

# FIRE AT NOS. 9, 11 AND 13, TEMPLE GARDENS:

On the motion for the adoption of the Report, Councillor Potter asked the Chairman of the Committee whether in view of the conflicting reports with regard to the fire which occurred at Nos. 9, 11 and 13, Temple Gardens on the 24th March with loss of life, he would be prepared to hold an Inquiry into the circumstances, at which the people who attended the fire and helped to extinguish it could attend to give evidence. Upon the Chairman of the Committee commencing to read a statement giving the facts relative to the fire, a motion was moved by Councillor Potter and seconded by Councillor Rice:—

THAT the question as to whether an Inquiry should be held be considered by the Council in Committee this evening.

After discussion, Councillor Potter intimated that with the consent of the Council and the seconder he would be prepared to withdraw his motion.

The Council having indicated assent, the motion was accordingly withdrawn.

The Chairman then read the following statement of the Fire Superintendent:-

"At 10.30 p.m. on the 24th instant a message was received, via the Exchange Telephone lines, at the Central Fire Station reporting a fire at No. 11, Temple Gardens, N.W. 11.

At 10.31 p.m. No. 1 machine and crew with the Station Officer in charge, was despatched from the Central Fire Station and arrived at the scene at 10.36 p.m.

Upon arrival it was found that the roofs of three houses, Nos. 9, 11, 13, were well alight and that a little girl was trapped in the back bedroom on the first floor of No. 11. The Officer in Charge immediately gave instructions for a further machine and crew to be summoned to assist, and at the same time ladders, hook ladders and breathing sets were brought into use in an endeavour to effect the rescue of the trapped child. No. 1 pump was brought into use with three lines of hose, one at the front of the house and the other two at the rear to cover the rescue attempts.

At 10.42 p.m. No. 2 machine and crew, from the Central Fire Station, arrived on the scene, and at this moment Fireman Boyall, after repeated futile attempts managed to gain entry into the child's bedroom through the back window and found the child lying on its face on the bed. He handed the child through the window to the arms of Fireman Austin who brought the child to the ground. Artificial respiration was resorted to immediately and oxygen administered but with no avail and Dr. L. Wailer of No. 738, Finchley Road, N.W. 11, who was on the spot, certified the child was dead.

I noticed that the supply of water was failing from the mains, and the pumps were not being as effective as I desired, so I communicated with the local Turncock by telephone, and just before his arrival the pressure began to increase again. At 10.55 p.m. I considered that it was necessary to obtain more manual assistance and sent for No. 4 machine and crew from the Mill Hill Fire Station, these arrived at 11.5 p.m. and about 15 minutes later the fire was under control, being finally extinguished by approximately 12.30 a.m. and all machines and their crews had returned to the stations by 1.27 a.m.

The fire had apparently started in the ground floor kitchen of No. 11 and spread to the bedrooms above and so to the roofs of the three houses, Nos. 9, 11, and 13."

- (1) Delay in reaching the fire from the times of calls made at between 10.40 and 10.20 p.m.;
- (2) Going to the wrong address;
- (3) Vital inadequacies in equipment, leadership and organisation;
- (4) Failure to maintain a proper water supply;
- (5) The urgent need, shown by this fire, to lessen future danger to lives and property."

Local Authorities will retain, with certain modifications, their "lay" functions under the Act which include the promulgation of the Ministry's orders; the service and enforcement of notices defining Infected Places; the detention and isolation of animals or the dipping of sheep in certain cases. Further they will continue to issue licences for the movement of animals in infected and controlled areas under conditions prescribed in the Ministry's Orders, and be responsible for the enforcement of all general Orders relating to the cleansing and disinfection of premises and places.

Functions in relation to meat inspection are unaffected. Noted.

#### ISOLATION HOSPITAL.

#### 16.-DRAINAGE:

The Medical Officer reported that a comprehensive test had been made of the drains at the Isolation Hospital when certain leakages were found. A detailed report on the subject has been prepared, and it was

RESOLVED—That a copy be forwarded to the Borough Surveyor for the necessary action.

#### 17.—SURGICAL UNIT:

Pursuant to the Committee's instruction (7/2/38-22) (2) a report was submitted by the Medical Superintendent as to the provision of a Surgical unit at the Isolation Hospital:—

The standard of treatment now being achieved at the more modern isolation hospitals is of such a character that a considerable but varying amount of operative interference is necessary and all recently built isolation hospitals have made provision for this. The increase is, in the main, due to infections of the ear, nose and throat following one of the acute infectious diseases, particularly Scarlet Fever and Measles. Children suffering from discharging ears are nearly always highly infectious and a large number of the cases of deafness in adult life follow inadequate treatment of ear, nose and throat infections in childhood.

At present surgical work is carried out in a specially prepared side room which is inconveniently small, washing up and sterilisation have to be done in the kitchen and there is no anæsthetic room. While the work is being carried on successfully under these conditions it throws an unnecessary burden on the staff in maintaining a standard of rigid surgical cleanliness.

Statistical information was submitted as to the operations performed during the past 15 months and having regard to the character of the operations and their number, the Committee have

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That a report be presented at the next meeting by the Medical Superintendent and Borough Surveyor (including the submission of plans and estimates) in relation to the provision of a surgical unit at the Isolation Hospital.

## 18.-WARD SISTER:

We, the undersigned members, submit the following report of an interim visit made to the above-named Hospital on Monday, the 28th day of March, 1938.

We visited the wards, laundry and administrative block and found the hospital busy and everything proceeding satisfactorily.

Attention was drawn to the fact that there was only a single telephone line and that this does not prove sufficient for the incoming calls, and we recommend that a second exchange line be installed.

(RECOMMENDATION APPROVED—SEE ITEM 1 (B) MAYOR'S RECESS REPORT TO COUNCIL, 9/5/38).

At the time the Committee considered the salary scales of Domestic Staff the recommendation then made did not clearly cover all domestic staff and created certain minor anomalies. In order to correct this it is

#### RECOMMENDED-

(i) That the Assistant Cook be placed on a scale of £50 x £5 to £60, the Table Maids on a scale of £45 x £5 to £55, and the Kitchen Maids, and Laundry Maids on a scale of £40 x £5 to £50 per annum to operate from 1st January, 1938.

Difficulty is still being experienced in the recruitment of Probationers and this is being intensified by the fact that the general knowledge examination of the General Nursing Council is now in force. It is

#### RECOMMENDED-

(ii) That the Matron be permitted to engage Assistant Nurses, as and when required, at a salary of £50 per annum.

Assistant Nurses are Nurses who have had a certain amount of training but who have not completed their course or have not sat for the State Examination. The numbers of these would be kept as low as possible, as, of course, it is desirable that the hospital should maintain its function as a Training School.

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REPORT

The Circular is addressed to water undertakers and to local authorities, and while it has more application to the former there are certain points arising which concern local authorities.

The Circular reminds local authorities of their duty under Section 111, subsection 1 of the Public Health Act of 1936, which imposes a duty to take from time to time such steps as may be necessary for ascertaining the sufficiency and wholesomeness of the water supplies within their district.

Hendon has a dual source of water supply:-

The Metropolitan Water Board supplying an area bounded on the West by the London Midland and Scottish Railway, on the North by a line along the Mutton Brook to Bridge Lane and on the East by the London & North Eastern Railway. The remaining Northern portion of the Borough is supplied by the Colne Valley Water Company.

The Metropolitan Water Board supplies selected Thames water which has been subjected to purification by storage in Queen Mary Reservoir for two months, in which time it is freed of the bulk of organisms. It is filtered through rapid and then slow sand filters, attaining a degree of purity which compares favourably with the general supplies in Great Britain, but as a further safeguard, terminal chloramination is applied which ensures a first class water in every respect. The quality of standard water which Hendon has been receiving for a definitely prolonged period is negative to Bact. coli in 100 ml. and a colony count of less than 5 per ml. Sampling of raw water, filtered water, mains water and all filter beds in rotation are examined on every working day, and the condition of the water in the reservoir is also kept under similar surveillance.

The Coine Valley Water Company derives the whole of its supply from deep wells sunk into the chalk and before distribution to the consumers the water is softened and chlorinated. The treatment the water receives and the purity of the supply are under the constant supervision of a resident chemical and bacteriological staff which carries out examinations in modern Laboratories situated at their Works.

The number of samples examined during the year by the Colne Valley Water Company were as follows:—

Of the 506 samples of softened water which were examined, 97.2 showed the absence of Bacillus coli in 100 c.c.

The presence of B. coli up to 2 per 100 c.c. of water is regarded as a good domestic supply and it will be seen therefore that a very high standard of purity is maintained.

Three points emerge from the circular and require special attention:-

 Action which can be taken to satisfy the requirements of Section III (1), Public Health Act, 1936.

At present no periodic sampling is carried out and in view of the very high standard of purity it seems doubtful whether any useful purpose would by served in doing so, as the only safeguard is constant vigilance at the source Complaints are, however, investigated and if it is considered necessary, before referring these to the appropriate water undertakers, samples are taken.

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(ii) The Council should make it their duty to bring to the notice of water undertakers cases of enteric fever or other diseases likely to be water-borne.

While there are a number of diseases which may from time to time be water-borne, typhoid or enteric fever, is the most important of these in this country. It would be advisable in future to notify the appropriate water undertakers of their occurrence.

(iii) Building development or other operations which might affect the purity of a source of water supply.

This is a matter which might conveniently be referred to the Buildings and Town Planning Committee, for consideration.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Medical Officer be instructed to ask the Metropolitan Water Board and the Colne Valley Water Company for a quarterly report on the water supplied by them in the Council's area.

## 22.—CENTRAL COMMITTEE—HENDON NURSING ASSOCIATIONS:

The Borough Treasurer reported the receipt of the accounts of the above Committee for the year ended 31st December, 1937. Noted.

#### 23.—CONFERENCE:

## IMPROVEMENT SCHEMES.

## 22.-MILL HILL BROADWAY BRIDGE:

In connection with the widening of The Broadway involving the reconstruction of the London Midland & Scottish Railway Company's Bridge, it was reported by the Borough Surveyor that the under-mentioned heads of agreement submitted by the London Midland & Scottish Railway Company had been forwarded to the Middlesex County Council:—

- (1) The Company to prepare all plans, specification and quantities and submit these to the Council. After their return to the Company approved, the Company will let a Contract in accordance therewith and will superintend the carrying out of the works.
- (2) The Company shall submit to the Council a list of the tenders received with a recommendation as to the acceptance of the most favourable.
- (3) The Council shall pay to the Company the whole cost of the work and upon the acceptance of a tender the Council shall pay to the Company a sum equal to 25 per cent. of the accepted tender and subsequently sums of a like amount when the previous instalment has been expended the balance to be adjusted on completion of the works.
- (4) The Council shall also pay to the Company a sum equal to  $7\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. of the amount of the Contract work to cover the preparation of the plans, specification, and supervision and accordingly  $7\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. shall be added to the sums payable by the Council under clause 3.
- (5) If the free and uninterrupted use of the railway of the Company or any traffic thereon shall be obstructed, hindered or interfered with during and in consequence of the carrying out of the work the Council shall repay to the Company on demand all cost and expenses to which the Company may be put and compensation for the loss sustained by the Company by reason of any such interruption or interference.
- (6) The Council to repay to the Company on demand the cost of :-
  - (a) Any alterations or additions (whether temporary or otherwise) to the permanent way, signals, telegraphs or other appliances or works of the Company including any additional maintenance.

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- (b) The provision of single line or other modified working and the possible slackening of traffic whenever in the opinion of the Company's Engineer the same shall be necessary during and in consequence of the carrying out of the work.
- (c) All necessary temporary support to the running lines of the Company.
- (d) All other expenses incurred by the Company on account of the works, including supervision, flagging, watching, lighting and wages of signalmen.
- (7) The Company to maintain the bridge structures, the Council paying to the Company an agreed commuted sum to cover the additional cost of maintenance and should it be necessary at any time or from time to time to hift the structures or to make good settlement therein due to mining operations to avoid doing which minerals are not purchased under clause 11 hereof, the Council to repay to the Company the additional cost incurred consequent upon the increased span of the bridges.
- (8) The Council to carry out all street works and afterwards maintain same.
- (9) The Council to make a payment for the easement and for any of the Company's land required.
- (10) The Company to be at liberty if and when they require to do so for any future widening or alteration of the railway to extend the bridges the Council to give any consent necessary and repay the Company the additional cost incurred both as regards construction and maintenance consequent upon the increased span of the bridges.
- (11) The Council to pay a fair proportion of any purchase money or compensation for any minerals required to be left unworked under the bridges if in the opinion of the Company it may be necessary for the Company to purchase or pay compensation.
- (12) The Company shall have such rights of access and frontage as are enjoyed by the owners of land having frontage to a public highway subject to any statutory restrictions from time to time in force.
- (13) General Indemnity Clause.
- (14) Arbitration Clause with a reference to the President of the Institution of Civil Engineers.

The County Council is prepared to approve the heads of agreement, subject to minor points in heads Nos. 5, 6 and 42 which can be dealt with on the draft agreement. The question of the sum to be paid for land and easements is at present under negotiation with the Estates Department of the Railway Company.

The works contemplate the road level under the bridge being lowered to the extent of two or three feet, and this fact with the frequent flooding in times of severe storms raises the question of the sufficiency of the existing surface water drainage system. It will be necessary to increase the capacity and lower the level of the watercourse which passes from The Broadway to Bunns Lane and through private property under Langley Park to an outlet under the London and North Eastern Railway, and it is suggested that this improvement should be effected by a culvert in the form of rustless corrugated iron and laid by the Council as a new storm water sewer under the previsions of Section 15 of the Public Health Act, 1936. The estimated cost of this work, which is largely consequent upon the road and bridge improvement, is £3,600 and should be included in the general improvement scheme and submitted to the County Council and the Minister of Transport in the usual way.

In connection with the road and bridge works, a letter was reported stating that the County Highways Committee is strongly of the opinion that this improvement should be carried out, and tentative approval has been given to the Scheme, but as the cost is

estimated at £38,600 it has been decided to await the decision of the Minister of Transport upon the question of grant, before recommending the County Council formally to approve the scheme. The matter will therefore be again considered by the County Highways Committee upon the receipt of the decision of the Minister of Transport. (Hi.C., 20/9/37—24).

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the heads of agreement outlined above be approved and the London Midland and Scottish Railway Company asked to forward the draft of the agreement to the Town Clerk.
- (ii) That the proposals for dealing with the surface water drainage estimated to cost £3,600 be approved, and submitted to the County Council and the Minister of Transport for inclusion in the general improvement scheme.
- (iii) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposals.]

#### 23.-SELVAGE LANE BRIDGE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted the following heads of agreement with the London Midland & Scottish Railway Company in connection with the reconstruction of the bridge carrying Selvage Lane over the Railway:—

- (1) The Company to prepare all plans, specification and quantities and submit these to the Council. After their return to the Company approved, the Company will let a Contract in accordance therewith, and will superintend the work of constructing the new bridge.
- (2) The Company shall submit to the Council a list of the tenders received with a recommendation as to the acceptance of the most favourable.
- (3) The Council shall pay to the Company the whole cost of the work and upon the acceptance of a tender the Council shall pay to the Company a sum equal to 25 per cent. of the accepted tender and subsequently sums of a like amount when the previous instalment has been expended the balance to be adjusted on completion of the works.
- (4) The Council shall also pay to the Company a sum equal to 7½ per cent. of the amount of the Contract work to cover the preparation of the plans, specification, and supervision and accordingly 7½ per cent. shall be added to the sums payable by the Council under clause 3.
- (5) If the free and uninterrupted use of the railway of the Company or any traffic thereon shall be obstructed, hindered or interfered with during and in consequence of the carrying out of the work the Council shall repay to the Company on demand all cost and expenses to which the Company may be put and compensation for the loss sustained by the Company by reason of any such interruption or interference.
- (6) The Council to repay to the Company on demand the cost of :-
  - (a) Any alterations or additions (whether temporary or otherwise) to the permanent way, signals, telegraphs or other appliances or works of the Company including any additional maintenance.
  - (b) The provision of single line or other modified working and the possible slackening of traffic whenever in the opinion of the Company's Engineer the same shall be necessary during and in consequence of the carrying out of the work.

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- (c) All necessary temporary support to the running lines of the Company.
- (d) All other expenses incurred by the Company on account of the works (including supervision, the cost of flagging, watching, lighting, and wages of signalmen).
- (7) The Company to maintain the new bridge structure the Council paying the Company an agreed commuted sum to cover the increased cost of maintenance, and should it be necessary at any time or from time to time to lift the structure or to make good any settlement therein due to mining operations to avoid doing which minerals are not purchased under clause 13 hereof, the Council to repay to the Company the additional cost incurred consequent upon the increased width of the bridge.
- (8) The Council to maintain the roadway on the bridge as widened and the approaches thereto, including fences, drains, etc., and in so doing not to raise the level of the road or otherwise increase the permanent load upon the super-structure of the bridge.
- (9) The Council to make a payment for the easement and for any of the Company's land required.
- (10) The Company to be at liberty if and when they require to do so for any future widening or alteration of the railway to extend the bridges the Council to give any consent necessary and repay the Company the additional cost incurred both as regards construction and maintenance consequent upon the increased span of the bridges.
- (11) The Company to have the right to open out the road over the bridge from time to time for the purpose of inspecting repairing maintaining or altering the bridge, or for any other purpose connected with their Undertaking, and in every such case to make good and restore the road to its former condition to the satisfaction of the Borough Engineer.
- (12) In the event of the Company requiring at any time or from time to time to lay any additional line or lines of railway or to carry out any other works in connection with their Undertaking, the Council to give any consent necessary and pay the additional cost involved in the construction and maintenance of such works by reason of the road and bridge having been widened, and should the said works affect the level of the roadway the Company to restore such roadway to the satisfaction of the Borough Engineer, the maintenance thereafter remaining with the Council.
- (13) The Council to pay a fair proportion of any purchase money or compensation for any minerals required to be left unworked under the bridge if in the opinion of the Company it may become necessary for the Company to purchase or pay compensation.
- (14) Arbitration Clause with a reference to the President of the Institution of Civil Engineers.

The heads of agreement have been submitted to the County Council who have some minor details to raise in connection therewith, but the Railway Company have agreed that such minor points can be dealt with in the draft agreement.

With regard to easements and the acquisition of land, the following terms have been provisionally agreed with the Railway Company, approved by the District Valuer and submitted to the County Council for formal approval:—

That the Company shall be paid the sum of £200, plus a Surveyor's fee of £5 5s. 0d. and proper legal costs in connection with the acquisition. (Hi.C., 1/2/37—25).

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#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the heads of agreement outlined above be approved and the London Midland and Scottish Railway Company be asked to forward the draft of the agreement to the Town Clerk.
- (ii) That the proposals with regard to easements and the acquisition of land be approved.
- (iii) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes

Committee concur in the proposals.]

## 24.-HOLDERS HILL ROAD IMPROVEMENT-PROGRESS REPORT:

It was reported that satisfactory progress is being maintained with the above improvement. Excavation is proceeding on the western half of the road between Holders Hill Gardens and Holders Hill Crescent. The construction of the traffic circus is completed on the western side and work is now proceeding on the eastern half of the Circus and Dollis Road. (Hi.C., 7/3/38—29). **Noted.** 

## 25.—THE VALE IMPROVEMENT—PROGRESS REPORT:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the work in connection with this improvement is nearing completion. The new carriageway, together with the sewers therein have been completed and the work is proceeding on the boundary walls and fencing. (Hi.C., 7/3/38—34). **Noted.** 

## 26.-STONEYFIELDS LANE-PROGRESS REPORT:

Good progress is being maintained with this improvement. The whole of the kerb and concrete foundation to the road is completed and the footpaths are now in course of construction. (Hi.C., 7/3/38—36). **Noted.** 

## 27.-FINCHLEY ROAD IMPROVEMENT-PROGRESS REPORT:

It was reported by the Borough Surveyor that the whole of the work on the western side of the Finchley Road has now been completed and opened to traffic. The concreting on the eastern side is nearing completion and wood paving is in progress from the Hampstead boundary. The Contractors have agreed to work a certain amount of overtime and with reasonable weather, the works should be completed before Easter. (Hi.C., 7/3/38—35). **Noted.**

# 28.—PASSENGER TRANSPORT SERVICES IN THE COUNTY—MIDDLESEX COUNTY COUNCIL—REPORT OF TRAFFIC SUB-COMMITTEE:

The Committee received the report of a meeting of the County Council's Traffic Sub-Committee held at the Guildhall, Westminster on the 9th March, 1938. The matters in respect of which Hendon made representations were dealt with by the Sub-Committee as follows:—

## Metropolitan Line from Stanmore to Edgware-Reduction of Fares.

It was RESOLVED-

That this Sub-Committee is of opinion that a revision of the fares on the Metropolitan Railway serving Wembley and Harrow is much overdue and implores the London Passenger Transport Board to take immediate steps to bring about a uniformity in fares.

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, 55. 0d. 1—25). On behalf of the Board it was stated that they fully appreciate the position and the matter would be rectified as soon as possible.

#### Omnibus Service No. 240.

With regard to omnibus service No. 240 the London Passenger Transport Board could not agree that the service was inadequate and asked to be supplied with further details of the complaint.

## Edgware-Morden Line.

With regard to the number of coaches on the Edgware—Morden Line trains during the day time, the Board's representative stated that he would report to the next meeting of the Sub-Committee.

#### Service No. 142.

In connection with trolley buses and 'bus service No. 142, the Board's representatives said that they could not agree that this was inadequate, although there might be some irregularity and they undertook to look into the matter and report to the next meeting of the Sub-Committee. (Hi.C., 7/2/38—27 and 28).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That further information be obtained in respect of the complaint relating to 'bus service No. 240 and supplied to the Traffic Sub-Committee.

## 29.-BRENT, WATFORD WAY AND CRICKLEWOOD LANE-STOPPING PLACES:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Minister of Transport referring to the recent inspection, at which the Council were represented, of the above stopping places, and stating that after consultation with the London & Home Counties Traffic Advisory Committee, the Minister had decided that such stopping places should be put into operation for an experimental period commencing on the 30th March, 1938. It is proposed to review the working of such stopping places at the end of three months and representations are invited from the Council before the expiration of this period. Details of the stopping places are as follows:—

## Cricklewood Lane.

Outward bound trolley buses to stop at the party wall of No. 153/155.

(Approximate position—just west of junction with Hendon Way).

Inward bound trolley buses to stop opposite door of No. 292. (Approximate position—just east of junction with Hendon Way).

## Hendon Way.

South bound omnibuses to stop opposite the party wall of Nos. 38/40.

(Approximate position—just north of junction with Cricklewood Lane).

North bound omnibuses to stop in line with the second small tree south of Cricklewood Lane. (Approximate position—between Cricklewood Lane and Hocroft Avenue).

## Watford Way.

North-west bound omnibuses to stop at the entrance to No. 11. (Approximate position—just north of Central Circus).

#### Church Road.

East bound omnibuses to stop at the party wall of Nos. 10/11, Sutton Parade. (Approximate position—just east of junction with Sunny Gardens Road).

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#### Parson Street.

South bound omnibuses to stop at the party wall of Nos. 20/22, Quadrant Parade. (Approximate position—just north of junction with Finchley Lane).

## Finchley Lane.

West bound omnibuses to stop at the lamp standard opposite Nos. 13/15. (Approximate position—just east of junction with Brent Street).

East bound omnibuses to stop at the party wall of Nos. 19/21. (Approximate position—just east of junction with Parson Street).

#### Brent Street.

South bound omnibuses to stop at the southern wall of No. 194. (Approximate position—just south of junction with Finchley Lane).

North bound omnibuses to stop opposite lamp standard No. 65. (Approximate position—just south of junction with Church Road). **Noted.** 

#### 30.—SELVAGE LANE—STANDING ACCOMMODATION:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the London Passenger Transport Board stating for the information of the Council, that the standing accommodation at Deans Lane, Mill Hill, for Route No. 52 is inadequate for the requirements on Saturday afternoons and that it is therefore proposed that 'buses on this route operating between Mill Hill and Willesden Garage shall stand on the south-west side of Selvage Lane, outside Nos. 46/48.

'Buses will proceed from Deans Lane via Selvage Lane, turn around the island at Gibbs Green back into Selvage Lane to stand and depart direct. Noted.

### 31.-BYE-LAW-CYCLING ON PUBLIC FOOTPATHS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Under Secretary of State, Home Office, stating that the Secretary of State confirmed the bye-law made by the Council on the 6th December, 1937, under Section 249 of the Local Government Act. 1933, as to cycling on certain public footpaths.

The date on which the bye-law is to come into operation has been fixed as the 1st May, 1938.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That notices calling attention to the bye-law be posted in suitable places adjoining the footpaths to which the bye-law applies.

## 32.-MILL HILL SUBWAY:

The Committee considered a letter addressed to Councillor Collins from Mr. E. T. Reynolds calling attention to the damage being caused to lamps, etc., in and adjacent to the Mill Hill Subway.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the attention of the Police be called to the matter and that notices be displayed stating that a reward of £1 will be paid to the person or persons giving information leading to the conviction of the offenders.

An area of approximately eight acres would be required and the proceeds of this function form practically the entire support of the Actors' Orphanage.

The allocation to allotments has been coaditionally approved by the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries and is in exchange for other land in Mill Hill to be appropriated from allotments to open space.

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## 10.-TENNIS COURTS:

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The Borough Surveyor reported on the difficulties encountered to meet the increasing demand for the use of tennis courts on Sundays in the various parks and open spaces. The Courts now open for play at 1 p.m. (E.P. & A.C., 27/6/32—9) and it has been found impossible to satisfy applications for advanced bookings, apart from the demand made by persons visiting the parks in the hope of finding a court available for play.

## 10.-PROGRESS REPORT:

The Borough Surveyor reported satisfactory progress. Approximately 50 per cent. of the houses had been finished and of the remaining 70, 68 had the plastering completed. The fencing work had also been put in hand. **Noted.** 

#### 11.-TENANCY OF HOUSES:

The Committee considered a report from the Housing Manager.

RESOLVED—That three of the cases on the Watling Estate (referred to in paragraph No. 8) be offered houses at Dole Street, and also applicants from the Council's ordinary lists whether or not overcrowding exists.

#### 12.-HOUSING OF PERSONS SUFFERING FROM TUBERCULOSIS:

The following resolution was submitted from the Borough of Tottenham together with the observations of the Medical Officer of Health on the matter:—

"That the Town Clerk be directed to communicate with Mr. F. Messer, M.P., J.P., and the local authorities in the County of Middlesex requesting them to make strong representations to the Middlesex County Council in regard to the provision of housing accommodation for persons suffering from Tuberculosis."

On a previous application from the Lottenham Borough Council the County Council considered the question of seeking housing powers for tuberculosis and other patients and their families but ultimately decided to take no action thereon (P.H. & M.S.C., 15/11/37-42).

It is the practice of this Council to provide housing accommodation for these cases subject to the residence qualification being satisfactory, viz.:—"that the applicant or his wife has had five years continuous residence in the district immediately prior to the date of application."

The Committee have duly noted the resolution from the Borough of Tottenham, but they are of opinion that consideration should be given to applications for Council Houses, where any of the intended occupants are suffering from tuberculosis, irrespective of compliance with the residence qualification, and they RECOMMEND accordingly.

## 13.—CLITTERHOUSE ESTATE—SCREENING OF LAVATORIES:

The Committee received the Borough Surveyor's report on the above subject (Hg.C., 14/3/38—4). On the Clitterhouse Estate screens have been erected in 96 cases where the external W.C.'s are adjacent. There are 194 houses where conditions differ in this

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respect and the Borough Surveyor estimates the cost of the provision of screens 6 feet by 4 feet consisting of oak posts and deal rails and boards at approximately £200. It was pointed out that the available money for repairs for the present financial year has already been allocated, and if capital works are to be financed out of the repairs fund the necessity might arise to reduce the approved programme.

Consideration was given to the question of providing where necessary, screens and overhead protection for external W.C.'s in connection with all the Council's Housing Estates, which the Borough Surveyor estimates would involve an expenditure of £1,000.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That, where necessary, screens and overhead protection be provided for the external W.C.'s on the whole of the Council's Housing Estates, and that the Finance and General Purposes Committee be requested to make the necessary financial provision.

## 15.—TEMPORARY ALLOTMENTS—TERMINATION OF TENANCIES—RENTERS AVENUE AND BRENT HILL:

The Committee have re-considered the following item of their report of the 14th March which was referred back by the Council at their Meeting on the 28th March.

"Consideration was given to the reference from the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee (7/3/38—Item 16). The Housing Committee were informed by the Borough Surveyor that it is anticipated that it will be possible to commence building operations on the land in September next.

As stated in the report of the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee the Council (11/10/37) authorised the service of notices terminating the allotment tenancies at the end of September provided there be a certainty that building operations will commence on the site immediately after the expiration of such notices but arising out of the further consideration of the matter by the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee on the 7/2/38-21 these notices were withheld. The Housing Committee have been reminded of the report of the Town Clerk intimating that if compensation is to be avoided the tenancies can only be determined by the service of six months' notice in writing expiring on the 25th March in any year, or, alternatively by re-entry on three months' notice after the land has been appropriated, but compensation would be payable.

After due consideration of the matter, and in view of the fact that building operations can commence about the end of September, it was

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#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That immediate steps be taken to obtain the consent of the Minister of Health to the appropriation from Sewage Disposal of the lands allocated for Housing purposes north of the River Brent by resolution of the Council of the 5th October, 1936.
- (2) That upon receipt of the Minister's instrument of appropriation the allotment tenancies on 3.3 acres Renters Avenue and 3.8 acres Brent Hill be determined by re-entry on three months' notice in writing expiring not earlier than the 30th September, 1938."

In connection therewith the Committee's attention was drawn to the report of the Special (Development) Committee of the 21st March which was similarly referred back by the Council and in which the following recommendations were made:—

- "(1) That the proposed housing development be confined to 10.8 acres, for the erection of 120 houses, as contemplated by the Housing Committee (14/2/38—13).
  - (2) **That** the remainder (11.2 acres) of the land allocated for housing purposes by resolution of the Council on the 5th October, 1936, be placed to 'reserve' for a period of five years."

The Council are reminded that on the recommendation of the Housing Committee (14/2/38—13) they approved a preliminary scheme which contemplates the provision of 60 3-bedroom non-parlour houses, and 60 2-bedroom non-parlour houses, designed on the assumption that the houses will be crected to deal with normal housing requirements as distinct from any special requirements which will be necessary in dealing with cases of overcrowding, sites for this development being 10.8 acres, made up as follows:—

3.8 acres Brent Hill Temporary Allotments.
3.3 acres Renters Avenue Temporary Allotments.
3.7 acres Adjoining Renters Avenue Allotments.

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The Council at their meeting on the 28th March passed the following resolution:-

"That in the view of the Council, upon completion of the Dole Street Housing Scheme, and the erection of 120 houses at Brent Hill, the obligation of the Council in relation to the provision of houses for the working classes will have been satisfied, and that no further houses shall be erected by the Council under the Housing Acts unless and until the conditions in the Borough shall have so changed as to render such course necessary."

The Committee have received a further representation from the Brent Hill Open Space Committee requesting consideration of proposals which would have the effect of (i) providing the houses on the Renters Avenue Site and also, if deemed necessary, on the proposed Recreation Ground on the south side thereof, and (ii) abandoning the scheme for the erection of houses on the Brent Hill Temporary Allotments adjoining Dallas Road, and the reservation of a portion of the Temporary Allotments as a Playing Field for Brent Modern School.

The Committee have no recommendation to make on the representation.

In view of the resolution passed by the Council on the 28th March, the Housing Committee now

HENDON PLANNING SCHEME NO. 1.

#### 1.-LAND JUNCTION OF THE DRIVE WITH HALE LANE, EDGWARE:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from Mr. F. Howkins for consent to erect on the above land a single storey lock-up shop. A similar application was disapproved by the late Hendon Rural District Council in 1924.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That consent be refused (Clause 43).

#### 2.-LAND-DOLE STREET, MILL HILL:

An amended application was considered from Housales Ltd., for consent to erect 44 flats, having the external appearance of eleven pairs of houses, on land fronting Dole Street and backing on to the Cemetery owned by the Metropolitan Borough of Paddington. (B. & T.P.C., 14/3/38) (Building The previous application provided for 48 flats. Application No. A.7229).

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That consent be given (Clauses 35 and 36) subject to the following conditions:-

- (a) That the plans and elevations of the proposed flats shall be to the Council's approval.
- (b) That all staircases shall be contained within the buildings.
- (c) That the front boundary of the site shall be adjusted to a line to be approved and any land between this line and the existing boundary of the highway conveyed to the Corporation.
- (d) That the land surrounding the proposed flats shall be laid out as gardens and maintained to the approval of the Council.

#### 3.—SIGN—FIRST NATIONAL CLEANERS LTD., BRENT STREET, HENDON:

This is an application on behalf of the First National Cleaners Ltd., of Brent Works, Brent Street, Hendon, for consent to the erection of an electric box sign three feet long. by two feet in depth which will project three feet six inches, at a height of eight feet six inches, over the public highway.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That consent be refused (Clause 51).

#### HENDON PLANNING SCHEME NO. 2.

#### 4.-PUBLIC INQUIRY:

The Town Clerk reported that the Public Inquiry, by an Inspector from the Ministry of Health, into the Council's application for approval of the above Scheme took place on Tuesday, the 29th March, when the necessary evidence in the case was given by the Borough Surveyor.

The following statements give particulars as to the objections heard at the Inquiry and as to any proposed action to satisfy the representations submitted.

(A). Mr. Leslie Raymond, on behalf of Messrs. Bennett & James. re 164, Golders Green Road (Nos. 158, 160 and 162 are also involved).

The properties concerned are included in the special residential zone of the Scheme, which is in accordance with the present user, and the application was for re-zoning for business purposes. The Council (28/2/38) agreed to give favourable consideration to a scheme for shop development, and on the 28/3/38 approved a building line for the purpose, subject to the final scheme of development being to the Council's approval, but in the meantime formal disapproval under the Restriction of Ribbon Development Act, 1935, has been recorded.

The principle of development for business purposes is thus agreed, but it is not intended to alter the zoning provisions of the Scheme. The intended development can be adequately safeguarded by an agreement under Clause 58 of the Scheme, and the objectors have agreed to this course.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That, in consideration of the objection being withdrawn, consent be given for an agreement to be entered into under Glause 58 of the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 2 providing for the re-development of the site of Nos. 158, 160, 162 and 164, Golders Green Road, for business purposes, subject to the final scheme of development being to the Council's approval and to conformity with the Restriction of Ribbon Development Act, 1935;
- (2) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents in the matter.
- (B). Mr. Leslie Raymond, on behalf of The Alliance Assurance Co., Ltd. and Miss Hodson.
  re Willifield House, Willifield Way, N.W. 11.

Willifield House is to all intents and purposes surrounded by residential development. The premises were erected with the approval of the Council and are used for offices and a garage. The application was for re-zoning for business purposes.

The Council, 15/3/37, upon consideration of the objection decided to adhere to the residential zoning.

It is obviously undesirable to create small business zones of this character, and on behalf of the Council it was submitted that the present use of the premises could be secured for the future by an application for consent under Clause 52 of the Scheme. Such consent cannot, however, properly be issued before the Scheme comes into operation, but in the meantime an undertaking could be given in the matter, and this course is agreeable to the objectors.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, in consideration of the objection being withdrawn, and upon the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 2 coming into operation, the Council undertake on an application from the owners under Clause 52 of the Scheme to give their approval of the continuance of the existing use of Willifield House.

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Works, t long, ht feet (C). Messes, Withall & Withall, on behalf of Newnhams, Ltd., re Nos. 1 and 2, Willifield Parade.

This objection was not received until the 24th March. The premises with frontages to Finchley Road and Willifield Way were formerly used as motor showrooms but at the present time are unoccupied.

The Scheme provides for residential zoning, to which objection was raised. The surrounding development is in accordance with the Scheme and the inclusion of the property in a residential zone is the only reasonable course to maintain. It was submitted that the premises could, if necessary, be dealt with under the secondary zoning provisions, which would give the Council a degree of control over the user, and the objectors agreed to accept an undertaking in regard to use for shops.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, in consideration of the objection being withdrawn, and upon the Hendon Planning Sheeme No. 2 coming into operation, the Council

- (i) undertake, on an application from the Owners under Clause 52 of the Scheme, to give approval to the principle that the user for which the premises were built, viz., shops, may in all events continue; and
- (ii) agree that there would be no objection by the Council to re-development for similar purposes in conformity with satisfactory plans to be approved by the Council.
- (D). Benskins Watford Brewery, Ltd.
  re Royal Oak Public House, Finchley Road.

This objection was made direct to the Ministry of Health and concerns the zoning as a private open space of a small piece of land at the rear of these premises.

The Council, 28/3/38, approved heads of agreement, including a re-zoning of the area concerned in Zone II., and pending the execution of an agreement under Clause 58 of the Scheme, the objectors express themselves as satisfied and will formally withdraw the objection in due course. **Noted.** 

(E). Messrs. Cluttons, on behalf of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, re 781 and 783, Finchley Road, N.W.2.

These properties are included in the special residential Zone II. but are at present used as a private school and contractors' yard, and the application was for re-zoning for business purposes.

The Council, 15/3/37, decided to adhere to residential zoning, but at the Inquiry it was put forward that if a satisfactory re-development scheme for shops with flats over was submitted it would probably meet with the approval of the Council.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Messrs. Cluttons be informed that, in consideration of the objection being withdrawn, the Council are prepared to approve the principle of the re-development of the site of 781 and 783, Finchley Road, N.W.2 for shops with flats over, subject to the final scheme of development being to the Council's approval.

(F). Messrs. Hall, Brydon & Chapman, on behalf of Master Sign Makers' Association.
re Clause 49—Advertisements.

The Clause provides protection of Zones II. and III. under the provisions of Section 47 of the Town & Country Planning Act, 1932.

The objectors contended that the protection of Zone III. is too extensive and is unreasonable, and proposals were submitted to modify the Clause in its application to that Zone.

Clause 40 provides that advertisements for certain permitted purposes shall not contain letters, etc., exceeding 6 inches in height and shall not (except where affixed to and not projecting above a vertical wall of a building) exceed a height of 12 feet from the ground.

