PLEASE MAKE SURE OF YOUR VOTE

Now is the time for you to ensure that your name appears in the next Register of Electors to be published on 15th February, 1970, and to check this when the Registers are on deposit during the period 28th November to 16th December, 1969, at the Council Offices, principal post offices and libraries.

A new Act of Parliament has reduced the minimum voting age from 21 to 18 and also enables persons to be registered and to vote at elections held on or after the date on which they reach voting age. For this purpose, if a person reaches voting age during the currency of the Register (16th February, 1970 to the 15th February, 1971), the date of his or her 18th birthday is entered in the Register and he or she can vote from that date.

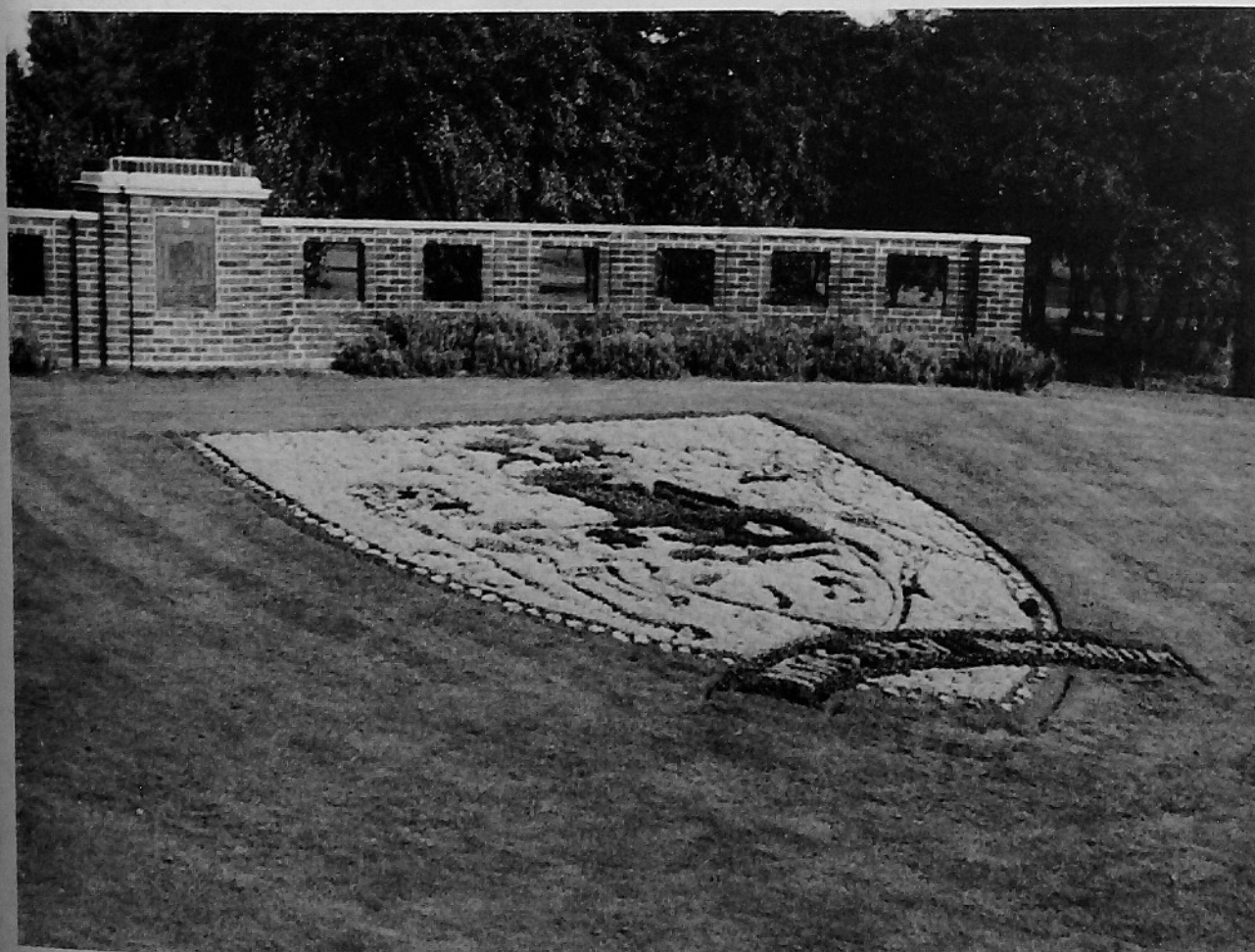
All householders in the London Borough of Barnet should have received, during a period commencing 12th September, 1969, a buff-coloured 'Form A' which should be completed as soon as possible, in any event on or before 10th October, 1969, and returned to the Town Clerk, as Electoral Registration Officer, at the Town Hall, Hendon, London, N.W.4. This is an annual procedure, because the Register of Electors is revised every year.

