

#### REPORT OF THE TOWN CLERK. GROUPING OF COMMITTEES.

Pursuant to the Resolution passed by the Town Council on the 23rd September, 1940 (Group II. Committee-2/9/40-24), directing me to report on any desirable re-distribution of the functions of the Standing Committees as between the existing Groups I, and II. Committees, I submit the following report.

During the past year the Standing Committees of the Council (with the exception of the Education, Finance and General Purposes, and Rating and Valuation Committees) have been grouped as follows, each section comprised within the respective Groups appointing its own Chairman:-

#### Group I.

Public Health and Medical Services Libraries Housing Works and Fire Brigade

#### Group II.

Highways Buildings and Town Planning Estates, Parks and Allotments. This grouping has, in the main, operated in a smooth and satisfactory manner, the only occasion on which any real difficulty was experienced, owing to a late sitting of Group I. Committee, being when the Group Committees followed a somewhat protracted meeting of the Council and the Committees did not commence until after 7.30 p.m. Having regard to this, Members may desire to consider as to whether any change is really desirable, particularly having regard to the fact that the Members of the Sections comprised in each Group have become familiar with the problems relative to such Sections.

The three Sections which occupy the most time are Public Health and Medical Services, Works and Fire Brigade and Highways, and if Members are still of the opinion that some alteration is necessary, it could only be effected by transferring, say, the Buildings and Town Planning to Group I. Committee, and Works and Fire Brigade or Public Health and Medical Services to Group II., and that in any case would still leave two of the heavy Committees in one Group. It would not appear, therefore, that any improvement would be effected by such alteration.

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

# PUBLIC HEALTH AND MEDICAL SERVICES.

# Part I .- Medical Services.

# 2.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936 (PART VII.)—CHILD LIFE PROTECTION:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on applications (Case Nos. 297 and 298) for permission to undertake for reward the nursing and maintenance of children under nine years of age apart from their parents.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the maximum number of foster children under the age of nine years that may be kept at the premises be fixed at one in each case.

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# 3.—EDUCATION IN FOOD VALUES:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on Ministry of Health Circular No. 2171 which invites all Welfare Authorities to give full support to the Food Education movement as a regular part of their work, using their facilities to the utmost for promoting its objects.

The Minister of Health believes that the personal contacts established by Medical Officers and Health Visitors in the course of their ordinary duties are the most effective means of imparting knowledge of food and nutrition to the public and he is anxious that full use should be made of these opportunities.

The circular also suggests that by arrangement with the Local Education Authority a short preparatory course of instruction could no doubt be given to Health Visitors if considered helpful, and also arrangements made for the exhibition of posters and the distribution of leaflets at the Health Centres.

The Committee are informed that the Welfare Services have always devoted much attention to the importance of promoting sound nutrition. The Medical Officer of Health has, however, interviewed a representative of the Ministry of Food, and he is arranging for publicity to be given in this area on cooking and food values.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council as the Welfare Authority cooperate in the Food Education Movement on the lines indicated in the Ministry of Health circular.

# 4.—DAY NURSERY—WATLING ESTATE:

Arising out of the application made to the Minister of Health for an indication as to whether he would be prepared to consent to the provision of a Day Nursery on the Watling Estate in existing circumstances (P.H. and M.S.C., 7/10/40—5) a letter was submitted from the Ministry of Health stating that in view of the present restrictions on capital expenditure and the shortage of materials, the Minister would not be prepared to agree to the erection of a new building for the purpose of the establishment of a Day Nursery. The Ministry, however, enquire whether it would be possible to secure an existing building for the purpose which could be adapted if necessary, and state that if it would be of assistance to the Council an interview could be arranged at which the matter could be discussed.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that a house on the Watling Estate which might be suitable had that day been brought to his notice but that it had not been possible to make an inspection of the interior of the premises.

RESOLVED—That the Chairman, Councillor Connell, and the Medical Officer of Health consider as to suitable premises capable of adaptation for the purpose of a Day Nursery, and that arrangements be made as soon as practicable for an interview with the Ministry of Health.

### 5.—NATIONAL DRIED MILK:

A letter was submitted from the Enfield Urban District Council invoking the Council's support to representations which that Authority had made to the Minister of Food and Minister of Health for an improvement in the standard of the dried milk to be supplied to infants under one year of age under the National Milk Scheme outlined in Ministry of Health Circular No. 2109.

After considering the report of the Medical Officer of Health on the matter, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND.—That the Council support the representations put forward by the Enfield Urban District Council.

# 6.-MIDDLESEX COUNTY COUNCIL ACT, 1934-PART VII.:

Licensing of Massage Establishments—Byelaws.

A letter was submitted from the Secretary of State, Home Office, intimating that he was not prepared, for the reasons indicated in his letter, to allow Byelaws Nos. 4 and 5 of the Draft Byelaws approved by the Council on the 18th March last (P.H. & M.S.C., 4/3/40—2) for the regulation of licensed establishments for massage or special treatment.

The Byelaws to which exception is taken are as follows:--

- A licensed person shall not advertise that either he or the establishment is licensed by the Council, nor shall be exhibit such licence on any part of such premises.
- 5. A licensed person shall not advertise in a public thoroughfare or a public convenience or conveyance or in any place in which the public assemble, any massage or special treatment carried on at the establishment.

The Committee are of opinion that the reasons underlying the making of the two Byelaws in question justify their retention, and they accordingly

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That further representations be made to the Secretary of State, Home Office, with a view to Byelaws Nos. 4 and 5 being allowed.

# 7.—APPOINTMENT OF ASSISTANT MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH AND ASSISTANT SCHOOL MEDICAL OFFICER:

It was reported that Dr. K. M. Bodkin had tendered her resignation on confirmation of her appointment to the School Medical Staff of the Birmingham City Council, and that applications for the appointment of a successor were due to be received on the 4th December.

# 9.—ST. MARY'S NURSING HOME-46 AND 89, SUNNY GARDENS ROAD:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that No. 89, Sunny Gardens Road is not at present being used as part of St. Mary's Nursing Home and that the conditions of registration required amendment.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the number of patients to be taken at No. 46, Sunny Cardens Road be limited to six medical, surgical or maternity, and that the conditions of registration under the Public Health Act, 1936, be amended accordingly.

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# 10.—NURSING HOME—2, THE PARK, GOLDERS GREEN:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that owing to war conditions the accommodation at the above Nursing Home had been re-arranged so as to accommodate the patients on the lower floor. The Home is at present registered for three maternity and four other cases, but under the re-arrangement there is sufficient accommodation for two maternity and general patients in the small room and four maternity or five medical or surgical cases in the larger room.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the conditions of registration be amended accordingly.

# Part III .- Public Health.

### 13.—WATER SUPPLIES:

At the last meeting of the Committee the Medical Officer of Health was instructed to ascertain from the Metropolitan Water Board and the Colne Valley Water Company as to the steps being taken by them to guard against the risk of infection of water supplies and as to the steps, if any, the Council should take in the matter.

Subsequent to the Committee's direction the Ministry of Health issued a circular (No. 2172) on the subject. Whilst the circular principally concerns water undertakers, and indicates certain precautions which should be taken during repairs to water mains against the risk of pollution of the supply, it states:—

"If, notwithstanding all precautions, there is at any time reason to suppose that the supply may have become unsafe, or if, owing to enemy action, the damage to works or mains is so intensive and the interruption of supply is so serious that consumers are likely to resert to casual water from rivers, streams, ponds, etc., the consumers in the particular localities affected should be immediately warned to boil all water for drinking and culinary use until further notice. Where the water undertaking is not managed by the local sanitary authority it is advisable to keep in touch with that authority through its Medical Officer of Health and to acquaint him with, or concert with him, the arrangements for giving this warning should the need arise."

The Medical Officer of Health reported on letters received from the Metropolitan Water Board and the Colne Valley Water Company and on his interview with the Chief Engineer of the latter Company, from which it appears that both undertakers have in operation very comprehensive methods for guarding against water pollution.

On the point mentioned in the circular from the Ministry of Health that owing to serious interruption of the water supply consumers are likely to resort to easual water from rivers, streams, ponds, etc., the Metropolitan Water Board suggest that the public should be informed through the A.R.P. Warden organisation that such water is unsafe to drink unless boiled, whereas the water supplied by the Board, whether by pipes or by earts, is safe to drink unless they receive information to the contrary.

The Colne Valley Water Company ask the Council to assist them to prevent the infiltration of sewage into a water main through damage caused by bombs, by being given details, with a minimum of delay after an "incident," regarding the position and depth of the sewer and an opinion as to whether it is fractured; and also by arranging through the Wardens, or some similar organisation, for assistance to be given to the Company's staff in the distribution of warning notices to consumers.

The Medical Officer of Health points out that should the water supply become infected, a community immunised against typhoid would suffer much less than a non-immunised community, but the Ministry of Health does not consider mass immunisation of the population is advisable at the present time, but that extensive immunisation in a particular area might well be desirable in the face of special risks of infection.

The Council have already authorised the Medical Officer of Health to provide facilities for immunisation against typhoid for persons desiring such treatment, and in addition the Medical Officer is in process of immunising as many of the Hospital Staff as wish to be immunised as it is possible that in the course of their work they will have to deal with cases of typhoid fever, some of which may not be diagnosed. The Medical Officer of Health has also obtained supplies of the immunising agent for the staff at the Redhill County Hospital.

The Committee are informed that the London County Council are extending immunisation on a voluntary basis to their firemen as it has been found that there has been a tendency on their part, whilst attending fires, to drink water drawn from doubtful sources. The Medical Officer of Health is of opinion that immunisation could with advantage be offered to all A.R.P. personnel and members of the Fire Brigade and Auxiliary Fire Service.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—

- (a) That the Council co-operate with the Metropolitan Water Board and the Colne Valley Water Company on the lines indicated and that the arrangements for effecting such co-operation be settled between the Medical Officer of Health and the A.R.P. Controller;
- (b) That the Council approve of voluntary immunisation being given to the Civil Defence Personnel and the members of the Fire Services and that the Medical Officer of Health be instructed to bring the facilities available to the notice of the personnel concerned through the heads of the respective services.

# 14.—AIR RAID SHELTERS AND PUBLIC HEALTH:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted the following memorandum:-

# MEMORANDUM ON THE HEALTH ASPECTS OF THE SHELTER PROBLEM.

New public health problems have been created by the form which aerial warfare has taken, resulting in considerable numbers of people using the shelters as dormitories, while these were actually constructed for raids of short duration.

This Memorandum has been written for the information of the Public Health and Medical Services Committee as there is much uninformed comment on the risks of epidemic diseases arising from this source, and while these risks are quite real it is important that the Committee should be in a position to assess them at their true value.

This Memorandum, while having a general application, is written with particular regard to the conditions existing in Hendon.

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oolitan Chief ave in The diseases which are likely to become more prevalent as a result of the present use of shelters are those which are spread by droplet infection, that is infection carried from person to person in the act of speaking, coughing, laughing, etc. As far as adults are concerned the two diseases most likely to increase in incidence are influenza and the common cold. As regards children, the same diseases with the addition of any of the acute diseases of children with a special stress on diphtheria, measles and whooping cough, and in this connection it is, in my opinion, very unfortunate that there has been a reduction in the number of beds available for the isolation of infectious diseases, particularly as many parents who previously could have isolated a child at home now wish to make use of shelters.

One of the most serious diseases of childhood which may manifest itself is cerebro spinal fever as this disease is definitely connected with overcrowded and badly ventilated sleeping conditions, and, in fact, an institutional outbreak can be terminated by as simple a method as placing the beds further apart. Tuberculosis is another disease which may be spread by chronic cases in an infectious condition, especially if the sufferer is not scrupulously careful about the disposal of his sputum. These and other chronic sick should, of course, have been evacuated from the congested areas.

One point emerges and that is that all the diseases likely to show a serious increase in incidence as a result of shelter life are those which are spread by droplet infection, and the following recommendations are the principal measures likely to minimise this:—

- 1. Prevention of overcrowding.
- 2. Provision of adequate ventilation.

This is a matter of primary importance as the incidence of all diseases carried by droplet infection is markedly increased in stagnant atmospheres.

3. Provision of heating.

This, while desirable, would require careful regulation unless adequate ventilation be maintained as an over-heated stagnant atmosphere is the ideal one for the propagation of disease by droplet infection. Much could be done by the individual using hot water bottles.

- 4. Regular washing down of the interior of public shelters, using for this purpose a weak antiseptic solution, and the daily cleansing, emptying and re-charging of changing cleans.
- 5. Spraying at intervals during the night with a weak antiseptic solution, preferably one of the hypochlorites as these are volatile and therefore disseminate more rapidly. How far this will be effective in reducing the bacterial content of the air is not yet clearly defined but much research is being done and the Horder Committee may have concrete recommendations to make as a result.
- 6. The wearing of masks.

This is, of course, the best method of preventing droplet infection, and is very effective in reducing the incidence of such diseases as influenza amongst those who have to nurse them. It is, however, unlikely that it will ever be adopted on a large scale, though an effort might be made to encourage people suffering from severe colds and influenza to adopt this method, especially if the masks were provided free.

- 7. When bunks are installed instructions should be given that people in opposite bunks sleep head to feet and not facing each other.
- 8. Prohibiting clothing and other material being left in the shelters. These should be taken home and aired and periodically cleansed, otherwise they will interfere with the cleansing of the shelters and may become verminous. Arrangements can be made for the inspection of any articles suspected of being verminous and for their disinfestation if this is confirmed.
- Immunisation against diphtheria of as many children as possible. On the 5th
  February, 1940, in anticipation of the situation I recommended an increase in prepaganda concerning diphtheria immunisation, with the result that many more children
  are now being immunised,

Pinally, there are other factors which may also tend to a lowering of the general standards of the health of the population. Of these probably, the most important is loss of sleep, especially amongst the child population, and the spending of long hours in a vitiated atmosphere if adequate ventilation is not maintained.

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# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That representations be made to the Minister of Health for consent to a further Ward at the Isolation Hospital being allocated for the treatment of cases of infectious disease;
- (b) That the Civil Defence Committee be requested to post notices in public shelters asking parents of children known to be suffering from infectious disease to refrain from taking such children to public shelters, and also asking other persons suffering from infectious disease not to use such shelters.

Under such revision, the annual cost of the maintenance of geared lamps will be increased from £1 2s. 2d. to £1 3s. 10d. per lamp per annum, and of short post lamps from 8s. 3d. to 8s. 10½d. per lamp per annum. There is no increase in the charge for lighting guard posts and street refuges. **Noted.**

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the ren As a result of the changed conditions during the month of October there is a drop in the value of salvage collected. This has been general throughout the whole Metropolitan area. Not only are the public producing less quantites of salvage, but it has been impossible to dispose of the whole of the salvage collected and substantial quantities of paper, metals, etc., are at present stacked at the Refuse Disposal Works.

Collection of Kitchen Waste. There has been a reduction in the collection of Kitchen Waste throughout the Borough during the past two months, due to the same causes which have disturbed the general collection of salvage. Winter conditions, however, have produced some demand for food for feeding pigs. The collection also shows some signs of improvement and there now appears to be a small surplus of a few tons per week over and above the amount sold. In order to utilise this surplus, arrangements have been made to purchase ten young pigs for fattening purposes. If more normal conditions prevail during the next few months, it is hoped to substantially increase the present collection of Kitchen Waste.

Disposal of Kitchen Waste during the Summer Months. During the past summer it has been practically impossible to dispose of Kitchen Waste to local farmers. This applies not only to Hendon but has been the general experience throughout London. The Ministry of Supply has set up a Committee with a view to finding an outlet for this material by the erection of a drying plant for the treatment of the Kitchen Waste so that it can be used for feeding animals generally.

The Borough of Tottenham propose to erect additional plant capable of treating 500 tons of material per week. These proposals have had the approval of the Ministry of Supply and the Tottenham Borough Council enquire whether Hendon would be prepared to send supplies to these works if and when additional plant is erected. It is stated that if sufficient material can be guaranteed the Tottenham Council will pay 25/- per ton for material delivered to the works: the profit on the disposal of the finished produce being utilised to set off the cost of the plant.

When this has been done, payment would be made to the Councils concerned on a profit sharing basis in proportion to the quantities delivered. Assuming that 500 tons of material each week can be delivered at the Works and that the selling price remains at the figure realised during the past six months, it is estimated that 35/- per ton could be paid for the raw material delivered. If the response from Local Authorities is satisfactory it is anticipated that the plant can be ready in approximately three months' time.

The Committee are of opinion that it is more desirable for the material collected to be delivered to a central plant, than to rely on the fluctuating demand of pig farmers who seldom require the supplies during the summer months.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Tottenham Borough Council be informed that the Council will be prepared to deliver 10 tons of Kitchen Waste per week to the Tottenham Works, subject to the approval of the financial details when they are available.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 9.—REPAIR WORKSHOP, HENDON WAY DEPOT:

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had received a number of applications from members of the staff, who are at present using their own cars almost entirely on civil defence services, for repair work to be undertaken to their cars in the Council's workshop. At the present time there is considerable difficulty in getting repairs carried out at short notice, and the Committee

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RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for repairs to cars belonging to members of the permanent staff to be undertaken at the Council's motor repair workshop, the owners of cars to be charged for such repairs on the basis of labour and materials, plus a suitable percentage to cover overhead expenses. The arrangement to be limited to members of the staff normally in receipt of mileage allowances and petrol issues in accordance with Home Security Circular No. 43, 1940.

# AUXILIARY FIRE SERVICE.

# 16.—ALTERATIONS AND ADDITIONS TO CENTRAL FIRE STATION:

The Council (Group I. Committee, 8/4/40—W. & F.B.—54) approved a scheme for alterations and additions to the Central Fire Station to provide accommodation for appliances and towing vehicles for Auxiliary Section No. 6, together with petrol storage and sanitary accommodation for the men. The amount of the estimate finally approved was £1,350 and the scheme was forwarded to the Home Office (Fire Brigade Division) on the 13th August last. On the 26th October, the Home Office forwarded a letter making certain observations concerning the scheme and intimating that they are prepared to approve the following proposals:—

- (1) Construction of garage for four pumps and towing vehicles.
- (2) Concrete roadway for existing roadway.
- (3) Reforming kerb and entrances.
- (4) Heating, electric lighting, water supply and drainage.

They are not at the present time prepared to approve the proposal to construct a garage for the two ambulances in order to leave room in the main Station for a workshop. They suggest that the concrete roadway is a peace-time amenity and can be reduced by a general reduction of the proposed works, and request that further estimates and plans be submitted. The Home Office have been requested to indicate the maximum amount they will be prepared to allow to rank for grant in respect of the scheme as submitted, and it is suggested that in the meantime, in view of the urgency of the work the Council should proceed immediately with the alterations and additions to the Central Fire Station in accordance with the plans submitted, and the Committee

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND accordingly.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

### 17.-MOBILE WATER UNITS:

The Chief Officer reported that five vehicles had been acquired at an average cost of £103 each. This figure is below the amount allowed by the Home Office and the difference in cost will enable the vehicles to be adapted for their particular use at a cost within the amount approved by the Home Office.

# 18.—AUXILIARY FIRE STATIONS—SECTIONS NOS. 2 AND 5:

A letter was submitted from the Ministry of Supply—Iron and Steel Control, regarding the Council's recent decision to dispose of a quantity of iron railings for scrap metal on the understanding that such metal will be utilised for the purpose of munitions. (Group II. Committee, 7/10/40—E.P. & A.—13.) The Minister intimates that it is usual for local authorities to obtain tenders from scrap merchants who are able to break up and consign the material to the appropriate Consuming Works. All such merchants are now licensed by the Control and the prices paid for scrap material are fixed at the Consuming Works end by an Order issued by the Minister of Supply. The Minister suggests that it should be made a condition of tender that the material is broken up for scrap and consigned to consuming works immediately or within a reasonable period. As a further reassurance to the Council, it is pointed out that all licensed merchants have to report stocks held month by month to this Control.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That consideration of the matter be deferred for two months and the Minister of Supply informed accordingly.

# 22.—EDGWAREBURY PARK:

35.—SHOPS—HOURS OF CLOSING:

It was reported that by an Order-in-Council made on the 8th November, Defence (General) Regulation 60A, which had been revoked, had been revived in modified form for the period 17th November, 1940, to 2nd March, 1941.

The Regulation reduces the general closing hours fixed by Section I. (i) of the Shops (Hours of Closing) Act, 1928, to 7.30 p.m. on the late day (Saturday) and 6.0 p.m. on other days.

The new hours of closing do not apply to the sale of newspapers and periodicals, tobacco and smokers' requisites, table waters, sweets, chocolates or other sugar confectionery or ice cream.

Local Authorities have power, except in the case of Barbers and Hairdressers, by Order, to fix earlier or later closing hours than those prescribed by the Regulation. If earlier hours are made there is no limit, but if later hours are made the regulation fixes a limit of 8 p.m. on the late day and on one other day, and 7 p.m. on one or more of the remaining days.

In the case of Barbers and Hairdressers the General Closing Hours are fixed at 8 p.m. on the late day and 7 p.m. on other days, but Local Authorities may by Order direct that the closing hour of one other day, in addition to the late day, shall be 8 p.m., but they have no power to fix earlier closing hours.

The provisions of the Shops Acts as applied to Sunday trading and weekly half-holiday closing are unaltered.

In connection with the Order, a letter was submitted from Prices Tailors Limited asking the Council to make an Order fixing the closing hours for Bespoke Tailoring as follows:—Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday 7.0 p.m., Thursday 1.0 p.m., Friday 7.30 p.m. and Saturday 8.0 p.m., and intimating that their letter is intended to support representations which the Council may receive from other retailers for later closing hours.

The Town Clerk reported that no further representations have been received, and that unless the Council propose fixing later closing hours than those prescribed by the Regulation no action is necessary on the part of the Council. It is pointed out that, from observations which have been made by the Shops Inspector during the course of inspections, most of the shops covered by the Regulation close at "Black-out" time or shortly before. **Noted.**

## 2.—LAND AT ENDERSLEIGH GARDENS:

The Committee has duly **noted** a report by the Borough Treasurer to the effect that a claim had been registered by Mr. Cyril Corden, the owner of the above land, for compensation under the Compensation Defence Act, 1939, possession of which the Council took under the Cultivation of Lands (Allotments) Order, 1939. The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries has agreed that subject to the necessary agreement being signed, payment will be made at the rate of 10s. 0d. per annum, payable each quarter day from the date of possession, viz., 7th December, 1939.

The Minister will be prepared to refund to the Council when the account in question is closed, the amount of any additional deficiency (in so far as it is not already covered by the deficiency grant not exceeding £2 per acre provided under Article 8 of the Cultivation of Lands (Allotments) Order, 1939) attributable to such award for compensation.

# 3.—DEMONSTRATION PLOTS:

The Committee has approved the following sites for demonstration allotments and given authority for the pegging out of the plots:—

- 1. Lullington Garth Allotments, serving the Frith Manor Estate. Plot 62.
- Wise Lane Allotments, serving the Dole Street and Copthall Estate Areas. Plot 27.
- 3. Entrance to Watling Park, by Burnt Oak Underground Station, serving the Watling Estate.
- 4. Edgwarebury Park, near entrance from Edgware Way, serving Edgware Ward.
- 5. Clitterhouse Area, 2 Plots are thought desirable as follows:-
  - 1. North-West corner of Area. Plot 147.
  - 2. South-East corner of Area in Clitterhouse Playing Fields by tennis courts.
- 6. Archfields Allotments, serving Hendon Central. Plot 4.

It has been reported by the Borough Treasurer that up to the present time it has not been possible to obtain further information from the Middlesex County Council as to the amount of grant available towards the cost of demonstration plots.

Negotiations are proceeding between the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries and the County Council and a further report will be presented in due course.

In connection with the produce from the demonstration plots, the Committee has authorised Mr. Erith (Parks' Superintendent) to arrange for the distribution of such produce amongst the persons cultivating the ground.

# 4.—RESERVATION OF PARKS SUPERINTENDENTS AND GARDENER STAFF OF LOCAL AUTHORITIES:

The Committee has duly considered a letter from the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries regarding the reservation of Parks Superintendents and Gardener Staffs of Local Authorities. The Borough Surveyor has submitted a report with regard to the reservation of certain members of the Parks' Staff who are employed whole-time on food production and who subsequently will be liable for military service.

The film will be shown in all the Cinemas throughout the County and it will, therefore, be unnecessary for the Council to undertake the production of a separate film.

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#### 6.—DISPLAY TABLES:

Arrangements have been completed for the exhibition of a display table at the Central Library and the Town Hall.

## 7.—CULTIVATION OF LAND OWNED OR OCCUPIED BY THE COUNCIL:

The Borough Surveyor has reported to the effect that it had been the policy of the Council for some time past to lease, wherever possible the surplus lands to farmers already operating in the area. At the present time the following areas are so leased:—

The Committee at its meeting on the 27th August allocated a further 50 acres of land forming part of seven open spaces in the area as additional land for War-Time Allotments.

The land now available for large scale cultivation is limited in extent and cultivation of such land has been made very difficult by reason of the action taken by the War Office in digging pits.

The Council is not equipped for general agricultural work and has neither the plant nor staff of agricultural workers for this purpose. Plant will have to be hired or purchased and the labour undertaken by men working under urban conditions and will have to be paid rates of wages appropriate to those conditions including overtime after normal hours. The land which is still evailable for consideration under the Scheme is as follows:—

Arrandene Open Space—57 acres in extent.—This land is undulating in character and is intersected by hedges containing a number of fine trees, and is unsuitable for ploughing purposes, it is, however, suggested that such land should be let to a dairy farmer for grazing purposes and the County War Agricultural Committee concur in this suggestion.

Copthall Playing Fields—142 acres in extent.—This land is at present under lease to Messrs. A. Auburn & Sons, and it is understood that they will not continue their tenancy after next March as the land has been rendered unsuitable for grazing purposes, owing to the existence of a large number of pits. The County War Agricultural Committee are of opinion that these fields are suitable for ploughing, but at the present time they have not made any suggestions as to how the work can be carried out. It may be possible to plough the land in strips between the rows of pits but the work will be both difficult and expensive. After the land is ploughed the question of drainage, manuring, etc., will have to be attended to before sowing takes place. It is suggested that the County War Agricultural Committee should make the necessary arrangements for cultivating the land, preferably through a farmer.

Land—Isolation Hospital.—Sufficient of the spare land at the hospital has been cultivated for several years past in order to provide the hospital with vegetables. Last year the total area so cultivated amounted to four acres. In view of the number of patients in the hospital there would not appear to be any justification in increasing the area of cultivation at the present time.

Woodfield House.—About two acres of this land was cultivated last season and it is suggested that a further two acres of land be prepared for cultivation and the whole four acres utilised for growing onions, carrots and similar root crops.

With regard to the glass houses, it is suggested that two of the large houses be used for tomatoes, two for encumbers and one for early lettuce. The few remaining houses will be required for seeds, etc.

In order to earry out this work it will be necessary to purchase a cultivator at an estimated cost of £100, the Council having no plant of this character. It will also be necessary to purchase chemical fertilisers to the value of approximately £20, for treating the newly ploughed land. If the foregoing proposals are carried out there will be only sufficient of the Council's land left to provide reasonable facilities for recreation and a margin for further provision of War-Time Allotments which may be required at a later date.

The Committee have approved the above proposals and given authority for the purchase of a cultivator at an estimated cost of £100, and for the purchase of chemical fertilisers at an estimated cost of £20.

## 8.—BLUNDELL ROAD—ALLOTMENTS:

In connection with the licence to be entered into with the London County Council in respect of the entrance to the above allotments, authority has been given to pay the County Council £3 8s. 0d. Solicitors costs.

# 9.—LAND, BUNNS LANE—LONDON AND NORTH EASTERN RAILWAY COMPANY:

It has been reported that the tenancy agreement between the Council and the London and North Eastern Railway Company for the use of land in Bunns Lane for Allotments, provides that the Company may terminate the tenancy forthwith in the event of the land being urgently required in connection with the railway undertaking.

Accordingly it is necessary to amend the licences granted to the Allotment tenants of this particular field, and the following amended clause, drafted by the Town Clerk has been approved:—

"12. The Licence shall be terminated forthwith upon the receipt by the Allottee of a notice in writing under the hand of the Town Clerk provided always that this licence shall not (except for a breach of the terms hereof, or by reason of the Council's tenancy of the land being terminated by the L.N.E. Railway Company) be terminated between the 6th day of April, and the 29th September in any year."

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

# REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENCE COMMITTEE

to the Meeting of the

## HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

14th December, 1940.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

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We herewith submit a report on various matters which have been dealt with by this Committee at its meetings held on the 6th and 20th November, and 6th December, 1940.

## 1.—CHAIRMAN AND DATES OF MEETINGS:

His Worship the Mayor, Alderman A. A. Naar, M.B.E., J.P., has been re-elected Chairman of the Committee.

Subject to emergencies, the Committee proposes to meet for tnightly on Fridays at  $2\ \mathrm{p.m.}$ 

## 2.—CHIEF OFFICER—FIRE BRIGADE:

The Committee has considered details of an act of conspicuous bravery on the part of Mr. R. Cook, Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade in rescuing a member of his service who was overcome by fumes when dealing with an incendiary bomb, and in extreme danger of losing his life.

It is with pleasure that the Committee has directed that the attention of the Regional Commissioners should be drawn thereto.

#### 3.—PAYMENTS TO STAFF ON MILITARY SERVICE:

In order to secure equality of treatment for all members of the staff of the Council on service with H.M. Forces, the Middlesex County Council has been urged to recognise payment of the difference between their War Service and Civil pay to members of the Corporation's staff who formerly held appointments with the sanction of the County Council.

The County Civil Defence Committee, however, adheres to its previous decision not to approve such payments or to recognise for Air Raid Precautions grant expenditure so incurred.

## 4.-HOME GUARD-TOWN HALL COMPANY:

Having regard to present conditions, the Committee has agreed to the discontinuance of the mounting of an armed guard nightly at the Town Hall, and has instructed the Borough Engineer to reinstate the previous arrangement for night watchmen to patrol the building.

The Town Hall Company of the Home Guard will be maintained and training will proceed as far as possible during the winter months. Authority has been given for a parade for training purposes to be called on Saturday mornings at 11 a.m.

# 5.—AUDITING OF AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS ACCOUNTS:

The County Council has agreed to recognise the services of a member of the Borough Treasurer's staff (Mr. R. A. Barker) as an Air Raid Precautions Audit Clerk at £240 per annum.

#### 6.—REPORT CENTRE STAFF:

In view of the considerable difficulty experienced in obtaining suitable staff at the Report Centres having regard to the flat rate of payment, the Committee has decided to make the following adjustments to operate from the 1st December, 1940:—

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Although the Officers-in-Charge work on 8-hour shifts, it has not been considered necessary to arrange for the payment of the third shift at either Report Centre in view of the fact that it has so far been possible to rely upon volunteers.

# 7.—STAFF OFFICER—CASUALTY SERVICES:

As a result of the representations made to the Middlesex County Council (referred to in item 4 of the last report) a salary of £300 per annum has been agreed for the appointment of Staff Officer for the Casualty Services.

Mr. C. Pinkney has been appointed to the position.

# 8.—RESCUE AND CASUALTY SERVICES—RATES OF PAY:

Having reviewed the nature of the work performed by members of the Reseue and Casualty Services and their present rate of remuneration in comparison with the cost of living, the Committee has directed that application be made for authority to the payment of a minimum wage of £3–15s, 0d. per week to the members of such services.

#### 9.-MORTHARY ATTENDANTS:

To facilitate the arrangement of duty periods, application has been made for approval to the placing of Mortuary Attendants on a full-time basis at the rate of £4 per week in lieu of the existing arrangements for the payment of a retaining fee of 10/per week, plus 2/- per hour for attendance during "alert" periods subject to a maximum payment of £4 per week.

# 10.—RESCUE SERVICES—STRENGTH:

The representations referred to in item 10 of the last report have been made to the County Council for an increase in the number of Rescue Parties authorised for the Borough.

It is understood that similar representations have been made by other authorities, and that the matter is now under review by the London Civil Defence Region.

# 11.—CASUALTY SERVICES—STRENGTH:

For some time it has not been possible to bring the Ambulance and Stretcher Party personnel up to full strength owing to lack of suitable applicants. Ten female drivers and fifteen stretcher bearers are now required, and these vacancies are being advertised.

# 12.-FIRST AID POSTS:

The provision of a third Mobile Unit in place of the fixed First Aid Post originally established at Golders Hill Park has been approved in principle by the Minister of Health and the Middlesex County Council. The Minister, however, is of the opinion that the Mobile Unit should not be purchased or put into operation until experience has shown that the present resources in the Borough are inadequate. The Committee has agreed that no action in the matter should be taken for the time being.

# 13.—WEATHER PROTECTION FOR A.R.P. PERSONNEL:

In reference to the instructions received from the Minister of Home Security in regard to arrangements for providing weather protection during the winter for A.R.P. personnel whose duties entail their remaining in the open (detailed in item 8 of the last Report), the Minister now states that the use of anti-gas jackets might not in all circumstances be satisfactory, and local authorities are asked to review the position. Ground sheets, as issued to members of the Rescue Service, are now authorised for outdoor Messengers. Local authorities may, if they consider it desirable, supply to members of the Wardens' Service, Mobile First Aid Units, drivers and attendants of ambulance and easualty ears, a waterproof coat or mackintosh to (a) whole-time personnel, and (b) to part-time personnel who apply for same, and who can be regarded as on the "effective" strength (i.e., volunteers who perform tours of duty amounting in the aggregate to 48 hours per month) at a cost of 25/- per garment excluding purchase tax.

The Committee considers that the ground sheets supplied to the Rescue Services do not afford adequate protection, and instructions have been given to procure mackintoshes for the services covered by the Minister's authority and also the Rescue Service.

#### 14.—ASSISTANCE OF RESCUE PARTIES BY STRETCHER PARTIES:

The Commissioners of the London Civil Defence Region have referred to the pressure upon stretcher parties having been less than that placed upon rescue parties, and to the wish expressed by members of stretcher parties and the Heads of Services that they may be used to reinforce the rescue party service. The Commissioners consider that for the present, at any rate, where the need exists and stretcher parties are available, they should be asked to volunteer for work of an immediate character or for the more lengthy operations which continue into the day following a raid at night.

It is proposed to equip the stretcher party personnel with heavy boots for moving among debris, and to seek the approval of the County Council to such expenditure.

#### 15.-ROOF WATCHERS:

Three men have now been trained as Roof Watchers, and are now carrying out their duties in connection with the Town Hall and adjacent buildings.

# 16.—REFRESHMENTS FOR A.R.P. PERSONNEL:

In reference to the question raised at the last meeting in regard to the supply of food to Wardens and First Aid Posts, the Committee has received a detailed report on the arrangements made.

While the Minister of Food has urged supplying firms to do all possible to meet the requirements of local authorities for A.R.P. purposes, no permits are issued by the Minister to enable manufacturers to obtain additional supplies of the commodities required. Restricted supplies and heavy demands by Military authorities thus render it impossible in practically every case for suppliers to entertain further orders.

Representations made to the Minister of Food for the issue of special permits have not so far met with success, and on the contrary, the permit held by the Council for the purchase of cheese has now been withdrawn.

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# 17.—MOBILE CANTEEN:

A Mobile Canteen has been delivered to this authority by the Middlesex County Council.

While this unit is primarily intended to serve this borough, it is to be kept available for service in any area on the direction of the Group Controller.

#### 18.—CHRISTMAS ARRANGEMENTS:

An expenditure of £120 has been authorised on the provision of additional fare, etc., for those personnel of the Civil Defence Services required to perform duties at the various depôts and posts in the Borough on Christmas Day.

His Worship the Mayor proposes to renew his appeal for gifts in kind for this purpose.

#### 19.—LIAISON WITH MIDDLESEX COUNTY COUNCIL:

The Middlesex County Council propose to hold regular meetings between the County Civil Defence Committee and representatives of districts in Group No. 6 for the purpose of discussing matters relating to Air Raid Precautions.

The Chairman of the Committee and Councillor Cox have been delegated to represent this Committee.

#### 20.—EMERGENCY WATER SUPPLY SERVICE:

The Metropolitan Water Board has expressed its thanks to the Council for the assistance given by the Council's Emergency Water Supply service in various parts of London served by the Board following damage to water mains as a result of aerial attack.

#### 21.—MILL HILL AND HENDON WAY DEPOTS:

As it is necessary to house the personnel of the Rescue Parties stationed at Mill Hill and Hendon Way Depôts in timber framed buildings and "lock-ups" respectively, the Committee has authorised an expenditure of £125 on the provision of linoleum to add to the comfort of such personnel, and is requesting the County Council to recognise such expenditure for the purposes of Air Raid Precautions grant.

# 22.—HENDON REPORT CENTRE:

At the request of the Committee, the County Civil Defence Committee has issued instructions to the County Architect to arrange for the erection of a blast wall to protect the entrance to the Hendon Report Centre.

The County Air Raid Precautions Officer is also applying for the formal approval of the Home Office to an expenditure of £152 10s. 0d. on the installation of additional ventilating plant.

#### 23.-AIR RAID DAMAGE:

Notification of damage to houses by enemy action now approximates 7,500. First Aid repairs have been completed to practically the whole of this number and work is proceeding on the remainder. The presence of unexploded bombs and exceptionally bad weather conditions has in certain cases resulted in damage being caused to the contents of houses before it was possible to make roofs and windows watertight.

It has been necessary to remove furniture from some 1,180 houses, and for the Corporation to store same in 245 cases.

The sites of sixty buildings have been completely cleared, and the debris salvaged. Some 120 men are now engaged on this work on approximately 50 sites.

Application is being made for the assistance of the Pioneer Corps in this work.

# 24.—RESCUE OF TRAPPED PERSONS:

From detailed reports of the work of the Rescue Service, the Committee observed that a considerable amount of time had been wasted in searching debris for possible occupants subsequently found to be absent at the time of the occurrence.

For some time past efforts have been made by the Wardens to institute a scheme of recording the movements of residents in their respective districts. Information obtained as a result of the Respirator Census provides an indication of the number of people ordinarily resident in each house and the Wardens have endeavoured to ascertain where these persons were in the habit of sleeping or sheltering. In a considerable number of cases, however, residents have no one set action which they take nightly, and for any scheme to be effective, the information requires checking daily—an impossible task for the Wardens having regard to the number available for this purpose. It is feared that the public whose movements vary frequently cannot be relied upon to make the necessary visits to Wardens' Posts to report thereon.

The following suggestions are being adopted, it being clearly understood that each is supplemental to the others, and information thus gained will be looked upon as for assistance only, and complete reliance must not be placed on its accuracy:—

- (1) Wardens to periodically check information as to the normal occupation of houses gained as a result of the Respirator Census.
- (2) Members of the public to be requested to advise the nearest Wardens' Post, their neighbours or persons in houses opposite to them, of any change in the number of residents in their premises.
- (3) Members of the public to be requested to affix a label on the inside of both the front and back doors of their houses giving particulars of the persons sleeping therein.

The Chief Warden has been authorised to develop a scheme based on these suggestions, and to arrange for the necessary publicity to ensure that at least a majority of the public co-operate by taking one or other of the courses of action.

#### 25.—SHELTER SUPERVISOR:

Authority has been received for the appointment of a Shelter Supervisor at £5 per week, and the Committee has accordingly appointed Mr. W. Lloyd-Taylor to this position.

# 26.—AIR RAID SHELTERS—CENSUS OF USER:

A census of the number of people using public and other shelters is now being taken at monthly intervals. On the night of the first census, the weather was very inclement, which, together with the dampness of certain of the shelters, showed an actual user below that known to be normal. In the following table, the estimated average user has, therefore, been inserted:—

# 27.—PUBLIC SHELTERS—ENTERTAINMENT AND INSTRUCTION:

(a) Literature. It is understood that the Libraries Committee has considered the suggestion of the Regional Commissioners in regard to the provision of 6d. books in air raid shelters, and is recommending to the Council that no action be taken in the matter.

This Committee concurs in this decision.

- (b) Entertainment and Instruction. Following representations made to the Regional Commissioners by the British Institute of Adult Education, the Workers' Educational Association, the Entertainments National Service Association (E.N.S.A.), the Committee for the Encouragement of Music and the Arts (C.E.M.A.) and the British Drama League, an Advisory Committee embracing these bodies, Local Education Committees, the Board of Education and the Ministry of Information has been established to formulate an organised scheme for the benefit of shelter users covering
  - (i) Education—talks, lectures, study groups, reading room and provision of books—to be undertaken by Directors of Education, Societies affiliated to the Central Council for Health Education, the British Institute for Adult Education and the Workers' Educational Association.
  - (ii) Entertainment—concerts and community singing, film shows, plays and music hall turns—to be provided by the Entertainments National Service Association (Professional), the British Drama League (Amateur), the Committee for Encouragement of Music and the Arts and the Ministry of Information (Films).
  - (iii) Recreation—indoor games, whist drives, etc.—to be conducted by members of Clubs whose members are users of the shelters.

Due consideration will be given to the proposals of the Advisory Committee.

# 28.—AIR RAID SHELTERS AND PUBLIC HEALTH:

The request of the Public Health and Medical Services Committee that parents of children known to be suffering from infectious diseases should be asked to refrain from taking such children to public shelters, and that other persons suffering from infectious diseases should be requested not to use public shelters has been considered, and arrangements are being made for the exhibition of posters to give publicity thereto.

Careful consideration has also been given to a letter received from the Hendon Branch of the Independent Labour Party urging the immediate commencement of active immunisation of the whole population against epidemic diseases, and the isolation of persons suffering from infectious diseases in special health centres.

It is proposed to call the attention of the public to existing facilities for free inoculation against diphtheria and by way of experiment to arrange for a surface shelter in Queen's Road to be set aside for use as a "sick bay."

# 29.—PUBLIC SHELTERS—ADDITIONS, IMPROVEMENTS, ETC.:

The following additional public shelters have now been approved by the Middlesex County Council:—

Hirst's Carage, Colders Creen. Remainder of basement to be taken over, increasing accommodation from 200 to 400.

Union Church, Mill Hill. New shelter for 103 persons.

John Keble Church, Mill Hill. Accommodation for 115 persons.

The use of the basement at 790, Finchley Road (50 persons) is being discontinued.

The following works in public shelters are being carried out as rapidly as supplies of labour and material allow:—

- (a) Replacement of sandbag walling and partitions with brickwork.
- (b) Introduction of electric lighting into shelters not so equipped, and an increase thereof where supplies already exist.
- (c) Laying on of water supply.
- (d) Provision of electric heating plugs for dual purpose of boiling water and providing heating when necessary.

Endeavours are being made to improve the amenities of the trench shelters to make them more suitable for use as dormitories by waterproofing the joints of the steelwork, and improving the existing drainage. The provision of electric light is being investigated, and it is hoped to produce a scheme to give additional light without danger to the occupants. Outside sanitary accommodation is being erected.

Approximately 540 three-tier bunks have now been fitted in various shelters, and further supplies are being received both from firms working for the Corporation and from Government contractors.

Accommodation has now been provided for 1,764 persons in 41 shelters of the communal type. Work is proceeding on 35 shelters which will give accommodation for a further 1,440 persons.

## 30.—ANDERSON SHELTERS:

The total number of Anderson Shelters which have been concreted is now approximately 5,350. Experience has shown that concreting reduces the infiltration of water to an amount which can be dealt with by baling, but it does not, of course, deal with cases where heavy rainfall flows down sloping gardens and enters directly into shelters.

#### 31.—BOMB-PROOF SHELTERS:

Careful consideration has been given to representations made by the Hendon Branch of the Communist Party that the proposed expenditure of £121,000 on communal shelters, in which the Party suggests the public lack confidence, should be diverted to the construction of "Haldane" or similar type shelters, which, while affording protection to a smaller number by reason of greater expense in construction, would be used by a larger number than use the existing types of shelter.

These representations were supported by:-

(1) The Basing Hill Shelter Committee.

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- (2) Electrical Trades Union—Hendon Branch.
- (3) Amalgamated Engineering Union-Hendon Branch.
- (4) 150 Petitioners resident and working in the neighbourhood of Hendon Central.

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A detailed communication has been received from the Minister of Home Security indicating in general terms the circumstances in which proposals for tunnelling may be developed. The following extract from the Minister's recent broadcast is quoted:—

"Anything like a universal policy of deep shelter, for the whole population or the greater part of it, is beyond the bounds of practical possibility. This fact I cannot alter. To attempt to build more than a limited amount in suitable places would mean providing deep shelter for a given number at the cost of leaving a much larger number with no good shelter at all.

No appreciable amount of this deep shelter, even in the most favourable event, can be ready until this winter is over. This fact I cannot alter.

In some places, and in some circumstances, the construction of deep shelter is practicable and will be undertaken. The deep shelter provided in London by the Tubes will be extended by tunnelling. In certain other parts of the country where the slope of the ground and the nature of the soil make tunnelling a relatively easy matter, work will also be begun. But the amount of deep shelter thus provided will inevitably be quite a small part of the total shelter in the country."

The concentration of specialised supervision of labour specially skilled in tunnelling, of plant of a specialised kind and probably of a relatively high proportion of materials for linings or support necessitated by tunnelling operations in soft strata or under level ground would make heavy demands on limited resources, and in such cases the Minister would not in general be prepared to authorise such work. Cover to the extent of sixty feet is stated to be generally desirable unless the strata consists of homogeneous rock when forty feet may be adequate.

Having regard to the general nature of the sub-soil in Hendon, any attempt to provide tunnel shelters of the depth indicated would be a slow and a costly process, and difficulty would be experienced in providing shelters of this type which were readily accessible from the larger centres of the population.

The Committee therefore propose to concentrate on improving the conditions of the existing shelters.

# 32.—WARDENS' ORGANISATION—STRENGTH:

While the maintenance of the numerical strength of the Wardens' Organisation is generally satisfactory, difficulty is experienced in one or two sections of the district due to the evacuation of certain of the members who are thus not so often available for duty.