The proposed modification based upon a Clause recently allowed in the Godalming Town Planning Scheme, is that the protection of Section 47 of the Act shall not extend in Zone III. to advertisements—displayed on premises in use relate solely to a trade or business carried on in the premises—no part of which

- (a) is at a less height than 9 feet clear above the surface of the street; or
- (b) is nearer the carriageway than 2 feet 6 inches from the outer edge of the kerb;
- (c) projects more than 4 feet from the wall, shop front or other part of the premises to which it is attached, or more than 1 foot of the advertisement extends more than 2 feet (not including stays or supports) along the face of the premises; or
- (d) exceeds 2 feet 6 inches in height.

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and is ation to RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, in consideration of the objection being withdrawn, Clause 49 of the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 2 be amended to conform to the Godalming Clause, incorporating the proposals outlined above.

Mr. Thomas' representation was on the question of street trading and he endeavoured to establish a case for objecting to street trading in Yew Grove by reference to certain provisions of the Planning Scheme. He was advised that it was not a matter which could be dealt with under town planning powers. **Noted.** 

No objection was received in this case, but representations were submitted as to the use of this property, which comprises a private dwelling house, builder's yard, stores, workshop and garage—said to have been so used for 30 years.

An intimation was given that having regard to the existing user the Council would give favourable consideration to an application under Clause 52 of the Scheme in due course.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the action taken be approved.

#### 1.-SURPLUS (SEWAGE DISPOSAL) LANDS:

North of the River Brent.

The Committee re-considered the item of their report of the 21st March, referred back by the Council at their last meeting—28/3/38, and having regard to the altered circumstances now report as follows:—

It will be remembered that the lay-out of these lands contemplated an ultimate housing development of some 240 houses, on 22 acres, but in the first instance it was proposed to erect only 120.

In view of the Council's resolution No. 209 restricting for the present the housing development to 120 houses it was represented that the lay-out of such houses approved by the Council on the 28th February (Hsg.C., 14/2/38 — 13) presented some difficulty in as much as the full development of 240 houses could not at the moment be anticipated. The partial development provided some 40 houses on 3.8 acres near Dallas Road on the west side of the Estate and about 80 houses on 7 acres adjacent to Hendon Way on the east side, and the Committee are of opinion that a more satisfactory lay-out can be provided on the lines indicated by the Borough Surveyor and shown on the plan submitted.

The proposal to some extent necessitates a re-consideration of the whole question of the utilization of the lands north of the River Brent, and the Committee have accordingly given the matter close attention.

The position in the matter at present is as follows:-

**Housing Land** allocated 5/10/38 — 22 acres.

This area includes :-

15 acres existing Temporary Allotments, Brent Hill.

3.3 acres existing Temporary Allotments, Renters Avenue.

3.7 acres other adjoining surplus land.

Permanent Allotments allocated 5/10/36 — 10 acres.

This area includes 2.7 acres of the existing Brent Hill Temporary Allotments and 7.3 acres of other adjoining land and is situate in a central position, between 15 acres to the West and 7 acres on the East, forming the 22 acres allocated for housing.

Permanent Open Space allocated 28/2/38 — 10 acres.

This area until recently was part of the site of the Sewage Disposal Works, and is situate south of the land allocated (as above) for permanent allotments and the land allocated for housing development (7 acres) on the east side of the estate.

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The Committee now

#### RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the contemplated housing development of 120 houses be sited on 10 acres of land now used as part of the Brent Hill Temporary Allotments, commencing from Dallas Road, and that this allocation be referred to the Housing Committee, together with the lay-out plan submitted;
- (2) That 10 acres of land to the east and adjoining the above site be allocated for open space;
- (3) That the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee be informed of the above allocations and requested to consider and report on the demand for allotments in this area and as to their proposals for the allocation of lands for the purpose on the east side of the Estate;
- (4) That any resolutions of the Council inconsistent with the above be varied accordingly.

[Note.—A plan showing the allocations referred to in the above recommendations will be exhibited in the Members' Room.]

#### 2.-WEST MIDDLESEX DRAINAGE SCHEME:

Land-North Circular Road.

An application has been considered from the District Valuer acting on behalf of the Middlesex County Council for the acquisition of a plot of land with an approximate frontage of 25 feet to the North Circular Road, and a depth of some 75 feet adjoining the Council's Refuse Destructor Works and forming part of the land reserved for the extension thereof. The site is required for the establishment of a chlorination station in connection with the West Middlesex Main Drainage Scheme.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the sale of the land, subject to the following:—

- (i) The approval of the Minister of Health;
- (ii) Satisfactory terms being agreed with the District Valuer acting for the Middlesex County Council;

#### FIRST-AID AND CLEANSING POSTS:

The Sub-Committee, accompanied by the Borough Engineer, the Medical Officer of Health, and the Town Clerk's A.R.P. Assistant inspected the following buildings, which have been included in the Draft Air Raid Precautions (General) Scheme No. 1 as First-Aid and Cleansing Posts:—

Garden Suburb Council School, Child's Way.

Wessex Gardens Council School,

Child's Hill Council School.

St. Barnabas Parish Hall.

St. Michael's Parish Hall.

The Sub-Committee are of the opinion that the three schools mentioned are suitable both from the point of view of location and construction for adaptation as First Aid and Cleansing Posts.

With regard to the St. Barnabas and St. Michael's Parish Halls, these buildings in the opinion of the Sub-Committee are unsuitable by reason of their size and type of construction for adaptation as First Aid and Cleansing Posts, and in these circumstances, they

RECOMMEND—That St. Barnabas Parish Hall and St. Michael's Parish Hall be deleted from Section 9 of the Draft Scheme.

Consequent upon the above recommendation to delete St. Michael's Parish Hall from the Draft Scheme, the Sub-Committee have given consideration to alternative premises in the vicinity. They have, therefore, inspected the Branch Library in Golders Green Road, and have come to the conclusion that this building could be readily adapted as a First-Aid and Cleansing Post. In addition, the Branch Library is conveniently situated in the area it is intended to serve. The Sub-Committee, therefore,

RECOMMEND.—That the Golders Green Branch Library be included in Section 9 of the Draft Scheme as a First-Aid and Cleansing Post.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That payment of the Lecturer's Fees as above indicated be approved.

#### 3.-BRITISH RED-CROSS SOCIETY:

#### (A).

First-Aid and Anti-Gas Training.

It was reported that classes in First-Aid arranged by the British Red Cross Society in conjunction with the Council had commenced as follows:—

Hendon Town Hall-Wednesdays, 2.45-4.45 p.m.

Hendon Town Hall-Fridays, 8.0-10 p.m.

A further First Aid Course is being arranged to commence at the Branch Library, Golders Green, on Wednesday, 4th May at 8 p.m.

Each of the First-Aid Courses will be followed by courses of instruction in anti-gas measures, the lecturer's fees being payable by the Council.

Arrangements have also been made with the British Red Cross Society for a course of lectures in First-Aid, to be followed by a course of instruction in anti-gas measures, to commence at Mill Hill on Monday, 25th April at 8 p.m. The first lecture will take place at the Hartley Hall, and subsequent lectures until the conclusion of the courses will be held in the Branch Library, Hartley Avenue.

A course of instruction in anti-gas measures (First-Aid in Chemical Warfare) arranged in conjunction with the British Red Cross Society will commence at Edgware Council School on Thursday, the 28th April.

The maximum fee for anti-gas lecturers provided by the British Red Cross Society is one guinea per lecture, each course consisting of seven or eight lectures.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for payment of such fees as may be necessary, not exceeding one guinea per lecture, for anti-gas lecturers in connection with the anti-gas courses indicated above.

#### (B). First-Aid Training—A,R,P. Volunteers.

It was reported that one or two persons who had volunteered to serve in the First-Aid Section of the Council's A.R.P. organisation had objected to the fee of 2/6d. charged by the British Red Cross Society for the course of instruction in First-Aid. It is an essential feature of the A.R.P. organisation that the training of all personnel is to be provided free. The Committee, therefore,

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That arrangements be entered into with the Hendon Branch of the British Red Gross Society whereby all A.R.P. Personnel for whom training is necessary will be trained without cost to the respective volunteers.

#### 4.-ST. JOHN AMBULANCE BRIGADE:

#### (A). First-Aid and Anti-Gas Training.

The Town Clerk reported that on the 31st March he had interviewed Mr. G. P. Hart, Divisional Superintendent of No. 56 (Cricklewood) Division, and Mr. W. H. Lane, Divisional Superintendent, No. 115 (Edgware and Watling) Division of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, together with Mr. Standingford of Headquarters Staff, with a view to ascertaining the measure of assistance the Brigade would be prepared to contribute towards manning First Aid Posts and the training of auxiliary personnel.

It was ascertained that the majority of the members of the Brigade within the Borough are fully trained in first-aid and anti-gas to man first-aid posts, and a number are also under training in anti-gas measures.

As a result of the interview, the Brigade Officers agreed to arrange two courses of lectures as soon after Easter as practicable (one at Child's Hill and the other at Burnt Oak), the classes at each course to consist of a maximum of 50 persons. Each course will consist of eight lectures in anti-gas measures, and a minimum of six lectures on First-Aid.

The Officers of the Brigade gave an assurance of their desire and willingness to cooperate with the Council to the utmost of their ability

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given to the payment of lecturers' fees and any necessary expenditure on publicity, etc., in connection with the first-aid and anti-gas courses to be conducted by the St. John Ambulance Brigade.

[The Finance and General Purposes Committee have noted the proposal

#### (B). Accommodation for Training.

The Committee were informed that the Women's Detachment of the St. John Ambulance Brigade were experiencing difficulty in obtaining suitable accommodation for holding their lectures and practical training, and it was

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That facilities similar to those accorded to the British Red Cross Society be granted to the St. John Ambulance Brigade.

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#### 5-TEMPORARY STAFF:

The Town Clerk reported that, with the authority of His Worship the Mayor, a male temporary clerical assistant had been engaged as from and including Tuesday, the 22nd March, at the usual weekly rate paid by the Council for such temporary assistance.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 6 .- AIR RAID SHELTERS-CONFERENCE:

It was reported that on the 31st March, the Borough Engineer attended a conference at the Home Office between Sir Alexander Rouse of the Home Office and the Chief Engineers of the Local Authorities within, or partly within, the Metropolitan Police Area to discuss the possibilities and the methods of a survey of the accommodation available, or which could be made available, within the area of each Authority for air raid shelters. It is understood that the Home Office will shortly address a letter to local Authorities on the subject. **Noted.** 

#### 7.-MEETING TO ENROL VOLUNTEERS:

It was reported that on Friday, the 8th April, the Chairman of the Committee (Councillor Naar) accompanied by the Town Clerk's A.R.P. Assistant, addressed a meeting of the North London Branch of the Vatuers, Surveyors and Estate Agents Association of Great Britain at the Ambassador Dance Hall, Hendon Central, and at the conclusion of the meeting, a number of volunteers were enrolled. **Noted.** 

#### 8.-EDGWARE RATEPAYERS' ASSOCIATION:

A letter was submitted from the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Edgware Ratepayers' Association offering to place the organisation of the Association at the disposal of the Committee should it be desired to convene a public meeting in Edgware with a view to enrolling volunteers, the cost of publicity to be borne by the Council.

Instructions have been given for the Committee's thanks to be conveyed to the Association, together with an intimation that the Committee will be pleased to accept their offer of co-operation at the appropriate time.

#### 9.—A.R.P. INSTRUCTOR'S COURSE—ST. JOHN AMBULANCE BRIGADE:

A communication was received from the A.R.P. Administrative Officer of the Middlesex County Council transmitting a syllabus of a week-end instructor's course to be held by the St. John Ambulance Brigade at the Great Central Hotel, London, on April 23rd and 24th, and intimating that the Brigade were prepared to reserve twelve vacancies for Middlesex up to a week before the beginning of the Course. In view of the unlikelihood of Middlesex being given a large number of vacancies at the Civilian Anti-Gas School, Falfield, the County A.R.P. Administrative Officer suggested that one of the Council's Sanitary Inspectors who had been nominated for the Falfield course should in the meantime attend the week-end course referred to. The fee for the course, including examination fee, is two pounds, and candidates who successfully pass the examination qualify as "Grade 4, External Instructor."

As a matter of urgency, the Committee have authorised the attendance at the course of one of the Sanitary Inspectors nominated for Falfield, and payment of the necessary fees and out-of-pocket expenses of the Officer nominated for the course.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the action of the Committee be approved.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 10.-WOODSIDE PARK-A.R.P. LECTURE:

In response to a request from the Woodside Park Garden Suburb Ratepayers' Association transmitted through the Council, Major Robinson, the County Council's Administrative A.R.P. Officer addressed a meeting of over 200 residents of the Woodside Park Garden Suburb at the Club House on the 8th March. Expenditure amounting to one guinea for the hire of the hall and 10/- for handbills advertising the meeting was incurred by the Association in connection with the meeting, and they have requested that the amount should be borne by the A.R.P. account. The County Council are prepared to recognise the expenditure for A.R.P. purposes, and in these circumstance, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That payment of the expenditure amounting to £2 1s. 0d. be approved.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 11.-MIDDLESEX AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS ADVISORY COMMITTEE:

A meeting of the Middlesex Air Raid Precautions Advisory Committee was held at the Guildhall, Westminster, on Friday, the 25th March, when Councillor Naar attended accompanied by the Town Clerk's A.R.P. Assistant.

The following conclusions arrived at by the Advisory Committee were reported:-

#### (a) BUILDINGS AND FURNITURE:

No rental value in respect of office accommodation in municipal buildings will be recognised by the Home Office for purposes of grant.

Local authorities are asked to send to the County Council for submission to the Home Office:—

- particulars of any rents and tenures of premises hired, or proposed to be hired; also of the cost of furniture specially purchased or proposed to be purchased.
- (ii) all proposals, with plans, for the adaptation of buildings. Noted.

#### (b) PAYMENT OF INSTRUCTORS:

In the opinion of the Advisory Committee, the maximum payment to C.A.G.S. instructors (whether or not on the staff of local authorities) for holding evening classes should be 40s. 6d. for one class, or 45s. for taking two classes on the same evening. Officers of local authorities should not be paid for giving instruction during working hours.

The Home Office has intimated that £25 a month is considered too high a salary for a whole-time instructor. The salary of the instructors appointed by the County Council is £20 per month, and any proposal to pay a higher salary should be submitted to the County Council.

#### (c) REMUNERATION OF PERMANENT STAFF:

The Home Office is unlikely to recognise for grant in normal cases a proportion of the salary of such officers as Clerks, Surveyors, and Medical Officers in respect of the time spent on A-R.P. duties appropriate to their respective offices. Proposals in exceptional cases should be submitted to the County Council.

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#### (d) WORKMEN:

The Advisory Committee considers it undesirable to deprive roadmen and other workmen of wages when they are away from their work for the purpose of being trained in A.P.P. duties which they would be expected to perform in an emergency. It is recognised and expected that this training will normally be carried out in working hours, but where it is carried out in the evening, the Committee does not consider the payment of "overtime" desirable as a rule.

The Home Office will not recognise for grant the value of the time lost to Highways Departments when workmen are trained during working hours, unless additional or substitute labour has to be employed to replace them. **Noted.** 

#### (e) EQUIPMENT FOR TRAINING DECONTAMINATION SQUADS, ETC.:

It is hoped that as far as possible use will be made of existing equipment, but that if special purchases for training are deemed to be necessary, local authorities will notify the County Council of the proposed purchases. **Noted.** 

#### (f) INSURANCE OF VOLUNTEERS:

The Advisory Committee approves of insuring volunteers under training for benefits similar to those suggested by the Home Office for auxiliary firemen (maximum £1,000) at a premium not exceeding 1s. 3d, per head. **Noted.** 

#### (g) CONVERSION OF REFUSE FREIGHTERS:

As at present advised, the Home Office is not prepared to accept for grant, proposals for the adaptation of refuse-collecting freighters at a cost approaching  $\pounds 300$  per vehicle. The Department is going further into this matter. **Noted-**

#### (h) STORAGE OF RESPIRATORS:

The Home Office proposes to issue an approved scheme, with a specimen lay-out, in the very near future. It is recognised that steel storage bays have advantages, and the Department thinks that the price of these bays per 1,000 respirators should be in the region of £2. It appears a little premature to order steel bays now, and the County Council will be glad to receive any alternative proposals involving less expenditure.

[NOTE: The Home Office scheme for the storage of respirators has now been received and further copies will shortly be available.]

#### (i) ALIENS:

The enrolment of aliens as volunteers is generally considered undesirable.

#### (j) USE OF COUNTY SCHOOL BUILDINGS:

It has now been decided that local authorities may in their schemes of general precautions designate the buildings of schools provided by the County Council as premises for use in an emergency as aid-posts, distribution depots for respirators and the like, if no equally suitable premises can be found elsewhere. It is not likely that room for large stores for respirators (for peace-time use) can be found in the Council's Schools.

Officers of the authorities are asked to note the procedure which they are desired to follow. It is desired that when practicable one of the County Council's A.R.P. or architectural staff shall accompany the local authority's officer when he visits premises for the purpose of considering what structural alterations, if any, seem to be necessary. An architectural assistant for A.R.P. will shortly be appointed by the County Council, and he will then be available for this purpose. The local authority will indicate in outline (sketch plans) what is wanted and if the approval of the County Council is given, the County Architect will be asked to prepare detailed plans and to be responsible for the execution of works of adaptation. It will be understood that no structural work will normally be approved which would interfere with the educational efficiency of the schools.

The Secretary of the Middlesex Education Committee will ask head teachers to give the necessary facilities to officers of local authorities desiring to inspect school buildings.

#### 12.-APPOINTMENT OF WHOLE-TIME C.A.G.S. INSTRUCTOR:

The Town Clerk reported that in connection with the courses of instruction for Air Raid Wardens now being held, several hundred respirators had been received and it would be necessary that these should be assembled and despatched to the respective training centres.

It was necessary that an officer should be appointed to be responsible for the assembling and care of the respirators, and further respirators which will be received from time to time to meet the requirements of further courses of instruction which will shortly be arranged. It was suggested that a whole-time qualified C.A.G.S. Instructor (Falfield Civilian Anti-Gas School) should be appointed to carry out these duties. Such instructor would also be available to give instruction to members of the Council's Staff who will be required to be trained in air raid precautions measures, and also conduct evening lectures. The salary which the Home Office and the County Council would be prepared to recognise for a whole-time instructor is £20 per month.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That a whole-time qualified C.A.G.S. Instructor be appointed at a salary of £20 per month and that the Town Clerk be authorised to issue an advertisement inviting applications for the appointment.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### FINANCIAL ADDENDUM:

In all cases where fees paid to lecturers are, owing to the exceptional circumstances, in excess of the County scale, it is intended that the County Council shall be pressed for approval.

#### 16.-FIRE BRIGADE PENSIONS ACT, 1925:

Fireman J. E. Comber reaches the age of 60 years on the 16th May, 1938, and by Section 1 of the Fire Brigade Pensions Act, 1925, and the Council's resolution of the 6th February, 1928 (Staff Committee, 23/1/28), is due to retire at that date. Fireman Comber has been in the service of the Council as a full-time Fireman since 1st May, 1911, prior to which he had served as a retained Fireman for 8 years.

For the purposes of the Fire Brigade Pensions Act, 1925, the service to be taken into account is from 1st May, 1911, to 16th May, 1938, a period of 27 years, which when reduced to terms of "Approved Service" amounts to 20 years.

In the application of Section 22 (2) of the Act of 1925, by the Council's resolution of the 6th February, 1928, Fireman Comber is entitled to make a payment of £3 10s, 0d. (equal to 5/- for each of 14 years non-contributing service) in order to restore his "Approved Service" from 20 years to 25 years (that being the maximum), in respect of which it is necessary, with the Council's approval, for the Chief Officer to issue a certificate that such service has been diligent and faithful.

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On the basis of 25 years "Approved Service" his pension will amount to £92-42s. 6d. per annum payable at the rate of £1-15s. 7d. per week, this being subject to Fireman Comber paying the sum of £3-10s. 0d. previously referred to.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade be authorised to issued his certificate under Section 6 of the Fire Brigade Pensions Act, 1925, that the Approved Service of Fireman J. E. Comber has been diligent and faithful.
- (2) That, subject to Fireman J. E. Comber making the necessary payments for the restoration of Approved Service under Section 22 (2) of the Act of 1925, he be granted a pension of £92 12s. 6d. per annum, payable at the Rate of £1 15s. 7d. per week.

#### 31.-AUDITOR'S REPORT:

The Town Clerk submitted the following report of the District Auditor on his examination of the accounts for the year 1936/7:—

#### 32.-DEACONS HILL-LAND TAX:

The Borough Treasurer reported that the above land purchased by the Gouncil in March, 1937, was assessed to Land Tax in the sum of £169, involving an annual payment of £8 9s. 0d., and that it would be of advantage to redeem the tax.

The cost of redemption would amount to £211–5s. 0d. and Mr. H. R. Robarts, the Council's tenant, who has been approached as to an adjustment of rent, is willing to pay an additional amount of £8 per annum during the remainder of his lease, which expires on the 20th September, 1944, thus contributing the sum of £48 towards the cost of the redemption of the tax.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- That the Land Tax on the property of the Corporation at Deacons Hill be redeemed, and that the Borough Treasurer be appointed under Seal as the Council's authorised agent to act in the matter;
- (ii) That the Town Clerk be authorised to prepare a new agreement (or an endorsement to the existing agreement) with the tenant, Mr. H. R. Robarts, providing for an increase of £8 in the annual rental during the unexpired period of the lease;
- (iii) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

#### 33.-WEST MIDDLESEX DRAINAGE SCHEME:

Hendon Outfall Works-Retention of certain Buildings.

It will be remembered that as a result of the above scheme it was intended that the buildings at the late Sewage Disposal Works should be demolished at the time when the site was being cleared, and that this Council should be relieved of all future liability for Loan Charges, etc.

The Council (W. & F.B.C., 10/12/36) approved the retention of the Silk Valley (Low Level) Pumping Station to be regulated by agreement with the County Council, and in addition the Messroom Stores have been retained under the Contract for otherwise clearing the site of the works. It consequently became necessary to arrange certain transfer adjustments of the Loan Debt with the Middlesex County Council, and it has been provisionally agreed that as from the 1st October, 1938, the Hendon Council should accept responsibility for the future loan charges, etc. (subject to adjustment in respect of U.G.C. Grants) in respect of the buildings on the following basis:—

The original cost of the Pumping Station was approximately £4.000 but after eliminating the cost of certain outlay made to specially adapt the building as a Pumping Station the figure of £1,600 is arrived at. The "sumps" in the premises have been filled in.

The liability for loan charges in a full year will be approximately £251, dropping to £59 in 1942/3 and then decreasing gradually until the loans expire in 1955/6.

The annual credit in respect of U.G.C. Grants now amounts to approximately £84, decreasing to £72 in 1940/1 and expiring in 1941/2.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the proposed arrangements be approved, and authority given to charge the liability involved to the appropriate accounts.

#### 34.-GOLDERS GREEN FOOTBALL CLUB:

The Borough Surveyor reported on the lines upon which discussions were proceeding with Mr. Gordon Raymond, on behalf of the Club, in pursuance of the Council's resolution of the 28th March. (F. & G.P.C., 21/3/38—26).

RESOLVED—That authority be given for the negotiations to proceed on the lines indicated in the Borough Surveyor's report.

#### 35.—MAINTENANCE OF PATIENTS FROM COUNTY HOSPITALS AND INSTITU-TIONS IN ISOLATION HOSPITAL:

The Council, on the 7th December, 1936 (P.H. & M.S.C., 16/11/36—15), approved a proposal that arrangements should be entered into with the County Council regarding the action to be taken with respect to in-patients in County Hospitals or Institutions who develop infectious disease, with a view to securing a uniform practice throughout the County.

A Conference of Financial Officers was held in December last. Having regard to the fact that a uniform basis of charge is desirable, agreement was reached on the following lines:—

- (i) The County Council is to pay in respect of every patient admitted to an Isolation Hospital from a County Hospital or Institution on the basis of:—
  - (a) A rate per day calculated according to the cost of maintenance of the previous financial year. Such cost of maintenance is to exclude Specialists Fees, but is to include a charge for rent equal to 5 per centof the Capital value of Land, Buildings, Machinery, Equipment, etc.
  - (b) Specialists Fees actually incurred in respect of cases for which the County Council is responsible under the arrangements.
  - (c) The full period of maintenance in the Hospital excluding the day of admission and including the day of discharge.
- (ii) The certificate of the Government Auditor is to be accepted as to the accounts without further audit by the County Officers.
- (iii) The arrangements are to date from 4st April, 4937, and be embodied in an agreement.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Corporation enter into an agreement, in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk in consultation with the appropriate Officers, embodying the above terms, and that the Corporate Seal be affixed thereto.

#### 36.-CAR (MILEAGE) ALLOWANCES:

The Borough Treasurer submitted a report on allowances to officers for the use of private cars, and suggested that as from the 1st April, 1938, the Middlesex County Council scate should be applied.

The scale adopted by the County was formulated after exhaustive enquiries and comparisons and is fair and equitable. It is based largely on the scale of H.M. Treasury.

The review of the existing arrangements arises on a request of the Physical Training Instructors (whose salaries are paid by the County) to be paid Car Allowances on the Middlesex scale. Officers in the employ of the Town Council have represented from time to time that the present allowance of 2d, per mile is inadequate.

The County scale is set out in the following recommendation.

For the next 2000 miles per annum

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

(1) That, in cases of officers permitted to use private cars on official business, the following scale of allowances be approved, to operate from the 1st April, 1938:—

GENERAL SCALE.

For the first 5000 miles per annum 3½d. per mile. For the next 2000 miles per annum do For the next 2000 miles per annum 2d. do. For additional mileage over 9000 miles per annum .... do SPECIAL SCALE. For officers authorised to use a car exceeding 8 h.p. For the first 4000 miles per annum 4d. per mile. For the next 4000 miles per annum 31d. do.

For additional mileage exceeding 10000 miles per annum 1½d. do.

(2) That any resolution of the Council inconsistent with the above be varied

#### 37.-OLD EXPENDITURE VOUCHERS, ETC.:

#### 38.-COMMUNITY CENTRES:

A letter has been received from the Middlesex Education Committee intimating that should the Council desire to submit any proposals for the provision of community centres by the County Council as higher education authority under Section 86 of the Education Act, 1921 (as amended by Section 6 of the Physical Training and Recreation Act, 1937), they would be glad to receive these for consideration by the Committee.

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Alternatively, should the Council decide themselves to exercise the power to provide community centres conferred by Section 4 of the Physical Training and Recreation Act, 1937, the County Council would be glad to receive information in order to avoid overlapping.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Civic Centre Sub-Committee, together with representatives from the Local Higher Education Committee to consider as to the desirability of the establishment of Community Centres in the Borough.

#### 39.-EXPENDITURE:

The following resolution of the Mill Hill Ratepayers' Association was submitted and noted:—

"That this meeting of the Mill Hill Ratepayers' and Residents' Association supports the protests being made daily to M.Ps., Bankers, the Press, Chambers of Commerce and local associations against the continuous heavy increase in local taxation.

It considers that especially in view of the government's demands due to rearmament local expenditure must be reduced and therefore urges the Middlesex C.C. and Hendon B.C. each to appoint a Special Committee whose duty it shall be to find ways and means of curtailing expenses."

#### 40.-FOOD AND DRUGS BILL:

This Bill was introduced in the House of Lords on the 17th March, and now stands referred to a Joint Committee of both Houses. Its presentation is the result of further meetings of the Local Government and Public Health Consolidation Committee, appointed in 1930, with a view to the consolidation of the enactments dealing with Local Authorities and Local Government and matters relating to the Public Health; but in 1936 the reference was extended to include enactments relating to the adulteration of Food and Drugs.

In their report the Consolidation Committee call attention to the fact that they have proceeded to reproduce existing law with such amendments as are likely to command general assent.

The Bill is divided into VI. Parts, dealing with-

Part I.—General Provisions as to Food and Drugs;

II.—Provisions as to Milk, Dairies and Artificial Cream;

III.—Provisions as to other kinds of Food:

IV.-Provisions as to the Importation of certain Produce;

V.-Markets, Slaughterhouses, and Cold Air Stores;

VI.—General and Miscellaneous,

and whilst the Bill introduces various amendments, probably the most important change relates to the definition of "Food and Drugs Authority." This term is defined in Section 13 of the Food and Drugs (Adulteration) Act, 1928. Outside London the Authorities under this Act were—

- (a) the Councils of County Boroughs;
- (b) Councils of Boroughs having a separate Police establishment;
- (c) Councils of Boroughs which had a population of not less than 10,600 according to the 1881 Census and had a separate Court of Quarter Sessions; and
- (d) elsewhere the County Council.

In the opinion of the Local Government and Public Health Consolidation Committee the main factors in determining whether a Local Authority should be a Food and Drugs Authority or not, are—

- (a) the extent to which the routine work of food inspection and sampling in the area will represent something more than occasional duties for the Officers engaged on the work, and
- (b) the standard which the Authority have achieved in their public health arrangements.

In its proposed application so far as Hendon is concerned, the Bill provides for the expression "Local Authority" to mean—

as respects any . . . . Borough and any Urban District or Rural District, the Council of the Borough or District;

and the expression "Food and Drugs Authority" means-

- (i) as respects a County Borough, and also as respects any Non-County Borough or Urban District which has according to the last published census for the time being a population of forty thousand or upwards, the Local Authority; and
- (ii) as respects any other area, the County Council.

"Food and Drugs Authorities" are specifically charged with the duty of carrying into execution and enforcing certain provisions of the Bill, whilst it is the duty of every "Local Authority" to carry into execution and enforce provisions not expressly, or by implication, imposed upon some other Authority.

The Bill contemplates the date of operation as the 1st October, 1939.

If the provisions of the Bill are accepted by Parliament, Hendon will become responsible for the administration of all the provisions, thus superseding the County Council, and it also follows that the Town Council would become the Authority for the enforcement of the Merchandise Marks Act, 1926.

The Parliamentary Committee of the County Council has had the matter under consideration, and in their report to the Council on the 31st March described the proposed change as "a most revolutionary proposal." They expressed the opinion that the question is of sufficient importance to justify the County Council formally expressing its unqualified opposition to the Consolidation Committee's proposals. With a view to strengthening their case for the County of Middlesex to be specially excluded the Parliamentary Committee state that they are obtaining the views of the Local Authorities on the question.

A letter has, accordingly, been received from the County Council intimating that they hold the view that outside the City and County of London the Food and Drugs Authority should be the Councils of Counties and County Boroughs.

In support, the County Council assert that their administration of the Food and Drugs Act, 1928, and the Merchandise Marks Act, 1926, has been very active, and that great economy has been secured.

During the year ended 31st March, 1937, the cost of the administration of the Food and Drugs (Adulteration) Act, 1928, and the Merchandise Marks Act, 1926, was £4,332 16s. 9d. and £1,457 18s. 4d. respectively. Calculated on the basis of rate income, the cost of these two services to your Council was £415 8s. 10d. and £139 45s. 9d. respectively, or 0.74d. and 0.24d. per head of population respectively."

The County Council enquire whether the Town Council concurs in the view that, so far as Middlesex is concerned, the County Council should be the Authority for the administration of the Acts.

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It is a matter of interest to note that from figures relating to ten very small Boroughs set out in the Report of the Royal Commission (1929) the number of samples examined in a year was roughly 3 per 1.000 of the population, and the Consolidation Committee appear to regard this as something of a standard in determining the amount of rentine food inspection and sampling. It is understood that for the year ended 31st of March, 1937, 195 samples were taken in the Borough of Hendon, and had the figure of 3 per 1.000 been applied for that year the number of samples should have been 465 based on a population of 155,800.

The population of the County at March, 1937 (based upon estimates, June, 1936) appears to have been approximately 1.940,600. Three samples per 1,000 = 5.820 but only 3.708 were taken and dealt with as follows:—

The County Council point out that calculated on the basis of rate charge the cost to Hendon for the administration of the Food and Drugs Act for the year ended 31st March, 1937, amounted to £415 8s. 10d. It follows, therefore, that the cost of each sample (195) amounts to £2 2s. 7d., and an analysis of the total costs could reasonably be assumed on the following basis:—

Had the whole of the 195 samples taken in Hendon been sent to the Public Analyst as formal samples, it would appear that the cost would only have been £146–15s. 0d. leaving £268–13s. 10d., representing administrative costs.

The Town Clerk in consultation with the Medical Officer of Health has reported as to the administration of the arrangements contemplated by the Bill, and the Committee are agreed that the duties of a Food and Drugs Authority should be carried out by the Public Health Department. The consolidation provided by the Bill embraces certain legislation already administered through the Public Health Department, and there would seem to be no reason why the additional duties involving the taking by each Inspector some eight samples per month (480 per annum) and inspections under the Merchandise Marks Act should not be carried out by the existing staff which consists of the Senior Sanitary Inspector and five additional Inspectors.

The population of the Borough is now estimated at 162,079, and the taking of 480 samples per annum could be regarded as a reasonable standard.

At the present time the Council have no laboratory in which any analysis could be carried out by the Council's staff, so for the present all samples would necessarily be referred to a Public Analyst who would have to be appointed.

The fees of the Analyst on the basis of 480 samples would approximate to £360, and apart from the time of the Officers involved in the matter this appears to represent the major cost of administration.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the County Council be informed that the Hendon Borough Council do not concur in the view that the Middlesex County Council should continue to administer the Food and Drugs Act and the Merchandise Marks Act, and that the Hendon Borough Council, if and when Parliament so decides, will be prepared to assume their responsibilities for the exercise of their full powers under the amending legislation.

#### 41.-POLLING DISTRICTS-EDGWARE WARD:

As requested at the meeting of the Committee on the 21st March, the Town Clerk submitted the following report as to additional polling facilities in the Edgware Ward.

#### REPORT.

The representation submitted at the last meeting was as to an additional polling district north of Edgware Way. The development comprises four new estates, viz., Golf Course Estate, Fairview Estate, Broadfields Park Estate, and Laing's Broadfields Estate, and in addition there exists the older development in Edgwarebury Lane and Edgware Way.

A suitable permanent building for a polling place in this vicinity appears to be St. Andrew's Church Hall, Lynford Gardens, which is on the Broadfields Park Estate and conveniently situated for the Laing's Broadfields Estate. Therefore, so far as these two estates are concerned no difficulty exists.

As to the remaining portion, the question of distance and possibly travelling facilities should be considered. It seems preferable for the residents in the older development in Edgwarebury Lane (west side) and Edgware Way to continue at present to vote at Station Road, Edgware, to which they have a convenient 'bus service. The distance which they would have to travel to the Broadfields Park Estate would generally be longer, with the added disadvantage of no 'bus service.

As to the Golf Course Estate and the Fairview Estate it seems unreasonable to expect the electors to continue to poll at Station Road, but it would be equally inconvenient for them to go to Broadfields Park owing to distance and lack of travelling facilities. These two estates offer a fairly compact development in themselves, and in view of their position on the extremity of the Edgware Ward the best solution is a separate polling district.

With the foregoing considerations in mind, two additional polling districts are proposed, comprising:—

 The east side of Edgwarebury Lane with Laing's Broadfields Estate and the Broadfields Park Estate—polling place, St. Andrew's Church Hall, Lynford Gardens.

It is difficult to forecast the ultimate electorate in this area. The present numbers are 1,186 parliamentary and 932 local government electors, but having regard to the building plans approved, and development otherwise contemplated in the near future, the numbers might quite conceivably reach 5,500—6,000 parliamentary and 4,000—4,500 local government electors in the next year or two, and there is room for further development.

The Golf Course and Fairview Estates—polling place, Wimpey's Estate Office, Apex Corner.

There are at present 839 parliamentary and 655 local government electors on these estates. The potential development is approximately 650 dwellings which should provide something approaching 2,000 parliamentary and 1,500 local government electors, and from all appearances these numbers are likely to materialise at a comparatively early date.

#### APPENDIX.

SHOPS ACTS, 1912-1936.

Order under Section 4 (2) of the Shops Act, 1912—as modified by the Shops (Sunday Trading Restriction) Act, 1936—fixing the day of the Weekly Half Holiday for non-exempted shops.

The Council of the Borough of Hendon, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Shops Act, 1912—as modified by the Shops (Sunday Trading Restriction) Act, 1936—and after due compliance with its provisions, do hereby order as follows:—

- This Order, which may be cited as "Borough of Hendon Shops (Weekly Half Holiday) Order, 1938," applies to all shops in the Borough of Hendon, except shops which are exempted by the Act or by any Order made in pursuance of the Act from the obligation to close for the weekly half holiday.
- 2. All shops to which this Order applies shall be closed for the weekly half holiday in the Central Hendon and Park Wards on Wednesday at 1 p.m., and in all other Wards of the Borough on Thursday at 1 p.m. throughout the year. Provided that any shopkeeper (not being a person who is entitled to keep his shop open on Sunday in accordance with the provisions of Section 7 of the Shops (Sunday Trading Restriction) Act, 1936) may substitute Saturday for Wednesday or Thursday, as the case may be, on affixing a notice to that effect in his shop, and that any shopkeeper who is entitled to keep his shop open on Sunday in accordance with the provisions of the said Section 7 may substitute Friday for Wednesday or Thursday, as the case may be, on affixing a notice to that effect in his shop.
- 3. The Central Hendon Shops Weekly Half Holiday Order, dated 20th July, 1914, the Mill Hill, West Hendon and Child's Hill Shops Weekly Half Holiday Order, dated 20th July, 1914, and the Edgware and Little Stanmore Shops Weekly Half Holiday Order, dated 11th November, 1914, in so far as it applies in the Edgware Ward of the Borough, are here revoked.

NOTE.—It is provided by Section 4 (5) of the Shops Act, 1912, that if a shop is closed throughout the whole of a Bank Holiday and the Bank Holiday does not fall on the day fixed for the weekly half holiday, the shop-keeper may keep his shop open either on the half holiday before, or on the half holiday after the Bank Holiday.

The following draft Apprenticeship Scheme was submitted from the Estates, Park and Allotments Committee of the Borough Council for consideration and observations:—

## APPRENTICESHIP SCHEME-PARKS AND OPEN SPACES.

Introduction.—The Council shall arrange to teach and instruct a limited number of boys, resident in the Borough, in the art trade or business of a gardener and in things incidental or relating thereto.

Number of Apprenticeships.—The number of apprenticeships shall be restricted to three every alternate year.

Age and Period.—Apprentices shall normally be taken at the age of 15 years and the period of apprenticeship shall be 5 years.

Training.—Subject to any necessary discretion being reserved to the Parks Superintendent to the Council, the course of training shall include:—

2 years-Nursery Work.

2 years-Gardening. Layout, Planting and General Cultivation.

1 year-Sports Grounds and Open Spaces.

