#### REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENCE COMMITTEE.

#### HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Hendon.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I submit the following Report on matters dealt with by the Civil Defence Committee at its meetings held on the 25th February and 11th March, 1942.

#### 1.—APPOINTMENTS:

The appointment of Mr. W. C. Ramsay as Deputy Chief Warden has been confirmed.

Mr. J. L. Workman having been called up for service with H.M. Forces, applications are being invited for the appointment of shelter supervisor.

Mr. L. B. Wright has been appointed training instructor, at a salary of £220 per annum, with effect from the 9th March, 1942. A vacancy exists for a further instructor.

The Regional Commissioners have approved the appointment of a female clerical assistant for the Hendon Centre of the Women's Voluntary Services. No appointment is being made for the time being.

# 2.—AMALGAMATED UNION OF BUILDING TRADE WORKERS:

Permission has been given for the District Organiser of the Amalgamated Union of Building Trade Workers to address personnel at the Mill Hill Depot on the subject of Trade Union Organisation.

# 3.—EMPLOYMENT OF CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL ON WAR WORK:

Having considered a suggestion that Civil Defence personnel should undertake certain war work at depots during their duty periods, the Committee has decided to take no action in the matter.

### 4 .- THE "KING'S FUND (1940)":

The Minister of Home Security desires to bring to the notice of Local Authorities the "King's Fund (1940)" for the assistance of those disabled or bereaved by war service in the Armed Forces, the Mercantile Marine and Civil Defence Services.

As a result of a recent extension of its scope, the Fund is now authorised to assist, within the limits of its resources, cases of temporary need or distress occurring in Civil Defence, Fire and Police Services where the purpose in view is outside the scope of State Funds. The assistance takes the form of grants to members disabled, or to widows and dependants of those who have lost their lives in the defence of the country.

The Fund is maintained entirely by donations, bequests and contributions from private funds, and the Minister trusts that Authorities will take suitable opportunity to make it known as widely as possible.

#### 5.—CIVIL DEFENCE RATES OF PAY:

(a) Generally: The following increases in the basic rate of pay for Civil Defence workers have been approved by the Minister of Home Security, with effect from the 2nd March, 1942:

Revised weekly inclusive rates for whole-time members of Civil Defence Services in respect of pay for rank have also been put into operation.

In addition to the increases of pay now authorised, the Minister proposes to introduce for those engaged on continuous whole-time paid service in the Civil Defence General Services a scheme of post-war credits similar to the scheme announced recently for members of H.M. Forces, which provides for setting aside for all rating and other ranks a sum for men of 6d. and for women of 4d. in respect of every day of paid service from the 1st January, 1942. Particulars of the scheme and of the classes to which it will apply will be communicated to Local Authorities later.

- (b) District and Deputy District Wardens: As heretofore, the approved rate of pay for District and Deputy District Wardens is £3 19s. per week—i.e., the rate payable to Post Wardens. Having regard to the additional responsibilities of the District Warden, the Committee is again making representations to Middlesex County Council for approval to the weekly rates of £4 9s. for District Wardens and £4 4s. for Deputy District Wardens.
- (c) Report Centre Staff: The rates of pay of the under-mentioned officers were settled in December, 1940. Since then there have been two flat-rate increases in the payment of the remaining personnel, amounting to 9s. male and 8s. 6d. female. The Committee accordingly approved payment as from the 2nd March at the following rates:—

# 6.—HOURS OF DUTY—WHOLE-TIME PAID PERSONNEL:

The Minister of Home Security has now decided that the weekly duty hours of women members of the Civil Defence Services shall be increased in stand-by conditions to a minimum of 60 hours. Accordingly, the minimum weekly duty hours for whole-time personnel are as follows:—

Young persons aged 16 to 17 enrolled for whole-time service are not to be employed for periods normally exceeding 48 hours weekly. They are to be off duty for periods of not less than 11 continuous hours in each period of 24 hours, and are not to be on duty at night more than is necessary.

#### 7.—AMALGAMATION OF RESCUE AND STRETCHER PARTY SERVICES:

The formal amalgamation of the Rescue and Stretcher Party Services took effect from the 1st March, 1942, as from which date Stretcher Parties are to be known as "Light Rescue Parties" and the Rescue Parties as "Heavy Rescue Parties."

No person at present in receipt of higher pay for rank, skill or supervisory functions will suffer a reduction of pay as a result of the amalgamation. Holders of existing posts surplus to those now authorised are not to be dismissed, pending consideration of the use that can be made of their services, and particulars of redundant officers for whom work consonant with their rate of pay cannot be found locally are to be reported to Group Headquarters. Redundant personnel will be kept available for transfer to other districts found to be below strength after completion of the call-up for Military Service of men who have become de-reserved.

The Regional Commissioners have approved an increase of two Heavy and four Light Rescue Parties for the Borough. The present authorised establishment is therefore 16 Heavy Parties—160 men and 8 vehicles; and 32 Light Parties—160 men and 16 vehicles. In addition to the 320 men referred to, there are eight Supervisors, two depot Superintendents, two Deputies and a clerical staff of two, making a total of 334. At the moment there is a surplus of approximately 129 men in the Service, who are awaiting call-up for Military Service or are available for transfer to other areas.

# 8.—RESCUE SERVICE OPERATIONS:

Much useful work is being done by members of the Rescue Service, the following works being in hand:—

Construction of I.B. shed at Ravensfield, and also the gas chamber.

Wingfield Cottages: Pointing of brickwork.

Addington House Day Nursery: Construction of false ceiling to prevent condensation.

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I.B. Shed, Woodside Park,

Dismantling shoring and supporting floor-Ravensfield.

Making up and concreting cleansing site for vehicles.

Dismantling public shelters at 1, 2, 6 and 8, Silkstream Parade, and 71 and 88, Watling Avenue.

"A" Depot: Alterations for garaging of municipal ambulance.

Various plumbing jobs have also been carried out to properties occupied by Civil Defence Services, and also Council properties. It is noted that the plumbers supplied their own blow-lamps for this work.

Inspection of hospitals, institutions and large industrial premises in the district have been made to enable Depot Superintendents, Supervisors and Leaders to gain information as to the lay-out of the buildings and the position of valves and switches controlling supplies of gas, water and electricity.

#### 9.—AMBULANCE SERVICE:

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The revised establishment of ambulances and sitting wounded cars (including reserve ears, the property of the Council) has been allocated to the various depots as under:—

The personnel have been re-allocated accordingly.

#### 10.—DECONTAMINATION SERVICE:

Under existing arrangements members of this Service are liable for Military Service or transfer to the National Fire Service up to the age of 45. In the event of men up to and including the age of 41 being so called, the present strength of the Service would be halved. Considerable difficulty has been experienced, not only locally but in the London Region as a whole, in establishing this Service, and, having regard to the somewhat lengthy process of training the men, representations are being made for the fixing of a lower age for reservation of such personnel.

Special attention is being given to the cleansing arrangements for dealing with the decontamination of vehicles belonging to commercial firms in the Borough and the training of employees of the firms.

# 11.—PETROL CONSUMPTION:

Special consideration is being given by the Committee to the use of Civil Defence transport, with a view to effecting a reduction in the amount of petrol being consumed.

# 12.—MILL HILL AND HENDON WAY DEPOTS—PROTECTED SLEEPING ACCOMMODATION:

The construction of further protected sleeping accommodation at these depots is proceeding, with the approval of the Middlesex County Council.

## 13,—DECONTAMINATION LAUNDRY:

With the approval of the Middlesex County Council, a decontamination laundry is now being erected on the site of the Refuse Disposal Works.

# 14.—REST CENTRES—PROTECTED ACCOMMODATION:

The construction of protected accommodation at each of the Rest Centres in the Borough is now approaching completion.

# 15.—FIRE PREVENTION (BUSINESS PREMISES) ORDER NO. 2:

For the purposes of administrative efficiency, the Committee has agreed to the exercise by the Hendon Borough Council of the functions of the Minister of Labour and National Service under the above Order in relation to certain factory premises in the area.

### 16.-EMERGENCY FEEDING SCHEME-PROVISION OF SHEDS:

A further approval of an expenditure of £59 5s. has been received from the Ministry of Food in connection with the provision of sheds to house and operate cooking equipment at Edgware, Frith Manor and Orange Hill Schools, in which cases the equipment cannot be accommodated within the buildings.

A strong protest is being lodged with the Ministry of Food at the proposed limitation of expenditure, which will necessitate the provision of buildings considered to be of a capacity totally inadequate to enable the Feeding Centres to function effectively in an emergency.

#### 17.—EMERGENCY FOOD VAN:

# 3.-PLAY CENTRES:

Arising out of consideration of Joint Circular of the Ministry of Health (No. 2535) and Board of Education (No. 1573), the Director of Education submitted the following suggested scheme in outline for the establishment and conduct of Play Centres:—

- (a) Play Centres should be set up, in so far as may be necessary, in any area in which there is a proved need, because of the large number of children whose mothers are engaged in war work.
- (b) The area is taken as the unit, and not the individual school, to ensure that a sufficient number of children are actually available for the play centre. Admissions must be strictly limited to the children of those mothers for whom the special provision is intended.
- (c) Opening: In the initial stages, during the trial period, it is suggested that the Centres should be opened after school only on all school days. When the actual need has been determined, it may be necessary in due course to extend the opening to the period before morning school and on a Saturday morning, and probably for an extended period during school holidays.

### (d) Times of Opening as a Preliminary:

Summer ..... 4.30 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Winter ..... To be decided at a later date.