Authority has been obtained for the supply of petrol to part-time members of the Wardens' Service in approved cases to enable them to return to the District for Post duty subject to a very strict control being exercised and limitation being placed on the issue of petrol as far as possible.

Applications have been lodged with the County Council, and also the Principal Warden for an increase in the number of paid Wardens authorised for the Borough.

#### 33,-WARDENS' POSTS-RALLYING POINTS, ETC.:

Arrangements are being made to increase the capacity of the heaters used in the Wardens' Posts.

The low percentage of paid Wardens and of part-time volunteers who are available during the day, necessitates the day manning of posts by a majority of the paid personnel, and night manning by part-time volunteers. It is appreciated that such personnel must be afforded an opportunity to obtain all possible rest during the night in order to fit themselves for their normal business activities. It is, therefore, desired to instal rest equipment in the posts themselves, and to obtain authority to meet expenses now incurred in a number of eases by the Wardens themselves on such accommodation in the vicinity of the posts.

It is also desired to provide protected Rallying Points for the Wardens on patrol duty.

These matters have been taken up with the County Council, and it is understood that a conference is to be convened in the near future to enable further discussion on these proposals.

# 34.—DISTRICT WARDENS, ETC.—EXPENSE ALLOWANCES:

In view of the additional responsibilities and out-of-pocket expenses necessarily incurred by District Wardens, Post Wardens and their respective deputies, it is proposed to request the County Council to authorise allowances on the under-mentioned scale to both paid and part-time volunteers holding these offices:—

I have approved of a payment of £50 further on account of architect's fees to  $M_{\rm P}$ . J. Gilmour Wilson. The payment is being made on the recommendation of the Chairman of the Education Committee.

# 10.—COPTHALL PLAYING FIELDS:

The receipt of a notice from the Middlesex County Council War Agricultural Executive Committee was reported to me. This notice is made under the Cultivation of Lands Order of 1939, and requires the Corporation to plough up 120 acres of the above by the 28th February, such land to be prepared, sown or planted for an approved crop.

It would appear that the County Council is unable to supply any plant or labour for the work, and I gave authority for the Borough Engineer to communicate with farmers regarding the letting of the land.

Authority was given for 38.56 acres of this land, comprising fields numbered 924, 925 and 926 to be let to Mr. H. P. Small of 39, Sunningfields Road, Hendon, as from the 9th December, 1940, at an annual rental of 10/- per acre, for the purpose of growing potatoes.

# 11.—TRANSPORT:

In view of the impossibility of replacing cars owned by the Corporation I gave authority for the purchase of an Austin 12 saloon (KMD 397) for the sum of £350.

# 12.—SCRATCHWOOD OPEN SPACE:

I gave authority for Mr. Node, farmer of Bury Farm, Edgware, to be granted permission to graze a few eattle on pasture land between the land which is covered by small woods, large growths of bramble, bracken, etc., at the above open space.

It is not possible to determine the exact area of land involved, but Mr. Node is prepared to pay a nominal figure of £5 per annum for the privilege, as from the 1st January, 1941.

The following matters have been dealt with during the time the Committee has been in recess:—

# 1.—BROADFIELDS AVENUE JUNIOR AND INFANT SCHOOL:

I am pleased to report that the Ministry of Supply, Timber Control, have issued the necessary licence to purchase the whole of the timber required for this contract and the Borough Engineer has been instructed to place the necessary orders within the period specified, which is within one month from 6/12/40, the date of issue.

In accordance with authority delegated, the Special Sub-Committee (comprising Councillors Curton, Hignett and Scott) met at the Town Hall on 11th December, 1940, and RESOLVED—

- (a) THAT the Borough Engineer be instructed to arrange for the appointment forthwith of a General Foreman with wages at the appropriate rate.
- (b) THAT the Architect and the Quantity Surveyors be instructed to provide the Borough Engineer with particulars as to sizes of timber required.
- (c) THAT the Architect and the Borough Engineer be instructed to take all possible steps to complete the building as speedily as possible.
- (d) THAT the Borough Engineer be instructed to arrange for the provision of air raid shelters to accommodate 200 children, similar in design to those at Colindale School.

I subsequently gave authority for the Architect to accept the tender of Messrs. Rippers, Ltd., for Joinery (including fixing), amounting to £1,092–10s. 11d., and instructed the Town Clerk to arrange for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to the necessary contract.

#### 2.—SCHOOL AIR RAID SHELTERS:

A meeting of the Special Sub-Committee referred to in Item 1 above was held on 2nd December, 1940, to consider the question of heating, ventilation and improved lighting, etc., of school air raid shelters.

The Borough Engineer was instructed to arrange for experimental installations to be provided in two trenches at Colindale School for inspection by the Sub-Committee.

The Sub-Committee met at Colindale School on 9th December, 1940, and inspected alternative systems of heating and lighting in trenches Nos. 1 and 2.

RESOLVED-

# THAT the Borough Engineer be instructed to arrange for the following works to be carried out forthwith:—

- (a) Installation of improved staggered lighting in all school shelters similar to the temporary installation inspected in No. 2 trench at Colindale School but subject to the slight alterations approved by the Sub-Committee.
- (b) Installation of electrical tubular heaters, without thermostats, in all school shelters, such heaters to be suitably covered for protecting the children against possible accident.

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(c) Installation of electrical ventilating extraction fans (to be fitted in escape hatches) in all school shelters.

(The estimated cost of carrying out the works comprised in Paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) is £7,600, and it is recommended that application be made to the Board of Education for their approval to the expenditure.)

- (d) Waterproofing of trenches Nos. 1 and 6 at the Hyde School, with a suitable mastic preparation as an experiment.
- (e) Making good of paths leading to shelters at all schools where necessary.
- (f) Provision of iron scrapers at the entrances to shelters at the Hyde School as an experiment.

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# 4.—SCHOOL CANTEENS:

In connection with the establishment of school canteens, the Director of Education reported that Miss Gertrude J. Horsley, one of the Committee's Domestic Subjects Teachers, took over duties as Organiser on 1st December, 1940. A Central Kitchen was being established in the Domestic Subjects Centre at the Algernon Road School where the Manual Centre would be available for an extension if necessary. Aga Cookers had been installed; gas and electric ovens, containers, cutlery, crockery, etc., had been ordered. Applications for priority certificates for the steel and iron required for the stoves had been forwarded to the Board of Education. Noted and approved.

# 5.—AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS IN SCHOOLS:

Board of Education Circular No. 1535 was submitted, the chief new points affecting this Sub-Committee being:—

# (1) "Spotter" System:

"Consideration has been given to the question of adopting some form of 'spotter' or second-warning system in the schools in order to reduce the amount of time children have to spend in the shelters and so minimise the disturbance to their education. While certain Authorities have devised arrangements of this kind which they have found to work reasonably satisfactorily in practice, the Board do not consider it possible to recommend the general adoption of such arrangements until greater experience has been gained of the working of the 'spotter' system and of the second-warning generally."

# (2) Parents fetching children from School:

"While the Board are anxious that parents should be discouraged as strongly as possible from fetching their children from school during an alert or an actual air raid, they should not be foreibly prevented from doing so."

# (3) Compliance with School Attendance Bye-Laws:

"Every effort should be made in all areas to secure compliance with the school attendance Bye-Laws."

# (4) Emergency Rations:

"Certain Authorities already provide emergency rations to cater for the needs of those children who are unable to leave school during the dinner hour or at the end of the afternoon session because of an alert, and this practice should be extended especially in areas which are subject to prolonged alerts. Wherever possible hot drinks should be provided."

There is also an appendix giving guidance on, what experience has taught to be, the best manner of securing the continued education of school children during the time they are forced to spend in Air Raid Shelters.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the principle of providing emergency rations be approved by this Committee and that the Director of Education be authorised to make the necessary arrangements therefor.

The Board of Education hope that Local Education Authorities will recognise the national importance of such employment and that they will co-operate by facilitating wherever possible the release of the teachers concerned.

#### (b) Appointments to the R.A.F. Volunteer Reserve:

Board of Education Administrative Memorandum No. 241 relaxed the operation of the schedule of reserved occupations to permit the enrolment of school masters in the Army Officers' Emergency Reserve. It has now been decided that the operation of the schedule shall also be relaxed for teachers above the age of reservation who wish to take commissions in the R.A.F. Volunteer Reserve.

#### (c) Calling-up of Crade III. Teachers:

Hitherto teachers between the ages of 25 and 30 who were in medical Grade III, had not been called-up. In consequence, however, of the need of the fighting services for more Grade III, recruits, it has now been decided that the deferment of the calling-up of teachers placed in Grade III, by reason of defective eyesight will not be continued after 1st January, 1941. Those in Grade III, on account of other defects will not be called-up for the present. The Board of Education fully realise that the calling-up of numbers of Grade III, teachers will add to the difficulties of stating but hope that Authorities will make the best arrangements possible in the circumstances and they wish in particular that it should be understood that they will not be able to support any applications for the further deferment of the calling-up of the teachers concerned.

# 4.—APPOINTMENT OF TEMPORARY ASSISTANT MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH, AND TEMPORARY SUPERVISOR OF MIDWIVES:

Consequent upon the release of Dr. MacLennan (Assistant Medical Officer of Health and School Medical Officer and Supervisor of Midwives) to undertake the duties of a Regional Medical Officer under the Ministry of Health for a period of six months, the Medical Officer of Health submitted proposals for the appointment of a temporary Assistant Medical Officer and for carrying out the duties of Supervisor of Midwives during Dr. MacLennan's absence.

The Committee have congratulated Dr. MacLennan on her appointment, and

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That Dr. MacLennan be granted leave of absence for a period of six months as and from the 20th January, 1941;
- (b) That Dr. Jean Castrell Lewis be offered the appointment of Temporary Assistant Medical Officer of Health for a period of six months at the usual scale salary, and in the event of her non-acceptance of the position, the Medical Officer of Health be authorised, in consultation with the Chairman of the Committee, to appoint a suitable person to the post.
- (c) That, subject to the approval of the Minister of Health, Dr. Margaret F. Coveney, the recently appointed Temporary Assistant Medical Officer of Health and Assistant School Medical Officer, be appointed Supervisor of Midwives for the period of Dr. MacLennan's absence.

#### 5.—HEALTH CENTRES—REDECORATION:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that the five permanent Health Centres (three of which are being used for the dual purpose of First Aid Post and Health Centre), and in particular the West Hendon Health Centre, require certain interior redecoration.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the matter be referred to the Chairman and Officers concerned to submit a report as to the redecoration works of an urgent nature which should be carried out at the present time.

#### 6.—REQUISITIONS:

#### Part III .- Public Health.

#### 7.--DIPHTHERIA PROPHYLAXIS:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on Ministry of Health Circular No. 2230 dealing with the subject of the production of artificial immunity against diphtheria.

The Circular states that the Minister is advised that a special effort should be made and sustained by all Local Authorities to secure immunisation against Diphtheria of as many children as possible in order to meet the increased risks which inevitably arise out of war conditions. To facilitate this the Ministry of Health have arranged with the Sector Laboratories to provide supplies of alum-precipitated toxoid free of charge to Local Authorities. The Medical Officer of Health reported that it has hitherto been the practice in this area to use the immunising agent known as T.A.F. but, in view of the difficulties of obtaining supplies of T.A.F. and the fact that alum-precipitated toxoid is to be provided free of charge, the Medical Officer proposes to use the latter immunising

The Council have for a considerable period advocated the desirability of the immunisation of children against Diphtheria and the Council's immunisation scheme was approved by the Ministry of Health in 1935. In February last, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, the Council approved proposals for the intensification of propaganda and an increased sum was included in the current year's estimates. The Minister of Health asks to be furnished by the 45th instant with a short report on the action taken under the Circular and the results secured. The necessary steps will be taken to submit such report. Noted.

#### 8.—PRECAUTIONS AGAINST THE SPREAD OF ALIMENTARY INFECTIONS:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on Ministry of Health Circular No. 2198 which reminds Local Authorities of the measures which can usefully be taken to protect the public against the spread of the diseases commonly conveyed by food, one of the commonest causes being the contamination of food, including milk, by the hands of persons exercting the casual organisms of the disease.

The Milk and Dairies Order, 1926, confers on Medical Officers of Health powers to stop milk supplies which are known or suspected to be infected. It also requires that every person engaged in the milking of cows, measuring of milk or having access to the milk or receptacles shall keep his clothing and person in a cleanly condition, and, in connection with the milking of cows, the hands of the milker shall be thoroughly washed and dried before milking, and throughout the milking he kept free from contamination.

The Circular also draws attention to the Public Health (Infectious Diseases) Regulations, 1927, whereby certain persons being contacts or carriers of enteric fever or dysentery who are employed in any trade or business connected with the preparation or handling of food or drink for human consumption, can be suspended from employment for a specific period.

Local Authorities are also reminded that outbreaks may in large measure be prevented by the workers in the food trade taking the elementary precautions which are specified in Section 13 (1) of the Food and Drugs Act of 1938. The Medical Officer of Health reported that these precautions have been, and are being, kept in mind and that specific instructions have been given to the Sanitary Inspectors to give special attention to the matter with a view to ensuring that such precautions are taken by the workers concerned. Noted.

#### 9.—IMMUNISATION AGAINST MEASLES:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that in Hendon and throughout the country there is at present a high incidence of measles.

The attack of measles can be modified by the use of blood scrum taken from convalescent cases but the supply is very limited. Scrum taken from any adult has, however, a considerable immunising effect. Limited supplies of this scrum are available through the Emergency Medical Service Laboratories and the Medical Officer of Health asked for authority to supply such scrum to local practitioners for use in selected cases.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the necessary authority be given to the Medical Officer of Health.

(Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the froposal on the understanding that the suffices of serum are obtained free of charge to the Council).

#### 10.—TREATMENT AND DISPOSAL OF FOODSTUFFS CONTAMINATED BY GAS:

Arising out of a letter from the Ministry of Food, the Council in January, 1940, appointed Mr. S. J. Masters (Sanitary Inspector) as its agent primarily responsible for dealing with gas contaminated foodstuffs, under the administrative control of the Medical Officer of Health. Subsequently a Course on gas contaminated foods was arranged by the London County Council at the Smithfield Institute and the remaining Sanitary Inspectors attended. In order that a rota for duty may be formed the Medical Officer of Health recommended that the remaining Sanitary Inspectors should be recognised as authorised officers for dealing with contaminated foodstuffs.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that a memorandum has been received from the Ministry of Food on the arrangements for dealing with food contaminated by gas and submitted a draft scheme for giving effect to the recommendations contained in the memorandum. The scheme provides for the following matters to which the authority of the Council is required:—

#### (a) The Selection of a Decontamination Site.

A suitable decontamination site should consist of:-

- A large paved and drained area where foodstuffs or containers can be washed down;
- (2) A large airy room or shed where contaminated foodstuffs may be freely exposed to air, as that is the most important process in decontamination;
- (3) Storage accommodation for food which has been contaminated and is awaiting an analyst's report;
- (4) Kitchen accommodation for the trimming of food;
- (5) Office accommodation for the keeping of records; and
- (6) A constant supply of hot and cold water is essential.

The most suitable existing premises are those provided by Swimming Baths, and for the purpose the Medical Officer of Health recommended that the West Hendon Swimming Baths should be used. Minor adaptations will be necessary as indicated bereunder:—

- (i) The ear park to be used for the reception and sorting of contaminated foods.
- (ii) The paved area behind the diving boards to be used for washing down and treatment by bleaching powder. For this purpose it would be necessary to render the surface in cement and provide adequate drainage.

(iii) The kitchen and café to be used for trimming foodstuffs and subsequent aeration if necessary.

- (iv) The store at the south side of the café to be used when aeration only is necessary but as a large space is required for this purpose it is likely that this accommodation will prove insufficient and it will, therefore, be advisable to erect an additional shed affording weather protection but allowing free circulation of air similar to the "open shed" used in connection with the cleansing of personnel.
- (v) The cubicle room to be used as storage for such goods as might be awaiting an analyst's report and the cubieles for the storage of food which has been treated and awaiting return.
- (vi) The existing office to be use for the keeping of necessary records.

The Committee are advised that the only alternative to the use of the existing Swimming Baths would be the erection of buildings for this specific purpose.

#### (b) Transport of Contaminated Material.

So far as is practicable, contaminated foodstuffs being transported for salvage or for destruction should be placed in metal or metal-lined containers or vehicles (e.g., metal refuse collectors or metal-lined vans). The Medical Officer of Health suggests that two lorries should be fitted wih metal linings and that such lorries should normally only be used for such work as would permit of their immediate release for the transport of contaminated material. In addition, it would be necessary to provide 24 dustbins.

#### (c) Destruction of Foodstuffs.

This should be carried out at the Council's Refuse Disposal Plant but it will also be advisable to enter into mutual arrangements with adjoining Authorities.

#### (d) Decontamination Squads.

These are required for loading, unloading and decontamination. It is understood that the present establishment for this service consists of only 8 squads and the Medical Officer recommended that the Civil Defence Committee be consulted with a view to the recruitment of 4 additional squads who, in addition to their normal training, would be specially trained for this purpose.

#### (e) Equipment

Tables in the kitchen and café should be covered with zinc, and certain minor articles of equipment, such as knives, packing case openers, lengths of hose, bleach powder, etc., will also be required.

#### (f) Services of Chemical Experts.

In order to protect the public against dangers arising from contamination of foodstuffs by poisonous gas, the officer primarily responsible will be concerned in reaching a decision as to whether or not food known to be, or suspected of being, contaminated constitutes a danger to the public, and only if he is in difficulty in regard to the question as to whether food is so contaminated as to call for its destruction would there be any question of his obtaining further expert assistance-e.g., the Public Analyst.

It may also be necessary in certain circumstances for a representative of the Ministry of Food to request that the destruction of suspected food may be deferred, pending the that Ministry, will take the necessary action for the examination to be made in order that it may be determined whether the foodstuffs in question can be rendered fit for consumption or processing after treatment. It must be borne in mind, however, that the appointed Public Analyst may in some cases reside at a distance from the Authority

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he serves and there may consequently be delay in obtaining his services or advice. In these circumstances the Council may find it desirable to make arrangements whereby a call could be made on the services of a qualified chemical expert who would be immediately available in the event of an emergency and it would be particularly useful if the person selected possessed expert knowledge of food chemistry and technology. It is pointed out that only in very exceptional circumstances should the duties normally assigned to the appointed Public Analyst be delegated to this expert. In the ordinary course of events, he would be called upon to assist with advice only when the services of the Public Analyst were not immediately available. The Public Analyst has been approached and will co-operate with the authorised officers as necessary, but in order that there may be a call upon the services of an expert food chemist and technologist who would be available in the event of an emergency, the Medical Officer of Health suggested that the Express Dairy Company be approached with a view to obtaining the services of the principal of their laboratories and his assistant.

#### (q) Personnel.

In the event of the extensive use of gas it would be necessary to appoint temporary store-keepers and clerical assistants.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That the report of the Medical Officer of Health be approved and that the question of the user and adaptation of the West Hendon Swimming Bath be referred for consideration by the Works and Fire Brigade Section of Group I. Committee.

The total number of books damaged beyond repair and missing is 721, the purchase price of which was just over £200. In addition, some 350 books have been salvaged and sent to the binders for re-binding at an estimated cost of £55. A report will be submitted by the Chief Librarian at the next meeting on the number of destroyed books which should be replaced. **Noted.**

#### 2.—BYE-LAW—CHARGES FOR REMOVAL OF REFUSE OR OTHER SERVICES:

A letter was considered from the Home Office regarding the bye-law prescribing the scale of charges which the Council are authorised to make under Section 146 of the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929, for the removal of refuse or other services rendered by them in connection with street trading. The bye-law will cease to be in force after the 1st April, 1941, and in the event of the making of a new bye-law the Secretary of State intimates that he is of opinion that it would not be advisable to make any change in the existing scale of maximum charges in the present circumstances,

It is proposed to install a receiver at Hendon in order to establish communication with the Assistant Regional Fire Officer of "H" District at Tottenham. The cost of the installation will be borne by the London Fire Region. **Noted.** 

#### 21.—EMERGENCY FIRE BRIGADE MEASURES:

The Chief Officer reported that a comprehensive report on emergency fire brigade measures had been made to the Home Office on the lines indicated in Fire Brigade Circular 153/1940. Local Authorities are urged to carry out any matters necessary in order to comply with its provisions. As far as Hendon is concerned, the under-mentioned are affected:—

#### (1) Communications, etc.:

In the event of communications breaking down all possible steps must be taken to see that all areas are adequately covered by appliances under the control of responsible officers, who should be able to contact Fire Headquarters as expeditiously as possible. To accomplish this it is suggested that:—

- (a) The district be divided into three divisions, viz.:-
  - 1. Southern Division, covering Cricklewood and Golders Green.
  - Central Division, covering Central Hendon, Colindale and Mill Hill East.
  - 3. Northern Division, covering Edgware, Burnt Oak and Mill Hill, each to be under the control of a senior professional officer.
- (b) Application be made to the Home Office for the whole-time messenger strength to be increased from 5 to 10.
- (c) Application be made for authority to purchase three additional motor cycles.

#### (2) Reinforcements:

Brigades are required to provide reception bases and accommodation for reinforcements sent in under the Fire Regional Scheme. For this purpose it is desirable to utilise public buildings as far as possible, and it is suggested that the Education Committee be asked to provide facilities for the sleeping of personnel, etc., at the following schools:—

- 1. Southern Division St. Agnes' School, Gillingham Road.
- 2. Central Division ..... St. Mary's C. of E. School, Church End.
- 3. Northern Division ..... Deansbrook School, Hale Drive.

#### (3) Protection of Regular and Auxiliary Fire Stations:

Special standards of protection for stations, especially for control rooms, are laid down, and to comply with the requirements some additional work will be necessary. It is suggested that these works should be carried out by the Borough Surveyor.

The Home Office has intimated that these matters should be regarded as urgent and should receive immediate attention.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the above suggestions be approved.

#### 22.-MOBILE CANTEEN:

It was reported that a mobile canteen had been given to the Hendon Fire Service through the kind offices of the Regional Fire Officer. It was presented to London by the children of Mauritius, but as London were fully equipped the gift was passed on to this authority,

RESOLVED-That a letter expressing the Council's thanks and appreciation be sent to the Regional Fire Officer.

#### 23.—FIRE WATCHERS ORDER, 1940:

Considerable assistance has, however, been provided under the Regional Scheme, and personnel have been despatched to Birmingham, Southampton and London. Several letters of appreciation from Chief Officers complimenting the local Fire Service on its excellent work have been received. **Noted.** 

#### 28.—EXCHANGE OF PERSONNEL:

The Home Office has intimated that arrangements have now been made for exchanging whole-time personnel between heavily bombed areas and other districts. In this connection the Chief Officer asked for authority to make any arrangements that may be necessary to utilise these facilities in the event of any extra heavy work falling on the local Fire Services.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given to the Chief Officer accordingly.

#### 29.—ADMINISTRATION:

The Chief Officer reported that in view of the extensive calls made on the Fire Services through enemy action, the administration of the services had greatly increased. Numerous circulars received from the Home Office often contain questions of principle, in respect of which, urgent decisions have to be made without reference to the Committee.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Chief Officer, in conjunction with the Chairman of the Committee, be authorised to deal with such matters.

# 22.—RATING AND VALUATION—DEFENCE REGULATION 54BA:

A letter was submitted from the Harrow Urban District Council drawing attention to the above-mentioned Regulation which empowers the Minister of Health to give directions in the case of any rating authority within the meaning of the Rating and Valuation Act, 1925, for varying the manner in which estimates of the product of a penny rate are to be made for the purpose of any precept issued by a County Council. The Harrow Urban District Council have considered the Regulation in relation to the growing difficulties of rate collection in the Greater London area. At the present time payment

to the County Council must be made on the basis of the Rate Income irrespective of the amount collected and no variation of the estimate affects the ultimate liability. The Harrow Council have decided to apply to the Minister of Health for a direction that the estimate be made according to the rules in force for the calculation of the product of the rate for the purposes of the Housing Acts and the Air Raid Precautions Act, 1937, namely, on the basis of the amount collected and not the amount collectible. The Harrow Council are of opinion that this method should be applied throughout the County of Middlesex and they ask this Authority to make application for a similar direction.

After hearing the observations of the Borough Treasurer, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council support the application made by the Harrow Council to the Minister of Health.

#### 23.—COST-OF-LIVING BONUS:

A letter was submitted from the Hendon Branch of the National Association of Local Government Officers asking the Council for the application of the resolution regarding payment of War Bonus to members of the staff in receipt of salaries up to £260 per annum to be extended to all officers whose salaries do not exceed £500 per annum.

A letter was also submitted from the Employer's and Joint Secretary of the Middlesex Whitley Council for Local Authorities' Administrative Technical and Clerical Services intimating that certain amendments had been received from the National Joint Council for Local Authorities' Administrative Technical and Clerical Services to the scheme of salary adjustments previously recommended by the National Joint Council, such amendments to operate as from the 1st January instant. The letter further stated that such amendments would be considered by the Middlesex Whitley Council at a special meeting to be held on the 1st February next.



## 2.—COMPARATIVE STATISTICS:

The Borough Treasurer has reported that he has been in communication with the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries regarding the number of War-Time Allotments provided in Middlesex. The Minister has intimated that this information is not yet available but he is directed to state that the results achieved in Hendon compare most favourably with those of other Boroughs in the County.

#### 3.—EDGWARE BOYS' CLUB:

The Borough Treasurer has reported on an application from the Edgware Boys' Club for permission to cultivate a plot of land at Edgware as War-Time Allotments. Land is available at Hale Lane at its junction with Station Road, Edgware, and the Committee have approved the application subject to the payment of a nominal rental of 2/- per annum, subject to the annual review of the Club's financial position and to there being no objection on legal grounds.

#### 4.—LAND REAR OF MEADWAY, HAMPSTEAD GARDEN SUBURB:

In response to requests for the use of the above land for War-Time Allotments, application was made to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries for a Special Order to enter upon the land for this purpose. The Minister has accordingly made an Order entitled the Cultivation of Lands (Allotments) (Hendon) Order, 1941, which comes into effect forthwith. The land will accommodate approximately five eight-pole plots.

#### 5.—MONTROSE PLAYING FIELDS:

The Borough Surveyor has reported that 20 additional plots have been pegged out on the portion of the above land set aside for War-Time Allotments.

#### 6.—FARM ROAD, EDGWARE:

The Committee have considered a report by the Borough Surveyor, together with a plan of a small piece of land owned by the Council, and situate between Nos. 141/3, Farm Road, Edgware. The land will provide three eight-pole plots and authority has been given for such land to be pegged out.

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# REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENCE COMMITTEE

# to the Meeting of the RENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

25th January, 1941.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I herewith submit a report on various matters which have been dealt with by the Civil Defence Committee at its Meetings held on the 3rd, 10th and 17th January, 1941.

#### 1.—CHRISTMAS ARRANGEMENTS:

The sum of £118–18s. 7d. allocated for the provision of additional fare, etc., for members of the Civil Defence Services required to perform duty on Christmas Day was duly distributed and many letters of appreciation have been received from the various Depôts, Posts, etc.

#### 2.-NEW YEAR'S MESSAGE:

The following New Year's Message was received from the Minister of Home Security and conveyed to the personnel of the Civil Defence Services:—

"The year that is now ending has given the Civil Defence Services very severe tests.

All who belong to those Services may justly be proud of playing their part in a task that has been well done. Under heavy and constant attacks thousands of brave men and women who sacrificed their leisure and trained themselves in the various branches of Civil Defence have undergone the ordeal by fire and bomb. They did not flinch, and they will not fail us, whatever is in store, nor will those whose turn has yet to come.

Each day sees the Civil Defence Services growing in efficiency, profiting by experience, becoming more compact and more disciplined, developing a stronger esprit de corps, and coping successfully with each new manifestation of frightfulness which falls from the skies in a vain attempt to break the spirit of the British people.

I send my warm good wishes for the year that is opening to all who belong to or are associated with the organisation and control of these magnificent Services. The Secretary of State for Scotland and the Minister of Health desire to be associated with me in this greeting.

To the thousands of men and women who comprise this new arm of defence I cannot promise a release or respite from the arduous and self-imposed obligations until our assured victory has removed the menace of the air. I can, however, offer them with complete confidence the regard and esteem of their fellow citizens, whose lives or sufferings will be spared, whose homes will be saved, by their courage and efficiency.

Once I told the workers in the factories to 'Go to it,' I said to them later, and I say now to their comrades in the Civil Defence Services, in the front line of the Battle for Freedom, 'Keep At It'."

#### 3.—GOVERNMENT EVACUATION SCHEME:

A reply has now been received from the Ministry of Health in regard to the representations made for the re-zoning of the Borough of Hendon as an evacuation area.

The letter states that the representations received the eareful consideration of the Minister in conjunction with those made by other Authorities and a copy of a statement made in the House of Commons on the 17th December, 1940, embodying the Minister's decision was enclosed. The statement referred to indicates that the actual effect of air raids on the areas in question, the degree of danger from bombing to which the inhabitants are exposed, the danger to health which might arise from shelter conditions in the

area (particularly overcrowding of public shelters), and the extent to which evacuation could proceed, having regard to available space in reception areas, have been examined. Consideration has also been given, amongst other things, to the need for the removal of further children from London and to the maintenance of a margin of accommodation in reception areas to meet the needs of provincial centres that might suffer intensive raiding. When considering the outer London suburbs, it was questionable whether the areas to which the people, if evacuated, would be as comfortable as their own homes or so much safer from the point of view of bombing and health as to justify further inroads upon the accommodation in reception areas. With these considerations in mind the Minister has come to the conclusion that the first necessity is to reduce the number of children in the more central areas, and he proposes to extend facilities for the organised evacuation of mothers and children of school age or under in the case of the Boroughs of Leyton, Tottenham, Walthamstow, Hornsey and Willesden. As regards the areas adjacent to the Metropolis he has come to the conclusion that there is not at present a case for adding to the evacuation areas except in two instances, the urban district of Penge and part of the Borough of Beckenham, and a slight extension of the existing The House was assured that the evacuation area in the urban district of Thurrock. situation would be kept under constant observation.

#### 4.—CIVIL DEFENCE EMPLOYMENT ORDERS:

With reference to the Orders made under the Defence Regulations whereby members of certain branches of the Civil Defence Services are precluded from leaving the service without having obtained the requisite permission, the County Civil Defence Committee have authorised the Town Clerk to initiate proceedings against such personnel who leave the service without the requisite permission.

#### 5.—CIVIL DEFENCE SERVICES—DEFERMENT OF CALLING UP:

The Minister of Labour and National Service has agreed that the present arrangement in the London Region for the deferment of calling up of whole-time paid Wardens over 30 at the date of registration and whole-time paid members of the Rescue and Stretcher Parties under 30 years of age, shall be extended until the 31st March, 1941.

#### 6.—CIVIL DEFENCE SERVICES—RATES OF PAY, ETC.:

At a meeting held in December between the County Civil Defence Committee and representatives of Local Authorities in Group 6, the following resolution was passed:—

THAT the attention of the Regional Commissioners be drawn to the difficulty experienced by Local Authorities in Group 6 in recruiting and maintaining their establishments of personnel in the various A.R.P. Services owing to more remunerative positions being available outside the Service, and that the Minister be asked to give urgent consideration to the rates of pay of whole-time volunteers being further increased.

The Committee have requested authority for the payment of allowances to the Chief Warden, District Wardens, Post Wardens and their respective deputies. In reply, the County Air Raid Precautions Officer states that his Committee have repeatedly made representations to the Minister of Home Security for increase in the pay of volunteers holding more responsible posts, i.e., District Wardens, Officers-in-Charge of Control and Message Rooms, etc. It is understood that the Minister is in full sympathy with the requests made and that the Treasury is likely to agree to some increase at an early date.

#### 7.—COMFORTS FOR CIVIL DEFENCE SERVICES:

The Minister of Home Security and the Commissioners of the London Civil Defence Region have requested this Conneil to co-operate in a scheme for the provision of woollen comforts for members of the Civil Defence Services, including the Auxiliary Fire Service. The establishment of a representative Comforts Committee for raising local funds for buying wool to be made into garments by working parties organised by the W.V.S. was proposed. A National fund has been set up to supplement local funds in areas where help is needed.

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Civil Defence on of woodlen ony Fire Serraising local raising by the nised by the cal funds in The garments to be made, such as pullovers, scarves, mittens and gumboot stockings, are to be knitted in distinctive colours, the main colour in every case being blue.

This Committee have given authority for the establishment of a Civil Defence Comforts Committee on the lines indicated in the Circulars, and such a Committee has now been formed under the Chairmanship of His Worship The Mayor.

A meeting has been held, when it was arranged that steps are to be taken by the representatives of the various A.R.P. services to raise funds to buy the necessary wool which will be made into garments by the Working Parties organised by the Women's Voluntary Services, and by the female personnel of the various Services.

#### 8.—RESCUE PARTY—ESTABLISHMENT:

The Regional Commissioners of the London Civil Defence Region have directed that the number of 10 men which form a Rescue Party in most areas should be standardised at this figure. This decision causes the strength of the Rescue Service in this Borough to be reduced from 234 to 220 men, and will be carried out by wastage, or by transfer of men to neighbouring local authorities. No man is to be dismissed through this revision.

The Committee is indebted to Mr. Howard Farrow for assistance given in the organisation of part-time rescue parties, which for many months carried out their training with the Council's Rescue Service. Due to pressure of war contracts, it became necessary to break up the two parties, but Mr. Farrow has again assisted in organising a party of 8 skilled men who are available at night for urgent work should heavy raiding occur.

# 9.—EMPLOYMENT OF RESCUE PERSONNEL ON WORK OTHER THAN CIVIL DEFENCE:

The Minister of Home Security has withdrawn the permission granted for members of the Rescue Service to be temporarily suspended from the Service to permit their engagement on urgent protective works. Authority is, however, given for minor works of improvement in the protection or amenities at their own Depôts to be carried out by the Rescue Parties, which it is considered might be undertaken by them without any question of extra payment in view of the shortage of labour, and the delay which would occur if the normal machinery of carrying out such work was relied upon. A rough figure of £100 is given as a limit of the estimated works permitted under this heading, and the local Trades Union Representative is to be given an opportunity of discussing such cases as might arise.

## 10.—DECONTAMINATION SERVICE:

The present establishment for Decontamination personnel totals 8 squads composed of 52 men recruited from the Council's employees. The Committee is concerned as to the inadequacy of the numerical strength of such personnel to deal with possible gas attacks.

The training and exercising of these men has revealed the exacting and arduous nature of their duties. The time during which the men can work in heavy anti-gas clothing is very limited, a matter of two to three hours while working without hoods and one hour only while actually wearing them. It is evident, therefore, that in assess-and one hour only while actually wearing them. It is evident, therefore, that in assess-and the number of men required to deal with an incident, allowance has to be made for substantial reliefs to permit prolonged periods of rest for the men engaged, thus considerably reducing the effective strength of the Service when dealing with numerous or extensive incidents.

Urgent representations therefore are being made to the County Council for an increase in the number of decontamination squads authorised for the Borough from 8 parties to 12 parties.

# 11.—WARDENS' ORGANISATION—STRENGTH:

As a result of representations made to the Middlesex County Council for an increase in the number of whole-time paid Wardens authorised for the Borough, the Commissioners of the London Civil Defence Region have increased the establishment for this Borough from 330 to 360. The Commissioners have also indicated that when recruitment to this new level has been achieved, they will consider an application for a further increase if such should be found necessary in the light of experience gained.

The Commissioners of the London Civil Defence Region recently approved the appointment of additional Wardens for the purpose of supervising shelters regularly used by 500 or more persons. There are no shelters of this capacity in the Borough and the Committee urged that the basis of grouping smaller shelters for the purpose of arriving at the number of additional Wardens permissible under the London Region authority referred to should be allowed. This request was not granted. At a meeting of the County Civil Defence Committee and representatives of Local Authorities in Group No. 6 of the London Civil Defence Region it was resolved that further representations be made to the Minister of Home Security to permit such grouping of shelters.

The number of shelter marshals now enrolled in the Wardens' Organisation totals 366. The allocation of such shelter marshals over the Borough is as under:—

#### 12.—FIRE WATCHING AND FIRE FIGHTING PARTIES:

In May, 1940, a scheme was initiated for the training by Fire Authorities of Supplementary Fire Parties drawn from the general public who would use Stirrup Pumps issued on loan by the Fire Authorities. This scheme was supplemented by Parties which were organised by the Wardens' Service, these Parties using Stirrup Pumps which they purchased through the Council or from other sources. Some 600 Stirrup Pumps were issued by the Fire Brigade free of charge and 1,600 were sold by the Council.

On the 28th October, 1940, the Council designated the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade as the Officer responsible for the operation of the Fire Watchers Order.

On the 28th December, 1940, a message was received from Regional Headquarters urging the need for the formation of many more voluntary. Fire Parties to deal with Incendiary Bombs and suggesting that a responsible Officer, generally the Chief Warden, should be in charge of the arrangements. Special attention was to be paid to business and industrial areas and to shops and the co-operation of the Police and Fire Brigade Officers was to be invited. The message also stated that consideration was to be given to a further issue of Pumps to all A.R.P. Depôts so that if the personnel at the Depôts were not called out for action they could assist in dealing with Incendiary Bombs in the vicinity of the Depôts.

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This message was followed by Home Security Circular No. 311/1940, which stated that Local Authorities should proceed to take steps to enrol and organise men and women to form Parties. Fire Brigade Circular No. 161a/1940 was also issued to Chief Officers of Fire Brigades and this circular stated that the Minister hoped that these Officers would take immediate steps to distribute leaflets which were to be supplied to responsible persons in shops, factories, warehouses and other business premises with a view to suitable Parties being formed on the lines indicated in the leaflet.

The following action was taken as a result of the receipt of the message and the circulars:—

- (a) The Chief Warden issued instructions to his Service to proceed to canvass house-holders and organise them into Parties, each Party having a Leader. The Parties were to be trained by the Wardens in conjunction with A.R.P. and L.A.R.P. Instructors. They were then to be grouped together in Groups of 5—10 Parties who would act under a Group Leader. This Group Leader would be in close touch with the Post Warden.
- (b) The Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade issued instructions to his Section Officers of the A.F.S. to proceed to canvass occupiers of shops and premises over, factories, warehouses and other business premises with a view to forming Parties, training them and issuing Stirrup Pumps.
- (c) The Assistant Controllers were asked to state whether any additional Stirrup Pumps could usefully be based on Depôts and to make every endeavour to complete the training of trained personnel in Incendiary Bomb control as soon as possible.

It is understood that regulations are shortly to be introduced which will entitle enrolled members of Fire Watching and Fire Fighting Parties to compensation for injuries received whilst on duty. These regulations, however, will not extend to Supplementary Fire Parties already organised.

A certain amount of overlapping exists in the two schemes of Supplementary Fire Parties, organised (i) by the Fire Brigade and (ii) by the Wardens' Service. The Committee therefore consider that with the exception of premises to which the Fire Watchers Order relates, the scheme for Fire Watching and Fire Fighting should be entirely operated by the Chief Warden, particularly having regard to the close contact of the members of the Wardens' Organisation with householders and business premises, and accordingly recommend that the Works and Fire Brigade Committee be requested to concur in the following arrangements:—

- (a) The enrolment of members of the Supplementary Fire Brigade in the new Watching and Fire Fighting Parties under the direction of the Chief Warden.
- (b) The transfer of records of the free issue of Stirrup Pumps to the Supplementary Fire Parties by the Fire Brigade to the Chief Warden, and
- (c) That with the exception of premises to which the Fire Watchers' Order applies, the scheme in respect of Watching and Fire Fighting Parties be operated by the Chief Warden.

Some 8,000 applications from members of the public for enrolment in the Parties have been received and it is anticipated that 20,000 volunteers will shortly be enrolled, which will enable practically the whole of the Borough to be covered. Difficulty is anticipated in covering the considerable number of untenanted houses and shops and for the time being this responsibility will have to be borne by the Wardens' Organisation.

#### 13.—MOBILE CANTEEN:

The mobile canteen delivered to this Authority by the Middlesex County Council has been put into operation with the assistance of the Women's Voluntary Services. Two female paid drivers will be employed and the remaining staff for operating the Canteen is being arranged by the Women's Voluntary Services.

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The canteen is equipped for emergency attendances at air raid incidents and in the interim is conveying refreshments to A.R.P. personnel operating away from their respective Depôts.

#### 14.—HOMELESS PERSONS—CONSTITUTION OF REHOUSING DEPARTMENT:

The Committee have considered the report of the Chief Billeting Officer set out in the appendix to this report and have resolved:—

- 1. That the scheme set out in the report be approved and adopted to take effect as from the 1st January, 1941.
- 2. That, in pursuance of the Ministry of Health Circular H.P.C.L. 13, dated 2/12/40, the Council establish a rehousing department and that Mr. A. E. Harding be appointed the rehousing Officer to be engaged whole-time on this work and directly responsible to the Council through the Town Clerk.
- That the staffing (including the seconding to the rehousing department of the
  permanent staff shown therein) and organisation of the department as shown in
  the scheme be approved and submitted for the confirmation of the senior
  Regional Officer.
- 4. That the Rehousing Officer be authorised to fill vacancies on the staff established by the scheme, and to appoint additional staff as circumstances may require after consultation with His Worship the Mayor and with any necessary consents of the senior Regional Officer.
- 5. That application be made for the recognition of expenditure as recoverable from H.M. Government and/or the County Council; and that the general financial regulations of the Corporation apply to the rehousing department, subject to any directions of the appropriate Government department and/or the County Council.
- 6. That the Rehousing Officer be authorised to take such steps as may be necessary to earry the scheme into effect.

#### 15.—PROTECTIVE WORK TO REST CENTRES:

At the request of the Middlesex County Council, a scheme involving a total estimated expenditure of £5.500 has been prepared for providing protective works to various buildings taken over for the purpose of Rest Centres for homeless persons in the Borough. Conditions vary at each of these Centres and preclude the preparation of a standard scheme. The buildings have, therefore, been divided into four groups and unit prices obtained for the different classes of work to be carried out. The work has been distributed to Mr. W. M. Glendinning in respect of Group No. 1, Messrs. E. S. Moss Ltd. for Group No. 2 and Messrs. Curtons of Stanmore for Group No. 3.

#### 16.—FIRST AID REPAIR TO HOUSES:

The lull in enemy aerial activity over the Borough around the beginning of the month enabled good progress to be made with First Aid Repairs to damaged houses, permitting the carrying out of protective work to the more seriously damaged properties with a view to preventing further deterioration of the structures.

At recent incidents, repairs were put in hand within a few hours of the occurrences. The Rescue and Casualty Services are co-operating in this work.

#### 17.-DEMOLITION AND SALVAGE OF MATERIALS:

Approximately 140 sites of damaged houses have now been cleared. Work is proceeding on a further 45 sites. ts and in the their respec-

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Experience has shown that at most incidents a large amount of clothing, bed linen, blankets, etc., can be salved and the Rescue Service is making every effort to deal with this matter. Mesdames Maughan and Monro of the Women's Voluntary Services have kindly offered to undertake and supervise the sorting and preparation of salvaged materials for despatch to store and the women ambulance attendants attached to the Casualty Services have also expressed a desire to co-operate in the work.

Permission has been granted for dumps of small pieces of batten and other wood having no saleable value to be created in order that those affected by the bombing may utilize same for fire wood.

#### 18.—AIR RAID SHELTERS—EXPENDITURE:

The Committee are supporting the Borough of Stalybridge in representations being made to the Minister of Home Security in regard to the reimbursement to local authoritities of expenditure on the provision of air raid shelters. In a Circular, dated 19th October, 1940, the Ministry decided that in relation to all contracts for the construction or equipment of shelters entered into after the date of the Circular, the Government will reimburse the full cost to local authorities. It is considered manifestly unfair that those local authorities which pressed forward with their shelter programme should be in a worse position financially than those which had not been so active and the Minister is accordingly being urged to adjust the position.

#### 19.—SHELTER STATISTICS:

A further census of the user of public shelters in the Borough was taken at the beginning of the month on a date fixed by the London Civil Defence Region. There was no Air Raid "Alert" on the night in question and a heavy rainfall. The figures obtained (as below) cannot therefore be regarded as a proper indication of the normal extent to which the shelters are used:—

#### 20.—PUBLIC SHELTERS—IMPROVEMENTS:

The waterproofing of trench shelters has been completed at:-

Clitterhouse Park. Hendon Park. Sunny Hill Park. Hampstead Heath Extension. York Park. Sturgess Avenue. Watling Park. Arrandene Open Space.

Similar work is proceeding at:-

Silkstream Park. Edgwarebury Park. Montrose Playing Fields. Child's Hill Park.

The application of powdered cork to the lining of the trench shelters to reduce condensation is well in hand.

External latrines have now been provided for the trench shelters at York Park, Hendon Park, Basinghill Park and Sunny Hill Park.

## 21.—PUBLIC SHELTERS—INSTALLATION OF BUNKS:

The work of installing bunks in trench shelters has been completed, providing accommodation for 4,340 persons. In other types of shelter 418 bunks have been installed to date, giving accommodation for 1,254 persons.

#### 22.—PUBLIC SHELTERS—LIGHTING AND HEATING:

The Committee have given careful consideration to London Region Circular No. 268, dated 23rd December, 1940, relative to the heating of public shelters and conveying the decision of the Regional Commissioners that a limited amount of heat should be allowed in surface shelters with seating accommodation for 50 or more persons in one compartment and also trenches which experience has proved to be exceptionally cold and damp. The Circular makes no reference to the heating of basement shelters.

After full experiment, having regard to careful limits to avoid dangers liable to result from an undue rise in temperature, and also materials available, the Regional Commissioners have chosen a stove of the ordinary slow combustion type, two of which it is intended should be provided in each 50 person shelter or 50 person bay or compartment of larger shelters.