Adequate facilities shall be given for apprentices to attend approved day classes during normal working hours without loss of wages, subject to the production of such evidence of attendance as may be desirable.

Apprentices shall undertake to attend evening courses of instruction, or other approved courses of study, at the expense of the parent or guardian, in such subjects as may be prescribed by the Parks Superintendent with a view to entering for the examinations of the Royal Horticultural Society and/or the Institute of Parks Administration.

Remuneration.—Subject to satisfactory progress the probationers or apprentices shall receive wages at the following rates in accordance with the recommendations of the Provincial Joint Industrial Council for Local Authorities Non-Trading Services (Manual Workers) for the County of Middlesex:—

Under 16 years of age—\frac{1}{3} of adult wage.

16 to 18 years of age—\frac{1}{2} of adult wage.

18 to 21 years of age—\frac{2}{3} of adult wage.

Appropriate Adult wage applicable—59/2d.

Overtime.— Apprentices shall not as a general rule be required to work overtime, but where any overtime (that is, beyond 47 weekly working hours) is authorised by the Parks Superintendant, payment shall be made in accordance with the award of the Joint Industrial Council, i.e., time-and-a-quarter for the first three hours, and time-and-a-half beyond three hours.

In no circumstances shall apprentices be employed on Sundays.

Annual Holidays.—After one year's service apprentices shall be granted 6 days' annual holiday with full pay, and one day shall be added in respect of each subsequent year of apprenticeship service.

Sick Pay.—Sick pay shall be granted after 6 months' service on the following basis, per the Joint Industrial Council Award:—

- (a) for the first five weeks of sickness an amount per week equal to onehalf of the total wage for a normal week;
- (b) for the next five weeks of sickness an amount per week equal to one-fourth of the total wage for a normal week;

such payments to be irrespective of benefits under the National Health Insurance Acts.

Employment after Apprenticeship.—Notwithstanding that apprentices may be required to make contributions on attaining the age of 18 years under the Local Government and Other Officers' Superannuation Acts, 1922-1937, the Council shall be under no liability to provide employment for apprentices on the expiration or sooner determination of the apprenticeship term.

Indentures.—The parent or guardian and the apprentice shall be required to enter into a Deed of Apprenticeship, in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk, in which inter alia, due provision shall be made for the termination of the apprenticeship on account of misconduct or other proper and sufficient reason and providing for a penalty to be paid by the Guardian in the event of failure to complete the apprenticeship term without reasonable cause.

6.—NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE (JUVENILE CONTRIBUTORS AND YOUNG PERSONS) ACT, 1937:

Board of Education Administrative Memorandum No. 175 was submitted stating that Local Insurance Committees are calling the attention of medical practitioners to the facilities afforded them under the National Health Insurance (Juvenile Contributors and Young Persons) Act, 1937, Section 6, for obtaining information from the school medical records in the case of young persons under the age of 18 years either through the Insurance Committee or by direct application to the Local Education Authority concerned. It is intended that the information (which is confidential) should be supplied only at the express request of a practitioner and that it should be sent direct to him by or on behalf of the School Medical Officer. A copy of a form of enquiry which has been prepared by the Board of Education and the Ministry of Health for the use of practitioners in this connection was also submitted. Noted.

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A memorandum was read from the Town Clerk referring to a proviso in the above letter from the Board of Education and stating that the land mentioned is registered with an absolute title at the Land Registry and is free from restrictions. It does not therefore appear that any difficulty will arise as to the title to the land in question.

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Home Office, stating that the Secretary of State confirmed the byelaw made by the Council on the 28th February, 1938, under Section 146 (1) (b) of the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929, prescribing the scale of charges for the removal of refuse or other services rendered in connection with street trading. The date on which the byelaw came into operation has been fixed as the 5th May, 1938. (Hi.C., 7/2/38-25). Noted.

#### 4.- EXHIBITION OF BYELAWS:

Arising out of consideration of the last preceding item, the Committee

RESOLVED-That the Finance and General Purposes Committee be asked to consider the question of the exhibition of the Council's Byelaws in appropriate public places throughout the district.

## PRIVATE STREET WORKS.

## 5.—ACCOMMODATION ROAD—WEST HEATH DRIVE AND FOOTPATH, STURCESS AVENUE TO PARK ROAD:

The Committee received tenders for making up the above accommodation road and footpath under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875. (Hi.C., 7/2/38-5, and 4/4/38-8.

RESOLVED-That such tenders be opened and initialled by the Chairman and referred to the Borough Surveyor for report.

## 6-USE OF MATERIALS IN PRIVATE WORKS:

Arising out of a question raised at the last meeting of the Finance and General Purposes Committee, the Committee have had before them the question of the carrying out of private work by the Council's employees in their own time and the use of materials in connection therewith and propose to give the matter further attention at a special meeting of the Committee to be held on Monday next, the 23rd instant, at 5.30 p.m.

## 7.-CRESWICK WALK, HAMPSTEAD CARDEN SUBURB:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from Co-Partnership Tenants, Ltd., asking the Council to make up and take over the above road, the carriageway to be not less than 14 feet in width. Previous proposals (Hi.C., 21/11/32—6 (i)) to make up this road under Section 150, Public Health Act, 1875, were withdrawn owing to the opposition of the residents. It is evident that a majority of the frontagers desire the road to be made up but stipulate a carriageway of not less than 14 feet in width.

This road was originally laid out by the Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust, Ltd., under the powers of their Act of 1906, and is therefore exempt from the operation of the Council's Byelaws relating to New Streets and Buildings, and the Borough Surveyor submitted a plan showing the difficulty involved in laying out this road with a 14 feet carriageway with adequate footpath accommodation.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Co-Partnership Tenants, Ltd., be informed that in the opinion of the Council adequate footpath accommodation should be provided in connection with all roads in the district.

## 8.-LEE ROAD AND OAKHAMPTON ROAD, MILL HILL:

The Committee considered a report of the Borough Surveyor on an application from Messrs. Swannell & Sly for the maintenance period in connection with the making up of Lee Road, under the Council's standard form of agreement, to be varied from 12 months to 6 months in respect of general works. (Hi.C., 7/3/38—4).

The Committee at its meeting agreed that the maintenance periods in respect of these two roads shall be 12 months for the general works and 2 years for the surfacing, from the date of notification of the Council's decision to dedicate the road.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Messrs. Swannel! & Sly be informed that the Council are prepared to vary the maintenance period to 6 months in respect of the general works in connection with the making up of Lee Road.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 9.-TALBOT CRESCENT, HENDON:

A letter was considered from Mr. S. Kane of 8, Talbot Crescent, regarding the condition of this road, which is practically fully developed. No proposals have been received from the owners with respect to the making up of the road.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That plans and estimates be prepared for the making up of the road under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875.

## 10.-CECIL ROAD, COLINDALE:

A petition was submitted from certain residents of Cecil Road protesting against the delay in making up this road. Plans and estimates have been approved for carrying out the necessary works, but progress is delayed on account of the objection of the Hyde Model Laundry who are frontagers. Negotiations are proceeding with this firm, and upon satisfactory settlement steps will be taken for the making up of the road. (Hi.C., 15/11/37—26).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the petitioners be informed accordingly.

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## 11.-WALMINGTON FOLD, N. 12:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from Mr. J. Whitehead, Solicitor to the Leyland Construction Co., Ltd., asking for the road charges in respect of this road to be apportioned in two sections in view of certain works already carried out by the Company, in respect of the section of the road developed by them. Letters from fourteen owners of property on this estate on the same subject were also submitted.

It was reported by the Town Clerk that the period allowed in the first notices served under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, upon the frontagers had expired and that the works on the two sections of the road concerned are being carried out as one contract. In view of this the road charges must be apportioned on the same basis for the whole length of the road, and not as suggested in two separate sections on different basic rates.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Mr. Whitehead and the owners in question be informed accordingly.

## 12.-TENDERS-WOODFIELD AVENUE (2nd SECTION):

A letter was reported by the Borough Surveyor from Tarslag (1923), Ltd., asking to be allowed to withdraw their tender amounting to £1,625 10s. 5d. provisionally accepted at the last meeting in respect of the making up of the above road. (Hi.C., 4/4/38-6).

The next lowest tender for this work is that of D. R. Paterson, Ltd., amounting to £1,652 2s. 0d., but the extra cost involved is insufficient to necessitate an amendment to the application for loan sanction already made to the Minister of Health.

#### RESOLVED-

- (1) That Tarslag (1923), Ltd., be allowed to withdraw their tender and that subject to the usual financial enquiries provisional approval be given to the acceptance of the tender of D. R. Paterson, Ltd., of 33, Granville Road, Child's Hill, amounting to £1,652 2s. 0d.
- (2) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

(APPROVED—SEE ITEM 1—MAYOR'S RECESS REPORT TO COUNCIL, 20/6/38.)

## 13.-PLANS AND ESTIMATES-HILLSIDE CARDENS (PART OF), EDCWARE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted plans and estimates for the making up of the undedicated portion of this road under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875. The estimated cost of the work is £290 and in view of the small amount of work to be done, it is suggested that a period of 6 weeks instead of the usual three months be allowed for the frontagers to carry out the necessary works. (Hi.C., 4/4/38—9).

#### RESOLVED ---

- (1) That the plans and estimates be approved.
- (2) That notices under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served on the frontagers and that a period of six weeks be allowed for the frontagers to carry out the work.
- (3) That on default by the frontagers, the Borough Surveyor be authorised to arrange for the necessary work to be carried out.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal and authorise the cost to be advanced out of Revenue Account]

### TRAFFIC CONTROL.

## 15.-BEVERLEY GARDENS AND TEMPLE FORTUNE LANE-PARKING PLACES:

A letter was submitted from the Minister of Transport relative to the above parking places and forwarding a copy of the London Traffic (Parking Places) (Amendment) No. 2 Regulations, 1938, made in connection therewith, which came into force on the 25th April, 1938. (Hi.C., 7/3/38—18). Noted.

## 16.-WATLING ESTATE:

The Borough Surveyor was instructed to submit a report regarding the provision of parking facilities on the Watling Estate.

## 17.—JUNCTION OF EDGWARE WAY WITH EDGWAREBURY LANE—TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNALS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Ministry of Transport stating that traffic conditions at the above junction had been carefully examined. The Minister has ascertained that the present volume of traffic is not sufficient to justify signals moreover, the distribution of the traffic at this junction is such that, in the Minister's view, the erection of signals would not achieve the purpose desired. The main difficulty at this site would appear to be that of securing the safety of pedestrians and in this connection the Minister has at present under consideration the construction of a subway which would serve Broadfields Avenue and Edgwarebury Lane.

A letter was also submitted from the Edgware Ratepayers' Association with a resolution passed at a meeting of the Association on the 27th April, protesting against the delay on the part of the Minister of Transport in giving his final sanction to the erection of traffic lights and asking for a favourable decision in the matter. The Association appreciate the consideration of the Council to this matter and express the hope that everything will be done to expedite an early and favourable decision from the Minister.

The Middlesex County Council by letter, dated 12th May, intimate that the Minister of Transport has written asking what justification the Hendon Town Council put forward in support of the proposals to install signals at this junction and in this connection the County Council request the further observations of the Council. (Hi.C., 4/4/38—13).

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Minister of Transport be asked to receive a deputation in order to submit further representations for the installation of traffic signals, which in the opinion of the Council are urgently required at this junction,
- (2) That such deputation consist of His Worship the Mayor (Alderman Egan, J.P.), Councillor Curton (Chairman) and Alderman Cartwright, J.P.
- (3) That the Middlesex County Council and the Edgware Ratepayers' Association be informed of the action proposed to be taken in the matter.

## 18.—FIVE WAYS CORNER, JUNCTION OF CREAT NORTH WAY WITH WATFORD WAY, HENDON:

The Committee considered the question of the difficulties of traffic control at the above junction.  $\varepsilon$ 

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the matter be referred to the deputation appointed to attend at the Ministry of Transport with a view to ascertaining the Minister's proposals on the matter.
- (2) That in the meantime representations be made to the Police to provide some measure of control at this point.

## 19.-JUNCTION OF BELL LANE WITH BRENT STREET, HENDON:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a plan received from the Minister of Transport regarding a proposal to institute "one way" traffic working at the island site at the above junction, and to erect the necessary signs in connection therewith.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the plan be approved and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare estimates for submission to the Minister in due course.

## 20.-BARRIER RAILS, DAWS LANE, MILL HILL:

The Committee considered a letter from the Mill Hill Chamber of Commerce asking for a barrier rail to be erected in Daws Lane, outside the entrance to the Mill Hill Swimming Bath.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in the matter.

## 21.—PEDESTRIAN CROSSING—COLINDEEP LANE, HENDON:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Minister of Transport approving the pedestrian crossing place in Colindeep Lane, east of Sheaveshill Avenue. The Middlesex County Council have agreed to defray a moiety of the balance of the cost after deducting the Ministry of Transport's grant, subject to the Town Council meeting the remainder of the cost. **Noted.** 

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

## 22.—JUNCTION OF WATLING AVENUE AND ORANGE HILL ROAD—TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNALS:

The Committee further considered the question of the installation of traffic control signals at the above junction, in respect of which the Council are awaiting the decision of the Minister of Transport. (HiC., 10/1/38—16).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Minister of Transport be asked to expedite his decision in the matter.

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#### SIGNS.

## 23.-THE VALE, COLDERS CREEN-"ONE WAY" SICN:

The Committee considered the question (deferred at the last meeting—Hi.C., 4/4/38—18) of the necessity for the erection of "One Way" Signs in connection with the double carriageway of The Vale. The existence of the double carriageway obviously conveys the intention for "one way traffie" and in the circumstances the Committee are of opinion that signs are unnecessary.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in the matter at the present time.

## 24.—SCHOOL SICN, HEMING ROAD, EDGWARE:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from Mrs. Ferguson suggesting that a School Sign should be erected in Heming Road, near its junction with Garratt Road.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the erection of such sign.

#### IMPROVEMENT SCHEMES.

#### 25.-EDCWAREBURY LANE IMPROVEMENT:

A letter was considered from the Minister of Transport agreeing to the Council's scheme for the improvement of Edgwarebury Lane, between Station Road and Edgware Way, by the provision of a 27 feet carriageway with two 9 feet footpaths. The Department is prepared to consider a grant at the rate of 33½ per cent. of the cost of the scheme. Plans, together with an amended estimate amounting to £10,475, were submitted by the Borough Surveyor.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the plans and amended estimate amounting to £16,475 be approved for submission to the Minister of Transport.

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The Kinance and General Purposes Commistee understand that a grant of £3,152. Being 333% based on the original approved estimate of £9,455 has been notified by the Ministry of Transport. The amended estimate now amounts to £10,475 and the increase is mainfy due to rise in prices since the previous figures were prepared (Hi.C., 1,2/37-26).

Gefore consideration of the motion, the Sinance and General Purposes Committee (Recommend-That the following be added-

- (2) That application be made to the Minister of Transport for a supplementary grant on the revised estimate.
- (3) Chaf a revised application be made to the Minister of Health for sanction to the borrowing of the sum of £10,475 for a period not exceeding 15 years.

#### 26.-HOLDERS HILL ROAD IMPROVEMENT:

It was reported that good progress is being maintained with this improvement, the whole of the foundation work, kerbing, etc., is completed on the first section north of Hendon Park Cemetery and asphalting is proceeding. On the southern section the excavation of the foundations and the paving of the footways is proceeding. Noted.

#### 27.-THE VALE IMPROVEMENT:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the above improvement was completed on the 30th ultimo. Noted.

## 28 -- STONEYFIELDS LANE IMPROVEMENT:

The work on this improvement is in its final stages and it is anticipated that it will be completed by the 21st instant. Noted.

## 29.-FINCHLEY ROAD IMPROVEMENT:

This improvement was completed on the 14th April and the road opened to traffic.

## 30 .- COOL OAK LANE IMPROVEMENT-TENDERS:

The Committee considered the tenders received for the improvement of Cool Oak Lane from Edgware Road to Cross Street. The schedule of tenders received is set out in the appendix to this report.

The lowest tender is that of Mr. Chas. Carter amounting to £2,742 7s. 11d. A loan sanction has already been granted and the work can now be put in hand. (Hi.C., 15/11/37—30).

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That subject to the usual financial enquiries, approval be given to the acceptance of the tender of Mr. Chas. Carter of 119, Granville Road, N.W. 2, amounting to £2,742 7s. 11d.
- (2) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 31.-DEANS LANE BRIDGE-FOOTPATH:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the Middlesex County Council had approved an expenditure of £110 in respect of the provision of a temporary footpath over the above bridge. Noted.

#### 32.—SURFACE DRESSINGS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on quotations received for the supply of bitumastic emulsion to be delivered on the highways, and the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the under-mentioned quotations at  $6\frac{7}{8}$ d. per gallon, delivered on the highways, be accepted:—

#### TRAVELLING FACILITIES.

## 33.—PASSENGER TRANSPORT SERVICES IN THE COUNTY—MIDDLESEX COUNTY COUNCIL—REPORT OF TRAFFIC SUB-COMMITTEE:

The Committee received the report of a meeting of the County Council's Traffic Sub-Committee held at the Guildhall, Westminster, on the 30th March, 1938. The matters in respect of which Hendon made representations were dealt with as follows:—

#### Edgware-Morden Line.

In connection with the number of coaches on the Edgware—Morden Line during the day-time, it was pointed out on behalf of the London Passenger Transport Board that there was no evidence of overcrowding and before they could go into the matter they must ask for specific instances.

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## Irregularity of Service No. 142 to Edgware.

On behalf of the London Passenger Transport Board it was stated that they were unable to ascertain any specific irregularities and before the matter could be further dealt with particulars must be supplied. Running alongside Route No. 142 was a strong service of trolley buses.

## Hampstead Garden Suburb.

The representative of the London Passenger Transport Board stated that he had met the representative of the Hendon Town Council with regard to the provision of a single decker 'bus service to connect the Hampstead Garden Suburb with Golders Green Station and he would bring up a report to the next meeting.

Noted.

#### 34.-REPORT OF CHAIRMAN:

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The Chairman (Councillor A. W. Curton) reported that he had gone thoroughly into the matter of the complaints relating to travelling facilities in the Borough with the London Passenger Transport Board and arising out of the Board's observations it would appear as follows:—.

### Omnibus Service No. 240.

This service is quite frequent and would appear to be adequate.

## Service No. 142 to Edgware.

This service, with the exception of the period between 12 o'clock and 1 o'clock mid-day, appears to be adequate. The Board, however, will look further into the question of the service between these hours and if necessary increase the facilities.

### Hampstead Garden Suburb.

The London Passenger Transport Board have taken a census of the persons entering and leaving this estate and assuming that 50 per cent, of such persons would utilise the 'bus service it would be possible only to provide one service per hour, with possibly two per hour during the peak periods. This service would be of practically no use whatever and the Board regret that they are unable at the present time to see their way to provide this service. The Board, however, state that when the surrounding land is developed and when the London & North Eastern Railway line to Finchley is electrified they will again consider this matter with a view to running a service through the estate from Golders Green connecting with Finchley. Noted.

## 35.—CANONS PARK—PROPOSED TURNING POINT FOR TROLLEY VEHICLES:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Minister of Transport regarding the proposed turning point for trolley vehicles around the island site at the junction of Edgware Road, London Road, Elstree Road, and Spur Road, Canons Park, intimating that he has now given formal approval to such turning point, on the understanding that the proposed turning point in Station Road and Manor Park Crescent will not be constructed. **Noted.** 

#### 36.- 'BUS ROUTES 28 AND 141:

Letters were submitted from the London Passenger Transport Board intimating that commencing Wednesday the 1st June certain morning and evening journeys on Route 28 will be extended from Golders Green Station to Park Royal Station, via Golders Green Road and North Circular Road and that 'bus route No. 141 will be varied to provide 'buses proceeding in both directions between Edgware Station and Canons Park (Stanmore Circus) via Station Road, Edgwarebury Lane, Watford Way and Spur Road, instead of via Station Road and Edgware Road. Noted.

## 37.-LILLEY LANE, MILL MILL:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from Mr. Stewart of "The Bungalow," Glendor Gardens, Mill Hill, asking for permission to be allowed to drive his car along the section of this right of way between Hale Grove Gardens and the footpath leading from Glendor Gardens, in order to obtain access to his premises.

Having regard to the general width of the right of way and the fact that it is largely used by pedestrians, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That permission be not granted.

## 38.-PROPOSED BANNER, WATLING AVENUE, BURNT OAK:

An application was considered from the Burnt Oak Branch of the Hendon Chamber of Commerce asking for permission to suspend a banner across Watling Avenue as near to the Edgware Road as possible in connection with a scheme of advertising.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That such application be disapproved.

## 39.-PROPOSED BANNER - EDCWAREBURY LANE, EDCWARE:

An application was considered from the Norwest Services, Limited, asking for permission to place a banner across Edgwarebury Lane at its junction with Hale Lane, advertising a special "Good Housekeeping Exhibition" at Edgware on the 23rd instant,

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That such application be disapproved.

### 40.-SHOP BLINDS OVER FOOTPATHS:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a report arising out of an inspection made of shop blinds in Vivian Avenue. Twenty shops have blinds, the main portions of which vary in height from 5 ft. 11½ ins. and 7 ft. 2 ins. and the side aprons vary between 4 ft. 9 ins. and 7 ft. 2 ins. above the pavement.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the matter be referred to the Town Clerk to take the necessary action.

#### 41 .- STREET ACCIDENTS:

A schedule was submitted giving details of 69 street accidents notified during the month of March, 1938, of which 2 were fatal. **Noted.** 

## 42.—DIVERSION OF FOOTPATH—HANKINS LANE TO MARSH LANE, MILL HILL:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from George Wimpey & Company Ltd., for the diversion of the above public footpath consequent upon the approval by the Council of a road plan in connection with the development of Moat Park Estate between Marsh Lane and Moat Mount Open Space. (B. & T.P.C., 22/11/37—12, and 14/2/38—9).

Subject to all costs in connection with the diversion being borne by the applicants, the Committee

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

(a) That it is expedient that the public highway or footpath in the Parish of Hendon in the County of Middlesex running from Hankins Lane, Mill Hill, in an easterly and southerly direction to Marsh Lane, Mill Hill, aforesaid, the situation of which is shown on the plan now produced to the Council and signed by the Town Clerk, should be stopped up, turned or diverted in manner following that is to say:—

By stopping up, diverting or turning the said highway or footpath at and from the point marked "A" upon the said plan, such point "A" being situate 167 yards or thereabouts in a northerly direction

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ath pint tion from the junction of the said Hankins Lane with the said Marsh Lane from which said point "A" the said highway or footpath runs in an easterly direction for a distance of 296 yards or thereabouts to the point marked "B" on the said plan, thence proceeding in a southerly direction for a distance of 89 yards or thereabouts to the point marked "C" on the said plan (which said point "C" is situate at a point 300 yards or thereabouts in an easterly direction from the junction of Marsh Lane with Hankins Lane aforesaid) the total length of the said highway or footpath from the said point "A" to the said point "C" being 385 yards or thereabouts and the average width of the said highway or footpath between the said points "A," "B" and "C" being 3 feet or thereabouts, which said highway or footpath (hereinafter referred to as "the old footpath") is distinguished on the said plan by the colour brown, and by substituting in lieu thereof a good and sufficient highway or footpath coloured red on the said plan (hereinafter referred to as "the new footpath") commencing at the point marked "D" on the said plan (which said point "D" is situate 117 yards or thereabouts in a northerly direction from the said point "A" on the said plan) and proceeding in an easterly direction for a distance of 233 yards or thereabouts to the point marked "E" on the said plan thence proceeding in a southerly direction for a distance of 220 yards, or thereabouts to the point marked "F" on the said plan (which said point "F" is situate at a point 237 yards or thereabouts in an easterly direction from the junction of Marsh Lane with Hankins Lane aforesaid) the total length of the new footpath from the said point "D" to the said point "F" being 453 yards or thereabouts and the width thereof between the said points being 8 feet.

- (c) That an intimation be given to the applicants for the diversion that no works are to be commenced on the existing highway or footpath until the Justices' Order has been obtained and the certificate of two Justices that the new footpath has been constructed to their satisfaction, lodged with the Clerk of the Peace.
- (d) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

## 1.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £245 6s. 3d. were approved.

#### 2-CAPITAL EXPENDITURE:

The Committee have had before them Circular 1687 issued by the Ministry of Health urging upon local authorities the policy of making every year a survey of their probable capital commitments for at least five years ahead. The first period is to commence on the 1st April, 1938, and with a view to the preparation of a programme the Committee have given preliminary consideration to the present development of parks and open spaces. Various items of capital expenditure may be anticipated within the period under review, and the Committee has instructed the Borough Surveyor to report thereon, and on any further desirable works with preliminary estimates which should be included in the programme.

#### 3-PARK CONSTABLES:

The Committee gave careful consideration to the advisability of the appointment of officers under Section 136, Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929, for the purpose of securing the observance of the statutes relating to parks and pleasure grounds and of the bye-laws and regulations made thereunder.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in the matter.

## 4.—HENDON PARK:

A letter was submitted from the Hon. Secretary of the Hendon Ratepayers' Association drawing attention to alleged rowdyism which occurs in Hendon Park after dark and annoyance to adjacent residents. Noted.

## MONTROSE PLAYING FIELDS.

#### 5-OFFICIAL OPENING:

The Committee gave further consideration to the question of an official Opening Ceremony (referred back by the Council, 9/5/38) and they see no reason to vary their previous recommendation in the matter. (E.P. & A.C., 4/4/38-7).

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

(1) That authority be given to the Mayor and Chairman of the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee to make the necessary arrangements for an official Opening Geremony on a date to be arranged.

## 6.-PROGRESS REPORT:

The Borough Surveyor reported that satisfactory progress was being maintained with the lay-out of the Montrose Playing Fields. The tennis courts are well in hand and with the exception of the plunge bath and water services the pavilion is practically complete. **Noted.** 

## 7.-CATE-PETITION FROM RESIDENTS:

A petition was received from eight residents in Booth Road requesting the erection of a gate at the back of the footpath in Booth Road in order that it can be closed after dusk.

The footpath in question is a public right-of-way.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the petitioners be informed that the Council are unable to take any action in the matter.

#### 8.-COPTHALL PLAYING FIELDS-DEVELOPMENT:

The Committee again considered the question of the development of the playing fields in stages (referred back by the Council, 9/5/38).

In view of the demand for pitches it is thought desirable that this section of the work should be put in hand as soon as possible, but it follows that the land drainage must first be carried out (£5,192). Upon completion of the above the provision of two lodges for the groundsmen, together with a car park and service road (£5,356) would appear to be the most suitable stage to follow, and finally the erection of the pavilion embodying dressing rooms, lavatories, etc., would bring the expenditure to £20,698.

The remainder (£2,050) of the total estimate of £22,748 consists of Contingencies £1,500, Clerk of Works £400 and cost of raising loan, printing, stationery, etc., £150. Charges under these headings could be apportioned as may be necessary to the various stages of the development.

In the lay-out plans for the Edgware Estate submitted by J. Laing & Son, Ltd., and approved by the Town Planning Committee an exchange of lands was indicated to permit the entrance to the park being re-sited at a point directly opposite Hartland Drive.

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## 2.-SURPLUS (SEWACE DISPOSAL) LANDS:

The Town Clerk submitted the following statement in connection with the Committee's request (11/4/38) asking for a report as to the lands allocated by the Council on the 5th October, 1936, for the services of the Committee, in relation to the desirability of proceeding with applications to the Minister of Health for the appropriation of such lands.

#### Appropriations :-

In submitting applications to the Minister of Health for appropriations definite schemes for the use of the lands are required. In the absence of such information formal application has not been made to the Minister of Health.

The Committee are aware that since the Council approved the allocation of the Surplus (Sewage Disposal) Lands—a total area of some 152 acres—in October 1936, various alterations and re-allocations have been necessary, and in no case has an appropriation been applied for until concrete proposals have been available as to the purposes for which the land is required.

So far as the allocations to the Works and Fire Brigade Committee are concerned, no definite schemes for the proposed fire station or swimming pool have been approved, nor has any extension of the Refuse Destructor Works been proposed. The only allocation therefore on which an appropriation might conveniently be made at the present time is the 1 acre for the Depot. In this case the land comprises the frontages to the Depot mainly occupied by cottages and gardens tenanted by the Storekeeper and one of the Highways Foremen.

In connection with the above report the Committee propose in accordance with their decision (17/1/38-13) to give further consideration at their next meeting to the question of the suggested Fire Station at Hendon Way, and have instructed the Borough Surveyor to prepare preliminary plans and estimates for an open air swimming pool and a closed swimming bath designed for use for other purposes.

I beg to confirm the verbal report I gave to you yesterday, as follows:-

At about 10.45 a.m. the Superintendent of the Fire Brigade informed me on the telephone that he was feeling much too unwell to carry on with his duties and was reporting to his Doctor with a view to obtaining a medical certificate.

In consultation with the Superintendent I made the following arrangements, subject to your confirmation:—

- That Station Officer Cook should take over charge of the whole Brigade until further instructions are issued.
- (2) That Senior Fireman Cross will act as Station Officer at Mill Hill.
- (3) That Senior Fireman Hill will act as Station Officer at Hendon until the return to duty of Station Officer Stimpson at 9 a.m. on Wednesday next, the 13th instant.

I visited both Stations during the morning and explained the whole position to both Station Officer Cook and Senior Fireman Hill.

I also approved a suggestion made by Station Officer Cook that in the event of a fire call being received at Hendon Station for the southern part of the District, Hendon would turn out immediately an engine and a full erew. At the same time Mill Hill would send an engine and full crew over to Hendon to stand by in case a second engine was required at the fire.

The present staff consists of thirteen permanent men and two temporary men and to bring the Central Station up to the required strength five additional men are required.

In order to provide accommodation for the additional men the application of Fireman F. E. Beasant, who is at present living in married quarters at the Central Station, for transfer to Mill Hill might be approved, leaving the married quarters at the Central Station available for the proposed additional staff as sleeping accommodation.

Further lavatory and washing accommodation would have to be provided and this could be met by the provision of 3 shower baths in the existing wash house and two additional lavatories in the Station Yard.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—

(1) That Fireman F. E. Beasant be transferred to the Mill Hill Station, vice J. E. Comber retired on the 19th instant.

- (2) That an advertisement be issued for the appointment of five additional single firemen for the Central Station.

#### 1.—CAPITAL EXPENDITURE—CIRCULAR 1687:

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The Committee considered Circular 1687 issued by the Minister of Health urging local authorities to make, every year, a survey of their probable capital commitments for at least five years ahead. The Borough Surveyor has been directed to submit a report on any contemplated capital expenditure which might be included in a programme extending over a period of five years.

#### HENDON PLANNING SCHEME NO. 1.

#### 2-LAND, EDGWARE ROAD, WEST HENDON:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the Hendon and District Bill Posting Company enquiring whether the Council will consider letting the vacant land at the junction of Edgware Road with Goldsmith Avenue for the purpose of erecting advertising panels.

It was reported that the above garage situate in a Special Residential Zone (Use Zone II.) of the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 1 was being used as a boot repairing shop in contravention of Clause 28 of the Scheme and that the notice displayed on the property was not of the type ordinarily exhibited on dwelling-houses within the meaning of Clause 32 of the Scheme

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be authorised to serve notices under Section 13 of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1932, specifying the nature of and the grounds upon which the Council propose to prohibit the present use of the building and land in question as contraventions of the provisions of the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 1.

# 8.—"THE LAURELS," LAWRENCE STREET, MILL HILL:

The Borough Surveyor reported that a notice board with the words "Middlesex Re-Boring Co.—Enquiries" had recently been erected at the above premises which are situate within a Special Residential area (Use Zone II.) of the Scheme. The Notice is not of the type ordinarily exhibited on dwelling-houses within the meaning of Clause 32 of the Scheme.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be authorised to serve a notice under Section 13 of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1932, specifying the nature of the grounds upon which the Council propose to prohibit the use of the land as a contravention of the provisions of the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 1.

# 22.-FLUES FROM WATER HEATERS:

It was reported by the Borough Surveyor that the North Middlesex Gas Company propose installing "Ascot" water heaters in houses in course of erection by G. Wimpey and Co., Ltd., on the Moat Park Estate, Mill Hill. The Company propose to connect the flue from the gas water heater into the flue to be used for the ideal boiler and ask the Council's approval to this method.

#### 1,-SURPLUS (SEWAGE DISPOSAL) LANDS:

North of the River Brent.

The Committee have re-considered the item of their report of the 2nd May, referred back by the Council at their last meeting - 9/5/38. In that report the Committee referred to the altered circumstances consequent upon the Council's resolution No. 209 (28/3/38) restricting for the present the proposed housing development to 120 houses, and pointed out that the lay-out approved by the Council on the 28th February (Hsg.C., 14/2/38-13) presented some difficulty in as much as the original proposal to erect some 240 houses could not at the moment be anticipated. The lay-out of the restricted development of 120 houses provides for the erection of some 40 dwellings on 3.8 acres near Dallas Road on the west side of the Brent Hill Temporary Allotments, and about 80 houses on 7 acres (vacant land and Renters Avenue Temporary Allotments) adjacent to Hendon Way on the east side of the estate, and the Committee expressed the opinion that a more satisfactory lay-out can be provided on the lines indicated by the Borough Surveyor and shown on the plan submitted. The Committee also intimated that the matter to some extent necessitated a re-consideration of the whole question of the utilization of the lands north of the River Brent, and that close attention had been given to a revision.

The following statement shows the land available and the allocations made by the Council in contemplation of the erection of 240 houses:—

After a careful review of every aspect of the matter and having regard to the future, the Committee remain of the opinion that the 120 houses should form a compact scheme and that the revised allocations of land offers the most economical and effective method of development for housing and open space, whilst a sufficient area exists for consideration in relation to allotments. In these circumstances the Committee have re-affirmed their previous decisions in the matter and accordingly re-submit the following recommendations:—

- (1) That the contemplated housing development of 120 houses be sited on 10 acres of land now used as part of the Brent Hill Temporary Allotments, commencing from Dallas Road, and that this allocation be referred to the Housing Committee, together with the lay-out plan submitted;
- (2) That 10 acres of land to the east and adjoining the above site be allocated for open space;
- (3) That the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee be informed of the above allocations and requested to consider and report on the demand for allotments in this area and as to their proposals for the allocation of lands for the purpose on the east side of the estate;
- (4) That any resolutions of the Council inconsistent with the above be varied accordingly.

Members are particularly requested to inspect the plans exhibited in the Members' Room.

#### 2-GOLF COURSE ESTATE-EDCWARE:

The Committee have considered a report from the Borough Surveyor with regard to the land referred to in the following recommendation of the Education Committee—24/5/38 (W.S/C., 10/5/38):—

"That the Education Committee recommend the Council's Special (Development) Committee to purchase the whole 13 acres of land under the Corporation's general powers and then appropriate the 7 acres required for education purposes at a price to be settled in consultation with the District Valuer:"

The Committee understand that the whole of the land can be purchased, but if the acquisition were restricted to a site of 7 acres for an Elementary School the question of severance would arise and a higher price per acre for the smaller site would be vitable.

- (3) That upon acquisition of the land, application be made for the consent of the Minister of Health to the formal appropriation of 7 acres for the purposes of Elementary Education;

#### FIRST AID AND CLEANSING POSTS:

The Sub-Committee, accompanied by the Borough Engineer, the Medical Officer of Health and the Town Clerk's A.R.P. Assistant, inspected the following premises which have been included in the Draft Air Raid Precautions (General) Scheme No. 1 as First Aid and Cleansing Posts:-

Welfare Centre, The Burroughs.

West Hendon Swimming Pool.

Colindale Council School.

With regard to the Welfare Centre adjacent to the Town Hall, whilst it is capable of adaptation as a First Aid Post, it is possible that the services for which it normally provides would continue to operate during a period of emergency. The Sub-Committee therefore came to the conclusion that other premises in the vicinity should be substituted, and after inspecting the Sunnyfields Council School, Sunningfields Road, they decided to recommend the utilisation of these premises in lieu of the Welfare Centre.

Bell Lane Council School is also included in the Draft Scheme as a First Aid and Cleansing Post, but in view of the fact that the lay-out of the premises and also the facilities existing thereat were well-known to the Members of the Committee, no inspection was carried out, the Committee being in agreement as to the suitability of the premises for the purpose for which they will be required.

The West Hendon Swimming Pool was carefully inspected by the Committee who came to the conclusion that the facilities and space available were insufficient for First Aid Post purposes. The West Hendon Slipper Baths were inspected with a view to such premises being utilized as an alternative in con-

junction with the West Hendon Ex-Servicemen's Club premises. In the opinion of the Sub-Committee, the Slipper Baths and adjoining Club premises are suitable for adaptation as a First Aid Post, and negotiations as to use will require to be entered into with the Ex-Servicemen's Club.

The Colindale Council School, Woodfield Avenue, on inspection was found to be in all respects suitable subject to necessary adaptation as a First Aid Post.

The Sub-Committee RECOMMEND-

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- (a) That the Welfare Centre, The Burroughs, and the West Hendon Swimming Pool be deleted from Section 9 of the Draft Scheme; and that Sunnyfields Council School and the West Hendon Slipper Baths in conjunction with the West Hendon Ex-Servicemen's Club premises be substituted therefor.
- (b) That the proposal included in the Draft Scheme for the use of Bell Lane Council School and Colindale Council School as First Aid and Cleansing Posts be confirmed.
- (c) That negotiations be entered into in due course regarding the use as a First Aid Post of the West Hendon Ex-Servicemen's Club premises.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the report of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 2-TRAINING OF RESCUE AND DEMOLITION PARTIES:

A letter was submitted from the Middlesex County Council stating that the Air Raid Precautions Committee of the County Council had approved a proposal that Council employees and other volunteers should receive practical training in demolition when this work is being carried out by a firm of house-breaking contractors. Some of this work will be done in the evenings or at week-ends. An experienced foreman, detailed by the contractors, will supervise the training and will receive five shillings per hour plus travelling expenses. If the cost of the demolition would in the ordinary way be a charge on the local authority, volunteers employed on the work (except Council employees employed during working hours) will be paid at the ordinary hourly rates (not over-time rates) applicable to the work. An agreed figure representing the cost of carrying out the works under normal conditions will be charged to the particular improvement scheme, and any additional expenditure will be chargeable to the A.R.P. service. Noted.