#### (e) Staffing:

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- (i) A superintendent and an assistant superintendent should be appointed to each centre, and paid at the rate of 5s. an hour for a maximum of 15 hours a week. Normally one or other would be in charge, but not both together.
- (ii) Helpers should be appointed and paid at the rate of 3s. an hour for a maximum of 15 hours a week.
- (iii) One member of the staff should be on duty for every 25 children or portion of that number attending the centre, e.g., for 35 children the staffing would be a superintendent and a helper.
- (iv) In the event of a member of a staff being absent, a suitable supply should be secured and paid at the rate for helpers.
- (f) Teas should be supplied at a charge of 2d., provided that the number of children requiring them is not less than 20. If it is necessary in due course to open before school, then arrangements will be necessary to provide breakfasts at a charge of 3d.
- (g) A kitchen worker or workers will be required to wash up if teas and/or break-fasts are supplied. The normal rate of 1s. 3d. per hour will be payable. The number of such will obviously depend upon the number of children who take advantage of the play centre.
- (h) Additional cleaning assistance for caretakers will be necessary. The number of cleaner hours will be determined by the usage.
- (i) **School Equipment:** It will be necessary to provide a sum of money for initial equipment. Obviously in these days the ordinary school equipment cannot be used; the cost thereof is a charge upon the Education Rate. It is suggested

Education.

that a sum of 10s, per head on the number enrolled might be allowed for this initial equipment, and that a sum of 7s. 6d, per head of average attendance might be allowed annually for upkeep and replacement of equipment. Finally, a sum up to 5s, a week might be expended on the purchase of children's periodicals.

The Medical Officer of Health reported on the receipt of the above Circular stating that a new procedure for the distribution of fruit juices and cod-liver oil, bringing it into line with that for liquid milk, whether issued free of cost or at a reduced price, will come into operation on the 1st April, 1942. # 10.—FUTURE GOVERNMENT OF ISOLATION HOSPITAL:

The Committee considered the question of the future government of the Isolation Hospital, together with a suggestion that in place of the existing visiting rota a subcommittee of seven members of the Committee be set up, to meet each month at the Hospital. The Committee were of opinion that no departure should be made from the present rota procedure, and decided that no further action be taken.

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#### 11.—PROPOSED GREENHOUSE:

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The Committee further considered the question of the erection of a greenhouse at the Hospital referred back by the Council (23/3/42—Resolution 142).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be requested to submit a comprehensive report, together with an estimate of the cost, in conjunction with a financial report by the Borough Treasurer, such reports to be circulated for consideration at the next meeting.

#### 12.—APPOINTMENT OF MATRON:

The Committee considered a reference from the Council (23/3/42—Resolution 143) regarding the issue of an advertisement for the appointment of Matron at the Isolation Hospital.

The Chairman reported the receipt of a letter from Mrs. Leibert tendering her resignation as Acting Matron, and at the same time expressing her willingness to remain in that capacity until other arrangements have been made. The Committee were informed that in pursuance of the Council's instruction an advertisement was being issued for the appointment of a Matron, and that in consequence of Mrs. Liebert's resignation it would be necessary to appoint a deputy matron.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the resignation of Mrs. Liebert be accepted.
- (ii) That an advertisement be issued for the appointment of a deputy matron with general and fever training, and preferably holding a sister tutor's certificate, at a salary of £200 per annum, rising by annual increments of £15 to a maximum salary of £250 per annum.

#### 13.—HEALTH CENTRES AND ISOLATION HOSPITAL—ROTA OF VISITORS:

The following report, together with a supplement, was submitted in regard to the visits to the Health Centres and the Hospital on Thursday, the 19th March, 1942:—

"We, the undersigned members, submit the following report of an interim visit made to the Health Centres and Isolation Hospital on Thursday, the 19th day of March, 1942.

#### HEALTH CENTRES:

The following Health Centres were visited:-

Central Hendon, Town Hall;

Watling Health Centre;

Colindale Health Centre;

Mill Hill Health Centre.

The Committee were struck by the large attendance at the Colindale and Mill Hill Centres, and, in view of the tremendous advantage which parents are taking of the Colindale Centre, wish to stress the importance of better heating arrangements, or, failing this, the desirability of finding alternative quarters.

The attendance at the Mill Hill Centre is so heavy that it seems advisable to give serious consideration to the possibility of splitting the sessions.

#### ISOLATION HOSPITAL:

A visit was also made to the Isolation Hospital, where the work was found to be proceeding satisfactorily. The lady members of the Rota Committee made a special feature of an inspection of the kitchen and domestic arrangements, and a supplement to this report will follow as a result of this inspection.

A letter from the Ministry of Health, dated 6th March, regarding the reinstatement of the Cubicle Block, was read, and the Committee instructed the Medical Officer of Health to communicate with the Surveyor regarding the questions raised therein, and to press for sanction for the inclusion of glass panels in the cubicle doors, as fitted to the existing cubicle doors.

Group I.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that two members of the hospital male staff—M. Cooke (ambulance driver) and M. Haggins (porter)—had received notices intimating that they were "de-reserved" as from the 1st April, 1942. The Committee decided not to make any application for deferment of "call-up," and recommended the immediate appointment of one additional man to be trained in the duties, with a view to taking over as soon as one of the above is called up.

The Committee considered a letter from the National Union of Public Employees concerning Miss Egerton (head laundress), and on hearing the evidence of the Matron it was decided to confirm the action taken in terminating Miss Egerton's appointment and appointing a new Head Laundress"

A special inspection of the kitchen and domestic arrangements was made by Councillor Mrs. Parvin and Councillor Mrs. Thomas, and the following summarised recommendations were submitted:—

#### Kitchen Machinery.

- 1. Bread and Meat Slicer.—The Ministry of Health have agreed to reimburse the Council with two-thirds of the cost of this machine, the purchase of which had been approved at an earlier meeting of the Rota. The proportion of cost payable by the Council amounted to £136s. 8d. and an order had been placed with the makers, Messrs. Berkell & Parnell.
- 2. Electrical Food Mixer.—That quotations be obtained with a view to purchasing one electrically-operated mixing machine, with attachment for cheese grating and bread crumbing.
  - 3. Other Kitchen Equipment .- The purchase of the following:-

One Potato Chipper;

One Food Trolley.

An assortment of saucepans, to be selected by the Matron and the lady members of the Rota Committee.

#### Washing and Ironing Facilities for Staff.

In view of the inadequacy of the present accommodation, it was recommended that the staff cloakroom be fitted out for this purpose by the installation of the following equipment:—

Two ironing boards;

water supply;

One heated cupboard; One sink with hot and cold One table;

One electric iron and power point

for same;

Line for drying of clothing.

#### Laundry.

- (a) Steeping Tank: That two metal steeping tanks of the same size as the existing wooden one be obtained, or, alternatively, one metal tank of a larger size, to replace existing wooden tank
  - (b) Cleaning of Laundry: That the laundry be thoroughly cleaned and repainted internally.

#### Ward Requirements.

- (a) Bowl Steriliser.—The purchase of a bowl steriliser.
- (b) Water Supply.—That the ward's drinking water should be obtained direct from the mains and the Borough Surveyor be asked to make the necessary adaptations.
- (c) Nurses' Meals.—It is at present the practice for the night nurses to prepare their own meals in the ward kitchens, and it is suggested that it would be desirable to arrange for them to have a hot meal prepared for them in the Nurses' Home.

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The following appointments were recommended:-

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- (i) A female night assistant for the kitchen, at a salary of £60 plus £5 to £70 per annum.
- (ii) An additional relief maid (at the existing scale), to combine relief of nights off with general relief duties.

#### Administration Block.

Extra Power Points.—The provision of electric power points in the sisters' bedrooms, to enable them to use electric fires.

[A quotation amounting to £51 16s. 4d. for this work has been obtained, including the wiring and installation of power points in the Doctor's and Matron's quarters.]

#### Cold Storage Plant.

That the Borough Surveyor be requested to submit a report as to the possibility of extending the existing accommodation.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the report of the Visiting Rota, together with the supplement thereto, be approved and adopted, and the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit a report together with an estimate of the cost of the heating of the remaining bedrooms and any other supplementary heating required.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 14.—ADMINISTRATION BLOCK—HEATING:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the retubing of the calorifier controlling the heating system had been completed, resulting in an improvement in the heating of the building. It was anticipated that during the summer a third calorifier would be installed, to be used in conjunction with the existing calorifier in exceptionally cold weather, and it was suggested that no further work be undertaken to supplement the existing heating system until it is ascertained whether the existing arrangements are adequate.

Noted.

#### 15.—WAR DAMAGE—CUBICLE BLOCK:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of a letter from the Ministry of Health stating that the Council's proposals for the reinstatement of the cubicle accommodation had been generally approved by the Minister. On the question of cubicle windows, the Ministry had been informed that arrangements would be made for the inclusion of glass panels in the cubicle doors, similar to those fitted to the existing cubicle doors.

The National Central Library has appealed to all the libraries in the country to support the scheme, and to name a provisional sum which might be expended, so that the amount involved can be ascertained. It was suggested that, so far as Hendon is concerned, the sum of £50 should be approved, but this amount need not be reached if a sufficient number of suitable books is not listed. In approximately three months time the National Central Library will circulate the list of suggested "popular" books, fiction and books for children. Each library will make its selection and submit its requirements to the National Central Library, which will order the books from America, and distribute them to the libraries making the purchase. The Ministry of War Transport has promised assistance in securing shipping space, and the Carnegie United Kingdom Trustees are covering overhead expenses, so that libraries get their books at the lowest possible price. Chief Librarian was of opinion that the scheme should be supported, and the Committee

#### 25.-BITTACY RISE AND ENGEL PARK, MILL HILL:

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#### 25.--THE HOME GUARD-COMPULSORY ENROLMENT:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of Circular 2616 from the Minister of Health referring to the recent public announcement that compulsory enrolment in the Home Guard will be applied in all Civil Defence Regions, and stating the conclusions reached with regard to exemption from such enrolment of men in the employment of local authorities and water companies or engaged in work in which these bodies are concerned.