The Committee have reviewed the possible dangers connected with the fitting of such a stove in underground trenches, the air capacity of which is necessarily small and where anything in the nature of a down-draught from the stove might result in serious consequences to the shelterers. While it might be possible satisfactorily to instal stoves of the type suggested in the surface brick and concrete shelter, a very strict supervision of the use of the stoves would be necessary, particularly in regard to the cleaning of the stoves and clearance of the flues. The supply and control of the necessary fuel would also present much difficulty and necessitate a large organisation.

The Committee therefore consider that the heating and lighting of public shelters could more satisfactorily be effected by the use of electricity. An estimate of £2,440 based on a scheme worked out in conjunction with the Northmet Power Company, who have indicated that no difficulty is anticipated in the installation of heaters in a manner which should be free from danger to the public and which provides for the installation of ordinary electric lighting using 40 watt lamps, has been approved in respect of work in the following trench shelters:—

#### 23.—ANDERSON SHELTERS:

The total number of Anderson type shelters concreted to date is 5,459.

Advice has been received of the allocation to the Borough of a further 700 shelters. Application has been made to the Middlesex County Council for authority for the Corporation to carry out the erection of these shelters, which it is desired to concrete at the time of erection.

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#### APPENDIX.

# HOMELESS PERSONS IN THE LONDON RECION. Circular H.P.C.L. 13.

The attention of the Committee is drawn to Circular H.P.C.L. 13 from the Ministry of Health, dated the 2nd December, 1940, in which a review of the above problem is made, particularly in connection with rehousing by billeting or requisition

- (1) inside the Borough of residence, and
- (2) in other parts of the region.

Quoting from the Ministry's Circular-

- "1. Experience has shown that the rehousing of homeless persons involves more than securing simply that there is accommodation, in billets or in requisitioned houses, for the number of persons involved. 'Case work,' taking into account the needs of the individual persons or families affected is also necessary and becomes more important the greater the distance between the original house and the new accommodation.
- 2. It is now clear that an effective solution of this problem will be a contribution of major importance to the nation's war effort and to the well-being of the population. The scope and size of the problem were not generally foreseen and it has been necessary to revise and expand the arrangements that were made in advance for dealing with it. Many district authorities have already made the necessary modifications....

Proposals for the appointment of additional staff to carry out the work of rehousing homeless persons should be submitted to the Senior Regional Officer at the above address. The approved cost of additional staff appointed for the sole purpose of dealing with the homeless and of additional premises taken solely for that purpose will be reimbursed by the Government. Such additional staff should be appointed on a temporary basis from month to month.

- 3. In the first place, it is suggested, the title 'Chief Billeting Officer' is not appropriate to the officer in charge of this work. The title 'Rehousing Officer' would better indicate the true function of the department, and this Chief Officer should normally, in the more urban and populous districts, be engaged whole-time on this work and should be directly responsible to the Council through the Town Clerk or the Borough Treasurer. The main divisions of the work will be:—
  - (i) billeting,
  - (ii) requisitioning and preparation of premises,
  - (iii) salvage and supply of furniture and equipment, and
  - (iv) welfare."

In so far as the suggestions, offered by the Ministry above, concern the organisation at present in existence in the Borough, the only item which is not within the purview of the Billeting (or Rehousing) Department is that relating to the "salvage of furniture" and this is at present carried out by the Borough Surveyor's Department and the furniture stored under his supervision.

Paragraph 1 above refers to the importance of "case work" which if it is to be effective involves considerable visitations for which a carefully selected staff of voluntary workers would be necessary. It is within the knowledge of members of the Committee that Ward Committees were arranged to follow the Welfare of War Refugees but unfortunately those Committees taken as a whole have not proved successful. The main reason appears to be the lack of suitable and sufficient voluntary assistance arranged by the Wards, and if

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it is to be effect f of voluntary Committee that tt unfortunately reason appears rewards, and if this was found to be difficult with the comparatively small number of war refugees accommodated in the Borough, the larger number of refugees from the Coast and London, together with Hendon eases, will present a very difficult problem under Ward Organisation. The matter might, however, be dealt with by selected Members of the W.V.S. and other organisations, but it appears desirable that any such arrangements should come under the direct control of the Rehousing Officer, this being contemplated by the Minister's Circular where he states that Voluntary Workers should report to a responsible Officer of the Council.

The Minister further suggests that Health Visitors may well be employed in this work, but having regard to the present duties of these Officers, it would seem preferable that they should only be called upon in an advisory capacity to deal with special or difficult cases.

Paragraph 3 above contemplates the establishment of a Special (Rehousing) Department and this in effect has already been done in Hendon, having been developed under the supervision of the Chief Billeting Officer in consultation with the Town Clerk. It must not be overlooked that in addition to the duties involved by the problem under review (the rehousing of homeless persons) the department also deals with

- (A) Billeting Schemes for
  - (1) War (Foreign) Refugees,
  - (2) Coastal Evacuation,
  - (3) London Evacuation (Priority classes in addition to Homeless Persons),
  - (4) Civil Defence.
- (B) Emergency Rest and Feeding Centres (Establishment and Supervision).
- (C) Sick Bays (Establishment).
- (D) Hostels for Aged Persons (Establishment).
- (B) to (D) are, of course, the real responsibility of the County Council (Public Assistance) but the Town Council took over, at the request of the County Council, the duties involved on the 28th October last.

It is therefore apparent that in any re-organisation which may be considered necessary, the activities of the Department must be considered as a whole and arrangements made accordingly.

The following scheme is therefore submitted for the consideration of the Committee showing the staffing and allocation of duties which it is suggested might receive formal approval, and authority given for its reference to the Senior Regional Officer for his consent to the scheme and for the recognition of all expenditure involved.

The Ministry of Health eall attention to the fact that in dealing with the equipment of houses it may be necessary to instal separate cooking facilities for each family and this aspect of the matter is receiving due attention where the requisitioned houses offer accommodation for two or more families. This provision is, however, considerably hampered by the inability of the Public Utility Undertakings to provide cookers.

The suggestion is also made that consideration should be given to the question as to whether some arrangements should be made for communal feeding.

In the latter connection, a communication has recently been received from the Minister of Food urging the preparation of a scheme for general communal feeding of the inhabitants against the possibility of a food shortage. It is understood that the Director of Education has been asked to prepare the necessary scheme for this purpose, using as far as practicable the Schools as accommodation.

It is, of course, quite conceivable that heavy enemy attack might result in a large number of homeless persons and other refugees seeking shelter and sustenance at Emergency Rest and Feeding Centres and the accommodation being found inadequate to meet the situa-In such event the general communal feeding scheme envisaged by the Minister of Food would be of immense value. It is understood that the Director of Education would willingly make his organisation available to deal with such an emergency to supplement the Emergency Rest and Feeding Centres, and in this connection the revised scheme for such Centres (herewith) enumerates the contemplated secondary accommodation.

It should be mentioned that such a contingency has not been overlooked in the past and to meet any such situation the use of Cinemas with the co-operation of neighbouring catering establishments was contemplated. The communal feeding of Homeless Persons in Schools will now supersede the Cinemas as the second line, and the Cinemas can become the third line for any such emergency. A certain amount of information as to cinemas has been collated and will be developed on the basis indicated.

The devastating effect of heavy enemy action cannot be over-estimated and with the consent of the Mayor, an order has been placed for the provision of 12 suitable mobile cooking kitchens, each capable of providing for 300 persons.

As previously mentioned, the question of the salvage of furniture has not been dealt with by the Billeting Staff, but the Ministry point out that the supply and equipment of requisitioned property must be worked in close liaison with the arrangements (made under L.R. Cir. 214) for the salvage of furniture and its storage or transference to new premises in which the owners of the furniture have been housed. No difficulties have been found in these respects in the present arrangements, the salvage department having arranged as expeditiously as possible for the removal of furniture to storage or other accommodation, but a new aspect of the matter has arisen in that it has been suggested that instead of storing furniture, some of the owners, such as those who may wish to evacuate, would probably be willing to dispose of the furniture. Powers of requisitioning have now been conferred upon the Town Clerk.

By Circular H.P.C.L. 5A, 29/10/40, Hendon has been asked to hold at all times under requisition not less than 200 houses and of this number 80 should be prepared and constantly ready for action. The required number has already been requisitioned, but the furnishing of 80 presents some difficulty and it is in connection with these houses that the purchase or requisitioning of furniture already stored would prove of great advantage.

In the meantime, the purchases of second-hand furniture is proceeding and will be supplemented by new furniture for, in the first instance, 40 houses and when these are completed due attention will be given to other houses.

There are now 23 Emergency Centres providing accommodation for 2,170 persons (1 per cent, of the population is now considered a reasonable standard of provision), 1 Sick Bay ("The Gables," Woodlands) and I Hostel for Aged Persons ("Storth Oaks," Downage).

The above ladies are also available and utilised for the supervision of the collection and distribution of furniture and clothing, welfare work and other duties within the purview of the Rehousing Officer. It is desired to record an appreciation of the work of Mesdames Monro and Maughan, particularly in connection with their prompt attendance at Emergency Rest and Feeding Centres and the equipment and furnishing of houses; of Miss Horner for the large amount of assistance which she has given in many directions; of Miss Lawless for her efforts in the Bridge Lane area of the Garden Suburb Ward; and of Mr. C. G. Bloomfield for his valuable assistance in the Edgware Ward.

In connection with the dispersal of homeless persons from the Emergency Centres, Circular H.P.C.L. 13 refers to various matters for which provision has already been made in the scheme applicable to the established Centres, but two important points emerge which are here recorded:—

- (1) the fact that boundaries must not be allowed to stand in the way of the convenient rehousing of homeless persons, and
- (2) the question of the claim to the use of Centres on account of "UX" bombs.

The Committee will no doubt be in complete accord with the former, and in fact, in the administration of the services, the question of boundaries has been completely broken down in at least two respects:—

- (a) billeting of persons from neighbouring neutral areas, and
- (b) requisitioning of properties in adjoining areas;

and it is proposed to extend the facilities provided in this Borough to neighbouring areas as may be necessary consistent with due reservation for local needs.

As regards the question of the "UX" bombs, arrangements are being made for the Rehousing Officer to be informed as to the actual houses evacuated and of any subsequent extension of the evacuation.

Further, in connection with the "UX" bombs, there is still uncertainty as to when persons concerned should return to their homes. It is laid down in London Region Operations Circular No. 25 Revised that persons who have been required to leave their homes because of unexploded bombs should be allowed to return to their homes after the lapse of 96 hours. This ruling does not, of course, imply that all risk is over, but that after that time the risk is so far reduced that it is no longer necessary to exclude persons from the affected area. But while persons are allowed to return to their homes it does not follow that they should for that reason be excluded from Rest Centres, billets or other temporary housing if they do not wish to take the risk of returning to their homes.

The Minister suggests therefore that persons admitted to Rest Centres on account of unexploded bombs might (unless the demands on Rest Centre accommodation are exceptional) remain in the Centre for, if necessary, four days, that at the end of that period they should be told that they may return to their homes and that those who are unwilling to return should either be billeted or housed in the special temporary accommodation that some boroughs have provided for this purpose—such provision is made in Hendon. In either case, a charge should thenceforward be made by the rehousing authority, on the basis set out in Circular 2154 which in effect is payment according to ability. It has not been the practice to keep people in the Emergency Centres any longer than about 24 hours (but there have been exceptions).

If the four days' retention in Emergency Centres is operated and it becomes necessary after that time to collect charges, time and the circumstances of further detention in the Centres will not permit investigation into the economic position of the families and to avoid such a procedure. I suggest that the following charges be authorised and that the Supervisors of the Centres be requested to collect such charges:—

Any necessary accounting system would, of course, be put into operation after consultation with the Borough Treasurer.

The only other point in Circular H.P.C.L. 13 to which attention should be drawn is contained in the Circular in the following terms:—

"In view of the difficulties that would result from the destruction of the Council's administrative centre (or information centre) or of the offices used for the rehousing department, it is suggested that the Council should, if the matter is not already in hand, make preliminary plans for the action that they would take to deal with such an emergency, in order that the interruption of the services rendered by the Council to the homeless may be minimised to the utmost possible extent."

The most important records of the Rehousing Department concerned are:-

- (a) Requisitioned houses and consequent correspondence.
- (b) Refugee and Householders Cards-Billets.
- (c) Refugee and House Cards-Requisitioned Houses.
- (d) Counterfoils of Billeting Notices and Evacuation Certificates,
- (e) Post Office counterfoils for payments under Billeting Notices.

Either duplicates should be kept in a separate building or preferably expenditure incurred in providing reasonable fire-proof protection. Suitable fire resisting safes can be purchased at an estimated cost of £265, and it is proposed to seek the approval of the Senior Regional Officer to this provision.

Circular H.P.C.L. 14, dated 6/12/40, refers to the establishment of an Information Centre for Homeless Persons. Posters and pamphlets have been sent for distribution, but before they can be issued the Information Centre referred to must be defined for publication. It is suggested that the Rehousing Department at the Town Hall be designated for this purpose and overprinted on the posters and pamphlets.

# **SCHEME**

# EMERGENCY REST AND FEEDING CENTRES

(Approved—Civil Defence Committee—23/10/40.) (Revised —Civil Defence Committee— 3/ 1/41.)

- 1. At the request of the Civil Defence Committee of the Middlesex County Council, the Town Council of the Borough of Hendon hereby assumes the powers of the County Council for the establishment of Emergency Rest and Feeding Centres in the Borough in pursuance of the Ministry of Health Circulars 1860 and 2082.
- 2. The main purposes of these Centres will be to provide shelter for homeless persons resulting from enemy action; to supply hot drinks and simple food, and generally to provide facilities as an aid to recovery from nervous and physical strain prior to returning to their homes or dispersal to alternative accommodaton or billets. It shall generally be regarded that a period of 24 hours at the Centre should be sufficient, but Supervisors of Centres (see Appendix "A") are authorised to continue to supply meals for a reasonable time for those provided with alternative accommodation (see paragraph 19) in which the supply of essential services (gas, water and electricity) may be delayed.
- 3. The Centres shown in Appendix "A" to this Scheme may be called upon to function immediately it is established that cases of the type referred to in paragraph 2 exist.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the A.R.P. Wardens to immediately direct homeless persons to the Centre nearest the incident of damage and to utilise for the conveyance of such persons all casualty service cars as may arrive on the scene of the occurrence, provided such cars are not required for the conveyance of sitting wounded cases. In the event of homeless persons preferring to go to shelters the A.R.P. Wardens shall direct them to the nearest public shelters and shall instruct such persons to attend on the "all clear" at the Emergency Rest and Feeding Centre which has been opened for their reception.
- 5. On any action being taken under paragraph 4 of this Scheme it becomes incumbent upon the Wardens to immediately contact the Supervisor (see Schedule "A") of the selected Centre and ensure the opening of the Centre in time for the first arrivals of homeless persons.

Following the successful execution of the above direction the Wardens will report the action taken to the Controller at the Local Report Centre with such information as to numbers as may be available, and may at the same time request the provision of additional easualty service cars for transport facilities as the circumstances of the incidents may require.

The Controller in his turn will notify the Rehousing Officer (by day at HEN, 8181, Ext. 6, and by night at HEN, 3666); and failing contact with this Officer Mrs. E. Monro, J.P. (by day HEN, 2542, at night HEN, 7720) and Mrs. V. Maughan (by day HEN, 2542, at night HEN, 1400) should be notified.

6.-Each Centre, when in use, will display a card at the entrance, viz.:-

#### EMERCENCY REST CENTRE

(This Centre is not an Air Raid Shelter).

- 7. The Rehousing Officer on receiving information from the Controller shall as soon as practicable ascertain that the Centre or Centres are duly opened.
- 8. The Centre Supervisor will arrange for Record Form—see Appendix "B"—to be completed in triplicate immediately on the arrival of homeless persons or as soon as physical conditions permit:—

One copy to form the record of cases received and dealt with at the Centre;

the second and third copies to be handed to the Chief Billeting Officer who will forward—the third copy to The Borough Surveyor, upon receipt of which he will consider and report to the Chief Billeting Officer whether the premises vacated by the homeless persons are in such a condition as to make it impossible for them to return home, necessitating alternative accommodation or billeting.

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The Supervisor will arrange for each person admitted to the Centre to be issued with a pass:—

# PASS Name Date This pass may be terminated and withdrawn at the discretion of the Centre Supervisor.

There shall be attached to the pass sufficient tickets for meals for 24 hours, and thereafter meal tickets may be issued at the discretion of the Supervisor after consultation with the Billeting Officer as to necessity for remaining at the Centre.

9. Each Centre shall be adequately supplied as far as practicable with **equipment** based upon the model and standard shown in Appendix "C," and Supervisors are authorised to maintain such standard of equipment.

The Borough Official Order Book should be used and each order plainly marked "Scheme-Homeless Persons" with the name of the Centre.

10. Bulk Supplies of the following items of food will be available from the Middlesex County Council (Supplies Dept., Somerset Road, Tottenham, TOT. 4991) and a Central Store will be established for the Borough Centres at 240, Hendon Way (near the Ambassador Cinema), HEN. 9433:—

Tea Ostermilk (tins)
Sugar Milk (tinned)
Meat (tinned) Syrup
Salmon (tinned) Cornflakes
Soup (tinned) Biscuits.

Supervisors of Centres are particularly urged to ensure that adequate supplies of the above items are always available at their respective Centres to deal with the numbers for which the Centres are considered to be available at any one time. In order to reduce to a minimum the demand on transport facilities, supplies for a week (on the following scale) should always be available, bearing in mind that during any such period of a week, it may be necessary for the Centre to be open continuously.

11. Rationed Foods may be purchased by Supervisors locally through the Official Order Book on an authority to Retailers from the Food Executive Officer at St. Joseph's Convent School, The Burroughs, N.W. 4, and this authority should be held against the necessity for its use.

It is for the trader to obtain the necessary permit from the Food Office to replenish his stock but for this purpose it is essential that the counterfoil of the official order should be presented. It follows, therefore, that for all purchases an official order must be issued.

12. Unrationed Foods.—Supervisors are authorised to purchase unrationed food and other necessities locally to the best advantage, by use of the Official Order Book. When a Centre is opened a supply of bread and milk should be ordered immediately.

13. Meals.—The following is the standard for meals to be supplied at the Centres:—

Suitable men and the British Red Cross Society or the Order of St. John (Ambulance Brigade). women may also be available for these duties among the homeless persons and may be called upon

Supervisors are authorised to call in a Local Practitioner in all cases requiring urgent medical attention.

Where, from continuous air raids or because the people cannot be dispersed sufficiently rapidly, the Centre has to be kept open the Supervisor should select a deputy to act in his absence, and shifts of voluntary workers will have to be arranged.

- 15. Water Storage. In view of any possible failure in the water supply, all suitable receptacles at the Centre, when not otherwise in use, should be kept filled with fresh water.
- 16. Light (Artificial). Where gas or electricity is used, some alternative should be provided in case of need. Hurricane lamps will be provided if required.
- It has been found from experience that many people arrive at the 17. Personal Clothing. shelters scantily clad or with clothes covered with dirt from debris, etc. Supervisors are asked to endeavour to procure from private services gifts of clothing to be stored at the Centres.

Supervisors should acquaint themselves of the nearest W.V.S. Centre on which chits may be issued for the replacement of personal clothing, blankets, etc.

Supervisors of Centres are authorised to arrange with the Superintendent, British Red Cross Society at the above establishments for the admission of any suitable cases.

19. Dispersal of People from the Centre. The task of dispersing the people in the Centre is not placed upon the Supervisor, but he is authorised to facilitate the return home or other discharge of persons other than those requiring accommodation.

A Billeting Officer will attend at the Centre and interview all persons who are unable to return to their homes or who cannot otherwise provide for themselves and/or have to be billeted. have before him the particulars already obtained of such persons (see paragraph 8) and will act upon the report of the Borough Surveyor as to unfit habitations. All other persons are to be pressed to return to their homes as soon as possible.

The Assistance Board Officer will after refugees have been accommodated by the Billeting Officers arrange for the payment of maintenance allowances and other forms of relief to cases falling within the scope of the regulations.

This, however, has not proved satisfactory and a number of sessions will require to be re-established. Furthermore, the Committee are informed that recently additional duties have been placed on the medical staff in connection with the medical supervision of shelters and emergency rest centres, and also the great increase in the number of persons applying for immunisation against diphtheria and typhoid fever.

They have now commenced this work and completed Colindale School, and have promised to keep the men at work following the Corporation's contractors. Noted.

#### 4.—FIRE WATCHING OF SCHOOLS:

As referred back to them by the Borough Council, the Sub-Committee have given further consideration to the question of Fire Watching of Schools during the hours of darkness. It was reported that, owing to the urgency of the matter, the Chairmen of the Education Committee and the Works Sub-Committee (Councillors Scott and Hignett) had given instructions that all Head Teachers should make adequate arrangements for the establishment of a rota of Fire Watchers by asking for Volunteers from members of their staffs, parents, old pupils, trench shelterers, etc., and report thereon to the Committee.

A schedule was submitted giving particulars of personnel (teachers and others) who had so volunteered. It was observed that there was a shortage of watchers amounting in the aggregate to 222 in respect of Council Schools, and that 82 per cent. of the teaching staff had offered their services.

- (a) THAT the Managers of all Non-Provided Schools in the Borough he informed that it is their responsibility to arrange for the Fire Watching of such schools and that the Education Committee has no legal power to grant financial assistance in connection therewith.
- (b) THAT, as a temporary measure, Head Teachers of all Council Schools be informed that they should arrange for their schools to be watched every night—the numbers in the squads to be reduced if necessary in order to do so until such time as the appropriate numbers of volunteers are obtained to bring the weekly complement up to full strength.
- (c) THAT Head Teachers and their staffs be asked to make a personal canvass for further volunteers where required in order to bring their squads up to strength. In the meantime, there should be at least one member of the staff on duty every night, and staffs should be asked to bring their friends.
- (d) THAT the Director of Education be instructed to obtain the names of those women members of the teaching staff who have volunteered, as required under the Personal Injuries (Civilians) Scheme for War Service Injuries as distinct from war injury; also the names of men teachers whose service is compulsory unless excepted under the Order.
- (e) THAT, in the case of semi-permanent schools, Head Teachers should encourage their watchers to use one of the air raid shelters during an alert.
- (f) THAT authority be given for Head Teachers to purchase the necessary materials and arrange for the blacking-out of rooms required, the amounts so expended to be recovered through their petty cash accounts.
- (g) THAT authority be given for the purchase of 78 steel helmets and 156 blankets, that the Borough Surveyor be asked to provide an appropriate number of sleeping bunks and that no action be taken with regard to the provision of other equipment mentioned.
- (h) THAT Councillors Scott and Hignett be authorised to make all further arrangements which may be found necessary for the fire watching of Council Schools during the hours of darkness, under the provisions of the Fire Prevention (Business Premises) Order, 1941.

- (b) while in the event of invasion the Home Guard may be called upon to give whole-time service, it is fully recognised that certain members of the force may not be available for such service, as their ordinary duties must come first;
- (c) notwithstanding that such members would not be available for whole-time duty their service in the meantime as members of the force on a part-time basis is both valued and welcomed.

The Board hope that this statement of the position will remove any obstacle that may stand in the way of teachers taking their full share in this important national service.

## JUVENILE DELINQUENCY.

Members of the School Attendance Sub-Committee conferred with Representatives of the Hendon Head Teachers' Association at the Town Hall, Hendon, on Saturday, 18th January, 1941, on the question of Juvenile Delinquency and problems arising therefrom. There were present:—

Councillor H. Connell, J.P. (Chairman), Councillors G. H. Hignett and H. G. Potter, J.P., F.S.I. (Deputy Mayor); The Rev. E. Anstie Bompas, the Rev. P. G. Howell; Miss I. M. Hornsby, Miss C. Hindmarsh; Mr. A. J. Albon and Mr. J. H. Price. (An apology for absence was submitted on behalf of the Rev. I. Livingstone.)

Quarterly comparative statistics were submitted, giving particulars of all convictions at Juvenile and Petty Sessional Courts, under the Children and Young Persons Acts, during the two years 1st July, 1938, to 30th June, 1940.

The following points of view were expressed:-

- (a) At present children have too much leisure time.
- (b) In many homes both parents go out to work, owing to the War, and consequently children are left to their own devices and are apt to get into mischief.
- (c) Much of the Juvenile Delinquency prevailing may be traced to lack of parental control and to dissension in the home. Many children brought before the Magistrates have excellent school reports.
- (d) The black-out has been responsible for the closing down temporarily of a number of Organisations, Clubs, etc., for young persons.

- (e) There is a definite lack of religious knowledge and background in the homes. Children should be urged by their parents to attend Sunday School.
- (f) Children are allowed to attend cinemas far too frequently. It would appear that many parents encouraged this to keep children out of the way. Certain types of film undoubtedly have a detrimental effect on the minds of children and encourage them to commit crime.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

- (1) Teachers should endeavour to make personal contact with parents on every possible occasion with the object of creating a friendly atmosphere between school and home.
- (2) Head Teachers should, at morning assembly, talk to children regarding good behaviour out of school and endeavour to make the children "school proud." Reference should also be made to prevailing war-time conditions and efforts made to create a patriotic feeling. It should be explained that much trouble can be caused to the Country by children breaking the law.
- (3) Meetings between parents and teachers should be held at each school at the end of term when a general discourse on behaviour of children out of school hours could be given. Such meetings would provide an excellent opportunity for parents to voice their problems and obtain guidance and advice.
- (4) Co-operation between schools and Y.O.C. should be strengthened. The Y.O.C. Officer should visit schools when "leavers" are interviewed and give a short address on good behaviour. At the same time efforts should be made to enrol as many children as possible in suitable organisations.

# 3.—DAY NURSERY—WATLING ESTATE:

The following report of the Chairman (Alderman Maughan), Councillor Connell and the Medical Officer of Health, was submitted:—

In accordance with the instructions of the Committee (23/11/40—4) the following premises were inspected and plans prepared with a view to their capability of adaptation for the purpose of a Day Nursery:—

Watling Labour Hall, Back Lane. Woodcroft Hall, Watling Avenue. Addington House, Orange Hill Road.

Addington House was ultimately selected as being the most suitable for adaptation and had the added advantage of a garden in which the children could spend their time in summer.

On Tuesday, the 14th January, an interview was held with a representative of the London County Council who expressed the opinion that it was unlikely that the purchase of the premises would be agreed to but that a sufficiently long lease could probably be arranged, that alterations would be agreed to, and that restoration of the property to its original condition would not be demanded if the alterations did not detract from the amenities. In the meantime he was prepared to give an assurance that the premises would not be let until this Council had decided on its policy.

On the same day an interview took place with officers at the Ministry of Health at which the proposals likely to be placed before the Committee were discussed and more general matters concerning the establishment and conduct of a Day Nursery.

We, therefore, now place before the Committee a plan for the proposed adaptation of the premises, which, if approved by the Council, should be submitted to the Ministry of Health.

The following memorandum dealing with the administrative and financial aspects of the proposed Day Nursery was also submitted:—

(1) ACCOMMODATION:

37 children under 5 years of age,

#### (2) MEDICAL STAFF:

A Medical Officer with special knowledge of infant feeding and Child Welfare should supervise the dictary and be prepared to pay regular weekly visits. It is recommended that this work should be undertaken by one of the existing Assistant Medical Officers.

#### (3) NURSING STAFF:

As a general guide to staffing it may be stated that a proportion of nursery staff to children ought to be in the ratio of not less than one to five.

It is suggested, however, in the first place that the following staff should be engaged:-

Matron-trained Children's Hospital or General Hospital with Day Nursery experience and a knowledge of housekeeping and clerical work. Suggested salary—£180 x £10 to £200 per annum,

Sister-with hospital training as for Matron and able to deputise when required. Suggested salary-£145 x £10 to £165 per annum.

Nursery Students (4). These should be girls of 16 years or over, who will receive training and are prepared for the examination of the National Society of Day Nurseries which awards certificates to successful candidates. The period of training is from 18 months to 2 years and it is possible that with this inducement students may be obtained at a payment of about £30 a year each.

#### (4) DOMESTIC STAFF:

Experience in plain cooking.

1 at £80 per annum, and

1 at £60 per annum.

#### (5) PART-TIME HANDYMAN-for approximately 2 hours per day.

#### (6) FINANCE:

The premises are owned by the London County Council and the rent asked is £65 per annum exclusive. The period of any lease is important and it is suggested that an agreement for an initial period of 3 years would be suitable to the Council.

Enquiries have been made by the Medical Officer of Health and it is understood that the following figures have been mentioned for adaptation:-

- (a) £100—to include certain small additions in the existing building and the strengthening of the existing garage to serve as an Air Raid Shelter and Staff Room.
- (b) £700—to include item (a) above and the provision of a two storey addition to be used as a Toddlers' Nursery and an ordinary

The present building and the additions under item (a) above would provide accommodation for 22 children, whilst the additions under item (b) above would increase the accommodation to 37.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that steps had been taken to provide adequate fire watching at the Isolation Hospital and the five Permanent Health Centres as indicated hereunder:—

#### Isolation Hospital:

Two night watchmen are on duty. All the staff are being trained in fire fighting and a set of rules for their guidance has been compiled by the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade. Arising out of an inspection of the premises the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade reported that the loft of No. 3 Ward is divided into two separate compartments and access is only provided to one section. He, therefore, recommended that access be provided to the other section either through the dividing wall, or by means of a trap door in the floor of the loft.

#### Health Centres:

The Health Centres at Central Hendon, Mill Hill and West Hendon are also First Aid Posts and a night staff is therefore on duty. In addition, the first two Centres are supervised by the fire brigade housed in adjacent premises.

Arrangements have been made with the Post Wardens (D 24/27) for watchers and fire-fighters to cover the Watling Centre, which is not occupied at night, and similar arrangements are being made through the Wardens in connection with the Child's Hill Centre.

Certain additional items of fire fighting equipment recommended by the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade are being purchased.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the report be approved and that the Borough Engineer be instructed to arrange for the necessary access to be provided to the section of the loft over No. 3 Ward at the Isolation Hospital referred to above.

A letter was submitted from Dr. Richard Roper, a member of the Emergency Medical Services medical staff at the Hendon Emergency Hospital, transmitting a copy of a letter sent by him to Dr. Pearson, the Group Officer of Sector (Emergency Medical Services) regarding the user of accommodation at the Emergency Hospital.

After hearing the observations of the Medical Superintendent of the Isolation Hospital (the Medical Officer of Health) and the Resident Medical Officer (Dr. Livingston), the Committee have given the following instructions:—

- (a) That representations be made to Sector Headquarters to reduce the number of resident Emergency Medical Services staff attached to the Hospital;
- (b) That no unauthorised persons be granted the user of accommodation at the Hospital.

#### 17.—PURITY OF WATER SUPPLY:

A letter was submitted from the Colne Valley Water Company enquiring whether the Council would be prepared to undertake through the A.R.P. organisation the distribution to households within the Company's area of supply of pamphlets drawing the attention of consumers to the advisability of keeping an emergency supply of water to help to cover their needs should the normal supply be temporarily interrupted. The pamphlet also emphasises the necessity of boiling water for drinking and domestic purposes in certain eventualities, and precise instructions are given on this point. In this connection, however, the letter points out that on many occasions it is not possible to boil water when such a procedure is definitely necessary because of the simultaneous interruption of gas and electricity services. The pamphlet, therefore, contains advice on a simple procedure whereby consumers can chlorinate their own drinking water in an emergency by using a dilute solution of sodium hypochlorite, followed, if necessary, after a given contact period, with one or two crystals of sodium thiosulphate.

The Company suggest that the distribution of a small quantity of the chlorinating agents to every household in the Company's area of supply should be arranged by the Council through the various A.R.P. services, and that the cost of the chemicals should be borne by the Council.

It is understood that sufficient quantities of the chlorinating agents can be obtained at small cost, and after hearing the observations of the Medical Officer of Health, the Committee

#### MILL HILL BRANCH LIBRARY.

#### 23.—STAFF:

The two new Junior Libraries, respectively at 92, The Broadway, Mill Hill, and at the Watling Centre, Burnt Oak, were opened for public use on Monday, January 27th. Their opening provides two more service points at Mill Hill in addition to the one previously in use, and the Chief Librarian reported on staffing arrangements necessitated thereby.

The vacancy for a senior assistant at Mill Hill, caused by the resignation of Miss Halliwell in September, was not filled as the Mill Hill Branch Library at that time was temporarily out of use. Owing to the increase in the number of service points, it is now necessary temporarily to fill this vacancy and the Chief Librarian recommended that Miss I. Gale be appointed Temporary Senior Assistant and that she be granted an increase of £30 per annum while holding the position.

The appointment of Miss Gale as Temporary Senior Assistant will necessitate the temporary appointment of a second assistant and the Chief Librarian recommended the promotion of Miss G. M. Baker at an increased salary of £30 per annum whilst holding the position.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That the proposals of the Chief Librarian be approved.
- (b) That Miss I. Cale be temporarily appointed Senior Assistant at Mill Hill (vice Miss Halliwell, resigned) and that Miss C. M. Baker be promoted temporarily Second Assistant and that such officers be granted an increase in salary of £30 per annum whilst holding such positions.

The hospital is mainly for neurological cases and the Honorary Librarian states that reading is very much encouraged and that it is especially gratifying to be able to supply patients with books on subjects in which they are interested. In the report, reference is made to the variety of subjects, including technical literature, psychology, poetry, drama and nature study, for which there is a steady demand.

During the time French soldiers were at the hospital, the library also lent books in French. These were eagerly read as the men on the whole were well educated and had a knowledge and appreciation of French literature. The Honorary Librarian concludes her report by saying that the co-operation of the Council in lending library books had greatly added to the efficient service of the hospital library.

The books lent to the hospital numbered 250 volumes of general literature and 175 volumes in French. The latter have now been returned. Noted.

# ESTATES, PARKS AND ALLOTMENTS.

#### 1.—REQUISITIONS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the Mother Superior, St. Joseph's Convent, calling attention to the condition of the fencing between the Council's land and the land used for grazing purposes belonging to the Convent, and suggesting that the Council should undertake the necessary repairs to such fencing.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in the matter and the Convent Authorities informed accordingly.

#### 3.—THE CULTIVATION OF LANDS ORDERS, 1939:

The Borough Surveyor reported with regard to the under-mentioned Orders served upon the Council by the County War Agricultural Executive Committee as follows:—

ORDER NO. 346. 120 acres of land comprising the Copthall Playing Fields, the whole area to be ploughed by the 28th February, prepared and sown or planted to an approved crop for harvesting in 1941.

An area of 38.56 acres has already been let at an annual rental of 10/- per acre. The three fields concerned, Nos. 925, 942 and 946, have been cut up very badly by the operation of the War Office and will be difficult to cultivate. In

addition a large portion of the area is occupied by pits and heaps of soil. The rent paid is equivalent to approximately £1 per acre for the area available for cultivation. Of the remaining 81 acres it is proposed to reserve 8 acres for further war-time allotments. This leaves approximately 73 acres of land in respect of which an offer has been received from Messrs. Tweedy & Company of Hanwell to cultivate the land in accordance with the County Council's requirements and to pay a rental of 15/- per acre per annum. This land has not been seriously interfered with by the War Office and the Borough Surveyor is negotiating with the Company with regard to the question of rent.

- ORDER NO. 398. 34 acres approximately of land between Scratchwood and Moat Mount Golf Course, comprising two woods, viz., Boys Hill Wood and Thistle Wood. The greater part of the remainder of the land is overgrown with brambles, braken, etc. There are only a few small areas of grassland for grazing. The County Council require the land to be grazed by cattle for the duration of the War. The land has with the approval of the County Council already been let to Mr. Noad of Bury Farm, Edgware, for this purpose at a rental of £5 per annum.
- ORDER NO. 399. 7 acres of land north of Scratchwood. The County Council require the land to be ploughed, prepared and sown or planted to an approved crop for harvesting in 1941. In view of the small area available and having regard to the isolated position of the land, application has been made to the County Council for permission to use the land for grazing purposes.
- ORDER NO. 400. 175 acres of land—Moat Mount Golf Course. The whole site to be grazed by sheep for the duration of the War. The responsibility for complying with this Order rests with the lessees of the land.
- ORDER NO. 401. 6 acres of land adjacent to Woodfield House, between Cool Oak Lane and the reservoir. To be ploughed, prepared and sown or planted to approved crops for harvesting in 1941. In view of the position of this land it has been arranged for the Council to cultivate this Area in conjunction with an areas of 4.5 acres which is already under cultivation.
- ORDER NO. 402. Two areas of land both forming part of the West Hendon Playing Fields. Field No. 695, 2½ acres in extent is required by the County Council to be set out for allotments for cropping in 1941, or sown or planted for harvesting in 1941. The land has already been pegged out with a view to it being let for allotment purposes. The other field, No. 962, approximately 9 acres in extent is required to be ploughed, prepared and sown or planted to approved crops for harvesting in 1941. In view of its proximity to Woodfield House, this area will also be dealt with by the Council in conjunction with the other land in the vicinity.
- ORDER NO. 406. 10 acres of land in the centre of Clitterhouse Playing Fields.

  To be ploughed, etc., for harvesting in 1941. Owing to the situation of the land, it will not be possible to let it to any tenant and it has therefore been arranged for it to be dealt with by the Council.
- ORDER NO. 463. 22 acres of land forming part of the Moat Mount Estate, let on a tenancy of 364 days to Mr. A. Weedon of Hendon Park Farm, to be ploughed, etc., for harvesting in 1941. It would appear that the tenant, who is responsible for complying with the Orders, desires to keep this land for hay for next Winter's cattle feed and that ploughing the land would make it difficult for him to continue his dairy farm. It is proposed to inform the County Council accordingly and to ask them to vary the Order.

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- ORDER NO. 464. 20 acres of land forming part of the Moat Mount Estate, also let to Mr. A. Weedon. The land to be debushed and ploughed or otherwise cultivated and re-seeded to permanent pasture by the 31st March, 1941. The tenant states that he is unable to comply with the terms of the Order. The Committee are of opinion that it is unreasonable to require a yearly tenant to undertake the work and it is proposed to ask the County Council to vary the Order.
- ORDER NO. 465. 83 acres of land forming part of the Moat Mount Estate, also let to Mr. A. Weedon. This area to be harrowed and, in parts, to receive calcium oxide at the rate of one ton per acre. The tenant is prepared to undertake the work of harrowing and asks the Council to provide the calcium oxide.
- GENERAL. Although the County Council have served Orders requiring considerable areas of land to be ploughed, they are not in a position to supply any plant to enable the work of ploughing or cultivating, etc., to be carried out.

The Borough Surveyor, therefore, is arranging with Messrs. R. & D. C. Weatherhead of St. Albans to undertake the necessary ploughing and harrowing of the land in respect of which the Council are responsible. (Group II. Committee, 4/1/41—E.P. & A.C., 31).

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That in the case of Order No. 406, the attention of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries and the Middlesex County Council be directed to the fact that the proposals will entail the destruction of four cricket tables on which considerable Capital Outlay has been incurred and on which there still remains outstanding debt, and further that considerable expense will have to be incurred in the eventual restoration.
- (ii) That, subject to the foregoing recommendation, the report of the Borough Surveyor be approved.
- (iii) That in the case of Order No. 465, the Council provide the calcium oxide.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 4.—ARRANDENE ESTATE, MILL HILL:

It was reported that an area of approximately 50 acres of the above land was very suitable for grazing purposes and that an offer had been received from Mr. Noad of Edgwarebury Farm, Edgware, to rent for this purpose, the land at a rental of 15/- per acre, on an annual tenancy from the 31st March, 1941. The land has not been made the subject of an Order by the County War Agricultural Committee.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the offer of Mr. Noad be accepted.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 5.—WEST HENDON PLAYING FIELDS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the Borough of Wembley enquiring whether the Council would be prepared to grant the use of approximately 4 acres of the above playing fields for the purpose of war-time allotments. The Wembley Council has set aside a large area of the adjacent park for allotments, but a portion thereof has recently been requisitioned by the War Office and 49 allotment holders have been suddenly dispossessed.

[NOTE:—The Finance and General Purposas Committee understand that the arrangement envisaged in the foregoing recommendation has now been superseded by the letting of the allotments direct by the Hendon Connect to Wembley residents. In these circumstances and before detailed consideration of the motion, the Finance and General Purposes Committee recommend that no action be taken in the matter.]

- (c) That, with the exception of premises to which the Fire Prevention (Business Premises) Order, 1941, applies the scheme in respect of Watching and Fire Fighting Parties be operated by the Chief Warden.

The Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade, therefore, will be responsible for the arrangements for fire protection of business premises, and the enforcement of the appropriate regulations.

The Committee concur in these arrangements, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND accordingly.

#### AUXILIARY FIRE SERVICE.

#### 26.-ALTERATIONS AND ADDITIONS TO CENTRAL FIRE STATION, HENDON:

The Borough Surveyor reported with regard to an interview he and the Chief Officer had had with officials of the Home Office (Fire Brigades Division) concerning the scheme for additions to the Central Fire Station for accommodation of the Auxiliary Fire Ser-The estimated cost of these works amounted to £1,350 in respect of which the Home Office have stated that only £461 would rank for grant. The Home Office questioned the necessity for the proposal to expend £190 on a garage for the two ambulances, in order to utilise the space at present occupied by these vehicles for workshop purposes. Further that any scheme for the provision of workshops must form the subject of a separate application and could not be dealt with under the present scheme. It was also suggested by the Department that an underground water tank costing £82 17s. 6d. might be deleted from the scheme in view of the fact that the training of the Auxiliary Fire Service was, to a large extent, completed. In addition, it was stated that the provision of a petrol tank and pump was not allowable for auxiliary fire service purposes, as authority already existed for the hiring of these from private garages where necessary. This provides for a further deduction of £194 17s. 6d., making a total deduction of £467 15s. 0d. from the estimate, leaving a total of £882 5s. 0d.

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With regard to the remaining items, the Home Office, eventually agreed to approve the provision of additional sanitary accommodation and also for the construction of the concrete roadway and yard. The total amount which they are prepared to allow to rank for grant is therefore, as follows:—



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### BOROUCH OF HENDON.

APPENDIX to the report of Group I. Committee (P.H. & M.S.—Item 9), 1st February, 1941, to be submitted to the meeting of the Borough Council on the 22nd February, 1941.

# TREATMENT AND DISPOSAL OF FOODSTUFFS CONTAMINATED BY POISON GAS:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that he had completed his negotiations on the matters of detail in connection with the Scheme for the treatment and disposal of food-stuffs contaminated by poison gas, which was approved in principle at the last meeting of the Committee (P.H. & M.S.C., 4/1/41—10) and the final scheme is set out in the Schedule hereto.

The Council have already approved of the use of the West Hendon Swimming Baths as the decontamination site, but certain alterations will be necessary. In the report approved at the last meeting it was suggested that the paved area behind the diving boards should be used for the treatment of food containers by bleaching powder and subsequent washing down, but it is now understood that the bunk-room which at present covers a large paved and drained area adjacent to the Car Park is shortly to be removed by the Middlesex County Council. The use of this paved area is preferable as it is larger and in close proximity to the suggested unloading ground, and in these circumstances the Medical Officer of Health recommended that the Middlesex County Council be asked to remove the bunk-room forthwith and that the surface of the site be treated with sodium silicate solution, the cost of which the Borough Surveyor estimates at £3 10s. 0d.

Additional accommodation is required for airing foodstuffs and it will be necessary to provide a building affording weather protection but allowing free circulation of air. The most suitable site is behind the diving boards, which it was previously intended should be used as washing space. The Borough Surveyor estimates the cost of an open shed approximately 66 feet by 11 feet at £105; and covering form tables with zinc, and counter with American cloth, at £12 17s. 6d.

With regard to the services of expert food chemists and technologists, a letter has now been received from the Governing Director of the Express Dairy Company, expressing his willingness for the Principal of the Company's Laboratories, Mr. A. L. Barton, F.C.S., R.I.P.II., and his assistant, Mr. T. MacDonald, F.C.S., to co-operate with the Authorised Officers in the event of emergency or when the Public Analyst is not available.

With regard to the destruction of foodstuffs, the Medical Officer of Health is negotiating with the Watford and Wembley Local Authorities with a view to foodstuffs being destroyed at their refuse disposal plants in the event of the Council's plant being damaged or otherwise out of action. In this connection the Wembley Council ask for reciprocal facilities, upon which the Committee are recommending the Works and Fire Brigade Section of Group II. Committee to submit a favourable recommendation to the Council.

With regard to the transport of contaminated foodstuffs, the Medical Officer of Health recommended that in order to provide immediate supplementary transport, the Public Health Department Utility Van be metal lined throughout. This van is already partly metal lined, and the Borough Surveyor estimates the cost of completing the lining of the van with zine at £7 0s. 0d.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

(a) That the Scheme for the treatment and disposal of foodstuffs contaminated by poison gas set out in the Schedule hereto be approved and adopted;

(b) That the Middlesex County Council be requested forthwith to remove the bunk-room erected on the paved area adjacent to the Car Park at the West Hendon Swimming Bath;

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- (c) That the alterations and adaptations recommended in the Medical Officer of Health's report, and the estimates of cost thereof prepared by the Borough Surveyor as indicated above, be approved and adopted;
- (d) That the application of the Wembley Borough Council for reciprocal facilities in connection with the destruction of contaminated foodstuffs, be remitted for consideration by the Works and Fire Brigade Section of Group II. Committee with an intimation of this Committee's support to such application.

(Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal, and Recommend that the administration of the service be placed under the control of the Civil Defence Committee).

### SCHEDULE.

# SCHEME FOR DEALING WITH FOODSTUFFS CONTAMINATED BY POISON CASES.

When notification is received that a gas bomb has dropped within the Borough of Hendon, the Officer-in-Charge at the A.R.P. Control Centre will immediately notify the Medical Officer of Health's representative in Control, who will inform:—

(1) The Authorised Officer, primarily responsible:-

(2) The Authorised Officer on duty.

A car will then be dispatched from the nearest Depôt to convey the Officer concerned to obtain protective equipment and proceed to the incident.