# 3.—SHELTERS FOR PERSONS CAUCHT IN STREETS; SITES FOR TRENCHES, ETC.:

A letter was submitted from the Middlesex County Council stating that at a recent conference with representatives of local authorities' associations, the Home Secretary stated that he regards as the most urgent need of the moment the survey of buildings capable of being adapted as small shelters for persons caught in the streets. The Home Secretary desires that this survey shall be completed, if possible, by the end of July, and also that by that date sites for trenches in open spaces, etc., should be marked on maps. An intimation has been given that the Home Office will recognise the cost of employment of additional surveying assistants when necessary for the above purposes.

A communication was also submitted from the Association of Municipal Corporations containing a summary of the discussion between the Home Secretary and the representatives of the associations of local authorities in England and Scotland on Monday, the 25th April last.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to carry out a survey of buildings capable of being adapted as small shelters for persons caught in streets, and also the preparation of maps indicating sites for trenches in open spaces, etc.

#### 4.-STORAGE OF RESPIRATORS:

A communication was submitted from the Middlesex County Council stating that the Secretary of State desires that storage accommodation for respirators shall be found as rapidly as possible. In this connection, the Committee considered the possibilities of storage accommodation for respirators being provided in conjunction with the proposed Dole Street Council School, and any other public buildings and the Borough Surveyor has been instructed to consider the question.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to make the necessary survey for the provision of storage accommodation for respirators and to report thereon to the Sub-Committee.

#### 5.-PUBLICITY:

A letter was submitted from the Home Office intimating that a series of Air Raid Precautions Recruiting Posters had been designed with a view to local authorities assisting in a campaign for obtaining volunteers, and stating that the Home Secretary attaches the greatest importance to this poster campaign, and that he is anxious that the posters should receive the widest possible display. In these circumstances, the Home Secretary expressed the hope that local authorities would take steps to have the posters exhibited on Town Halls and public buildings, and that a reduced sized poster should be displayed on municipal vehicles.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the facilities for publicity indicated in the letter from the Home Office be approved.

#### 6.-AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS COURSE FOR MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL:

The Committee considered the suggestion that a short course on air raid precautions should be arranged for such members of the Council as desire to attend, and the Town Clerk was instructed to make the necessary arrangements.

#### 7.--WARNING SIGNALS:

Home Office circular, dated 4th May, on the subject of Air Raid Warning Signals was reported. The code of signals laid down in the circular is as follows:—

For the Air Raid Warning:-

A Signal of two minutes' duration consisting of either

a fluctuating or "warbling" signal of varying pitch in which the frequency range is not less than 10 per cent. above and below the mean pitch, the complete cycle of each fluctuation to extend over a period of 2 to 5 seconds

a succession of intermittent blasts of about 5 seconds' duration separated by a silent period of about 3 seconds.

For the Raiders Passed Message:-

A continuous signal of 2 minutes' duration at a steady pitch.

Street Signals :--

In addition to large sirens, etc., used for public warnings, it is desirable that police constables and air raid wardens should have simple means of repeating the public signals, and of giving local gas warnings (for which the main public signals cannot be used). For these purposes only a short range is required, but the sounds must be distinctive.

The instruments selected are the following :--

For repeating the Warning-whistles (to be blown in sharp blasts).

For giving a Local Gas Warning-hand rattles.

For eancelling the Gas Warning (or for repeating the Raiders

Passed signal if no gas is present)-hand bells.

Hand Bells will thus become in effect an all clear signal.

A letter was also submitted from the Middlesex County Council calling attention to the Home Office circular and stating that the first task of local authorities in this matter is to acquaint themselves with the location and nature of existing sirens and hooters, and Secondly, to ascertain by trial how far these existing to mark maps accordingly. instruments cover the authority's area, and to locate positions for new instruments. Where there is need for the purchase and installation of new sirens, authorities are asked to explore the possibility of making use of existing plants where steam or compressed air is available. The Home Office wishes to be consulted for advice on the most suitable types of sirens to be obtained, and it would seem desirable that, so far as new instruments for Middlesex are concerned, the type should if possible be decided, subject to Home Office approval, by agreement between local authorities in Middlesex. County Council, therefore, ask to be furnished with specific suggestions in order that at a later date a conference may be arranged on the subject.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to ascertain the location and nature of existing sirens and hooters and to report thereon as early as practicable.

#### 8.-HIRING OF LOCAL AUTHORITIES' ROOMS FOR LECTURES AND CLASSES:

A letter was submitted from the Middlesex County Council stating that the Home Office has ruled that the only charge which will be ordinarily recognised when halls, assembly rooms, school-rooms and other rooms belonging to any local authority (including the County Council) are used for A.R.P. lectures and classes, will be a charge based on out-of-pocket expenditure on heating, lighting and cleaning. The Department is unwilling, as at present advised, to recognise loss of potential income arising from the fact that the rooms cannot simultaneously be let for other purposes. actual income can be proved the position may be different, but this is not yet clear). It is desired by the Home Office that a flat-rate charge for lighting, heating, etc., should if possible be fixed and that with this end in view, the County Council should submit a list of cases where the question arises. The County Council state that evidently there has been no general flat-rate applying to equally large assembly rooms and quite small class-rooms, or to all seasons of the year. They ask, however, to be furnished with a statement of the estimated out-of-pocket cost in summer and winter respectively in the case of any rooms belonging to the Council which have been, or will be, used for A.R.P. classes and lectures with a note of any special circumstances which might be urged in support of a further demand for the recognition of potential income lost.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Middlesex County Council be furnished with the desired information.

#### 9.-STRUCTURAL AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS:

A letter was submitted from the Royal Institute of British Architects drawing attention to the Conference on Structural Air Raid Precautions which the Royal Institute are holding on the 13th to the 15th June at the headquarters of the Institute, and inviting the Council to send as a delegate to the Conference a member of their architectural staff, and if they wish to do so, their Air Raid Precautions Officer also. Conference will be divided into two parts, namely, an inaugural meeting on June 13th at 8 p.m. and a two-day instructional course during the 14th and 15th June commencing at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. daily. On the suggestion of the Borough Surveyor, it was

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e main nge is RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Chief Building Inspector (Mr. L. A. Jones) be authorised to attend the Conference in question, and that the expenses incidental thereto be paid.

#### TRAINING OF VOLUNTEERS.

# 10.—BRITISH RED CROSS SOCIETY; FIRST AID TRAINING—FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS:

The Council at its last meeting decided that arrangements be entered into with the Hendon Branch of the British Red Cross Society whereby all A.R.P. personnel for whom training is necessary will be trained without cost to the respective volunteers. (A.R.P.C., 11/4/38—3 (B)).

The Hendon Branch of the British Red Cross Society have agreed to train First Aid personnel on the basis of a payment of 1/6d. for each volunteer trained, including the issue of the Society's certificate on passing the examination at the end of the course, and the Middlesex County Council have indicated their approval to this arrangement.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the arrangement indicated above be approved.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 11.-BRITISH RED CROSS SOCIETY-ANTI-CAS TRAINING:

In connection with the Anti-Gas Courses arranged by the British Red Cross Society in conjunction with the Council for First Aid Auxiliaries, Ambulance Drivers, Attendants, etc., the Middlesex County Council have approved of the Council making a payment to the British Red Cross Society of a fee of 1/- for each certificate issued to A.R.P. volunteers who pass the examination at the end of the respective courses.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the arrangement be approved.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 12-FIRST AID TRAINING-MILL HILL:

In connection with the First Aid course organised by the British Red Cross Society which commenced at Mill Hill on Monday, the 25th April, further accommodation was required for practical work in view of the large numbers attending the course, and arrangements were made for practical work to be carried out at the Branch Library on Friday evenings. The use of the Library premises on Fridays commenced on the 13th May. **Noted.** 

# 13.—WOMEN'S DETACHMENT (HENDON) OF THE ST. JOHN AMBULANCE BRICADE:

A course of instruction consisting of eight lectures in Anti-Gas measures organised by the Hendon (Women's) Detachment of the St. John Ambulance Brigade commenced at the Sunnyfields Council School on Monday, the 16th May. **Noted.** 

#### 14.-ST. JOHN AMBULANCE BRIGADE:

A course of Anti-Gas training for First Aid personnel organised by the No. 56 (Cricklewood) Division of the St. John Ambulance Brigade commenced at the Child's Hill Council School on Tuesday, the 10th May, and a similar course organised by the No. 115 (Edgware and Watling) Division will commence at Barnfield Council School on Friday, the 27th May. (A.R.P.C., 11/4/38—4 (A). Noted.

#### 15.-AIR RAID WARDENS' TRAINING:

Woodside Park Garden Suburb. (i).

The question was raised as to whether in the event of a property owner erecting an air raid shelter in the garden adjoining his premises, the assessment of the premises would be increased.

# 20.-DAMAGE TO PRIVATE PROPERTY AS A RESULT OF AN AIR RAID:

The Committee have instructed the Town Clerk to ascertain from the Home Office as to what steps the Government propose to take to compensate owners of private property for any damage that may be done to their property as a result of an air raid.

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#### 21.-BOROUCH SURVEYOR'S DEPARTMENT-STAFF:

The duties which will fall to be carried out by the Borough Surveyor's Department under the Air Raid Precautions Scheme will necessitate additional technical staff, but at the moment the extent of such additional staff cannot be foreseen. The Borough Surveyor reported on the matter, and it was

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor, in consultation with His Worship the Mayor and the Chairman of the Committee, be empowered to obtain such temporary technical assistance as the duties under the Air Raid Precautions Scheme falling to be carried out by his Department may require.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 22.-PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT-STAFF:

The Medical Officer of Health indicated that it was difficult to visualize precisely the volume of work which would have to be undertaken, but that it would appear that the Officers in his Department who would be primarily affected would be one Assistant Medical Officer, his Chief Clerk, and one Sanitary Inspector, who is at present attending the Anti-Gas School at Falfield. The appointment of an additional Assistant Medical Officer that night would make it possible to release one Assistant from his normal duties for a few sessions each week. This could be further extended by continuing the employment of the part-time Medical Officers for certain sessions as required. The Medical Officer had already in contemplation the appointment of an additional Sanitary Inspector in the normal course, and this matter would be brought before the Public Health and Medical Services Committee at their next meeting. will, of course, be accentuated when a portion of the time of the Sanitary Inspector who is at present under instruction is devoted to work under the Air Raid Precautions Scheme. It would no doubt also become necessary to appoint an additional shorthandtypist.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the matter be referred to His Worship the Mayor and the Chairman of the Committee in consultation with the Chairman of the Public Health Committee for consideration.

#### 23.-CASUALTY CLEARING HOSPITALS:

Pursuant to the instruction contained in Section (8) of the draft Air Raid Precautions (General) Scheme No. 1, the Medical Officer of Health reported on the number of beds which would be available at the Manor House Hospital by a process of evacuation as follows:—

in 74 hours ..... 5 beds. in 72 hours ..... 20 beds. in 7 days ..... 50 beds.

No information has yet been received in respect of the Hendon Cottage Hospital.

Noted

#### 24.-FIRST AID POSTS:

The Medical Officer reported that he had been in communication with the Secretary of the Hendon Division of the British Medical Association and had also addressed a meeting of its members. A letter was submitted from the Hon. Secretary of the Hendon Division of the Association stating that a small Committee had been formed, and in view of the fact that the Division takes a serious view of its responsibilities in A.R.P., the Committee is anxious to co-operate with the Council in the establishment of an efficient and complete medical service to function in an emergency, and to collaborate with the Council in the implementation of the A.R.P. Scheme.

The Committee have given instructions for the Council's thanks to be communicated to the members of the Hendon Division of the British Medical Association for their cooperation.



#### APPENDIX.

#### REPORT

relating to Public Local Inquiry into the circumstances attendant upon the

Fire at 9, 11 and 13, Temple Cardens, Colders Green, Hendon, on March 24th, 1938,

held by

C. M. KNOWLES, Esq., Barrister-at-Law,

accompanied by

Lt. Col. C. SYMONDS, D.S.O. (Fire Adviser to the Home Office) as Assessor.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Hendon.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

On 6th April, 1938, I was appointed by the Council of the Borough of Hendon, after consultation with the Home Office, to hold a Public Local Inquiry into the circumstances attendant upon the outbreak of fire at 9, 11 and 13, Temple Gardens, Golders Green, on 24th March, 1938, whereby Jennifer Susan Bramall, aged nine, lost her life, and the three houses suffered severe damage. The Inquiry was not concerned with the cause of the outbreak, and the cause of death was exclusively a matter for the Coroner's Court. I was able to undertake the Inquiry with greater confidence for the reason that Lt. Col. Guy Symonds, D.S.O., Fire Adviser to the Home Office, was appointed to sit with me as Assessor. The Inquiry was held at the Central Library, Hendon, and the evidence and the addresses of the legal representatives of the various bodies who appeared occupied three full days, namely April 13th, 21st and 22nd. Forty witnesses were called and Lt. Col. Symonds and I visited the Fire Station and the site of the fire and also traversed the routes taken by the Fire Brigade when called to the outbreak.

I now submit my report.

The allegations which call for investigation fall under four main heads:-

- 1. Delay in the telephone exchange in putting through calls to the Fire Brigade.
- 2. Unnecessary loss of time on the part of the Fire Brigade in arriving at the fire after receiving the call.
- 3. Inadequate leadership and defective organization of the Brigade at the site of the fire; defective equipment and bungling in using it.
- 4. Partial failure of the water supply.

These various matters can conveniently be dealt with in the foregoing order.

# ALLECATIONS OF DELAY IN PUTTING THROUGH CALLS TO FIRE BRIGADE.

The fire was discovered and the alarm first given by Miss Freda Adair, the maid employed by Mr. and Mrs. Bramall, the occupiers of 11, Temple Gardens, where the fire originated. She was at the time alone in the house with the little girl, Jennifer, who lost her life, and had herself gone to bed. A noise caused her to go downstairs to the kitchen and she found it ablaze. She ran to two houses near to get assistance. She returned to her own house

and there found Mr. Derek Bird, of 13, Temple Gardens. Mr. Bird told her to telephone for the Brigade. According to her story she ran to the telephone at the side of the front door, shouted into it "Fire at 11, Temple Gardens" but did not get, or did not wait for any reply. She was unable to give any evidence as to the time of these occurrences. Mr. Derek Bird, who lived next door, was, however, brought out of bed by what in my view must be taken to be the same noise as that which brought Freda Adair down to her kitchen, and according to his evidence the time of that occurrence was between 10.20 and 10.25 p.m.

It is undisputed that the first call was received at Hendon Central Station at 10.30 p.m. and that No. 1 Motor Engine left at 10.31 p.m.

The allegations are that several telephone fire calls were made at times substantially earlier than 10.30. The specific calls so alleged are the following:—

Mrs. E. Brown of 16, Temple Gardens, at 10.10 p.m.

Mrs. L. Spicer of 10, Temple Gardens, a first call at 10.15 and a second at 10.20.

Miss B. C. Stableforth of 9, Temple Gardens, at 10.20.

Mr. D. Friend of 81, Templar's Avenue, after 10.25 and before 10.30.

Mrs Spicer's evidence was that when she rang up the second time, which she says was at 10.20, she was told that the engine was on its way. Seeing that the first engine left the station at 10.31, it could not have been on its way at 10.20. It follows that Mrs. Spicer must have been in error when she said that she sent a call at 10.20.

According to Mr. Friend's evidence, he was passing the Golders Green Sorting Office which is barely two minutes from the scene of the fire when a police officer asked him to run to the box outside the Sorting Office and 'phone up the Fire Brigade. This he did and was told that the fire engine was already on the way. He was sure that he made the call before 10.30 and his calculations were that it was about 10.25, and he fixed the time by reference to an electric clock outside a shop three minutes from the Sorting Office, which shop he says he passed when the clock was "just gone 20 past 10." Here again it is impossible to accept the accuracy of the evidence of the witness that the time of his call was before 10.30, seeing that he was told in answer to his call which was put through immediately, that the engine, which admittedly left the Station at 10.31, was already on its way.

Accordingly, of the five calls alleged to have been made before 10.30, two must at once be eliminated as striking instances of the danger of accepting uncorroborated statements as to the time at which particular events took place.

When considering the other three calls alleged to have been made before 10.30 it is necessary to bear in mind the special procedure of the telephone exchange when dealing with emergency calls. It was explained in evidence by Mr. W. A. Rowe, the Supervisor on duty at the Speedwell Exchange on the night in question, that when a fire call is received whether from a call box or from a private subscriber the call is received on a docket. The particulars entered include the time of the call, the subscriber's name and number or the situation of the call box, and the action taken. The clock in the telephone exchange is regulated daily as a matter of routine. The instructions direct the record to be made immediately the call is received and passed on. The following dockets were put in at the Inquiry, and it was stated by Mr. Rowe that they represent the only emergency calls that evening.

Mrs. Brown's telephone number is 6732, and it will be seen that no call from that number was recorded that evening. Her evidence was that "to the best of my recollection" she made the call at 10.10. "The operator said, 'Number please' I said 'I want a fire brigade quick." The answer I got was, 'What number'? I said 'I do not want a number; I want the fire brigade for 11, Temple Gardens; I am speaking from No. 16'... I waited a moment. He said, 'That is all right.'" On her own admission she was in a state of considerable agitation all the time.

So far from there being any corroboration of Mrs. Brown's statement that she made a fire call at 10.10 p.m. or thereabouts, such relevant evidence as exists points in the opposite direction. Her evidence, as also that of Mrs. Candy with whom she lived in a house opposite the houses where the fire occurred, was that they were roused from bed by a knocking at the door, that they went downstairs and saw the maid Freda Adair running back across the road shouting the name of Jennifer; that Mrs. Candy told Mrs. Brown to put a call through for the Brigade; and Mrs. Brown states that she immediately did so. The maid was not herself able to state the time of these events, but it happened that Mr. Derek Bird, who lived next door, at No. 13, was brought downstairs and out by the same noise as that which brought the maid downstairs to find the kitchen in flames. Mr. Bird fixes the time of the explosion, or whatever the noise was, at between 10.20 and 10.25 and gives good grounds in support of the accuracy of his statement-much more convincing grounds than Mrs. Brown was able to adduce in support of hers. Accepting Mr. Bird's evidence as to time, it must have been not earlier than 10.20 or 10.25 that the maid roused the Candy household and rather later that Mrs. Brown telephoned. Moreover, the remark heard by Mrs. Brown at the conclusion of her telephonic conversation "That is all right" is much more compatible with a fire call having already been received than with a first call. Mr. Rowe, the supervisor from the Speedwell Exchange stated the view that as no Emergency Call was registered from the Caudy household, no such call was made. But assuming in favour of the stories of Mrs. Candy and Mrs. Brown that the telephone exchange is in error, the considerations above set out make it impossible to hold that a call was sent out from their house at 10.10 or thereabouts. Rather does the evidence show that any call that may have been made from that house was after rather than before 10.30.

Mrs. L. Spicer, stated in evidence that she made three fire alarm calls, and she timed them as made at 10.15, 10.20 and 10.30 respectively. When asked how she fixed these times she could only say it was by looking at the grandfather clock which was "kept ten minutes fast year in and year out," and she could not say why she looked at it on this particular occasion except that "you just get into the habit." Without corroboration, and there is none, it is impossible to accept a statement fixing a particular time on such an uncertain foundation.

But here again the difficulty of accepting her statement as to time is made manifest by her own evidence. Already it has been shown that her second call could not have been made at the time she alleged, 10.20, for she was told that the engine which left the station at 10.31, was already on its way. She puts this second call at five minutes later than the first, so that the first call, which is now under consideration, must have been made not at 10.15 but five minutes before some time later than 10.31, that is to say her first call was made not earlier than 10.26. This being so there is clearly nothing in Mrs. Spicer's evidence on which the telephone exchange should be held guilty of remissness in putting her calls through.

There remains the call made by Miss Stableforth of 9, Temple Gardens, from her own telephone No. 7368, as he alleges at 10.20, but registered by the telephone exchange on the Emergency Docket as received at 10.36. Her eall was thus described in evidence: "I called 999; the answer came back, 'Burglary or fire!' I said 'Fire at 11, Temple Gardens.' Then I waited a second to see whether they wanted to ask any more questions. Nothing more was said, so I replaced the receiver." This is compatible with the receipt of a first call or at any rate a call before the fire engine started at 10.31. But Miss Stableforth was able to point to a striking piece of corroborative evidence as showing that her call must have been earlier than 10.36, the time registered by the telephone exchange. After sending her call she went into the street, then returned to her house and went upstairs into the front bedroom and commenced to climb out of the window intending to get into the window of the burning house next door. She saw Mrs. Dobson at the window of No. 11 and Mrs. Dobson asked for a light. Miss Stableforth climbed back into her own room and got a lighted bulb which was attached to the end of a long flex. This she handed to Mrs. Dobson at the window of No. 11.

At this stage it is necessary to refer to evidence given by Postman Wright, whose evidence on questions of time is valuable for the reason that he had occasion to check his watch for the purpose of his duties. On the evening in question he checked his watch at 10.28 as he moved to the door of the Sorting Office to make his 10.45 collection. At the door he was told of the fire and immediately put a fire call through from the Public Call box there (No. 2669). A fire call from this call box was registered at 10.30. The answer came back "It's 11, Temple Gardens, isn't it." He then crossed to the burning house, "a matter of seconds" and got there before any fire engine appeared. The first thing he did was to climb into No. 11 through the front bedroom window, and he found a bulb and flex on the window sill. His account of his movements bears out his statement that he found the bulb and flex at the window between 10.30 and 10.35 and his evidence on this point is corroborated by Mr. G. Spicer who had also entered No. 11 and states that the bulb and flex were there before the engine arrived.

The bulb and flex were handed across to No. 11 by Miss Stableforth after she had sent her telephone call, and were found there by Wright between 10.30 and 10.35 and after he had put his own call through shortly before 10.30. It follows that Miss Stableforth's call could not have been made so late as 10.36, the time recorded at the Telephone Exchange.

I come to the conclusion that Miss Stableforth made only one fire call on the evening in question and that she made it before 10.30. It is possible that the call was put through promptly, that it was the call which brought out the first fire engine, and that it was merely by a elerical error that it was registered as made at 10.36. If 10.36 was the time the call was put through it was delayed in transmission. The possibility cannot be excluded that someone other than Miss Stableforth sent a call at 10.36 from her tele-

phone but there was no evidence of such a call. If this is the explanation of a call being registered at 10.36, it follows that Miss Stableforth's earlier call was not recorded. Which, if either, of these possibilities represents the truth the evidence does not enable me to judge.

Save possibly in the case of Miss Stableforth's call there is no evidence that fire calls made on the evening of 24th March, 1938, were not promptly put through to the Fire Brigade by the Speedwell Exchange, but at the same time the evidence suggests that the instruction requiring Emergency Calls to be immediately recorded is not always obeyed or precisely carried out.

# ALLEGATIONS OF DELAY ON PART OF BRICADE IN ARRIVING AT FIRE.

It must be accepted that the first call received at Hendon Central Fire Station was at 10.30 p.m. on the night in question and that No. 1 Engine left the Station at 10.31 p.m. The Fire Brigade records all show the time of arrival at the fire as 10.36 p.m., but Station Officer Stimpson was willing to allow an additional minute, making it 10.37 p.m. But whereas the Fire Engine automatically records its own time of departure, "punches itself out" on the Gamewell tape, the time of arrival at the fire is mentally noted from the clock on the engine by the officer in charge, and by him recorded at some convenient time later. On the evidence however it may be accepted that No. 1 Engine reached the fire in six minutes from the time of leaving the station. It took a longer time than was necessary for two reasons. Two routes from the station to the fire were available and it took the longer route; and it went astray, finding itself at Temple Grove instead of Temple Gardens. The longer route taken (not including distance lost by going astray) is a distance of 10,900 feet from Station to fire; the shorter route is 9,100 feet. By going to Temple Grove instead of going direct to Temple Gardens the engine went 1,500 feet out of its way. The engine accordingly traversed 3,300 feet unnecessarily. Put another way it covered a distance 2.3 miles to get to the fire, whereas it might have got there in a distance of 1.7 miles. On the evidence the engine was at Temple Grove for a space of about two minutes, the time occupied by Station Officer Stimpson in going into Mr. Danks' house in Temple Grove and telephoning back to headquarters to enquire as to the address of the fire. Altogether I come to the conclusion that No. 1 Engine took some three minutes longer to get to the fire than was absolutely necessary.

A delay of three minutes in getting to grips with a fire is, in any circumstances, bound to have unfortunate consequences, but, on the evidence of those who were at the fire before the engine arrived, the flames had already got such a hold that it would not be reasonable to say that had the engine arrived two or three minutes sooner it could have materially altered the situation for the better.

The second of the three engines that attended the fire left Hendon Central Station, according to the reports of Station Officer Stimpson and the Superintendent, at 10.37, but according to the Occurrence Book at 10.38 and arrived at 10.42, going by the shorter of the two routes already referred to, a performance with which that of No. 1 Machine does not compare unfavourably if allowance is made for time lost by taking the longer route and going astray.

The third engine left Mill Hill Sub-Station at 10.57 and got to the fire in eight minutes.

The incidents and evidence now under consideration must be considered in another aspect.

Station Officer Stimpson very frankly and loyally took sole responsibility for the mistake made in driving No. 1 Engine to Temple Grove, whereas the fire was in Temple Gardens. In his own words when describing his actions on receiving the alarm at 10.30. "The Duty man shouts to me: 'Fire at Temple Gardens, No. 11.' I said 'Right.' My crew was then on the machine and the machine punched itself out of the station at 10.31." When asked what he did when his head lights showed that they had got to Temple Grove he replied: "I had the biggest shock of my career. This was the first time that I had ever made such a mistake in my 23 years of service, and I should like to add at this moment that in the Borough we have six streets all practically with the same name. Immediately I saw Temple Grove I looked to the right of me and I saw a lady and gentleman at the second house; I rushed to the door and I asked whether I might use the telephone to verify the call. I wish to make it clear that I instructed my driver to take this route . . . I was very quick in getting through on this telephone to the Fire Station . . . . 1 asked my Duty Man to verify the call. I said I was at Temple Grove. He immediately said 'It is Temple Gardens.' I said, 'Temple Gardens? Right!' At the same time I turned to Mr. and Mrs. Danks and said, 'Where is Temple Gardens?' . . . As I got to my machine, Fireman Clarke said to me: 'Sir, I can see smoke,' and at the same time I jumped on the machine and we went straight to Temple Gardens, and to get from Temple Grove to Temple Gardens took under a minute." When asked, "Why did you spend time telephoning and inquiring where the fire was if you knew where it was before you set out?" the answer was "It was a practice I adopted to get my memory refreshed."

It further appears from the evidence of Fireman Gosden who drove No. 1 Engine that Station Officer Stimpson directed him to drive "to 11, Temple Gardens, off Temple Fortune Lane" and that when Gosden replied that "it was Temple Grove, not Temple Gardens," Station Officer Stimpson "just instructed me to drive to Temple Fortune Lane: I had to obey his orders."

Furthermore the fact emerged, but only on cross examination, that when telephoning from Mr. Danks' house in Temple Grove, Station Officer Stimpson asked that a second engine might be sent. It was a curious method of taking what was in fact a very serviceable step, for he had not then seen the fire, and when asked for an explanation he could only say, "Because it would help to cover my mistake. That was my idea," the mistake being the loss of time.

Nor does this rather unhappy chain of events end here. Fireman Allen was Duty Man at Hendon Central Station on the night in question and it was he who received any calls that came through. Part of his duty was to record in the Occurrence Book all that happened, and the time the various events occurred. He said quite frankly that he had entered all that occurred that evening with "one exception," that exception being the call of Station Officer Stimpson from Mr. Danks' telephone in Temple Grove already referred to. Asked to explain this one exception Fireman Allen replied: "I was told not to book it" and when further asked who told him not to book it he replied: "The Chief Officer." The Chief Officer had in his evidence agreed that the incident should have been entered in the Occurrence Book, but could not say whether it was, he was "so forgetful." He would not admit, on cross examination, that he had told Allen not to enter the incident, but his attitude was that he did not remember rather than one of denial. Putting aside this latter incident, however, it has to be accepted that Station Officer Stimpson directed his engine to the wrong place although his error was pointed out by his driver at the start; and that he wasted a certain amount of time telephoning back to headquarters to inquire where the fire was, when he had been given the information quite clearly on leaving the Station. For

reasons that had already been explained it is not probable, in the present instance, that any serious results followed, and it may be that undue prominence and a disproportionate amount of publicity has been given to the episode; but unfortunately such incidents impair the confidence of the Brigade in its leaders and of the public in the Brigade.

One further matter remains to be noticed in this connection. Instructions issued to the London Fire Brigade designed to procure the most accurate information possible as to the locality of a fire for the guidance of the drivers when a call is received were quoted in evidence. It was admitted that no such instructions had been issued to Hendon Fire Brigade and the Station Officer admitted their usefulness. The appropriate Committee of Hendon Borough Council will doubtless take into consideration the compilation and issue of similar instructions for the future guidance of their own Brigade.

#### SEQUENCE OF EVENTS AT FIRE.

So far as it is possible to disentangle the incidents of a confused situation, the sequence of events after the arrival of No. 1 Engine at the fire was as follows:—

When No. 1 Engine arrived at 10.36 p.m. a number of police officers were already there together with a number of civilians, and attempts had already been made, but unsuccessfully, to get at the child in the burning house.

No. 1 Engine arrived with the Station Officer, driver and three men. On arrival the Station Officer ordered a line of hose to be run to the front door of No. 11. Then being told by a voice from the crowd that the child was in No. 9 he made his way upstairs and found two men whom he took to be plain-clothes policemen trying to cut a hole through the party wall into No. 11 next door with the idea of getting to the child there, an operation which was abandoned on his instructions as in his judgment it was a waste of time. He then went back to No. 11 and tried to enter by the front door but was beaten back by smoke and flames. The landing was then alight and the roofs of the three houses were burning. Hearing a shout that the place was well alight at the back he ordered a second line of hose to the rear of the building and went there himself.

Attempts were being made to get into a bedroom window there and he went to No 1 Engine and lifted off the hook ladder which he handed to a police constable who had already been in the house, having entered from the front, and who carried it to the back of the house where he handed it to other officers. Driver Gosden who was also the pumpman of No. 1 Engine on arrival put his engine on the hydrant at the corner of St. George's Road and Temple Gardens. Fireman Rogers ran out the first line of hose, fixed the branch (the metal attachment terminating in a nozzle through which the jet of water issues) and directed his jet through the broken glass panels of the front door of No. 11. Apparently the door was not broken open until five minutes later, when Fireman Williams, who had arrived with the second engine smashed in the door with his axe and so enabled an entry to be made. That being done Fireman Rogers handed the branch to Fireman Clarke and tried to get upstairs but was driven back by smoke and flames. Leonard Austin, the remaining member of the crew of No. 1 Engine, after preparing the hydrant for serving the first line of hose took over the second line of hose which had been laid, attached a branch, and also for a short time played into the hall through the front door, when he heard someone say that a child was in the back of the house. Thereupon he left Fireman Rogers to cover the front door and himself shut off his branch and went to the back. Returning to the front he asked the pumpman to shut off the second line of hose so that he could lay further hose to enable him to play on the back of the premises. He got the hose round to the back of No. 11 by way of No. 13 with the help of civilians, but then an unfortunate cause of delay occurred, for the water was turned on again before he could properly attach the branch, and it was not until he asked one of the civilians who had helped to bring the hose round to go back to the engine and tell them to switch off the water from the hose that the branch could be attached and brought into use.

No. 2 Engine reached the fire at 10.42, some five or six minutes after No. 1 Engine. It was not fully manned, for it only had a crew of three, namely Firemen Beasant, Boyall and Williams. Station Officer Stimpson at once ordered Fireman Boyall to put on the self-contained breathing apparatus and directed him to the room at the back of No. 11 where the child was. He also sent Beasant to relieve Gosden, the pumpman, and fitted the latter with another apparatus so as to be ready to assist Boyall. This was done in pursuance of the obviously sensible policy of calling on men for the purpose who were freshest and least exhausted from fire-fighting.

Boyall went up the hook ladder already in position at the back window of No. 11. His account was that by then the house was alight from the ground floor to the roof. A belt was handed up to him by which to hook himself to the ladder and a hose was handed up to him by Police Constable Havard with which he played into the room. When the fire in the room was sufficiently subdued he entered, having, however, first removed the mouth-piece of his apparatus, preferring to rely on natural breathing, and, groping about, he found the child on the bed, face downwards. He handed her to P.C. Havard who had followed him into the room and together they passed her through the window to Fireman Leonard Austin. Artificial respiration was applied and doctors were sent for and arrived, but it was too late and it only remained to take the body in the ambulance to the mortuary.

It was shortly after the removal of the child's body that Superintendent Bevis arrived at the scene of the fire. Of the four lines of hose that could be coupled to No. 1 Engine three were functioning when he arrived. disposition of the three hoses was thus explained by Station Officer Stimpson: "The line of hose into No. 11, the first line of hose, was to keep down the body of the fire on the ground floor of No. 11 to give us an opportunity to get to the child. The second line of hose went round No. 13 and first of all played into the back kitchen window of No. 11, where the fire had originated, to get that part of the fire down, and then that line of hose was extended to the rear of No. 11 to assist the rescue. Then I got the third line of hose on to No. 9 which I handed to a policeman in plain clothes." The Superintendent, on his arrival, directed a fourth line of hose to be laid to the rear of No. 9. As already there were three lines of hose on three deliveries, the dividing breach had to be used on No. 3 delivery, that is to say, the delivery was divided between two lengths of hose. At a comparatively late period the Station Officer coupled a short length of hose direct to a hydrant near No. 13, Temple Gardens which was operated by a policeman.

Soon after his arrival Superintendent Bevis noticed that the two jets which were playing on the roofs were failing to the extent that, in his own words, the water issuing from the branches was "just a goose neck." The fire continued to extend along the roofs but the jets would no longer reach so far. According to Fireman Gosden who was standing by the No. 1 Engine, the pressure gauge showed a drop from 120 to between 30 and 40. The Superintendent found that the pumps were in order and concluded that the water supply had failed and accordingly he telephoned to the Water Board telling them he wanted more water at once for a serious fire in Temple Gardens. The delay in getting the necessary turnock to the scene of the fire is surprising, but is explained by the circuitous procedure involved.

According to the evidence of William Taylor, a reservoir attendant in the employment of the Metropolitan Water Board he received a telephone call at 11.15 p.m. to say that water was wanted for a fire at Temple Gardens. He went on his bicycle to fetch Turncock Rowland. Turncock Rowland related how he was called out of bed by Taylor about 11.20 p.m., how he at once got up and went out, finishing his dressing on the 'bus by which he got to Temple Gardens at about 11.40. His services, however, were not required, for the water supply had returned to the normal before he arrived. The period of inadequate water supply could not be accurately stated, but was estimated by Superintendent Bevis at from ten to twenty minutes.

A further measure taken by the Superintendent after his arrival was to summon from Mill Hill Station another engine, which arrived shortly after 11 p.m. with three men only, not with a full crew. The Mill Hill Engine was coupled up to a hydrant other than that on which No. 1 Engine was working, that is to say to the hydrant at the junction of Finchley Road and St. George's Road. It was used for relay pumping, in other words, pumping from the hydrant into another engine in order to get increased pressure. Thereafter the general situation was satisfactory. The ladders and hose brought by the Mill Hill Engine enabled the firemen who accompanied it to control and soon to subdue the fire from the level of the roofs of the houses involved, and at 1.25 a.m. the last of the three engines returned to its station.

# ALLECATIONS OF DEFECTS IN LEADERSHIP AND ORCANIZATION OF BRICADE.

The mere recital of the foregoing sequence of events at the scene of the fire give rise to misgivings, inasmuch as certain of those events appear prima facie to point to inadequate or defective training, unsatisfactory leadership, and failure to concentrate an adequate fire fighting force at the proper time.

Two incidents, minor incidents perhaps, but each of them resulting in the loss of valuable time, seem explicable only on the footing that the men concerned were insufficiently trained, or that there was lack of control by the officer in command.

It has been related how, when with civilian help the second hose was being dragged to the back of the burning premises, the branch was seen to be detached from the hose while from the hose itself water was pouring, and how in spite of efforts, again with civilian help, to stop the flow by doubling the hose back, it was not found possible to attach the branch until a civilian had run back to the engine to get the water switched off. The water had been turned on in the hose before the branch had been got into position. According to the evidence of the pumpman in charge of the Engine, the signal to turn water off or on is given by the officer in charge by means of a whistle-one blast to turn on, two to shut off. The evidence of the pumpman was that on this occasion he turned on the water, not as the result of a signal received, but, in his own words, "I used my own imagination." seems quite clear that the station officer in charge exercised no effective control over the pumpman at the engine, and that there was no co-ordination by signal or otherwise as between the pumpman in charge of the engine and the firemen at the other end of the hose. The whole incident can only be described as an instance of sheer bungling, resulting in a hose being out of action for a serious period of time.

Again, it has been described how the fireman who was handling the first hose brought into use was directing his jet through the broken glass panels of the front door of the burning house, and how it was not until this had continued for some five minutes that another fireman who had arrived on the second engine broke in the door with his axe and so enabled an entry to

be made into the house itself. It is difficult to believe that any properly trained fireman would be content for five minutes to direct his jet through the broken glass panel of a closed door without attempting to get to closer quarters with the fire by breaking the fastening of a door of a kind which could not have been a very formidable obstacle to a man armed with a fireman's axe.

But it is in the use of the self-contained breathing dress or any similar apparatus designed for effective rescue work that the Brigade's lack of training is most alarmingly manifest. Two of the firemen put on the selfcontained breathing dress at the fire. Fireman Gosden, however, said in his evidence that although the breathing apparatus was placed on his shoulders he "did not put the mouth piece in position at all," and he agreed that this meant that he did not at any stage of the fire wear the equipment in a manner that would make it effective. Fireman Boyall told how he got to the ladder at the window of the child's room wearing the breathing dress completely adjusted and in full working order and so ascended the ladder. But when he actually entered the room and found the child he was not using the fully room I decided I should do better if I relied on my own respiratory system. I did so and accomplished what I set out to do." He "did not take the thing off," but he discarded the mouth piece. P.C. Havard, who followed Fireman Boyall into the room, wore no breathing apparatus at all. purpose of such apparatus is to enable firemen more successfully to accomplish rescue work at fires by making it possible for them to enter rooms so full of smoke that without the apparatus such entry would not be possible In the present instance, according to the evidence of those immediately concerned, the room was not entered until it was found possible to do so without using the breathing apparatus. In other words, no effective use was made of the self-contained breathing dress during the whole course of the fire and the Brigade might just as well have left it behind them at the station. Fireman Boyall's devotion to duty and personal bravery are unquestioned, and his tactics at the crisis of the fire are only explicable on the basis that he was so inadequately trained in the use of the breathing dress that he did not feel safe in relying on it and so discarded it at the critical moment. It logically follows that a fireman properly trained in the use of the self-contained breathing dress would have been able to enter the child's room earlier.