It is the intention at present to direct into the Home Guard only men who can be placed in Class I. mentioned in Circulars 2564 and 2583. Accordingly the officers of the Ministry of Labour and National Service have been instructed not to issue directions to men employed or engaged as aforesaid who come under certain occupational headings, on the assumption that such men, if enrolled, would have to be placed in Class II. Otherwise the male staff of local authorities in departments responsible for services with which the Ministry of Health is concerned, and of water companies, will, subject to special instructions given by the Minister, be under the same obligations as men in other employment.

#### 26.—SUPPLY OF AGENDA AND REPORTS OF MEETINGS TO THE PRESS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of Circular 2600 from the Minister of Health referring to the decision of the Court of Appeal in the case of De Buse and Others v. McCarty and Stepney Borough Council, and stating that representations have been made to him as to the possible effect of that decision on the practice of local authorities in regard to supplying the Press with information in the form of Committee reports or otherwise in advance of Council meetings. The Minister is confident that local authorities will appreciate the desirability, on the broadest grounds, of avoiding any withdrawal or restriction of facilities hitherto afforded to the Press, except in cases where this is necessary under present conditions for reasons of national security. Subject to this, and to proper precautions against the publication of potentially defamatory matter, the Minister trusts that local authorities will be willing to continue their former practice.

#### 27.—MIDDLESEX WHITLEY COUNCIL—SALARY ADJUSTMENTS:

The Committee considered a letter from the Middlesex Whitley Council forwarding an amended scheme of salary adjustments made by the National Joint Council for Local Authorities' Administrative, Technical and Clerical Services. The effect of such amendments is to apply variable flat rate increases in lieu of the present percentage scheme. The amended scheme was considered and approved by the Middlesex Whitley Council at its meeting on the 20th March, 1942, and is recommended to all local authorities in Middlesex for adoption, with effect from the 1st April, 1942. A letter was also considered from the National Association of Local Government Officers (Hendon Branch) expressing the hope that the Town Council would adopt such amended scheme.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council adopt the amended scheme of salary adjustments as recommended by the Middlesex Whitley Council, with effect from the 1st April, 1942.

#### 28.—SUMMER HOLIDAYS FOR WORKERS:

The Committee considered Circular S.R.O. No. 58 from the Ministry of Health, referring to the Government's policy to ensure that, so far as the productive drive permits, workers should have a week's leave this summer. Owing to transport facilities being over-burdened, the Government intend to discourage all travelling (except for very short distances to recognised playgrounds). It is essential, therefore, that every effort should be made to increase the amenities for recreation and entertainment during the period April to September in or close to the homes of the workers and their

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families, and the Minister urges local authorities to do all that is possible for the well-being of citizens in this matter by providing entertainments—i.e., bands in parks and other public places, orehestral and other concerts, etc.

# 29.—COUNCIL'S AMBULANCE SERVICE (SEPARATION FROM FIRE SERVICE CONTROL):

1.—JOINT CIRCULAR OF MINISTRY OF HEALTH (2535) AND BOARD OF EDUCATION (1573)—CARE OF YOUNG CHILDREN OF WOMEN WAR WORKERS:

The Committee has considered and approved a scheme outlined by the Medical Officer of Health for carrying out the provisions of the above Circular for the operation of the scheme referred to therein.

2.—ESTABLISHMENT OF WAR-TIME NURSERIES—EDGWARE AND MILL HILL DISTRICT:

The Committee has inspected the following sites and premises considered to be suitable for the erection of pre-fabricated huts and/or adaptation as Nurseries:—

#### (a) Plot of Land at Station Road, Edgware.

This plot of land, situate off the Station Road, Edgware, fronting the accommodation road leading to the 'bus garage, was considered suitable for the erection of a pre-fabricated hut, and authority has been given for negotiations to be entered into with the London Passenger Transport Board with a view to the utilisation of the land in question for the purpose of the erection of a War-Time Nursery for the duration of the war.

#### (b) No. 98, Mill Way, Mill Hill.

The Committee has decided that, subject to the availability of the above premises, the Ministry of Health be asked to grant requisitioning powers to the Council, and that the necessary work in connection with the adaptation of the property for use as a War-Time Nursery be undertaken as early as possible.

#### (e) Clitterhouse School Playing Fields, Cricklewood.

The Minister of Health has been requested to supply a pre-fabricated but for erection at the southern end of the above Playing Fields for the purpose of a Nursery, and, in this connection, application has been made to the Hendon Education Committee for its formal approval to the erection of such hut.

#### (d) Hocroft Road - Additional Premises.

The suitability for the adaptation of the adjoining property as an extension of the existing Day Nursery is under consideration, and arrangements are being made for an early inspection, and a further report will be submitted in due course.

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#### 3,—ADDINGTON HOUSE DAY NURSERY:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that the administration of the above Nursery was progressing satisfactorily. The total number of children on the register is 40, and there are 35 on the waiting list.

#### 4.-THE HYDE SCHOOL:

It was reported that the whole of the work in connection with the adaptation of the school had now been completed, with the exception of interior redecorations, the estimated cost of which is £57.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, subject to the approval of the Education Committee to the proposed redecorations, the estimate of £57 be approved, and the Borough Surveyor be instructed to proceed with the work.

#### 5.—HOCROFT ROAD DAY NURSERY:

#### 1.—LETTER FROM DIVISIONAL FOOD OFFICER, MINISTRY OF FOOD:

Pursuant to the Committee's Resolution (9/3/42—Item 8) application was made to the Ministry of Food to receive a deputation consisting of the Chairman (Councillor F. J. Collins), Councillor H. Connell, J.P., together with Chief Officer, Meals Service, and it was reported that the Divisional Food Officer had replied to the effect that the Ministry were always desirous of helping Local Authorities as much as possible by meeting their representatives, but that in this instance he could deal with the points raised without the necessity of a deputation. In connection with St. Michael's British Restaurant, it was stated that as approval had been given on the 10th March the scheme could now be proceeded with. Regarding the provision of Nissen huts, it had been found impossible to carry out the full commitments of the Ministry in this connection. It was further stated that arrangements were in hand whereby Nashcrete huts would shortly be in supply, and suggested that estimates for the supply and erection of such huts should be obtained direct from T. F. Nash, Ltd., prior to submission to the Ministry. It was further pointed out that every possible assistance would be given to local Authorities to obviate any delay in giving effect to the Minister's policy with regard to British Restaurants.

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had been in communication with T. F. Nash, Ltd., and that a hut could be erected within a very reasonable space of time after the submission of plans and estimates to the Ministry of Food.

The Committee, however, are of opinion that in the event of any further difficulties arising in connection with the establishment of British Restaurants, the Minister again be requested to receive a deputation.

#### RESOLVED-

- (i) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare the necessary plans and estimates of the cost of erection of Nashcrete huts for the purpose of British Restaurants to accommodate 250 persons at Brent Street, Montrose Avenue and Cricklewood Lane; and at Cressingham Road, Watling Park, for the accommodation of 150 persons.

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had been in communication with T. F. Nash, Ltd., in accordance with the Committee's Resolution (23/3/42—ltem 1) and had obtained prices for the supply of pre-fabricated huts. Estimates had been prepared for the erection of this type of hut to accommodate 250 persons at Montrose Avenue, Brent Street and Cricklewood Lane. The estimated cost of building Restaurants at Montrose Avenue and Cricklewood Lane is £3,987 each, and £3,558 for the Restaurant at Brent Street, as the concrete already exists over the site.

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The Borough Surveyor also stated that with regard to the Ministry's suggestion that the Council should consider the erection of brick buildings, he was of opinion that the cost of such buildings would not differ materially from the cost of pre-fabricated huts.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to proceed with the erection of four brick buildings for use as British Restaurants on the under-mentioned sites, in the following order:—
  - (a) Montrose Avenue, Burnt Oak.
  - (b) Cricklewood Lane, N.W. 2.
  - (c) Brent Street, Hendon.
  - (d) Cressingham Road, Watling Park.
- (ii) That application be made to the London County Council for permission to utilise the sites at Montrose Avenue and Cressingham Road, and application made to the Ministry of Food for the granting of requisitioning powers in respect of Cricklewood Lane and Brent Street.
- (iii) That plans and estimates of the cost of erection of such buildings be submitted to the Ministry of Food;
- (iv) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to make enquiries with a view to the possible acquisition by the Council of the sites in question.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes

Committee conour in the proposal.]

18.—LETTER FROM THE NATIONAL FEDERATION OF BUILDING TRADES OPERATIVES:

A letter from the above Federation regarding the establishment of British Restaurants was submitted, and the Committee issued instructions for the necessary reply.

### 19.—EDGWARE AND MILL HILL DISTRICT:

A letter from the Edgware Women's Co-operative Guild was submitted to the Committee for consideration, and the Borough Surveyor intimated that he would institute the necessary enquiries regarding the availability of suitable sites and submit a further report. It was agreed to notify the Guild accordingly.

### HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Hendon.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Since the last meeting of the Council the Committee has met on the 25th March and the 8th and 22nd April, 1942.

### 1.—APPOINTMENTS:

Mr. F. Ford has been appointed Staff Officer for Shelters, at a salary of £250 per annum plus bonus, with effect from 13th April, 1942.

In view of the expiration on the 30th June, 1942, of the period of deferment of entry into military service granted to Mr. L. J. C. Hart, Staff Officer, Wardens' Organisation, members of the Wardens' Service are being invited to make application for this appointment.

### 2.—MR. P. F. CROYSDILL:

The Committee has indicated its willingness to temporarily release Mr. P. F. Croysdill from duties in connection with the Rescue and Decontamination Services in the event of the Government of India requiring his services.