On arrival at the scene of the contamination the Authorised Officer will take steps to obtain all possible information, and will confer with the Gas Identification Officer as to the nature of the gas used and the extent of the possible contamination of foodstuffs.

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It may also be necessary to consult other expert opinion (i.e., Public Analyst, other appointed chemist, or a member of the chemical staff of the food firm whose stocks have been damaged).

# INSPECTION AND DECONTAMINATION OF FOODSTUFFS:

The authorised Officer will inspect the foodstuffs and pass as fit for human consumption food which in his opinion has been suitably protected and has not been contaminated.

Any foodstuff's contaminated or suspected of being contaminated will be seized and removed for decontamination treatment or destruction (authority is given by the Emergency Defence Regulations, 1939 (S.R.O. 927, Sec. 25 (2)).

Foodstuffs will be classified as follows:-

- (1) Foods which have been contaminated but which after treatment may be passed
  - (a) as fit for human consumption, or
  - (b) condemned as unfit for human food but may be released for other uses (e.g., conversion into animal feeding stuffs, soap boiling, etc.).
- (2) Foods which have been contaminated and must be totally condemned and destroyed.

So far as conditions permit, the Authorised Officer will prepare an inventory of all foodstuffs seized or removed for treatment or destruction, and a copy of the inventory will be sent to the Food Executive Officer.

Foodstuffs coming within categories 1 and 2 will be placed in metal or metal-lined containers or vehicles and conveyed to the decontamination site. The vehicles will be requisitioned from the Borough Engineer with the addition of the Public Health Department Utility Van.

If the material is heavily contaminated and there is little chance of it being salvaged, steps will be taken to render it relatively harmless before it is transported.

At the decontamination site the Authorised Officer will supervise the decontamination treatment and will consult the Public Analyst or other appointed advisory chemist regarding the sampling of foodstuffs which it may be necessary to submit to analysis in order to ascertain the extent of the contamination.

All foodstuffs which have been decontaminated and passed as fit for human consumption will be returned to the shopkeepers in clean vehicles provided by the Borough Engineer (the Authorised Officer will make an inventory of all foodstuffs so returned and send a copy to the Food Executive Officer).

Where it is not possible to decontaminate foodstuff's sufficiently to be passed as fit for human consumption, they will be decontaminated as far as practicable, and released if possible for conversion into animal feeding stuff's, soap boiling, etc.

In the case of foodstuffs passed for use for purposes other than human consumption, immediate reference must be made to the Food Executive Officer.

Where it is not possible to use the food brought to the site either for human consumption or other purposes, the Authorised Officer will condemn the food and arrange for its destruction by incineration or burial.

### DECONTAMINATION SITE:

West Hendon Baths will be used as the decontamination site, as follows:-

- (1) The Car Park for the reception of contaminated goods.
- (2) The paved area adjoining the filter house and Car Park will be used for the treatment of food containers by bleaching and subsequent hosing down.

- (3) The kitchen and refreshment room will be used for the trimming or eutting of foodstuffs and subsequent aeration.
- (4) The men's dressing room No. 2 and the clothes room adjoining the kitchen will be used for aeration or the storage of goods awaiting Analyst's report.
- (5) The women's dressing room and clothes store to be used for the storage of foods which have been decontaminated and await return to the shop-keepers.
- (6) The building to be constructed behind the diving boards will be used where aeration only is necessary.
- (7) The Superintendent's office will be used for the purpose of keeping records, etc.

#### DESTRUCTION:

Foodstuffs to be incinerated will be decontaminated and placed in suitable containers and conveyed by vehicles provided by the Borough Engineer to:—

- (1) Refuse Disposal Plant, North Circular Road, N.W. 2.
- (2)
- (3)

As an alternative, contaminated foodstuffs may be disposed of by burial, if the necessary precautions are taken beforehand to render them harmless, and three feet of soil covers the condemned material. Arrangements have been made for such burial to take place on land south side of North Circular Road, opposite Claremont Road.

The Authorised Officer will prepare an inventory of all foods destroyed and forward a copy to the Food Executive Officer.

# DECONTAMINATION SQUADS:

Decontamination squads will be available for loading at the scene of contamination and for unloading and decontaminating foodstuffs at the site. The squads will act under the supervision of the Authorised Officer.

#### PUBLIC ANALYSTS:

It will be frequently necessary for the Authorised Officer to consult the Public Analyst or other appointed advisory chemist regarding the sampling of foodstuffs which it may be necessary to submit to analysis in order to ascertain the extent of contamination. "Volunteers who are not in excess of immediate requirements and who undertake to perform as members of the Local Authority's Civil Defence organisation the duties of fire prevention for not less than 48 hours per month, will, if they sustain injury arising out of or in the course of the performance of these duties, be entitled to receive the compensation payable to part-time Civil Defence volunteers enrolled by the Local Authority under its general scheme."

#### CIVIL DEFENCE:

His Worship the Mayor asked for the indulgence of the Council to enable the report of the Civil Defence Committee to be taken as the first item of business and also to receive a statement from the Controller on the recent air raid disaster.

Continuing, the Mayor said:-

"As you are aware, with dramatic suddenness a large bomb was dropped in one of our most congested areas causing loss of life, seriously wounding a large number, destroying a large amount of property and rendering hundreds of families homeless. This dastardly attack was the most serious yet inflicted on this locality since the outbreak of the war.

The suddenness of the raid, the large number of casualties, together with a great amount of material damage threw a big strain on all our services, especially the rescue and casualty services, who, to their great credit, were on the scene in a comparatively short time. Assistance was asked for and received from neighbouring boroughs and I would like here to pay tribute to the excellent work, under splendid leadership, which was performed by all parties. They worked truly like Trojans, continuously for two days and three nights amidst scenes that literally beggar description. The whole organisation was good and speaks volumes for those who patiently and untiringly have helped to build it up. Many deeds of heroism and courage can be enumerated but I prefer to leave that to the responsibility of the Controller.

Now what of the people who were the victims of this infamous brand of German frightfulness? It has been my privilege—and I use that word deliberately—it has been my privilege to be with them during their hour of trial and sore affliction. Bereaved, bruised, battered, their little homes in ruins, there was not a whimper—not a grouse—but just a grim determination that in spite of the shambles about them those Nazi barbarians will not get them down.

One cannot help feeling that these people reflect the true British spirit: they are the salt of the earth; they are of the granite that a dozen Hitlers cannot smash. It is the spirit of these front liners that will lead us to ultimate victory.

Now a word of praise to those who worked in this building. The Assistance Board was excellent: gradually they built up a system which dealt with urgent advances for war damage compensation, and I would like to mention the Area Officer, Mr. C. N. Roscoe, who readily carried out any suggestion that was made for dealing with each case as speedily as possible. In 8 days £5,404 was paid. The Lord Mayor of London was most generous and at my request sent £2,000 on Tuesday, making the total contribution from that fund £4,500 since last September. The disbursements from this fund to date are about £3,000.

The Re-housing Department have been hard put to it but, as the Controller will inform you, this job was efficiently tackled.

The Fire Brigade have rendered yeoman service too. At my request they installed their canteen immediately outside the Town Hall and supplied almost a continuous service of tea and biscuits which was greatly appreciated by the men, women and children who were waiting for attention."

The Mayor read letters he had received from the Minister of Home Security and the Regional Commissioner with reference to the disaster and culogising the magnificent work of the Civil Defence and Voluntary Services, and also reported upon a personal conversation he had had with Sir Warren Fisher who had visited the area.

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Home Security eulogising the also reported also reported had visited the As a tribute to the memory of the victims in the tragic occurrence and as an expression of sympathy with the bereaved and those who had suffered, the Council stood for a few moments in silence.

Alderman Reynolds thanked the Mayor for his statement and expressed keen satisfaction at the knowledge that the Civil Defence Services and the Council's staff had proved equal to the occasion, and on behalf of his colleagues and himself he expressed their sincere appreciation of the untiring efforts of the Mayor and the immense amount of work His Worship had performed in relation to the disaster.

The Council indicated their wholehearted concurrence with the remarks of Alderman Reynolds.

The A.R.P. Controller submitted the following statement:-

It is my task to give to the Council some information as to the functioning of the services at the recent major disaster to which His Worship the Mayor has referred and in respect of which I had the advantage of seeing something of both the Control Centre in action and operations on the site.

At the Control Centre, Mr. Begg was on duty. He was subsequently relieved by Mr. Day and proceeded to the site. Mr. Chadwick was the Officer in Charge and the whole of the staff dealt with the incident with expedition and an entire lack of confusion or flurry.

All the Borough's resources in Rescue Parties, Ambulances and Cars were almost immediately called into action and reinforcements by way of Rescue Parties and cars had to be requisitioned through Sub Group.

Our thanks are due to the whole of the outside personnel who gave such prompt and valuable assistance. Throughout, Group and Sub Group were most helpful.

The First Aid Post adjoining the site was damaged and the electricity supply out of action. This caused some difficulty in the initial stages but Miss Richardson took charge and soon had the situation well in hand.

The Staff Officer of the Casualty Services (Mr. Pinkney) was also most helpful in guiding and controlling the Stretcher Parties and assisting at the First Aid Post.

I shall not attempt to describe the scene of the disaster but some slight idea of the magnitude of the incident may be gained when I give the official figures as to casualties and damage. (These details are recorded in MS.)

The Wardens were on the scene immediately and the Chief Warden, who is an inspiration to his personnel, is to be congratulated on the efficiency of the service under his charge. Exceptionally good work was done by Post Warden Dade. Other posts in "G" District and "D" District sent reinforcements and played a large part in the successful handling of operations on the Wardens' side.

It was necessary to call in the aid of the Home Guard whose help was most timely and valuable. The Fire Brigade operated with its customary efficiency.

On the site itself the most outstanding figure was that of Mr. Pelham, directing, guiding and assisting—always cool and unperturbed—just the man to take charge of a situation of this character. He never misses attending all serious incidents and has deservedly earned the admiration and confidence of all those connected with A.R.P. It is only fitting that I should pay this public tribute to his indomitable spirit and invaluable work. In that work he was most ably assisted by Mr. Jared and Mr. Croysdill and the work of the rescue and casualty services was splendid.

There are certain eases of bravery and devotion to duty which will in due course be reported to the Civil Defence Committee.

During the night of the disaster and subsequently the Council's Mobile Canteen, under the control of Mrs. Lesty and W.V.S. was in operation and proved most helpful, the work of Mrs. Thwaites and Miss Sturt being particularly worthy of mention. It was also necessary to invoke the assistance of Sub Group in obtaining a further canteen which proved most useful and for which the services were very grateful. Valuable help was also given by the Salvation Army Canteen. (The details given by the Controller as to the number of homeless persons, and the numbers re-housed, billeted, etc., are recorded in MS.)

The work of the Re-housing Department was stupendous but was carried out under the control of Mr. Harding, with that speed and thoroughness which we have learnt to expect from him, while Mrs. Maughan and Mrs. Monro, Miss Horner and Miss Lawless rendered exceedingly valuable assistance.

Most sympathetic and careful attention was given to the identification and disposal of the dead and in the latter connection most capable service was rendered by Mr. Blizard.

In this brief outline of events I have endeavoured to cover the ground as far as possible.

I can only add that all the services operated in a highly satisfactory manner and I ask that I may be permitted to convey the thanks of the Council to the personnel and all those outside bodies who so readily responded."

The Council indicated their assent to the request contained in the last paragraph of the Controller's statement.

Councillor Nye, speaking on behalf of the people he represented in the stricken area, said the people who had suffered were more than satisfied with the way the Council and their officers had carried out their duties, and they were most grateful to the Women's Voluntary Services. On behalf of the people who had suffered he expressed thanks to all who had helped to make their conditions easier.

# REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENCE COMMITTEE to the Meeting of the

# HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL

22nd February, 1941.

#### Ladies and Gentlemen,

I herewith submit a report on various matters which have been dealt with by the Civil Defence Committee at its meetings held on the 31st January and 14th February, 1941.

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# 1.—WOMEN'S VOLUNTARY SERVICES—HEADQUARTERS:

In view of the bad state of repair of Burroughs House, at present being used as the Headquarters of the Hendon Centre of the Women's Voluntary Services, the tenancy of these premises is being discontinued and arrangements are being made to take over No. 160, Station Road, Hendon.

# 2.—ISOLATION HOSPITAL—RESIDENT MEDICAL OFFICER:

At the expiration of three months, the authority given for the re-arrangement of the supervision of the Casualty Services to enable the Deputy Medical Officer of Health to discharge the duties previously carried out by Dr. Stalker at the Isolation Hospital has been reviewed.

The Committee has expressed its satisfaction with the arrangements now existing and has agreed to the Deputy Medical Officer continuing to perform his Hospital duties.

#### 3.—CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL—INCREASE OF PAY:

As from the 3rd February, 1941, the pay of whole-time volunteers at that date in receipt of the standard weekly rates of pay has been increased by flat rate additions of 5/- per week for men (including foremen and skilled members of the Rescue Parties), 3/6d. per week for women and 1/6d. per week for youths. The current standard rates of pay therefore are 70/- per week for men, 47/- for women, 23/- for youths 16-17 years of age and 28/- for youths 17-18 years.

Depôt Superintendents and their deputies have been granted a similar increase provided such increase does not carry their revised rate over £6 per week.

The Committee is supporting the Hayes and Harlington Urban District Council in making representations to the Minister of Home Security for the granting of further increases of 5/- per week for men and 3/- per week for women.

# 4.—COMFORTS FOR CIVIL DEFENCE SERVICES:

In regard to the scheme for the provision of woollen comforts for members of Civil Defence Services (referred to in Item 7 of the report to the Meeting of the Council held on the 25th January, 1941) a local Civil Defence Comforts Committee has been formed under the Chairmanship of His Worship the Mayor.

The Heads of the various Air Raid Precautions Services have been asked to appeal to the personnel of the Services to organise functions to raise funds for the purchase of wool. 40 lbs. of wool have been received from the local branch of the British Red Cross Society, which is now being made into garments by working parties organised by kindly presented 12 Pullovers, 12 Scarves, 5 pairs of Mittens, 12 Helmets and 12 pairs of Socks to the Comforts Committee.

## 5.—DEPOT SUPERINTENDENTS:

The Middlesex County Council has approved the appointment of Depôt Superintendents and Deputies at the various A.R.P. Depôts in the Borough as shown below:-

alt with by the 14th February, Representations made to the County Council for approval to the payment of Deputy Superintendents at the combined Depôts established at Mill Hill and Hendon Way at the rate of £5 per week, have been referred by that Authority to the London Civil Defence Regional Commissioners with a request that such payment should be approved.

It should be noted that the rates of pay referred to above are subject to the increase in pay authorised by the Ministry of Home Security and referred to in Item 3 above.

# 6.—EVENING SOCIAL FUNCTIONS AT DEPOTS:

Having regard to the desirability of Depôts being clear for emergency action and the difficulty of controlling admission thereto, the Committee has directed that no social functions for other than Civil Defence Personnel be permitted in A.R.P. Depôts during the hours of black-out.

# 7.—HENDON COUNTY SCHOOL DEPOT:

Approval is being sought to the installation of two electric fans for ventilating the men's sleeping quarters at this Depôt, and also for the provision of electric heating in the basement used for sleeping quarters by the female personnel and for the accommodation of the guards and express parties.

#### 8.—CLITTERHOUSE DEPOT:

A sum of approximately £20 is being expended on the provision of internal lavatory accommodation for the female staff at this Depôt.

#### 9.—FIRST AID POSTS—GAS CLEANSING SECTIONS:

At the request of the County Council, the general lay-out and arrangement of the gas cleansing sections of First Aid Posts in the Borough is being reviewed in the light of recent instructions issued by the Ministry of Health in regard thereto.

The provision of three electric fires for heating the cleansing section of the West Hendon First Aid Post has been sanctioned.

#### 10.—DECONTAMINATION SERVICE:

Pending the result of the application to the County Council for an increase in the number of Decontamination Squads from 8 to 12, two additional trained squads were formed to act as an emergency reserve. As many of the men in these reserve Squads were engaged in the Corporation's Repair Section, men have been recruited from the Parks Department to form the 4 additional Squads to permit the release of the personnel normally engaged in the Repair Section. The training of these additional Squads is now well advanced. The men appear to be very interested in the work and it is anticipated that the total of 12 fully-trained Squads will be available for service in the immediate future.

In view of the exacting and arduous nature of their duties which would necessitate substantial release to permit allowing periods of rest for the men engaged, the Middlesex County Council is being pressed to obtain a definite decision from the London Region in regard to the operation of these Squads on the relief system.

In view of the possible simultaneous use of gas and high-explosive bombs, necessitating the combined operation of both Rescue Parties and Decontamination Squads, the Committee have directed that arrangements be made for Mr. B. Coe of the Sewer Section to be transferred to the Decontamination Service for such periods as may be necessary in connection with the training of Decontamination personnel and in assisting to direct operations at actual gas incidents.

# 11.—REST EQUIPMENT FOR WARDENS' POSTS:

Authority has been received for the provision of bunks, mattresses, blankets, pillows, etc., at Wardens' Posts and is being acted upon.

# 12.-FIRE PRECAUTIONS:

In regard to the organisation of Fire Watching and Fire Fighting Parties, set out in Item 12 of the Report to the Council at its Meeting held on the 25th January, 1941, the Fire Prevention (Business Premises) Order, 1941, issued subsequently directs that occupiers of business premises are to make proper and adequate arrangements for detecting and combating incendiary bombs and requires them to submit details of their proposed arrangements to Local Authorities for approval, the Local Authority being responsible for the enforcement of the Order in relation to factories and business premises.

It was considered that the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade should deal with matters concerning business premises and the enforcement of the regulations and with the concurrence of the Works and Fire Brigade Committee, the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade has taken over these duties.

The Borough Engineer, Medical Officer of Health and the Director of Education are dealing with schemes for the protection of premises under their control.

#### 13.—DISTRIBUTION OF SAND:

Distribution of two partly-filled sandbags to each house in the Borough is proceeding satisfactorily, over 30,000 bags having been delivered to date.

Members of the Rescue and Stretcher Parties have been assisting in filling and distributing the bags.

#### 14.—REPAIRS TO CRATERS IN ROADS:

The Commissioners of the London Civil Defence Region have indicated that the services of the Royal Engineers' General Construction Companies will continue to be available for a limited period only and Local Authorities should prepare to deal with repairs to roads based on a scale of attack as intense as or even more intense than that experienced in the early part of September last.

Suitable labour available in this District is limited and is gradually being depleted by the operation of the Military Service Act. Application has been made to the London Region for the temporary release from the Army of a number of key men and for the deferment of the calling up for the time being of other men engaged on this work. Release has been allowed in the case of two men but refused on the ground of national requirements in the case of seven others.

Arrangements have been made to employ 100 men on the clearance of sites of damaged buildings in the area in order that they may be immediately available for the repair of roads in emergencies.

# 15.—PROTECTIVE WORK TO REST CENTRES:

In reference to the arrangements for an expenditure of £5,000 on schemes for providing protective works to various buildings taken over for the purposes of Rest Centres for homeless persons in the Borough (see Item 15, Report 25/3/41) this matter was subsequently reviewed by an Officer of the Middlesex County Council in conjunction with the Technical Adviser to the Ministry of Health and the whole policy of providing protection for the Rest Centres was revised. In accordance therewith, the County Council are now being asked for permission to provide protected accommodation or shelters at the various Rest Centres at a total estimated cost of £6,314 0s. 0d.

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# 16.—SPECIAL EVACUATION SCHEME:

Special considerations which have arisen since the preparation of the original evacuation scheme has rendered it necessary for a revised scheme to be prepared, and the Rehousing Officer has received a request that the machinery for the reception of 24,800 evacuees should be overhauled.

The original scheme contemplated the reception of evacuees at Main Line Railway Stations over a period of 48 hours and billeting direct from these Stations. Under a revision of the scheme, whilst the transport and reception would probably be over a similar period, the dispersal to billets would be made from Emergency Centres. The Rehousing Officer is conferring with the Director of Education as to the use of Schools for this purpose. As this may necessitate the closing of certain Schools for three or four days, the Education Committee is being requested to give sympathetic consideration to this proposal.

# 17.—EMERGENCY REST AND FEEDING CENTRES:

In the revised scheme for emergency Rest and Feeding Centres (Item 14—Report to Council, 25/1/41) provision was made for secondary accommodation at twelve schools. On the 30th January, the County Civil Defence Committee decided that it was not necessary to have secondary Rest Centres as the provision already made in Hendon is in excess of the standard of 1 per cent. of the population laid down by the Ministry of Health.

The decision of the County Council seriously affects the underlying principles of the Hendon Scheme, drawn to provide an efficient service to meet potential emergencies. The County Council has therefore been advised that this Council regards it as imperative that the service should anticipate the possible effect of major incidents of the kind experienced in various parts of the Country and if the Hendon Scheme—drawn to provide an efficient service and to meet such potential emergencies—is to be limited to emergency centres on the basis of 1 per cent. of the population, it is considered that this Council should be absolved from responsibility in the event of major incidents occurring necessitating additional accommodation and other services.

Further representations are being made to the County Council in the light of experience gained at more recent incidents.

## 18.—SHELTER STATISTICS:

The following details were obtained as a result of a census of the user of public shelters in the area, taken on a recent date selected by the Commissioners of the London Civil Defence Region:—

It should be pointed out that there was no Air Raid Alert during the night in question and the figures do not therefore give a real indication of the use which may be made of the shelters.

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# 19.-AIR RAID SHELTERS-EXPENDITURE:

The Minister of Home Security, dealing with the representations made to him by Local Authorities that expenditure on the provision of public Air Raid shelters should be reimbursed to Local Authorities in full regardless of their construction prior to the 19th October, 1940, has stated in the House of Commons that although he appreciated the point raised, he could hold out no prospect of this concession being made to operate retrospectively.

# 20.—SHELTER POLICY:

The County Civil Defence Committee has directed the attention of the Shelter Commissioner of the London Region to the little use being made of public and domestic shelters in the Group area with a view to ascertaining the present policy in regard to the continuance of creetion of communal shelters on highways. The County Civil Defence Committee recommended to the Shelter Commissioner that Local Authorities in Group 6 should be authorised to provide where possible protection within the home, i.e., by strengthening a room.

The following information was ascertained by the County Council from the Shelter Commissioner:—

- The Minister of Home Security is expected to make an early announcement in the House of Commons on shelter policy.
- 2. As far as possible, having regard to existing contracts, the construction of further communal domestic surface shelters should be discontinued where experience has shown that shelters of this type are not used by the public.
- 3. That the steps authorised in the various circulars to make existing shelters habitable, i.e., installation of heating, lighting, bunks and provision of other amenities, should be carried out as speedily as possible.
- 4. Public surface and trench shelters should be heated by means of the "Cura" stoves, but that the installation of electricity for heating basement shelters and communal domestic shelters would be considered. Any subsequent information connected with the heating of shelters by electricity will be circulated to Local Authorities for guidance as and when received.
- 5. The erection of shelters of the Haldane type will not be authorised in any circumstances having regard to the resources, i.e., labour and materials available.

In regard to item 2, the Committee has directed that for the moment, the existing contracts which provide for the erection in each Ward of one-third only of the total number of communal shelters approved by the Middlesex County Council be not exceeded.

In regard to items 3 and 4, the Council is aware of the arrangements being made for the electrical lighting and heating of the shelters (see item 22, Report 25th January, 1941). The electrical wiring of the shelters is proceeding satisfactorily but the fittings required are not being received as rapidly as could be desired.

# 21.—AIR RAID SHELTERS AND PUBLIC HEALTH:

In reference to item 25 of the Report of the Meeting of the Council held on the 25th January, 1941, following consultation with the Minister of Health and Middlesex County Council it has been agreed that the medical supervision of shelters can be carried out by Sanitary Inspectors, provided that the shelters are visited from time to time by one of the Medical Assistants who is to be available for consultation on any matter concerning hygienic conditions. Arrangements are being made for more frequent day-time visits and periodic night visits by the Council's Sanitary Inspectors and subject to the replacement of one of the two Medical Officers who have recently resigned, the medical supervision of the shelters will be adequately covered by forming a rota of the medical staff.

It is considered that the present use of the shelters does not justify the appointment of nurses or the establishment of medical aid posts. There are not many groups of shelters to which the terms of the Ministry of Health Circular in regard thereto can be reasonably applied. The situation will, however, be reviewed should need arise.

# 22.—AIR RAID SHELTERS—IMPROVEMENTS:

- (a) Anderson Shelters—the total number of Anderson shelters concreted to date is approximately 5,730. This work has again been delayed by bad weather.
- (b) **Bunks in Shelters**—Bunk accommodation has now been provided in public shelters for approximate 7,750 persons.

# BOROUGH OF HENDON AIR RAID DISTRESS FUND:

In response to a question raised by Alderman Richardson as to whether the Mayor proposed to make a statement regarding the Fund which is being raised to relieve air raid victims in the Borough, His Worship stated that, at the request of a number of people, but largely on the suggestion of the Lord Mayor of London who presumed a local effort would be made, he had launched an appeal for a fund to assist persons whose homes had been destroyed as a result of the recent air raid disaster and also for relieving air raid distress not only in this particular instance but distress arising out of air raids generally throughout the Borough. Worship further stated that, although the campaign had not yet gathered full momentum, he had been deeply touched by the splendid generosity of a large number of persons and already the Fund, including amounts promised and eash actually received, amounted to fairly big proportions. The Mayor expressed the hope that he would have the support of the Members of the Council and he was assured of the support of the inhabitants of the Borough. He stressed the point that all the money raised would be applied to the relief of victims of any air raid, irrespective of the particular incident causing distress.

With regard to the constitution of the Committee charged with the responsibility of launching the appeal, an enquiry was made as to whether a Member of the Council representing the West Hendon Ward was a member of the Committee. It was ascertained that such was not the case but the Mayor indicated that a Member would be welcomed and it was left to the Members of the West Hendon Ward to submit a nomination.

# H. EVACUATION OF CHILDREN AFFECTED BY AIR RAIDS-MEDICAL EXAMINATION:

A letter was submitted from the Middlesex Education Committee referring to Ministry of Health Circular No. 2261 and enquiring whether the Council would be prepared to allow their Medical Officers to conduct the medical examination, prescribed by Defence Regulation 31 (c), of any children resident in the Council's area who are attending schools for which the County Council is responsible as Education Authority. The expense of such examinations would be a charge against this Council's evacuation account.

Ministry of Health circular 2261 provides that if a child is certified by the medical practitioner appointed by the local authority to be (a) suffering in mind or body as a result of hostile attacks, or (b) is in such a state of health as to be likely so to suffer if he remains in that area, the local authority may give directions for the removal of the child under an evacuation plan, but the parent or guardian may within 7 days appeal to a Court of Summary Jurisdiction against the direction.

The Regulation, however, only applies to evacuation areas, and in this connection the Medical Officer of Health points out that in view of the extent of hostile attacks in the Borough, arrangements should exist whereby children certified by the Medical Officer as suffering in body or mind as a result of air raids should be voluntarily evacuated and the cost charged to evacuation account.

The Committee are in agreement with the views of the Medical Officer of Health, and

# 1.—EMPLOYMENT OF CHILDREN IN AGRICULTURE:

# 2.—COMMUNITY FEEDING—CO-OPERATION BY LOCAL EDUCATION AUTHORITIES:

The Director of Education submitted Board of Education Circular No. 1539 in which Local Education Authorities are requested to lend all the assistance in their power in connection with community feeding. Such assistance may be categorised as follows:-

(a) "Stand-by" Provision for Community Feeding during special emergencies:-

Use of Domestic Science Rooms and school buildings and playgrounds in close connection thereto.

(b) Co-operation by Local Education Authorities in Community Feeding in normal operation:-

Use of School Halls as dining rooms,

(c) Maintenance of School Canteens during Emergencies:-

Use of ovens which function with solid fuel in addition to the usual gas and electric ovens.

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#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT full co-operation in the provision of Emergency Feeding Centres be given by the Committee.

#### 3.—INSTRUCTION IN GARDENING:

The Sub-Committee considered a reference from the Council's Allotments Committee of 1st February, 1941, approving a suggestion of the Henden Federation of Allotment Societies that boys should be given instruction in gardening.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT such instruction be given to boys in attendance at Senior Schools where the Head Teacher is able to make the necessary provision, and that the offer of the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies to afford facilities in connection therewith be accepted.

#### 4.--PIG CLUB:

A letter was submitted from Mr. J. H. Price, Headmaster of the Hyde Mixed School, asking that permission might be given for the staff to start a Pig Club at the school without entailing any expenditure by the Education Committee.

# 1.-BROADFIELDS AVENUE SCHOOL:

#### (a) REPORT OF ARCHITECT:

The Architect reported that some progress has been made but things are moving slowly, largely due to the labour difficulty. Roof tilers were due to commence work

on 6th instant, and carpenters have been busy getting the roof boarding finished and the tiling battens fixed ready for the tiles. Painting is also going on. It is hoped to see the heating chamber completed and asphalted shortly. Noted.

Windsor Floors, Ltd., giving particulars of the terms upon which they are prepared to proceed.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

#### Roof Tiling:-

Messrs, Henry J. Greenham, Ltd.—£701 9s. 10d., less 2½ per cent. discount.

The Town Clerk has been instructed to execute the contracts. Noted and approved.

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### (g) QUANTITY SURVEYORS' FEES:

A letter was submitted from Messrs. E. E. Richardson and Davis stating that they have been informed by the Architect that certain work on this contract has been let to various firms who have tendered on schedules of prices of which the original Quantities for the various trades form the bases. The settlement of accounts will involve measurement on site, preparation and pricing of accounts and agreeing the amounts with the several firms. The existing agreement with the Quantity Surveyors does not provide for services to be rendered in the event of determination of the original contract, and they ask for instructions from the Committee before proceeding.

Messrs. Richardson and Davis state that they are prepared to accept a fee of 2 2/5ths per cent. for carrying out the necessary work.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT Messrs. E. E. Richardson and Davis be instructed to carry out the additional work necessary at the fee mentioned, namely 2 2/5ths per cent. on the amounts of the accounts agreed with the various contractors.

## 3.—PROTECTION OF SCHOOL WINDOWS:

The estimated cost of carrying out the necessary work is £3,000. The Board of Education are prepared to recognise the expenditure involved for grant purposes at the rate of 100 per cent, and application for formal approval is now being made to H.M. Inspector. Noted and approved.

# 5.—FIRE WATCHING OF SCHOOLS—REPORT OF AD HOC COMMITTEE:

In accordance with authority delegated, it was reported that the Chairman of the Education Committee and the Works Sub-Committee had given instructions that, in order to endeavour to bring Fire Watcher Squads for certain Council Schools up to strength, Head Teachers be asked to get in touch with the Chief Wardens of the posts nearest their schools with the object of enlisting the services of a sufficient number of street sector watchers, and that if such services were forthcoming, suitable accommodation within the school premises be offered to the Watchers.

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#### II. NON-PROVIDED SCHOOLS:

The Managers of all Non-Provided Schools were asked on 10th February to submit schemes for fire watching. At date, schemes have been received from the Managers of St. James' R.C. Central, R.C. School of the Annunciation, St. Paul's C.E. and St. Vincent's R. C. Schools—4 schools.

No schemes have yet been submitted in respect of All Saints' C.E., St. Agnes' R.C., St. John's C.E., St. Mary's C.E. and St. Mary's R.C. Schools—5 schools,

#### B. OTHER MATTERS.

- I. In connection with the Fire Watchers Order, the Personal Injuries (Civilians) Scheme for War Service Injuries as distinct from War Injury applies. Head Teachers have provided lists of all persons who are taking part in the Fire Watching Schemes. This is essential because all persons who are doing service must be IDENTIFIABLE as Members of a Civil Defence Organisation.
- II. All blankets and sleeping bunks have been delivered to the various schools but at date it has not been possible to procure steel helments. A communication has been sent to the Ministry of Home Security with regard thereto.
- III. The Head Teachers of Edgware School have reported that the Chief Warden of that district is prepared to arrange for his street sector watchers to carry out fire watching duties at Edgware Council School subject to the payment by the Committee of the sum of 3/6d, per week. This would bring the fire watching squads at that school up to strength.
- IV. Board of Education Circular 1542 regarding Fire Prevention Orders was submitted. In this circular the Local Education Authority are asked to notify the Regional Commissioner of their arrangements for carrying out the provisions of the Fire Prevention (Business Premises) Order, 1941. In the case of Non-Provided Schools, the Managers should notify their arrangements to the "appropriate Authority" which, in the case of Hendon, is the Borough Council.

The Board state that reasonable expenditure on equipment for fire watchers in respect of Provided Schools will be recognised for grant and that such expenditure may include the re-imbursement by the Authority of the reasonable cost of extra meals and extra travelling expenses actually incurred by members of fire parties whether in Provided Schools or Non-Provided Schools (if claimed). Necessary equipment which Non-Provided Schools cannot supply from their own financial resources will be provided by the "appropriate Authority."

The Ad Hoc Committee were of opinion that instead of paying the actual cost of extra meals and travelling expenses it would be more equitable to pay a subsistence allowance of 1/- per head per week (one duty spell of 12 hours per week) making a total estimated expenditure of £2,000 per annum. Application was made to the Board of Education for approval to the payment of such subsistence allowance. The Board have, however, notified the Authority that they are unable to approve the proposal to pay a weekly subsistence allowance of 1/- per head.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) THAT the question of payment of salaries to teachers absent from school owing to injuries received through fire watching duties be referred to the Staffs and Salaries Sub-Committee for consideration.
- (b) THAT the Civil Defence Committee be asked to provide 78 steel holmets for use by school fire watchers, and that in the event of those holmets not being forthcoming, efforts be made to obtain the supply of guaranteed reinforced bakelite helmets.

- (c) THAT, in view of the exceptional circumstances explained, the assistant mistresses mentioned on the staff of Orange Hill Central Cirls' School be allowed to commence fire watching duties at 7.30 p.m.
- (d) THAT authority be given for the weekly payment (if claimed) to members of school fire watching parties of the reasonable cost of extra meals and of extra travelling expenses actually incurred in connection with fire watching duties.
- (e) THAT the foregoing Report (as amended) be approved and that section "A" of the Report be forwarded to the Regional Commissioner.

2.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936 (PART VII.)—CHILD LIFE PROTECTION:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on applications (case Nos. 303, 304 and 305) for permission to undertake for reward the nursing and maintenance of children under nine years of age apart from their parents.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the maximum number of foster children under the age of nine years that may be kept at the premises be fixed at one in each case.

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### 3.—HEALTH CENTRES—REPAIRS AND RE-DECORATIONS:

In accordance with the Committee's instructions (P.H. & M.S.C., 4/1/41-5) the Chairman and Medical Officer of Health reported that the five permanent Health Centres had been inspected, and recommended that the repairs and re-decoration work indicated hereunder should be carried out:—

### Health Centre and First Aid Post, Central Hendon.

Cleanse walls and whiten ceilings throughout.

Repaint external doors.

Correct defect in wastepipe to lavatory basin in the Doctor's room, which is at present syphoning out after discharge.

### Health Centre and First Aid Post, West Hendon.

Cleanse walls and whiten ceilings throughout.

Extend plates behind radiators in waiting room.

Remove redundant electric conduit tubing in Toddlers' Room.

Fix gas fire in office.

These premises, however, recently suffered damage through enemy action and essential repairs are now being carried out by the Borough Surveyor's Department. When these are completed the remaining cleansing and minor work should be carried out.

### Health Centre, Watling.

This Centre is in a comparatively good state of repair throughout but internal washing down should be carried out where necessary, the front door should be re-painted and the wooden palings at the rear of the Centre require repairing.

### Health Centre, Child's Hill.

This Centre internally is in a comparatively good condition but the walls should be washed down and paintwork renewed where necessary, and the palings at the rear of the premises repaired.

### Health Centre and First Aid Post, Mill Hill.

These premises require washing down and the ceilings whitening throughout, the roof over the Doctor's cloakroom is leaking and requires repairing and in the staff watercloset compartment there is dampness in the rear wall due to rain gaining access through ventilators provided in connection with the addition built for decontamination. A metal protection should be provided on the wall behind gas heater in the Minor Ailment Room.

### Centres Cenerally.

The painting of ceilings might be more advantageous in the long run than white-washing and where roof lights have not already been covered over this should be carried out to prevent damage.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to carry out the repairs and re-decoration work indicated above.

### 7.—TEMPORARY HOUSEKEEPER:

The Medical Officer of Health reported as to the desirability for the appointment of a temporary housekeeper possessing a diploma in Domestic Science who would be responsible for the catering arrangements and the supervision of the domestic staff at the Isolation Hospital. Such an appointment would be especially valuable at the present time owing to the large volume of work falling upon the Deputy Matron.

The Medical Officer of Health has given instructions for an enquiry to be made of the Sector Matron to ascertain whether an officer capable of performing the work is available, failing which he asked for authority to advertise for a temporary housekeeper at a salary of £130 per annum with residential emoluments.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given to the appointment of a temporary housekeeper at the Isolation Hospital at a salary of £130 per annum with residential emoluments, the appointment to be subject to the Council's regulations relating to temporary officers.

### 8.—DEPUTY MATRON:

The Committee gave consideration to the position of the Deputy Matron (Sister Keegan), who has been acting Matron since the 28th December last in the absence of the Matron, and

### 9.—PURITY OF WATER SUPPLY:

The Council on the 22nd February last adopted the recommendation of this Committee (P.H. & M.S. 1/2/41—17) to the intent that stocks of sodium hypochlorite and sodium thiosulphate, for chlorinating drinking water under certain circumstances, should be purchased by the Council and distributed to householders through the Civil Defence services.

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A conference has since been held between the Colne Valley Water Company and Medical Officers of Health concerned, and the conclusion arrived at that the purchase, storage and distribution of hypochlorites by local authorities is not, for a number of reasons, the best solution of the problem.

As a result of the conference a pamphlet has been prepared giving advice, amongst other matters, on methods of chlorination and suggesting that the hypochlorites should be purchased by the prospective users. The distribution of the pamphlets through the Wardens' organisation has been arranged with the Controller and notices have also been printed for exhibition in public air-raid shelters.

In these circumstances, the Committee

### 30.—WAGES OF MANUAL WORKERS-CO-ORDINATION:

The Committee considered a report of the Conference held on the 4th February last between representatives of the Middlesex County Council and representatives of Local Authorities in Middlesex with a view to setting up machinery for the co-ordination of the wages of manual workers employed by the County Council and other Local Authorities in the County. The following is a summary of the recommendations agreed by the Conference:—

- That adherence to the principle of collective bargaining should be continued and where necessary extended to cover the whole of the Council's manual workers.
- 2. That craftsmen with respect to whom machinery exists either by means of direct negotiations with trade unions or with joint conciliation boards, etc., should continue to be so dealt with, but that all other manual workers should be dealt with through a joint industrial council suitably constituted.
- That co-ordination should be extended to cover not only the manual employees
  of the County Council but also those of all other local authorities in Middlesex.
- 4. That the Joint Industrial Council should include representatives of all local authorities in the County and that the constitution and procedure of the existing body should be suitably amended, such amendments to incorporate, in particular, the following principles:—-
  - (a) That all wage-rates recommended should be standard rates as opposed to minimum rates:
  - (b) That no official of a trade union represented on the employees' side should function as an employers' representative on the employers' side:

(c) That each local authority should be entitled to appoint one representative and, if employing more that 500 workers within the purview of the J.I.C., an additional representative for every 500 or part of 500 such workers, subject to a maximum of three representatives.

- 5. That the whole of that part of the expenses of the J.I.C. apportioned to be borne by the employers' side (viz., at present one-half of the total) should be paid by the County Council,
- 6. That the employers' side should be properly organized as a body in the nature of an employers' federation and the necessary clerical, etc., work performed by the County Council's staff.
- 7. 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

#### REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENCE COMMITTEE

to the Meeting of the

#### HENDON BOROUCH COUNCIL.

22nd March, 1941.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I herewith submit a report on various matters which have been dealt with by the Civil Defence Committee at its Meetings held on the 28th February and 14th March, 1941.

#### 1.—INSPECTION OF CIVIL DEFENCE SERVICES:

Admiral Sir Edward Evans, K.C.B., D.S.O., Regional Commissioner of the London Civil Defence Region, conducted an inspection of the Civil Defence Services in the Borough on Wednesday, 12th March, 1941.

He subsequently wrote indicating his pleasure in finding the Services so well organised and controlled. He accordingly awarded the "Red Pin" denoting all-round efficiency.

At the same time, Sir Edward forwarded from funds placed at his disposal by admirers and well wishers in South Africa who have expressed the greatest appreciation of the splendid work being done by the men and women of London, a cheque for £50, to be disbursed at the discretion of the Mayor and the Controller for the benefit and welfare of the Civil Defence Services.

#### 2.—COMMENDATION FOR GALLANTRY:

The Council will be pleased to learn that a member of the Wardens' Organisation, Deputy Post Warden E. V. Foxen, has received a Commendation for Gallantry in respect of his action in September last in relation to an unexploded bomb which was endangering the lives of residents in the Borough.

# 3.—CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL—DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURE:

The Commissioners of the London Civil Defence Region are being urged to introduce without delay a code of disciplinary procedure for Civil Defence personnel who misdemean themselves in such a way which does not render them liable to prosecution under the Civil Defence (Employment) (No. 2) Orders.

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#### 4.—RESCUE SERVICE—PAYMENT OF DRIVERS:

While the recent increase in the flat rate of payment to male Civil Defence personnel was 5/- per week, that granted to Rescue Service Drivers under a J.I.C. Award, was 3/- per week only. The Committee consider that the circumstances leading to the increase for Civil Defence personnel generally are equally applicable to the Drivers of the Rescue Service. The payment of a further 2/- per week has been authorised and the County Council has been requested to approve such action.

#### 5.—CASUALTY SERVICE—DEFERMENT OF CALLING UP:

In view of the arduous nature of the work of removing casualties from bombed sites and the need of able bodied men for such duties, the Committee is supporting the Harrow Urban District Council in making representations to the Minister of Labour and National Service for the continued deferment of the calling up of the male personnel over 30 years of age at present serving in the Casualty Services.

#### 6.—UNIFORMS FOR RESCUE AND CASUALTY SERVICES:

Arrangements have been made by the Minister of Home Security for the production of a heavy uniform of battle-dress design for issue to the members of the Rescue Parties and First Aid Parties, supplies of which it is anticipated will be available shortly.

The Committee consider that the whole of the male personnel of the Casualty Service should be so equipped (and not merely members of First Aid Parties), and have issued instructions accordingly.

#### 7.—RECREATIONAL EQUIPMENT:

The Middlesex County Council are being pressed to increase the amount of the expenditure authorised for the replacement of worn recreational equipment provided for Civil Defence personnel.

#### 8.—INTER-SERVICE TRAINING:

In accordance with instructions received from the Minister of Home Security, additional training is being arranged to ensure that members of First Aid, Rescue and Decontamination Services are able to render skilled assistance to each other in case of need.

#### 9.—DECONTAMINATION SERVICE:

The training of additional decontamination squads recruited from employees of the Council engaged in the Parks Section has been completed. Information as to transport and additional equipment for these additional parties is awaited from the County Council.

In view of the intention of London Region that Rescue Services should act as Express Parties to contaminated sites, necessitating the carrying of additional equipment which it is not possible to accommodate on the Rescue lorries, the County Council is being asked to approve the provision of trailers at an estimated cost of £30 for attachment to the Rescue Service Iorries.

#### 10.—CASUALTY SERVICE TRANSPORT:

Having regard to the increasing purposes for which Casualty Service ears have now to be used, and to the fact that such use of the cars (which were second-hand when acquired by the Corporation) cannot continue without grave risk of them becoming beyond repair and consequently unavailable for the purpose for which they were obtained, the Committee have directed that endeavours be made to obtain a reserve fleet of twelve 12/14 h.p. saloon cars at a cost not exceeding £100 per vehicle.

# 11.-WOMEN'S VOLUNTARY SERVICES-SUB-CENTRES:

The Hendon Section of the Women's Voluntary Services are desirous of establishing Sub-Centres in the districts of Mill Hill and Edgware and the approval of the County Council to such action is being sought.

# 12.-AIR RAID INCIDENTS:

The Committee has carefully reviewed detailed reports upon the direction of operations as recent air raid incidents and has approved the following action:-

#### Rescue Service.

- (a) Expenditure on the provision of small flags to indicate progress at various points in the work of rescuing casualties for the information of personnel and reliefs. (The thanks of the Committee are due to the Women's Voluntary Services in connection with the making of the flags).
- (b) Arrangement for the establishment at major incidents of Advance Headquarters and for consideration to be given to the possible linking of such headquarters with the Incident Officer by means of field telephones.

#### Identification of Casualties.

Expenditure on the provision of cards to record the number and place of sleeping of residents in all houses in the Borough to provide a record to be readily available at the scene of the incident for an initial basis of checking the whereabouts of persons connected with each house affected.

#### Fire.

Expenditure on water carrying cans to enable rescue personnel to deal with small fires regardless of the availability of a local water supply.

The Regional Commissioners are being urged to impress upon householders the advisability of using close mesh fire guards which can be wedged into the opening of fire places to counteract the scattering of burning embers by blast and debris falling into the grates.

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#### 13.—GAS CLEANSING FACILITIES:

Schemes for the establishment of gas cleansing stations in the shopping areas of Golders Green, Burnt Oak, Hendon Central and Edgware are being prepared.

The Middlesex County Council have requested that plans and estimates for the erection of a building at the Refuse Disposal Works for the decontamination of clothing should be prepared. The building under consideration will be much larger than that for which plans and estimates were submitted to the County Council about 12 months ago, and which were then disapproved, and is intended to provide accommodation for certain adjoining areas.

Local chemists have been requested by the Ministry of Home Security to co-operate in a scheme for the treatment of gas easualties by making available at their premises pails of bleach for use by the public. Thirty-nine chemists in the Borough have offered facilities, and a scheme is being prepared accordingly.