The Chairman of the Works and Fire Brigade Committee, while admitting that "on this particular occasion something went wrong at the psychological moment," yet claimed that the evidence showed "that there are regular drills at which every kind of appliance is used and brought into practice," and in his opinion the duty of seeing that those drills are regularly carried out and that the training is efficient "must be left to the Chief Officer." I am quite unable to agree that the evidence showed that the Brigade received effective training in the use of the self-contained breathing dress. about the training of the men in the use of breathing apparatus, Station Officer Stimpson said, a little vaguely, that such training was given "pretty often." A little more precisely he said later it took place "at least once a month" and that drills lasted "half an hour on an average," but that they had at Hendon no smoke chamber. On the other hand, Fireman Gosden, who was fitted with a second breathing apparatus which, however, it will be remembered, he never used, when asked what training he had received in its use replied: "In Hendon very little, but in the volunteer brigade I had a fortnight's course with the Siehe-Gorman instructor," and he agreed that in Hendon there was no regular training in the use of breathing apparatus.

Rescue work is obviously one of the most important aspects of a fire brigade's duties. It can only be effectively undertaken by men who have been

thoroughly trained in the use of the self-contained breathing dress or some similar apparatus by regular drill in a smoke chamber. The men of the Hendon Fire Brigade have received no such effective training; the partial training they appear to have received may be only dangerous.

To fight a fire successfully it is essential that an adequate fire fighting force should be concentrated on the fire as early as possible. No harm is done by sending more men and equipment than are found to be wanted in response to a call. To send too few gives the fire the opportunity of making progress while reinforcements are being awaited. This principle is recognised in the practice, which is by no means confined to the London Fire Brigade, of despatching at least two fully manned engines at once in response to the first call to all fires except such as are known to be chimney or very small When the call to the Temple Gardens fire was received a single engine was sent manned by the Station Officer, the driver (who was also the pumpman in attendance on the engine) and three firemen. A second engine, manned by only three firemen of whom one was the driver, left seven minutes How it was summoned has already been described and it is only later. necessary to say here that its despatch in support of the first engine was not in pursuance of a general practice of the Hendon Brigade. The third engine left Mill Hill Station nineteen minutes later, arriving after 11 p.m., but although its full crew is an officer and six men it only brought on it three men, one of whom was the driver. During the critical period of the fire, namely from 10.30 to 11 p.m. only the Station Officer and seven men, one of whom had to be in attendance on the engine, were on the site.

Seven well-trained men, efficiently led, may have been enough to subdue a fire of the dimensions of that with which the Hendon Brigade had to deal, but all the evidence goes to show that in fact the six men (excluding the driver and pumpman) who came with the first two engines were an inadequate force. Help from outside the ranks of the Brigade was not only not resented but welcomed and indeed invoked. It has already been described how police constables and civilians helped to get the fire hose round to the back of the burning houses, to get the hose up a ladder to the fireman at the top, to attach the branch to one of the hoses, to convey messages to the pumpman at the engine, to fetch and carry ladders from the engine to the fire, and even to manipulate branches, and it was by a police constable and a fireman that the child was taken from the burning building. Station Officer Stimpson told how he himself handed the hook ladder to a police constable to carry from the engine to the fire, how a constable helped him to lay the third line of hose to the rear of the premises, and how when he opened a hydrant near No. 13 it was to a police constable that he handed the branch and hose attached thereto. A fireman told how he handed his branch to a policeman, even so late as after the child had been taken from the house. In a remarkable passage in his evidence Station Officer Stimpson summed up the situation by his confession, "I had the worst twenty minutes of my career in the Fire Brigade." He explained that he had to carry out the duties of an extra fireman as well as to supervise. He had himself to lay the third line of hose. assisted by a constable, and he rightly thought it was not an officer's place to lay a line of hose. But he had to do it "because I had not at the early stages the men."

The full complement at the Hendon Central Station is one Superintendent, one Station Officer and fourteen men. At Mill Hill Station there are one Station Officer and eighteen men. The continuous service system is in use, which means that the firemen are continually on duty except on their leave days, and they have leave every fifth day. Including the men who arrived with the ambulance or utility van, and the dutyman at the Station, the Hendon Central Staff would be all accounted for; but of the fourteen men who should

be available at the Mill Hill Station, allowance being made for those on leave, only three men were despatched to the fire. The Station Officer in command could not have been satisfied that the three men who arrived on the second engine were sufficient reinforcements, for the assistance of police and civilians continued thereafter, and his complaint that he was so "hard pushed" that he himself had to do the fireman's job of laying a line of hose relates to an incident which was subsequent to the arrival of No. 2 Engine. Superintendent Bevis, on the other hand, seems to have realised promptly the need for more men for he called up the Mill Hill Engine almost immediately after his arrival at the fire.

It is almost incredible that a medley of civilians, police and firemen should have been left to deal with a serious fire in the area of a professional brigade and in a district which geographically and socially, though not administratively, is really part of the Metropolis, and it is inexplicable in that, as has been shown, plenty of men were available for reinforcements at the Brigade's Mill Hill Station.

No fault is to be found with the Brigade's Equipment which appeared to be adequate and well maintained. The statement was made by one witness that she saw jets of water shooting out from punctures in one of the hoses in use. At our request a demonstration was arranged for the benefit of Lt. Col. Symonds and myself. The hose in question was tested in our presence and we were satisfied that what the witness saw was not jets, but the ordinary weeping that occurs in a new hose of this kind.

#### FAILURE OF WATER SUPPLY.

The failure of the water supply during the fire for a period estimated by the Superintendent at from ten to twenty minutes and by the Station Officer at from fifteen to twenty minutes is the most disquieting of a series of unfortunate incidents. To what extent the fire spread as a consequence of the failure cannot be known, but it might well have had the most disastrous results. At the same time it is right to point out that the body of the child was brought out before the water shortage began, so that the shortage in no way contributed to her death.

Much of the evidence relating to this particular matter was of a technical nature, but its effect can be stated in non-technical language. The central fact is that until the Mill Hill Station Engine arrived shortly after 11 p.m. four lines of hose were coupled up to No. 1 Engine and No. 1 Engine was working on a single hydrant, namely, the hydrant at the junction of St. George's Road and Temple Gardens, which is on a 4-inch main. The evidence of Mr. Thorold, Distribution Engineer to the Metropolitan Water Board, makes it clear that the four lines of hose made demands on the delivery No. 1 Engine was trying to draw more water from that single hydrant than The nozzle on the branch attached to the hose the hydrant could supply. first in use was 7/8 inch and the second 3/4 inch. According to the evidence, which I have no hesitation in accepting, with these two nozzles, and taking into account the pump pressure, there would be a delivery of about 200 gallous a minute. The addition of a hose with a 3/4 inch nozzle would bring the demand on the hydrant up to 292 gallons per minute, a quantity which was beyond its capacity to supply. The addition of a fourth hose with a 1/2 inch nozzle would bring the demand up to a total of 327 gallons a minute and made a breakdown inevitable.

No defence of these tactics was offered and indeed it is difficult to see how any valid excuse could be found, for other tactics which would have avoided any breakdown of supply could have been adopted. In the first place a second hydrant was available, namely, that at the junction of St. George's Road and Finchley Road, which is on a 6 inch main, but it was not used until the third engine from Mill Hill Station which arrived shortly after 11 p.m. was connected to it for the purpose of relaying to No. 1 Engine. Thereafter there was no water shortage. There is no apparent reason why the additional supply available from this second hydrant should not have been drawn upon much earlier. No. 1 Engine could have been coupled up to the two hydrants, in other words, the engine could have pumped off two hydrants instead of making impossible demands on one.

In the second place, when No. 2 Engine arrived, five minutes after the first, it could have been coupled to the second hydrant at once. But No. 2 Engine was allowed to stand idle.

But even if it was necessary or for any reason considered desirable that only one hydrant should be used, it was quite possible, by following the proper procedure, to secure an adequate supply of water from that one There is what Water Engineers call a dividing valve between the 4-inch main in Temple Gardens from which alone the four hoses were being supplied, and the 6-inch main in St. George's Road. A Metropolitan Water Board turncock, had he been present, could have opened that dividing valve. The evidence of the Engineer to the Metropolitan Water Board was that if that had been done the flow from the hydrant in actual use would have been increased from 170 gallons to 290 gallons a minute. The question then arises, why were the services of a turncock not available, when they would have been of use? The answer is that the Hendon Fire Brigade have so far not thought it necessary to adopt the practice of the London Fire Brigade whereby steps are taken to secure the presence of a turncock at the scene of the fire so far as possible simultaneously with the arrival of the Brigade itself. also the practice in other Brigades. For example according to the evidence of its Chief Officer, a similar practice prevails in the Hounslow Brigade. Certainly Turncock Rowland cannot be accused of any dilatoriness seeing that although he had to get up from bed, and find his way to the fire by 'bus, as he himself said, finishing his dressing on the way, he arrived at the fire 20 minutes after he received the call. But it was more than an hour after the first arrival of the Brigade itself. His experience when called to a fire within the are of the London Fire Brigade was far otherwise. In his own words, "In the case of a fire like that they would either send down the escape or the Superintendent of the district sends his car and fetches you to it quick." He was quite clear that if Temple Gardens had been in the area of the London Fire Brigade he would have been at the scene of the fire shortly after 10.30 p.m. ready to provide more water if necessary.

Both Superintendent Bevis and Station Officer Stimpson admitted that it would have been better if the turncock had been summoned to Temple Gardens at the outset, but they had no instructions as to calling turncocks.

On the foregoing facts it is clear that none of the responsibility for the failure of the water supply at the fire can be allocated to the Metropolitan Water Board or any of its officers, and as would be expected the recording charts from the Board's pressure gauges which were produced show that the pressure in the mains was constant before, after, and during the period of the fire. Moreover it is due to the Board to put on record the statement made on their behalf that they encourage the ready attendance of their turn-cocks at fires in order that they may assist in every possible way, and furthermore pay the turncock a gratuity out of their own funds for any such attendance. Responsibility for failure to make the best use of the resources at his disposal must rest with the officer in control at the scene of the fire.

When asked at the Inquiry whether he knew that there was a dividing valve between the 6-inch main in St. George's Road and the 4-inch main in Temple Gardens, and that the turncock, by opening that valve could have provided him with an abundant supply from the 6-inch main, Superintendent Bevis replied that he did not know it "because it was up to him to give me water." Station Officer Stimpson admitted similar want of knowledge. In view of their admissions, and seeing that there are many miles of 4-inch mains in the Borough from which, without manipulation of valves, the flow must necessarily be relatively small, the desirability of making provision for the presence with the Brigade of a functionary possessing the necessary knowledge and equipped with the authority and means to provide an adequate water supply should be obvious to those who control the general organization of the Brigade.

#### CONCLUSIONS.

Reviewing the evidence as a whole, the only conclusion that can be arrived at is that while the men of the Fire Brigade individually did their best at the scene of the fire they were, as a body, insufficiently trained, and they were to too great an extent left to their own resources. Station Officer Stimpson, by reason of the absence of the Superintendent during the critical period of the fire, found himself in a position where he was called upon to carry a burden of responsibility that was beyond his powers. When, at a late stage of the fire, Superintendent Bevis arrived, he seems to have grasped the situation at once and to have taken the steps necessary to remedy the errors that had already been made. To his absence must be ascribed the lack of leadership at the fire which was so apparent, but he should not be blamed for his late arrival for he was not then and for a considerable time had not been physically in a fit state to take active command at a serious fire.

While the lay Committee of a local authority must largely depend upon its officers for guidance in technical matters, and while undue interference by a Committee with the authority of the higher officers of any department is to be deprecated, it is impossible to agree with the principle enunciated by the Chairman of the Committee controlling the Hendon Fire Brigade that it must be left to the Chief Officer to see that the training of the Brigade is Unless the Committee interests itself in the affairs of the Brigade to the extent of satisfying itself that the best and most modern fire brigade practice has been at least considered by its officers and so far as desirable adopted in its own Brigade, it is difficult to see what useful purpose it serves. The Borough is the neighbour of a great administrative entity which has what is probably the most efficient Fire Brigade in the world, and with a minimum of effort it could keep in touch with the best fire brigade practice. deficiencies in the training of the men which have become apparent, the sending of only one engine on receipt of the first alarm, and the omission to summon a turncock to the scene of the fire at the outset are instances which make it clear that this policy of active observation has not been pursued in Hendon.

In conclusion I feel bound to suggest to the Borough Council that it is a matter for their very serious consideration whether, in the light of what happened at the Temple Gardens fire, their Fire Brigade's present standards of training and leadership are such that it can be regarded as competent to deal efficiently and effectively with fires of any serious magnitude.

I am unwilling to part with this Report without making some reference to the admirable services rendered by officers of the Metropolitan Police, especially during the period between the receipt of the alarm of fire and the arrival of the first engine. On being told that a child was there two members of the force entered the burning house and searched the bedroom floor until obliged to retire through exhaustion. Another constable, after endeavouring to enter the window of the room where the child was, which he managed to smash and the bars of which he was able to remove, but finding himself unable to make further progress, searched the neighbouring premises to see that nobody was there. P.C. Havard, after an independent attempt to enter the house, dragged the fire hose up the ladder, so enabling the fireman there to pour water into the child's room, and then followed the fireman into the room without the protection of any breathing apparatus and assisted him in the child's actual removal.

The Inspector who, with great promtitude collected as many men as could be spared from Finchley Station and took them to the scene of the fire by car as reinforcements to those already there, thus described the duties of the police at an outbreak of fire: "In cases of this kind, and in many cases, they are by various means the first on the scene, as in this case, and having received this information about the little girl, it would be their job to do what they could to get her out, consistent with their knowledge of fire-fighting, which is perhaps not so much, and having done that, or rather at the time the Fire Brigade arrive, it is then their duty to leave things entirely in the hands of the Fire Brigade and to concentrate on assisting as far as they can in helping the Fire Brigade by keeping a sufficient space and turning back persons who have no right there." Certainly, and in circumstances of considerable danger to themselves, police officers did do what they could to rescue the little girl and moreover gave welcome help to the Brigade after its arrival when it was found that such help would be useful.

I am very appreciative of the excellent arrangements made for the Inquiry by the Town Clerk, necessarily at somewhat short notice, and of the courtesy with which he saw that all requests for documents or information, by whomsoever made, were readily met. While never unmindful of the interests of those he represented, he at the same time was careful to ensure that all information and every witness or document that could be of assistance to the tribunal was made available.

Many of the matters which it was the purpose of the Inquiry to investigate were of necessity technical in their nature and it goes without saying that the great experience and knowledge of Lt. Col. Guy Symonds, who sat with me as Assessor, were invaluable in their elucidation. Responsibility for this Report must, of course, be wholly mine, but Lt. Col. Symonds authorises me to say that he concurs in its contents.

#### TRAFFIC CONTROL:

REPORT ON INTERVIEW AT THE MINISTRY OF TRANSPORT.

The Deputation appointed by the Council, 20/6/38 (Hi.C., 16/5/38-17 and 18) attended at the Ministry of Transport on Monday, the 27th June, and consisted of Alderman C. C. Cartwright, M.B.E., J.P., and Councillor A. W. Curton, Chairman of the Highways Committee; with the Borough Surveyor and the Town Clerk's Chief Assistant.

His Worship the Mayor had expressed regret on his inability to attend.

The Deputation was received by Captain A. Hudson, M.P., Parliamentary Secretary and Mr. II. Fisher,

Junction of Edgware Way and Edgwarebury Lane.

In connection with the Council's application for traffic lights at this junction, the Deputation were informed that the Ministry had given the matter the most careful consideration and had called the Police into consultation. A census showed that the volume of traffic on Edgware Way was nearly nine times that of Edgwarebury Lane, which proved that the problem at this junction was primarily one of concern for the pedestrian crossing the Arterial Road. The installation of traffic lights at a junction where such traffic conditions exist had proved that the traffic was unduly delayed on the busier thoroughfare, whilst as an aid to pedestrians they are of little value as the change of light is so frequent and for so short a period that pedestrians are afforded but little opportunity to cross. The installation of lights at unsuitable places are considered to be conducive to accidents.

It was made abundantly clear that the installation of traffic lights would not be approved, but the Ministry are anxious to see a subway constructed. It is understood that this proposal has been before the Middlesex County Council but that no great interest appears to have been shown. For this reason, and the fact that the Town Council had pressed their application for lights, no progress had been made.

The Parliamentary Secretary intimated that Edgware Way being a County Road the normal grant of 60 per cent, would be available in connection with the construction of a subway, and he expressed the view that if the Town Council would give the proposal their support he would again take the matter up with the Middlesex County Council with the hope of some measure of success.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- That the Council with the full knowledge that the traffic lights will not be allowed do now approve the proposed subway, and
  - (i) that the Ministry of Transport be immediately informed accordingly, and
  - (ii) the County Council requested to give early consideration to the proposals of the Minister and to expedite the construction of the works;
- (2) That each of the Hendon Members on the Middlesex County Council be furnished with a copy of the foregoing report and the resolution of the Council.

Five Ways Corner.

The Deputation enquired as to the Minister's proposals for this junction, and they were informed that after full consideration of the installation of traffic lights, that idea had been abandoned owing to the cross streams of traffic and plans were in course of preparation for a roundabout with a diameter of 120 feet, in conjunction with a scheme for the widening of Watford Way to 120 feet with dual carriageways 30 feet wide, from Five Ways Corner to Apex Corner. A subway, with entrances from the corners, converging under the roundabout was also to be incorporated in the reconstruction.

Plans will be submitted for the information of the Council in due course and it was stated that work on these improvements would commence this year. Noted with satisfaction.

#### FIREMEN-RATES OF PAY:

The reference to the Committee (Resolution No. 302-20/6/38) to consider the rates of wages of the firemen arose from a proposal to appoint five additional firemen for the Central Station. (W. & F.B.C., 23/5/38-22).

The Committee have received and considered memoranda as to the existing fire brigade staff with information as to the rates of wages paid by contiguous and certain other authorities. There does not appear to be any general uniformity amongst authorities as the scales reviewed show two on the Middlebrook scale, three on the London County Council scale, and six with local scales (two of these closely approximating to London). In nine cases the scales may be said to be higher than the Hendon local scale, whilst the remaining two show smaller maxima but have higher commencing rates for firemen.

The Borough Treasurer submitted statements as to the cost of the application of the London Fire Brigade scale and the scales set out in the Middlebrook report, as compared with the existing local rates:-

The Council were therefore urged to co-opt on the appropriate Committee a Midwife with the necessary experience.

[The Committee have no recommendation to make thereon.]

### 4.—DEMONSTRATIONS AND LECTURES:

A letter was submitted from the Clerk of the London County Council intimating that the County Council is prepared to continue during the financial year 1938/39 the arrangements whereby courses of lectures and demonstrations in ante-natal and postnatal work, and in general midwifery, are open to Midwives residing or practising within the areas specified.

The proposed charges for admission will be sixpence for each lecture and two shillings for each course of demonstrations, any deficit on the courses being shared by the authorities concerned on the basis of user.

### 14.-LOCAL COVERNMENT ACT, 1933-SECTION 111:

The above Act places a duty upon the Middlesex County Council to formulate, after consultation with the Councils of County Districts, arrangements for securing whether by means of a combination of districts or otherwise that every Medical Officer of Health subsequently appointed for a County District shall be restricted by the terms of his appointment from engaging in private practice as a Medical Practitioner.

Draft proposals prepared by the County Council provide for the Medical Officer of Health for the Borough to be restricted in the manner indicated and enquiries are made as to whether the Council have any observations thereon.

RESOLVED-That the Middlesex County Council be informed that the Town Council has no observations to offer on the draft proposals.

#### 15.--MATERNAL MORTALITY:

The Committee were furnished with a copy of Ministry of Health Circular No. 1705 on the above subject and the Medical Officer of Health submitted a report thereon.

The Circular arises from a command report 5422, in which it is recommended that Local Supervising Authorities should, in consultation with the local medical profession, be empowered to take steps to ensure that the best local obstetric skill is made available in all cases in which midwives are required under the rules of the Central Midwives Board to call in a doctor.

It is recommended that a list of practitioners who will be available in all cases in which a midwife is required to call in a registered medical practitioner in accordance with the provisions of Section 14 of the Midwives Act, 1918, should be established by each Local Supervising Authority. The Medical Officer stated that such a list had already been compiled and is in process of revision and the additional information suggested will also be obtained.

It is suggested in the Circular that an Advisory Committee consisting of the Medical Officer of Health, as Chairman, two general practitioners and two obstetric consultants should be formed after consultation with the representative organisations of local practitioners. The functions of this Committee would be to scrutinise the list and to make recommendations to the Authority to ensure a high standard of obstetric practice on the part of the practitioners included on the list. The list when compiled would be supplied to every midwife employed under Section 1 of the Midwives Act, 1936.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That a copy of the Circular be forwarded to the local division of the British Medical Association and that they be invited to submit their observations thereon.

- (a) In determining the suitability of alternative accommodation for tenants of dwelling-houses to which the principal acts apply it shall not be deemed suitable to the needs of a tenant and his family, if the result of their occupation thereof would be that it would be an over-crowded dwelling-house for the purposes of the Housing Act, 1936, and on an application being made by a landlord or a tenant, the number constituting the permitted number of persons in relation to a particular house would be obtained from the Overcrowding records, and a Certificate issued to an applicant;
- (b) Certificates of disrepair issued by local authorities (which enable a tenant to withhold the permitted increase in rent) are no longer required to specify the works needed to render the house fit for habitation: prior to the Act of 1938 a Certificate was required to specify what works were required to be executed in order to put the dwelling-house into a reasonable state of repair. Noted.

HOUSING ACT, 1936.

### 22,-1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, THORNBANK, FORUMSIDE, EDCWARE:

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given to George Ernest Luck and Robert Ernest Young, Sanitary Inspectors, to enter the above dwelling-houses for the purpose of survey and examination in pursuance of Section 157 of the Housing Act, 1936, and for the service of notices under Section 168 of the Housing Act, 1936, requiring information as to ownership of the premises.

### 1.—REQUISITIONS:

#### 3.—APPLICATION FOR LICENCE:

The Committee considered an application from Mr. R. C. Bennett for a licence to sell confectionery from a stand on wheels in a stationary position on the south side of the carriageway of Abbotts Road adjacent to the entrance to Watling Park. by the Borough Surveyor and the Commissioner of Police were also considered calling attention to the width of the road and possible interference with traffic conditions.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That such application be disapproved.

#### PRIVATE STREET WORKS.

### 4.—SOUTHOVER, WOODSIDE PARK CARDEN SUBURB:

A letter was considered from the Woodside Park Garden Suburb Ratepayers' Association asking the Council to make up and take over the above road under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875.

RESOLVED-That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit a report on the matter to the next meeting of the Committee.

### 5.-WOODSIDE, HAMPSTEAD CARDEN SUBURB:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from Mr. J. C. S. Soutar on behalf of the Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust, Ltd., asking the Council to make up and take over Woodside, off Erskine Hill. # 7.—JUNCTION OF NORTH END ROAD AND FINGHLEY ROAD—"ONE WAY" TRAFFIC WORKING:

The Town Clerk reported letters from the Minister of Transport regarding the one way traffic working recently introduced at the above junction, and enclosing a copy of the London Traffic (Prescribed Routes) (No. 23) (Golders Green) Regulations, 1938, made in connection therewith. (Hi.C., 7/2/38—8). **Noted.** 

# 8.—JUNCTION OF DEANSBROOK ROAD AND ORANCE HILL ROAD AND DEANS LANE:

The Committee considered a letter from the Watling Association regarding the dangerous crossing at the above junction and suggesting that suitable signs or traffic control signals should be installed in connection therewith.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for a "Slow—Major Road Ahead" sign to be erected in Orange Hill Road.

#### 9.--JUNCTION OF STATION ROAD AND EDCWARE ROAD, HENDON:

A letter was submitted from the Hendon Chamber of Commerce regarding the traffic control signals and pedestrian crossings at the above junction and stating that there is still a very grave danger to pedestrians crossing the Edgware Road. It is suggested by the Chamber of Commerce that the system of traffic control signals should incorporate the words "Don't Cross" and "Cross Now."

The Committee, however, are of opinion that the danger to pedestrians would be overcome by the introduction in the cycle of operation of a period to provide for both sets of signals to show red lights.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That representations be made accordingly to the Minister of Transport and the Commissioner of Police.

### 10.-THE BURROUGHS CROSS ROADS:

A letter was reported for the information of the Council from the Minister of Transport enclosing a plan and copy of a draft Compulsory Purchase Order under the Trunk Roads Act, 1936, and the Restriction of Ribbon Development Act, 1935, relative to the island site in Watford Way opposite its junction with Neeld Crescent. **Noted.** 

### 11.-ISLAND, NORTH END ROAD, COLDERS CREEN:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from Sir Raymond Unwin suggesting that an island should be provided at the junction of North End Road and Hampstead Way. Although this would be a desirable improvement, the width of the North End Road at this point is insufficient at the present time to allow the construction of an island.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Sir Raymond Unwin be so informed.

### 12.—WATLING ESTATE—PARKING FACILITIES:

The Borough Surveyor reported with regard to the suitability of certain sites for car parking facilities on the Watling Estate. A letter from the Royal Automobile Club on this subject was also submitted. Facilities are mainly required in the vicinity of the junction of Watling Avenue and the Edgware Road, and the only vacant land in this neighbourhood is that fronting Barnfield Road and between that road and the London Electric Railway. The area of this land is approximately one acre and would provide accommodation for about 150 cars. (Hi.C., 16/5/38-16).

RESOLVED-That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to make enquiries regarding this land and report to the next meeting.

### 13.—PEDESTRIAN CROSSING—COLINDEEP LANE, HENDON:

It was reported that the Ministry of Transport having approved the construction of a crossing in Colindeep Lane, east of Sheaveshill Avenue, authority is required to put the work in hand. (Hi.C., 16/5/38-21).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the construction of such pedestrian crossing.

### 14.—PEDESTRIAN CROSSING-LULLINGTON CARTH:

A letter was considered from the Woodside Park Garden Suburb Ratepayers' Association regarding the safety of children crossing Lullington Garth near Walmington Fold and Chanctonbury Way, and suggesting that a pedestrian crossing should be installed at this point. It was reported by the Borough Surveyor that Walmington Fold and Chanctonbury Way were not yet dedicated as public highways, and the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That consideration of the matter be deferred.

### 15.—JUNCTION OF WATLING AVENUE AND ORANGE HILL ROAD—TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNALS:

In connection with the grant recently received from the Minister of Transport, and reported to the Council at its last meeting, in respect of the installation of the above signals, the Borough Surveyor asked for authority to accept the tender of the Siemens and General Electric Railway Signal Co., Ltd., amounting to £514 10s. 0d. and to arrange for the necessary work to be put in hand.

It will also be necessary to enter into a maintenance contract in connection with these signals as follows:-

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#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the tender of the Siemens and Ceneral Electric Railway Signal Company, Limited, amounting to £514 10s. 0d. be accepted and authority given for the necessary work to be carried out.
- (ii) That the terms of the maintenance contract be approved.
- (iii) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

### 16.—BARRIER RAILS—DAWS LANE, MILL HILL:

The Committee further considered the question of the erection of barrier rails in Daws Lane outside the entrance to the Mill Hill Swimming Bath, referred back by the Council on the 20/6/38. (Hi.C., 16/5/38-20).

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The Borough Surveyor submitted a report with regard to accidents in Daws Lane from which it appeared that during the last  $2\frac{1}{2}$  years only four accidents had occurred, two of them being collisions between pedal cyclists, one a collision between two private cars and in one case a boy was knocked down by a goods van. None of the accidents has any connection with the Council's Swimming Bath. The Committee are satisfied with the existing conditions at the entrance and exit to the Bath and are of opinion that the erection of barrier rails would serve no useful purpose. In these circumstances there appears to be no justification for varying the previous recommendation.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That no action be taken in the matter.

### 17.-BARRIER RAILS-WATFORD WAY, HENDON CENTRAL:

The Committee considered the question of certain difficulties alleged to exist in connection with the barrier rails in Watford Way, Hendon Central and reference was also made to the barrier rails proposed to be erected at Golders Green.

RESOLVED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit a report on the matter to the next meeting.

### 18.-JUNCTION OF HENDON WAY AND NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD:

The Committee considered the question of the traffic conditions at the above junction, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That enquiry be made of the Minister of Transport as to what progress has been made with the scheme for dealing with this junction.

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the Secretary of the Committee of Management of St. James' Presbyterian Church, Hale Lane, Edgware, for permission to erect signs directing to the Church in the following positions:—

On lamp post at the junction of Edgware Way with Broadfields Avenue, Edgware.

### IMPROVEMENT SCHEMES.

### 20.-HOLDERS HILL ROAD IMPROVEMENT:

It was reported that satisfactory progress is being maintained with this improvement. The whole of the carriageway is completed including the surfacing from Dollis Road to the entrance to the Hendon Golf Club. Work on the foundations is proceeding on the remainder of the road between this point and Great North Way. **Noted.** 

### 21 .- STONEYFIELDS LANE IMPROVEMENT:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the work on this improvement was completed on the 15th instant. Noted.

### 22.-MILL HILL BROADWAY BRIDGE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a report to the effect that the Council's scheme estimated to cost £3,600 for the culverting the water course from a point near the junction of The Broadway with Bunns Lane to the point where the culvert passes under the London & North Eastern Railway had been submitted to the Middlesex County Council. It is pointed out by the County Council that this watercourse is, in effect, a surface water sewer draining a considerable proportion of the Council's area and it is felt that, in the circumstances the County Council ought not to be wholly liable for the cost of culverting. They suggest that a contribution should be made towards the cost pro rata of the area of the road to be drained consequent upon the widening and lowering of the road under the bridge. The Committee are, however, of opinion that this would not prove a very satisfactory basis as the actual additional area to be drained is not very large and it is therefore suggested that negotiations be entered into with the County Council under which the cost of this culverting should be divided between the Council, the County Council, and the Ministry of Transport in fixed proportions to be agreed. (Hi.C., 4/4/38-22),

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to negotiate with the authorities accordingly.

#### 23.- DEANS LANE BRIDGE:

In connection with the reconstruction of the above bridge the Town Clerk reported that the draft Order under the Bridges Act, 1929, had been prepared, that the Borough Surveyor had prepared the necessary plans and it was anticipated that the application would be ready for sealing at the Meeting of the Council on the 18th July. 16/5/38-31).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Corporate Scal be affixed to all necessary documents.

### 24-HICHWAY DEVELOPMENT SURVEY OF CREATER LONDON, 1937:

A letter was submitted from the Minister of Transport enclosing for the information of the Council a copy of the Highway Development Survey of Greater London, 1937, prepared by Sir Chas. Bressey in consultation with Sir Edwin Lutyens. The Minister trusts that Local Authorities will decide as soon as possible as to those schemes which can be put in hand in the near future, and as to the safeguarding of the lines of those other projects on which actual constructional work may have to be postponed for the time being. Noted.

### 25.—HENDON WAY—PROVISION OF SEAT:

The Committee considered the desirability of providing a seat in Hendon Way on the south side of its junction with Cricklewood Lane.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the provision of such seat, subject to the approval of the Minister of Transport and the Middlesex County Council.

TRAVELLING FACILITIES.

### 26-EDCWARE-MORDEN LINE:

The Committee considered a letter from the Hendon Ratepayers' Association regarding travelling conditions on the above line and stating that it is not unusual for General réference is made to passengers to travel standing during the day time.

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Saturday afternoons, most evenings at about 7.30 p.m. when theatre goers are travelling to the West End, and Sunday mornings. Inconvenience is also alleged between Golders Green and Hendon when passengers arriving at Golders Green from the City have to change there to proceed in trains from the West End.

The London Passenger Transport Board have intimated that unless specific instances with times and details are supplied in connection with complaints relating to travelling facilities, they are unable to deal with these matters.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Hendon Ratepayers' Association be informed accordingly and asked to supply the required information to justify their representations.

### 27 .- WATER MAIN, WISE LANE, MILL HILL:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the Colne Valley Water Co., Ltd., regarding a new main required in Wise Lane, consequent upon the construction of the Council's new housing scheme. It is suggested that the main shall be laid in a contemplated service road, the site being the property of the Corporation, and the Committee

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That an easement be granted to the Colne Valley Water Company at a nominal rental of 1/• per annum, subject to the execution of a formal agreement with the Company.
- (2) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to all necessary documents.

### DEDICATION OF LAND.

#### 28.-BROADFIELDS AVENUE, EDGWARE:

A letter was submitted from the North Metropolitan Electric Power Supply Company regarding the conveyance to the Corporation of a strip of land (as shown on plan No. R.760 submitted) in front of the Company's Sub-Station, required in connection with the widening of Broadfields Avenue. The Company are prepared to agree to dedicate the land as part of the highway free of cost on condition that the Council accept responsibility for:—

- (a) taking down and re-erecting the boundary fencing and gates on the new front-age line;
- (b) the shortening of the side boundary fences;
- (c) alteration to existing surface water drainage;
- (d) private street improvement charges on the site; and
- (e) all reasonable legal costs in the matter.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the plan be approved and that such shrubberies be included in the agreement accordingly.

### 30.—BANNERS OVER HIGHWAYS—HENDON COTTAGE HOSPITAL FETE:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the Chairman of the Publicity Committee of the Hendon Cottage Hospital Fête asking for permission to place banners across the public highways in Brent Street, Golders Green Road, and West Hendon Broadway in connection with the Fête to be held on Saturday the 2nd July.

As a matter of urgency the Committee

RESOLVED—That permission be given subject to the Hospital Authorities giving an indemnity to the Council.

#### 31.—STREET ACCIDENTS:

Schedules were submitted giving details of 68 street accidents notified during the month of April, and 76 during the month of May. In each month one fatal accident had occurred. Noted.

### 1.-REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £283 6s. 9d. were submitted and approved.

#### 2.—PARK CONSTABLES:

The recommendation of the Committee (16/5/38-3) "that no action be taken in the matter" was referred back by the Council, 20/6/38.

The Council are reminded that Section 136 of the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929, gives power to appoint officers and the Council may procure such officers to be sworn in as constables for the purposes of securing the observances of the statutes relating to parks and pleasure grounds and of the byelaws and regulations made thereunder. An officer cannot act as a constable unless in uniform or provided with a warrant.

At the present time the park-keepers are instructed that any breach of the byelaws should be reported to the Parks Superintendent as soon as possible, together with the names and addresses of the offenders and of any persons witnessing the incident. On any report thus submitted any necessary action is taken. The commission of any criminal offence should be reported to the police.

The park-keepers if sworn as constables under the powers of Section 136 of the Act of 1929 would, of course, have the powers of removal and of arrest if necessary, but the Committee are inclined to the view that adequate control of the parks and open spaces can be secured without vesting such responsibilities in the employees engaged in the parks, etc., by seeking further Police supervision on the public footpaths, and by extending the hours of attendance, and supplementing the uniformed staff now engaged.

In connection with the byelaws the question was raised at the meeting of the Council as to cycling on footpaths,

The 1930 series of byelaws-No. 8-provides:-

"A person shall not .... bring .... into the pleasure ground any bicycle .... unless used for the conveyance of a child .... or an invalid, except upon the drives specially provided for such traffic .... and indicated in a notice or notices affixed or set up in a conspicuous position in the pleasure ground."

There are no drives specially provided in any of the parks and open spaces, but in some there exist certain public footpaths on which the above byelaw had no effect and ling frequently took place. To remedy this condition the Council recently made a Rule and Government Byelaw which provides that:—

- "(1) In so far as the Council may indicate by notices conspicuously exhibited alongside any of the footpaths described in the Schedule to this Byelaw that the riding of bicycles, tricycles or other similar machines on such footpath is prohibited, no person shall ride any such bicycle, tricycle or machine upon such footpath.
- (2) Any person offending against the foregoing Byelaw shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding five pounds."

The parks and open spaces referred to in the schedule to the byelaw are :-

Arrandene Copthall.

Sunny Hill Park. Hendon Park. Mill Hill Park.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Commissioner of Police be requested to provide extra police supervision over the public footpaths in the parks and open spaces especially after sunset.
- (2) That a park-keeper be detailed for duty between the hours of 10 p.m. and 11 p.m. in Hendon and Mill Hill Parks for a trial period of one month.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

### 3.—APPRENTICESHIP SCHEME—PARKS AND OPEN SPACES:

The scheme which was before the Committee on the 7/3/38—4 has been considered by the Education Committee (24/5/38) and after amending the paragraph relating to overtime they have now approved the scheme.

The matter first arose when Councillor P. Lightfoot, on behalf of the Juvenile Employment Sub-Committee attended before the Committee on the 7th February last to urge the advisability of promoting an apprenticeship system for boys in Horticulture and Nursery Work. It was then pointed out that the Municipal Service offers a wide field for training and that a scheme of this character would be a considerable advantage.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the following scheme be now approved and adopted by the Council:—

#### SCHEME.

#### Introduction:

The Council shall arrange to teach and instruct a limited number of boys, resident in the Borough, in the art, trade or business of a gardener and in things incidental or relating thereto.

### Number of Apprenticeships:

The number of apprenticeships shall be restricted to three every alternate year.

### Age and Period:

Apprentices shall normally be taken at the age of 15 years and the period of apprenticeship shall be 5 years.

#### Training:

Subject to any necessary discretion being reserved to the Parks Superintendent to the Council, the course of training shall include:—

- 2 years-Nursery Work.
- 2 years-Gardening-Lay-out, Planting and General Cultivation.
- 1 year -Sports Grounds and Open Spaces.

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Adequate facilities shall be given for apprentices to attend approved day classes during normal working hours without loss of wages, subject to the production of such evidence of attendance as may be desirable. Apprentices shall undertake to attend evening courses of instruction, or other approved courses of study, at the expense of the parent, or guardian, in such subjects as may be prescribed by the Parks Superintendent with a view to entering for the examinations of the Royal Horticultural Society and/or the Institute of Parks Administration.

### Remuneration:

Subject to satisfactory progress the probationers or apprentices shall receive wages at the following rates in accordance with the recommendations of the Provincial Joint Industrial Council for Local Authorities Non-Trading Services (Manual Workers) for the County of Middlesex:—

Appropriate
Adult Wage
applicable.

Under 16 years of age ½ of adult wage ..... 16 to 18 years of age ½ of adult wage ..... 59/2d.