### 3. - FREE TRAVELLING VOUCHERS:

The issue of free railway warrants to enable whole-time Civil Defence personnel to take leave outside the Borough has been suspended. The Regional Commissioners state that a similar but modified scheme will be introduced in the event of heavy raiding occurring in the future.

### 4.—RELEASE OF CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL:

The Committee has received details of the Government's proposals for releasing certain of the Civil Defence personnel at present engaged on a whole-time basis, to enable them to make a more active contribution to the general war effort. Instructions of the Regional Commissioners in regard to the carrying out of the Government proposals within the London Civil Defence Region are awaited.

### 5.—AMBULANCE AND FIRST-AID POST SERVICES:

On the instructions of the Regional Commissioners, female personnel attached to the Ambulance and First Aid Post Services are being placed on a 24-hour shift system.

The establishment of First Aid Posts is now fixed at three (i.e., Central Hendon, West Hendon and Mill Hill), with a staff of eight females and two males at each.

The second Mobile First Aid Unit has been disbanded.

### 6.—BLOOD TRANSFUSION:

The facilities which existed at the Isolation Hospital for the grouping of blood have been extended to all members of the Town Hall staff.

### 7.—REORGANISATION—RESCUE AND STRETCHER PARTY SERVICES:

The reorganisation of the Rescue and Stretcher Party Services into 32 Light and 16 Heavy Rescue Parties has been completed.

The Middlesex County Council is adapting transport for use by the Light Parties.

### 8.—DECONTAMINATION SERVICE:

In reference to the representation being made for the fixing of a lower age of reservation for personnel enrolled in the Council's Decontamination Service, it has been ascertained that the County Council have taken up this matter with the Regional Commissioners without success.

The London (Outer) Civil Defence Region Standing Joint Committee is being asked to pursue this matter.

### 9.—WARDENS' ORGANISATION — RATES OF PAY:

The London (Outer) Civil Defence Region Standing Joint Committee is being requested to support the representations made by this Council for the approval of an increased rate of pay for District Wardens and their Deputies.

### 10.—HOME GUARD:

A proposal for the formation of a Static Unit of the Home Guard, composed of members of the Hendon Wardens' Organisation, is being forwarded to the Regional Commissioners.

### 11.—WOMEN'S VOLUNTARY SERVICES:

It is understood that the Hendon Section of the Women's Voluntary Services is to be reorganised, and details of such reorganisation are awaited.

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### 12.- EMERGENCY FEEDING SCHEME:

(a) Ford Emergency Food Van.—On the 25th March, 1942, Mr. Harold Perry, representing Lord Perry, Chairman of the Ford Motor Company, and Lieut.-Colonel Charles Jarrott, O.B.E., Secretary of the Royal Society of St. George, formally handed over to His Worship the Mayor, on behalf of the Corporation, a Ford Emergency Food Van, provided by the Ford Emergency Food Vans Trust from funds placed at its disposal by the Nairobi Branch of the Royal Society of St. George.

His Worship expressed the thanks of the Corporation to the Ford Emergency Food Vans Trust, and also to the people of Nairobi, adding that, while it was hoped that circumstances would not necessitate the use of the van for its main purpose, it would operate immediately in connection with the scheme for the provision of midday meals for school children.

(b) Preparation of School Premises.—In consequence of the ear-marking of seven of the schools in the Borough by the Ministry of Works and Buildings for special purposes in an emergency, the Ministry of Food has withheld approval to expenditure on sheds to accommodate cooking equipment, inside alterations, black-out, etc., necessary at these premises in connection with the operation of the Emergency Feeding Scheme.

Although there appears to be some doubt as to whether the Ministry of Works and Buildings would have to rely on these schools for alternative accommodation, it has not relinquished its claim on the premises, and as no other suitable accommodation exists in the requisite areas, the Ministry is being urged to release the schools in question.

The Ministry of Food has approved an expenditure of £30 on the provision of hose for refilling the reserve water supply tanks at regular intervals.

(c) Charges for Meals—The Ministry of Food has agreed that persons obtaining meals at Emergency Feeding Centres during the first 48 hours of operation should not be charged for such meals, but those wishing to pay are to be invited to do so on a voluntary basis.

### 13.—OPERATION OF CORPORATION AMBULANCES:

The Middlesex County Council has indicated that if the Corporation is unable to make satisfactory arrangements for manning, maintaining and operating its ambulances at its own expense, without invoking the assistance of the County Civil Defence Committee, the County Council will raise no objection to the Corporation ambulances being manned for their normal purposes by Civil Defence personnel as and when the same are available, it being understood that the Corporation accepts full responsibility and indemnifies the County Council against liabilities for any personal injury to the Civil Defence personnel if and in so far as this is not covered by the Personal Injuries (Civilian) Scheme, and for all third-party claims arising out of the driving of ambulances by Civil Defence personnel.

The County Council will accept no financial responsibility for the repair, maintenance, housing, etc., of the vehicles. If desired, the County Council will provide any housing facilities in substitution of existing ambulance accommodation now used by the National Fire Service, subject to the Corporation undertaking to repay any expense thereby incurred.

The facilities offered by the County Council for the use of the services of its Civil Defence personnel are subject to the rights of the County Council to use the ambulances as and when circumstances so require for County Civil Defence Services, in which event the cost of petrol so used will be refunded.

Arrangements are proceeding for the adaptation of a building at John Groom's Crippleage and the erection of suitable accommodation at Clitterhouse Depot for housing two ambulances.

### 14.-AIR RAID SHELTERS:

- (a) Control of Access—To prevent pilfering, misuse, etc., the approval of the Regional Commissioners has been obtained to the locking of a number of shelters during "non-alert" periods.
- (b) Shelter Programme—The Regional Commissioners have intimated that after the 30th June, 1942, it will no longer be possible to make a specific allocation of labour for the provision of air-raid shelters. Proposals for new construction will be subjected to rigid scrutiny, and are not to be put forward unless there is overwhelming justification for them.

### 15 .- WARSHIP WEEK:

The Committee has noted with satisfaction that the proceedings from the dance organised by the Civil Defence personnel in aid of Warship Week reached a total of £152 9s. 1d.

- (a) Admission to hospital is more restricted, cases only being admitted on medical and environmental grounds.
- (b) There is a disruption of family life in wartime, in many instances no one being left at home capable of looking after the mother.
- (c) Many women who previously were prepared to help a neighbour during this period are now engaged in industry.
- (d) The number of domiciliary confinements has increased.

The Medical Officer stated, however, that owing to the numerous present day ealls upon women, great difficulty would be experienced in compiling a satisfactory panel of home helps, but that every endeavour should be made to provide such a service, which would prove to be a valuable addition to the Council's Midwifery Service under present conditions.

The Scheme, which provides for attendance of Home Helps in cases where a midwife has been engaged, and the patient is unable to arrange privately for a Home Help, is as follows:—

- A panel of women recommended as Home Helps to be prepared, this panel to be available at each Health Centre and at the Public Health Department.
- 2. The Home Help when employed shall be paid at the rate of 10s, per day, there being no retaining fee, the Council to be responsible for 7s. 6d. of this payment and the mother for the remaining 2s. 6d.
- 3. The supervision of Home Helps to be undertaken by the Midwife in attendance on the case.
- 4. The duties for women on this panel are appended.

# DUTIES OF THE HOME HELP.

- (i) On being summoned to a case, to notify the Public Health Department as soon as possible of her commencement of duty.
- (ii) To commence duty on the instruction of the Midwife, and to attend each day thereafter for a period of 14 days (this period may be varied in accordance with the directions of the Modical Officer of Health).
- (iii) The Home Help to be generally responsible for the domestic arrangements of the homescall between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. on weekdays, and 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Sundays.
- (iv) To do the washing, cooking and such general duties as the mother would normally do, this to include the removal and washing of soiled linen from the patient's room.
- (v) Not to interfere with the work of the Doctor or Midwife.
- (vi) To attend punctually each day, and not leave without giving due notice.
- (vii) To obey the instructions of the Midwife with regard to the mother and baby.
- (viii) To report immediately to the Midwife any contact with infectious disease.
- (ix) To notify the Midwife if for any reason she is unable to continue her duties.
- (x) The Home Help must provide her own meals.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the scheme as outlined above be approved and adopted, subject to review after a period of six months, and to the submission of monthly progress reports.

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[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

4.—ALLOCATION OF MEDICAL MAN POWER BETWEEN CIVILIAN AND MILITARY SERVICES—JOINT CIRCULAR MINISTRY OF HEALTH (2624) AND BOARD OF EDUCATON (1586):

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of the above Joint Circular, intimating that the pressing need for doctors in the medical branches of H.M. Forces necessitates the release from civilian duties of an increasing number of doctors, and that a further contribution towards this number must be made out of the doctors employed on Public Health duties other than whole-time staffs of hospitals. It was stated that Local Authorities, in considering the contribution to be made, should have regard to the urgency of, and pressure upon, the individual services in the area. Other forms of relief to be taken into consideration are set out in the Joint Circular, and Public Health and Local Education Authorities are urged to do their utmost in helping to meet the national needs for medical man-power in such a way as not to prejudice the essential health services. It is asked that proposals based on the suggestions contained in the Joint Circular should be submitted to the Regional Medical Officers of the Ministry of Health, who will review, in conjunction with officers of the Board of Education, the number and distribution of Medical Staff remaining in the service of the Authorities.

Apart from the Medical Officer of Health, the only male doctor on the Council's staff at the present time is Dr. Livingston (Deputy Medical Officer of Health and Resident Medical Officer of the Isolation Hospital), who has, on the representations of the Council, been granted deferment until November next, when the position will be reviewed.