When completing this form, the notes printed on the left-hand for your guidance should be carefully studied and special care should be taken to ensure that the appropriate columns in Part 2 of the form are completed giving information as to whether a resident is 18 or over by the 16th February, 1970, or will be 18 after the 16th February, 1970 and on or before the 15th February, 1971.

Each year when the 'Forms A' are sent, you must be sure to see that your name is included, or you may not be registered in the new list, and will be unable then to vote.

Shortly after the First World War Councillor Jobbins was engaged by a firm of merchant bankers which, within a few years, went bankrupt and Councillor Jobbins found himself redundant. He then chose to become a speculative builder and eventually established his position in this field.

He was the first Chairman of the Barnet and District Branch of the Federation of Master Builders and was appointed to the London Regional Council and became London Regional President.

Cllr. Jobbins became interested in local government through the East Barnet Ratepayers Association and although he has always been a Conservative in National Politics, was elected to the East Barnet U.D.C. as an Independent Candidate for the Hadley Ward in 1946. He was appointed to represent the Council on the London Accident Prevention Council, eventually becoming Chairman of that body and is now a Vice-President.

As a member of the East Barnet Council Cllr. Jobbins served on most of the Committees and was elected Chairman of the Council in 1958. He was appointed to many charities and is now Chairman of the Jesus Hospital Charity, the Eleanor Palmer Charity and the Byford Charity. He was also appointed to the Barnet and District Record Society, now the Barnet and District Local History Society, which administers the Barnet Museum, and is the present Chairman.

EDUCATION—1969

"It wasn't like that when I was at school." This kind of comment is often heard nowadays when schools try out new ideas intended to give their pupils an added interest in their studies.

The Alder Secondary Boys' School at East Finchley is pioneering in work of this kind. Although they live inland many Finchley youngsters are attracted by the present-day enthusiasm for activities on water.

Alder School provides groups of pupils with the opportunity of learning canoeing, sailing and the handling of larger vessels in addition to all the complex lore of the seaman that is so necessary if safety is to be maintained. What better school subject for an island nation than 'Nautical Studies'?

So that these activities can have a sound basis of discipline the work of each Nautical Studies Class is integrated with the activities of the School's Sea Cadet Detachment.

Some people might think that this is just another form of recreation or an out of school activity. This is not the case at all. The structure of the Certificate of Secondary Education has made it possible for pupils to sit for the examination at this level in 'Nautical Studies'. This takes place at the end of the School Course and means that enthusiasm for a hobby becomes enthusiasm for a school subject and pupils who may not always be keen on the more traditional school subjects such as 'English', 'Mathematics' or 'History' realise the need for them when they have to write up a log or plot a course on a chart, or study the development of the sailing ship. A high standard is set and a pupil must not fall below this standard if he is to remain on the course.

Apart from the obvious benefits the greatest contribution of this educational venture has perhaps been the development of qualities such as confidence, self-discipline and endurance in the boys taking part, especially during the periods of practical instruction on the waters of the upper and lower Thames.

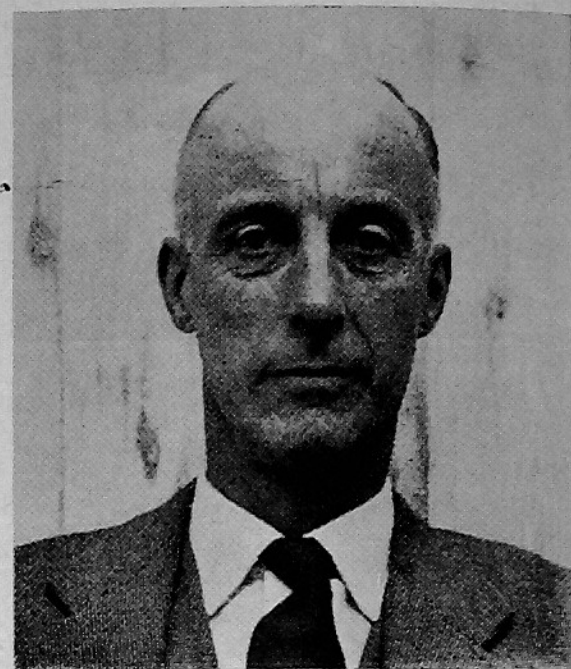

Councillor Tangye has been a resident within the present Borough boundaries for over 50 years and has lived in Whetstone since 1934. He was educated at Finchley School.