18 to 20 years of age ¾ of adult wage ..... ....

#### Overtime:

Apprentices shall not be required to work overtime, and in no circumstances shall apprentices be employed on Sundays.

#### Annual Holidays:

After one year's service apprentices shall be granted 6 days annual holiday with full pay, and one day shall be added in respect of each subsequent year of apprenticeship service.

#### Sick Pay:

Sick Pay shall be granted after 6 months' service on the following basis, per the Joint Industrial Council Award:—

- (a) for the first five weeks of sickness an amount per week equal to one-half of the total wage for a normal week;
- (b) for the next five weeks of sickness an amount per week equal to one-fourth of the total wage for a a normal week;

such payments to be irrespective of benefits under the National Health Insurance Acts.

#### Employment after Apprenticeship:

Notwithstanding that apprentices may be required to make contributions on attaining the age of 18 years under the Local Government and Other Officers' Superannuation Acts, 1922-1937, the Council shall be under no liability to provide employment for apprentices on the expiration or sooner determination of the apprenticeship term.

### Indentures:

The parent or guardian and the apprentice shall be required to enter into a Deed of Apprenticeship in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk—in which, *inter alia*, due provision shall be made for the termination of the apprenticeship on account of misconduct or other proper and sufficient reason.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

### 4.—NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD PLAYING FIELDS:

The scheme for the development of these playing fields estimated at £5,898 was approved by the Council, 25/1/37 (E.P. & A.C., 4/1/37—7), and the inquiry by the Ministry of Health into the application for loan was held on the 18th November, 1937, with the application in respect of Copthall Playing Fields. The Minister has intimated his approval of the scheme and is prepared to issue his loan sanction on receipt of information as to a provisionally accepted tender for the pavilion, which it had been assumed would go to tender concurrently with that proposed for Copthall.

The Committee have reviewed the question of proceeding with this development at the present time and have

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the development of the North Circular Road Playing Fields be deferred, but that provision be made in the five year programme of capital expenditure for the work to be carried out at a suitable period.

#### 5.-HENDON CROVE-FENCING:

A letter was received from Sister M. Albertina of St. Joseph's Convent complaining of persons trespassing on the convent grounds, having obtained access through Hendon Grove.

A report has previously been submitted by the Town Clerk (E.P. & A.C., 16/11/36—11) when it was pointed out that the Council is under no liability to undertake the fencing of the land in question.

The Committee have given instructions regarding supervision to be provided in Hendon Grove, and have instructed the Borough Surveyor to inspect and report upon the deficiencies in the fencing, together with an estimate of the length of fencing required, and the cost of providing and erecting such fencing.

### 6.-SCRATCHWOOD OPEN SPACE:

It was reported that the occupiers of five houses in the Barnet Road have access to the Scratchwood Open Space from their back gardens. Steps have been taken to prevent such access but it has now been stated by certain of the persons concerned that this right was given to them by the previous owner of the land.

 ${\bf RESOLVED\ TO\ RECOMMEND-That\ the\ matter\ be\ referred\ to\ the\ Town\ Clerk}$  for report to the next meeting of the Committee.

### 7-MOAT MOUNT OPEN SPACE:

A letter was submitted from Mrs. Nott complaining of the destruction of bird life by grey squirrels in the Moat Mount Open Space.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That appropriate steps be taken to exterminate the squirrels.

BOWLING GREENS.

# 8.—EDCWAREBURY PARK AND SUNNY HILL PARK:

The Borough Surveyor submitted plans and estimates for the construction of bowling greens in Edgwarebury Park and Sunny Hill Park. (E.P. & A.C., 4/1/37-9).

The site selected for the green in Sunny Hill Park is opposite to the pavilion and west of the tennis courts, and for Edgwarebury Park at the rear of the houses in Parkside Drive, in close proximity to the entrance to the park from Edgwarebury Lane.

The estimated cost of constructing the green in Sunny Hill Park is £1,600 and in Edgwarebury Park £1,300.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the plans and estimates amounting to £1,600 in respect of Sunny Hill Park and £1,300 in respect of Edgwarebury Park be approved.
- (2) That application be made to the Minister of Health for sanction to the borrowing of the sum of \$22,500 for a period not exceeding 5 years.
- (3) That tenders be invited for the construction of bowling greens in Sunny Hill and Edgwarebury Parks, conditional upon the Council reserving the right to purchase the required turf direct, for which purpose an adequate prime cost amount be included in the tender.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

### 9.-WATLING PARK AND MILL HILL PARK:

The Borough Surveyor reported that despite the extremely dry weather it had been found possible to prevent the turves on the new greens from shrinking and the joints opening. There is, however, an excessive growth of weeds consisting chiefly of clover, and seedling perennials, and the matter has been taken up with the Contractors who have promised to employ men to carry out the necessary hand weeding.

Consideration was also given to the present condition of the existing green in Mill Hill Park and now used by the Mill Hill Bowling Club.

It has been represented that the number of bowling greens now in parks and the additional provision contemplated in the near future, would warrant the strengthening of the parks staff by the appointment of an expert green keeper and the Committee have directed the Borough Surveyor to report on the advisability of such an appointment at the next meeting.

In view of the condition of the new bowling greens in these Parks, the Committee RECOMMEND—That the greens be not taken into use this season.

#### 10.-WATLING PARK:

Pursuant to instructions (E.P. & A.C., 4/4/38-3) negotiations have proceeded with a view to granting the use of rinks to the Watling Association Bowls Club.

The following are the charges suggested for an experimental period and for subsequent seasons it will be possible to negotiate terms based upon the experience:—

- (1) The Association to have the exclusive use of two rinks on the new bowling green and pay to the Council a fixed sum of £7 10s. 0d. for each rink for the season of five months.
- (2) In addition to the foregoing the Association to pay to the Council the fixed sum of 1/- in respect of each member of the Bowling Section. The Borough Treasurer to have the right to inspect the books of the Association's Bowling Section to check the number of Members.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the above terms for the use of two rinks by the Watling Association Bowls Club be approved for 1939 season, and that the matter be then reviewed.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

### 11.-CHILD'S HILL PARK:

A letter was submitted from the Child's Hill Bowling Club stating that the existing pavilion is inadequate for their needs and suggesting the re-allocation of two rooms used by the Club prior to the erection of the pavilion, in the block of buildings adjacent to the northern boundary of the park for the use of the Club. The buildings referred to are part of the old shooting range and the rooms are not required at the present time by the Parks Department.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Child's Hill Bowling Club be granted the use of the two rooms in question.

Emendment

Gefore detaited consideration of the motion, the Kinance and General Purposes Committee Recommend - That the following words be added to the recommendation of the Estates, Parks and Ottotments Committee:
"af a nominal rental of L1 per annum."

WOODFIELD PARK.

### 12-LAND FOR SPORTS GROUND:

Consideration was given to a further letter from Handley Page, Ltd., with regard to their application to lease an area of land at Woodfield Park for the purpose of a Sports Ground for their employees. (E.P. & A.C., 7/2/38—5).

The site now proposed has an area of approximately eight acres to the west of Woodfield House and the Company offers a rental of £40 per acre per annum inclusive of rates for a lease of 7 years, but reserves the right to remove any pavilion erected on the expiration of the lease.

In view of the fact that the land in question is now used as playing pitches for local clubs and will ultimately be required for the extension of the Nurseries, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Handley Page, Ltd., be informed that the Council regret they are unable to accede to the request.

#### 13.—STAFF COTTAGES:

The Borough Surveyor reported that satisfactory progress is being made by the Contractors with the erection of the two cottages at Woodfield Nurseries. The two buildings are roofed and the drainage works are nearing completion. **Noted.** 

#### 14.--MONTROSE PLAYING FIELDS-LAY-OUT:

The Borough Surveyor reported that with the exception of the construction of a small footbridge over the Silk Stream adjacent to Montrose Avenue the layout of these playing fields has now been completed. **Noted.** 

### 15 .- SUNDAY CAMES AND RECREATION:

A letter was considered from the Nimrod Cricket Club asking whether it would be possible for cricket matches to commence at 11.30 a.m. on Sundays.

By the Council's resolutions of the 18th July, 1932 (E.P. & A.C., 27/6/32—9) as amended on the 4th April, 1938 (E.P. & A.C., 4/4/38—10) Sunday Games are permitted as follows:—

From 9 a.m.—Tennis.

From 1 p.m.—Cricket and putting, but cricket is not permitted in Hendon Park or on that part of the Mill Hill Park adjoining the houses in Parkside.

No football is allowed in the Parks on Sundays.

(The swimming pools are opened at 7 a.m.).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Sunday Cricket be permitted in all parks and open spaces as from 11.30 a.m. and that any resolution of the Council inconsistent herewith be varied accordingly.

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## 16.-WATLING PARK-CONVENIENCE:

A letter was submitted from the Secretary to the Watling Association drawing attention to the desirability of providing a convenience for children adjacent to the larger playground in Watling Park.

The Committee are of the opinion that the convenience in Orange Hill Road with access from the Park is within easy reach of the playground.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Watling Association be informed accordingly.

### 17.-TREE-HALE LANE, MILL HILL:

It was reported that the "Hale" Garage have now withdrawn their claim against the Council in respect of the tree at the junction of Halegrove Gardens and Hale Lane. (E.P. & A.C., 7/3/38—13).

Consideration was then given to the question of the removal of the tree on condition the "Hale" Garage erect a suitable forecourt to define the boundary between this property and the public footpath, but the Committee have

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no further action be taken in the matter.

### 18.—INSTITUTE OF PARK ADMINISTRATION (INCORPORATED):

A letter was submitted from the Institute of Park Administration (Incorporated) inviting the Council to appoint delegates to attend the Annual Conference to be held at Aberdeen from the 31st August to the 2nd September next.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Mr. H. Erith, F.R.H.S. (the Council's Parks Superintendent) be appointed to attend such Conference.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 19,-CLITTERHOUSE HOUSING ESTATE-RAILING OFF OF GREENS:

The Committee have considered further representations from the Clitterhouse Estate Tenants' Association with regard to the railing off of greens on the above Estate. (E.P. and A.C., 15/11/37—6 and 7/3/38—2).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council adhere to their previous decision to take no action in the matter (6/12/37).

### 20.-HENDON PARK-REFRESHMENTS:

Pursuant to instructions (E.P. & A.C., 4/4/38—6) the Borough Surveyor reported that a tender has been obtained from the Municipal Park Caterers for the right to sell refreshments in Hendon Park, for the period ending 31st March, 1939, amounting to £5 and for the following three years ending 31st March, 1942, £45.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the tender of the Municipal Park Caterers for catering rights in Hendon Park for the period to the 31st March, 1942, amounting to £50 be accepted, subject to payment in advance and that a contract be entered into in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk.

### 21.—ACCIDENTS IN PARKS:

A letter was submitted from the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries pointing out that it was agreed not to press for reservation for allotments in the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 1 on the understanding that in the lay-out of the sewage farm at least 43 acres of land would be reserved for permanent allotments. The Minister asks that when the new lay-out of the farm is considered, not less than the above-mentioned area will be reserved for permanent allotments.

5.—STAFF INCREMENTS:

A recent inspection of the fire appliances in the buildings enumerated in the report of the Acting Fire Superintendent has been undertaken, and the appliances were found to be in order.

In connection with the appliances at present installed in schools reference was made to the existence of a type of extinguisher alleged to be too heavy for proper handling by women teachers. The Committee understand that the matter is receiving the attention of the Education Committee and they have, accordingly, decided to review the action taken, if any, by that Committee in due course.

The question was raised as to arrangements for the attendance of the Turneock at fires, and it was reported that negotiations were proceeding with the Water Companies. The matter will be further considered by the Committee on their review of the Commissioner's Report, on the fire which occurred on the 24th March last. **Noted.** 

### 9.-MILL HILL FIRE STATION-TELEPHONE EXCHANGE LINES:

Having regard to the increased number of subscribers in the Mill Hill area, the Committee gave consideration to the question of fire calls received by telephone from the Colindale, Edgware and Mill Hill Exchanges, being received direct by the Mill Hill Fire Station, instead of at the Central Station.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Post Office Telephone Service be approached with a view to the necessary transfer being carried out.

### 10 .- TELEPHONE CALLS "FIRE BRICADE":

The Committee have again had under consideration the question of the issue of instructions for the guidance of householders as to calls for the Fire Brigade and Ambulance.

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In December, 1936 (W. & F.B.C., 23/11/36—5) the Council on the suggestion of the Post Office Telephones decided to issue a Notice with the rate demands urging householders to acquaint themselves with the Brigade appropriate to their address, but in February, 1937 (W. & F.B.C., 8/2/37—10) the proposal was rescinded in favour of a suggestion from the London County Council, in arrangement for reciprocal services, that suggestion from the London County Council, in arrangement for reciprocal services, that each telephone subscriber in the area who was connected to an outside exchange should be supplied with a card directing the caller in case of fire to ask for the brigade serving the district in which he resides. For this purpose the Post Office Telephones were asked to supply the relevant information, but they intimated that the Borough was served by eleven different telephone exchanges, and it was impracticable for them to discriminate as to which telephones were actually in the Borough. Cards containing the names of some 35,000 served by the eleven exchanges were however offered and this would have involved a considerable amount of sorting the cards to exclude non-residents.

At that time difficulty was mostly experienced in the Child's Hill and Cricklewood areas where the telephones are on the Hampstead and Gladstone Exchanges, and with the approval of the Council, 3/5/37 (W. & F.B.C., 19/4/37—9), the Fire Superintendent furnished persons residing in the vicinity of the southern boundary of the Borough with information as to the telephone number for fire and ambulance calls appropriate to their addresses.

Telephone exchanges which provide services entirely within the Borough of Hendon only are Hendon and Mill Hill. The remaining nine exchanges which overlap the Borough Boundary are:—

The Grand Union Canal Company have intimated that they would be prepared to provide facilities for the Council to relay a section of the pipe and extend the outlet to the diverted course of the Silk Stream and suggest that they should be paid a nominal rental of 5/- per annum, the cost of the work to be borne by the Council.

### FIRE-9, 11 and 13, TEMPLE GARDENS:

The Council at their meeting on the 13th June made the following references to the Committee:-

To consider and report on-

- (a) the report of the Commissioner;
- (b) the appointment of a separate Fire Brigade Committee;
- (c) the appointment of a Fire Superintendent who shall be directly responsible to the Council;
- (d) the substitution of the "two platoon" for the continuous duty system, and the appointment of any necessary additional staff; and
- (e) the desirability of increasing the rates of wages of firemen with a view to minimising the number of resignations of firemen seeking better remunerated

[Note.-In connection with (e) above, in view of the decision taken by the Council on the 4th instant fixing new rates of pay for firemen this reference is regarded as discharged.]

#### REPORT.

### 1.-THE COMMISSIONER'S REPORT:

The Committee have given very careful consideration to the conclusions set out in the report which were, of course, based upon evidence relating to incidents at one particular fire. While they readily admit that certain deficiencies were undoubtedly found to exist those can only be attributed to one section of the Brigade and steps have been taken to avoid any recurrence. There has never been any suggestion that the training and control at the Mill Hill Station have been at any time other than highly efficient.

It may be well to remember the difficulties with which the Council has been confronted in the building up of its fire fighting service. Since 1921 increase in population has been phenomenal as will be seen from the following figures:-

New building estates have come into being with great rapidity opening up entirely new areas, constantly adding to the burden of fire protection, and presenting it in new aspects as fresh centres of population were created.

In the year 1921 the Committee had at its disposal one Station at The Burroughs, opened in the year 1914 and accommodating one dual purpose machine, four married firemen, four single firemen, and Chief Officer in charge. The subsequent years show an almost uninterrupted development by the Fire Brigade Committee of the personnel and equipment of the Brigade. In 1929 a new Station was opened at Mill Hill. It was equipped with two dual-purpose machines and was provided with cottages for eight firemen in close proximity thereto and quarters for the Station Officer. It has been admitted to be a model of its kind and has been visited by deputations from Fire Authorities all over the country. The accommodation for the staff at this Station was increased in 1934 by the addition of ten cottages, giving a staff of eighteen firemen.

The accommodation at the Central Station has been increased by reducing the number of married quarters and thus increasing the capacity of the single-men's quarters, ultimately giving a total of one Superintendent, one Station Officer and fifteen firemen at this Station—further provision has been authorised to bring the number of firemen up to twenty. There are now at the Central Station two dual purpose machines, together with a water tower having a maximum height of 110 feet.

Both Stations have been re-equipped with special utility vans and ambulances.

Many serious fires have occurred in the district and have been successfully dealt with by the Brigade and, until the unfortunate circumstances attendant upon the fire at Temple Gardens, no question was ever raised as to the general efficiency of the Brigade.

The following analysis of Fire and Ambulance Calls for years 1933 to 1937 is submitted for the information of the Council, and it should be mentioned that on many occasions persons who have availed themselves of these services have given expression to their appreciation.

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It would appear that the fundamental difficulty and the source of the defects in the section of the brigade which have been revealed by the Inquiry can be traced, in the main, to the difficulties encountered in developing the Central Fire Station. The final solution of the problem will not be achieved until the Council is in possession of a new Station on a much larger site and containing more adequate accommodation for personnel, training and equipment. This question is further mentioned at a later stage of this report—Item 6.

Turning to the observations of the Commissioner the following are the main allegations,

But even if it was necessary . . . that only one hydrant should be used, it was quite possible by following the proper procedure, to secure an adequate supply of water from that one hydrant." "The suggestion is made that the services of a turncock might have been available to open the dividing valve between the 4 inch main in Temple Gardens and the 6 inch main in St. George's Road but the Hendon Fire Brigade have not so far thought it necessary to adopt the practice of the London Fire Brigade whereby steps are taken to secure the presence of a turncock at the scene of the fire so far as possible simultaneously with the arrival of the Brigade itself. It is also the practice in other Brigades."

It is clear from the evidence at the Inquiry and the Report of the Commissioner that the first call was received by the Brigade at 10.30 p.m. and that there was no delay in the departure of the first engine.

It is equally clear that neither the slight delay caused through the mistake of Station Officer Stimpson nor the partial failure of the water supply contributed to the unfortunate loss of life attendant upon this fire.

NOS. 1 AND 5 above are, of course, matters controlled by outside bodies, but nevertheless the Committee intend to pursue these questions with a view to securing the co-operation of the appropriate undertakers in an endeavour to arrive at the most satisfactory solution. For this purpose the Committee have appointed a Sub-Committee consisting of the Chairman (Councillor A. A. Naar, M.B.E.) and Councillors A. W. Curton and H. G. Potter, J.P., F.S.I., to confer with representatives of the Post Office and the Metropolitan Water Board.

Much has been said since the fire at Temple Gardens as to the attendance of the Turncock at fires, and it will be of interest to the Council to know that the matter has been the subject of correspondence with both the Colne Valley Water Company and the Metropolitan Water Board. As regards the Colne Valley area, the Committee are informed that there are no valves on this system. They also understand that the mains are always kept fully charged with water. In these circumstances even if the Turncock attended there would be nothing he could do to increase the supply of water. The Metropolitan Water Board work on a very different principle. This area of supply is sub-divided into a number of zones, and although there is a complete network of mains, each zone is made a water-tight compartment by the insertion of dividing valves at certain points on the mains, and these valves are kept closed. An enquiry was addressed to the Board with a view to securing arrangements for the prompt attendance of the Turncock at fires, and the following reply was received:—

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gade's <sub>'qua</sub>te "It is quite appreciated that during normal working hours these men will not usually be available at their homes but a note of the approximate position where each man is working is daily in the hands of the District Foreman responsible for the area. The District Foreman of the area of Hendon which is supplied by the Board has an office in the same building as the District Superintendent, viz., 1, Fordwych Road, N.W. 2 (Telephone—Gladstone 1123) and an enquiry made at the office at any time could be answered giving the locality in which the appropriate official could be found.

While the Board would be willing to transmit any message from the office to the appropriate turncock it is considered the man's services would be more speedily obtained by sending a message direct from the fire station."

It, therefore, seems quite clear that at the present time it is not possible to say that at a moments notice a Turncock can always be available to open the closed valves on the Board's system, but as previously stated this matter will be the subject of further conversations with the Board.

In connection with the Commissioner's observations based on the evidence given at the Inquiry on the practice in the area of the London County Council, a communication from that Authority outlines their arrangements as follows:—

"ATTENDANCE OF TURNCOCKS.—Turncocks are called on the receipt of every fire call. Where it is possible the officer-of-the-watch at the superintendent station calls the turncock by exchange telephone. When the turncock is not on any exchange telephone the duty man at the local fire station sends a policeman or messenger to call him and the officer-of-the-watch at the superintendent station enquires of the local station as to whether this has been done.

In the event of the non-arrival of the turncock at the fire and it is found that his services are required, the officer in charge of the fire sends a car or appliance to convey him from his home or place of duty."

NO. 3 above has given the Committee much anxious thought in so far as the allegations concern defective training and unsatisfactory leadership. As regard the failure to concentrate an adequate force at an early stage, the Committee are satisfied that the arrangements which have now been put into force are such that a criticism of this character could not arise in the future. In connection with the other matters the Committee felt bound to consider them not only from the point of view of lack of organisation, but more particularly in relation to the importance of discipline and general conduct of such a character as would promote the utmost efficiency in the Brigade and maintain the staff in complete harmony. After very careful consideration of all the circumstances the Committee have come to the conclusion that it would be desirable to relieve the Station Officer of his duties.

The Committee accordingly

### RECOMMEND ...

- (1) That Station Officer Stimpson be relieved of his duties with the Fire Brigade and transferred to other services of the Council;
- (2) That the question of his past service in relation to superannuation benefits be considered at a future date.

The Committee have directed that at all future meetings a report book shall be presented indicating the men who have been engaged on drills and the nature of the training.

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The Finance and General Purposes Committee have considered the incidence of superannuation benefits in this case. It would be open to the Council to return Mr. Stimpson's contributions under the Fire Brigade Pensions Act, 1925, and if he accepts other service under the Council his fire service would be counted as non-contributory service for the purposes of the Local Government and Other Officers' Superannuation Acts. It would also be permissible for Mr. Stimpson to convert such non-contributory service to contributary service after 1st April 1939 on payment of a sum to be ascertained in accordance with regulations to be prescribed

The Committee accordingly Recommend -

- Elast aubsect to the Council approving recommendation (no. 1 of the Works and Sire Brigade Committee, recommendation (no. 2 be defeted and the following aubstituted.
- (2) Ebat confributions to the Sund under the Sire Grigade Pensions (Act Be refunded to Mr Stimpson and that he be informed of his position under the Bocal Government and Other Officers' Supers annuation (Acts in the event of his accepting service with the Council in another capacity.

# 2-SEPARATE FIRE BRIGADE COMMITTEE:

The Council's reference herein has received consideration, but the Committee see no reason to vary the existing arrangement.

The Committee

RECOMMEND—That the existing Works and Fire Brigade Committee be continued.

# 3-RESPONSIBILITY OF FIRE SUPERINTENDENT:

The question of the appointment of a Fire Superintendent to be directly responsible, through the Committee, to the Town Council has been earefully considered. The Committee are in agreement with this principle and have given effect thereto in their recommendation hereunder as to an appointment—Item 5.

# 4.—SALARIES OF OFFICERS OF THE BRIGADE:

As intimated in the report to the Council on the 4th instant, the Committee have now reviewed the scales of salaries for Officers, and as in the case of the firemen the basis of consideration has been the equivalent scales in operation in the London Fire Brigade, with a comparison of the rates paid under other comparable Authorities.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the following scales of salaries being the equivalent of the London Fire Brigade scales, be approved and adopted, subject to the continuance of the existing arrangements for free quarters:—

# 5.—APPOINTMENT OF FIRE SUPERINTENDENT:

The Committee considered the desirability of open competition, leaving the Acting Superintendent, Station Officer R. Cook, to apply in the ordinary way, but decided that their confidence in him was such as to warrant their recommendation for his promotion. Station Officer Cook is 43 years of age. He served 7 years in the Army being discharged with the rank of Sergeant, and has had nearly 19 years experience in fire fighting services. For 8 years and 7 months he has occupied the responsible position of Station Officer at Mill Hill in which capacity he has rendered efficient and valuable service to the Borough.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Station Officer R. Cock, Mill Hill Station (Acting Superintendent) be promoted to the position of Superintendent of the Hendon Fire Brigade, to be directly responsible to the Council, through the Works and Fire Brigade Committee, for the Fire and other Associated Services in the Borough; such appointment to date as from the date of the retirement of Superintendent F. J. Bevis.

The Finance and General Purposes Commissee concur in the proposal, and Recommend That the following words be added to the above recommendation.

"to be subject to three months notice on either side, and on completion of the necessary years of service and the attainment of the age of 55 years the appointment to then be terminated, unless the Council in their discretion decide to continue his service."

### 6.- "TWO PLATOON" SYSTEM:

Consideration of this system raised the question of the proposed new fire station at Hendon Way and the policy of the Council in connection therewith. It is therefore advisable that the Council should be reminded that when the Hendon Way Station is completed it is intended to discontinue the use of the Central Station at the Burroughs. This would result in two stations (Mill Hill and Hendon Way) and the Council were agreed, when this policy was settled in 1931, that such provision adequately equipped with men and plant should be sufficient for the protection of the whole Borough.

Preliminary plans for the Hendon Way Station are under consideration. The proposals comprise an engine room, watchroom, administrative offices, and firemen's recreation rooms, paved drill yard, ambulance garage and repair shops. Housing accommodation to the extent of some 40 dwellings is included for the Superintendent, other officers and firemen. Proposed equipment includes three fire engines, water tower ladder, two ambulances and a utility van. The Committee are giving further consideration to these proposals at their next meeting.

The Continuous Duty System now in force necessitates the staff being available for duty at all times, except on "days off" which now amount to one day off in every five days, and the whole staff is provided with free quarters.

The Two Platoon System would necessitate to all intents and purposes the doubling of the Staff to provide a full brigade (in two shifts) at all hours, the duty period of each shift being normally twelve hours. Under this system the provision of housing accommodation is not essential for firemen but it is usual to give the staff rent allowances. Sub-Officers 11/- per week, and Firemen 10/- per week. Where, however, accommodation is provided an economic rent is charged and having regard to the character of the provision made by the Council the economic rent on existing accommodation might well exceed the rent allowance.

The National Union of Firemen have made representations for the adoption of the two platoon system, but the Committee are advised that there is by no means unanimity amongst the staff as to its desirability. In a Brigade of the type earried by the

Council where a fair proportion of the staff consists of young men the system would, of course, have the effect of reducing the number of fires which any individual member of the Brigade would attend, and to this extent his experience would be curtailed. Furthermore, the fire risk in the Borough could not be considered heavy, and the question therefore arises as to whether the conditions in the area warrant the two platoon system with its increased cost.

HENDON PLANNING SCHEME NO. 1.

# 1.- EDCWAREBURY HOUSE ESTATE, ELSTREE:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from Mr. W. Thorpe for consent to increase the density of development laid down by the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 1 in respect of a portion of the above estate. Before consideration of this application it will be necessary for it to be advertised in accordance with Clause 36 (5).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the applicant be informed accordingly.

# 2.—LAND, JUNCTION OF HALE LANE AND FARM ROAD, EDCWARE:

An application was considered from Mr. G. L. Russell for consent to develop the land known as Hale Farm, by the erection of small houses. The proposals are not in accordance with the provisions of the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 1 in so far as the widths of roads and size of plots are concerned.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

# 3.—ADVERTISEMENT HOARDINGS, JUNCTION OF WATFORD WAY AND BARNET WAY, MILL HILL:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application for consent to a variation in the plan relating to one of the advertisement hoardings in respect of which consent No. 315 has been issued to Messrs. Partingtons Billposting Department. The proposal provides for the back of the hoarding to be used for advertising purposes. (B. & T.P.C., 14/3/38—13).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application be approved and the consent varied accordingly.

# 4-"KINC'S HEAD," THE RIDGEWAY, MILL HILL:

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The Committee considered an application from the Secretary of Mill Hill School for consent to the user of the above premises in connection with a proposed garage and petrol filling station. It is proposed to retain the existing buildings and use them as an office and showroom on the ground floor, with a residential flat above. Petrol pumps to be installed in the rear of the premises, with a drive in from each side of the old licensed premises, and a new garage to be constructed at the back of the site.

The application has been advertised in accordance with the provisions of Clause 30 of the Scheme and a letter has been received from the Mill Hill Ratepayers' & Residents' Association expressing the hope that in dealing with this application, due consideration will be given to the amenities of the district, and that no advertisements will be permitted to be erected which will affront this particular part of Mill Hill.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the applicants be informed that the Council will be prepared to further consider the application on the receipt of detail plans and additional information as to the proposals.
- (2) That such application be disapproved under the Restriction of Ribbon Development Act, 1935.

# 5.-LAND, CROSSWAY, HENDON:

This application from Messrs. Campbell & Heath is for consent to erect six houses on a piece of low lying land fronting Crossway at the rear of Rushgrove Avenue. The application does not comply with the requirements of the Scheme as regards size of plots and breaks in buildings.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That consent be refused (Clauses 37 and 43).

# 6.-LAND, WEST VIEW, HENDON:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from Mr. W. Thorpe for consent to use half an acre of land forming the site of an old gravel pit in West View at the rear of Sydney Grove, for the purpose of the erection of a block of ten flats. The land was the subject of an interim development permission issued in connection with the Hendon Synagogue.

# 7.—ADVERTISEMENT HOARDING—679a/681, FINCHLEY ROAD, COLDERS CREEN:

In connection with the dedication of a strip of land at 679a/681, Finchley Road, Golders Green, the Borough Surveyor reported with regard to an application for consent to the display of an advertisement Board (6 ft. x 9 ft. x 2½ ins.) on the exposed flank wall adjacent to the shop, such advertisement board not to be illuminated and only to be used in connection with the trade carried on in the shop.

# 8.-THE HARTLEY PETROL FILLING STATION, WATFORD WAY, MILL HILL:

### 13.-BRITISH POSTER ADVERTISING ASSOCIATION:

The above Association objected to the protection of the Special Business Zone in the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 2 under Section 47 of the Town and Country Planning Act, The Minister of Health upon consideration of the objection suggested to the Association that they should approach the Council with a view to the possibility of entering into an agreement for the exemption of certain frontages or sites from the operation of the provisions, and in this connection a list of some 96 sites has been submitted. Upon an examination of the proposals many of the sites are not in the area of the No. 2 Scheme, others are in the residential area of the scheme the protection of which is not questioned by the Association, a number are on land ripe for building development, others are on flanks of buildings where no advertisements exist at present or in respect of which it is undesirable to grant exemption, whilst a number of the suggested sites cannot be identified.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the British Poster Advertising Association and the Ministry of Health be informed that the Council are not prepared to enter into an agreement exempting any of the proposed sites in the list submitted by the Association from the protection given by Section 47 of the Act of 1932, by virtue of the provisions contained in the scheme.

# 31.—HOLDERS HILL ROAD, BITTACY HILL, THE RIDGEWAY, AND HOLCOMBE HILL:

The Borough Surveyor reported to the effect that in view of the approaching completion of Holders Hill Road reconstruction and the development consequent thereon, it was desirable to define the names applying to the various sections of the above roads, and it is therefore suggested that the following definitions should be adopted:—

Holders Hill Road ...... From Great North Way to Holders Hill Circus.

Bittacy Hill ..... From Holders Hill Circus to the northern boundary of Engel Park.

The Ridgeway ..... From the northern boundary of Engel Park to the junction of the footpath by St. Mary's Abbey and Holcombe Hill.

Holcombe Hill ..... From the junction of The Ridgeway and the footpath by St. Mary's Abbey to the junction of Lawrence Street and Highwood Hill.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the sections of the roads in question be defined as above.

# 32.-NAMING OF STREETS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the London County Couneil intimating that the County Council, in the general public interest, had undertaken a general revision of all street names in the County of London with a view to eliminating duplication, having regard to the difficulty which has been experienced in identifying streets in the case of calls to the fire brigade and the ambulance service, and also to the strong representations received from the Post Office from time to time, as to the desirability of avoiding duplication of street names as far as possible in the London Postal Area.

It has for some time past been the policy of the County Council in naming streets to decline to sanction any name already in use within the County of London and also to avoid the selection of names already in use in the London Postal Area, and it is desired to secure co-operation between the various authorities concerned in dealing with street nomenclature in the London Postal Area. It is therefore suggested that each Authority should adopt the general policy of declining to sanction any new street names which are already in use in the London Postal Area, and should also from time to time exchange information with respect to the sanctioning of new street names with the other Authorities concerned. The County Council's Superintending Architect will be pleased to supply any information regarding street names in the County of London. Noted.

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# 33,-DOLLIS ROAD, HENDON:

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The Committee considered a letter from Mr. C. W. Voysey, together with a petition signed by 18 residents of Dollis Road, objecting to the naming of the above road, which in their opinion should be known as Dollis Lane. The Borough Surveyor reported that the section of the road in the Borough of Finchley is known as Dollis Road, and the section in Hendon has sometimes been referred to as Dollis Lane, although the correct name is Dollis Road, and would no doubt lead to confusion if the name Dollis Lane were adopted.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the name Dollis Road be retained for this section of the road in Hendon and Mr. Voysey and the petitioners be informed accordingly.

### 25.-MIDWIVES ACT, 1936-COMPENSATION:

The Council (P.H. & M.S.C., 15/11/37—5) approved a proposal to join with the Middlesex County Council and the Harrow Council in serving a direction upon Mrs. G. E. Sarell of 15, Holmstall Avenue, Edgware, to surrender her Midwife's Certificate under the above Act. Such direction was served on the 21st January, 1938; the Certificate was surrendered on the 18th February, 1938, and compensation has been claimed.

Provisional agreement has been reached as to the Council's share of such compensation at £22 17s. 7d.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the payment of £22

17s. 7d. in full discharge of the Council's liability in connection with the surrender by Mrs. C. E. Sarell of her Certificate under Section 5 of the Midwives Act, 1936.

### 26.—DEANS LANE ALLOTMENTS—HUTS:

The Committee's recommendation on the report of the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee, 16/5/38—22, as to a rental of 10/- per annum for individual huts on the above allotments was referred back by the Council.

The capital cost of 72 huts at £4 each is equivalent to £288, and in view of the limited life of such huts it is considered that a rental of 10/- per annum is the minimum which can be charged economically. On this basis the capital cost would be repaid in 10 years, if, say, 2/- per annum each were included for repairs.

A communication has been received from Deans Lane Allottees intimating that they are definitely against the small hut and would prefer the large hut.

The alternative is the construction of a central or communal hut, which, it is understood, can be erected at a capital cost of £280. This would be of a more permanent character, and its life would probably be at least 15 years which would enable the rental to be reduced to (say) 6/6d, per annum per allottee.

The provision of huts by the Council is a new departure and must be considered in the light of possible extension of the principle of uniform huts (whether of the individual or central type) to the whole of the Council's Allotments numbering approximately 1.975 plots. Such a proposal would involve an ultimate capital outlay of £8,887 10s. 0d. (based on £4 10s. 0d. per unit) or £9,875 (based on £5 per unit) and it will be appreciated that if such a scheme were adopted a considerable loss would fall to be borne by the Allotments Account in the absence of a proper rent charge.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the whole matter be re-considered by the Allotments Committee.

### 27.-LAND-NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD:

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The Council on the 9th May, 1938, authorised the sale to the Middlesex County Council of a plot of land with an approximate frontage of 25 feet to the North Circular Road and a depth of some 75 feet, adjoining the Council's Destructor Works (forming part of the land reserved for the extension thereof) for the establishment of a Chlorination Station in connection with the West Middlesex Main Drainage Scheme.

Negotiations in the matter have now been concluded, and an enlarged site having a frontage of 50 feet and a depth of 65 feet is proposed, the purchase price of £1,000 having been agreed by the District Valuer.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That authority be given for the sale to the Middlesex County Council of a plot of land having a frontage of 50 feet to the North Circular Road and a depth of 65 feet for the sum of £1,000, subject to the consent of the Minister of Health;
- (2) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents;
- (3) That any resolution of the Council inconsistent herewith be varied accordingly.

### 28 .- "FENELLA," THE BURROUGHS:

It was reported that the lease granted to the Hendon Crusaders' Bible Class of the above property would expire in September, and that application had been made for the continuance of the tenancy until Michaelmas, 1939. In view of probable developments, the Committee

RECOMMEND-That the Hendon Crusaders' Bible Class be offered a continuation of the tenancy up to the 31st March, 1939, on the present terms.

### 29.-COLDERS CREEN FOOTBALL CLUB:

The Borough Surveyor further reported upon the discussions with Mr. Gordon Raymond on behalf of the Club. (F. & G.P.C., 2/5/38-34). The schemes which have been under consideration are:-

Scheme No. 1. The Council to undertake the erection of a new stand and dressing room on the existing site and to carry out any necessary under-draining and levelling of the pitch. The estimated cost of these operations would be approximately £5,000 and it would be necessary in connection therewith to grant to the Club a new lease at a revised rental to be agreed.

Scheme No. 2. The consideration of the unsatisfactory position of the existing site suggests the possibility of establishing a Club on a new site, using some 6 acres of land fronting Hendon Way in the vicinity of Highfield Avenue. On this site entirely new premises could be erected, the design being such that, in addition to football, general sports meetings could be held on the ground. It has been explained to Mr. Raymond that the cost of establishing a centre of this type would exceed, substantially, the cost of Scheme No. 1, and it was suggested that having regard to the improved site the Club might be able, by floating a limited liability Company or otherwise, to raise the additional financial support.

Mr. Raymond's comments on these proposals are as follows:-

"With regard to Scheme 1, your remarks regarding the isolated position of the ground and the lack of easy means of communication are undisputable, and for that reason I am inclined to favour Scheme 2.

It does not, however, appear to me likely that from a public appeal to form a limited Company, or otherwise finance the Scheme, that we could rely on any sum in excess of £2,000 being obtained, and might I, therefore, suggest that the Corporation be asked to favourably consider this Scheme under the Physical Training and Recreation Act, 1937, particularly for the use of the Schools under the Local Education Committee, and to let to the Golders Green Football Club, on terms to be arranged, the football pitch and accommodation during the Winter Season.

It is hardly necessary for me to add that if such an arrangement could be brought about, we should continue to extend the same warm welcome to the schools under the Education Committee to play their important matches on the ground as we have done for several years past."

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That enquiries be instituted as to the arrangement made in certain areas for the provision and leasing of football grounds comparable with the schemes outlined above.
- (2) That the Borough Treasurer submit a financial report on the arrangements in other areas and on the alternative Schemes.