# 5.—"BETTER HEALTH" JOURNAL:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of a further letter from the "Better Health" Journal stating that if a continuance of the subsidy of £1 per month could be granted, it might be possible tore-issue the Hendon edition of the Journal but that no guarantee to this effect could be given under existing difficult conditions (P.H. & M.S., 24/11/41—10).

RESOLVED-That no action be taken in the matter.

# $\mathfrak{b}_{\ell^*}$ -DIETARY OF YOUNG CHILDREN- MEMORANDUM FROM THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of a Memorandum from the Ministry of Health forwarding two booklets dealing with the feeding of young children up to the age of one and between the ages of one and five years, issued by the Ministry at a charge of 3d. and 4d. a copy respectively, and asking that Local Authorities would make arrangements for the booklets to be on sale at Welfare Centres.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be granted for the purchase of 250 copies of the booklet at threepence and two dozen copies of the one issued at fourpence per copy, for sale at Health Centres at the prices stated.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 7.- DR. MACLENNAN:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted a further letter from the Chief Medical Officer of the Ministry of Health requesting that Dr. MacLennan's services may be retained by the Ministry for the duration of the War. (P.H. & M.S., 2/3/42—3.)

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Ministry of Health be informed that the Council agree to the retention of the services of Dr. MacLennan by the Ministry for the duration of the War, and that for superannuation purposes the Minister be asked to recognise her employment with the Ministry as war service under the Local Covernment Staffs (War Service) Act, 1939.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes

Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 8.—WAR - TIME NURSERIES — EXPENDITURE:

The Committee considered a reference from the Special (War-Time Nurseries) Committee upon which the Medical Officer of Health reported that in the founding of a new service small unanticipated items of expenditure inevitably arise, and that, whilst the Ministry of Health generally appreciate this, and are willing to sanction such items, the application for such sanction causes undue delay. To obviate such delay the Committee

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the terms of reference of the Special (War-Time Nurseries) Committee (Council Minutes 10/11/41—16) be varied to the extent that the Committee be authorised to expend during the period ending 31st March, 1943, a sum not exceeding £50 in respect of each War-Time Day Nursery, beyond the limit of expenditure approved or to be approved by the Minister of Health.
- (ii) That notwithstanding the preceding recommendation every effort be made to secure the approval and total reimbursement of all expenditure in respect of War-Time Day Nurseries by the Minister of Health.

# 10.—DIPHTHERIA PROPHYLAXIS: MINISTRY OF HEALTH CHRCULAR NO. 2627.

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of the above circular expressing the Minister's appreciation of the efforts of Local Authorities in connection with the immunisation from diphtheria of the child population in England and Wales, which has resulted in at least one-third of such population having now completed the course. The circular emphasised the necessity and value of immunisation for the greatest possible number of children, and particularly in the case of children under school age. Attention was also drawn to the value of personal advice given to parents by the Medical Officer of Health and doctors and nurses at Welfare Centres and by Health Visitors, and Local Authorities were urged to do all possible to secure the active and sustained co-operation of all in a position to exercise personal influence.

The Committee were informed that the under-mentioned procedure is being followed at the present time:—

- 1. Talks to individual mothers at the Health Centres.
- 2. Notices exhibited at the Health Centres.
- 3. A letter is sent to parents advocating Diphtheria Prophylaxis when a child attains its first birthday.
- 4. Immunisation is offered to all entrants to public elementary schools. and that this procedure had produced the following results:—

It was pointed out that additional acceptances for immunisation might be obtained by concentrating on the infants' departments of each public elementary school in turn by circularising the parents and obtaining the co-operation of the Director of Education and his teaching staff; also by making use of the local Press. Should considerably increased numbers of acceptances be obtained, it may be found more practicable to carry out the immunisation in the schools, but this would remain to be considered when the response is ascertained. The Medical Officer stated that infants' departments had been selected in the first instance as the incidence and mortality from diphtheria is greater in the younger age groups. Immunisation, however, will not be confined to these age groups, and will be available, as at present, for all children whose parents wish to avail themselves of the opportunity.

RESOLVED-That the Report of the Medical Officer of Health be approved.

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# HENDON ISOLATION HOSPITAL.

# 11.—APPOINTMENT OF MATRON:

In connection with the applications received for the appointment of Matron at the Hendon Isolation and Emergency Hospital, the Chairman reported the receipt of a petition signed by 56 members of the hospital staff urging the retention of the services of Mrs. Liebert (Acting Matron) in her present capacity.

A letter from the Right Reverend Monsignor Canon G. Coote in support of the retention of Mrs. Liebert was submitted by His Worship the Mayor, who also reported that he had received a deputation of three nurses from the hospital on the same subject.

The Committee considered a schedule of 17 applications selected by the Medical Officer of Health and his Deputy from the 46 applications received for the appointment of Matron, and selected the under-mentioned 10 candidates for interview at a special meeting of the Committee to be held on Monday, the 11th May, at 6 o'clock p.m.:—

# 12.—PROPOSED GREENHOUSE:

Pursuant to the Council's resolution (P.II. & M.S., 30/3/42—11), the Borough Treasurer and the Borough Surveyor submitted a joint report relative to the proposal to erect a greenhouse at the Hospital. It was pointed out that the object of the proposal was to produce a crop of early vegetables which would be available some five or six weeks earlier than normal supplies, but that this could not be achieved by the use of a greenhouse alone, and that a forcing house to grow small plants from seed would be required in the first instance. The plants could then be transferred to the greenhouse for further development, and finally hardened off in cold frames before being planted outside. On the assumption that the necessary forcing-house accommodation could be provided elsewhere, the dimensions of the required greenhouse were outlined, together with particulars of the work to be carried out, which it was estimated would amount to £1,050. The Committee were informed that the sanction of the Ministry of Health would be required, also permits for all timber and iron necessary would have to be obtained.

Regarding the question of labour for operating the greenhouse, two additional men would be required.

A statement of the expenditure and income account for the Isolation Hospital kitchen garden for the year ended 31st March, 1942, was set out, and doubts were expressed as to whether the provision of the greenhouse would result in any direct saving of expenditure on vegetable produce, having regard to the cost of maintenance and the amortisation charges involved. It was further stated that during the financial year

1941/42 produce from the Woodfield House Nurseries to the value of £278 was sold outside, and produce to the value of £31 only was supplied to the Hospital. The undermentioned alternative proposals were suggested:—

- (a) That some modification of the arrangements for the sale of produce from the Nurseries could be made to enable the Hospital to have first call on the produce from the Woodfield Nurseries.
- (b) That a detailed scheme of food production on the Hospital land for the 1943 season should be prepared, and one existing forcing house and one plant house at Woodfield Nurseries utilised for the production of the plants such a scheme would require.

The Committee, after carefully considering the matter,

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the alternative proposals outlined in (a) and (b) above be approved, and that the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee be asked to co-operate in the scheme.

# (Imendment

Before detailed consideration of the motion, the Finance and General Purposes Committee Recommend—That the words "the equivalent of" be inserted after the word "and" where it first occurs in line 2 of paragrath (b) above.

# 13.—ADMINISTRATIVE BLOCK AND LAUNDRY—MINOR IMPROVEMENTS:

With reference to the supplementary report of the Visiting Rota (P.II. & M.S., 30/3/42—13), the Borough Surveyor reported on the under-mentioned matters:—

- (1) Washing and ironing facilities for staff: The cost of fitting in the staff cloak-room a sink with hot and cold water, and providing the necessary power plug for irons, etc., but excluding the various movable fittings which would be required, was estimated at £18.
- (ii) Laundry Steeping Tanks: The cost of providing two galvanised iron steeping tanks, each of 200 gallons capacity, with the necessary waste fittings and water supply was estimated at approximately £30.
- (iii) Heating of Sisters' Bedrooms: It was reported that in the case of a seventh bedroom on the second floor occupied by the night sister, which was not included in the estimate of £57 16s. 4d. already approved, an additional sum of £7 would be required for the provision of the fire and fittings therein.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the report and estimate of the Borough Surveyor be approved and authority given for the necessary work in connection therewith to be put in hand.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes

Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 14.—LAUNDRY:

It was reported that the estimated cost of repainting the interior of the laundry would be approximately £25. In view, however, of the difficulty in obtaining paint and the fact that the wall surfaces are in fairly good condition, the Borough Surveyor suggested that these should be cleaned down only.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND accordingly.

# 15.—COLD STORAGE PLANT:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the suggested extension of the existing cold storage accommodation could be dealt with by:—

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- (a) The provision of a small electric refrigerator in the laboratory for the storage of serum;
- (b) The removal of the galvanised bins kept for the storage of ice for the oxygen tent, and a smaller receptacle provided for this purpose, and
  - (c) The provision of additional shelving in the chamber for the storage of food.

It was pointed out that an extension of the existing storage chamber would necessitate alterations to the plant, and that the total cost of such extension would not be less than £250. Furthermore, a licence would be required from the Ministry of Works and Buildings for works involving an expenditure in excess of £100.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the suggestions set out in (a), (b) and (c) above and the expenditure involved be approved.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 16.—HEATING OF BEDROOMS GENERALLY:

It was reported that the estimated cost of heating the whole of the remaining bedrooms would amount to £650, excluding the cost of the weekly consumption of electricity.

RESOLVED—That consideration of the matter be deferred pending a further report by the Borough Surveyor based on an extension of the existing steam heating plant at the Hospital.

# 17.—STAFF— RESIDENT MEDICAL OFFICER:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted a letter received from the Deputy Group Officer of the Ministry of Health Emergency Hospital Service stating that it was not proposed to fill a vacancy caused by the transfer of one of the medical staff, and asking that Dr. Livingston be allowed to assist with the work on the emergency side of the Hospital.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council accede to the request on a reciprocal basis.