It was in 1953 that he was first elected a Councillor to serve on the Friern Barnet Urban District Council as a member for the North Ward, which covered the Oakleigh Park Area. He was appointed Chairman of that Authority in 1958 and served in that capacity for two years, continuing as a member until the amalgamation of the district to form the London Borough of Barnet. In those years he served on all the Committees of the District Council.

Councillor Tangye has been a member of the Barnet London Borough Council since its formation and has served on many of its Committees. At the present time he is a member of the Building and Town Planning Committee, the Grahame Park and Burnt Oak Developments and is Chairman of the Western Division of the Town Planning Committee and Appeals Committee.

He serves on the Board of Governors of the Barnet College of Further Education and several secondary schools and he is on the Board of Managers of a group of junior schools.

For several years he was a Trustee of Alexandra Palace and since the control of Alexandra Palace has passed to the Greater London Council, he has been the Borough Representative on the Committee appointed by that Authority to control the affairs of Alexandra Palace.

He is a Justice of the Peace and serves on the Highgate Bench. By profession he is a Chartered Surveyor.

Councillor Mrs. Ena Constable, J.P., has been a lifelong resident of Friern Barnet. She was educated at Southgate County School and from there joined the staff of the Bank of England, retiring in 1952 after 27 years' service "to do a little voluntary work and enjoy leisurely pursuits". In 1941 she was married to the youngest son of former Friern Barnet Councillor, Mr. G. H. Constable, at All Saints' Church in Friern Barnet where she has been a lifelong member and a sidesman for the last thirty years.

The first woman candidate to be adopted by the Conservative party, Councillor Mrs. Constable was elected by the East Ward to the Friern Barnet Urban District Council in 1954. In the ensuing years she held the Chairs of the Housing Committee (8 years), the Education Committee (6 years), Finance and Parks Committees (2 years on each), and that of the governing body of the Friern Barnet County School. In 1956, Councillor Mrs. Constable became the Chairman of the Council, the first (and only) woman to hold this office which she did for two years. Three years later she was appointed a magistrate for the Highgate Division and subsequently was elected a member of the Juvenile Panel.

With the reorganisation of local government in 1964, Councillor Mrs. Constable was elected by Friern Barnet West Ward to the London Borough of Barnet. Two years later when the then Councillor L. G. Snelling was elected Mayor of the Borough, she accepted his invitation to become Mayoress during his term of

TOWN PLANNING IN BARNET

An exhibition is being held in the Church Farm House Museum, Church End, Hendon, from Saturday, 18th October to Sunday, 23rd November, 1969.

It shows with photographs and maps some of the changes that have taken place over the last 50 years together with plans which at present guide the development of the Borough. It also explains in graphic form samples of the surveys and studies needed for the preparation of town centre schemes, landscape conservation areas, urban redevelopment schemes and the local development plan.

World Town Planning Day occurs during the exhibition on the 8th November, 1969.

It was initiated in 1950 to provide an opportunity to co-ordinate the dissemination of ideas on town planning and to bring to the notice of people its aims and achievements. Each year a country is chosen as the national centre of events and Great Britain was the country selected in 1965 under the Presidency of Sir Frederick Osborn. This year Japan fulfils the role.

HOW TO DISPOSE OF THAT OLD CAR

Under the Civic Amenities Act, 1967, it became an offence to dump old vehicles, or other junk, anywhere "in the open air". For a first offence the fine can be up to £100 with a maximum penalty rising to three months imprisonment and/or a fine of £200 for a second offence.

Unwanted cars and other motor vehicles can be taken to certain depots in most areas where they will be accepted for disposal, free of charge. The registration books must also be handed over at the same time and owners must sign an indemnity certificate transferring ownership to the Greater London Council.

Times when vehicles may be accepted:

Mon. to Thur. — 7.30 a.m. - 4.30 p.m.
Friday — 7.30 a.m. - 3.30 p.m.
Saturday — 7.30 a.m. to 11.0 a.m.

The Council will, upon request and the receipt of the remittance of the appropriate amount, and the registration book, remove the vehicle at a charge of £2 if towable, or £3 if trailer has to be used.

Drivers should beware, however, not to dump the unwanted vehicle outside the council refuse depot as vehicles so left could be regarded as abandoned, and in this event the owner would then be liable to the above-mentioned penalties.

Councillor Sharman, who is a Partner in a hundred-year-old firm of consulting civil engineers, was first elected as a representative for the Garden Suburb Ward on the former Hendon Borough Council in 1959. Except for the municipal year 1962/3 he has continuously represented the ward of that name on the Hendon and Barnet Borough Councils ever since, having been elected four times.