### 30.—METROPOLITAN WATER BOARD EASEMENT-THE VALE:

Upon consideration of the Notice to Treat served by the Board by virtue of their Act of 1935, the Council on the 28th March last (F. & G.P.C., 21/3/38—Item 27) decided to grant the Easement required upon payment of a nominal rental of £1 per annum.

The appropriate Claim under the Notice to Treat was submitted to the Board, but a letter was subsequently received from their Surveyor stating that it was the Board's practice to settle such claim by payment of a capital sum.

Negotiations have taken place on the question of the amount to be paid and the following terms are now recommended for approval:—

1. The Board to pay the Corporation the sum of £30 in full settlement of its claim.

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- The Board to restore the surface of the land after the laying of their main and after any subsequent work of repair.
- 3. The Corporation to remove at its own expense the sewer vent pipe recently erected by its Contractors on the easement.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council approve the above terms subject to the execution of an agreement in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk, and that the Corporate Seal be affixed thereto.

# 31.—INCREASE OF RENT AND MORTCACE INTEREST (RESTRICTIONS) ACT, 1938:

The following Joint Memorandum by the Town Clerk and Borough Treasurer was submitted:—

The Act continues restrictions until the 24th June, 1942, and its principal effect is to render in certain circumstances further houses as undecontrollable.

Restrictions and protection commenced in 1920, and on the passing of the Amendment Act of 1933, houses protected were, as from 29/9/33, houses with rateable values not exceeding:—

Metropolitan Police District \_\_\_\_ \_\_\_ £45
Elsewhere \_\_\_ \_\_ \_\_ \_\_ £35

Protection existed until the landlord came into possession. New tenants were not protected except in small properties where rateable value, April, 1931, did not exceed:—

Metropolitan Police District \_\_\_\_ \_\_ \_\_ £20

Elsewhere \_\_\_ \_\_ \_\_ \_\_ £13

but where such properties had become decontrolled under an Act of 1923, they remained decontrolled upon registration with the Local Authority.

As from 29/9/38 houses with rateable values exceeding:-

Metropolitan Police District \_\_\_ \_\_ \_\_ £35
Elsewhere \_\_\_ \_\_ \_\_ £20

will become decontrolled upon the landlord giving one month's notice before that date.

The additional houses which now become undecontrollable in the Metropolitan Police District are those with a Rateable Value of over £20 and not exceeding £35. These houses with those of lower rateable value remain controlled until 1942 notwithstanding that the landlord may obtain vacant possession; unless actual possession has already been obtained by the landlord and the dwelling has been registered as decontrolled under the Act of 1933 or registration of decontrol before the 26th May, 1938, is claimed within a period of three months ending on the 26th August, 1938, under the 1938 Act.

The following relates to the registration provisions of the Act:-

Class " C " Dwellings.

Class "C" dwellings are those, which, on the 1st April, 1931, had a rateable value not exceeding £20.

If the landlord of a Class "C" house claimed that the principal Acts had ceased to apply to it (i.e., it had become "decontrolled") prior to the 18th July, 1933, such dwelling had to be registered in the statutory register provided by the Council before the 18th October, 1933. If the landlord failed to register by that date, it was open for him to apply to the County Court for permission to make a late registration.

By Section 4 (4) of the 1938 Act, no further registrations of Class "C" dwellings may be made after 26th August, 1938. The effect of this is that all Class "C" houses, to which the principal Acts applied, which, after 26th August, 1938, do not appear in the statutory Register will be deemed to be controlled.

### Class " B " Dwellings (Lower Scale).

Dwellings which on the 1st April, 1931, had a rateable value exceeding £20 but not exceeding £35.

The Registration provisions of the 1933 Act are extended to this class of property by the 1938 Act. Thus, landlords who claim that the principal Acts had ceased to apply to Class "B" dwellings (Lower Scale) prior to the 26th May, 1938, may register such dwellings in the statutory register. Such registrations must be made by the 26th August, 1938. In the event of application not being made by this date, landlords have power to apply to the County Court for permission to make a late registration. In the ease of Class "B" dwellings (Lower Scale), however, such permission may be granted only within 12 months of the passing of the Act, namely, before 26th May, 1939.

### Generally.

The effect of registering both Class "C" and Class "B" (Lower Scale) houses is to maintain the decontrolled status where the landlords have obtained decontrol at the material dates.

As a matter of urgency, the Statutory Register has been set up under the 1938 Act, on similar lines to that under the 1933 Act, and Certificates of Registration at a fee of 1s. 0d. each are being issued, and approval is required to the steps taken.

Local Authorities are given power to publish information to landlords and tenants as to their rights and duties under the Acts. Since the passing of the 1933 Act a very large number of persons have been given advice as to how they are affected by the Rent Restriction Acts, and in accordance with the Council's previous decision (F. & G.P.C., 25/9/33—4) many copies of the pamphlet explaining the Acts have been distributed.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for a concise statement of the provisions of the new Act to be drawn up, and that the necessary steps be taken by advertisement or otherwise to bring the Act to the notice of persons affected.

### 32.—PROVINCIAL JOINT INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL FOR LOCAL AUTHORITIES NON-TRADING SERVICES (MANUAL WORKERS) FOR THE COUNTY OF MIDDLE-SEX:

A letter has been received from the Middlesex County Council intimating that the question of the affiliation of the above Council had been under consideration, and that it was proposed to hold a conference of Authorities to consider the constitution of the Joint Industrial Council at the Guildhall, on Friday, the 22nd July, at 3.30 p.m.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That His Worship the Mayor (Alderman S. H. Egan, J.P.), Councillor A. A. Naar, M.B.E., and the Borough Treasurer, be appointed the Council's representatives to attend the Conference.

### 33.-CAME LICENCE:

An application was submitted for the renewal of a Game Licence in respect of the following premises:-

Malcolm Stuart McFarlane for and on behalf of Messrs. Cope Bros., 83, Golders Green Road, N.W. 11.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND.—That the licence be renewed for a period of one year to the 1st July, 1939, and that the Corporate Seal be affixed thereto.

### 34.-HENDON LOWER RATES DEMAND ASSOCIATION:

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

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

- 1. The number of cases in which proceedings have been instituted, in accordance with the provisions of the bye-law relating to annoyance caused by the indiscriminate use of wireless sets.
- 2. The maximum penalty provided for in the bye-law.
- 3. Whether, in view of the ineffectiveness of appeals by the press and by the B.B.C., he is satisfied that sufficient publicity is given to the existence of such bye-law.

The Chairman of the Committee (Alderman A. J. Reynolds) J.P.) replied in the following terms:—

- 1. In only one case have proceedings been taken in connection with a wireless set, which resulted in a fine of £2 and £1 1s. 0d. costs. Proceedings are about to be instituted in a second case. Another case under the bye-law concerned the use of an amplifier on a van and resulted in a fine of £2 with £3 3s. 0d. costs.
- 2. The maximum penalty is £5.
- 3. It would appear that the existence of the bye-law is generally known, and the Police have a supply of the necessary forms. Several complaints have been received from time to time. In each case the proper form is issued for signature by three persons residing within the hearing of the instrument and service on the persons concerned, with a view to subsequent proceedings if the noise continues after the expiration of a fortnight. Either the persons concerned with making the noise have abated the nuisance upon the service of the notices by the complainants, or the latter have not pursued the matter further.

In connection with the Commissioner's Report on the Fire Inquiry, the Town Clerk reported the receipt of letters from the Hampstead Garden Suburb Residents' Association and the Golders Green Estate Ratepayers' Association, which were duly noted.

Before consideration of the Committee's Report the Chairman of the Committee (Councillor A. A. Naar, M.B.E.) submitted the following statement:—

## FIRE AT TEMPLE CARDENS, COLDERS CREEN, N.W. 11.

The Council will recall the circumstances that led to the holding of a Public Local Inquiry into incidents attendant upon the fire at Temple Gardens.

Certain allegations, some of which have proved to be true and some false, were made by 57 members of the public, and the Council—while it was under no obligation to do so—and while the ratepayers could not have compelled the Home Secretary to order such Inquiry—readily consented to arrange for a full and public investigation.

This should, I think, be counted to the credit of the Council and should be regarded as indicative of their desire to maintain the efficiency of their services which have been generally regarded as of the highest order.

If any weaknesses were disclosed, and they have never claimed infallibility, they were determined to apply the necessary tightening up.

There were four main heads under which allegations were made:-

- Delay in the telephone exchange in putting calls through to the Fire Brigade.
- Unnecessary loss of time on the part of the Brigade in arriving at the fire after receiving the call.
- Inadequate leadership and defective organisation of the Brigade, at the site of the fire—defective equipment and bungling in using it.
- 4. Partial failure of the water supply.

On 1 and 2, the Commissioner finds that there was no undue delay when once the Station had received the call, and the fact that the first engine went to Temple Grove instead of Temple Gardens did not have any serious effect on the fire.

The fact remains, however, that there was no breakdown in the system. The Station Officer admits that the correct address was given to him, and according to the evidence of the Driver even after attention had been called to the mistake the Station Officer persisted in his error and the Driver had no alternative but to obey orders.

We come now to items 3 and 4. Inadequate leadership and defective organisation at the Fire—defective equipment and bungling in using it.

While it is readily admitted that certain deficiencies were found to exist in relation to this fire, the strictures of the Commissioner must be confined to one section of the Brigade only. There is no suggestion that the control and training at the Mill Hill Station have been at any time other than highly efficient.

To my mind the most important allegation is that of inadequate leadership at the fire. This must be regarded impartially and without any thought of providing a scapegoat.

We cannot, however, fail to realise that during the most critical stages of the fire the Station Officer was in sole charge, and it is also abundantly clear that the conduct of operations was most unsatisfactory.

Soon after I was appointed Chairman of the Works and Fire Brigade Committee I had come to the conclusion, that the Central Station was not what could be termed a "Happy Ship"—there appeared to be a lack of cooperation between officers and men. Whilst the Chief Officer was no doubt an efficient fire fighter, he was not strictly speaking a disciplinarian. A good deal of his work was delegated to the Station Officer—especially that which related to practise and drill—the Station Officer did not appear to have the confidence of his men, especially the older men.

I have no doubt that past Chairmen and Committees had probably been aware of the same kind of atmosphere at the Central Station; but whilst the general standard of conduct remained satisfactory, it will be readily appreciated that to take drastic action merely on the ground of "atmosphere" would have been extremely difficult.

It is a great pity that it had to be left to this fire to focus attention upon what was no doubt a weakness in the organisation.

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Your Committee have dealt with this matter from a disciplinary point of view, and the fact that the Chief Officer has asked to retire on the grounds of ill health now places us in the position of being able to thoroughly reorganise the entire Brigade.

As a first step, we are to increase our personnel by an additional five men, that will give each appliance a full crew to go out on any call.

A good deal has been heard about the fact that when the alarm was given, only one engine was sent. I have had an analysis drawn out of fire calls for the last two years, and I find that in 1936—of a total of 216 calls 49 were false alarms, 31 were chimney fires, 108 were minor outbreaks, and 28 major ones.

In 1937—we had 49 false alarms, 33 chimney fires, 151 minor outbreaks, and 20 major ones making a total of 253.

We have been advised to follow London's lead, and send two engines to every fire; but London has plenty to spare, so have Liverpool and other large towns; but Liverpool only send one on first turn out.

We can only be guided by our local experience, and for all the years our Brigade has been established, we have managed to cope with the work pretty satisfactorily.

The next step we have taken in re-organisation is to try to attract the best type of man, and we have now placed our wages scale on a level with that of London. Whilst our own maximum was not far behind that of London, our starting pay was not so good, so we found we were recruiting men, who having served a year or so, and having received a certain amount of training left our Brigade to seek higher pay elsewhere.

In fairness to the Station Officer it must be admitted that his men constituted the younger men of the Brigade, with a comparatively short period of service; but this cannot excuse the absence of proper records of drills and training, which should be kept by every Station Officer, nor can it excuse the lack of a reasonable measure of control at the fire.

At Mill Hill Station, such records have always been kept and there is a much higher standard of efficiency.

Since this regrettable occurrence drills and training have been accelerated at both stations.

There was an allegation that our equipment was defective. That the Commissioners find is not true. I am glad to say we have always been well to the fore in equipment, and the Fire Brigade Committee are ever ready to consider any and all types of up-to-date fire fighting appliances—on this point it is interesting to make a comparison with London. Hendon adopted the combined motor pump and fire escape on one machine in 1914—Finchley had the first one in use in the country in 1903. London only took it up in 1932. London has had one of the oldest and most unsatisfactory systems of street fire alarms going.

Hendon had an improved system on that of London installed in 1910 and the modern Gamewell system installed in half the Borough in 1930—London followed Hendon's lead by adapting the Gamewell system only three years

There are no doubt many lessons we can learn from London; but equipment is apparently not one of them.

The fourth allegation concerns the failure of the water supply.

#### FAILURE OF WATER SUPPLY.

In order to appreciate the true position regarding the question of water supply in case of fire, it is necessary to give a brief description of the position as regards water supply authorities in the Borough.

There are within the Borough two entirely independent water supply authorities. The southern portion of the Borough is under the control of the Metropolitan Water Board. The northern, and larger portion of the Borough, comes within the area of supply of the Colne Valley Water Company. This latter Company supply their area through one network of open mains. There are no dividing valves, and if a pump is coupled to any hydrant it pumps direct from the whole network of the Company's mains.

From the evidence given at the Inquiry it appears that the Metropolitan Water Board work on a very different principle. They sub-divide their area into a number of zones, and although there is a complete network of mains, each zone is made a water-tight compartment by the insertion of dividing valves at certain points on the mains, which valves are kept permanently closed. As a result of this system the hydrants in Temple Gardens are in one zone and those in St. George's Road, although closely adjacent, are supplied from another zone and have no physical connection with the former.

In my opinion, some form of co-operation between the Water Board and the Corporation must be adopted so that full information as to zones, dividing valves, etc., is in the possession of the fire brigade, and the brigade must be able to open these dividing valves in cases of necessity.

It is suggested in the report that the attendance of a turncock at all fires is the proper method of securing this co-operation, but I regret I do not think it is possible to accept this as a solution of the problem.

As regards The Colne Valley Water Company, even if a turncock is sent for at each fire there are no valves he can open and nothing he can do to increase the supplies.

In the case of the Metropolitan Water Board there is no doubt a turneock could, by opening dividing valves, give at certain points a largely increased supply of water.

It was stated in evidence by the Metropolitan Water Board that the London County Council send a fire escape or a car to bring the turncock to a fire. I have communicated with the Metropolitan Water Board on this particular matter and the following is an extract from a letter sent to the Chief Engineer of the Board:—

"The Committee is, of course, aware of the existing arrangement under which a turncock is sent for directly after a fire alarm is received. It does not appear, however, that the prompt attendance of this turncock at a fire can always be relied upon at any hour of the day or night, as it is obvious he has other duties to perform and during the daytime in particular is not necessarily available on the telephone. As far as I am aware the Board has no officer who, it can be said, is available at any time to attend a fire and manipulate valves on the mains.

I should, however, be much obliged if you could give me some further information on this point and make any suggestion which would enable the Committee to carry into effect the suggestions of the Commissioner who held the Inquiry."

I also append, for the information of the Committee an extract from the reply of the Chief Engineer dealing with this point, as follows:--

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"It is quite appreciated that during normal working hours these men will not usually be available at their homes, but a note of the approximate position where each man is working is daily in the hands of the District Foreman responsible for the area. The District Foreman of the area of Hendon which is supplied by the Board has an office in the same building as the District Superintendent, viz., 1, Fordwych Road, N.W. 2 (Telephone—Gladstone 1123) and an enquiry made at the office at any time could be answered giving the locality in which the appropriate official could be found.

While the Board would be willing to transmit any message from the office to the appropriate turncock it is considered the man's services would be more speedily obtained by sending a message direct from the fire station."

While the Chief Engineer's very helpful attitude is appreciated I think it is clear that it is not possible to say that at a moment's notice a turncock can always be found available to open the closed valves on the Board's system. The suggestion that a car should be kept and sent off at once in search of the appropriate turncock does not appeal to me as a proper solution of the difficulty.

Reference is also made by the Commissioner to the practice of the London Fire Brigade whereby steps are taken to secure the presence of a turncock at the scene of a fire so far as possible simultaneously with the arrival of the brigade itself. I have communicated on this point with the Chief Officer of the London Fire Brigade and the following extract from his reply gives the practice of this brigade:—

"Attendance of turncocks.—Turncocks are called on the receipt of every fire call. Where it is possible the officer-of-the-watch at the superintendent station calls the turncock by exchange telephone. When the turncock is not on an exchange telephone the duty man at the local fire station sends a policeman or messenger to call him and the officer-of-the-watch at the superintendent station enquires of the local station as to whether this has been done.

In the event of the non-arrival of the turncock at the fire and it is found that his services are required, the officer in charge of the fire sends a car or appliance to convey him from his home or place of duty."

I think it is clear from this that the prospect of a turncock arriving at the fire simultaneously with the brigade is somewhat remote.

It can, of course, be agreed that provided the turncock can be found the quickest way of securing his services would be to send a motor vehicle to fetch him.

I have dealt with the main points of the Commissioner's report; but I cannot conclude without giving a general outline of the problem with which the Fire Brigade Committee has had to deal in recent years. Probably the best index as to the extent of this problem is given by the growth of the population of the Borough.

In 1921—there were 56,000 inhabitants, in 1931 nearly 116,000 and in 1937—162,000—new areas springing up, added to the burden of fire protection.

In 1921 you had one Station opened in 1914, with one dual purpose machine—4 married firemen, 4 single firemen and 1 Chief Officer in charge. Subsequent years show an uninterrupted development by your Fire Brigade Committee of personnel and equipment of the Brigade.

In 1929, a new station was opened at Mill Hill—it was equipped with 2 dual purpose machines and was provided with cottages for eight firemen and quarters for the Station Officer. This station has been admitted to be a model of its kind, and has been visited by Fire Authorities from all over the Country. The accommodation was increased in 1934 by the addition of 10 cottages giving a staff of 18 firemen.

The Central Station has been increased by reducing the number of married quarters, and increasing the capacity of single men's quarters—giving a total now of 1 Superintendent, 1 Station Officer and 15 Firemen at this Station, and further provision for 5 men is to be made at once.

There are now 2 dual purpose machines, together with a Water Tower of a maximum height of 110 feet—this can operate against the highest building in Hendon.

Both Stations have been equipped with special utility vans and Ambulances of the latest patterns—incidentally all these are open to inspection by the public at any time.

The next problem that faces the Committee is that of developing the Central Station—the present building by its design and limited site is now out of date. It is not possible to provide accommodation for the present and future requirements of the fire service.

This problem will not be solved until the Committee is in possession of a new station on a much larger site, with adequate accommodation for personnel, training, and equipment. As the Council are aware steps are being taken at the present time with a view to the provision of such a station.

If I have been somewhat lengthy, I hope I may be forgiven; but in view of the many statements and mis-statements that have been made—it is only fair, not only to the Fire Brigade Committee and this Council, but to the public at large, that a plain unvarnished story should be told, and I hope the people of Hendon will believe me, when I say—that they may sleep securely at night, knowing that they have a Fire Service second to none, and that incidents of the unfortunate kind of which we have heard tonight may be relegated to the past.

Alderman Maughan called attention to the wording of recommendation No. 1 and stated that the word "Ministry" should be substituted for the words "appropriate Committees" and it was agreed that the recommendation be amended accordingly.

Apologies for absence were submitted on behalf of His Worship the Mayor and Alderman Maughan.

#### 1.-WARNING SIGNALS-SIRENS:

The Council on the 20th June last on the recommendation of the Committee (A.R.P.,C., 24/5/38-7) instructed the Borough Surveyor to ascertain the location and nature of existing sirens and hooters and to report thereon, as early as practicable. Subsequent to the Meeting of the Council a letter was received from the Middlesex County Council stating that it has been ascertained from the Home Office that the provision of sirens in the whole of the Metropolitan Police Area will now be undertaken by the Police. It will therefore no longer be necessary for Local Authorities to survey existing sirens, unless they are requested by the Police, but any information in the possession of the Authorities should be offered to the Local Superintendents of Police. Authorities are asked to co-operate by permitting the Police to place sirens on their own buildings and by undertaking that their own staffs will operate the sirens on such buildings as Town Halls and Fire Stations which will be permanently manned in war, in order to save the unnecessary use of Police Personnel. As regards financial arrangements, the expenditure incurred by the Receiver of the Metropolitan Police will be included in the Police Precept and will rank for grant.

In this connection the Borough Surveyor reported that in co-operation with the Police Authorities a scheme is being prepared for the provision of warning sirens throughout the district. Provisional sites are being selected and it is anticipated that at least sixty stations will be necessary. The Committee are informed that the Police desire the Council's assistance in settling the scheme and the fullest measure of co-operation will be extended.

#### 2-TRAINING OF LOCAL ANTI-CAS INSTRUCTORS:

On the 19th May the Home Office issued a new edition of A.R.P. Memorandum No. 5 dealing with Anti-Gas Training. The Memorandum sets out a new scheme for the local training of Anti-Gas Instructors. Under this scheme any scheme-making authority (in Middlesex the County Council) may organise local courses of instruction in anti-gas measures and may award certificates (L.A.G.C.) to persons who will then be qualified to give the New Modified Full Course, Voluntary Aid Course, or short courses of local anti-gas training. The training of such Local Anti-Gas Instructors can only be given by an Instructor C.A.G.S.—Special. It is anticipated that the operation of this scheme will permit a considerable increase in the number of Instructors qualified to train the majority of volunteers for Air Raid Precautions Services.

Mr. F. H. Day, one of the Council's Sanitary Inspectors, who recently attended the Civilian Anti-Gas School at Falfield, qualified as an Instructor C.A.G.S.—Special, and he is therefore qualified to train Local Anti-Gas Instructors. The Middlesex County Council were intending to establish a central Anti-Gas School, but as soon as an intimation had been received that Mr. Day had qualified as a Special Instructor the Town Clerk pressed the County Council A.R.P. Administrative Officer to permit the establishment of a local school in Hendon in order to train instructors for the Council's purposes. Permission to the establishment of a local school was granted and the course, the first to be established in Middlesex—possibly in the Country—commenced at the Town Hall on Monday the 4th July and ten L.A.G.C. Instructors are at present under training. The classes are held on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 8-10 p.m. and the course will be completed by the end of the present month.

In order to comply with the proviso to the Home Office Memorandum that the training of Instructors L.A.G.C. should be undertaken by a scheme-making authority the Branch Schools will be under the general supervision of an official of the County Council (Major J. W. Webber, M.C., Instructor C.A.G.S.—Special) who will be responsible for preserving uniformity in and maintaining the standard of instruction and who will also conduct the examinations as laid down in the Memorandum.

When the Local Anti-Gas Instructors at present under training have qualified it will be possible to have about 20 classes for Air Raid Wardens running concurrently. The training of the volunteers who have not yet been allocated to courses of instruction will then be speeded up and in the case of new volunteers the lag between enrolment and allocation to courses of instruction will be very considerable reduced.

The expense involved in the training of Local Anti-Gas Instructors at Branch Schools will form part of the County expenditure and will rank for grant.

The Town Clerk reported that he proposed starting a further L.A.G.C. Instructors' Class about the middle of September and the Committee have given their approval thereto.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken be confirmed.

# 3.—THE WOMEN'S VOLUNTARY SERVICES FOR A.R.P.:

A letter was submitted from the Home Office stating for the information of the Council that with the approval of the Secretary of State a Services for A.R.P." The primary purpose of the organisation is to for A.R.P. Services and for the expansion of hospital services that would be necessary if an emergency arose. It is not intended that the organisation should take over any of the existing statutory responsibility placed upon Local Authorities by the Air Raid Precautions Act, 1937, and and the Regulations made under it, but Sir Samuel Hoare feels confident that all Local Authorities will wish to co-operate with the organisation of Air Raid Precautions.

The Women's Voluntary Services propose to appoint a regional representative in each of the thirteen Regions of the country to correspond with the areas coming within the scope of the Home Office Regional Inspectors. These representatives will undertake the general oversight and organisation of the work of the Women's Voluntary Services in their regions. It is also proposed to appoint representatives in such County Council, County Borough and Borough areas as may be desirable in consultation with the Local Authority concerned.

#### RESPIRATORS.

#### 4.-STORACE AND DISTRIBUTION OF RESPIRATORS:

The Government has made arrangements to provide respirators, including a protective device for babies, in sufficient quantities to enable every person in the country to be equipped with one in the event of an emergency arising. The respirators will not be issued to individuals until an emergency arises because certain storage conditions which would not be available to every person are essential for their preservation. They will, however, require to be stored in the custody of every Local Authority which will be responsible for obtaining particulars as to the numbers and sizes of the respirators required for the inhabitants in its area, and for making the arrangements for their ultimate distribution to the people. The storage places to be provided by the Local Authorities will be known as "Local Respirator Stores." These stores should be situated with due regard to the area they will serve and should have easy means of entry and exit. The respirator stores to be provided by Local Authorities should be capable of housing about 30,000 respira-The space required would necessitate a building about 50 feet in length by 20 feet in width provided with racks for storage and benches, etc., for assembly purposes. Provision would also have to be made for heating the premises and the buildings must be so situated as to enable regular inspections to be carried out.

The basis laid down in the Home Office Memorandum of 30,000 respirators to each Local Respirator Store will necessitate the establishment of six Local Respirator Stores to serve the Borough. The Borough Engineer reports that a survey of the Borough has been carried out, but at the present time there are no buildings in the possession of the Council suitable for utilisation as Local Respirator Stores. He, therefore, recommends that new buildings for the purpose be provided as follows:—

- 2 Stores at Hendon Way Depôt,
- 2 Stores at Bunns Lane Depôt,
- 1 Store at Refuse Destructor Works, North Circular Road,
- Store in Edgwarebury Park, adjacent to Edgware Way frontage.

The necessary heating for the stores at the two Depôts where there is a resident staff, could be provided by a small domestic boiler and radiators, whilst the store at the Refuse Destructor Works could be heated by electricity from the Destructor itself, and thermostatically controlled. The store in Edgwarebury Park would have to be heated by electricity from the Company's mains.

It is physically impossible to issue respirators to the people direct from the Local Respirator Store and it will, therefore, be necessary to provide Respirator Distributing Depóts to receive the respirators from the Local Respirator Stores for supply to the Air Raid Wardens for distribution. The maximum number of respirators which can satisfactorily be dealt with at any one Distributing Depót is about 4,000, which means that a Local Respirator Store containing about 30,000 respirators would need at least seven or eight Distributing Depóts. Each of these Depôts would then serve the requirements of eight Wardens' Posts, each Post being responsible for the final distribution of about 500 respirators. It will, therefore, be necessary to prepare a schedule of buildings which can be used for this purpose. Generally speaking, Schools, Church Halls, and Club Halls, might be found suitable for use as Distributing Depôts.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a map indicating the sites of the six suggested Local Respirator Stores and 46 buildings in different parts of the Borough radiating from the suggested Local Respirator Stores which he is of opinion are suitable for Distributing Depôts. It will be necessary for plans and estimates to be prepared for the erection and fitting of the proposed Local Respirator Stores for submission to and approval by the Middlesex County Council.

The Committee accordingly

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare plans and estimates for the erection of six Local Respirator Stores on the sites indicated on the plan now submitted for consideration by the Committee at the earliest possible date with a view to subsequent submission to the Middlesex County Council.

#### 5.-STEEL SHELVES FOR RESPIRATORS:

At the Meeting of the Middlesex County Council A.R.P. Advisory Committee on the 27th May it was agreed that steel shelves required for respirator stores should so far as practicable be purchased under a central purchasing scheme. The Middlesex County Council have obtained quotations for the supply of such shelves and Local Authorities having satisfactory storage space available and ready to take delivery of shelves should order them from the Milner Safe Company, Ltd., intimating that the cost is to be debited to the Middlesex County Council. The County Council state that many Authorities wish to arrange for the shelves to be erected and fixed by wardens or other volunteers and when placing orders Local Authorities are asked to make it clear to the firm whether or not erection by the firm's employees is required. **Noted.** 

# 6.—SHELTERS FOR PERSONS CAUCHT IN STREETS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the survey of buildings capable of being adapted as small shelters for persons caught in streets is being carried out by the Building Inspector's Department and is well in hand. In addition, visits and interviews have taken place with Mill Hill School, Rolls Royce, Ltd., and St. Joseph's Convent, and advice given on measures to be taken to secure some degree of safety in the buildings owned by them. The Borough Surveyor also reported that Mr. L. A. Jones, Chief Building Inspector, had qualified as a Grade I. Anti-Gas Instructor.

Noted.

#### 7.-SITES FOR TRENCHES:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the preparation of maps for sites for trenches is being prepared and that it will be necessary to utilise all the open spaces including Hampstead Heath Extension and Golders Hill Park, but it would not be necessary to utilise such open spaces as Moat Mount and Scratchwood in the northern part of the Borough.

Noted.

#### 8.—FIRST AID POSTS AND CLEANSING CENTRES:

Further consideration has been given to the siting of First Aid Posts in the light of the directions contained in the latest Memorandum issued by the Home Office. The normal ruling for the provision of First Aid Posts laid down in the Memorandum is that adjacent Posts should be less than two miles apart so that no casualty should have to go more than a mile to reach a Post. The size of the Post is to be reckoned according to the following formula:—

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had gone into the question of adapting the buildings previously approved by the Council in accordance with the Home Office Circular and that there are grave difficulties in converting the schools of the semi-permanent type built around a quadrangle as the large area of glass would make it extremely difficult to render the buildings either gas proof or blast proof. A plan was submitted indicating the buildings which it is considered could be adapted as First Aid Posts and which are suitable from the point of view of location for the areas they would be required to serve.

The buildings recommended for adaptation as First Aid Posts are set out hereunder:—

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the First Aid Posts set out above be approved and the Borough Surveyor instructed to prepare plans and estimates for adapting the buildings as First Aid Posts for consideration in due course and subsequent submission to the County Council for approval.

# 9.—ORCANISATION OF SQUADS FOR DECONTAMINATION WORK

The Borough Surveyor reported that Squads are being organised from amongst the permanent employees of the Council for the following purposes:—

Decontamination of Streets and Buildings, Demolition and Clearance of Buildings, Repair of Highways, Repair of Sewers.

For this branch of the organisation it is proposed to utilise Bunns Lane and Hendon Way Depôts and also the small Depôt under the railway arches at Golders Green for the purpose of highways repairs. When the organisation of squads has been completed the necessary training will be undertaken. The training will be carried out in the evenings and pursuant to the decision of the Middlesex County Council the men will be paid at ordinary rates of wages during the training period. Squads for the decontamination of clothing and vehicles, etc., are also being organised from amongst the Council's permanent staff and the training of these squads will be carried out in a similar manner.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the training arrangements for the personnel mentioned above be approved.

## 10.-BOROUGH SURVEYOR'S DEPARTMENT-STAFF:

The Borough Surveyor reported that work in connection with Air Raid Precautions is occupying the full time of one Building Inspector, one Architectural Assistant and an Assistant in the Engineering Section, together with the part-time services of other members of the Staff, and that he hoped at an early date to obtain additional assistance for Air Raid Precautions Work as owing to the time occupied on this work the general work of the Department is falling in arrear. These proposals will necessitate the approval of the Middlesex County Council.

# 11.—STORAGE OF TRAINING EQUIPMENT:

The Town Clerk reported that a considerable amount of training equipment consisting of respirators and anti-gas clothing has now been issued to the Council. At the present time the equipment is stored in Committee Room No. 5, but the accommodation is insufficient. When the Local Anti-Gas Instructors now under training have received their certificates further training equipment will be issued and the question of storage accommodation will become even more acute. It was, therefore, necessary that immediate consideration should be given to the question of providing adequate storage accommodation for existing equipment and the further equipment to be received in the future. The Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the provision of adequate storage accommodation be referred to the Borough Surveyor to be dealt with as a matter of urgency and that plans and estimates of the expenditure involved be forwarded for the approval of the Middlesex County Council.

#### 12.-NAMEPLATES FOR WARDENS:

At the Meeting of the A.R.P. Advisory Committee of the Middlesex County Council held on the 27th May last it was agreed that Wardens' nameplates should be issued to those Wardens who may desire them, and that they should be obtained under a central purchasing scheme through the County Council. Nameplates will be supplied free to the Wardens, and it had been ascertained that the volunteers who have up to the present qualified to act as Wardens in the Borough are desirous of receiving nameplates to fix to their houses. Arrangements have been made by the County Council for the supply of the nameplates and the Council's requirements should be ordered direct from the suppliers with an indication that the account is to be sent direct to the Middlesex County Council. It is proposed to order a sufficient quantity of the nameplates for issue to the Air Raid Wardens in the Borough.

#### 13.—TRAINING OF VOLUNTEERS:

The following statement was submitted showing the number of volunteers enrolled and the progress of training on the 12th July:—

Instructions were given for a circular to be addressed to each volunteer who has not yet commenced training pointing out the difficulties which have been experienced and giving an indication as to when they are likely to be allocated to a course of instruction.

#### 14.-PUBLICITY:

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It was reported that as a result of an offer made by Mr. Fuller, the Manager of the Orpheum Cinema, Temple Fortune, to place his screen and also the windows on each side of the entrance to the cinema at the disposal of the Council for the purpose of giving publicity to Air Raid Precautions with a view to accelerating the enrolment of volunteers, that a short film, which had been borrowed, and also slides appealing for volunteers were shown on the screen during the week from Monday, 20th to 25th June. A display of Anti-Gas clothing and the various types of respirators and also the Home Office posters calling for volunteers were shown in each window adjacent to the cinema entrance, whilst pamphlets giving details of the services for which volunteers are required and also enrolment forms were available in the vestibule of the cinema. A number of volunteers were enrolled as a result of the publicity given at the cinema. The Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council do accord to Mr. Fuller their best thanks for his co-operation.

#### 15.-APPEAL FOR VOLUNTEERS:

The Town Clerk submitted suggestions for the launching of an intensive campaign for the enrolment of volunteers after the summer recess, and the Committee have **approved** of the campaign being inaugurated on the lines suggested. The Committee have also given instructions for the display of the Home Office official posters in prominent positions throughout the Borough.

#### 16.-HENDON RATEPAYERS' ASSOCIATION:

A letter was submitted from the Secretary of the Hendon Ratepayers' Association transmitting the following resolution passed at a Meeting of the Association on the 15th June last:—

"THIS Meeting of the Hendon Ratepayers' Association deplores the lack of any evidence of efficient organisation in the Borough relating to Air Raid Precautions and request the Council to publish immediately full details of what steps have been or are being taken in this vital matter."

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to reply to the Association to the effect that full details of the progress which is being made in connection with Air Raid Precautions is published in the Council Agenda, a copy of which is supplied to the Association.

# 17.—DAMAGE TO PRIVATE PROPERTY AS A RESULT OF AIR RAIDS:

At the last Meeting of the Committee instructions were given to ascertain from the Home Office as to what steps the Government propose to take to compensate owners of private property for any damage that may be done to their property as a result of an Air Raid. The Town may be done to their property as a result of an Air Raid. The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Home Office enclosing a copy of an Clerk submitted a letter from the Board of Trade to a question asked answer given by the President of the Board of Trade to a question of in Parliament on the 17th May last, to the effect that the question of putting into operation any scheme of compensation should the contingency putting into operation any scheme of compensation should the contingency of the circumstances of the time. Such preparatory work as can usefully of the circumstances of the time. Such preparatory work as can usefully be undertaken in time of peace to facilitate the eventual application of a scheme of compensation is well in hand. Noted.

#### 18 .- CASUALITY CLEARING HOSPITALS:

Pursuant to the instructions contained in section 8 of the Draft Air Raid Precautions (General) Scheme No. 1, the Medical Officer of Health has been in communication with the Medical Superintendent of the Hendon Cottage Hospital and a letter was submitted stating that the possible accommodation which can be made available in the case of an emergency by a process of evacuation is about 50 beds. Noted.

#### 19.-FIRST AID-TRAINING:

A letter was submitted from the A.R.P. Administrative Officer of the Middlesex County Council giving preliminary notification that a new syllabus of training in pure first aid (excluding anti-gas) with a covering circular will shortly be issued by the Home Office. The syllabus will exclude the treatment of injuries not likely to be sustained in Air Raids. It will include in addition to courses for First Aid personnel a shorter course for Wardens and other Air Raid Precautions personnel and for members of the public. The Home Office will make new and uniform financial arrangements to operate when first aid instruction is given through the British Red Cross Society and the St. John Ambulance Brigade and it is hoped that the syllabus and circular will be issued soon enough to enable the new scheme of training to come into force after the In the meantime it is considered undesirable for a Local Authority to enter into any new or long term arrangements with the voluntary organisations, but existing arrangements will remain in force at present. Noted.

#### 20.—ANTI-CAS TRAINING—INLAND REVENUE STAFFS:

A letter was submitted from the Estates Surveyor of H.M. Office of Works enquiring whether the Council would be prepared to place at their disposal for Anti-Gas Lectures to Inland Revenue Staffs a room in the Town Hall for one hour during the morning three times a week to accommodate a class of approximately twenty persons; the course will cover a period of eight weeks from the 17th October to 10th December.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the desired facilities be granted subject to out of pocket expenses in connection with the user being paid by H.M. Office of Works.

#### 21.-AUXILIARY FIRE SERVICE:

In connection with the training of Auxiliary Firemen which is now proceeding at the Mill Hill Fire Station, certain clothing and equipment is necessary. The uniform and equipment which is to be issued to members of the Auxiliary Fire Service is set out in Appendix 1 of the Home Office Circular of the 15th June, 1938, and the Home Office will raise no objection to Local Authorities making their own arrangements by direct contract for the provision of uniforms which are urgently required, provided the conditions of the circular are complied with, and intimation is given that the cost will be allowed to rank for grant. The cost of the clothing and equipment required for the Auxiliary Firemen now in training will amount to £165, and the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given to the purchase of the requisite clothing and equipment at a cost of £165, the financial implications being duly noted.

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## 22.--MATTERS OF URGENCY:

In view of the special nature of the matters coming within the terms of reference of the Air Raid Precautions Committee, they

RECOMMEND—That in the event of matters of urgency arising during the Summer Recess, Meetings of this Committee be convened to deal therewith.

