INFORMATION

The County Series Maps represent a district at 1:2500 or 25 inches to the mile, or 40cm to the Kilometre. If you were in a balloon it would be like being 800 metres (half a mile), above ground. Each sheet shows an area 1.5 miles west to east and 1-mile north to south. 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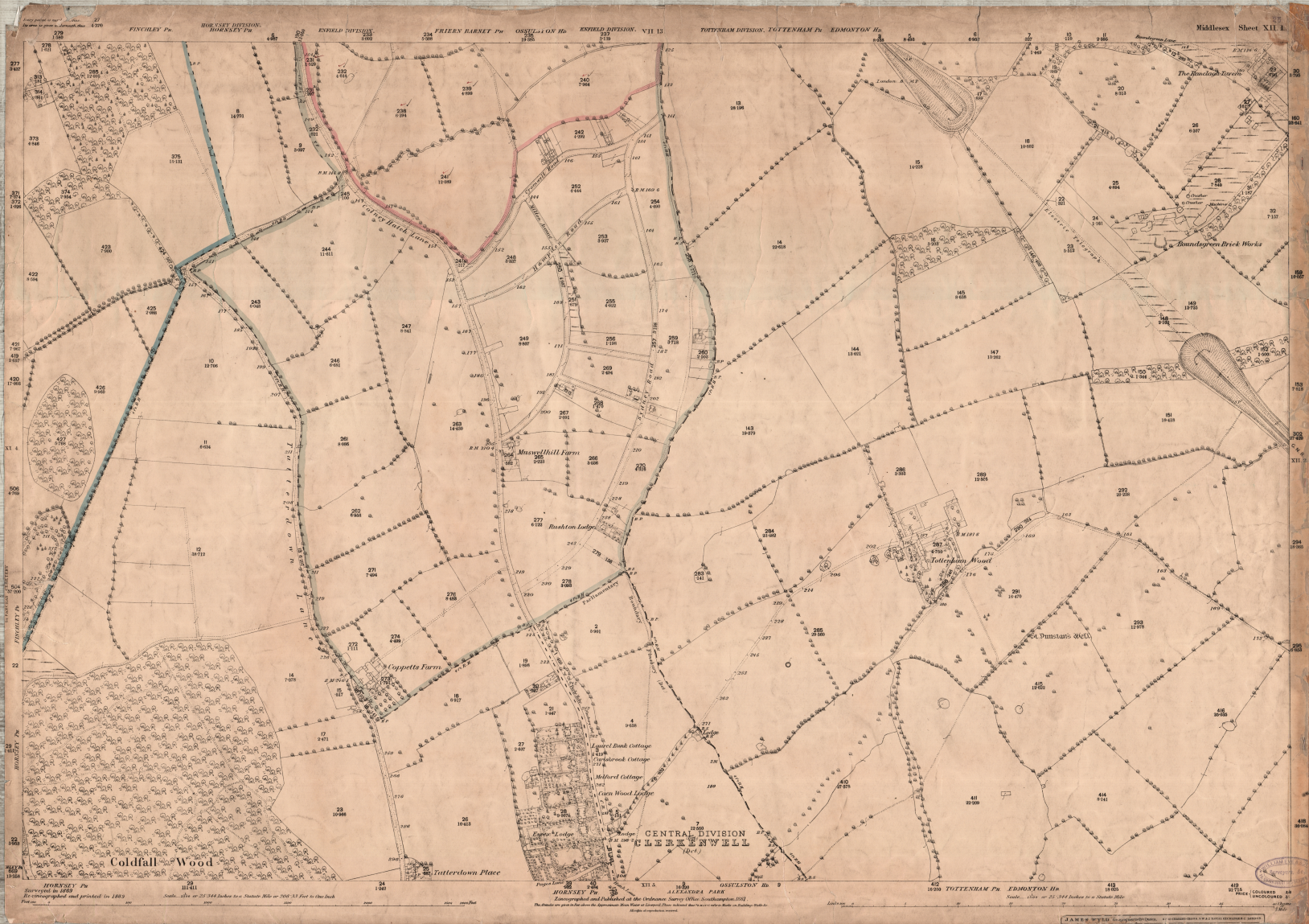

Altitudes of Beach Marks and surface heights are given in Feet above the mean level of the sea at NEWLIN, and are based on the new primary instrumenting of 1912-13. The figures refer to the absolute Ellipsoid datum, and to the figures shown on [F. 32]. [Note that the figure applies to this plan only and is only approximately to 0-1 ft.]

Altitudes indicated here (B.M. & P.F.F.) refer to bench marks on buildings, walls, etc. These marked (1.) preceded or followed by the height refer to surface levels.

Note:—To convert Decimal parts of an Area into Rods and Fathoms, multiply by 4; this will give Rods and Decimals of a Rod, multiply this Decimal by 40; thus obtaining Rods and Decimals of a Perch.

N.B.—The representation on this map of a Road, Track, or Footpath, is no evidence of the existence of a right of way.