# 18.—MOSQUITO NUISANCE IN STATIC WATER TANKS—MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR NO. 2622:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of the above circular, referring to the necessity of preventing mosquitoes from breeding during the months April to September in tanks and other collections of water stored for fire-fighting purposes. It was pointed out that if the Medical Officer of Health considers it necessary on occasion that any of the Fire Service tanks in particular should be emptied and cleared out, the Fire Service will be prepared to do this on request. The instructions issued to the Fire Service are set out in the circular, and it was intimated that Local Authorities should follow similar procedure as regards all tanks and collections of water within their own control, as distinct from those for which the Fire Service is responsible.

# 36.—CONTRAVENTIONS—USE OF PREMISES FOR WAR PURPOSES:

# 3.—SUMMER HOLIDAYS FOR WORKERS, BANDS IN PARKS, ETC.:

The Committee considered a letter (S.R.O. No. 58) from the Ministry of Health referring to the Government's policy to ensure that, so far as the productive drive permits, workers should have a week's leave this summer. Owing to transport facilities being overburdened, the Government intend to discourage all travelling (except for very short distances to recognised playgrounds). The Minister points out that it is essential that every effort should be made to increase the amenities for recreation during the period April to September in or close to the homes of the workers and their families, and the Minister urges local authorities to do all that is possible for the wellbeing of citizens in this matter by providing entertainments, i.e., bands in parks and other public places, orchestral and other concerts, etc.

A letter was also considered from the Middlesex County Council intimating that it is anxious to co-operate with local authorities in carrying out the suggestions of the Minister, and offering to assist by way of affording facilities in regard to property of the County Council, and also in the granting of licences for music, dancing, etc. In order to deal with enquiries, the Ministry of Labour and National Service (Hendon Employment Exchange) has asked to be supplied with particulars of any additional facilities available for holiday-making.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That a Sub-Committee be appointed, consisting of the Chairman (Councillor C. F. Windust), Councillors E. J. Cox and A. W. Curton, to arrange entertainments in Hendon and Watling Parks during the months of June, July, August and September, such Sub-Committee to have power to co-opt members if necessary;
- (ii) That the cost of the provision of such entertainments shall not exceed £1,000;
- (iii) That application be made to the Middlesex County Council for a grant towards the cost of the scheme.

On a recent visit, Ministry of Health officials intimated that if the Council was satisfied that the need existed, a pre-fabricated hut would be supplied, which could be attached to the existing building, thus affording the required additional accommodation. The Committee are of opinion that steps should be taken forthwith to provide the requisite additional accommodation, and have given instructions to the Borough Surveyor accordingly.

#### 2.—THE HYDE SCHOOL:

The above Day Nursery was formally opened for the reception of children on the 11th May, 1942. The Ministry's officials have made a visit of inspection, and, in view of the number of children to be accommodated, were of the opinion that adequate staff would be provided by the appointment of one additional warden and two probationers.

#### 3.—HOCROFT ROAD DAY NURSERY:

There is a total of 37 children on the register and 37 on the waiting list. In view of the recent approval given by the Ministry to the accommodation of a further number of children, certain alterations by way of improvements have been suggested, which are being carried out in accordance with the wishes of the Ministry of Health.

#### 4.—YORK PARK SITE:

Satisfactory progress is being made with the erection of the pre-fabricated hut on the above site, and it is anticipated that completion will be effected shortly. The Ministry has approved the appointment of the following staff:—

The above salaries are in accordance with the scale authorised by the Ministry of Health.

#### 6.—ESTABLISHMENT OF ADDITIONAL NURSERIES:

#### (a) Plot of Land at Station Road, Edgware:

The London Passenger Transport Board has intimated that, owing to the use of the roadway by the Board's 'buses, it was thought that the site would not prove suitable for the purpose of a War-Time Nursery, but that if the matter is to be pursued it must be understood that the roadway would be kept clear of vehicles to allow an uninterrupted flow of 'buses to and from the garage. The Committee has decided to continue the negotiations with the Board.

#### (b) No. 98, Millway, Mill Hill:

The Minister of Health has intimated that the above premises are not considered suitable for adaptation as a War-Time Nursery, and, in these circumstances, no further action is being taken in the matter.

#### (e) Hocroft Road-Additional Premises:

With regard to the suggested user of the premises adjoining the existing Day Nursery for nursery purposes, the Committee decided to take no further action in the matter.

#### (d) Clitterhouse School Playing Fields:

The Borough Surveyor reported that owing to the absence of a sewer within a reasonable distance the originally selected plot of ground would be unsuitable for the erection of a pre-fabricated hut.

Consideration has, therefore, been given to an alternative site on land adjacent to the entrance of Clitterhouse Playing Fields, and the Ministry of Health has intimated that a pre-fabricated hut will be reserved for this site. Detailed plans, together with the estimated cost of erection (£1,300), have been prepared and forwarded to the Ministry for approval, and formal application is being made to the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee for its approval to the erection of such hut.

#### 7.—STAFF MEALS:

The Minister of Health has authorised the provision of free meals for probationers, and has intimated that other members of the staff should contribute towards the cost of their meals, and suggested that a charge of 1s. per day should be made by way of an experiment, with which the Committee has concurred.

#### 8.—STAFF ABSENCES:

The Minister of Health is not prepared to authorise the engagement of temporary assistance for the purpose of replacing staff who are absent due to holidays and sickness.

#### 9.—WAR-TIME NURSERIES—STAFF—MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR NO. 2646:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of the above Circular, which emphasised the importance of encouraging voluntary workers to assist in the Nurseries, and asking that Welfare authorities will endeavour to find suitable volunteers in this connection. The Medical Officer is dealing with this matter through the medium of the Health Centres. The Circular also provides that Local Authorities may make an initial uniform allowance of £10 to matrons, and an annual allowance of £5 for replacements, together with overalls for other members of the staff.

The Committee has decided to provide an indoor uniform and overalls for matrons in lieu of the allowance set out in the Circular, and overalls for the other nursing staff



### 1.—ADDITIONAL BRITISH RESTAURANTS:

The Committee considered a letter dated 19th May from the Ministry of Food, which dealt, firstly, with Christchurch Hall, which is used for the feeding arrangements of the Civil Defence personnel housed at Hendon County School. The letter stated that the Ministry had in view the possibility of the personnel being supplied with meals from a British Restaurant, if one could be established in this hall. It was pointed out that, as the alternative was the provision, at considerable expense, of a new building, and that should there be at any time enquiry into the extra expense involved in supplying a new building where there was a hall close to the site, the Council's own ruling in the matter would be regarded as the crucial point of decision. It was appreciated that during the period of adaptation of the Christchurch Hall for use as a British Restaurant the necessity would arise of feeding the personnel who take their meals there at present, and also the question of feeding them after the period of

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closure of the hall for the necessary structural alterations. The second portion of the letter dealt with the Council's proposals for the erection of brick buildings, and in this connection it was pointed out that general agreement had been reached with the Council's architect to the effect that Nashcrete huts should be supplied for all the proposed sites in Hendon for British Restaurants, and that as these huts are immediately available the Ministry would not now consider the erection of brick buildings. The proposals to build such brick structures were made during the period of uncertainty as to the time which would be taken in obtaining the Nashcrete huts. It was further stated that these huts are now in store in London and the firm is anxious to clear them by delivering to the Authorities requiring them. The time of erection was stated to be from six to eight weeks, and, in these circumstances, the Ministry suggested that the Council would be best served by taking Nashcrete buts and abandoning the proposal to erect brick buildings.

The Chief Officer, Meals Service, reported that Christchurch Hall was in the occupation of Civil Defence personnel, and, having regard to their requirements, as set out in a letter from Dr. Livingston, it was not possible to provide their meals from a British Restaurant. Furthermore, it had not been found possible to obtain alternative accommodation.

With regard to the provision of Nashcrete huts, the Borough Surveyor reported that estimates for the erection of these huts had already been prepared, as previously reported (Minutes 13/4/42—17). The Borough Surveyor stated that, as the British Restaurant at Cressingham Road is to accommodate 150 persons, he would prepare estimates for this Restaurant for submission to the Ministry of Food.

After consideration, it was

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the previous decision of the Council to erect four brick buildings for use as British Restaurants (Minutes, page 347) be varied to provide for the erection of Nashcrete huts at Montrose Avenue, Cricklewood Lane and Brent Street;

### REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENCE COMMITTEE.

to the Meeting of the

### HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors

of the Borough of Hendon.

Ladies and Gentlemen.

Since the last meeting of the Council the Committee has met on the 6th and 20th May, 1942.

### 1.-AWARDS FOR GALLANTRY:

The Committee has noted with satisfaction that Section Leader II. Harris and Leading Fireman Cyril Davis have been awarded the British Empire Medal in recognition of the conspicuous service rendered by them when, as members of the Hendon Fire Service, they assisted in the disposal of an unexploded land mine.

### 2.- INVASION DEFENCE SCHEME:

An invasion defence scheme to implement the Government's policy of enlisting the co-operation of the civil population in resisting any attempt at invasion by the enemy is being set up within the Borough, and the Regional Commissioners have appointed the Controller as the local Invasion Defence Officer. Full use will be made of the Civil Defence Organisation.

### 3.—WOMEN'S VOLUNTARY SERVICES:

The Committee has interviewed the W.V.S. Administrator for Group 6C and her deputy in regard to the proposed reorganisation of the Hendon Section of the Women's Voluntary Services, which consists of the division of the Borough into four areas under the direction of area organisers, who will report direct to the sub-group administrator.

The appointment of a "Hendon Borough President" was also proposed, which officer would discharge locally functions similar to those of Lady Craig as county organiser—i.e., making social contacts, etc.

The representatives of the Women's Voluntary Services were informed that the scheme of reorganisation as submitted did not meet with the approval of the Committee, and a request was made that it should receive further consideration.