# 23.—ISSUE OF A.R.P. BADGES TO TRAINED VOLUNTEERS:







#### MAYOR'S RECESS REPORT:

His Worship the Mayor, submitted the following report:-

#### RECESS REPORT.

The following matters have been dealt with during the Summer Recess under authority of the Council's resolution No. 346 of the 18th July:-

## 1.--PROPOSED SUBWAY--EDGWARE WAY:

The Clerk to the County Council intimated that the Ministry of Transport had asked that this matter should receive attention during the Summer Recess and an enquiry was made as to what contribution the Town Council would be prepared to make towards the cost of constructing the Subway in the event of the County Council approving the proposal. The County Council are the highway authority for Edgware Way and it is their duty to put in hand any measures required for the safety of the public using the highway. In these circumstances I authorised a communication to the County Council intimating that the Town Council were unable to see their way to make any contribution.

# 2.—HENDON PLANNING SCHEME NO. 1:

(A).

Applications for Consent.

Mr. J. N. Jones in respect of Builder's Store, Workshop and Office in Accommodation Road off Selvage Lane, Mill Hill. (i).

An application from Mr. J. N. Jones for permission to erect a builder's store, workshop and office on land fronting the accommodation road off Selvage Lane, Mill Hill, has been advertised in accordance with the Scheme and no objections received. therefore gave authority for a consent to be issued, subject to the following condi-

- (a) That plans and elevations be submitted to the Council's approval. tions :-
  - (b) That no part of the premises shall be used for advertising purposes.
  - (c) That no machinery be installed in the workshop and nothing done therein which, by reason of noise, smoke or smell, might, in the opinion of the Council, be detrimental to the amenities of adjacent property.

The proposal was also approved under the Restriction of Ribbon Development Mr. H. Cook in respect of Land at Ranclagh Drive, Edgware. Act, 1935.

An application from Mr. H. Cook for permission to erect a bungalow fronting Edgware Way at the rear of No. 19, Ranelagh Drive, Edgware, was considered and disapproved.



#### (iii). Mr. J. S. Goff in respect of Land at the rear of Farm Villa, Farm Road, Edgware.

An application received from Mr. J. S. Goff for permission to instal a petrol tank and pump at the rear of the house known as "Farm Villa," Farm Road, Edgware, was disapproved.

## (iv). Mr. W. F. Thorpe in respect of the Edgwarebury House Estate, Elstree.

I considered an application received for the development of the land comprised in the Edgwarebury House Estate, Elstree. The applicant desires to increase the density on 26 acres from six to seven units per acre, and the proposal has, therefore, been advertised in accordance with the Scheme, one objection being received.

In view of the fact that there does not appear to be any justification for the increase in density I gave authority for the proposal to be disapproved under Clauses 33, 36, 37, 38, 49 and 61.

#### (v). Mr. L. Kennard in respect of No. 7, Nant Road, Cricklewcod.

Amended plans were submitted in connection with the above, and authority given for consent to be issued under Clauses 28, 35 and 36 of the Scheme, subject to the following conditions:—

- (a) That plans and other particulars of the proposed alterations shall be submitted to the satisfaction of the Council.
- (b) That no machinery shall be installed in the premises and nothing done therein which, by reason of noise or smell, might, in the opinion of the Council be detrimental to the amenities of adjacent property.

#### (vi). Mr. M. Needler in respect of Nos. 9 and 11, Heather Gardens, Golders Green.

Under Clauses 36, 37, 42 and 43 of the Scheme I disapproved an application submitted by Mr. M. Needler for permission to erect a house at the rear of Nos. 9 and 11, Heather Gardens, Golders Green.

#### (vii). Messrs. Howes & Jackman in respect of Scaford Cottage, Parson Street, Hendon.

An application for the reconstruction of the property known as "Seaford Cottage," Parson Street, Hendon, to provide new showrooms for the business of Mr. C. J. Corden was considered and disapproved under Clause 43 of the Scheme, the Public Health (Buildings in Streets) Act of 1888, and the Restriction of Ribbon Development Act of 1935.

## (B). "The Hendon Way" Public House, Hendon Way, Hendon.

The Borough Surveyor reported regarding his negotiations with the owners of the above premises in respect of the car park. In view of the fact that the Architect is prepared to preserve the garden appearance to Graham Road by the provision of a narrow flower bed and trellis work along the boundary wall, I gave authority for a consent to be issued under the Town Planning Scheme varying the original interim development permission.

#### 3.—HENDON PLANNING SCHEME NO. 2:

I gave authority for arrangements to be made with Cook, Hammond & Kell, Limited, for the preparation of the final copies of the Scheme map for submission to the Ministry of Health, at an estimated cost of £57.

## 4.—FRITH MANOR SCHOOL:

Quotations were considered for the paving to the playground of the above school, and authority given for the General Contractor to accept the lowest quotation, that of Constable, Hart & Company, Limited, in the sum of £785 14s. 11d., subject to the Council accepting no direct financial liability in connection with the matter.

Constable, Hart & Company, Limited, will give a maintenance guarantee in respect of the paving for a period of five years.

## Heating and Hot Water Installation.

I considered the schedule of tenders (Appendix A) received for the heating and hot water installation and gave authority for the tender of Z. D. Berry & Sons, Limited, amounting to £853 to be provisionally accepted, subject to satisfactory financial enquiries, the approval of the Board of Education and the issue of a supplementary loan sanction for £303 (being the amount of the tender in excess of the loan sanction already received) by the Ministry of Health.

I gave authority for the necessary applications to be made.

# 6.—HOLDERS HILL ROAD IMPROVEMENT—ACQUISITION OF LAND:

The following provisional settlements for the dedication of land in connection with the above improvement were approved and authority given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents:-



(i) Mr. G. Portman, in respect of "Echnont," Holders Hill Road :--

The Council shall-

#### 8.-LAND-NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD, HENDON:

With reference to the Report of the Special (Development) Committee, dated the 29th November, 1937, regarding the exchange of land with the Grand Union Canal Company, I considered a plan showing the proposal which has been agreed by the Company and the District Valuer and gave authority for an application to be made to the Ministry of Health for approval to the proposals.

#### 9.—SILK STREAM BRIDGE, EDGWARE ROAD, HENDON:

Authority was given for the completion of the Ministry of Transport Form TR. 113B in connection with the reconstruction of the bridge carrying the Edgware Road over the Silk Stream.

The estimated cost of the work is £9,185 for which the Ministry is responsible under the Trunk Roads Act.

#### 10.—THE VALE EXTENSION:

Approval was given to the submission of a scheme of one-way traffic working in the above road (where dual carriageways have been provided) to the Ministry of Transport, and for putting the work in hand on receipt of the necessary consents.

#### 11.—SIGNS ON HIGHWAYS:

Applications from the London Passenger Transport Board for the erection of signs on highways were considered, and authority given for the following, subject to the usual conditions:—

Work in connection with a pedestrian crossing and refuge in Station Road, Edgware (opposite Station Approach), will be put in hand when the necessary indication of grant has been received from the Ministry of Transport.

#### 13.—PARKING—CLAREMONT ROAD, CRICKLEWOOD:

A letter was considered from HandleyPage, Limited, regarding a piece of vacant land at the junction of Claremont Road and Midland Brent Terrace, which they desired to rent from the Council for the purposes of a parking place,

The proposal was approved, subject to the following conditions, and authority given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents:-

- (a) Handley Page, Limited, to pay a rent of £115 per annum for the privilege, exclusive of rates.
- (b) The land shall be taken for one year certain and then to be subject to six months' notice on either side.

#### 18.—PURCHASE OF TRUCK:

#### II. NORTH WESTERN CHILD GUIDANCE CLINIC

In accordance with instructions (E.C., 5/7/38, page 850) the Medical Officer reported that he had conferred with the other Authorities concerned on the question of financial aid to the above Clinic.

The following appeared in the Memorial submitted by the deputation at the last meeting:—

"The North Western Child Guidance Clinic opened in October, 1934, to provide a centre for the psychological treatment of children and young persons in the Boroughs of Hendon, Willesden, Finchley and Hampstead. The Clinic has received recognition from the three independent Boroughs, from the London County Council, and from the Middlesex County Council. Recently the Middlesex County Council has decided to refer to it all children needing treatment from its area—children from secondary and elementary schools, and boys and girls from its Juvenile Employment Bureaux."

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Of the Authorities named, only Willesden has been approached for a contribution, and they have not yet finally determined the matter. With regard to Hampstead and Finchley it would appear that they do not officially make use of the Clinic.

Close attention has been given by your Chairman and the Officers in providing Vocational Guidance and assistance to our young people with due regard not only to avenues of employment locally, but also to the opportunities afforded in the Greater London Area. The number of children interviewed at the twenty-one schools (Secondary, Central and Senior Elementary) during the year was 567 hoys and 539 girls, a total of 1,106. The number of parents accompanying the children was 629, which denotes the keen interest the parents continue to take in the future welfare of their children.

Through the efforts of the Sub-Committee the Borough Council have adopted an Apprenticeship Scheme in Horticulture and Nursery Work with a view to providing opportunities for a limited number of boys to acquire the necessary qualifications for a career either with Local Authorities or with private employers.

The Juvenile Employment Officer has visited 23 of the main industrial employers in the Borough and has effected personal contact with the Principal of each firm. During the visits the various manufacturing processes were seen and enquiries made as to the progress of the juveniles who had been placed in employment by the Bureau. The importance of this aspect of the Sub-Committee's work has long been realised and it is pleasing to note that the personal contacts effected were of an extremely co-operative and frier-fly character; thereby the effectiveness of the Bureau has been considerably increased.

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Education.

The important co-operation between the Bureau and the Juvenile Organisations and Evening Institutes in the Borough has been maintained during the year. Advice with regard to the profitable use of leisure hours was given to each school leaver during the Choice of Employment Conferences.

Under the Education Act, 1936, the compulsory school age will be raised to fifteen as from 1st September, 1939. Whilst the procedure for carrying out the provisions of the Act with regard to the issue of employment certificates has not yet been formulated by the Local Education Authority, this Sub-Committee will no doubt be called upon to play a very important part in determining whether employments are beneficial or otherwise when applications are received from intending employers. In this connection it is necessary that the Authority should know the conditions and circumstances in which children generally between fourteen and fifteen are at present employed in the area and the Juvenile Employment Officer has already commenced a comprehensive 'Survey of Occupations.'

#### Part I .- Medical Services.

#### 1.-STATISTICAL INFORMATION:

Information as to Maternity and Child Welfare Services and attendances at Health Centres was submitted for the twelve weeks ended on the 10th September, 1938, see Statistical Tables (Appendix to the report of the Finance and General Purposes Committee, page 9).

#### MIDWIVES ACTS.

#### 2-NOTIFICATIONS:

The Medical Officer reported that the number of notifications under the Midwives Acts since the last meeting was 45.

#### 3.-POST CERTIFICATE COURSES FOR MIDWIVES:

The Medical Officer submitted a report on a Memorandum from the Central Midwives Board on the above subject.

This Memorandum is explanatory of the Rules framed by the Board under Section 7 (1) of the Midwives Act, 1936, requiring midwives to attend from time to time, in accordance with the provisions of the Rules, a Course of Instruction approved by the

Section 7 (2) of the Midwives Act, 1936, requires that every local supervising authority shall provide or arrange for the provision of such courses of instruction for midwives practising in its area as may be necessary to enable those midwives to comply with the rules made by the Board under Section 7 (1) of the Act.

The Rules now framed are divided into two parts; Part I. being concerned with courses of instruction for practising midwives and Part II. with courses for non-medical supervisors of midwives.

This authority so far is only concerned with Part I. of the Rules which in brief places a duty on the authority to provide or arrange for the provision of such courses and on the practising midwife an obligation to attend.

Briefly, the Rules envisage that all midwives practising in the area shall attend a residential course of instruction extending over a period of four weeks and that all practising midwives shall attend such a course within the next seven years. The Rules come into force on the 1st January, 1939. It is desirable that an equal number of mid-



wives be selected for attendance in each of the years. Certain exemptions are made, namely, midwives approved as teachers of pupil-midwives during the period of their approval, and matrons of institutions approved by the Board for the purpose during the period of their appointments and such of the midwives on the permanent staff of such ments.

Part II. of the Rules relates to midwives who do not notify their intention to practise but who are employed by local supervising authorities as Supervisors or Assistant Supervisors of Midwives. The Courses for midwives differ in character. It is laid down that a supervisor or assistant supervisor shall attend an approved course of instruction at intervals of not longer than five years. Noted.

A communication was also **noted** from the Nursing Sisters of St. John the Divine, Deptford, in relation to the Courses in question.

#### 4.—RESPONSIBILITY OF THE MIDWIFE:

The Medical Officer reported on a Memorandum from the Midwives' Institute with regard to the responsibility of the Midwife in the Public Health Service in which he stated that the work of the Hendon Municipal Midwives is being organised in conjunction with that of the other Public Health Services, along the lines of the views expressed by the Midwives Institute. **Noted.** 

#### 5.-COUNCIL'S SCHEME:

The Medical Officer reported that the Council's Scheme had been put into operation and the five additional midwives commenced duty on August 1st.

The Borough has been divided into five areas, viz.:—Child's Hill, Central Hendon, West Hendon, Colindale and an area which includes Mill Hill and Edgware. The two local Midwives appointed by the Council are carrying on their work in Child's Hill and Central Hendon respectively. Generally speaking the work at West Hendon is being continued by Mrs. Sherman but she has been relieved of part of the area. With regard to the other three Midwives, one has been allocated for duty in Colindale, one in the Northern area and the other detailed for relief duty for the whole Borough, working in a different area each day. This arrangement provides for the off duty periods and for attendances at Ante-Natal Clinics.

Certain of the Midwives have their own transport, but where this is not the case, instructions have been given for the necessary arrangements to be made with the Borough Surveyor for transport at night after the general facilities cease to be available.

#### 6.--MATERNAL MORTALITY:

The Medical Officer referred to the setting up of the proposed Advisory Committee as suggested in Ministry of Health Circular, No. 1705 reported at the last meeting, and it was

# 11.—BARRIER RAILS, WATFORD WAY, HENDON CENTRAL:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the above barrier rails were erected by the Middlesex County Council in accordance with a scheme approved by the Minister of Transport, and are proving a substantial addition to the safety of pedestrians using this shopping area (Hi.C., 27/6/38—17).

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# 12.—CUARD RAILS, CLAREMONT ROAD:

A letter was considered from the Clitterhouse Estate Tenants' Association asking for guard rails to be erected outside the park gates in Claremont Road. The Committee, however, are of opinion that the conditions are such as not to warrant the erection of guard rails at this point.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in the matter.

# 13.—WATLING ESTATE—PARKING FACILITIES:

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had communicated with the Burnt Oak Conservative Association who are the lessees under the London County Council of the land adjacent to Barnfield Road.

The Association are prepared to lease to the Council, subject to the consent of the London County Council, a portion of their site shown on the plan submitted for an annual rental of £60, the lease to be subject to the following conditions:—

- (i) Restriction of user to that of car park.
- (ii) The lessees fencing off the property and maintaining all boundary fences in good repair.
- (iii) Such other conditions as are necessary to comply with the terms of the lease under which the Trustees hold the land.

The land in question would accommodate approximately 110 cars and with a slight amendment to the boundaries, provision could be made for approximately 150 cars. It is desirable that access should be obtained from the club entrance and not from the back road near Watling Avenue (Hi.C., 27/6/38—12).

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to negotiate with the Association and the London County Council regarding the use of the land as a car park and that the observations of the Commissioner of Police be obtained to the proposal.
- (ii) That a report be presented in due course as to the approximate cost involved in connection therewith.

## 14.—JUNCTION OF HENDON WAY WITH THE NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD:

A letter was reported from the Minister of Transport in reply to the Council's enquiry as to what progress has been made with the scheme for dealing with the traffic at the above junction (Hi.C., 27/6/38—18). The Minister states that a scheme is now under consideration by the Department which provides for carrying Hendon Way over the North Circular Road and for increasing the diameter of the central island of the roundabout.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That enquiry be made of the Minister of Transport as to when it is anticipated the work will be commenced.

# 15.—JUNCTION OF BRENT STREET WITH VICTORIA ROAD, HENDON—ONE WAY TRAFFIC WORKING:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Minister of Transport stating that it had been decided that the existing one way traffic working at the above junction should continue to operate as a permanent traffic feature, and that the Middlesex County Council had been informed accordingly. **Noted.** 

# TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNALS—PROVISION OF BOXES CONTAINING SWITCH KEY FOR USE BY POLICE:

A letter was considered from the Minister of Transport stating that representations had been received from the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis regarding the desirability of the Police having ready access to the switch key of the traffic light signals in order that in the event of a fault in the mechanism or other occurrence which may render it necessary for traffic to be temporarily controlled by the Police, they may be able to switch off the signal lights without delay. The Minister has therefore decided that boxes containing the switch key, and capable of being opened by the Police, shall be installed to the signal standards. With regard to the provision of such boxes, the Minister is prepared to meet the cost thereof from the Road Fund and any cost arising from fitting and subsequent maintenance may be included in claims for grant in respect of the maintenance of the signal installation.

In future installations similar boxes will be provided with the signals. The Minister trusts that the Council will co-operate with him in carrying out the scheme and undertake the fitting of the boxes and locks to be supplied.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the Minister be informed that the Council will be prepared to carry out the scheme and undertake the necessary work in connection therewith.

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Obefore defailed consideration of the motion, the Sinance and Beneral Purposes Committee Recommend-Ebat the following words be added to the resolution :-

# 17.—STATION ROAD, EDCWARE—HACKNEY CARRIAGE STANDING:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Commissioner of Police transmitting a copy of the regulations governing the cancellation and re-appointment of a hackney carriage standing in Station Road, Edgware. No alteration has been made in the position of the rank, but the first portion commencing at a point immediately north of the entrance to the forecourt of Edgware Underground Station, and extending northward by kerb as far as necessary for two cabs, has been made available at all hours. Noted.

# 18.—STATION ROAD, EDGWARE—PEDESTRIAN CROSSING AND REFUCE:

A letter was reported from the Middlesex County Council intimating that approval had been given to the provision of a pedestrian crossing and refuge at an estimated cost of £14 and £57 respectively, in Station Road, Edgware, opposite Station Approach. The County Council are prepared to defray a moiety of the balance of the cost of the crossing after deducting the Minister of Transport's grant, subject to the Council meeting the remainder of the cost. In connection with the provision of the refuge, approval is given subject to the Minister of Transport accepting the cost as a charge against the classification grant, and to the Council defraying the cost of lighting the central lamp. Noted.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 19.-MINISTRY OF TRANSPORT CIRCULAR NO. 518 (ROADS):

A report was submitted by the Borough Surveyor regarding Circular No. 518 (Roads) recently issued by the Minister of Transport calling attention to the provisions of Section 48 of the Road Traffic Act, 1930, regarding the use of unauthorised traffic

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above Iiddlesigns, and stating that there is an indication of a growing tendency on the part of Highway Authorities to erect or permit others to erect on or near to roads, traffic signs which are not of the prescribed type or have not been otherwise authorised. The Minister asks to be furnished, not later than the 21st October next, with a statement showing in respect of the roads for which he is the Highway Authority.

- (a) Particulars of the number and type of any unauthorised signs which have been erected since 1st January, 1934, and
- (b) What steps have been, or will be, taken for the removal of unauthorised signs and their replacement, if necessary, by signs which conform with Section 48 of the Act.

The Minister points out that permission has been given to certain organisations to supply and erect signs for Highway Authorities. This permission applies to signs indicating temporary deviations while road repairs are in progress or for use on special occasions, such as football matches, exhibitions, etc. Under Section 48 (a) the expression "traffic sign" includes all signals, warning sign-posts, direction posts, signs or other devices for the guidance or direction of persons using roads.

In the area under the control of the Council unauthorised traffic signs may be summarised as follows:—

- (a) Signs placed on lamp posts directing to railway stations, churches, and other buildings, sports clubs, etc.
- (b) A small number of special road signs, such as "Drive Slowly" erected with the authority of the Council from time to time.

If, in the opinion of the Minister, that the signs included in group (a) are traffic signs within the meaning of the Act, it will appear to be necessary to give notice to terminate all agreements and remove the signs in question. The Committee are, however, of opinion that the Minister's attention should be drawn to the advertisements particularly illuminated advertisements adjacent to the highway which are causing considerably more confusion to traffic than the small number of unauthorised direction signs.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That representations be made to the Minister on the lines above indicated.

## 20.- "DUAL CARRIAGEWAY" SIGNS:

In connection with Statutory Rules and Orders, 1938, No. 907, the Borough Surveyor reported to the effect that in future where dual carriageways are established for one-way working, it will not be necessary to make special regulations in each case. The regulations make it an offence to cause a vehicle to proceed otherwise than to the left of the island or islands in any length of road with two carriageways. It will, however, be necessary in each case to obtain the approval of the Minister to the erection of the "Dual Carriageway" Sign. **Noted.** 

# 21.—JUNCTION OF BRIDGE LANE WITH THE NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD, COLDERS CREEN:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the Temple Fortune Club regarding the refusal of the Council to allow the erection of directional signs directing the public to the club premises (Hi.C., 4/4/38—20). The Club refer to other signs in the vicinity in respect of which permission has been given and agreements entered into with the Corporation accordingly.

The Council have as a matter of principle in the case of similar applications from other sports clubs in the district refused permission.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no variation be made in the Council's previous decision in the matter.

# 22.—CAPITAL EXPENDITURE:

or two seats in this area is on the greensward of Hendon Way. RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND.—That, subject to the approval of the County

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# 37 .- SHOP BLINDS OVER FOOTPATHS:

The Chamber also refer to the erection of the R.A.C. road direction sign board in Vivian Avenue and suggest that this does not comply with the terms of the Act. The sign in question was erected with the authority of the Minister of Transport.

#### 38.-STREET ACCIDENTS:

## 39.-ANNUAL TENDER FOR SHINGLE, ETC.:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from Builders' Materials and Transport regarding the supply of shingle, sand and ballast and asked to be released from their contract.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council agree to release the Company from their contract.

## 1.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £244 15s. 6d. were approved.

### 2-SUNDAY GAMES:

(A) The Council at their meeting on the 18th July, 1938, referred back the Committee's recommendation "that Sunday Cricket be permitted in all parks and open spaces as from 11.30 a.m. and that any resolution of the Council inconsistent herewith be varied accordingly," with the reservation that such reference back was not to "affect the application of the terms of the recommendation to Mill Hill Park, Montrose Playing Fields and West Hendon Playing Fields."

The Committee have accordingly re-considered the question of playing cricket on Sundays, and now

RECOMMEND—That cricket be permitted at 11.30 a.m. on Sundays in all parks and open spaces with the following exceptions:-

Hendon Park, Queen's Road.

Mill Hill Park, adjacent to the back of the houses in Parkside.

If the above recommendation is approved by the Council, Sunday Games will be permitted as follows:-

From 9 a.m.—Tennis.

From 11.30 a.m.—Cricket, but not in Hendon Park, nor on that part of the Mill Hill Park adjacent to the houses in Parkside.

Football is not allowed in the parks on Sundays.

(The Swimming Pools are opened at 7 a.m.)

- (B) The Committee also received a letter from the Hampstead and Hendon Free Church Council urging that no further addition be granted to the existing facilities for Sunday Games.
- (6) An application was received from the Claremont Cricket Club for permission to play cricket in Clitterhouse Playing Fields on Sundays from 11.30 a.m. during the season RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application be approved. 1939.

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# 3.-CAPITAL EXPENDITURE:

Pursuant to the resolution of the Committee (E.P. & A.C., 16/5/38-2) the Borough Surveyor submitted a report on the various items of capital expenditure anticipated within the next five years.

In view of the large area of Open Spaces within the Borough the total anticipated expenditure over the period of five years cannot be considered excessive and the new works suggested, details having been carefully considered, are essential to bring the existing open spaces up to date as regards sanitation, dressing accommodation, etc., and with a view to improving the general amenities of the parks.

The following is a summary of the works anticipated during the period ending  $31\mathrm{st}$  March, 1943:—

Bowling Green, West Hendon Playing Fields.

Parking Facilities at Moat Mount and Scratchwood Open Spaces.

Contingencies, say £3,000.

To be included in Revenue Estimates for 1939/40.

Shelters-Watling Park and Clitterhouse Playing Fields.

RESOLVED — That the five year programme amounting to £62,538, plus £3,090 contingencies, together with the suggested additional items be approved and referred to the Finance and Ceneral Purposes Committee.

### 4-WATLING PARK:

Consideration was given to a letter from the Watling Association as to the desirability of appointing at least one woman park-keeper for duty in this Park.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in the matter.

# 5.—CLITTERHOUSE PLAYING FIELDS:

A letter was submitted from the Clitterhouse Estate Tenants' Association drawing attention to the lack of shelters in the above playing fields for use in inclement weather, the meagre assortment of equipment in the Children's Playground and the desirability of placing prominent notices indicating the public convenience.

The question of the shelter has already received the attention of the Committee (see Item 3).

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—

(1) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit a report to the next meeting of the Committee on the equipment provided in the Children's Playground and on any desirable additions, with a view to any necessary provision being included in the Estimates for 1939/40.  $\left(2\right)$  That the question of the provision of signs outside the public convenience be referred to the Borough Surveyor for attention.

## 6-SCRATCHWOOD OPEN SPACE:

Pursuant to instructions (E.P. & A.C., 27/6/38-6) the Town Clerk reported that there are five owners of property with gates giving access to Scratchwood Open Space. It appears that four of these owners acquired their properties after 1927 and cannot therefore claim any rights of access against the Council by restriction.

The fifth claimant, being the owner of property known as "Bays Hill Cottage" has two gates. From the gate at the bottom of his garden he claims the right of access to the Council's Open Space for the purpose of walking about. From the gate on the west side of his property he claims the right to pass over the Council's land for the purpose of carting manure from the Barnet Road to his property. It appears that this owner and his predecessors have been in possession of Bays Hill Cottage for more than thirty years and have claimed to exercise these rights. (E.P. & A.C., 27/6/38-6).

The Town Clerk suggested that steps be taken to prevent access to the Open Space by the four owners and that the rights claimed by the owner of Bays Hill Cottage be referred for further investigation and a subsequent report to the Committee.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That authority be given for the stopping up of the four entrances to the Open Space and that the rights claimed by the owner of Bays Hill Cottage be referred to the Town Clerk for a further report.

#### 7.-WOODCROFT PARK-PUBLIC CONVENIENCE:

A letter was submitted from the Ministry of Health intimating that further consideration to the Council's proposals will be given upon receipt of a list of the tenders received for the execution of the works. (E.P. & A.C., 7/2/38-3).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That an advertisement be issued inviting tenders for the erection of the convenience in Woodcroft Park.

## 8.-HENDON CROVE-FENCING:

Pursuant to instructions (E.P. & A.C., 27/6/38-5) the Borough Surveyor reported upon the deficiencies in the fencing of the boundaries of Hendon Grove and estimated that the cost of erecting six-foot wrought iron fencing on the westerly boundary and repairing the short section adjacent to the Town Hall would be approximately £300.

The matter has been before the Committee on several occasions and the Town Clerk has reported that the Council is under no liability to undertake the fencing of the (E.P. & A.C., 16/11/36-11). land in question.

The property was purchased in 1934 and the loan sanction from the Ministry of Health was given under the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929, giving authority for the purchase of the land for the benefit, improvement or development of the Borough. Upon a reference from the Council (29/6/36) to the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee to consider the question of the opening at the earliest possible moment the Estates Committee recommended (6/7/36) and the Council duly approved (27/7/36) the opening of the property to the public, its maintenance in a tidy condition by the Borough Surveyor, arrangements for the number of seats to be provided and the allocation of a park-keeper for duty.

Hendon Grove is not officially allocated as a public park or recreation ground and in the circumstances the Committee regard the question of the fencing as a matter for the consideration of the Finance and General Purposes Committee.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Finance and General Purposes

[The Finance and General Purboses Committee have deferred consideration of this matter until their next meeting.]

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# 9.-DOLLIS BROOK RIVERSIDE WALK:

A letter was received from Mr. G. J. Harrup asking whether the Council would be prepared to construct tennis courts on the section of Riverside Walk at the rear of Chanctonbury Way and Walmington Fold, and suggesting that the Council should acquire two pieces of land on either side of the junction of Lullington Garth with Chanctonbury Way for the purpose of providing facilities for games for the residents in this area.

Provision has already been made in the five years' programme for the construction of tennis courts on this section of the Riverside Walk.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That no further action be taken in the matter.

#### WOODFIELD PARK.

#### 10.-NURSERIES:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a report suggesting that the annual Chrysanthemum Show should be held at the Nurseries, Woodfield Park for two weeks commencing the 5th November. The exhibition to be open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., including Sundays.

A request was also received from the Kingsbury and Wembley Horticultural Society for the Council to enter an exhibition at the Society's Show to be held on the same date.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Annual Chrysanthemum Show be held at the Nurseries, Wood-field Park for two weeks commencing the 5th November.
- (2) That authority be given for an official Opening Ceremony by His Worship the Mayor.
- (3) That a suitable exhibit be sent to the Kingsbury and Wembley Horticultural Society's Show.

#### 11.-COTTAGES:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the contract for the erection of the two cottages at the Nurseries has now been completed and that it was proposed to let these cottages to two members of the Nurseries staff; the tenancy to commence on the 26th September. **Noted.** 

## 12-PARKS DEPARTMENT STAFF:

The Borough Surveyor reported that Mr. W. L. Parmenter and Mr. R. Joyner of the Parks Section have obtained two certificates from the Royal Horticultural Society and have also passed the preliminary examination of the Institute of Parks Administration.

RESOLVED—That a letter of congratulation be sent to Mr. Parmenter and Mr. Joyner on their success.

#### TREES.

## 13 .- WILLIFIELD WAY:

It was reported that the badly diseased trees in the section of Willifield Way from Temple Fortune to Asmuns Hill have now been removed and will, in due course, be replaced by trees of a more suitable type. A letter of appreciation of the action taken has been received from the Hampstead Garden Suburb Horticultural Society. Noted.

# 14-LABELLING:

A letter was received from the Hampstead Garden Suburb Horticultural Society suggesting the labelling of the trees bordering the roads on the Hampstead Garden

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to carry out the labelling of the trees in the usual manner.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 15-PLANTING IN STREETS:

Consideration was given to a report of the Borough Surveyor, together with a schedule of quotations received for the supply of trees required in connection with the vearly tree planting programme.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the quotation of W. C. Slocock, Ltd. be accepted.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

## 16.-LAWRENCE CARDENS, MILL HILL-PLANTING OF BULBS:

A letter was received from Mr. C. Coiley intimating that the residents of Lawrence Gardens are prepared to purchase bulbs for planting in the two shrubberies at the junction of this road with Lawrence Street. It was also suggested that the residents should arrange for the planting of these bulbs.

# 21,-STONE CROVE PARK-TENNIS COURTS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the lowest quotation received for tar-spraying the above tennis courts, namely that of Constable, Hart & Co., Ltd., amounting to £96, exceeded the sum included in the Rate Estimates for the year 1938/9 by £26.

# 21.-NEW FIRE STATION, HENDON WAY:

Pursuant to the Committee's instruction (W. & F.B.C., 17/1/38-13) the Borough Surveyor submitted preliminary plans and estimates for the erection of a new Fire Station at Hendon Way.

The lay-out plan provides for a new connecting road from Hendon Way to Claremont Road to afford a quick outlet to Cricklewood. West Hendon and The Hyde, and also to avoid traffic congestion at Brent Cross.

The Station provides accommodation for three fire engines and the water tower ladder with a clearing bay at the rear of the watchroom, battery room and men's lavatories on the ground floor. Offices, recreation room and lecture room are included on the first floor and an underground air raid shelter is also provided. The plans also show how the additional accommodation required by the Platoon System could be added in the event of this system being adopted at a future date.

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The drill yard at the rear has an area of approximately 5,000 square yards, with a drill tower 60 feet in height. The garage and workshop block has been placed at the back of the drill yard, the garage having accommodation for two ambulances, two fire tenders, one utility van and one car.

In addition, stores, hose room, gas room and boiler house are provided.

The accommodation for the staff and appliances is as follows:-

- 1. Chief Officer's house facing Hendon Way.
- 2. Second Officer's house adjoining the Station.
- 3. Firemen's houses (40 in all) on each side of the new road with a short cul-de-sac off this road (30 houses included in estimate).

The Borough Surveyor's estimate of the cost of these proposals is as follows:-

### 25.—BYE-LAWS—NEW STREETS:

The Borough Surveyor reported as to the necessity for adopting the new bye-laws dealing with new streets. It is suggested that the Ministry of Health's model bye-laws be adopted with the necessary amendments to make it comply with conditions in this district, and in conformity with the Hendon Planning Schemes which provide for a standard width of 50 feet and gives a schedule of modifications of this width which may be adopted in certain cases. The modifications given in the byelaws will not therefore apply as these are automatically repealed by Clause 71 of the Hendon Planning Schemes. The main bye-law will, therefore, provide for a 50 feet road. With regard to streets which form a secondary means of access, it is suggested that the bye-law shall provide for a minimum width of 24 feet with a carriageway of 16 feet. ### 1.-EMERGENCY MEASURES:

Reports were submitted by the Town Clerk, Borough Engineer, Medical Officer of Health and the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade on the measures taken by them under the Air Raid Precautions Scheme to deal with the present emergency.

### 2-ASSEMBLY AND DISTRIBUTION OF RESPIRATORS:

The Town Clerk reported that pursuant to instructions received from the Home Office through the Middlesex County Council to obtain temporary storage accommodation for civilian respirators, the first floor of Messrs. Batty's new repository in Belle Vue Road, Brent Street, Hendon, had been rented for a period of one year on terms approved by the County Council, and that upon the receipt of instructions to assemble and distribute the respirators, the necessary action had been taken with the help of voluntary labour organised by the Air Raid Wardens' Association, and the respirators fitted and issued from 32 Stations—mostly school premises—throughout the Borough.

### 3.-TRENCHES AND SHELTERS:

The Borough Engineer reported upon the organisation under his control, and the work carried out or in progress in connection with the provision of trench shelters. A list of the sites where trenches are being provided is set out hereunder:—

### 4.—FIRST AID POSTS AND CASUALTY CLEARING HOSPITALS:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that pending the final approval by the Middlesex County Council and the Home Office of First Aid Posts, and the carrying out of the adaptation works, emergency arrangements had been made to use the following premises:—

Child's Hill Clinic. Central Hendon Clinic. West Hendon Clinic. Mill Hill Clinic. Burnt Oak Clinic. West Hendon Slipper Baths. Child's Hill Slipper Baths.

In addition, two mobile units had been assembled to operate immediately in any suitable premises obtainable in the Edgware and Golders Green areas. In this connection, the Committee gave instructions for St. Andrew's Church Hall, Broadfields Avenue,

Edgware, to be used as a temporary first aid post, and also the Golders Green Branch Library or St. Michael's Church Hall, the selection of the premises to be used to be left to the discretion of the Medical Officer of Health and the Borough Engineer.

### 5.-FIRST AID AND CASUALTY PERSONNEL:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that over 50 medical practitioners in the Borough had volunteered their services and that considerable assistance had been received from the St. John Ambulance Brigade and the British Red Cross Society who had placed the whole of their organisation and personnel at the Council's disposal. In addition, the members of the medical and nursing staff of the Public Health Department had volunteered their services, and a large number of trained and untrained persons had also offered their services to the Council. The personnel available was sufficient to enable an emergency scheme to be put into operation immediately.

To deal with the untrained personnel, abbreviated courses in First Aid and Anti-Gas measures were prepared and training immediately commenced.

CASUALTY CLEARING HOSPITAL—ISOLATION HOSPITAL.

### 6.-EVACUATION OF PATIENTS:

The Isolation Hospital was cleared as far as practicable to provide accommodation for 70 casualty cases, and notices were sent to all medical practitioners requesting them to apply for admission to the Isolation Hospital only for such cases as could not reasonably be nursed at home.

### 7 .- SURGICAL EQUIPMENT:

On the report of the Medical Officer of Health as to the necessity for the provision of surgical instruments for use at the Isolation Hospital which was to be used as a Casualty Clearing Hospital, the Committee, as a matter of urgency, authorised the Medical Officer of Health to purchase a complete set of surgical intruments for use at the hospital.

[N.B.—In view of instructions received from the Middlesex County Council subsequent to the meeting of the Committee, no steps have been taken to purchase the surgical equipment referred to above.]

### 8.-DRESSINGS, ETC.:

It was reported that the necessary additional stocks of dressings, etc., had been obtained to meet the anticipated requirements of all sections of the casualty service.

### AUXILIARY FIRE SERVICE.

### 9.-UNIFORMS:

The Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade reported that in view of the great increase in the number of auxiliary fire service volunteers at present in training, it was necessary to provide further overalls and uniforms.

As a matter of urgency, the Committee authorised the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade to purchase the requisite clothing and equipment for a further 100 volunteers.

### 10.-FIRE EQUIPMENT:

The Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade was authorised to purchase 30 standpipes and 30 keys and bars in order to complete his equipment to deal with an emergency on a skeleton basis.

### 11.- MEETINGS OF COMMITTEE:

It was decided that during the emergency, meetings of the Committee should be held weekly, or more frequently if considered desirable by the Chairman.







Thanks are also due to many of our permanent staff. engaged in all branches of the organisation, but in spite of the burdens which they willingly shouldered, involving long hours of extra duty, there is no evidence to show that the general administration of the Council's many public services was in any way neglected during the crisis,

The immense amount of work which has been so successfully carried out will not, although we are in more happy times, be lost to the Borough -indeed great headway has been made with the Scheme for protection against air attack, and it will be for the Committee to make the most of the present position and push forward to a completion of their arrangements. It would be invidious for me to mention by name any persons in particular, but my observations during the period in question leaves a happy and appreciative memory of many individuals.

During the whole of the time that I have known her I have admired her calm judgment and pertinacity of purpose. I well remember her advocacy of the Library movement. She was responsible for the adoption of the Libraries Act in Hendon and did yeoman service as Chairman of the Libraries Committee from 1923-1930. While others were hexitant she went forward with a singleness of purpose and the Library services of Hendon owe more to Alderman (Mrs.) Bannister than to any other inhabitant of the Borough.

Her sphere of usefulness did not, however, end there, and while I do not propose to detail the various Committees which benefited from her labours, I feel that I must mention one—the Education Committee. Above all else Alderman (Mrs.) Bannister is an educationalist in its widest and best sense. That may perhaps be regarded as her life's work and we all know how well she has carried it out.

In 1932 she was elected an Alderman of the newly constituted Borough—an indication of the esteem in which she was held by all her colleagues. We cannot fail to receive her resignation with feelings of profound regret but it is gratifying to know that we may yet enjoy the advantage of her sound advice and long experience in matters relating to education."