In his nine years of Council work he has served on all the major committees, but his principal contribution has been in the spheres of development and of traffic planning. For four years he was Chairman of the Development and Research Committee, and he is at present Chairman of the West Hendon Development Committee and of the Central Division Sub-Committee of the Building and Town Planning Committee. He is also Vice Chairman of the Governing Body of the Hendon College of Technology and a member of the Hampstead Garden Suburb Institute Council.

In his work as a professional engineer he has been concerned with projects in many exotic parts of the world; he has published a number of technical papers and is a member of several learned societies and professional bodies. He has also been much involved in the events which led to the setting up of the Commission on the Third London Airport. Locally, he is a persistent Conservative and a member of the Hampstead Garden Suburb Residents' Association.

His wife is active in the National Council of Women, and his three children are active.

HISTORIC BUILDINGS OF BARNET



"WYLDES", HAMPSTEAD WAY

A house has stood on this site since the thirteenth century when the land formed part of the endowment of St. James' Leper Hospital, subsequently transferred to Eton College. The house now existing is not original. Its

central section of weatherboarded timber construction was built in the early part of the seventeenth century, and has been known at various times as Home Farm, Collins Farm (after a former occupier), and Heath Farm. In

1820 a brick barn was erected on the north-east side. This has recently been converted to a separate dwelling.

John Linnell, the painter, occupied the house in 1824 when it was the meeting place of many young avant-garde artists and writers of the day, including William Blake. Later in the century visitors included Charles Dickens, Ford Maddox Brown and George Bernard Shaw.

The house was given its present name at the beginning of this century. In 1906, it became the home of Sir Raymond Unwin, the architect and town planner, who was commissioned by Dame Henrietta Barnett to design and supervise the building of Hampstead Garden Suburb. He lived in the house until his death in 1940.

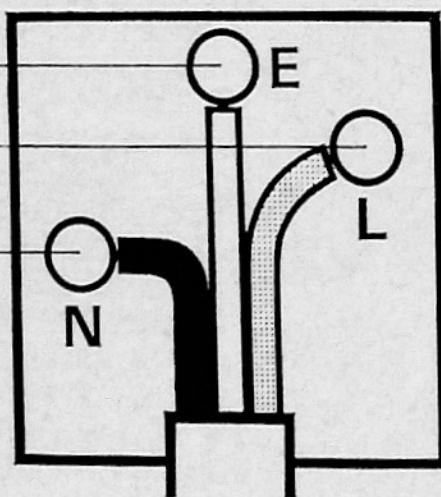

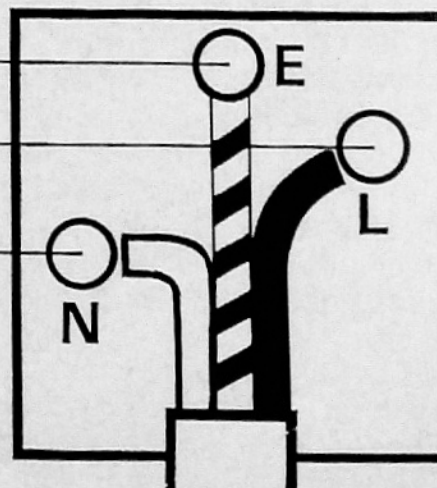

LIBRARY LECTURES

The season of Library Lectures commences on Wednesday, 15th October, when a lecture entitled "Return to India" will be given by Douglas Dickens at Burnt Oak Library, Orange Hill Road, Burnt Oak. Mr. Dickens, a professional photographer specialising in travel photography, is a Fellow of the Royal Photographic Society. He spent his childhood in the India of the British Raj, and also served there for three years during the war. He visited India again during the winter of 1967/68, travelling overland and spending several months touring India and Nepal.

The following lecture will be held at Hendon Central Library, The Burroughs, Hendon, N.W.4, on Thursday, 30th October, and will be given by mountaineer Michael Westmacott, who was a member of the 1953 Everest Expedition. He will talk on "Peaks and Passes in Chitral."

office. Councillor Mrs. Constable serves on many committees. She is Chairman of the Carnival and Shows Committee, Vice-Chairman of the Education Committee, Chairman of the Schools and Special Services Sub-Committee, a member of the Appointments, Further Education, Youth Service, Youth Employment and the Joint Consultative Council Sub-Committees and a member of the Children's Committee, Child Care Sub-Committee and the Policy Advisory Committee. Past Committees on which she has served include Housing and Finance.

In addition, she is a member of the governing body of the following education establishments: Barnet College of Further Education (Chairman of Governors). Woodhouse and Friern Barnet County Schools (Vice-Chairman of Governors), Friern Barnet grouped primary schools (Chairman of the Managers) and the College of Speech and Drama. She is also the Borough Representative on Haberdashers' Askes' schools, City of London University Governors, Marriage Guidance Council and the Lawrence Campe Almshouses Trust.