#### 14.-MILL HILL REPORT CENTRE:

The approval of the Regional Commissioners has now been received to an expenditure not exceeding £990 Os. Od. on the erection of the new building to accommodate the Mill Hill Report Centre, as a result of the application made in July last for the approval to an estimated expenditure of £1,050 Os. Od.

#### 15.—CLITTERHOUSE AMBULANCE DEPOT-LAVATORIES:

The London Civil Defence Region has approved the expenditure of £20 on the proposed amended lavatory facilities for female personnel at the Clitterhouse Ambulance Depot.

#### 16.—HENDON COUNTY SCHOOL DEPOT—ALTERNATIVE ACCOMMODATION:

In order that the resources and personnel now stationed at the Hendon County School may be more satisfactorily housed and that two Rescue Parties may be accommodated, the Middlesex County Council is being urged to agree to the erection of a third Depot building in the neighbourhood of the Town Hall for this purpose.

#### 17.—OBSERVATION POSTS FOR WARDENS:

The Minister of Home Security has intimated that he is unable to agree to expenditure on the provision of protected rallying and observation posts for use by the Wardens in the Borough.

#### 18.—WARDENS' POSTS—BLAST WALLS:

The Committee has authorised the supply of salvaged bricks and the necessary cement and sand to enable the Wardens to erect, where possible, blast walls for the protection of the entrances to their Posts.

#### 19.—FIRE PREVENTION (BUSINESS PREMISES) ORDER, 1941:

Proposals for watching, etc., buildings under the control of the Corporation have been approved for submission to the Minister of Health.

#### 20.—FIRE WATCHING AND FIRE FIGHTING PARTIES:

Approximately 16,000 applications for enrolment in fire watching and fire fighting parties have been received. Details are not yet available as to the arrangements made in all Post areas but it would appear that the fire watching of private premises in the Borough generally is being effectively carried out.

# 21.—DISTRIBUTION OF SANDBAGS:

The work of filling and delivering bags of sand to houses in the Borough was temporarily delayed by the employment of all available labour and transport at a recent The work, however, has been recommended and is proceeding satisair raid incident. factorily.

# 22.—EMERGENCY REST AND FEEDING CENTRES:

In reference to Item 17 of the last Report, verbal intimation has been received that the County Civil Defence Committee is unable to vary its decision on the necessity for the secondary accommodation provided for in the Hendon Scheme for Emergency Rest and Feeding Centres.

The Controller and Rehousing Officer were instructed to interview members of the County Committee to press that the Borough should be given a reasonably free hand in the administration of the Service on behalf of the County Council.

# 23.—REST CENTRES—PROTECTION:

Satisfactory progress is being made with the provision of protection at the various Rest Centres in the Borough.

# 24.—SHELTER STATISTICS:

The following details were obtained as the result of a recent census of users of public shelters taken on the instruction of the Regional Commissioners.

#### 25.—SURFACE SHELTERS:

The Ministry of Home Security has directed that all communal and public surface shelters built in ungauged lime mortar or lime cement mortar below standard, or in cases where insufficiently baked bricks have been used, are to be closed. 11

# 26.—COMMUNAL SHELTERS—ERECTION:

94 Communal Shelters have been completed under present contracts and work is in hand on a further 86 shelters.

Accommodation in Communal Shelters is now available for 4,908 persons.

# 27.—IMPROVEMENTS TO SHELTERS:

Satisfactory progress is being made in the lighting and heating of public shelters generally and in addition the work of installing lighting in communal shelters is pro-Similar work on ceeding in the Park, Garden Suburb and Golders Green Wards. shelters in the Child's Hill Ward will be commenced in the course of a few days.

Bunks fitted in public shelters now provide accommodation for 8,133 persons.

The waterproofing of trench shelters is still proceeding.

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#### 28.—ANDERSON SHELTERS—ERECTION AND CONCRETING:

The total number of Anderson Shelters concreted to date is 5,926,

The draining of shelters is being undertaken in cases where bad flooding has occurred and where concreting is unlikely to produce a satisfactory result.

As the work requires constant supervision, the County Council is being urged to agree to the erection and concreting of Anderson Shelters in one operation by direct labour.

#### 29.—AIR RAID SHELTERS—BURNT OAK:

The Committee has agreed to assume responsibility for public shelters numbers 136/147, Burnt Oak, erected by the Wembley Council within the Corporation's area on the East side of Edgware Road between Watling Avenue and Montrose Avenue.

#### 30.—INDOOR SHELTERS:

The Commissioners of the London Civil Defence Region have announced the production of a new type of domestic shelter for indoor use to be manufactured centrally for distribution to householders by local authorities. The shelter will accommodate two adults and one older child or two younger children. Designed for erection on the lowest floor of the house, it has been tested against debris equivalent to the collapse of two floors above. No other protection is offered and the shelter should be placed in a position where the best lateral protection is afforded by existing walls. Not more than one shelter is to be issued to one householder, domestic shelter in one of the other forms being suggested for larger householders.

The shelter can be erected by unskilled labour. Arrangements are being made with the Boy Scouts' Association for Scouts to assist householders unable to cope unaided with the work, and local authorities are asked to afford training facilities for local Scouts.

The shelters are to be issued free, and put on sale concurrently. (No advice has been received as to the sale price of the shelters). The income limit for persons eligible for free shelters has been raised to £350 per annum, increased by £50 for each child below school leaving age in excess of two. This new limit applies also to free domestic shelters in general. Previously ineligible householders are not entitled to reimbursement of cost of shelters already provided at their own expense. Free shelters are not to be provided for persons already in possession of a domestic shelter (or a share in a communal shelter) which is serviceable or can be made so in a reasonable time, or for whom arrangements are already in train for the provision of shelter of another type. Preference is to be given to persons having no shelter of any kind available. The Commissioners emphasise there is to be no abandonment of Anderson shelters in favour of new indoor shelters, merely because people prefer the indoor to the outdoor shelter.

Advice has been received that it is anticipated that the first supplies for this Borough will be available at the end of the current month. The forms of application for shelters, which the Ministry of Home Security require completed, have not however, yet been received from the Ministry.

#### 1.—ADMINISTRATIVE MEMORANDUM NO. 282:

This memorandum from the Board of Education was submitted and noted.

#### 2.—BOOTS AND SHOES FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN:

A letter was submitted from the Federated Associations of Boot and Shoe Manufacturers pointing out the probability that the Government's policy of transferring industrial capacity from civilian production to munitions production will seriously prejudice the ability of the boot and shoe industry to continue to maintain supplies of children's boots and shoes. Representations have already been made to the Government by the Federation suggesting that no restriction should be placed upon the manufacturing of children's boots and shoes and the Federation now requests the Committee to supplement such representations by an appeal through the Local Member of Parliament and by direct approach to the President of the Board of Education, the Minister of Health and the President of the Board of Trade.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the request of the Federation be acceded to and that representations be made accordingly.

#### 3.—RESPIRATORS FOR TEACHERS:

A letter was submitted from the Hendon Teachers' Association stating that difficulty is experienced by teachers in making their instructions to children clear and distinct whilst wearing the ordinary "Civilian" respirator but that this difficulty does not exist with the "Civilian Duty" respirator. The Association therefore asks whether it is possible for all teachers to be provided with the latter respirator. The Director of Education pointed out that the Ministry of Home Security had advised the Board of Education that for such duties as teachers are expected to perform in the event of an air raid, they will be adequately equipped, and in some respects better equipped, with the ordinary "Civilian" respirator and that so far as audibility is concerned this view was endorsed by the Council's Deputy Air Raid Precautions Officer.

#### 6.—USE OF SCHOOLS AS REST CENTRES:

#### "USE OF SCHOOLS AS REST CENTRES.

- It appears that in some areas the use or proposed use of schools as Rest Centres
  is causing or is likely to cause undue interference with the maintenance of
  proper provision for education. While a wide use of schools for this service
  will no doubt continue to be necessary, it is at the same time most important
  that the schools should continue to function as normally as possible, and this,
  not least, in those areas where circumstances necessitate the establishment of
  Rest Centres.
- 2. The Board have accordingly been in consultation with the Ministry of Health, who have issued instructions to their Regional Officers that, except in cases of sudden emergency, the consent of the Local Education Authority and His Majesty's Inspector should be obtained before schools are secured as Rest Centres. Undue interference with educational provision can be avoided only if the following principles are observed:—
  - (i) Schools should not be taken for Rest Centres unless there is no other reasonably suitable accommodation available.
  - (ii) The occupation of school premises or a part of them in advance of the occurrence of the emergency should be avoided unless, owing to exceptional circumstances, it is absolutely essential, or it is quite clear that the accommodation required can be spared without detriment to the maintenance of the educational service.
  - (iii) When a school has been taken into use as a Rest Centre it should always be cleared and returned to educational use as quickly as possible, in normal cases within 48 hours or so, the occupants being dispersed to billets or elsewhere."

# 1.—BROADFIELDS AVENUE J. AND I. SCHOOL:

#### (a) REPORT OF ARCHITECT:

It was reported that progress on this contract is slow but is going along steadily. The asphalt tanking to the heating chamber is now completed and as soon as a few reinforcing rods are obtained the roof of the chamber can be finished and brick work pushed on. The classroom block on the south side is roofed in and it is hoped that the block on the west side and the Caretaker's bungalow will have the tiles fixed at an early date. The remaining roofs are not ready for tiling as the steelwork is not fixed. It is expected that this will be done in a day or so. The metal windows cannot be fixed until scaffolders are obtained. Noted.

# (b) MESSRS. WINDSOR FLOORS, LTD.:

Pursuant to Item 1 (c) in the report of this Sub-Committee, dated 8/3/41, the Architect reported that he had given careful consideration to the question of completing the fire-resisting flat roofs and had interviewed the above-named firm thereon. Messrs. Windsor Floors, Ltd., are prepared to finish their remaining work on the basis of actual cost plus 20 per cent. The value of the work remaining to be done is £80 (approximately) plus 20 per cent. profit.

#### 3.—STRENGTHENING OF SCHOOL AIR RAID SHELTERS:

As instructed by the Education Committee the Borough Surveyor reported that he was of opinion that it was very desirable that certain school trenches, which are also used by the public, should be strengthened as required by the Regional Technical Adviser's Branch of the Ministry of Home Security. The estimated cost of carrying out the work is £3,000 and the Board of Education are prepared to recognise this expenditure for grant purposes at the rate of 100 per cent.

#### 23.—PRIVATELY OWNED RAILINGS FOR SCRAP—VOLUNTARY SCHEME:

A letter was submitted from the Ministry of Supply (Iron and Steel Control) in further reference to a campaign for the removal of privately owned railings under a voluntary scheme. The Department point out that iron railings are one of the most valuable forms of scrap metal utilised in very special war industries and emphasises the importance and urgency of organising a special campaign for the collection of scrap metal in the Borough. The Department concludes by expressing the hope that the Council will give further consideration to the matter. (Group II. Committee—1/2/41—W. & F.B., 18).

Last year the Council made arrangements for the collection of scrap metal, house-holders undertaking the work of collecting iron chains from the forecourts of private houses and depositing them in one spot for removal by the Council's vehicles. (Group I. Committee—24/6/40—W. & F.B., 27).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That a further appeal be made to householders to surrender iron railings, etc., for the purpose of scrap metal and that a copy of the Minister's letter be sent to persons who assisted in the previous collection of railings.

A letter was submitted from the Hampstead Garden Suburb Residents' Association complaining of the increasing number of pigeons in the vicinity of the Garden Suburb. The Association point out that in view of H.M. Government's repeated calls to "Dig for Victory," etc., it appears very desirable that the appropriate Ministry should be urged to grant powers authorising the destruction of pigeons in districts adjacent to the London County Council area wherein Metropolitan Boroughs have statutory powers under the London County Council General Act, 1935, to exterminate surplus pigeons.

The Association has forwarded a similar letter to the Finchley Borough Council and request both Hendon and Finchley to take combined action in making representations to the appropriate Government Department.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That representations be made to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries with a view to obtaining powers to permit the extermination of pigeons;
- (2) That the attention of the various Church Authorities in the Garden Suburb be called to the matter and that they be asked to remove pigeons' nests in the Church buildings.

# 21.—COUNCIL AGENDA—MILL HILL RATEPAYERS' AND RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATION:

The Committee have duly noted a letter from the Mill Hill Ratepayers' and Residents' Association asking the Council to consider reducing the matter and details published in the Council's Minutes and Reports of Committees and suggesting that essential matters could be issued when necessary by "Multigraphed Circulars."

## 22.—CO-OPTION TO SUB-COMMITTEES:

A letter was considered from the Mill Hill Ratepayers' and Residents' Association suggesting that Sub-Committees of the Council should be strengthened during the present emergency by co-opting electors of experience who could give time to the work.

Noted.

## 23.—PAPER RESTRICTIONS:

The Committee considered reference from Group II. Committee (Works and Fire Brigade, item 24) as to the necessity of further economising, as far as practicable, in the use of payer.

Suggestions were made as to how further economies might be effected and the Chief Officers were instructed accordingly.

## 24.—BOROUGH OF HENDON SERVICES WELFARE AND COMFORTS COMMITTEE:



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

## REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENCE COMMITTEE to the Meeting of the

HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

28th April, 1941.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I herewith submit a report on various matters which have been dealt with by the Civil Defence Committee at its Meetings held on the 28th March and 10th April, 1941.

### 1.—CARRYING OF RESPIRATORS:

The Minister of Home Security has drawn attention to a statement made by him in the House of Commons on the 27th March in regard to the possibility of gas attacks being made upon this Country and the steps being taken by His Majesty's Government to ensure that every member of the population carries, practises with and is in every respect familiar with his gas mask.

The Minister adds that he is sure he may rely upon members of local authorities in their individual and in their corporate capacity, as well as upon those in the Authority's employ, to assist by the force of their example His Majesty's Government to carry out its declared policy. If those in responsible positions to whom members of the public naturally turn for guidance have their respirators at hand on all occasions, carry them with them when out of doors and practise their use from time to time, and will, moreover, bring the influence of their position to bear to see that others follow the example set, much will be done to remove apathy and indifference, which, if allowed to persist, may be fraught with danger to the public.

#### 2.—WOMEN'S VOLUNTARY SERVICES—HEADQUARTERS:

The London Civil Defence Region has approved the requisitioning of the premises at 160, Station Road, Hendon, for use as the Hendon Centre Headquarters of the Women's Voluntary Services.

#### 3.—CHIEF WARDEN:

Having considered the duties of the Chief Warden and the numerical strength of the personnel under his direction, the Committee are of the opinion that the office of Chief Warden should be a full-time appointment and has accordingly made representations to the Ministry of Home Security for approval for such an appointment at a salary of £500 per annum plus an annual car allowance of £100.

## 4.—ASSISTANT AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS OFFICER:

The Committee have appointed Mr. A. Smith, Staff Officer of the Wardens' Organisation, to be Assistant Air Raid Precautions Officer on salary scale C.2. commencing at £320 per annum.

## 5.—TRAINING INSTRUCTOR:

Consequent upon the resignation of Mr. C. W. Jarvis, the Committee has approved the appointment of Mr. F. McGloughlin, A.R.P.S. as a full-time Instructor.

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## 6.—CIVIL DEFENCE SERVICES—RATES OF PAY:

A petition having been received from the Stretcher Party Leaders attached to the Corporation's Casualty Service for consideration to be given to the granting of an increase in their rate of payment, the Committee has renewed its representations to the Middlesex County Council for higher rates of pay for personnel holding the more responsible posts.

The County Council state that they are satisfied that the Regional Commissioners are in favour of the proposal and consider that no useful purpose would be served by making further representations at the present time.

Uniform rates of pay for Rescue Party drivers having been fixed to avoid anomalies being caused by varying local rates in adjoining districts, the County Council states it has no authority to increase the wages of drivers beyond the recent 3/- per week allowed under the terms of the recent J.I.C. Award. The additional payment of 2/- in excess of this Award approved by this Committee cannot therefore be recognised.

## 7.—MILL HILL AND HENDON WAY DEPOTS—DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENTS:

The Regional Commissioners, having given careful consideration to the Committee's request that the Deputy Depot Superintendents at the two combined Depots established at Mill Hill and Hendon Way should receive an additional payment of 5/- per week, are not prepared to vary their decision that the over-all wage of the Deputy Depot Superintendents in question should not exceed £5 per week, the rate applicable to all Deputy Depot Superintendents.

The Committee propose to review this matter at the expiration of three months.

#### 8.—COMFORTS FOR CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL:

A free issue of 50 lbs. of wool has been received from the London Region Civil Defence Comforts Committee and a further 42 lbs. of wool has been given by the British Red Cross Society. Some 114 lbs. of wool has also been purchased at special rate from the Headquarters of the Women's Voluntary Services.

Working parties organised under the auspices of the Women's Voluntary Services are engaged in knitting comforts and the distribution of garments has already commenced.

#### 9.—RECREATIONAL EQUIPMENT:

While not agreeable to increase the amount allowed for the replacement of worn out recreational equipment, the County Council has agreed as a special case to recognise expenditure at the approved rate of 6d, per head based on the authorised establishment of personnel for the Borough instead of on that of the whole-time personnel only.

## 10.—RESPIRATOR SPECTACLES FOR A.R.P. PERSONNEL:

Arrangements are being made to supply respirator spectacles for members of the Civil Defence Services, where necessary.

## 11.—CIVIL DEFENCE (EMPLOYMENT AND OFFENCES) ORDER, 1941:

Consequent upon representations made to the Minister of Home Security as to the need for provision for dealing with serious cases of indiscipline in the Air Raid Precautions Services which would impair their efficiency if they occurred to any considerable extent, by an amendment of Defence Regulation No. 29B, it has now been made an offence for a whole-time member of the Wardens' Service, First Aid Party, Stretcher Party, Rescue Party or Report and Control Centre, to disobey any lawful order given to him in the course of his employment or to be absent without reasonable excuse from

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The Minister of Home Security states that it will be a matter of deep regret to him, as to the local authorities directly responsible for the Civil Defence Services, if the maintenance of order and good behaviour on the part of the members has to depend upon penal sanctions. He is confident that throughout the services there is general recognition of the necessity for good conduct, esprit de corps and attention to duties and, if in exceptional cases these are lacking, the Minister trusts that local authorities on whom powers to institute proceedings for indiscipline are conferred will exercise these powers with restraint.

#### 12.—CASUALTY SERVICES—DEFERMENT OF CALLING UP OF MALE PERSONNEL:

Deferment of calling up of male personnel has been extended to such personnel who:-

- (a) are employed whole time in the First Aid Post and Ambulance Service;
- (b) are 30 years of age and over;
- (c) have registered under the National Service Armed Forces Acts but have not received enlistment notices.

The Minister of Health stresses that the increasing needs of the Armed Forces makes it more and more difficult to maintain the principle of deferment and the time is approaching when it will become necessary to abandon it, possibly at short notice. It is, therefore, more than ever incumbent upon Local Authorities to replace all men of military age in the First Aid Post and Ambulance Service whose work can be efficiently performed by men over military age.

## 13.—HENDON COUNTY SCHOOL—ALTERNATIVE ACCOMMODATION:

The Middlesex County Council has considered the representations made by this Committee that approval should be given to the erection of a 3rd Depot building in the neighbourhood of the Town Hall to accommodate the personnel and resources now stationed at the Hendon County School, plus two Rescue Parties. While the County Civil Defence Committee appreciates the fact that there are difficulties in the present Depot which might not be experienced in a new building such as those which have been erected at Hendon Way and Daws Lane, Mill Hill, it is unable to agree to the erection of a new building.

With regard to the urgent representations which this Committee has from time to time received from the Educational Authorities, the County Civil Defence Committee states that it has taken this matter up with the Secretary to the County Education Committee and that there is now question of releasing the school premises for educational purposes.

## 14.—WARDENS' POSTS—LAVATORY FACILITIES:

Endeavours have been made to obtain approval to an expenditure of £12 per Wardens' Post on the provision of lavatory facilities where alternative accommodation cannot be arranged. An amount of £8 per Post is the maximum amount the Regional Commissioners are prepared to authorise.

The Committee has authorised the Borough Engineer to proceed with the immediate erection of lavatory accommodation at a cost not exceeding £10 per Post at the 49 Posts where this is necessary and the County Council is being urged to recognise the whole of this expenditure as ranking for grant.

## 15.—FIRE WATCHERS' POSTS:

The Committee have received requests from Leaders and Members of Fire Parties:—

- (a) for Fire Watching Posts to be constructed;
- (b) for materials to enable Fire Watching Parties themselves to erect Fire Watching Posts; and
- (c) for communal shelters to be set aside for use as Fire Watching Posts and for same to be locked up.

No authority exists for the Committee to incur expenditure on Fire Watchers' Posts and the County Council has prohibited the use of salvaged materials for this purpose.

No objection will be raised to use being made of communal shelters as Fire Watching Points by official fire watching parties, provided that members of the public desiring shelter are not excluded and that the shelters in question are not locked.

### 16.—FIRE WATCHING PARTIES—SUPPLY OF WHISTLES:

In view of the difficulty experienced by members of Fire Watching Parties in obtaining whistles, endeavours are being made to obtain supplies for resale.

#### 17.—DISTRIBUTION OF SANDBAGS:

The distribution of sandbags on the basis of two per house in the Borough is nearing completion. The total number of sandbags delivered to date is approximately 91,000.

#### 18.—STORAGE OF FURNITURE ON SCHOOL PREMISES:

The Committee has considered representations made by the Education Committee that furniture from bombed houses should be removed from the Committee's Schools and has directed that the Borough Engineer endeavour to secure other suitable accommodation to enable this to be done.

#### 19.—GAS CLEANSING FACILITIES:

In regard to the proposed special Gas Cleansing Centres in the shopping areas of the Borough, instructions have been received for the affiliation of these Centres to the nearest First Aid Posts and for staffing same.

In view of the shortage of man power, it is suggested that the staff should be on a part-time basis and that endeavours be made to obtain volunteers from nearby shops who will immediately proceed to the Cleansing Centre should their services be required. Other suggested likely sources for obtaining volunteers are as follows:—

- 1. The British Red Cross Society.
- 2. The Order of St. John.
- 3. The Women's Voluntary Services.
- 4. The British Legion.
- 5. Civil Defence Volunteers canvassing their relatives and friends.

The Committee do not consider it possible to recruit sufficient personnel to ensure the satisfactory operation of the whole of the Centres at all times of the day or night and has accordingly directed that application be made to the Ministry of Health for permission to recruit the necessary minimum number of full-time workers at Civil Defence rates and conditions.

### 20.—CLEANSING STATIONS AT FIRST AID POSTS:

Alterations to the Cleansing Stations attached to the various First Aid Posts as required by the Minister of Health have been put in hand and are proceeding satisfactorily.

## 21.—TREATMENT AND DISPOSAL OF CONTAMINATED FOODSTUFFS:

The recruitment and training of food treatment squads and the general arrangements for the treatment and disposal of foodstuffs contaminated by poison gas, as required by the Ministry of Food, are proceeding.

### 22.—CLEANSING OF GAS CONTAMINATED VEHICLES:

The site of the old pumping station which formed part of the North of the Brent Outfall Works is being prepared for use in connection with the scheme for the cleansing of vehicles contaminated with persistent gas.

### 23.-GAS TESTS:

Application has been made for authority to conduct gas exercises in the shopping areas throughout the Borough.

### 24.—EMERGENCY REST AND FEEDING CENTRES:

The Committee has approved the Third Edition of the Scheme for the provision of Emergency Rest and Feeding Centres. Copies of the Scheme will be circulated for the information of the members of the Council.

Following interviews with the Middlesex County Council and the Senior Regional Officer on the matter of the necessity for the provision of second-line Emergency Rest and Feeding Centres, approval in principle has been given to the establishment of secondary accommodation at seven schools (instead of twelve) as follows:-

Centres marked " \* " are included in the local scheme for emergency feeding and will be equipped for that purpose. Sleeping accommodation for homeless persons is available and for the feeding of such persons, the emergency feeding scheme would operate—the homeless persons being provided with vouchers for the service of meals free. In the event of it becoming necessary to use the accommodation of these five Centres (\*) hefore the emergency feeding organisation is set up, the Domestic Science Centre and School Staff will be available and the County Pool of apparatus and equipment would supplement any deficiencies.

The work of providing protection at the various premises used for Rest Centres throughout the Borough is proceeding satisfactorily.

## 25.—PUBLIC SHELTERS—GOLDERS HILL PARK:

Approval is being sought for the creetion of five shelters each accommodating 100persons within the precincts of Golders Hill Park.

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## 26.—PUBLIC SHELTERS—LIGHTING AND HEATING:

The Middlesex County Council has approved of an estimated expenditure of £3,676 on the provision of lighting in the whole of the public shelters in the Borough. The Commissioners of the London Civil Defence Region, however, are not prepared to approve the provision of electrical heating in shelters of the types for which Cura stoves are made available (viz.:—trench and surface shelters accommodating 50 persons or more in one compartment) unless special circumstances render the stoves unsuitable. The Council is, therefore, asked to reconsider its proposals for shelters of this type.

Further representations are being made to the Regional Commissioners for approval to expenditure on the installation of electrical lighting and heating in all shelters, which work is now in fact proceeding.

#### 27.—ANDERSON SHELTERS:

The total number of Anderson Shelters concreted to date is approximately 6,400.

#### 28.—COMMUNAL SHELTERS:

163 Communal Shelters have now been completed under current contracts and work is in hand on a further 89 shelters. Accommodation is now available in this type of shelter for approximately 7,130 persons.

## EMERGENCY REST AND FEEDING CENTRES

- 1. At the request of the Civil Defence Committee of the Middlesex County Council, the Town Council of the Borough of Hendon hereby assumes the powers of the County Council for the establishment of Emergency Rest and Feeding Centres in the Borough in pursuance of the Ministry of Health Circulars 1860 and 2082.
- 2. The main purposes of these Centres will be to provide shelter for homeless persons resulting from enemy action; to supply hot drinks and simple food, and generally to provide facilities as an aid to recovery from nervous and physical strain prior to returning to their homes or dispersal to alternative accommodaton or billets. It shall generally be regarded that a period of 24 hours at the Centre should be sufficient, but Supervisors of Centres (see Appendix "A") are authorised to continue to supply meals for a reasonable time for those provided with alternative accommodation (see paragraph 19) in which the supply of essential services (gas, water and electricity) may be delayed.
- 3. The Centres shown in Appendix "A" to this Scheme may be called upon to function immediately it is established that cases of the type referred to in paragraph 2 exist.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the A.R.P. Wardens to immediately direct homeless persons to the Centre nearest the incident of damage and to utilise for the conveyance of such persons all casualty service cars as may arrive on the scene of the occurrence, provided such cars are not required for the conveyance of sitting wounded cases. In the event of homeless persons preferring to go to shelters the A.R.P. Wardens shall direct them to the nearest public shelters and shall instruct such persons to attend on the "all clear" at the Emergency Rest and Feeding Centre which has been opened for their reception.
- 5. On any action being taken under paragraph 4 of this Scheme it becomes incumbent upon the Wardens to immediately contact the Supervisor (see Schedule "A") of the selected Centre and ensure the opening of the Centre in time for the first arrivals of homeless persons.

Following the successful execution of the above direction the Wardens will report the action taken to the Controller at the Local Report Centre with such information as to numbers as may be available, and may at the same time request the provision of additional casualty service cars for transport facilities as the circumstances of the incident may require.

The Controller in his turn will notify the Rehousing Officer (by day at HEN. 8181, Ext. 6, and by night at HEN. 3666); and failing contact with this Officer Mrs. E. Monro, J.P. (by day HEN. 2542, at night HEN. 7720) and Mrs. V. Maughan (by day HEN. 2542, at night HEN. 1400) should be notified.

6 .- Each Centre, when in use, will display a card at the entrance, viz :-

### EMERGENCY REST CENTRE

(This Centre is not an Air Raid Shelter).

- 7. The Rehousing Officer on receiving information from the Controller shall as soon as practicable ascertain that the Centre or Centres are duly opened, and notify the Medical Officer of Health and the Police.
- 8. The Centre Supervisor will arrange for Record Form—see Appendix "B"—to be completed in triplicate immediately on the arrival of homeless persons or as soon as physical conditions permit:—

One copy to form the record of cases received and dealt with at the Centre; the second and third copies to be handed to the Rehousing Officer who will forward—

There shall be attached to the pass sufficient tickets for meals for 24 hours, and thereafter meal tickets may be issued at the discretion of the Supervisor after consultation with the Billeting Officer as to necessity for remaining at the Centre.

9. Each Centre shall be adequately supplied as far as practicable with equipment based upon the model and standard shown in Appendix "C," and Supervisors are authorised to maintain such standard of equipment.

The Borough Official Order Book should be used and each order plainly marked "Scheme-Home-less Persons" with the name of the Centre.

10. Bulk Supplies of the following items of food will be available from the Middlesex County Council (Supplies Dept., Somerset Road, Tottenham, TOT. 4500) and a Central Store will be established for the Borough Centres at 240, Hendon Way (near the Ambassador Cinema), HEN. 9433:—

Supervisors of Centres are particularly urged to ensure that adequate supplies of the above items are always available at their respective Centres to deal with the numbers for which the Centres are considered to be available at any one time. In order to reduce to a minimum the demand on transport facilities, supplies for a week (on the following scale) should always be available, bearing in mind that during any such period of a week, it may be necessary for the Centre to be open continuously.

11. Rationed Foods may be purchased by Supervisors locally through the Official Order Book on an authority to Retailers from the Food Executive Officer at St. Joseph's Convent School, The Burroughs, N.W. 4, and this authority should be held against the necessity for its use.

It is for the trader to obtain the necessary permit from the Food Office to replenish his stock but for this purpose it is essential that the counterfoil of the official order should be presented. It follows, therefore, that for all purchases an official order must be issued.

12. Unrationed Foods.—Supervisors are authorised to purchase unrationed food and other necessities locally to the best advantage, by use of the Official Order Book. When a Centre is opened a supply of bread and milk should be ordered immediately.

#### "UX" Bombs, etc.

Persons who have been required to leave their homes because of unexploded bombs should normally be allowed to return to their homes after the lapse of 96 hours. This ruling does not of course imply that all risk is over, but that after that time the risk is so far reduced that it is generally no longer necessary to exclude persons from the affected area. But while persons are glowed to return to their homes it does not follow that they should for that reason be excluded from Rest Centres, billets or other temporary housing if they do not wish to take the risk of returning to their homes.

It has not been the practice to keep people in the Emergency Centres any longer than about 24 hours (but there have been exceptions) and it is not intended, as far as practicable, to depart from this rule.

If the four days retention in Emergency Centres is found necessary, after that time Supervisors of the Centres are authorised to collect the following charges:—

All charges collected should be strictly accounted for and paid into the Borough Treasurer.

Supervisors are authorised to call in a Local Practitioner in all cases requiring urgent medical attention.

Where, from continuous air raids or because the people cannot be dispersed sufficiently rapidly, the Centre has to be kept open the Supervisor should select a deputy to act in his absence, and shifts of voluntary workers will have to be arranged.

- 15. Water Storage. In view of any possible failure in the water supply, all suitable receptacles at the Centre, when not otherwise in use, should be kept filled with fresh water.
- 16. Light (Artificial). Where gas or electricity is used, some alternative should be provided in case of need. Hurricane lamps will be provided if required.
- 17. Personal Clothing. It has been found from experience that many people arrive at the centre scantily elad or with clothes covered with dirt from debris, etc. Supervisors are asked to endeavour to procure from private services gifts of clothing to be stored at the Centres.

Supervisors should acquaint themselves of the nearest W.V.S. Centre on which chits may be issued for the replacement of personal clothing, blankets, etc.

Supervisors of Centres are authorised to arrange with the Superintendent, British Red Cross Society at the above establishments for the admission of any suitable cases.

19. Dispersal of People from the Centre. The dispersal of people in the Centre is not incumbent upon the Supervisor, but he is authorised to facilitate the return home or other discharge of persons other than those requiring accommodation.

A Billeting Officer will attend at the Centre and interview all persons who are unable to return to their homes or who cannot otherwise provide for themselves and/or have to be billeted. He will have before him the particulars already obtained of such persons (see paragraph 8) and will act upon the report of the Borough Surveyor as to unfit habitations. All other persons are to be pressed to return to their homes as soon as possible.

The Assistance Board Officer will after refugees have been accommodated by the Billeting Officers arrange for the payment of maintenance allowances and other forms of relief to cases falling within the scope of the regulations.

20. Information Centre. The Rehousing Department of the Council has been designated as the Information and Administrative Centre to which homeless persons can apply.

#### VI. INFESTATIONS BY LICE—CIRCULAR 2306 AND 1544:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of a joint Circular of the Ministry of Health and the Board of Education urging an active campaign, especially in view of the part played by lice in the transmission of infectious disease, and suggesting that a report should be submitted by the 30th June, 1941, by the Medical Officers of Health and School Medical Officers on the incidence of lousiness in their areas and any steps to be taken to improve the conditions. A Memorandum accompanying the Circular gives the results of an investigation which has been conducted and also draws attention to the powers possessed by Local Education Authorities and Local Authorities for dealing with the matter.

The Medical Officer of Health pointed out that, as the infestation here is practically confined to school children, the powers of the Education Authority are those in common use, and reported generally on the procedure adopted as regards school children and the Local Authority's powers. Information was also given to the Committee as to the results of an ad hoc survey which had been made of all children attending public elementary schools, and, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, the Committee

- (1) That all female leavers be examined in their last term at school and the necessary steps taken for disinfestation where necessary;

#### 1.—BOOTS AND SHOES FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN:

## 3.—FIRE WATCHING OF SCHOOLS:

With reference to Item 1 (c) of the minutes of this Sub-Committee of 5th April, 1941, a memorandum was submitted from the Town Clerk stating "provided that the fire watchers have undertaken to perform not less than 48 hours per month and are duly enrolled as members of the Council's organisation in connection with fire watching, they will be entitled to compensation. The same considerations apply to substitutes for teachers who are ill and volunteers doing short periods; they are only covered if they have in fact undertaken to do the 48 hours and are properly enrolled members of the organisation."

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the Director of Education be instructed to make enquiries of the Town Clerk whether it is an essential part of the scheme that fire watchers shall be required to undergo a special course of instruction and training.

#### 4.—TEACHERS AND NATIONAL SERVICE:

Board of Education Circular No. 1545 was submitted with regard to the new schedule of reserved occupations which raises the age of reservation for teachers (except Headmasters) from 30 to 35. This change will be made effective at Stage B. which means to say that the teachers de-reserved will not as a rule be required to join their unit before July next. The Board of Education are prepared to recommend the deferment of the calling-up of a limited number of key men, if so desired, but they contemplate that the number of men so deferred should not exceed 10 per cent. of the total number of men liable to be called up in the age group 30/35.

It was reported that 23 men teachers were already engaged on Active Service and that 25 more men would be affected by the raising of the age of reservation to 35 including 7 men possessing B.Sc. Degrees who will be placed in a special category eligible for work of a technical character in H.M. Forces. **Noted.** 

#### 5.—ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:

Circular No. 2338 from the Ministry of Health was considered with regard to the revised schedule of reserved occupations in so far as it relates to Local Government Staffs. The age of reservation is raised from 30 to 35 at Stage C., i.e., de-reservation of men in this group will not take effect until October, 1941. The Director of Education reported that 2 members of the staff of the Education Department were concerned and that arrangements will be made for the engagement of the necessary temporary staff at the appropriate time. **Noted.**

# 6.—MIDDLESEX COUNTY COUNCIL ACT, 1934—PART VII.—LICENSING OF MASSAGE ESTABLISHMENTS—BYE-LAWS:

A letter was submitted from the Board of Registration of Medical Auxiliaries forwarding a copy of a Bye-law made by the Borough of Leyton prescribing the technical qualifications to be possessed by any person administering massage or special treatment at any establishment licensed within the Borough of Leyton. The Board expressed the view that it would be advantageous from the point of view of the protection of the public if the various Boroughs within the County of Middlesex were to make a Bye-law on similar lines.

The present position regarding the Bye-laws proposed to be made by the Council is that the Home Office is not prepared to approve Nos. 4 and 5 of the draft Bye-laws relating to advertisements.

Upon hearing the views of the Medical Officer of Health regarding the Bye-law made by the Borough of Leyton, the Committee

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### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That Nos. 4 and 5 be deleted from the draft Bye-laws.
- (b) That the following Bye-law be added to the draft Bye-laws:-

### "TECHNICAL QUALIFICATIONS."

"No person shall administer massage or special treatment at any establishment within the Borough of Hendon licensed under Part VII. of the Middlesex County Council Act, 1934, unless such person possesses appropriate qualifications in medical auxiliary work approved by the Board of Registration of Medical Auxiliaries as evidenced by the entry of that person's name in the National Register of Medical Auxiliary Services Provided That this Bye-law shall not apply to any establishment licensed at the date of confirmation of this Bye-law until the expiration of two years from such date of confirmation."

(c) That the draft Bye-laws as so amended be submitted for the approval of the Home Office.

### 7.—PROPOSED DAY NURSERY—WATLING ESTATE:

It was reported that negotiations were still in progress with the London County Council regarding the terms of the proposed tenancy of Addington House, the rent having been agreed at £65 per annum exclusive of outgoings but the term not having been settled.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a revised plan incorporating the suggestions made by the Ministry of Health, together with a detailed estimate amounting to £875 in respect of the cost of the necessary conversions to the building, the provision of an adequate hot water system and the overhauling of the lighting.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Town Clerk be instructed to endeavour to obtain a twenty-one years' lease of the property with a break clause at the end of seven and fourteen years.
- (2) That the plan and estimate submitted by the Borough Surveyor be approved.

### 8.—DISTRIBUTION OF ORANGES:

He pointed out that it was the latter item which principally concerned the Council as the hospital is staffed on the E.M.S. side in the main by Civil Nursing Reserve and on the infectious disease side by Sisters and nurses who are employees of the Council.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that the arrangement made with Dr. Livingston (P.H. & M.S.—7/10/40, item 10) was subject to review at the end of three months and that it had now been represented by Dr. Livingston that in the present circumstances the charge made to him, viz., at the rate of £150 per annum, should be reduced to £100 per annum being the rate allowed by the Ministry of Health for the maintenance of the Emergency Hospital Staff at the Isolation Hospital who are living on an equal footing so far as accommodation and subsistence are concerned.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the value of the emoluments of the Resident Medical Officer be assessed at £100 per annum as from the 1st January, 1941, and that this assessment be reviewed in the event of any change from present conditions.

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- (3) A suitable site exists at the Hospital for conversion into a heu run.
- (4) The gardener has undertaken to look after the fowls.

The sale now covers a complete financial year and the total value of the sales for the year in question amounts to £9,305 3s. 6d. It is pointed out, however, that this total does not include any materials salvaged from properties demolished by enemy action.

With regard to the removal of iron railings from the Council's parks and open spaces, the Borough Surveyor reported that this work was being proceeded with as rapidly as supplies of labour permitted. Noted.

  Act.
- 3. The large number of persons exempted under Article 3 of the Order who are already performing national service.
- 4. The number of successful appeals allowed by the Military Service (Hardship) Committee.
- 5. The ruling by the Ministry of Home Security that persons must actually work on the premises to be liable for service excludes all men working for such firms as builders, jobbing merchants, etc.

The effect of such Order is that a person who disobeys any lawful order given to him in the course of his employment, or is absent without reasonable excuse from any place at a time when it is his duty to be there in the course of that employment, commits an offence against the Regulation and is liable to a fine not exceeding £10, or to imprisonment not exceeding one month, or to both.

This Regulation shall apply to all Fire Authorities irrespective of whether the Auxiliary Fire Service (Discipline) Rules, 1940, are adopted or not. Noted.

# 47.—MARK III. RESPIRATOR SPECTACLES:

Fire Brigade Circular No. 22/1941 empowers Local Authorities to supply free of cost to A.F.S. personnel who normally wear spectacles the above special type for use with respirators.

The Chief Officer reported that the number required is approximately eighty pairs and these will be supplied by qualified opticians at a cost to the Local Authority of 9/. a pair. The expenditure involved will rank for grant. Noted.

### WAR CHARITIES ACT, 1940.

The Committee further considered the letter from the Charity Commission deferred from the last meeting (F. & G.P.C., 21/4/41-24). The Commissioners point out that the fact that a Charity is established in good faith is in itself no ground for exemption and that exemption of a Charity on the ground of the limited area of its activities or on the ground of its limited objects appears to the Commissioners to be inappropriate in the case of a Charity whose activities extend over so large an area as that of the Borough of Hendon. In the view of the Commissioners, exemption on the ground of limited area should only be granted in cases in which the population of the area to which the appeal is made is so small as to make the registration of the Charity unnecessary in the public interest and, as stated above, the Commissioners feel difficulty in seeing how this condition applies in the case of the above-mentioned Charity. In view also of the fact that the appeal extends over so large an area it appears to the Commissioners to be improbable that the value of the money and property contributed will be so small as to make registration unnecessary in the public interest. If the duration of the Charity is limited to the duration of the war the Commissioners do not consider that that fact necessarily implies that it is of so short a duration as to make registration unnecessary.

It is accordingly suggested that the Council may wish to reconsider the matter.

In 1931, under the provisions of the Hendon Urhan District Council Act, the Hendon Borough Council became the Highway Authority for this road. The Company has now claimed from the Council the sum of £116 3s. 8d., being the amount of the retention monies outstanding.

By virtue of Section 30 of the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929, the liabilities attached to the Rural Council were transferred to and vested in the Hendon Council. It would accordingly appear that this sum is properly due from the Council to the Com-



#### REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENCE COMMITTEE

to the Meeting of the

#### HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL

26th May, 1941.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I herewith submit a Report on various matters which have been dealt with by the Civil Defence Committee at its Meetings held on the 25th April, 7th and 21st May, 1941.

#### 1.—CIVIL DEFENCE (EMPLOYMENT AND OFFENCES) (2) ORDER, 1941:

Under the provisions of this Order, the requirement already applicable to men in the First Aid Post and Ambulance Services on a whole-time paid basis that they should continue in that employment until their services are dispensed with in accordance with the order is extended to women employed on a whole-time paid basis in those services. The Order also provides penalties for disobedience to lawful orders and for absence from duty without reasonable excuse on the part of such persons.

#### 2.—CIVIL DEFENCE VOLUNTEERS—SICK PAY:

The Committee is supporting the Urban District Council of Enfield in its representations via the Middlesex County Council to the Ministry of Home Security for the period during which full pay is allowed to Civil Defence personnel absent as a consequence of injury sustained by them as a result of enemy action while discharging Civil Defence duties to be extended.

### 3.—CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL—UNIFORM:

Supplies of the new type of battle-dress uniform for Casualty Service personnel have been received and it is hoped that similar uniforms for the Rescue Party personnel will shortly come to hand.

Representations are being made to the Middlesex County Council that battle-dress uniforms should be supplied to members of the Wardens' Service, for authority to purchase forage caps for issue to all personnel equipped with A.R.P. uniforms and for the supply of heavy-type boots to full-time Wardens and also to those part-time Wardens on the "effective" strength.

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## 4.—RESCUE SERVICE DRIVERS—RATES OF PAY:

In reference to item 6 of the Report to the Meeting of the Council, 28th April, 1941, a further J.I.C. Award has increased the weekly payment of Rescue Service drivers from £3 15s. 6d. to £3 18s. 6d.

#### 5.—MERITORIOUS SERVICE CERTIFICATE:

The Committee were pleased to learn that Mr. H. Leake, Deputy Depot Superintendent of the Hendon County School Depot, has been awarded the St. John's Ambulance Brigade Meritorius Service Certificate for service rendered in connection with the major air raid incident which occurred in the Borough.

#### 6.—RE-HOUSING DEPARTMENT STAFF:

The Committee has considered the request of the Youth Organising Committee for the release of Mr. Griffiths, Y.O.C. Officer, from duties in the Re-housing Department, but regrets its inability to arrange therefor.

#### 7.—MINISTRY OF INFORMATION FILM UNIT:

The film unit of the Ministry of Information has visited the Borough and films depicting various aspects of the Empire's War effort have been shown to and much appreciated by members of the Civil Defence personnel.

#### 8.—HENDON WAY AND MILL HILL DEPOTS:

Plans and estimates for alterations and additions to the Depot Buildings at the Hendon Way and Mill Hill Depots to afford protected sleeping accommodation for all personnel stationed thereat have been prepared and submitted to the Middlesex County Council for approval.

The arrangements for parking vehicles at these Depots have also been revised and the erection of fences to more adequately enclose the Mill Hill Depot has been authorised.

#### 9.—PROTECTION OF REST CENTRES:

Work on the provision of protection at premises used for Rest Centres is now nearing completion.

## 10.—REPLACEMENT OF LOST AND DAMAGED RESPIRATORS:

Authority has been received for the repair and replacement of damaged or lost respirators issued for the use of children attending grant-aided schools without charge, unless it is considered that the damage is not due to fair wear and tear and no satisfactory explanation is forthcoming. There is, however, no change in the charges for damaged or lost babies' helmets for the custody of which the parents themselves can be held responsible.

#### 11.—GAS EXERCISES:

The proposed arrangements in connection with the holding of gas exercises in shopping areas in the Borough have been deferred pending the issue by the Minister of Home Security of regulations as to the conduct thereof.

# 12.—PUBLIC GAS CLEANSING STATIONS:

Approval to the proposed construction of public cleansing stations to serve the shopping areas at Hendon Central, Burnt Oak and Edgware at an estimated cost of £1,950 each has been received and work thereon has been commenced.

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tle-dress to purfor the Vardens The Ministry of Health is being pressed to sanction the proposed works to provide similar facilities in the Golders Green area.

## 13.—EMERGENCY FEEDING CENTRES:

A scheme for emergency feeding to cover 10 per cent. of the population has been approved by the Committee.

The scheme embraces the establishment of 21 Centres, twenty in School premises and one in a Church Hall in the Borough, each of twelve of the Centres being intended to eater for 250 to 500 people and the remainder 500 to 1,000 people.