### 4.—CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL AND THE GENERAL WAR EFFORT:

The instructions of the Regional Commissioners have been received in regard to the method of carrying out the Government's policy for enabling Civil Defence personnel at present engaged on a whole-time basis to make a more active contribution to the general war effort.

In view of substantial cuts recently made in the whole-time strength of the Rescue, Ambulance and First Aid Post Services, no further reduction to the whole-time establishment of these Services is proposed, except such as may be possible by the replacement of whole-time by part-time personnel.

An over-all cut of one-third is to be made in the present paid establishment of the Wardens' Service, one-fifth of the present strength being made available for immediate release. The release of the balance will be decided upon after consultation with the Regional Commissioners.

An over-all cut of approximately one-half of the present paid establishment is to be made in Report and Control Centre staffs. A revised establishment will be fixed by the Commissioners after consultation with Controllers in the light of any reductions in strength already made.

Whole-time personnel remaining in the Services may be granted "short term releases" in rotation, so that the release of any one person does not exceed four weeks, and not more than one-third of the paid establishment of any one Service is released at any one time. Personnel so released are to be required to sleep in their depots as part-time volunteers at least one night per week.

### 5.—RECREATIONAL AND VOCATIONAL TRAINING:

A local Recreational and Vocational Training Committee has been set up to coordinate all recreational and vocational training throughout the Civil Defence Services in the Borough, and to act in co-operation, via group and sub-group, with London Region.

### 6.—POWERS OF SCHEME-MAKING AUTHORITY:

Notice has been given that at the next meeting of the London (Outer) Civil Defence Standing Joint Committee this Council's representatives will move—

"That the London (Outer) Civil Defence Region Standing Joint Committee press County Councils in the Region to delegate their powers as scheme-making authorities to Local Authorities within their respective areas."

### 7.—OPERATIONAL CONTROL OF INCIDENTS:

The Regional Commissioners have approved in principle the cessation of the permanent manning of the Mill Hill Report Centre, and to its being placed on a care and maintenance basis.

### **B.**—HENDON EMERGENCY HOSPITAL:

The Committee has intimated its willingness to accede to the request of the Deputy Group Officer of the Ministry of Health Emergency Hospital Scheme that the Council's Deputy Medical Officer of Health should assist in the Emergency Section of the Hendon Isolation Hospital.

### 9.—AMBULANCE SERVICE:

The establishment for the Ambulance Service has now been fixed as under:-

Vehicles: 28 ambulances; 8 sitting wounded cars.

Personnel: 56 ambulance drivers; 56 attendants; 15 car drivers.

Two of the county reserve of ambulances have also been posted to the Borough, making a total of 30 vehicles in this class.

### 10.—WARDENS' ORGANISATION:

. The Committee has appointed Mr. R. H. Templeman to discharge the duties of Staff Officer to the Wardens' Organisation on the expiration of the period of deferment of entry into military service granted to the present Staff Officer, Mr. L. J. C. Hart.

### 11.- EMERGENCY FEEDING:

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The Ministry of Food is being urged to sanction expenditure on materials, and to secure permits for obtaining supplies of steel to enable demonstrations to be given in the crection and working of emergency cooking stoves, so that they may be rapidly constructed in any area in which essential services are interrupted as a result of aerial attack.

### 12.- CHRIST CHURCH HALL-USE AS BRITISH RESTAURANT:

The Committee has agreed to the establishment of a British Restaurant in Christ Church Hall, provided that satisfactory arrangements are made for feeding the Civil Defence personnel attached to the Hendon County School Depot, for which purpose the hall is now in use.

### 13.-DAY NURSERIES:

The Committee has noted with pleasure that the three Day Nurseries in the Borough have been supplied with a varied assortment of toys made by the personnel of the Rescue Service in their spare time from salvaged materials.

### 14.—RESPIRATOR CENSUS:

A further census of civilian respirators in the Borough will be conducted by members of the Wardens' Service at the beginning of June.

### 15.—GAS CLEANSING:

The four public gas cleansing stations are now equipped, and will be staffed by members of the Wardens' Service.

In conjunction with the Women's Voluntary Services, arrangements are being made for the cleansing of gas contaminated persons at private houses throughout the Borough, and a canvass of households is proceeding.

### 16.—AIR RAID SHELTERS:

(a) Control of Access.—The necessary authority has been obtained to the fixing of locking devices to enable members of the public to gain access to the shelters in emergencies by the breaking of glazed panels on the doors of all public shelters. It is hoped in this way to check the pilfering and misuse of the shelters, and also to reduce expenditure on cleansing.

Instructions have been given for the work to proceed forthwith.

(b) Watling and West Hendon Parks.—In view of the damage being done at night-time in the various parks in the Borough, which it is not possible to close in view of access to public shelters being necessary at all hours, the Committee recommended that the entrances to Watling and West Hendon Parks be closed at night-time, and that night watchmen at the rate of one per gate be placed on duty during this period to ensure immediate access to the shelters on the sounding of an "alert."

As locking devices are being fixed on the doors of the shelters in these parks (see paragraph (a) above), the recommendation for the closing of the Watling and West Hendon Parks is being withdrawn.

(c) Generally.—Work in connection with the concreting, waterproofing, etc., of Anderson shelters in the Borough has been undertaken in approximately 490 cases during the past four weeks. During this period 16 indoor shelters have been issued, bringing the total issue of this type of shelter to 4,620.

The strengthening of 64 out of a total of 109 communal shelters has been completed; work is proceeding on a further 34. The installation of electric lighting in this type of shelter is proceeding.

### 1.—BROADFIELDS AVENUE SCHOOL:

### (a) Report of Architect:

Good progress has been made, and it is now possible to visualise the completion of the building. The heating is on, and the lagging of the pipes practically completed. Granolithic floors are being laid satisfactorily. Wall tiling is virtually complete, and the plasterers are finishing off. The bungalow is finished except for certain small items. Teak floors are down in two classrooms and work is proceeding on the other floors. With the exception of the field drains the drainage is almost complete.

Noted with satisfaction.

### (b) Air Raid Shelters:

Pursuant to Item 1 (c) in the Sub-Committee's Report dated 24/3/42, further consideration was given to the question of heating, lighting and ventilating the air raid shelters at this school.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

# THAT the Board of Education be again urged to approve the above-named work, so that it may be ready for the winter season.

The Surveyor reported that better progress has been made with the construction of these air raid shelters during the past month, although there are only eight men employed on the job. The soil drainage has been completed for four of the shelters and excavation work completed for one. The contractors have been impressed with the necessity for speeding up the work so that the shelters may be ready for use in August next.

### (e) Nursery Class:

The Director of Education reported that he had had a telephone conversation with the Child Care Officer, Board of Education, who stated that he was prepared to recommend the Board to approve the completion of the Nursery block for the purpose of organising a War-Time Nursery Class for children of women workers employed on munitions. The amended Order provides, inter alia, that no subsistence allowance shall be paid to any person in respect of the performance of fire-watching duties who lives in a building comprising part of the school premises. For this purpose a person shall be deemed to be living in a building if he normally sleeps there on not less than three nights a week. The Borough Treasurer has been in touch with the Regional Commissioner for London, who has ruled that school caretakers who live in school houses, cottages or bungalows attached to the premises in which they do firewatching duties are not eligible to receive subsistence allowance in respect of such duties.

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# PUBLIC HEALTH AND MEDICAL SERVICES. (Alderman W. M. Maughan, J.P. — Chairman.)

### Part I .- Medical Services.

### 20.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936, PART VII.—CHILD LIFE PROTECTION:

The Medical Officer reported on an application (Case No. 319) for permission to undertake for reward the nursing and maintenance of a child under nine years of age apart from its parents.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the maximum number of foster children that may be kept at the premises be fixed at one.

### Case No. 288.

It was reported that an application had been received from a foster-mother (Case No. 288) notifying change of address, and applying for permission to be registered to have the care and maintenance of one foster child at her new premises.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the number of foster children to be kept in respect of the new premises be fixed at one.

### 21,-MISS WEBSTER-MIDWIFE:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that Miss Webster, one of the Council's midwives, had completed a course on Analgesia, and had also been granted permission to take a pupil midwife to qualify her to become a candidate for a Teacher's Certificate in Midwifery. As the introduction of analgesia would prove useful in suitable cases, the Medical Officer of Health recommended that Miss Webster be provided with the appropriate type of apparatus. The Medical Officer further stated that he hoped to have two further midwives trained in this work, in order to extend this facility, if possible. The Committee were of opinion that the relief midwife should be the first to be trained, and thereafter the training of others could be proceeded with.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Miss Webster be provided with the appropriate type of apparatus for introducing analgesia, at an approximate cost of £14 10s., and that the arrangements for training two further midwives be approved.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

### 22.—REGISTRATION OF NURSING HOMES-NO. 27, THE PARK, GOLDERS GREEN:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on an application from Miss Emma Nichol for registration, pursuant to the provisions of Section 187 of the Public Health Act. 1936, of the above premises as a nursing home. The application is in substitution of that previously considered by the Committee for the registration of No. 2, The Park, which has since been found to be unsuitable (P.H. & M.S., 30/3/42—Item 4 (b)). The applicant is prepared to have such structural work done as is considered necessary, and to provide adequate staff and equipment.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Miss Emma Nichol be registered in respect of the premises known as "Heather House," No. 27, The Park, Golders Green, N.W. 11, provided the house, when ready for occupation, complies with Section 187 of the Public Health Act, 1936, and the Council's bye-laws relating to nursing homes.