The major portion of the required equipment will be provided by the Ministry of Food. Arrangements are in hand for obtaining the balance, the housing of the boilers and ranges outside the school premises where necessary, the emergency storage of water, etc. The supply of fresh food to the Emergency Centres is also being arranged.

The Middlesex County Council has also prepared a scheme to provide mutual assistance for emergency feeding under which mobile units to cater for 500 persons will be stationed throughout the area, seven being posted to Schools in this Borough. The local units will, in the first instance, be at the disposal of the Controller, but might be called upon as reinforcement to assist other areas.

The Committee also propose to proceed with the establishment of British Restaurants within the Borough.

The Borough Librarian has been appointed as Chief Officer, Meals Services, to deal with the establishment and functioning of emergency feeding centres and communal kitchens. Steps are being taken to appoint a Catering Manager at £450 per annum. The part-time services of Mr. McCourt have been made available to the Chief Officer and the appointment of a temporary shorthand typist has been approved. Office accommodation has been secured at St. Joseph's Convent.

The Hendon Centre of the Women's Voluntary Services, which has also been called upon to provide personnel to staff eight of the County mobile units, has undertaken to staff the Feeding Centre proposed at St. Andrew's Church Hall, Edgware. The Director of Education has been requested to obtain volunteers from the teachers to staff each of the other 20 centres in an emergency, as it is envisaged that the Schools will not function as such when Centres established in the premises are in operation. The Women's Voluntary Services have also promised to form a central pool or reserve of volunteers to give additional assistance where found to be necessary.

Facilities for volunteers to attend courses at Army Schools of Cookery for instruction on the improvisation of cooking facilities when normal machinery has ceased to function have been made available by arrangement with the Military Authorities.

#### 14.—FIRE WATCHING AND FIRE FIGHTING PARTIES:

**Equipment.** An initial issue of steel helmets for members of street fire parties has been received and distributed to the various districts. In many cases these have not been issued to individuals but are held by Group Leaders for use by those on duty. Personal issues will be made when further helmets are received, for the supply of which the Ministry of Home Security is being pressed.

Watching Posts. Several applications for the issue of Anderson shelters to provide posts for watchers have been received. The Committee regrets it is unable to accede to these requests.

Supplies of Water. Instances in which Fire Fighters experience difficulty in obtaining supplies of water in certain roads where large numbers of houses are unoccupied are being investigated with a view to consideration being given to the provision of storage tanks in such areas.

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## 15.—STORAGE OF FURNITURE ON SCHOOL PREMISES:

Alternative accommodation is being secured for the storage of furniture removed from bombed premises to release that now being used in various schools in the Borough.

#### 16.—SHELTER STATISTICS:

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The following details were obtained as a result of a shelter census taken on a date fixed by the London Civil Defence Region in the early part of this month. At the time of taking the census there was no "Alert" although the siren was sounded later. There had been no "Alert" for several nights previously.

#### 17.—SHELTER CONSTRUCTION:

Having regard to the severe restrictions on the available supply of labour and materials, the Regional Commissioners are reviewing the whole question of shelter construction and improvement in order that the best use may be made of the resources available. It has been decided that priority must be given to the improvement of existing shelters over new construction, i.e. the remedying of dampness, the provision of amenities such as sanitation, ventilation, etc.

A special review of the shelter facilities available throughout the Region is being conducted, following which the Regional Commissioners will decide on the extent of the work to be undertaken in each area. In the meantime a request has been made that no new construction should be begun without the specific prior approval of the Commissioners.

## 18.—COMMUNAL SHELTERS:

Accommodation is provided for 9,800 persons in shelters of the Communal type. Similar shelters which will accommodate a further 3,048 people are in hand.

Having regard to the instructions received from the County Council that no further Communal shelters are to be constructed, the Committee do not propose to exceed the present contracts which provide for the erection in each Ward of one-third of the total number of Communal shelters approved by the Middlesex County Council.

## 19.—ANDERSON SHELTERS:

## 20.-LIGHTING AND HEATING OF SHELTERS:

Work of installing electric lighting and heating in the shelters throughout the Borough is proceeding satisfactorily. Some difficulty has been experienced in obtaining the necessary fittings; deliveries have, however, commenced and a number of installations will be completed in the near future.

### 21.—PUBLIC SHELTERS—REFRESHMENTS:

Estimates for installing canteen facilities in the larger shelters or group of shelters in the Borough are being prepared with a view to the approval the County Council being obtained thereto.

#### (b) SCABIES.

The Medical Officer of Health reported receipt of a letter from the County Medical Officer giving details of the incidence of lousiness in the county amongst school children and the steps taken to combat this infestation. The letter also pointed out that the increase in scabies among the school population was causing concern.

The County Medical Officer stated that the County Council had suggested to one or two local authorities in Middlesex that they should make use of the Gas Cleansing Sections of the First Aid Posts as Cleansing Stations, and utilise the services of the First Aid Post personnel for the cleansing of verminous persons and this proposal had received the unofficial approval of the Ministry of Health. # 1.—BROADFIEDS AVENUE SCHOOL.

# (a) REPORT OF ARCHITECT:

Since the last meeting considerable progress has been made. The Heating Chamber is now to all intents and purposes finished and brick work at this end is going on well. The roof steel to the Assembly Hall has been fixed together with the roofing timbers over the nursery classroom. Progress is going on steadily and in a month it is hoped to see the whole building roofed in.

#### (b) SPECIALIST ITEMS:

It was reported that as a matter of urgency his Worship the Mayor, the Chairman of the Education Committee and the Chairman of the Works Sub-Committee had given authority for the acceptance of the following tenders and had instructed the Town Clerk to execute the contracts and affix the Corporate seal thereto, viz.:-

# 2.—HEATING, LIGHTING AND VENTILATING OF SCHOOL SHELTERS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the heating, lighting and ventilation of all school trenches is now completed. Work has also been undertaken in connection with the overground shelters erected at certain schools by H.M. Office of Works. This work is also completed with certain exceptions at Frith Manor, Child's Hill and Wessex Gardens Schools. Noted.

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# 3.—STRENGTHENING AND WATERPROOFING OF TRENCH SHELTERS.

The Committee will recall that the Ministry of Home Security have issued instructions that all trench shelters constructed of precast concrete slabs are to have certain works carried out to strengthen them against the possibility of bombs falling in close proximity thereto.

The method recommended by the Ministry was to strengthen the interiors of the trenches by steel framing. In the case of the Hendon schools this scheme would not be satisfactory, as it would interfere with the electric light and heating fittings already installed and would not provide for the waterproofing of the roofs of the trenches which it is desired to carry out in conjunction with the strengthening. The Borough Surveyor has been in negotiation with the Technical Adviser to the Ministry and as a result has agreed an alternative scheme for covering each trench shelter with reinforced concrete slabs and earrying concrete beams down the outside of the walls of the trenches to carry the weight. This scheme will be much more economical than that proposed by the Ministry of Home Security, and will not in any way interfere with the existing installations.

There are 121 trenches to be dealt with and the estimated cost of dealing with each shelter is £65, making a total of £7,865.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT, subject to approval by the Board of Education, the Borough Engineer be authorised to take all necessary steps for the strengthening and water-proofing of the trenches concerned and that any previous minute inconsistent herewith be rescinded.

#### 4.—COLINDALE SCHOOL—HEATING PLANT.

The Committee have had for some years past, a maintenance contract with the makers of the oil fire heating plant at this school. # (d) NEWLY-APPOINTED HEAD TEACHERS:

Newly-appointed Head Teachers to existing schools are to be graded according to the Grade of the school as at 1st April, 1939. Noted.

# PUBLIC HEALTH AND MEDICAL SERVICES. (Alderman W. M. Maughan, J.P.—Chairman.)

#### Part I .- Medical Services.

#### 1.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 4936 (PART VII.)—CHILD LIFE PROTECTION:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on an application (case No. 309) for permission to undertake for reward the nursing and maintenance of a child under the age of nine years apart from its parents.

# 3.—LAND ADJOINING GREAT NORTH WAY:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of Order No. 651 made by the County War Agricultural Executive Committee requiring certain work to be undertaken to the ditches and hedges, such work to be completed before the 31st October, 1941. Noted.

# 4.—CULTIVATION OF LANDS—PROGRESS REPORT:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a report with regard to progress made in connection with the cultivation of lands in accordance with the requirements of Orders served upon the Council by the County War Agricultural Executive Committee.

## 5.—MILL HILL PARK—SPORTS FACILITIES FOR A.R.P. PERSONNEL:

The Committee considered a reference from the Civil Defence Committee asking for sports facilities other than tennis to be granted to the A.R.P. personnel of the Mill Hill Depot.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That half fees be charged to the A.R.P. personnel of the Mill Hill Depot and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit a report on the matter in due course.

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Before detailed consideration of the motion, the Finance and General Purposes Committee Recommend — That the matter be referred back for further consideration by the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee.

#### 6.-HAY CROP-OPEN SPACES:

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had received a communication from the County War Agricultural Executive Committee calling attention to the difficulty being experienced by farmers in obtaining sufficient food for cattle, having regard to the necessity for shutting up certain grazing land to preserve the hay crop. The Agricultural Committee suggested that, in the circumstances, Mill Hill Park, Sunny Hill Park and Edgwarebury Park should be used for grazing cattle.

In view of the fact that this would result in extensive damage to parks which have been developed, the Borough Surveyor had communicated with the County Council thereon and the following arrangements had been made:—

Mill Hill Park.—An area of approximately 19 acres of land to be reserved to provide a hay crop.

Sunny Hill Park.—Mr. Hinge, of Church Farm, Hendon, to be allowed to cut the grass as and when required and to remove it for feeding purposes, subject to the payment of a sum of £15 for the privilege. Mr. Hinge to supply all labour, plant, etc.

Edgwarebury Park.—The upper portion of the land to be let for grazing purposes to Mr. Noad, of Bury Farm, and the lower portion, nearer the Bye-pass Road, reserved for the general use of the public.

The County Council has approved the above arrangements and tendered their appreciation to the Council for their assistance in the matter.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action of the Borough Surveyor be approved.

#### 7.—ACCESS TO PUBLIC PARKS:

Broadfields Avenue, Edgware...... From its junction with Glengall Road to a point 66 ft, beyond the southern boundary of the transformer station belonging to The Northmet Power Company.

# TRAVELLING FACILITIES.

## 18.—DISCONTINUANCE OF THROUGH BOOKINGS:

The London Passenger Transport Board give notice of the withdrawal, as from the 1st July next, of the limited number of through bookings now in operation for single journeys between certain road points on the bus, tram and trolley-bus services of the Board and a number of Underground Stations. This course is being adopted because these bookings and the complication of their ticket system gives rise to serious operative difficulties at a time when simplicity is of paramount importance.

## 19.—THE BURROUGHS, HENDON, BUS "REQUEST STOP" SIGNS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the London Passenger Transport Board intimating that, after negotiations with the police, it has now been agreed that "By Request Stop" signs can be conveniently fitted to lamp-posts in positions near Egerton Gardens and outside Nos. 71 and 73, The Burroughs. (Group II Committee-1/2/41--Highways-13.) Noted.

## 20.-LAND-JUNCTION OF CRANMER ROAD WITH LYNFORD GARDENS, EDGWARE:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the Ministry of Transport had called attention to the water course situate in a strip of private unfenced land at the above junction. Having regard to the respective levels of the land and the highway, a danger exists to persons using the highway, particularly during periods of darkness.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That a notice under Section 30 of the Public Health Acts (Amendment) Act, 1907, be served upon the owner of the land requiring him to enclose, within a period of 28 days, the stream and bank so as to prevent any danger therefrom.

# 21.—PROPOSED WATER DAM—JUNCTION OF ELM GROVE WITH CRICKLEWOOD LANE:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from Clang Ltd., Crown Yard, Cricklewood, for permission to place a 5,000 gallon capacity dam on the highway at the junction of Elm Grove with Cricklewood Lane. The dam is required in connection with the fire protection of the company's works.

#### SALVACE.

#### 24.—SALVAGE OFFICER:

A letter was submitted from the Controller of Salvage, Ministry of Supply, with further reference to his suggestion that the Council should appoint a Salvage Officer. Whilst recognising that it is for the Council to organise the work in the manner that may be most appropriate, the Controller trusts that the Council will not regard the present results as sufficiently satisfactory in view of the fact that the quantities of waste paper, metal and bones shown by the monthly returns amount to only about half of the standards which are expected based on the experience of many Councils throughout the country. The Controller cannot help feeling, therefore, that a good deal more can be done and he requests the Council to give the matter their earnest consideration and to take such further steps as are possible to increase the quantities in view of the urgent national need for these materials. (Group II Committee—5/5/41—W. & F.B.—19.)

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Chairman, together with the Borough Surveyor, be instructed to interview the Controller of Salvage on the matter.

#### 25.—SALVAGE DRIVES OR PAPER WEEKS:

A letter was considered from the Controller of Salvage, Ministry of Supply, suggesting that the Council should organise a short and intensive campaign in the form of a Salvage Drive or Paper Week. The Ministry forward a memorandum indicating the nature of the assistance which they will be glad to give in planning and carrying out such special drives.

A letter was also submitted from the Association of Municipal Corporations calling attention to the facilities afforded by the Ministry to Local Authorities in connection with the organisation of a Salvage Drive. - (2) Water Supplies.—The appointment of Water Officers as required by Circular 153/1940 is approved as follows:—
  - 1 Section Officer as Water Officer.
  - 1 Patrol Officer as Deputy Water Officer.

- (3) Petrol and Oil Supplies.—The Home Office are unable to approve the purchase of a second portable petrol tanker, as each large Authority is limited to one
- (4) Auxiliary Fire Stations.—The Home Office recommend that additional accommodation be provided near existing Auxiliary Stations to meet the needs of the increased personnel.
- (5) Personnel.—In view of the increased war establishment the following additional officers should be appointed :-
  - 1 Section Officer.
  - 9 Leading Firemen.

The question of a Final establishment of Auxiliary Firemen is reserved for consideration in connection with the arrangements for the re-organisation of the Fire Services generally.

(6) Vehicles.—The Home Office approve the purchase of a further seven vehicles for towing purposes.

The Chief Officer reported that it will be necessary to make certain further appointments and alterations within the Auxiliary Fire Service as follows:-

(a) That the following be promoted to the rank of Section Officer:

Sub-Officer R. A. Loft. Sub-Officer W. Newson.

(b) That the following be promoted to the rank of Patrol Officer:

Leading Fireman S. F. Swan. Leading Fireman B. Emmerson. Leading Fireman J. G. R. D'Alessio.

(c) That the following be promoted to the substantive rank of Leading Fireman:

#### 23.—COST-OF-LIVING BONUS:

A letter was submitted from the Middlesex Whitley Council for Local Authorities, Administrative, Technical and Clerical Services calling attention to certain amendments made by the National Joint Council for Local Authorities Administrative, Technical and Clerical Services to their scheme of Salary Adjustments operative as from the 1st January, 1941. This amended Scheme as set out hereunder was considered and approved by the Middlesex Whitley Council at a Special Meeting on the 31st May, 1941, and recommended to all local authorities in Middlesex for adoption with effect from the 1st April, 1941. The amended scheme has also been approved by the whole of the Provincial Councils covering England and Wales.

A letter was also submitted from the Hendon Branch of the National Association of Local Government Officers in support of the amended scheme.

#### Scheme.

- (1) (a) An officer whose normal salary does not exceed £300 per annum be granted a cost of living increase at the rate of 10 per cent. of salary.
  - (b) An officer whose normal salary exceeds £300 per annum be granted a bonus equivalent to 6 per cent. of the first £300 of salary, plus 3 per cent. of salary in excess of £300 or 3 per cent. of £200 whichever is the less subject to an officer whose salary exceeds £300 but is less than £311 13s. per annum not receiving less than he would have received had he been in receipt of a salary of £300.
- (2) That the foregoing recommendation be subject to the undermentioned conditions:—
  - (a) The bonus shall remain in force until altered or rescinded by the National Council, the position to be reconsidered at intervals in the light of changing conditions.
  - (b) This recommendation in its application to an area covered by a Provincial Council shall be subject to endorsement by the Provincial Council, who shall have regard to any agreements operating in the area.
  - (c) The bonus shall be calculated by reference to normal salary exclusive of fees except where fees are recognised by the Local Authority as forming part or the whole of the salary of an officer.
  - (d) Bonus shall not be payable in respect of a travelling allowance or an allowance made for provision of office accommodation and/or clerical assistance, unless in the case of an allowance for clerical assistance the local authority grants a bonus on such basis as it deems desirable in the circumstances on condition that the officer will apply the whole of the amount received to granting a bonus to the assistants employed.
  - (e) In the case of a part-time officer there shall be first ascertained the bonus which would have been payable had the officer devoted his whole time to the employment, regard being given to the salary payable for the part-time employment and the proportion of whole-time devoted to the duties, and the officer shall be entitled to receive by way of bonus the same proportion of the amount so ascertained as is represented by the proportion of whole-time service devoted to the duties.

- (f) In the case of a whole-time officer holding two or more appointments there shall be ascertained the bonus which would have been payable had the officer been employed whole-time by one authority and been in receipt of a salary equal to the aggregate of the salaries he receives for the several appointments, and in respect of each appointment held the officer shall be entitled to receive by way of bonus the same proportion of the amount so ascertained as is represented by the proportion of his total remuneration allocated to the appointment.
- (g) In the case of an officer who enjoys free apartments and rations in addition to salary he shall be entitled to receive one-half of the bonus calculated by reference to the total of his cash salary and the money value of his emoluments.
- (h) In the case of an officer who enjoys rations only or apartments only in addition to salary he shall be entitled to receive two-thirds of the bonus calculated by reference to the total of his cash salary and the money value of his rations or apartments.
- (3) That the bonus granted shall be regarded as a temporary payment intended to assist in meeting the increased cost of living owing to the War, and shall be recognised as due to and dependent on, the existence of the abnormal conditions now prevailing.
- (4) That any question arising between a local authority and a staff organisation regarding the interpretation of this recommendation shall be determined in the first place by the Provincial Council for the area or, failing agreement, by the National Council.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council adopt the amended scheme of cost of living increase scale as recommended by the Middlesex Whitley Council.

# 24.—PROVISION OF CONSECRATED GROUND FOR BURIAL OF PARISHIONERS OF HENDON:

#### 28.-LOSS OF RATE INCOME:

The Committee considered a letter from the Middlesex County Council intimating that as a result of the Conference which took place on the 24th April, 1941, between the Chairman of the County Finance Committee and representatives of the Local Authorities in the County, the special Sub-Committee has considered the report of the Clerk of the County Council regarding Loss of Rate Income by Enemy Action.

The County Council suggest that Authorities contemplating the submission of claims should take the necessary steps in regard thereto without undue delay, and that the matter should not be left until the Authorities find themselves in financial difficulties. This course is suggested owing to the possibility that the Ministry may determine that any action already taken by the Authorities to alleviate the financial position without prior discussion with the Ministry cannot be taken into consideration in arriving at the amount of the Government grant. The County Council offer to assist any Local Authority in the submission of its claim, and in view of the effect upon the County precept, it is suggested that it might be helpful if Local Authorities, before the submission of claims would confer with the County Council.

The Sub-Committee are proceeding with the formulation of the principles which should in the opinion of the Members be taken into consideration in determining the financial relationship between the Government and the Local Authorities in regard to this matter.

The County Council will continue to keep Local Authorities informed of the position.

#### 2.-FURSBY AVENUE-KEEPING OF PIGS:--

The Committee has considered a letter from Mr. E. R. Clifford regarding the question of allottees resident in Finehley, who are members of the Archfield Allotments Association, being allowed to participate in the co-operative pig club recently formed at the above allotments.

The Committee has no objection to such allottees participating in the Club and Mr. Clifford has been informed accordingly.

#### 3.—PLANT PESTS.

The Committee has considered a letter from Plant Protection, Ltd., suggesting that a series of demonstrations on how to deal with plant pests be given on the Council's allotments.

The Committee has approved the suggestion and arrangements have been made for such demonstrations to be given on the four demonstration plots, commencing on the 28th June, 1941.

# 4.—DERELICT GARDENS:

The Committee has duly noted a letter from the Middlesex War Agricultural Executive Committee with the following resolution:-

"That this Committee views with grave concern the possibility of many private vegetable gardens becoming derelict as a result of the calling up of private and jobbing gardeners. and that, in view of the above, it is suggested that Local Authorities, through their Horticultural or Allotment Committees, should make some arrangements whereby local horticultural experts can supervise the maintenance of such vegetable gardens if unskilled workers or members of the Women's Land Army can be made available for this work."

# 5.—WATER SUPPLIES:

# Hendon Lawn Tennis Club:

The Borough Surveyor has reported that work is proceeding in connection with the provision of the water supply to the allotments on the Hendon Lawn Tennis Club's ground at Downage. The Water Company's cost for restoring the supply is £1.

#### Hyde Cottage:

The Borough Surveyor has reported that further investigation had revealed that there is a pipe laid on to the tennis court at the above site. Subject to the consent of the Colne Valley Water Company it is proposed to utilise this site in order to provide a water supply to the allotments.

#### Harman Drive:

There is also a supply pipe situate at these allotments which it is proposed, subject to the consent of the Metropolitan Water Board, to utilise in a similar manner.

### Utilisation of Salvaged Materials for Water Supply Purposes.

The Borough Surveyor has reported on the comparative prices of new piping and pipes from the salvage dump, and pointed out that the number of water tanks which are fit for re-use is very limited and that those which can be used are being taken over in connection with the scheme for Emergency Feeding. The pipes available are in short lengths and have to be sorted out on the ground. The cost of labour for fixing such pipes is, therefore, very much higher and before any of these materials can be used the consent of the appropriate water company will have to be obtained.

The Borough Surveyor has been instructed to utilise where possible the water tanks recovered from properties affected by enemy action, subject to the consent of the appropriate water company. Instructions have also been given for the preparation of an estimate of the cost of additional water supplies to the Clitterhouse allotments.

#### 6.—ARCHFIELDS ALLOTMENTS:

It was reported that the Archfields Allotment Association intended making application to the Council for permission to erect a green-house on an area of land approximately fifty feet in extent adjacent to the entrance to the allotments, for the purpose of raising seeds.

The Committee desire to support the application.

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REPORT TO THE FINANCE AND GENERAL PURPOSES CONDUCTED SOTH JUNE 1941.

# PROVISION OF LAND FOR BURLAL.

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The procedure under the Burial Acts involves considerable delay and trouble and the preferable course would be to provide a cemetery under the provisions of the Public Health Interments Act 1879.

On the establishment of a cemetery the Council may make byelaws with respect to the management and charges for its use. They may also set apart a portion of the cemetery for burials according to the rites of the established church and the Bishop of the Diocese may, on the application of the Council, consecrate the portion so set apart.

On the consecrated part a chapel to be approved by the Bishop must be built, for the performance of the burial sorvice of the established church. A salaried chaplain is to be appointed to officiate in the consecrated part of the cemetery, but the appointment and salary to be subject to the approval of the Bishop.

The Council may also set apart the whole or a portion of the unconsecrated part of the cemetery as a place of burial for persons not being members of the established church and may allow in any chapel built in such unconsecrated part, a burial service to be performed according to the rites of any church or organisation, other than the established church,

With regard to the making of the cemetery, the following points should be borne in mind:-

- The cemetery is not to be constructed nearer to any dwellinghouse than 100 yards except with the consent of the comer or occupier.
- The Council must keep the cemetery, buildings and fences, in complete repair and in good order and condition.

As regards the complaint of the lack of conscerated ground in Hendon, I have spoken to the Secretary of the Abney Park Cometery Company with regard to Hendon Park Cometery, and I am informed that ne part of this cometery is The Secretary also stated that it was not the policy of his Board to permit the consecration of any part of the cemetery and he did not think an application for this purpose would be favourably received by his Board.

The Paddington Council's cometery contains consecrated ground, which is available for the burial of Hendon residents. The fees payable, however, are higher for Hendon than for Paddington residents.

# OBSERVATIONS OF THE BOROUGH TREASURER:

- 1. The provision of places of interment by local authorities is regulated by numerous Acts of Parliament. In general, the procedure may be by way of the Burial Acts or under the Public Health (Interments) Act, 1879.
- 2. Procedure under the Burial Acts involves the passing of special In effect the Local Authority becomes the Burial Board for the whole or such part of the area as may be defined. There are certain disadvantages in this procedure.
- 3. If the Corporation decides to provide Cometeries, the best procedure would be by way of the Public Health (Interments) Act, 1879, which, in conjunction with the provisions of the Public Health Acts, enables land to be ecquired and money to be borrowed under the Local Covernment Act of 1933.

- 4. When a cemetery is provided, the Authority is required to keep the cemetery, and the buildings and fences in good order and repair out of the cemetery receipts. In general, the management of the cemetery is entrusted to a Cemetery Superintendent and certain statutory records are required to be kept in relation to burials.
- The cemetery authority is authorised to set aside parts of a cemetery for exclusive burials and it may sell burial rights in perpetuity. Fees may be charged for various services and for the grant of privileges. The approval of the Ministry of Health is required to charges for interment in common graves, otherwise the scale of fees may be determined by the Local Authority.
- 6. It is doubtful whether there is any necessity for a Corporation Cemetery in Hendon at the present time, having regard to the numerous existing facilities in the Borough. Apart from this point, the time is inopportune from many standpoints and the question might properly be deferred.

#### OBSERVATIONS OF THE BOROUGH SURVEYOR:

- 1. The question of the provision of cometeries within the Borough was taken into consideration by the Town Planning Committee when preparing the draft Town Planning Scheme, which became operative in 1936. Investigation into the problem showed that it was inadvisable to reserve land in the Town Planning Scheme for this purpose. Such reservation not only gave rise to serious opposition from adjacent land owners but was found, in practice, to be ineffective in retaining the land for the purpose indicated. Even if the Ministry of Health agreed to the reservation of land for this purpose in a Town Planning Scheme there was nothing to prevent an outside Borough purchasing the land and using it as a cometery for their own area.
- 2. In these circumstances the Town Planning Committee decided to proceed with their policy of acquiring for purposes of general development, large areas of land in the northern part of the Borough, which was still undeveloped. After such land had been acquired there would have been no difficulty in selecting an appropriate site within such areas and applying for the necessary authority to use the site as a municipal cometery.
- 3. Up to the outbreak of the War substantial progress had been made in the acquisition of the large areas referred to, but it is improbable that there will be any opportunity of completing this work until the termination of the War.
- 4. The Committee were influenced in their policy of deferring the actual selection of the site to be used for cemetery purposes by the fact that, for the time being, there appeared to be sufficient cemetery prevision within the Borough. It was felt that it was not desirable to specify the exact site of the proposed cemetery until the problem of the allocation and lay-out of the belt of land could be dealt with as a whole.
- In any case it would, at the present stage, be undesirable to specify any particular area of land for this purpose, unless it is proposed to make a compulsory purchase order and proceed with the scheme immediately. All proposals for the acquisition of land for cometery purposes lead to proposals for the acquisition of land for cometery purposes lead to organised opposition from adjacent land owners and are very difficult to carry into effect.
- 6. It is therefore suggested that it will be better to continue the policy of the Town Planning Committee and, as soon as circumstances permit, complete the acquisition of the belt of land in the northern part of the Borough. Detailed proposals can then be prepared for the use of the whole of this land, including the site of a municipal cemetery in a position where it will not affect detrimentally either the amenities of the Borough as a whole or the properties of individual owners.



## REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENCE COMMITTEE

to the Meeting of the

#### HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

7th July, 1941.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Hendon,

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I submit a report on various matters which have been dealt with by the Civil Defence Committee at its Meetings held on the 4th and 18th June and 2nd July, 1941:—

## 1. AWARDS.

The Committee learned with extreme satisfaction that acts of gallantry and of marked devotion to duty by members of the Borough's Civil Defence Services have been officially recognised by the following awards:—

It is also noted with pleasure that Mr. A. L. Butler, an employee of the Corporation (Hendon Way Repair Shop) has received a Commendation in recognition of assistance given by him in rescue operations.

# 2. CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL—CONDITIONS OF SERVICE:

The following matters were referred to in a reply given by the Minister of Home Security to a question in the House of Commons on the 22nd May, 1941:---

(a) Uniforms.-Where existing "bluette" uniforms are not thought to be adequate for the duties they undertake, Local Authorities are to be enabled to obtain on a grant-aided basis serge uniforms, coats, berets and boots for whole-time members of the Services and part-time members who undertake to perform, if called upon, not less than 48 hours duty per month. Appropriate new uniforms are to be designed for women members of the Services who have not already been provided with a suitable type. The date of issue of the garments, etc., will depend on supply considerations.

Note.—The Minister's detailed instructions in the matter are awaited.

(b) Pay and Refreshments.—A scheme of pay for certain intermediate ranks in A.R.P. Services is to be introduced. Arrangements for the provision of meals for part-time volunteers (including members of Local Authorities' Fire Prevention Organisations) who undertake relatively long hours of duty away from their homes, are also under review. The Minister proposes to suggest to Local Authorities that, where the preferable course of supplying meals as at present authorised cannot be adopted, they shall, as an experiment, make payments in lieu of meals to unpaid volunteers who cannot take their meals at home on the basis of 2s. for spells of duty lasting 8 hours and 3s. for 12-hour spells.

Note.—This Committee has for some time been pressing the Minister to allow cash payments to be made in lieu of meals to personnel not stationed at depots enjoying canteen facilities.

Further directions in the matters of pay in respect of personnel holding certain offices and refreshments for part-time personnel generally are now to hand and will receive the careful consideration of the Committee.

(c) Sick Pay, etc.—Subject to a medical certificate, paid personnel will be entitled to receive the equivalent of their full pay during absence through sickness up to a maximum of 13 weeks, whether such sickness is due to war service injuries or arises out of other conditions of their service. It is also hoped to introduce a system whereby in areas selected by the Regional Commissioners on account of heavy and frequent raiding, whole-time personnel will be eligible to receive one free return railway voucher in a year so that their annual holiday may be spent in more peaceful surroundings.

Note-Further instructions in regard to the payment of volunteers during absence through sickness to operate as from June 1st, 1941, have been received and will be applied. No direction as to the proposed issue of free railway vouchers has been received.

# CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL—DEFERMENT OF CALLING-UP:

The following amendments in the schemes for the deferment of calling up for service with the Forces of men in Civil Defence Services have been made:-

(a) Rescue and Stretcher Parties.—Men aged over 25 but under 30 years of age at date of registration-deferment extended to 30th September, 1941.

(b) First Aid Post and Ambulance Personnel.—General deferment after 1st July. 1941, limited to men of 35 years of age and over.

Special regard having been given to the position in this borough, applications for the deferment of men between 30 and 35 years of age will be considered.

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poration ssistance (c) Decontamination Service.—Regular employees of Local Authorities in London Region enrolled in Decontamination Service, 30 years of age or over at date of registration—deferment until 30th August, 1941.

The Regional Commissioners indicate there is no prospect of securing agreement to the continuance of deferment on the scale now authorised after the 31st August. Endeavours are to be made to secure additional recruits from employees reserved in respect of their primary occupation or who are above military age.

(d) Wardens.—Wardens over 30 years of age at date of registration—deferred until 30th September, 1941.

The Regional Commissioners intimate that no assurance can be given that these deferment arrangements will be extended beyond this date, and in any event no further general period of deferment for men below 35 years of age is possible. Endeavours are to be made to replace male Wardens under 35 years of age by older men or by women, the recruitment of three women to replace two men being authorised.

# 4. INTERCHANGEABILITY OF DUTIES OF CIVIL DEFENCE SERVICES:

A further amendment has been made to Defence Regulation 29B, making it part of the duties of a paid member of one Civil Defence Service, where the Local Authority so directs. (a) to perform the functions of another such Service, including the undergoing of training, and (b) to perform his duties (including any duties which he is required to perform under (a) above) outside the area of the Local Authority when parties or detachments of which he is a member are sent to another area in connection with mutual support schemes or for purposes of reinforcement. The amendment has been made primarily to assist Local Authorities in applying the important principle of the interchangeability of functions to members in particular of the Stretcher and Rescue Parties with a view to securing greater flexibility in the operation of these Services and the more effective and economical use of the available man-power. Substantial progress has already been made in reinforcing the hard-pressed Rescue Service with Stretcher Parties, who have been seldom fully engaged, and the Regional Commissioners desire that this practice should be employed to the fullest extent possible as the training of Stretcher Parties in Rescue work develops.

#### 5. APPOINTMENT OF CHIEF WARDEN:

In reference to the application made by the Committee for approval to the appointment of a full-time Chief Warden at a salary of £500 per annum, plus £100 car allowance, the Regional Commissioners replied that no authority existed for such an appointment at a rate in excess of £3 10s. per week, but that the question of higher pay for supervisory ranks was still under consideration.

In the further directions in regard to pay for supervisory ranks referred to in Item 2(b) of this Report, the rate of pay applicable to the office of Chief Warden is stated to be £3 15s, per week.

# 6. COST OF LIVING BONUS-LOCAL AUTHORITIES' STAFFS:

The terms of Home Security Circular No. 101/1941 relating to the payment of a revised cost of living bonus to staff of the Council employed full-time on Air Raid Precautions work, as from the 1st April, 1941, are being applied.

## 7. EMERGENCY FEEDING SCHEMES:

(a) Catering Manager.—Mr. G. Palin has been appointed Catering Manager and commenced his duties on the 26th May, 1941.

The Committee has authorised the payment of an allowance at the rate of £100 per annum to the Catering Manager to cover the provision and mainten-

(b) Equipment and Supplies of Food.—The Ministry has commenced delivery of supplies of food and equipment and has also approved an expenditure of £908 on the local purchase of additional items of kitchen equipment.

Application has been made to the Ministry of Food for authority of an expenditure of £800 on the provision and fitting up of tanks for storing reserve supplies of water.

As the supplies of food provided by the Ministry of Food do not include commodities suitable for breakfast, the Committee has approved the acquisition of stocks of oatmeal and cereals for this purpose and are requesting the Ministry of Food to approve of this action.

#### 8. BRITISH RESTAURANTS:

Every endeavour is being made to establish British Restaurants in the Borough at the earliest possible moment. Considerable difficulty is being experienced in obtaining suitable premises which are not already in use, or earmarked, for special purposes.

The Committee has approved for submission to the Ministry of Food, preliminary proposals for the use of 10 buildings to serve various areas. In five cases the premises have been inspected by the Ministry. Two of these premises have been provisionally earmarked and negotiations for their renting are proceeding, while in the remaining three cases endeavours are being made to arrange for the release of the premises by the Departments by whom they have previously been requisitioned.

# 9. AIR RAID SHELTERS:

(a) Anderson Shelters.--Approximately 6,600 Anderson shelters have been concreted, 2.376 drained and 605 extended.

Approximately 4,600 bunks have also been issued for use in this type of shelter.

- (b) Indoor Shelters.-The distribution of indoor shelters under the scheme for "free issue" and for sale has commenced.
- (c) Communal Shelters.—Accommodation for 14,770 people is now available in this type of shelter.
- (d) Lighting and Heating of Shelters.—The installation of lighting in communal shelters and lighting and heating in other types of shelters in the Borough is
- (e) Colders Hill Park .- Approval is being sought to the erection of shelters for the benefit of users of Golders Hill Park.

# 10. GAS CLEANSING FACILITIES—SHOPPING CENTRES:

In reference to the scheme for the provision of gas cleansing stations in the various shopping centres in the Borough, work is proceeding on the erection of buildings in Hendon Park, Watling Avenue and Station Road, Edgware.

The Middlesex County Council has now approved the Committee's proposals for the acquisition and adaptation of premises fronting the Broadwalk, Golders Green, and the work, at an estimated cost of £1,050, is being put in hand.

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# 11. FIRE WATCHING AND FIRE FIGHTING:

- (a) Corporation's Buildings.—The Committee has approved a scheme for the fire watching and fire fighting arrangements for the Town Hall, Library and Ravensfield, which has been in operation since the 23rd June, 1941.
- (b) Protected Watching Points.—The Minister of Home Security is being urged to give authority for the use, where necessary, of Anderson shelters to approved protected watching points.
- (e) Business Premises.—The Committee has authorised the institution of proceedings against certain persons under the provisions of the Fire Prevention (Business Premises) Order, 1941, in respect of breaches of the Order.

#### 12. DEMOLITION OF DAMAGED HOUSES—WATLING ESTATE:

Arrangements have now been made with the London County Council in regard to the demolition, where necessary, of houses on the Watling Estate as a result of air raid damage.

#### 13. WARDENS' POSTS-LAVATORY ACCOMMODATION:

The tender of Messrs. Buckingham & Sons, Ltimited, amounting to £483 17s. 6d. for the provision of lavatory facilities at 49 of the Wardens' Posts in the Borough has been accepted.

## 14. INFESTATION OF LICE-TREATMENT OF SCABIES:

The Committee concurs in the proposals of the Public Health and Medical Services Committee in regard to the utilisation of gas cleansing sections of First Aid Posts and the services of First Aid Post personnel in connection with the cleansing of verminous persons and treatment of scabies.

# II. WAR-TIME NURSERIES:

#### Joint Circular of Ministry of Health and Board of Education.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that since the last meeting of the Committee, when consideration of the above Circular was deferred pending his report thereon, the following action had been taken by the Public Health Department:—

(1) Enquiry has been made of all mothers known to the Department with children under five years of age in the Child's Hill, Cricklewood, West

- (2) A letter was sent to firms engaged in war industry in these areas.
- (3) The Regional Welfare Officer of the Ministry of Health, the Local Officer of the Ministry of Labour and various other Organisations have also been

As regards (1), the replies received at the present date disclose that in the West Hendon and Colindale areas there are 95 women either in employment or seeking employment providing accommodation is found for their children, and that the number of children under five years of age to be cared for is 123. As regards the Child's Hill and Cricklewood areas, the replies disclose that the corresponding numbers are 152 and 204 respectively. The Committee were informed that replies from mothers requiring accommodation for their children were still being received.

A letter was also submitted from the Deputy Senior Regional Officer of the Ministry of Health stating that representations had been received from the Ministry of Labour stressing the need for the establishment of War-time Nurseries in Hendon and urging the Council to submit their proposals to the Ministry of Health at an early date, such proposals to contain the particulars specified in the memorandum accompanying the letter which was read to the Committee.

In view of the information collected locally and the recommendation contained in the letter from the Deputy Senior Regional Officer, the Medical Officer of Health reported that the need for War-time Nurseries in Hendon had been clearly established and, accordingly, the Committee

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# 1. BROADFIELDS AVENUE SCHOOL:

# (a) REPORT OF ARCHITECT:

During the past month very appreciable progress has been made on this contract. The greater part of the brickwork is complete, the boarding to the assembly hall roof has been commenced and the nursery class roof is being tiled. Drainage will start almost immediately to be followed by the electrical work and plastering. Glazing is well under way. **Noted with satisfaction.**

In connection with the heating of the school shelters which are used by the public after school hours, the Committee agreed that the A.R.P. Controller and the Chief Warden be asked to take all possible steps through their Shelter Marshals and Air Raid Wardens respectively to ensure that there is no wastage of electrical current.

## 3. STRENGTHENING AND WATERPROOFING OF SCHOOL SHELTERS:

The strengthening and waterproofing of the shelters at the Meads School have been completed. The Surveyor reported that the work at the remainder of the schools will be put in hand immediately, the necessary steelwork having already been ordered. It is proposed to carry out this work partly by direct labour and partly by contract so as to make sure that it is all completed by the end of September. **Noted.** 

#### 4. BOARD OF EDUCATION APPROVALS:

Pursuant to Item 3 in the Report of this Sub-Committee, dated 10/6/41, it was reported that the Board of Education had approved expenditure amounting to £7,865, which will rank for grant at the rate of 100 per cent, and had issued a certificate for the purchase of 90 tons of steel in connection with the strengthening and waterproofing of school shelters. **Noted.** 

## 5. FIRE WATCHING OF SCHOOLS:

#### (a) ARRANGEMENTS FOR MIDSUMMER HOLIDAYS:

A schedule giving particulars of arrangements made by Head Teachers for fire watching the Hendon Elementary Schools during the Midsummer Holidays, was submitted and approved.

# (b) DEANSBROOK COUNCIL SCHOOL:

The Minister of Home Security states that Members of Fire Prevention Parties (including fire watchers) whether paid or unpaid on business premises will be accepted by the Ministry of Pensions as Civil Defence Volunteers for the purpose of the Personal Injuries (Civilians) Scheme and adds that the compensation to which they are entitled is wider in scope than that to which other civilians are entitled. It is assumed that all such teachers have been enrolled with the Local Authority as members of a Civil Defence Organisation for this purpose."

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the Hendon Fire Brigade for permission to use, free of charge, some of the tennis courts in Hendon Park on Wednesday, the 6th August, in order that the tennis finals of H District, London Fire Region, may be played off.

RESOLVED.—That permission be given to the Fire Brigade for the free use of four tennis courts in Hendon Park on the 6th August, 1941.

# 7. WEST HENDON PLAYING FIELDS:

# 8. ENTERTAINMENTS IN PARKS:

An application was considered from Messrs. Goodwin & Hart, of St. Albans, asking the Council to let them have the use of a piece of land in any of the children's playing fields for a period of three or four days for the purpose of erecting small hand-turned roundabouts, small swing-hoats, switchbacks, etc. A small charge of 1d. or 2d. would be made for the use of the larger apparatus to cover running expenses. RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application be disapproved.

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### 9. GARDEN SUBURB:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the Hon. Secretary of the Hamp. stead Garden Suburb Residents' Association relating to the following matters:

- (1) Flowering Weeds.—The Association request that strong action be taken with the owners of gardens of unoccupied houses to destroy weeds to prevent damage to adjacent property.
- (2) Grass Verges in Roads.—The Association note with satisfaction that these are being dealt with by the Council and they express the hope that the fronts of unoccupied houses may be kept tidy.

The Association have been informed that the Council are prepared to deal with the grass verges in front of unoccupied houses but they are unable to take action in respect of private gardens of houses.

RESOLVED—That the question of flowering weeds be referred to the Middlesex County Council.

# 10. NATIONAL ALLOTMENTS SOCIETY, LTD,-CONFERENCE:

# 11. POULTRY KEEPING:

A letter was submitted from the County of Middlesex Domestic Poultry Keepers' Federation intimating that the Domestic Poultry Keepers' Council is actively encouraging the formation of new societies or the expansion of existing organisations to embrace the interests of domestic poultry keepers. The Federation has been formed to co-operate in this work and to co-ordinate the activities of the numerous new and existing societies in the County of Middlesex and, in this connection, the Federation suggest that the various allotment societies are well suited to undertake this work and ask to be supplied with a list of the allotment societies in the Borough.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That a list of the Allotment Societies in Hendon be supplied to the Federation.

# 12. SHEAVESHILL AVENUE—SILK STREAM:

The Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies called attention to the damage caused to the allotments through the flooding of the Silk Stream and asked for certain works to be carried out to the banks of the stream. The County Council has previously intimated that they are not prepared to incur expenditure in respect of repairs to the banks of the stream at the present time. (Group II. Committee—5/5/41—E.P. & A.—12.)

# 13. WATER TANKS—SOMERTON ROAD, CRICKLEWOOD:

The Borough Surveyor reported an application from Handley Page, Ltd., for permismission to erect additional water tanks in Somerton Road adjacent to their premises. It is proposed to erect one 5,000 gallon tank adjacent to an existing shelter in Gillingham Road and another 5,000 gallon tank adjacent to the shelter at the Claremont Road junction, and also a 20,000 gallon tank on the footpath on the opposite side of the road approximately opposite Gillingham Road.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the application be approved subject to the Council being indemnified against any claims which may arise.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal, subject to the execution of a formal agreement protecting the rights of the Council and to the payment of an annual rental of 1/- per tank).

# 14. FINCHLEY ROAD AND CRICKLEWOOD LANE-SURFACE DRESSING:

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had been in communication with the County Council regarding the desirability of surface dressing the new wood paving in these two roads. Having regard to the limitations on the supply of bitumen, it is unlikely that it will be possible to carry out this work again for the period of the war, and for this reason it is desirable that this work should be carried out during the present summer. This paving is under a maintenance contract with the Acme Flooring and Paving Co., (1904) Ltd., and they are prepared to carry out the necessary work at a cost of 10d. per square yard or a total of £1,204 3s. 4d.

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## AUXILIARY FIRE SERVICE.

# 30. AUXILIARY FIRE STATION, 175, COLINDALE AVENUE, N.W.9:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the Ministry of Works and Buildings with regard to the above Auxliary Fire Station which forms part of the Government Lymph Establishment. The Ministry point out that the Auxiliary Fire Service have the use of the domestic cold water service in connection with the sanitary accommodation. Part of such accommodation is used jointly by the Auxiliary Fire Service and the staff of the Government Lymph Establishment, and another part is used solely by the Auxiliary Fire Service. In these circumstances the Ministry suggest that a charge of £8 per annum be made by the Department for this user.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council agree to the charge of £8 per annum in respect of such service.

# 36. SECTION 5-AUXILIARY FIRE STATION, 175, COLINDALE AVENUE, N.W. 9:

The Chief Officer reported that the Ministry of Works and Buildings, owing to certain of their premises being damaged by enemy action, have intimated that they propose to remove part of their furniture and chattels from the Government Lymph Establishment. It will, therefore, be necessary to replace these items which consist mainly of chairs, tables, etc., at an estimated cost of £10.

# Provision of Municipal Cemetery and Grematorium.

Representations have been made to the Council on behalf of local religious organisations as to the provision of a Municipal Cemetery comprising consecrated ground. The main reasons for such representations are that the Parish Church Cemetery is full and that a Cemetery in the locality, which is operated by a limited company, does not contain consecrated ground. In this connection it should be stated that the Borough of Paddington have a Cemetery in this Borough in which the interment of non-Paddington parishioners is permitted subject to the payment of extra charges. This latter Cemetery comprises both consecrated and unconsecrated ground.

Before proceeding to a detailed consideration of the representations it is desirable that the Council should, as far as possible, ascertain whether under existing emergency conditions, a loan sanction is likely to be issued for the capital expenditure involved if it should be decided to proceed further with the matter in expenditure. It will, therefore, be appreciated if a provisional intimation can the near future. It will, therefore, be appreciated if a provision of interpretation of the given on this point. To enable you to consider the matter it should be mentioned that the approximate capital cost based on the provision of fifty acres of land and the necessary appurtenances for the purpose might amount to upwards land and the necessary appurtenances for the Borough of Paddington's of £65,000. # Provision of Municipal Cemetery and Crematorium.

I am directed by the Minister of Health to refer to your letter of the 9th instant with regard to the proposal of the Town Council to provide a municipal cemetery and crematorium and to state that in view of the limitation on borrowing imposed by the Treasury Circular of the 28th March, 1940, the Minister is only prepared to issue his consent to a loan for the execution of works which are urgently necessary in connection with the war effort or are of pressing necessity on grounds of public health.

The Minister understands that there is ample accommodation for the needs of the Borough in existing cometeries, and in these circumstances the Minister is not prepared to entertain an application from the Town Council for the provision of a further burial ground at an estimated cost of approximately £65,000.

# 1. LETTING OF PLOTS:

The following details regarding the letting of plots are submitted for the information of the Council:—

# 2. LAND-ORCHARD DRIVE, EDGWARE:

The Borough Treasurer has reported that following representations made to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries regarding the use of the above site for War-time Allotments, the Minister has intimated that it was not possible to schedule the land for allotment purposes. The Minister, however, has suggested that consideration might be given to the utilisation of the land, formerly the Edgware Golf Links, situate in Harrow, for this purpose.

Eleven applications have been received for plots in this area of the Borough, and it has been agreed to refer the applicants to the Harrow Urban District Council with a view to accommodation being obtained on the site of the former Edgware Golf Links.

# 3. HAMMER'S LANE ALLOTMENTS:

The Borough Treasurer has reported the receipt of letters from two allottees on the above site stating that the land is unsuitable for cultivation. The Parks Superintendent has inspected the land and reported that the quality of the soil is poor, particularly in the case of three plots. Arrangements have therefore been made for the deposit of as many dead leaves as possible on the site during the forthcoming autumn, and in the meantime it has been decided to offer alternative plots to the allottees in question and to release them from the liability of rent until the 31st March, 1942.

### 4. CAMDEN SCHOOL PLAYING FIELDS:

The Committee has considered a report of the Borough Treasurer to the effect that the previous application for the use of this land for allotment purposes had not been proceeded with in view of the fact that the Governors of the School had indicated that they would be returning in the near future. It is now understood that the land, which is technically occupied, is not likely to be required and the Committee has given authority for entry upon the land under the Cultivation of Lands Order.

## 5. LAND—GREEN LANE, EDGWARE:

The Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies has asked for the fencing to be repaired at the above allotments in order to prevent cattle straying on to the plots. The estimated cost of carrying out repairs to such fencing is £35, and the Committee has instructed the Borough Surveyor to carry out the necessary work.

#### SALVAGE DRIVE IN THE BOROUGH OF HENDON:

The Committee considered a report by the Borough Surveyor consequent upon his attendance together with the Chairman at the recent Conference convened by the Controller of Salvage at the Guildhall, Westminster, S.W.1, in connection with the inauguration of Salvage Drives throughout the County.

The Controller of Salvage intimated that it was necessary to increase the quantities of waste paper, metals, textiles, etc., collected by local authorities for disposal to industry for war purposes.

He suggested that a General Committee should be set up to organise the drive throughout the County of Middlesex and that such Committee should consist of a representative from each local authority. The Conference agreed to the proposals of the Controller of Salvage and in this connection the following resolutions were passed:

- (a) That a simultaneous salvage drive should be organised by all the local authorities in the County, the date suggested being early in September.
- (b) That a General Committee should be appointed to make the necessary arrangements. Such committee to be composed of one representative from each local authority in the County and one from the County Council.
- (c) That a small Executive Committee be appointed by the General Committee to work out details and submit recommendations to the General Committee.
- (d) That an Honorary Secretary of the Committee should be appointed.

The first meeting of the General Committee was held on the 29th July, 1941, when a report was received by a small temporary committee which had been formed in the meantime to draft proposals for the consideration of the General Committee.

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The following proposals were approved by the General Committee:--

- 1. The Drive to be held during the first two weeks in September. The area to be covered by the Drive should be extended to include the whole of the London region. If necessary the date of the Drive can be deferred slightly to give additional time to organise the larger area.
- 2. Posters will be supplied by the Controller of Salvage free of cost, and he will arrange for any National advertising. In order to provide funds for general advertising and expenses, local authorities will be asked to pay into a common fund the sum of eight shillings per thousand of the population, the population figure to be based on the latest return of the Local Food Office.
- 3. Local authorities will deal themselves with advertising in the local press, and distribution of any special notices relating to their own locality.

Having regard to the area of the Borough and the somewhat scattered nature of its development, the Borough Surveyor suggested that a small Executive Committee should be formed to consider various ways of advertising the Salvage Drive throughout the district, the Executive Committee to have authority to incur any necessary expenses of printing, advertising in the press, and to meet the general expenses of the organisation in addition to paying the levy into the common fund. (£48 based upon a population of 120,000.)

#### HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Hendon,

Ladies and Gentlemen.

I submit a report on various matters which have been dealt with by the Civil Defence Committee at its Meetings held on the 16th and 30th July, 1941:-

#### 1.—HENDON AND DISTRICT TRADES COUNCIL:

The Hendon and District Trades Council, as the official central Trade Union organisation of the district, has submitted a further request for representation on this Committee. The Trades Council has been advised that the Committee is constituted in the manner prescribed by the Home Office, and it would not appear that co-option to this Committee would be permissible.

#### 2.—FREE RAILWAY VOUCHERS:

In reference to item 2 (c) of the last Report, the Minister of Home Security has directed that the scheme for the issue of one free return railway voucher in a year to Civil Defence volunteers in heavily raided areas, to enable them to spend their holidays in more peaceful surroundings, shall apply to the London Civil Defence Region.

The scheme, therefore, has been put into operation in this Borough, and has been made retrospective from the 1st June, 1941.

#### 3.—GRADED PAY FOR RANK:

The Committee has considered the scheme prepared by the Ministry of Home Security for additional pay to certain intermediate ranks in the A.R.P. services, and in accordance with the direction of the Minister have submitted proposals in connection with the application of the scheme in this Borough for the necessary confirmation of the London Civil Defence Region. When the proposals are approved, they will be made retrospective from the 1st June, 1941.

# 4.—PROVISION OF FOOD OR SUBSISTENCE ALLOWANCES:

In reference to the revised scheme for the supplying of meals or making a cash payment in lieu thereof to unpaid volunteers, further instructions have been received. It ing the terms of the Circular in this area.

# 5.—GROUP SCHOOL FOR INDIVIDUAL TRAINING:

A school for the training of the personnel from the 31 local authorities in Group 6 has been established by the Middlesex County Council. Entrants to the services will attend the school during the first week of service to receive training common to all services and in the second week special training for the particular branch in which they are enrolled. The School will conduct "refresher," "specialist" and "higher staff training" courses, and it is considered that it will provide better training facilities with a higher standard of instruction than can be afforded by individual authorities.

#### 6.-CHIEF WARDEN:

Captain A. G. Petrie having been appointed Chief Instructor of the Middlesex County Council Training School, is no longer able to continue in the office of Chief Warden of this Borough as from the 1st August, 1941.

The Committee has expressed its keen regret at Captain Petrie's inability to continue to act as Chief Warden, which office he has held with much distinction.

Pending further consideration of the appointment of a successor to Captain Petrie, the Deputy Chief Warden, Mr. H. E. Swabey, has been appointed as acting Chief Warden.

#### 7.—CASUALTY CHAPLAIN:

The Committee has considered a suggestion put forward by Pastor A. S. Oldham, the Minister of Christ Church, Borthwick Road, N.W. 9, that a "Casualty Chaplain" should be appointed. The Controller is conferring on this matter with the Rev. N. Boyd, M.A., as Rural Dean of Hendon.

#### 8.—RESCUE SERVICE—CONTEST:

In a Rescue Party Contest in which the 31 local authorities in Group 6 took part, the result was as under:—

# 9.—USE OF RESCUE PARTIES ON WORK IN CONNECTION WITH CIVIL DEFENCE:

Having regard to the considerable difficulty being experienced in obtaining sufficient skilled labour to carry out the necessary repairs and maintenance work on houses requisitioned by the Corporation for occupation by persons evacuated from premises damaged by enemy action, it is proposed to confer with the Middlesex County Council and the Trades Union Organisation concerned as to the possibility of utilising the service of skilled tradesmen who are members of Reseue Parties when the exigencies of the service permit.

## 10.—DECONTAMINATION SERVICE:

The attention of the Regional Commissioners is being drawn to the difficulty experienced in maintaining the strength of this service due to the calling up of its personnel for military service.

Attention is also being drawn to the absence of any authorisation for the provision of transport for the primary use of the decontamination service, and to the inefficacy of the existing arrangements whereby vehicles normally engaged on the central service of the Council are to be diverted to this service in an emergency.

#### 11.—REHOUSING DEPARTMENT:

The Committee have noted with satisfaction the following expressions of appreciation of the services of the Rehousing Department:—

- (1) From Mr. Henry Willinck, London Commissioner for the Homeless in respect of the helpful attitude and good work of the staff in re-housing homeless persons from the East End, and remarking that this kind of assistance to hard-hit boroughs was quite invaluable, and had been greatly appreciated by those who had been helped. Special reference was made to the initiative shown by the Re-housing Officer in visiting the evacuation area in order to establish contact with the Re-housing Department of that borough.
- (2) From the British Jaeger Instruments Ltd. expressing admiration at the whole-hearted and unstinted help given by everyone in the Department to the scores of sufferers on the occasion of a major incident within the borough, and also the opinion that it must be a great consolation to the citizens of Hendon to know that the Re-housing organisation so severely tested has been found to be well-nigh perfect.

#### 12.-WARDENS' POSTS-DRINKING WATER:

The Ministry of Home Security has declined to approve expenditure on the provision of drinking water containers at Wardens' posts.

#### 13.—PUBLIC GAS CLEANSING STATIONS:

Satisfactory progress is being made in the construction of public Gas Cleansing Stations to serve the shopping districts of Hendon Central, Burnt Oak, Edgware and Golders Green.

As it has not been found possible to recruit voluntary personnel for the manning of these stations, application has been made to the Middlesex County Council for specific approval of the engagement of a paid staff under the general sanction for the engagement of one male and one female at each station where essential.

#### 14.—RESPIRATOR CENSUS:

During a census of respirators conducted in June, 1941, 121,418 respirators were inspected by personnel of the Wardens' Service.

#### 15.—BRITISH RESTAURANTS:

Negotiations for the use of premises throughout the Borough for use as British Restaurants are being pressed forward.

Work in connection with the preparation of St. John's Church Hall, West Hendon, for the purposes of the "St. John's British Restaurant" is in hand, and it is anticipated that this Restaurant will be opened in approximately six to eight weeks.

Arrangements are being made for the engagement of the staff to operate the Restaurants in conjunction with volunteers supplied by the Women's Voluntary Services.

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## 16.-EMERGENCY FEEDING CENTRES:

Arrangements are in hand to enable 21 static Emergency Feeding Centres to operate within the Borough should this become necessary, and for them to be supplemented by 7 Mobile Units.

If further assistance was required, Queen's Messenger Convoys would be available for service in the Borough.

# 17.—FIRE WATCHING—BUSINESS PREMISES:

The Committee has authorised the institution of proceedings in cases of failure of employees of business firms to carry out fire watching duties allotted to them.

# 18.—HENDON WAY DEPOT—FIRE PROTECTION:

The Committee has accepted the assistance of the Fire Superintendent in placing a reserve Trailer Pump at the above depot, and undertaking to train Civil Defence personnel in its operation to give added protection to the large stock of Council's stores and materials in addition to the Civil Defence Equipment placed at this depot.

## 19.—AIR RAID SHELTERS—STATISTICS:

The following figures obtained as a result of census taken on nights selected by the Regional Commissioners during the months of May, June and July are submitted for information:—

## 20.—AIR RAID SHELTERS—PROGRAMME:

A programme of improvements to existing shelters and construction of new shelters for the Borough has been drawn up by the Regional Technical Advisers in relation to the amount of work which it is estimated can be carried out in the region in a period of six months by a labour force approximating to that reported to be employed now on shelter work. In view of the urgency of the work, the Commissioners hope that the most strenuous efforts will be made to complete the programme in four months.

#### 21.—INDOOR SHELTERS:

The number of indoor shelters allocated to the Borough is 2,500. The number of applications for such shelters received to date totals 2,577, 2,334 thereof being for "free issue" and 243 for "purchase." Delivery of these shelters commenced on the 16th June, 1941, and 1,137 have been delivered to date.

The Ministry of Home Security has laid down that indoor shelters are intended for householders who have no Anderson shelter in usable condition, or other type of suitable shelter within easy access. Some difficulty has been experienced in the allocation of these shelters, which was undertaken at a time when Anderson shelters were still being delivered to the district by the Government, and the scheme for the erection of communal shelters was subject to frequent revision necessitating alterations in the position of communal shelters after decisions in regard to the distribution of indoor shelters had been made.

The Committee has carefully considered, and is satisfied with the action taken in regard to the allocation of shelters to persons referred to by Councillor Rodway at the last meeting of the Council.

#### 22.—CAMOUFLAGING OF BUILDINGS:

The Regional Commissioners state that many local authorities have asked that consideration should be given to the visibility from the air of such land marks as whitened buildings, pends and other features, thought to be conspicuous from the air in their area, and add that treatment of features of this nature is constantly studied by the camouflage officers of the Ministry of Home Security, who work in the closest conjunction with the Air Ministry. Local enquiries may be answered accordingly.

As regards fresh buildings, the Ministry exercises its power to secure the camouflage of new Government factories as they are projected and additional important factories as they come on to the vital list. Air observation is made when necessary so that each scheme is thorough and comprehensive.

# 18.—MILK (SPECIAL DESIGNATIONS) ORDERS, 1936 to 1941. — PURCHASE OF MILK SAMPLING OUTFIT:

asthma.

The Medical Officer of Health has reported that since much of the milk recently supplied to the schools has ceased to be bottled in one-third pint bottles, difficulty has been experienced in maintaining a programme of sampling owing to samples having to be taken from bulk.

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Apparatus used in the taking of samples from bulk must be such as can readily be sterilised before further use, and will allow the taking of several samples in a journey.

A milk sampling outfit which provides for the taking of six samples with six separate sets of sterilised apparatus can be purchased for the sum of £11.

The importance of the purchase of an outfit lies, in addition to school milk, in the probability, due to war conditions, of milk being delivered to householders from bulk.

I have therefore given authority for the purchase of a "Reigate Milk Sampling Outfit" at a cost of  $\mathfrak{L}11$ .

# 19.—HENDON EMERGENCY HOSPITAL—DEPUTY MATRON:

The resignation of Miss Keegan, the Deputy Matron, has been received.

On the recommendation of the Sector Matron, Mrs. Liebert was interviewed by the Chairman of the Public Health and Medical Services Committee, together with the Medical Officer of Health, and I approved her appointment in a temporary capacity as Deputy Matron.

# 20.—NUISANCE CAUSED BY CRICKETS AT HENDON EMERGENCY HOSPITAL:

The Medical Officer of Health has reported that a considerable nuisance is experienced at the Hospital through crickets. # II. WAR-TIME NURSERIES:

# Joint Circular of the Ministry of Health and the Board of Education.

The following extracts from reports of the War-time Nurseries Sub-Committee were submitted:-

25th July, 1941.

# PREMISES:

Consideration was given by the Sub-Committee to the question of suitable premises, and it was decided that as regards the West Hendon District the availability of accommodation at the Hyde School should be explored. The Sub-Committee were informed that certain class rooms at this school were vacant, and that shelter accommodation was available adjacent to the school premises.

RESOLVED—That immediate arrangements be made with the Director of Education to facilitate an early inspection by the Members of the Sub-Committee of available school accommodation in the specified areas.

29th July, 1941.

# HYDE SCHOOL:

Three class rooms and the entrance hall at this school were inspected by the Committee and careful consideration was given as to the adaptability of these class rooms for the purpose of a War-time Nursery. Various items were noted regarding requirements; the question of the supply of gas in the room to be used as the kitchen, which it was pointed out to the Committee would be obtained through an adjacent pipe: also, the Toddlers' Room was the subject of consideration as to reinforcement to provide shelter accommodation.

This, it was suggested, could be effected by wiring the windows, and the erection of "blast walls" outside.

The Committee were informed that a separate entrance could be made for the proposed Nursery, thus segregating the children from the regular school attenders.

The Sub-Committee expressed their entire satisfaction with regard to the premises and generally felt that the class rooms could be readily adapted for use as a Nursery.

The Sub-Committee accordingly-

RESOLVED-That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare the necessary plans, together with an estimate of the cost of converting the class rooms at the Hyde School for the purpose of a War-time Nursery.

19th August, 1941.

#### HYDE SCHOOL:

A very thorough investigation of the available accommodation at the Hyde School was made by Ministry of Health officials on the 11th August and points were raised regarding lavatory accommodation for the staff; provision of a perambulator shed, and finally the Air Raid Shelters were inspected. The class rooms were considered to be suitable for adaptation as a War-time Nursery.

The Sub-Committee approved the minutes of the meetings held on the 25th and 29th July; also the report of the Chairman regarding the inspection carried out by the Ministry's officials as above referred to. The Sub-Committee were informed that the Ministry's decision was awaited, and that the Chairman would be notified immediately this was received.

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The Committee were informed that the advertisement for a Matron for the Addington House Day Nursery had produced 33 replies, and the Chairman stated that he thought there would be no difficulty in selecting applicants for the remaining two proposed Nurseries at the Hyde School and Child's Hill. The Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the appointment of Matron and Staff for the Day Nursery at Addington House and the proposed Nurseries at the Hyde School and Child's Hill be made by the Sub-Committee.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal, provided no further appointments are made until agreement has been reached with the Minister of Health, or any proposed excess expenditure has been approved by the Council.

# IV. DAY NURSERY-ADDINGTON HOUSE:

The Borough Surveyor reported that work on the alterations and additions is proceeding satisfactorily; new drains have been laid; the foundations to additions are in, and brickwork is now in hand.

The question of the erection of a laundry was considered, and a plan was submitted showing the proposed laundry, the building to be added at the rear of the existing garage and adjoining the kitchen. After discussion the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the erection of an additional building at an estimated cost of £105, for the purpose of a laundry, be approved, and authority be given for the purchase of the necessary equipment.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

# V. THE HYDE SCHOOL:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a plan based on the suggestions made by the Architect from the Ministry of Health for the formation of a Day Nursery unit at the south end of the ground floor of this school, for consideration by the Committee. The proposals embrace the occupation of a portion of the Assembly Hall, three class rooms and two small cloakrooms, and will be self-contained.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That authority be given for the submission of the plan to the Ministry of Health, together with Form M.C.W. 100, giving particulars of the estimated expenditure.

(The Finance and General Purposes Committee has duly noted the action to be taken.)

# VI. DAY NURSERY—CHILD'S HILL:

A plan was also submitted by the Borough Surveyor for the erection of a Nursery on the vacant land in Cricklewood Lane opposite All Saints' Institute.

The plan is prepared on the standard design of the Ministry of Health and based on the assumption that the Ministry will provide pre-fabricated slabs to facilitate its construction.

The Committee approved the plan submitted by the Borough Surveyor, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the submission of the plan to the Ministry of Health, together with Form M.C.W. 100, giving particulars of the estimated expenditure.

# 1.—BROADFIELDS AVENUE SCHOOL:

Work on this school has been proceeding steadily though somewhat slowly due in some measure to the very wet weather during August. Brickwork is practically

# 1.—WAR-TIME NURSERIES. JOINT CIRCULAR OF MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND BOARD OF EDUCATION:

The terms of reference of the Sub-Committee appointed by the Public Health and Medical Services Committee under Resolution of the 14th July, 1941, are as follows:—

<sup>&</sup>quot;To formulate comprehensive proposals for the establishment of War-time Nurseries in Hendon."

The Chairman pointed out to the Committee that the provision of War-time Nurseries in Hendon was an instruction to the Council from the Ministry of Health, which had to be carried out in accordance with the terms of the joint circular, and that proposals were to be submitted to the Ministry as early as possible.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that further specific enquiries had been made regarding the number of children to be accommodated in the West Hendon, Colindale, Cricklewood and Child's Hill districts, which was as follows:—

The Committee were informed that these figures would no doubt fluctuate from time to time in the event of more mothers being employed, or on the other hand, leaving employment for various reasons.

# 2.—ACCOMMODATION:

With regard to the question of accommodation, the Medical Officer drew the attention of the Committee to the stipulation contained in the Memorandum accompanying the joint circular, which stated that the nursery accommodation should allow a minimum space of 25 square feet per child. Separate rooms should be provided for babies and toddlers. It is probably not necessary to instal fixed baths for the children, the toddlers can, if necessary, use an adult bath, and portable baths can be used for the babies. Separate lavatory accommodation for toddlers should be provided with suitable sluicing facilities. Provision should be made for washing and boiling the babies' napkins and small articles. Good kitchen and larder facilities and a milk room will be necessary. A room should be allocated for isolation purposes. The memorandum also referred to the question of accommodation being arranged for members of the staff to reside on the premises.

It was also pointed out to the Committee that as quite a number of the children were between the age of four and five years, the question of their attendance at elementary schools and feeding arrangements should be considered.

#### 3.-PREMISES:

Consideration was given to this matter, and it was decided that the Members of the Sub-Committee should visit the areas referred to; view potential premises, and particularly, as regards the West Hendon district, should consider the availability of accommodation at the Hyde School. The Committee were informed that certain class-rooms at this school were vacant, and that shelter accommodation was available adjacent to the school premises.

The question of suitable premises in the Cricklewood and Child's Hill areas was similarly considered, and it was the general opinion of the Committee that, as in the case of the West Hendon and Colindale areas, the availability of school accommodation, also the position as regards other suitable premises, should be explored.

The Committee generally felt, however, that, taking into consideration the number of children to be catered for, and the limited school accommodation available, immediate application should be made to the Ministry of Health, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 16 of the joint circular for two pre-fabricated buts to be supplied to the Council. It was also decided that arrangements be made, for a section of the huts to be reinforced to provide shelter facilities. The Committee accordingly-

- RESOLVED-(il) That application be forthwith made to the Senior Regional Officer of the Ministry of Health requesting the supply of two pre-fabricated huts to the Council under the provision contained in paragraph 16 of Circular 2388;
  - (2) That immediate arrangements be made with the Director of Education to facilitate an early inspection by the members of the Sub-Committee of available school accommodation in the specified areas.

#### 4.-DAY NURSERY-WATLING ESTATE-STAFF:

The Medical Officer stated that he understood possession of Addington House could be obtained on the 5th August, 1941, and that the Borough Surveyor would have the premises ready in approximately six weeks thereafter. The question of the engagement of the necessary staff for the premises would shortly have to be considered. Noted.

29th JULY, 1941.

#### 1.-WAR TIME NURSERIES:

The Sub-Committee, in accordance with their resolution passed at a meeting held on Friday, the 25th July, visited the undermentioned premises:-

#### (a) Hyde School.

Three class rooms and the entrance hall at this school were inspected by the Committee and careful consideration was given as to the adaptability of these class rooms for the purpose of a War-time Nursery. Various items were noted regarding requirements; the question of the supply of gas in the room to be used as a kitchen. which it was pointed out to the Committee would be obtained through an adjacent pipe; also, the Toddlers' Room was the subject of consideration as to reinforcement to provide shelter accommodation.

This, it was suggested, could be effected by wiring the windows and the erection of "blast walls" outside.

The Committee were informed that a separate entrance could be made for the proposed Nursery, thus segregating the children from the regular school attenders.

The Sub-Committee expressed their entire satisfaction with regard to the premises and generally felt that the class rooms could be readily adapted for use as a Nursery.

The Sub-Committee accordingly-

RESOLVED-That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare the necessary plans, together with an estimate of the cost of converting the class rooms at the Hyde School for the purpose of a War-time Nursery.

#### (b) Westcroft Housing Estate, Cricklewood.

The Committee then proceeded to inspect the Recreation Ground at this estate with a view to considering the suitability of the ground as a site for one of the pre-fabricated huts to be supplied by the Ministry of Health under the provisions of Circular 2388, and for which application had already been made for two such huts to be supplied to the Council. The Committee were of opinion that a portion of this Recreation Ground would be eminently suitable as a site for one of the huts and

RESOLVED-That an application be made to the Hampstead Borough Council for permission to utilise a portion of the Recreation Ground at the Westcroft Housing Estate for the purpose of the erection of a hut.

#### (c) Plot of Land at Cricklewood Lane.

The Sub-Committee also inspected a plot of land at Cricklewood Lane (opposite All Saints' School) and were generally of the opinion that this plot of land could be utilised as a site for one of the huts.

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Sab 1, 150 1 160 It was decided that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare a Report with regard to this land, and also-

RESOLVED—That pending the submission of comprehensive proposals to the Ministry of Health regarding the scheme, application be made to the Ministry for the supply of an additional pre-fabricated hut to the Council.

19th AUGUST, 1941.

1.—WAR TIME NURSERIES—HYDE SCHOOL AND PLOT OF LAND AT CRICKLEWOOD LANE:

The Sub-Committee approved the Minutes of the Meetings held on the 25th and 29th July, also the Report of the Chairman regarding the inspection carried out by the Ministry of Health officials on the 11th August. The Committee were informed that the Ministry's decision was awaited, and that the Chairman would be notified immediately this was received.

#### 2,-DAY NURSERY-WATLING ESTATE-STAFF:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted the form of advertisement for the engagement of a Matron for consideration and approval. The question of salary scale was discussed, and it was agreed that this should be at the fixed rate of £200 per annum, together with uniform and meals. The Sub-Committee approved the advertisement for insertion in the "Hendon Times," "Nursing Mirror" and "Nursing Times."

Dr. J. H. Garrow informed the Committee that she had instituted enquiries regarding the expenditure involved in connection with staff salaries, children's upkeep, laundry and other essential items required for the running of a war-time nursery, with a view to the submission of the total cost to the Ministry of Health on the form provided (M.C.W. 100). It was revealed from the various items outlined by Dr. Garrow that the total yearly expenditure incurred in the running of a war-time nursery on the basis of accommodation for 40 children would be approximately £3,500, this cost being based on the maximum rates suggested in the Ministry's Memorandum No. 249-111A, and subject, of course, to approval by the Ministry of Health. The Committee agreed that the required form could be completed on the lines suggested by Dr. Garrow, and forwarded to the Senior Regional Officer.

# 3.—RULES AND REGULATIONS—ENTRANCE OF CHILDREN:

The Medical Officer of Health referred to the question of the formulation of Rules and Regulations governing the entrance of children. It was agreed by the Sub-Committee that this matter could be left over for consideration at a later date.

#### 4.-NEXT MEETING:

Pending the awaited decision of the Ministry of Health, it was agreed that the next meeting of the Sub-Committee be called as and when necessary.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Reports of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

# 5.—WATLING AND DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATION:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted an application which had been received from the Hon. Secretary of the Watling and District Nursing Association asking that the grant made to the Association in respect of midwifery and maternity cases under the Council's Agreement be increased by 20s. per case.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Chairman of the Committee, together with the appropriate Officers, be requested to interview the Hon. Secretary of the Association and report in due course.

# 6.-MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR 2340.-NURSING STAFFS IN HOSPITAL:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that since prior consideration by the Committee (P.H. & M.S.—5/5/41—Item 10) of the above-mentioned circular he had been in communication with the London County Council and neighbouring authorities to ascertain what action had been taken regarding their own hospital staffs, and he submitted for the information of the Committee particulars of the new grades of salaries now being paid by the various authorities, together with the present salary grade of the staff at the Hospital and the new grade for the Civil Nursing Reserve. It was suggested that the following scale of salaries be adopted for the Nursing Staff at the Isolation Hospital with effect from the 1st October, 1941, and that the scale be applied to the existing staff as though it had been in operation at the date when their present period of service with the Council commenced.

# 7.—BUILDING FOR STORAGE AND GARAGE ACCOMMODATION:

The Borough Surveyor submitted for the consideration of the Committee a plan of an additional building to be erected at the Isolation Hospital. The building is required for two purposes:

- (a) To provide storage for the large quantities of vegetables which are now being produced at the Hospital for use during the winter. At the present time there is no suitable storage place at the Hospital for this purpose.
- (b) To provide additional garage accommodation for the ambulances and cars.

When the Hospital was constructed the garage was made large enough to house one ambulance and to provide space for workshop purposes. The Hospital is now equipped with two ambulances, with the result that the workshop space is now occupied as a garage. It is essential to enable the plant at the Hospital to be kept in proper order, for the workshop space to be restored.

It is proposed to erect the building in 4½ in. brickwork with 9 in. piers, with a corrugated asbestos roof. All the necessary materials can be obtained without difficulty at the present time. The estimated cost of erecting this building is £500.

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ether ry of RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the estimate of £500 be approved, and the Borough Surveyor be instructed to proceed with the necessary work.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 8.—PLANT:

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had now completed a survey of the whole of the plant at the Hospital and certain works were necessary to prevent the possibility of breakdowns in the future.

With respect to the domestic hot water and heating plant at the administration block, this is provided by means of calorifiers placed in the basement which are heated with live steam direct from the central boiler house. There is one calorifier for the domestic hot water and one for the heating purposes. These calorifiers require periodical taking down and retubing. Whilst this work is in progress the heating system served by the calorifier must be placed out of action.

Having regard to the importance of the building it was, in his opinion, advisable to provide a third calorifier so arranged that it could be used on either the domestic hot water system or the heating system whilst the original calorifier is being cleaned out.

The Borough Surveyor stated that he had been in communication with Messrs, Z. D. Berry & Sons regarding the provision and fixing of a calorifier for this purpose and they had submitted an estimate amounting to £205 for the work in question.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the quotation of Messrs. Z. D. Berry & Sons amounting to £205 be accepted and authority given for the necessary work to be undertaken.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 9.—CENTRAL BOILER PLANT AND LAUNDRY:

The main water supply to the Hospital is of a very hard type and is adversely affecting the main boiler plant. The water softening plant installed originally when the Hospital was built has been out of commission for some years and is not now in working order. It would be not only difficult but very expensive to obtain the necessary chemicals to operate this plant.

The Borough Surveyor stated that in his opinion a supply of softened water both for the boilers and for laundry use is essential and suggested that an electrical water conditioning plant should be installed, similar to that which the Corporation is putting in at the Refuse Disposal Works. The plant is made by the O.C.P. Water Conditioning Company at Romac Works, The Hyde, Hendon, and the cost of providing and installing a unit capable of handling a varying load from 1,400 to 2,200 gallons per hour with all necessary controls, would amount to £148 10s.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the installation of an electrical water conditioning plant be approved at an estimated cost of £148 10s.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 10.—ADDITIONS TO ADMINISTRATION BLOCK:

The Borough Surveyor asked for the authority of the Committee to accept the tender of Messrs. John Frederick Ltd., of Watford Way, Hendon, amounting to £38 18s. for the black-out curtains required to this building.

He also reported that the addition to the administrative block is now practically completed. The only work remaining to be done is the erection of the folding doors, which the sub-contractors state will be put in hand next week.

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tically doors, RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the tender of Messrs. John Frederick Ltd. amounting to £38 18s. for the provision of black-out curtains be accepted.

# 11.-ROTA OF VISITORS:

The following report was submitted in regard to the visit to the Hospital on Monday, the 1st September (P.H. & M.S., 14/7/41—1tem 10):—

"We inspected the grounds and all hospital buildings and found everything proceeding in a satisfactory and efficient manner.

We were particularly impressed with the highly satisfactory condition of the grounds and kitchen garden and desire to place on record our appreciation of the efforts of the gardening staff.

In view of the large amount of vegetable produce which is being raised, the provision of adequate storage space is a matter of urgency, and we urge that the erection of the proposed garage-cum-store be commenced immediately. Furthermore, having interviewed the gardening staff, we are convinced that additional greenhouse space is urgently needed and ought to be proceeded with immediately.

The rota are also of opinion that, in view of the highly satisfactory results from the land now under cultivation, steps should be taken to bring the remaining land at the Hospital into productive use.

In inspecting the ward buildings, it was noted that the exterior paintwork was in a very bad condition in certain instances, and we recommend that the following renovations be undertaken:—

Block 2: External repainting.

Block 3: External repainting.

Fire Hose Box (attached to laundry building): Repainting.

Mattress Store (Block 4): External repainting.

# 12.-WAR DAMAGE:

The Medical Officer of Health reported with regard to the damage sustained by the hospital a year ago as a result of enemy action. The portions damaged were Block 1 and Block 4 (Cubicle Block). The former has been successfully temporarily repaired and its total capacity for the reception of patients has only been reduced by four. Block 4, the Cubicle Block, suffered much more serious damage and as a result it is now only possible to use six cubicles. The block previously consisted of 16 cubicles.

It will be appreciated that the provision of a sufficient number of cubicles at any time greatly enhances the value of an Isolation Hospital. Admission is frequently sought for many conditions which cannot be isolated in the main wards, and, moreover, conditions develop in these wards necessitating separate isolation. The usefulness of the hospital as an isolation unit, particularly in view of the curtailment of beds for that purpose, would be materially increased by the provision of further cubicle accommodation.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Chairman of the Committee, together with the appropriate Officers, be requested to interview the Ministry of Health on the matter.

This open space was subsequently acquired by the London Passenger Transport Board under compulsory powers. One of the conditions of the agreement was that a strip of land should be laid out alongside this road from Station Road to the public convenience and that such strip of land should be kept as a shrubbery. The London Passenger Transport Board have since requested an amendment to this agreement to enable them to use the land at the junction of Station Road and the new road for business premises and to bring such business premises right up to the boundary of the road, thus eliminating the shrubbery.

The Board have submitted plans showing the character of the buildings it is proposed to erect. The proposed building consists of three lock-up shops on the ground floor, billiards room to accommodate 14 tables on the first floor and six flats on the third floor.

The air space adjacent to the buildings, and the secondary means of access to the lockup shops are inadequate. Access to the billiards hall and flats is by a single staircase at the rear of the building.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the London Passenger Transport Board be informed that the Council is unable to approve an amendment to the agreement to facilitate the erection of the proposed building.

### ESTATES, PARKS AND ALLOTMENTS.

(Councillor C. F. Windust-Chairman.)

### 1.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £183 9s. 6d. were submitted and approved.

### CULTIVATION OF LANDS ORDERS, 1939.

### 2.—LAND—MILL HILL GOLF CLUB:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a copy of Order No. 799 from the County War Agricultural Executive Committee served upon the Mill Hill Golf Club, requiring 30.599 acres of land to be ploughed, prepared and sown to an approved crop. (All greens, tees and bunkers are excluded from the provisions of the Order.) Noted.

### 3.—COPTHALL PLAYING FIELDS—ORDERS Nos. 651 and 755:

It was reported that these Orders required the cleansing of ditches and brushing of hedges on land forming part of the above playing fields. The Borough Surveyor is endeavouring to obtain prices for carrying out the work prescribed by these Orders.

### 4.—SCRATCHWOOD OPEN SPACE—ORDERS Nos. 767 and 774:

The Borough Surveyor reported that he was endeavouring to obtain prices for the cleansing of ditches and trimming of hedges on six fields comprising part of the above Open Space in compliance with Order No. 767.

Order No. 774 served on the Council requires a considerable amount of work to be carried out to approximately 32 acres of land forming part of the Seratchwood Open Space, to enable the area to be used as pasture land. The land, which is in a very rough condition, is let at a nominal rental of \$5 per annum to Mr. Noad, of Bury Farm,

Edgware, and it is understood that it is not possible to earry out the work at less than £10 per acre. The estimated cost of complying with the Order, including the provision of the necessary materials, is £368, which would appear to be unreasonable having regard to the area of land involved.

In these circumstances the Borough Surveyor is communicating with the County War Agricultural Executive Committee asking for either a revision of the Order or some assistance in carrying out its provisions. **Noted.** 

### 5.—"FORDSON" AGRICULTURAL TRACTOR:

The Borough Surveyor reported that in connection with the agricultural operations which are now being undertaken by the Council, difficulties are steadily increasing in respect of the supply of labour and transport. It is anticipated that further Orders will be made by the Middlesex County Council and, in any event, the land already under cultivation will have to be continued. Up to the present time the necessary tractors for this purpose have been hired. It is therefore suggested that the Council should purchase a "Fordson" agricultural tractor, which would not only be of great assistance in carrying out land cultivation, but would also be of use in general parks maintenance after the war. A quotation has been obtained from the Ford Motor Company for a tractor equipped with pneumatic tyres, amounting to £206 nett.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council purchase a "Fordson" tractor at a cost of £206 nett.

### 6.—STURGESS AVENUE PLAYING FIELD:

A letter was submitted from the Hendon and District Trades Council on behalf of the residents of Park Ward, complaining that the continued use of this field as an A.R.P. dump deprives the children of this playing ground, as well as acting to the detriment of the health and development of the future generation of Hendon.

### 19.—SALVAGE DRIVE:

In connection with the Salvage Drive in the London Region, the Controller of Salvage, in view of the expenditure to be incurred on printing and advertising, has asked the Council to increase the levy payment to the common fund from £48 to £60 (being 10s. per 1,000 population, based upon a population of 120,000).

The Special (Salvage) Executive Committee has duly considered the application and recommends that the additional levy payment of £12 be paid.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the additional levy payment of £12, making a total of £60, be paid into the common fund.

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### 20.—ASSISTANT CLEANSING SUPERINTENDENT:

The Borough Surveyor reported that Mr. L. Boylett, the Assistant Cleansing Super-intendent, had been called up for military service. Having regard to the importance of the work of salvage refuse, it is necessary to reorganise the existing control of these services and to make provision for further assistance to the Cleansing Superintendent in earrying out this work.

It was therefore suggested that the following arrangements be put into operation in order to deal with the work of collection and salvage during the period of the war.

### Assistant Cleansing Superintendent:

It is suggested that the Salvage Officer, Mr. A. F. Staite, be appointed as from the 1st September, 1941, Assistant Cleansing Superintendent and Salvage Officer for the duration of the war at a salary of £400 per annum.

### Disposal Works:

The amount of refuse now being burnt at the Disposal Works is very much smaller than in pre-war time owing to the increasing amount of materials which are salvaged. It is desirable that Mr. Hamlett, Superintendent in charge of the Disposal Works, should also be in charge of the actual operations of separating and sorting the salvaged materials, and it is therefore suggested that this work should form part of his duties for the period of the war.

The foregoing arrangements will enable the Cleansing Superintendent (Mr. Counter) to devote more time to the general co-ordination of the different branches of the service and to give his personal attention to the important work of the sale of the materials after they have been sorted.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the arrangements outlined above be approved.

### NATIONAL FIRE SERVICE.

### 21.—FIRE SERVICE (GENERAL) REGULATIONS, 1941—APPOINTED DAY:

It was reported that the appointed day referred to in the above regulations was fixed as from midnight of the 17th/18th August, 1941, when the maintenance and adminstration of the Fire Services was transferred from Local Authorities to the Fire Services Department of the Home Office. **Noted.** 

### 22.—RE-ORGANISATION OF FIRE SERVICES:

The Committee considered a Memorandum by the Borough Treasurer relative to the financial arrangements in connection with the transfer of the Council's Fire Brigade to the Home Office in accordance with the Fire Services (Emergency Provision) Act. 1941.

Under the provisions of the Act, the Secretary of State takes over the fire services only. Accordingly the Exchequer will not assume responsibility under these arrangements for expenditure (a) in connection with fire prevention duties under the Fire Prevention (Business Premises) Order, 1941; (b) incurred under Civil Defence Duties Compulsory Enrolment Order, 1941; (c) in connection with inspection and other work under the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act, 1928; (d) incurred in providing an ambulance service; (e) in the inspection and licensing of buildings, or incurred in connection with any other service outside that involved in providing a fire service.

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It is, however, pointed out that where certain duties under (c) and (e) have normally been carried out by personnel of the Regular Fire Brigade, it may be considered advisable for the fire personnel to continue to assist in so far as the duties relate to the inspection of fire risks.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be appointed the Officer responsible for the various duties of the Council under the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act, 1928, Section 34 of the Factories Act, 1937, and also for the issue of Fire Appliances Certificates in connection with the licensing of premises for public entertainment; and that the Fire Brigade personnel continue to assist in so far as the duties relate to the inspection of fire risks in connection therewith.

### 23.—OBSERVATION POST—CENTRAL FIRE STATION:

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had been requested by the Fire Brigade authorities to prepare a plan and estimate of the cost of the provision of an observation post on the top of the tower of the Central Fire Station. The lowest quotation obtained for the work is that of E. S. Moss, Ltd., amounting to £62 10s., and authority is required to put the work in hand.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, subject to the London Region Fire Authority undertaking to reimburse the Council's costs in the matter, the tender of E. S. Moss, Ltd., amounting to £62 10s., be accepted and authority given for the necessary work to be undertaken.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes

Committee concur in the proposal.]

### 24.—"FENELLA," THE BURROUGHS, HENDON:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade calling attention to the condition of the wooden balcony in front of the above premises, which requires substantially repairing. In view of the property being taken over by the London Region Fire Authority, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the necessary work to be carried out, subject to the reimbursement of the Council's costs by the London Region Fire Authority.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes
Committee concur in the proposal.]

### 25.—SUPPLEMENTARY WATER SUPPLIES:

It was reported that London Region Circular No. 443 sets out standards of static water requirements in classified areas within the London Civil Defence Region. Hendon is graded as a Class II. area, and a conference between officers of the Home Office, London Civil Defence Region, and this authority has discussed the position in relation to this district.

The Regional Works Adviser has now requested the following works be put in hand immediately. Expenditure in excess of £1000 is not to be incurred until the estimate has been sanctioned.

- 1. Fix a removable dam in Deans Brook near Penshurst Gardens.
- Construction of basin (150,000 to 250,000 gallons capacity) near the Montrose Playing Fields, or alternatively to provide a permanent dam in the Silk Stream of sufficient height to raise the water level at the dam about two feet.
- 3. Form a sump in the Burroughs Pond to enable suction hose to be used.
- Fix a removable dam in the River Brent about half a mile above Welsh Harp Reservoir.

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- 5. Erection of three 24 feet diameter steel tanks on site of bomb crater on Willifield Green.
- 6. Provision of 20,000 gallon steel dam by side of stream near allotments at British Museum Depository.
- 7. Lay a 6 in. main from the Welsh Harp to the High Fire Risk area in Cricklewood.

The Works Adviser has asked the Borough Engineer to carry out the works in Items 1-4. The steel dam and 6 in, main will be supplied through the Ministry of Works and Buildings.

With regard to the pond on the Moat Mount Golf Course, it has been suggested by the Regional Works Adviser that the Fire Department be provided with a key for the sluice gate, and that the water level in this reservoir should not be reduced below a level to be fixed by the Chief Officer, without his approval.

The whole of the costs involved are subject to reimbursement in full.

RESOLVED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to proceed with the necessary works in accordance with the directions of the Regional Works Adviser.

# SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FOOD CONTROL COMMITTEE FOR THE BOROUGH OF HENDON.

(Period covered 3rd September, 1940, to 2nd September, 1941).

 The Food Control Committee is appointed by the Town Council and is composed of 15 members grouped as follows:—

> General representatives, 9. Trades Union representative, 1. Retail Trades representatives, 5.

The Food Defence Orders require that two members (at least) shall be women; that of the Retail Trades representatives one shall be a grocer, another a butcher, another an officer of a retail co-operative society and that the two remaining traders shall represent other retail trades.

- 2. The Committee was duly appointed by the Town Council and the appointment was duty recorded by the Ministry of Food.
- 3. Chairman and Vice-Chairman.—At a meeting held 12th September, 1940, Alderman Egan, J.P., was appointed Chairman and Councillor Hirschfield was appointed Vice-Chairman.

Alderman Egan having resigned the Chairmanship, Councillor Hirschfield was appointed Chairman and Councillor Bate Vice-Chairman on the 7th November, 1940.

- 4. Change in Membership.—Alderman Egan having died 6th April, 1941, Alderman Rice was appointed in his place as a Consumers' Representative, by the Town Council on the 28th April, 1941.
- 5. Attendances. [A summary of meetings and attendances was duly submitted.]
- 6. Enforcement Orders and Prosecutions.—During the year proceedings were ordered in 40 cases; 10 of these are awaiting hearing by the Courts. Of the 30 cases disposed of, 28 resulted in convictions. One case was dismissed and one case was dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act. Fines and costs amounted to £302 2s. In many cases warning letters have been sent.
- 7. Circulars and Orders.—Numerous circulars and instructions have been received and dealt with.
- Food Queues.—This question has received attention and representations have been made to the Minister of Food.
- 9. Branch Offices.—The Minister of Food has given provisional approval to the establishment in the Borough of three Branch Offices. The actual sites are yet to be settled in consultation with the Ministry of Works and Buildings.
- 10. Finance and Staffing.—The provision of all finance and the determination of staffing arrangements is entirely in the hands of the Minister of Food. The cost of Food Control does not fall on local rates.
- 11. Statistics.—Periodic statistical information has been submitted to the Committee. The Minister of Food deprecates publication of figures which are considered to be of a confidential nature. Population or other figures having a bearing on movements of the community have been purposely omitted from this report.

56 applicants are not yet accommodated.

### 3.—ORCHARD DRIVE, EDGWARE:

The Committee has duly noted a report that application had been made to the Harrow Urban District Council to accommodate applicants for plots in Edgware on the site of the Edgware Golf Links, but the Harrow Council do not accept applications from persons resident outside their area. It is therefore proposed to utilise a further area of Stone Grove Park for allotments.

### 4.—DEANS PARADE—FENCING:

It has been reported that the allottees had completed the work of erecting fencing at the above plots to the satisfaction of the Borough Surveyor. The payment of £5 to the allottees towards the cost of the work has been made in accordance with the Committee's instructions.

The Committee has approved the action taken.

### 5.—CAMDEN PLAYING FIELDS:

The Committee has duly noted a report that negotiations are proceeding satisfactorily with the London County Council and the Camden School Authorities, and it is anticipated that the land would shortly be available for cultivation.

### 6.—CLITTERHOUSE PLAYING FIELDS:

It has been reported that the existing plots on this site have now been let and it is necessary to provide more plots on this field. The Committee has approved a suggestion that application be made to utilise part or the whole of the ten acres which had been ploughed and planted under Order No. 406, served by the War Agricultural Executive Committee last spring.

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### 7.—NEW LANDS—AUTUMN CAMPAIGN:

The Borough Treasurer has reported that, in conjunction with the Borough Surveyor, an effort had been made to find additional land in readiness for the Autumn campaign, and that after inspection the following sites might be considered:—

Wesley Central Hall, Watling Avenue, Burnt Oak. Cambrian Tennis Club, Hocroft Road, Cricklewood.

The Committee has duly noted the matter.

### 8.—WATER SUPPLIES:

The Borough Surveyor has submitted plans and estimates for the provision of water supplies to the allotments on a scale similar to that provided on pre-war allotments.

A letter from the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries has also been submitted pointing out that for the present the Ministry could not see its way to release additional steel for water supply purposes. Every endeavour has been made to obtain material but without success. The Committee has requested the Borough Treasurer to submit a report on the financial position with regard to war-time allotments, and in the meantime to inform the allottees of the position.

### 9.—ADDITIONAL ALLOTMENTS:

The Borough Surveyor has reported that three additional plots had been set out on land on the west side of Tenterden Gardens.

### 10.—STONEGROVE PARK:

The Borough Surveyor has submitted a plan of additional allotments in this park, and reported that such plan had been approved by Group II. Committee (Estates, Parks and Allotments). The Committee has **noted** the matter.

### 11.-EDGEWORTH CLOSE:

A letter has been duly noted from Mr. A. E. Andrew, of Bertram Road, Hendon, stating that all the allottees on this site were willing to pay the usual water charges for the supply to these allotments.



# REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENCE COMMITTEE to the Meeting of the

# HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

29th September, 1941.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Hendon,

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I submit a Report on various matters which have been dealt with by the Civil Defence Committee at its Meetings held on the 27th and 29th August, 1941, and the 10th and 24th September, 1941.

#### 1.-AWARDS:

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The Committee learned with extreme satisfaction that acts of gallantry and of marked devotion to duty by members of the Borough's Civil Defence Services have been officially recognised by the following Awards:—

Mr. E. G. Jared ..... George Medal.

(Assistant Officer in charge Rescue Service)

Mr. I. Tunley ..... British Empire Medal.

(Deputy Leader, Rescue Party No. 2)

Mr. T. Harding ..... .....

(Scaffolder, Rescue Party No. 7) ..... British Empire Medal.

#### 2.—NATIONAL FEDERATION OF BUILDING TRADES' OPERATIVES:

At its last meeting, the Committee received a Deputation of the Hendon/Edgware Branch of the National Federation of Building Trades' Operatives.

Matters concerning the employment of Rescue Service personnel on First Aid repairs, the use of direct labour on shelter construction, the shelter policy generally and the erection of blast walls at Wardens' Posts by members of the Wardens' Organisation were raised and will receive careful consideration by the Committee.

#### 3.—CHIEF WARDEN:

The Committee has appointed Mr. H. E. Swabey, Deputy Chief Warden, as Chief Warden with effect from 29th August, 1941.

#### 4.—DEPUTY MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH:

Having regard to the duties of Dr. J. Livingston as Assistant Controller and Head of the Casualty Services, the Committee has directed the Controller to make representations for the deferment of his calling-up for Service with H.M. Forces.

#### 5.—ASSISTANT A.R.P. OFFICER:

In accordance with an approval received from the Middlesex County Council, the salary of Mr. A. Smith, Assistant A.R.P. Officer, has been increased from £320 to £400 per annum with effect from 1st September, 1941.

#### 6.—STAFF OFFICERS:

Application has been made to Middlesex County Council for the grading of the salaries of Staff Officers to the Casualty Rescue and Wardens' Services at £400 per annum, rising by annual increments of £20 to £440 per annum.

#### 7.—SHELTER SUPERVISOR:

Mr. W. Lloyd-Taylor having joined H.M. Forces, Mr. J. O. Workman has been appointed as Staff Officer to the Chief Warden in charge of public shelters at a salary of £250 per annum with effect from 11th August, 1941.

#### 8.—CASUALTY CHAPLAIN:

The Rev. Norman R. Boyd (Rural Dean of Hendon) has consented to receive details of all air raid casualties in the Borough and to arrange for the distribution of the necessary information, via the Parish Priests of the affected areas, to the local Clergy and Ministers.

#### 9.—CIVIL DEFENCE GENERAL SERVICES:

The following directions have been received from the Minister of Home Security:-

(a) Nomenclature of Services.—The Civil Defence Services as a whole will, in future, be designated the "Civil Defence General Services" and the various sections thereof referred to as under in all future notices and communications:—

Civil Defence Wardens' Service.

Civil Defence Ambulance Service (including sitting case cars).

Civil Defence First Aid Post Service (including First Aid Points and Public Cleansing Centres and Mobile Cleansing Units).

Civil Defence First Aid Party Service (in London, Stretcher Party Service).

Civil Defence Rescue Service.

Civil Defence Decontamination Service.

Civil Defence Report and Control Service.

Civil Defence Messenger Service.

Civil Defence Gas Identification Service.

(b) Service Badge and Markings.—The present A.R.P. woven badge worn on the left breast of uniforms will be superseded by a new device in gold colour consisting of the letters "CD" surmounted by a crown. This will be supplied as production changes can be introduced, on all new uniforms other than greatcoats. (No breast badge will be worn on greatcoats).

The name of the Borough will be incorporated in these badges. Service markings such as "Warden," "Rescue," "First Aid Posts," etc., to be worn on the shoulder will be introduced. A schedule of badges of rank has also been adopted by the Ministry of Home Security.

#### 10.—CIVIL DEFENCE DUTIES (COMPULSORY ENROLMENT) ORDER, 1941:

The application of the Civil Defence Duties (Compulsory Enrolments) Order, 1941, has been extended to the whole of the London Region and registration in connection with the Order was carried out on the 14th, 20th and 21st September, 1941. Arrangements were made for Registration Centres to be opened at John Groom's Crippleage, Edgware; Wesleyan Central Hall, Watling Avenue; Baptist Church Hall, Wilberforce Road; Frith Manor Council School; St. Michael's Church Hall, Golders Green, and All Saints' Hall, Cricklewood Lane. The staff of the local Ministry of Labour Employment Exchange was responsible for the registration, supplemented by 33 clerks and six ushers supplied by the local Wardens' Service. An official of the A.R.P. Department or the Wardens' Service attended each centre to deal with enquiries relating to exemption from enrolment.

#### 11,—CIVIL DEFENCE (EMPLOYMENT AND OFFENCES) ORDER:

A further Order has been made requiring persons in continuous whole-time paid employment at Control or Report Centres to continue in that employment until their services are dispensed with.

#### 12.-GRADED PAY FOR RANK:

The Committee's proposals in connection with the application of the scheme prepared by the Ministry of Home Security for additional pay to certain intermediate ranks in the Civil Defence Services (referred to in item 3 of the last Report) has been considered by the Regional Commissioners and approvals granted as under:—

(a) Control Centre.—Approval granted to the payment of six female Message Room Supervisors at £2 14s, per week with effect from 1st June, 1941.

#### (b) Wardens' Service.-

- (i) Chief Warden.—The rate previously approved (i.e., £3 15s. per week) may be paid to the Chief Warden provided he is a whole-time member of the Wardens' Service and holds no other paid Civil Defence appointment.
- (ii) Deputy Chief Warden.—The general question of the Deputy Chief Warden being eligible for an increased rate of pay is under consideration by the County Council.
- (iii) District and Deputy District Warden.—The rate of £3 15s, per week in the case of men and £2 10s, 6d, per week in the case of women is approved for a District Warden or Deputy District Warden where he or she is a whole-time paid member of the Wardens' Service, up to the number of Districts (i.e., 13). The appointment of both a paid District Warden and a paid Deputy District Warden in the same District is not permitted.
- (iv) Post Wardens and Deputy Post Wardens.—The payment of 94 Post Wardens at £3 15s, per week in the case of men and £2 10s, 6d, per week in the case of women, and of 94 Deputy Post Wardens at £3 12s, 6d, per week in the case of men and £2 9s, per week in the case of women has been approved with effect from 1st June, 1941, where the holders of the appointments are whole-time paid personnel.
- (c) Casualty Services.—Approvals granted to the following appointments:—
  - (i) Four Supervisors (two at John Groom's Crippleage Depot and two at Hendon County School Depot) at £3 17s, 6d. per week.
  - (ii) Sixty-two Party Leaders (various depots) at £3 12s. 6d. per week.
  - (iii) One additional Supervisor at Mill Hill Depot at £3 17s. 6d. per week and one additional Supervisor at Hendon Way Depot at £4 per week.
  - (iv) The appointment of shift leaders at John Groom's Crippleage, Mill Hill, Hendon County School and Clitterhouse Depots in one of the following three ways:—
    - (1) for Depot with male personnel, two male Shift Leaders at £3 15s. per week, one for each shift;
    - (2) for Depot with female personnel, three female Shift Leaders at £2 10s. 6d. per week, one for each shift;
    - (3) for Depots with mixed personnel, either (1) or (2) or one male Shift Leader at £3 15s. per week and two female Shift Leaders at £2 10s. 6d. per week.

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# 13.—CALLING UP OF CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL:

Under the present arrangements, the period of deferment of approximately 20% of the Stretcher Parties and 50% of the drivers of Ambulances and Sitting Wounded Cars will expire at the end of this month. The appropriate Authorities have been urged to "stagger" the calling-up of such personnel to enable the efficiency of the Service to be maintained during the recruitment and training of further personnel.

The deferment of the calling-up of whole-time Wardens over 35 years of age and whole-time District, Deputy District and Post Wardens over 30 years of age at the date of registration has been extended for an indefinite period. It is anticipated, however, that approximately 20% of the paid personnel will have to be released for military service after the close of this month.

Approximately 18% of the personnel of the Rescue Service are under the age of 35 years. Men in this Service under 30 years of age are reserved until the 30th of this month and men over 30 years of age are at the moment covered by the schedule of reserved occupations. An intimation has been received, however, that it is probable that after the end of this month numbers of men up to the age of 35 will be called up for service with H.M. Forces, but, in accordance with instructions, application has been made for the continued deferment of the calling-up of all men under the age of 35 years.

The calling up of men in the Decontamination Service who had reached the age of 35 years at the time of registration has now been extended to the 15th December, 1941.

#### 14.—CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTORS:

In reference to the policy to be followed in connection with the enrolment of Conscientious Objectors who volunteer to become members of the Civil Defence Services, the Minister of Home Security states that this is a matter which he has, in the past, been content to leave to the discretion of individual Local Authorities. Although the position of persons of military age who have a conscientious objection to Military Service was recognised by the passing of the National Service (Armed Forces) Act, 1939, on the outbreak of war, in some cases Authorities have nevertheless hesitated to accept conscientious objectors as members of their Civil Defence Services. The passage into law of the National Service Act, 1941, and the discussions which took place in Parliament during its passage have, in the Minister's view, modified the position materially and it would be in accordance with the policy of the Government that Authorities should not, in future, refuse to accept as Volunteers for Civil Defence, persons who hitherto by reason merely of their conscientious objection to Military Service have been regarded by them as unsuitable candidates.

#### 15.—SALVAGE DRIVE:

The Committee approved a request that personnel of the Rescue Service should assist in the work of erecting and fixing banners and hoardings in connection with the Salvage Drive being conducted in the Borough.

#### 16.—HOMELESS PERSONS—ADMINISTRATIVE CENTRE:

The Committee has reviewed the arrangements for dealing with persons rendered homeless as the result of enemy action and considered a suggestion put forward by the Regional Commissioners that sufficient provision should be made for the result of a heavy raid.

The existing arrangements at the Town Hall, whilst reasonably satisfactory so far, might not prove adequate in the event of heavy enemy attack and the extension of the services within the Town Hall building would be extremely difficult.

The Committee has accordingly approved in principle the establishment of an Administrative Centre in the Wesleyan Sunday School premises apposite to the Town Hall, in which rooms will be allocated for the accommodation of the staff of all Departments engaged on duties connected with the assistance of homeless persons. The proposal and estimates of expenditure have been submitted to the Senior Regional Officer for approval.

#### 17.—RE-HOUSING DEPARTMENT—TRANSPORT:

The purchase of a car for the purposes of the Rehousing Department has been authorised.

#### 18.-FIRE GUARD ORGANISATION:

A scheme for the Fire Organisation in the Borough, based on the directions contained in Home Security Circulars 174 and 176 of 1941 and London Region Circular No. 444, has been approved for submission to the Regional Commissioners.

The creation of new posts to enable the Authorities to ensure adequate supervision, organisation, administration and training of part-time Fire Guards is authorised and, in accordance therewith, application was made for the appointment of the following administrative staff:—

- (a) A Fire Guard Officer to the Chief Warden at a salary of £400 per annum.
- (b) A Fire Guard Assistant Staff Officer at a salary of £300 per annum.
- (c) An Equipment Officer at a salary of £4 5s. per week.
- (d) A Records Clerk at a salary of £4 5s.per week.
- (e) A Shorthand-typist at a salary according to the Council's scale.

The Regional Commissioners have approved appointments (e) and (d) at the salaries stated and the appointments have been made. The Commissioners, however, consider £300 per annum and £275 per annum to be appropriate salaries for the Fire Guard Staff Officer and the Assistant Staff Officer. Further representations are being made to the Regional Commissioners for the recognition of salaries at the rates included in the Committee's original proposals.

The appointment of Head Fire Guards, Senior Fire Guards and respective Deputies is also authorised by the Ministry of Home Security. Consideration of these appointments, however, has been deferred pending the receipt of information as to the number of Fire Guards resulting from the registration which was carried out on the 14th, 20th and 21st September, 1941, under the Civil Defence Duties (Compulsory Enrolment) Order, 1941.

Consequent upon the appointment of the Administrative Staff referred to above, an increase in office accommodation is necessary and consideration is to be given to the erection of a building at the rear of "Ravensfield" for this purpose.

#### 19.—FIRE PREVENTION (BUSINESS PREMISES) ORDER, 1941:

In accordance with Article 2(4) of the Fire Prevention (Business Premises) Order, 1941, details of the fire prevention arrangements at the Corporation's premises have been submitted to the Regional Commissioners for approval and such approval received in respect of the arrangements made in connection with the following premises:—

#### 20.—FIRE WATCHING—TOWN HALL AND ADJOINING PREMISES:

The Committee has reviewed the arrangements made in connection with the scheme for Fire Watching at the Town Hall, Central Library, and Ravensfield House.

Exemption by reason of Civil Defence duties, Home Guard, age restriction, hardship, etc., has been granted to 85 of the total male staff of 189 employed in these buildings. Seventeen members of the Home Guard entitled to exemption have, nevertheless, volunteered for duty and have been included in the rota on the understanding that the Home Guard have the first call on their services. A further 10 members of the staff entitled to exemption on other grounds are also participating in the scheme voluntarily.

The training of the parties has been carried out by Mr. R. Cook, of the National Fire Services.

#### 21.—BRITISH RESTAURANTS:

- (a) Hendon Food Control Committee.—The following resolution was passed by the Hendon Food Control Committee at its meeting on the 11th September, 1941, and has been considered:—
  - "That the Hendon Food Control Committee strongly urge the Hendon Corporation to hasten the opening of British restaurants in the Borough as it is the considered opinion of the Food Control Committee that the provision of such restaurants helps towards the solution of many problems arising out of Food Rationing and restricted supplies of fuel and other commodities. Further, the Hendon Food Control Committee desires strongly to represent to the Corporation that one or more representatives from the Food Control Committee should be appointed to the appropriate Council Committee dealing with the provision of restaurants and feeding organisation generally."

The Committee has indicated that it will be happy to receive members of the Hendon Food Control Committee on any matter it is desired to raise.

(b) Prices for Meals.—The following scale of charges for meals served at British Restaurants in Hendon has been approved:—

- (c) Sites.—Negotiations are proceeding for the acquisition of premises in various parts of the district for the establishment of further British Restaurants and for the acquisition of Nissen huts for erection in areas where no accommodation suitable for adaptation is to be found.
- (d) St. John's British Restaurant.

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(i) Progress.—An estimate of the total cost of works, equipment, etc., but excluding equipment drawn from the Ministry of Food "pool" amounting to £1.699, has been forwarded to the Ministry of Food for approval.

The decorations, electrical installations and general repairs have been completed, the installation of the various services is nearing completion and it is anticipated that the furniture and balance of equipment will be delivered at an early date.

(ii) Opening.—The date for opening this Restaurant has been fixed provisionally for October 11th.

A request was submitted that Her Majesty, the Queen, should perform the ceremony of opening. In reply, the Private Secretary to the Queen stated that Her Majesty had learned with interest that this, the first British Restaurant in the Borough, was to be opened, but was unable to accede to the invitation. The Secretary, nevertheless, requested that he should be advised when the restaurant was in running order so that the matter may be laid before the Queen in case Her Majesty's engagements should allow her to pay a visit to the restaurant.

His Worship the Mayor has been requested to perform the opening eeremony and invitations to attend the ceremony will be sent to members of the Council and to representatives from neighbouring boroughs.

# 22.—MILL HILL REPORT CENTRE:

The Middlesex County Council has approved an expenditure of £27 on the installation of a further ventilating plant at the Mill Hill Report Centre for use when the protective shutters are in position.

#### 23.—FIRST AID POSTS—PROTECTION:

In accordance with the directions of the Ministry of Health, the provision of lateral and overhead protection at the First Aid Posts established at the Health Centres at the Town Hall, West Hendon and Mill Hill is to be put in hand.

#### 24.—DEPOTS—PROTECTED SLEEPING ACCOMMODATION:

Revised plans and estimates for the provision of protected sleeping accommodation to cover the whole of the personnel stationed at the Mill Hill and Hendon Way Depots have been approved by the Middlesex County Council and tenders are being obtained for the work. Plans and estimates for the provision of further protected sleeping accommodation at the Hendon County School, Clitterhouse Farm and John Groom's Crippleage Depots have also been submitted for the approval of the Middlesex County Council.

Authority has been given for the temporary use of the premises at the Mill Hill Swimming Pool for sleeping accommodation to relieve the present congestion in the Mill Hill Depot building.

#### 25.—DEPOT EQUIPMENT:

The Middlesex County Council has approved an expenditure of £232 17s. 3d. on the provision of lockers for the use of personnel at the various Depots, subject to the further approval of the Regional Commissioners.

#### 26.—DECONTAMINATION SERVICE—TRANSPORT:

The Committee is continuing to urge the Middlesex County Council to give immediate consideration to the question of transport for the Decontamination Service, with a view to authority being given for the acquisition of vehicles to be held primarily at the disposal of this Service.

The County Civil Defence Committee states it has been seriously concerned with the inadequacy of the transport of this Service throughout the Group and has repeatedly drawn the attention of the Regional Commissioners to this aspect of the Service. It is understood that this matter is to be further discussed with the Commissioners at an early date.

#### 27.—WARDENS' POST—LAVATORY ACCOMMODATION:

The Committee has received the approval of the Middlesex County Council to the construction of lavatory facilities at a further 23 of the Wardens' Posts, making 72 in all.

#### 28.—PROTECTED ACCOMMODATION AT REST CENTRES:

Work in connection with the provision of protected sleeping accommodation at ten of the Rest Centres has been completed and similar work on a further Centre is still in hand.

An estimate amounting to £4,500 has also been submitted to the Middlesex County Council in connection with the improvement of existing Rest Centres by the provision of adequate washing accommodation, including shower baths equipped with hot water supply.

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County provision of water The Middlesex County Council has approved in principle additional protected sleeping accommodation at six other Centres and plans have been submitted to the County Council. The siting of the proposed buildings is being agreed with the Owners of the properties concerned and work has already been commenced in one instance.

#### 29.—PUBLIC GAS CLEANSING STATIONS:

Satisfactory progress is being made on the construction of Gas Cleansing Stations to serve the shopping areas in Golders Green, Hendon, Burnt Oak and Edgware.

Authority has been received for the appointment of two whole-time paid Auxiliaries (one female and one male) to each of these Cleansing Centres. These Auxiliaries will be placed in the same category as the staff of the First Aid Posts and will be subject to the ordinary Civil Defence rates of pay and conditions of service.

Approval has been given for the purchase of the necessary equipment in respect of which local purchase is authorised and the balance of the equipment has been requisitioned from the Ministry of Health.

#### 30.—AIR RAID SHELTERS:

- (a) Anderson Shelters.—Concreting has now been carried out to approximately 6,800 shelters and 750 small type Anderson shelters have been extended and concreted. The distribution of bunks for use in this type of shelter is suspended, awaiting a further supply of bunks from the Government.
- (b) Indoor Shelters.—A total of 2,318 indoor shelters have been delivered to date.

The Committee has again reviewed the general directions of the Ministry of Home Security in regard to the issue of indoor shelters and the application of these directions in this Borough. The Committee has expressed its satisfaction with the arrangements made and at each meeting receive details of applications which it has been found necessary to disapprove.

The Regional Commissioners have referred to their previous announcement that a householder eligible for the free provision of an indoor shelter whose family was too large to accommodate in one shelter might be allowed to purchase an additional shelter and state that it has now been decided that a second shelter may be provided free. Similarly, an indoor shelter may be supplied where an Anderson shelter already installed does not afford sufficient accommodation for the family of a householder eligible for the free provision of shelter.

(c) **Communal Shelters.**—Accommodation in communal shelters in this Borough is now available for approximately 16,450 people. The fitting of bunks in this type of shelter is continuing and bunk accommodation is now available for approximately 6,650 persons.

On completion, one key of each shelter is retained at the appropriate Wardens' Post and a duplicate deposited with a responsible householder in the vicinity or a person to whom the bunk accommodation in such shelter has been allocated.

In accordance with the instructions of the Middlesex County Council the strengthening of communal shelters erected in 13½ in. brickwork without vertical steel reinforcements is proceeding.

(d) Air Raid Shelter Statistics.—The following details were obtained as a result of a shelter census taken during a night in September in accordance with instructions received from the London Civil Defence Region. The figures obtained as a result of the previous census taken in August are noted for the purposes of comparison:

# 2.—LETTER FROM SENIOR REGIONAL OFFICER, MINISTRY OF HEALTH, DATED 10th SEPTEMBER, 1941:

In accordance with the decision of the Sub-Committee at their meeting on the 19th August, 1941, Form M.C.W. 100 was completed and forwarded to the Ministry of Health on the 8th September. The estimated yearly expenditure for the running of the Nursery was shown on the form to be £2,850. The following letter from the Senior Regional Officer of the Ministry was submitted to the Committee for consideration:—

#### War Time Nurseries. Circular 2388.

I am directed by the Minister of Health to refer to your letter of the 8th instapplying for approval under the above Circular to the establishment of a war time nursery at Addington House, Watling Estate, and to state that the sum which the Minister is prepared to approve as annual running costs for a nursery for 37 children is approximately £1,730. The Council's estimate is £2,850, and I am to suggest that economies might be effected as regards the following items:—

1. Staff: Voluntary workers might be used in place of one of the nursery trained assistants and two of the probationers.

2. Salaries should approximate more closely to those suggested in Memo. 249-111A. Paragraph 5 of that Memo, indicates that salaries are all inclusive rates on the assumption that the staff will live out. No charge should, therefore, be included in the running costs in respect of food for the staff.

- 3. Food: See (2) above. The average daily allowance for children's food is 10d, per head as compared with the Council's estimate of 1s, per head.
- 4. Laundry: The estimated cost is exceedingly high and it appears from other estimates which have been submitted to the Minister that a saving of nearly £400 might be effected on this item.
- 5. Heating, Lighting, etc.: It is considered that the estimate for this item is capable of some reduction.

It is requested that the estimate of £140 should be apportioned between rent. rates, etc., and that the Minister should be furnished with a report by the District Valuer as to the proposed rent.

Form M.C.W. 100 is returned herewith for amendment in the light of these suggestions.

As regards the initial costs, I am to request that the Minister may be furnished with details of the cost of the adaptations and with a priced list of the furniture and equipment which is to be purchased locally.

The Medical Officer of Health informed the Committee that earlier in the day, the Chairman, Dr. J. H. Garrow, and himself had discussed the position at an interview with the appropriate officers of the Ministry from whom suggestions had been forthcoming regarding the question of certain reductions in expenditure in order to comply with the figure of £1,730 set out in the letter under reference. It was pointed out to the Ministry's officials that difficulty would probably arise in the matter of obtaining voluntary workers at the present time, and, after consideration it was agreed to adopt their suggestion to appoint one Nursery-trained Assistant, instead of two, and two Probationers instead of three, thus effecting a saving of £120 and £84 per annum respectively.

With regard to the question of food it was suggested that the average daily allowance for the children's food should be 10d, instead of 1s., thus effecting a further saving of approximately £100, and that no question of cost should arise with regard to food for the staff. The Medical Officer pointed out to the Committee that this item would have to be borne by the Council in respect of the Matron only.

The Ministry's Officials also pointed out that in their opinion a considerable saving could be effected in respect of laundry expenses and the Committee were informed that the proposed laundry building had been approved and that a further interview was being arranged to discuss the general question of equipment.

The Medical Officer stated that after consideration it was agreed that various adjustments should be made with regard to running costs; that this had now been carried out and a revised estimate prepared for submission to the Ministry showing a total expenditure of £1,964. After consideration the Committee

RESOLVED—That the revised estimate of running costs for the Nursery be submitted to the Ministry on Form M.C.W. 100, and that the Borough Surveyor be authorised to proceed with the work in connection with the proposed laundry building.

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#### 3.—WAR TIME NURSERIES—MEMORANDUM:

A memorandum from the Ministry of Health was submitted to the Committee relating to the necessity for keeping registers recording the daily attendances made by the children and the payments made by mothers; also regarding the stipulations governing the employment of aliens and further stating that the Mental Health Emergency Committee were appointing a Psychological worker to be available on loan to Local Authorities to advise on individual activities for children; difficulties of discipline, etc., and asking Local Authorities to communicate with the Secretary of the Committee if desired. **Noted.** 

#### 4.—APPOINTMENT OF STAFF:

Four applicants for the post of Matron at the Addington House Day Nursery were interviewed, and the Committee unanimously decided to appoint Miss M. I. Clarke, of Rochdale, with effect from the 20th October, 1941.

On being offered the appointment, however, this applicant asked to be allowed a few days to consider the matter before coming to a decision, giving as a reason for her request the fact that she would like to await the result of another application for a post elsewhere. After consideration, the Committee felt that, under the circumstances, Miss Clarke would probably prefer to withdraw her application, and she ultimately expressed her desire to do so. The Committee

# 6.—MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR S.R.O. 51.—DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION CAMPAIGN:

The Medical Officer of Health reported receipt of the above-mentioned Circular, stating that the film, "Defeat Diphtheria," would not be available for theatrical distribution and was thus precluded from cinema shows. It was pointed out, however, that the Ministry of Information had agreed to include in their Central Film Library 25 copies of the trailer film which was shown in all cinemas earlier in the year with the newsreel programme, and that this film would be available on free loan to cinema managers who offer to co-operate with the Council. It was urged that the Council should make provisional arrangements and formulate plans to exhibit the film.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Medical Officer of Health be requested to approach cinema managers on the matter.

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# 7.—MIDDLESEX COUNTY COUNCIL ACT, 1934—PART VII.—LICENSING OF MASSAGE ESTABLISHMENTS:

With reference to the recommendation contained under Group I. Committee Report (P.H. & M.S.—5/5/41—Item 6) a letter from the Home Office was submitted stating that if the Council were prepared to withdraw the proposal to add the Bye-law headed "Technical Qualifications" from the proposed Bye-laws the Secretary of State would consider giving his provisional approval to the proposals thus modified, but that otherwise consideration must be deferred since the adequacy and suitability of the Bye-laws made by the Leyton Borough Council were now in question. The Medical Officer of Health clearly outlined the position and suggested that each case should be dealt with on its merits. After careful consideration the Committee

#### 8.—AUTUMN PUBLICITY CAMPAIGN:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted a letter received from the Principal Regional Medical Officer of the Ministry of Health giving details of a campaign to be continued until about the middle of March, 1942, designed to reduce the spread of diseases by droplet infection, particularly diphtheria, measles, whooping cough, eerebrospinal fever and tuberculosis as well as influenza and the common cold. It was stated that 7,000 posters for exhibition in Welfare Centres would be provided free of charge, and that the Central Council for Health Education were producing a special E.M.B. poster and a special pamphlet which could be purchased. The co-operation of the Council was asked for in this campaign and the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Medical Officer of Health be authorised to take any necessary steps in the matter.

"A general inspection of the premises was made. The extension to the administrative block is now almost complete. A list of furniture prepared by the Matron was submitted and approved, and the Medical Superintendent was authorised to obtain this furniture.

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The sloping portion of the roof of the extension contrasts sharply with the main building, and it is suggested that the Borough Surveyor might give consideration to some means of bringing this into harmony with the existing building.

#### 12.—EMERGENCY WATER SUPPLY:

The Medical Officer of Health outlined the position with regard to the Emergency Water Supply and stressed the importance of the maintenance of such a supply. He stated that the water storage capacity available at the Hospital was 3,500 gallons.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a letter which had been received from the Colne Valley Water Co., and suggested that plans and estimates be prepared for covered water storage within the grounds of the Hospital of a capacity of 1,000 gallons. It was pointed out, however, that in view of the scattered nature of the hospital buildings it may not be possible to provide a pumping system to pump the water up to the various storage tanks in the Hospital. The Committee

#### 13.—HOSPITAL DOMESTIC STAFF:

#### (a) Schedule of Reserved Occupations.

The attention of the Committee was drawn to the present unsatisfactory conditions prevailing in regard to domestic staff concerning their employment, inasmuch as such employment could be terminated, if desired, by short notice being given without any restriction. It was pointed out that this was a very serious problem especially in the case of Hospital Staff. After careful consideration the Committee were of opinion that representations should be made to the appropriate authority requesting that such staff be included in the Schedule of Reserved Occupations.

#### (b) Remuneration.

In conjunction with the foregoing it was suggested that the question of an increase in the present scale of wages paid to this Staff should be reviewed in order to bring it in line with the scale of pay already extended to the Nursing personnel. The Medical Officer stated that the matter had been considered and would be the subject of a report.

- (i) That representations be made to the Ministry of Labour and National Service with a view to the inclusion of domestic service in the Schedule of Reserved Occupations, thus restricting the transfer of such personnel from one employment to another without authority first being obtained.

- (1) The railings will be severed under Regulation 50 of the Defence Regulations of
- (2) Possession of the severed railings will then be taken under Regulation 53, and will then be removed.

- (3) The rights of claimants to compensation are set out in the Compensation (Defence) Act, 1939, of which Section 3 applies to action taken under Regulation 50 and Section 6 to action taken under Regulation 53.
- (4) The term "railings" includes iron or steel posts, chains, bollards, gates, stiles and similar materials.

The following procedure is to be adopted:-

#### Survey.

A direction has been issued under Regulation 54B of the Defence (General) Regulations of 1939, under which the Council is to carry out a survey of the railings in the district and furnish a schedule or schedules of such railings to the Minister. This work is to be proceeded with at once and completed within six weeks.

Railings should not be included in these schedules where, in the opinion of the Local Authority, they fall within the following categories:—

- (1) Railings which should be maintained for safety reasons.
- (2) Railings necessary to prevent cattle, etc., from straying.
- (3) Railings of special artistic merit or historic interest.

#### Appeals.

It is not intended that there shall be any appeal from the decision of the Local Authorities to schedule particular railings, unless a claim is made by the owner that they are of special artistic merit or historic interest.

In order that appeals can be lodged with the Local Authority public notice should be given of the intention to conduct the survey and owners given fourteen days within which to lodge any such appeal. In cases where the Local Authority agrees that the railings should not be scheduled, the interested party should be informed accordingly. In other cases the appeal must be referred to the Assistant Director of Emergency Works (Salvage).

#### Collection and Removal.

The removal and collection of the railings scheduled will be undertaken by the Ministry of Works and Buildings. The approximate date will be notified to the Local Authority and a notice is then to be inserted in the local press and similar notices exhibited in public places.

Persons having an interest in the railings to be removed and who desire to claim compensation, are invited to apply to an officer of the Council who will be designated for the purpose.

#### Compensation.

The Minister hopes that the majority of owners will surrender their railings freely, and that claims for compensation will be reduced to a minimum.

As regards claims under Section 6, the Minister states efforts should be made to settle all such claims by payment at the standard rate of 25s, per ton. The owner is, however, not bound to accept this offer.

The scheme provides for the issue of forms to persons desiring compensation and for the payment thereof by the Council at the standard rate. If the claimant is not willing to accept the standard rate of compensation, the form must be forwarded to the Ministry of Supply for disposal.

The directions provide for the repayment of the costs incurred by the Ministry to the Council, and the preparation of accounts, etc., in connection with the matter. This matter will be dealt with by the Borough Trensurer.

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The Minister states that railings should not be included in these proposals where, in the opinion of the Local Authority, they fall within the categories already set out.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That authority be given to Group II. Committee (Works and Fire Brigade) to decide which railings shall be included and excluded from the Scheme;
- (2) That authority be given to the Borough Surveyor to proceed with the necessary survey, to give the required public notices, and to make the necessary arrangements for recording and dealing with claims for compensation.

#### 15.—EMERGENCY PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY SERVICE:

The Borough Treasurer reported that the above service was organised in September, 1939, by the Ministry of Health Medical Research Council to augment existing facilities for bacteriological diagnostic work required for Public Health purposes. In view of the difficulties of making individual charges for work done it has been suggested that each Local Authority using the service for its normal Public Health Laboratory work should make an annual block contribution based on the expenditure actually incurred for Laboratory work during the three years preceding the outbreak of hostilities, and that such contribution should commence as from the inception of the scheme. A simple form of agreement must be completed if the Council accept the suggested basis of contribution. As a consequence of representations made to the Minister of Health, it has now been agreed that this Council's contribution should only be payable on the suggested basis as from the 1st October, 1941, and that any work done by the Laboratory before the date stated should be paid for at an agreed scale.

The approximate annual contribution of the Council will amount to £493, and it is anticipated that this will not exceed the value of the work done. No other Laboratories will be used and consequently no further fees will be payable. The Medical Officer of Health recommends that the agreement be completed, and the Committee

#### 17.—COLNE VALLEY WATER CO.—INCREASED WATER CHARGES:

A letter was submitted from the Town Clerk, Borough of Wembley, intimating that his Council had had under consideration the effect of the imposition by the Coine Valley Water Co., of the recent increase of 10% in the charges for the supply of water for domestic purposes. The Company's Act of 1922 authorised an increase up to a maximum of 60% in the charges authorised by the Company's Act of 1907. This maximum increase was reduced to 20% by Section 86 of the Colne Valley Water Act, 1939. Between January, 1938, and June, 1941, a 5% increase has been charged and the new increase of 10% increases this 5% charge from the 26th June, 1941, to 15% over the charges fixed by the 1907 Act. A perusal of the Company's accounts reveals that during 1940 the charges operating prior to the recent increase of 10% enabled the Company to meet all its liabilities so far as Debenture interest and Preferential dividends are concerned, and, furthermore, it has been able to maintain payment of the maximum authorised dividends of 7% and 10% on Ordinary stock. Of the sum of £131,000, representing the profit of the Company during the last twelve months, £76,000 has been absorbed in paying dividends on Preference and Ordinary stocks.

The Wembley Borough Council are of opinion that strong protestations should be made to the Board of Trade against the Company's recent increase of 10% in the charge for the supply of water for domestic purposes and, as the Hendon Town Council have a direct interest in the matter, it is asked to support Wembley in this course of action, which it is felt would be strengthened by the support not only of the Middlesex and Hertfordshire County Councils but also of every local authority in the area of the supply of the Colne Valley Water Co.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council accordingly support Wembley Borough Council in its representations to the Board of Trade.

#### 18.—BETTING AND LOTTERIES ACT, 1934—HENDON GREYHOUND STADIUM:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from Messrs. Clifford-Turner & Co., solicitors, enclosing, in pursuance of the provisions of Section 6 of the above Act, notice of the intention of their clients, the Hackney Wick Stadium Ltd., to apply to the Entertainments Committee of the Middlesex County Council for a licence authorising the provision of betting facilities at the above Stadium.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no objection be raised to the issue of the proposed licence by the Middlesex County Council and that the applicants be informed accordingly.

#### 19.—WAR-TIME ALLOTMENTS—WATER SUPPLIES:

The Committee considered a request from the Special (War-time) Allotments Committee to agree to the withdrawal of the present water charge of 1s. 6d. per ten pole plot in respect of War-time Allotments.

The Committee were informed that difficulty had arisen in a number of instances in the collection of these charges in view of the inadequacy of the supply at certain Wartime Allotments. In these circumstances the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the water charge be reduced to the basis of 6d. per ten pole plot in respect of the War-time Allotments.

# 20.—HENDON FOOD CONTROL COMMITTEE—RESIGNATION OF COUNCILLOR W. A. HICKS:

It was reported by the Borough Treasurer that Councillor W. A. Hicks had resigned his position as a Consumers' representative on the Hendon Food Control Committee.

As far as possible the Ward system of Consumers' representation has been applied to the Committee.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Councillor W. L. Duthie be appointed a Consumers' representative on the Hendon Food Control Committee (vice Councillor W. A. Hicks).

#### 21.—BRITISH RESTAURANTS AND EMERGENCY FEEDING:

The Committee considered the following resolution passed by the Hendon Food Control Committee on the 9th October, 1941:—

"That the Hendon Borough Council be informed that in the opinion of the Hendon Food Control Committee, the constitution of any Committee dealing with the administration of British Restaurants and kindred Emergency Feeding arrangements should provide for a proportion of representatives from the Hendon Food Control Committee and that the Hendon Corporation be asked to constitute such a Committee."

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That a separate Committee to deal with the establishment and maintenance of British Restaurants be appointed, constituted on a ward representation basis, with power to co-opt members if necessary;
- (2) That the appropriate officers be instructed to submit reports on the legal and financial position with regard to British Restaurants and Emergency Feeding Schemes.

#### 22,—HENDON FIRE BRIGADE—ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:

The Committee considered a letter from the Hendon Branch of the National Association of Local Government Officers regarding the position of a member of the administrative staff of the Hendon Fire Brigade, now incorporated in the National Fire Force, and enquiring whether such member is still an employee of the Hendon Borough Council and asking for an assurance that, in the event of his not being absorbed into the new organisation, he will be retained in the Council's service.

At the present time the member in question is still employed by the Council and the salary is reimbursed in full by the National Fire Force.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Association be informed that the employee concerned is a member of the Council's staff engaged on Fire Brigade duties; and that the question of his transfer to another department will be considered if and when the necessity arises under the Fire Brigade re-organisation and in the light of his former position and other circumstances appertaining to any redundancy of his present employment.

#### 23.—COLLECTION AND STORAGE OF WOOD FUEL:

The Committee considered a letter from the Deputy Under-Secretary for Mines intimating that the Mines Department of the Board of Trade has had under consideration the question of arrangements for the creation of emergency reserves of wood suitable for use as domestic fuel as an additional safeguard against coal shortage which may arise during the winter in districts where difficulties of coal distribution may be experienced.

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It is appreciated that in many districts there will be no necessity to make such arrangements, either because supplies of suitable wood are not available, or because adequate arrangements already exist for its collection, storage and distribution through the timber trade, voluntary organisations or otherwise. It is known, however, that in many districts where this is not so Local Authorities are willing to organise the collection and storage of such wood in their area, and to this end the Department would be prepared, pursuant to Regulation 548 of the Defence (General) Regulations, 1939, to give such Local Authorities directions to perform specified functions for and on behalf of the Board of Trade.

It is pointed out that in any event it will be of considerable assistance to the Department if Local Authorities who are willing to co-operate in these arrangements would so inform the Department as quickly as possible, indicating if necessary that their detailed proposals will be submitted separately. The Department emphasise the urgency of the problem and request the Council to consider the matter at the earliest possible moment.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the matter be referred to Group II. Committee (Works and Fire Brigade) for consideration.

# 1.—SALVAGE DRIVE IN THE BOROUGH OF HENDON:

At a meeting of the above Executive Committee on the 6th August, 1941, it was arranged that, in co-operation with the Controller of Salvage, a Special Salvage Drive in the Borough should be organised to take place during the two weeks commencing 15th to 29th September inclusive, the Local Authority being responsible for organising local advertising, canvassing and collection of salvage within its area.

# 2.—OBJECTS OF THE SALVAGE DRIVE:

(a) To make a special collection of waste paper, metals and textiles, with special emphasis on the importance of paper.

It was intended by means of general publicity, canvassing, etc., to encourage the public to turn out any waste paper such as books, magazines and other documents which they no longer required and also any textiles or metals which they could spare.

The materials to be collected by special vehicle in each ward and not dealt with in the ordinary weekly collection of household refuse, which will maintain, during the period of the Drive, the ordinary collections of bones, pig food, bottles, etc.

(b) To stimulate the public interest in the normal collection of salvage every week and thus reduce the possibility of a serious falling off in the production of salvage after the finish of the Drive.

# 3.—ORGANISATION:

It was agreed that the Special (Salvage) Executive Committee should control the organisation of the work and have power to co-opt any specialists whose services might be required, such as a Publicity Officer, etc., such organisation to fall under the following sub-divisions:—

- (1) General Publicity.
- (2) Canvassing.

- (3) The collection of salvaged materials.
- (4) The reception and disposal of such materials delivered at the Refuse Disposal Works of the Council.

Mr. R. T. Barrow ..... Arrangements for lectures in schools.

Messrs. A. C. Mills and A. S. Howes were also appointed as Co-opted Members of the Committee as representatives of the Refuse Collection section.

# 4.—LEVY PAYMENT:

In view of the expenditure incurred on printing and advertising, and at the request of the Controller of Salvage, the Council agreed to increase the levy payment to the common fund from £48 to £60 (being 10s. per 1000 population, based upon a population of 120,000).

# 5.—ADVERTISING AND PUBLICITY:

In connection with the advertising and publicity organisation, the Committee authorised the expenditure of approximately £120 in respect of the following items:—

- The issue of letters to householders, to be followed by the distribution of a four-page leaflet.
- (ii) Advertisements in the "Hendon Times" for a period of five weeks commencing on the 22nd August, 1941.
- (iii) The provision of slides for the purpose of advertisements on the screens of local cinemas.
- (iv) The provision of 1,000 reminder slips "Stickers" for the purposes of shop window advertisements.
- (v) The provision of "screen slogans" for display on street pavements.
- (vi) The provision of streamers for display advertising throughout the Borough.
- (vii) The provision of a loud speaker van for patrols during the period of the Drive.

Arrangements were made for a panel of speakers consisting of members of the Education Committee, the Council and the Special (Salvage) Executive Committee, to visit the schools for a series of talks to the children, and also for visits by certain members of the Committee to address the Rotary Clubs on the object of the Drive.

Arrangements were also made for the display of streamers at the junction of Station Road and Edgware Road, Mill Hill Broadway, Watling Avenue and Brent Street (near "The Bell"); also for hoardings to be erected for the display of posters at Golders Green (Island site), Hendon Central, Edgware Tube Station, and the Town Hall Balcony.





# to the Meeting of the HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

27th October, 1941.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Hendon,

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I submit a Report on various matters which have been dealt with by the Civil Defence Committee at its Meetings held on the 8th, 13th and 22nd October, 1941.

# 1. COUNCIL'S AMBULANCE SERVICE.

The request of Group II. Committee (Works and Fire Brigade) that this Committee should take over the Ambulance Service on behalf of the Council has been considered, and the matter has been referred back to the Works and Fire Brigade Committee.

# 2. WOMEN'S VOLUNTARY SERVICES.

The Committee has been pleased to accept on behalf of the Corporation a Utility Van, presented by the Hendon Section of the Women's Voluntary Services for use in connection with Civil Defence.

# 3. CIVIL DEFENCE COMFORTS.

612 knitted garments have been distributed to members of the Civil Defence and Auxiliary Fire Services.

# 4. WORKERS' EDUCATION COMMITTEE—UNIVERSITY EXTENSION LECTURES.

Authority has been given for the arrangement of Lectures by the Workers' Education Committee at various Civil Defence Depots in the Borough.

# 5. TRANSPORT AND GENERAL WORKERS' UNION.

A request for the District Officer of the above Union to address Civil Defence personnel in the various Depots has been granted.

# 6. MOBILE CANTEEN.

A second Mobile Canteen has been allocated to this Borough by the Middlesex County Council.

# 7. WELFARE AND SOCIAL CENTRES.

Welfare and Social Centres are being opened at "Redlands," The Vale, N.W. 11, and 15, Flower Lane, Mill Hill; these will be staffed by members of the Women's Voluntary Services, and will perform a very important duty in helping persons who have been rendered homeless and rehoused in the Borough.

# 8. FIRE GUARD ORGANISATION.

A Fire Guard Staff Officer at a salary of £350 per annum and two Assistant Fire Guard Staff Officers at salaries of £275 per annum have been appointed.

# 9. COLINDALE FIRST-AID POST.

On the direction of the Regional Commissioners, the use of the First Aid Post at Colindale Hospital will be discontinued as from the 3rd November, 1941.

# 10. BRITISH RESTAURANTS.

The St. John's British Restaurant was opened to the public on Monday, the 13th October, 1941. During the first week 2,590 midday meals were served.