### 23.—DENTAL CASES—EXPECTANT MOTHERS:

The Medical Officer of Health informed the Committee that in many cases expectant mothers requiring dental treatment could more appropriately be dealt with if admitted to hospital than at the Council's dental general anaesthetic sessions, and suggested that, as the E.M.S. side of the Isolation Hospital is very little used, such cases could, subject to the consent of the Emergency Medical Service of the Ministry of Health, be admitted to the Hospital. A letter from the Ministry of Health was submitted, stating that there would be no objection to the admission of such cases the night before for pre-medication, on condition that the beds were not required for casualties, and that arrangements were made which would secure that the whole cost is borne by the Council—i.e., that the bed days should be charged on Form A.G. 135 to the Council and not to the Ministry. The Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the proposals outlined by the Medical Officer of Health regarding the admission of expectant mothers requiring dental treatment to the Hendon Emergency Hospital be approved.

### @mendment

Before detailed consideration of the motion, the Finance and General Purposes Committee Recommend—That the following words be added:

"and that such patients be required to pay a charge for such facility, fixed at a uniform figure to be determined by the Borough Treasurer in consultation with the Medical Officer of Health and to be subject to the Council's economic scale."

## 24.—HEALTH CENTRES, WAR-TIME NURSERIES AND ISOLATION HOSPITAL—ROTA OF VISITORS:

The following report was submitted with regard to the visits to the Health Centres, War-Time Nurseries and the Hospital on the 2nd June, 1942:—

"We, the undersigned members, submit the following report of an interim visit made to the following on Tuesday, the 2nd day of June, 1942. The following were visited:—

Central Hendon Centre; Frith Manor Child Welfare Centre; Watling Maternity and Child Welfare Centre; Addington House Day Nursery; Hyde Nursery School; The Isolation Hospital;

At all the Centres we found the work proceeding satisfactorily, and the parents expressing their gratitude for the services they were receiving.

### ADDINGTON HOUSE DAY NURSERY:

We wish particularly to draw attention to the pathways at this Centre, which are at present covered with cinders, in which several pieces of glass were found. This obviously is a menace to the children, and we strongly recommend that the cinder paths be replaced by concrete. By the entrance gate a strand of wire appears to be missing from the fence, leaving a gap through which children can easily get in, and we ask for the speedy replacement of this. We also suggest that the pram shed, which is obviously inadequate, should be enlarged. We further recommend that the downstairs lavatory at this Centre be covered with line, and that shelving be placed in the upstairs lavatory above the draining board.

### HYDE NURSERY SCHOOL:

We were particularly pleased with the Hyde Day Nursery School, where both children and staff seemed to be very happy amid most agreeable surroundings.

### ISOLATION HOSPITAL:

Attention was drawn to the verandah of Ward Pavilion 6, where subsidence of the flagstones has resulted in a very uneven surface, which causes difficulty in the movement of beds and damages the rubber tyres of bed-wheels. We recommend that this paving be relaid. In view of the large amount of vegetable produce now being grown at the Isolation Hospital, it is anticipated that the store which is about to be built will prove too small, and we recommend that consideration be given to increasing the capacity of this store to a size sufficient to fully meet the anticipated requirements.

We were pleased to note that the decorations in the administrative block were in progress."

After consideration the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, on the undstanding that the costs involved cannot be charged to public funds, authority be given for the four lady members of the Committee, if they so desire, and such lady members of the Public Health Department staff as can be spared to attend the Conference.

### HENDON ISOLATION HOSPITAL

27.—LETTER FROM THE HYDE COUNCIL ESTATE TENANTS' ASSOCIATION:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Hon. Secretary of the above-named Association asking that a deputation be received, consisting of staff from the Hendon Emergency Hospital and two members of the Hyde Tenants' Association, in connection with the application of Mrs. Liebert for appointment as Matron. The Committee were of opinion that no useful purpose could be served by receiving the deputation, and accordingly

RESOLVED-That no action be taken in the matter.

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# 28.—FIRE PRECAUTIONS AT HOSPITALS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on the action taken to comply with the Ministry of Health Circular of the 17th April drawing attention to the importance of ensuring that hospital fire appliances are maintained in satisfactory working order, and requesting that arrangements be made for regular inspection of the fire-fighting equipment. Prior to the nationalisation of the Fire Brigade Service this work was undertaken by the Council's Brigade, and in order to avoid setting up an organisation to deal with the maintenance of fire equipment at the Hospital the Borough Surveyor had communicated with the National Fire Service and the Commander of Fire Force Area No. 35 has issued instructions for the continuation of this service on the same basis as obtained prior to the nationalisation of the Brigade. The Borough Surveyor further reported that arrangements were being made for an officer of his department to be in attendance at these inspections, and that a periodical report would be submitted to the Committee.

RESOLVED That the action of the Borough Surveyor be approved.

#### 29.—WAR DAMAGE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an amended plan which had been prepared in consultation with the Medical Officer of Health for the rebuilding of the section of Ward Pavilion No. 4, destroyed by enemy action in 1940. Certain improvements to the original plan were suggested by the Ministry of Health when approval was given to the rebuilding, but it was considered that these suggestions did not go far enough. The rebuilding now presents the opportunity to provide the ward kitchen in a central position, with the sister's duty room controlling the older section, and the present remaining ward kitchen and duty room to become a general duty room controlling the newer section. It was stated that the estimated cost of the work is £3.640, of which £3.200 is the approximate sum recoverable from the War Damage Commission.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the revised plan be approved and submitted to the Ministry of Health.
- (ii) That on receipt of the Ministry's approval of the revised plan, Messrs. A. Francis & Sons be appointed quantity surveyors for the work.
- (iii) That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to advertise for tenders in due course.

The Finance and General Purposes Committee point out that it is anticipated that the sum recoverable from the War Damage Commission will be by way of a "Cost of Works" payment, and that no financial assistance will be forthcoming pending the making of such a payment.

#### @mendment

Before detailed consideration of the motion therefore, the Finance and General Purposes Committee Recommend—That the following paragraph be added:—

"That the work shall not be commenced until the War Damage Commission have indicated their agreement as to the proportion of reinstatement to be included in the proposed rebuilding."

#### 30.—APPOINTMENT OF DEPUTY MATRON:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of eight applications for the post of Deputy Matron, and it was agreed that the candidates selected by the Medical Officer of Health be interviewed at a special meeting of the Committee to be held at 5.30 p.m. on Tuesday, the 16th June.

#### 31.—RECRUITMENT TO H.M. FORCES OF MEDICAL STAFFS OF HOSPITALS:

Ministry of Health Circular No. 2652, setting out the arrangements approved by the Army Council for the medical examination, prior to the actual date of call up of medical staffs of hospitals, etc., liable for military service was submitted and noted.

#### 32.-MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR NO. 2648;

The Medical Officer of Health reported on the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1942, and the above Circular, which accompanied the Regulations, prescribes a new procedure to be followed for supplying information to the County Medical Officer as to the tuberculosis history of women born in the years 1918-21 who are called before medical boards for enlistment in the Women's Auxiliary Forces.

The Minister appreciates that in some cases the new procedure will involve a rather heavier burden on the Local Authority and its officers, but expresses confidence that the Local Authorities will co-operate in supplying the necessary information.

The Medical Officer of Health informed the Committee that the necessary action is being taken to comply with the Regulations.

Noted.

## 33.—EXPRESS DAIRY COMPANY, LTD.—COMPLAINT OF DIRTY MILK BOTTLE:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that on the 21st May a pint bottle of pasteurised milk was submitted to his department by a customer of the above company, with a complaint regarding the dirty state of the inner surface of the bottle. It was presumed that the bottle was cleansed and the milk bottled at the Express Dairy Company's pasteurising depot at Clarement Road, Cricklewood. After hearing a report on the legal position, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That a letter in the strongest possible terms be sent to the Express Dairy Company, Ltd., and the full facts brought to the notice of the Ministry of Food and the Ministry of Health.

#### 34.—REMOVAL OF REFUSE AND FISH OFFAL:

The attention of the Committee was drawn to a case of the non-removal of an accumulation of fish offal which had given rise to obnoxious odours, and to the desirability of action being taken to remedy the position, and to obviate a recurrence of the cause of complaint.

RESOLVED—That the Senior Sanitary Inspector be instructed to deal with the matter forthwith, and to submit a report to the next meeting of the Committee, and that the question of the collection of trade refuse of this nature be referred to the Works and Fire Brigade Committee.

# Summer Holidays for Workers - Entertainments in Parks.

#### 1.--PLATFORMS IN PARKS:

The Borough Surveyor reported satisfactory progress with regard to the construction of platforms in Hendon and Watling Parks, and submitted a plan showing the general lay-out of the stage and seating accommodation. It was also reported that if a charge was to be made for the chairs a suitable fencing would be necessary as an enclosure, and if it was proposed to charge admission to the area reserved for dancing, similar fencing would be necessary. The Sub-Committee were of opinion that a charge of 6d. and 3d. should be made for admission to band performances and concerts, and an admission charge of 6d. to the dancing enclosure, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND accordingly.

#### 2. HIRE OF CHAIRS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that W. M. Shanley (Park Chairs No. 2), Ltd., are prepared to supply 500 iron chairs for each Park at a charge of 1s. per chair per month from June to September, the Council to be responsible for all loss or damage to chairs.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the hire of such chairs on the terms above indicated, and for the execution of a formal agreement.

#### 3.-LOUD SPEAKER EQUIPMENT:

It was reported that E. F. Ferris & Son are prepared to instal microphone and loud speaker equipment in each Park on alternate nights of the week, and to supply an attendant to connect and control the equipment, the charge to be £1 ls. per night. 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# 23.—PROPOSED SEWER-REAR OF HOUSES IN THE GREENWAY, HENDON:

The Committee interviewed a deputation, consisting of Councillor Cook, Councillor Ormsby Taylors, and officers from the Wembley Borough Council, regarding its proposals in connection with the construction of a surface-water sewer at Edgware Road, within the Borough of Hendon.

The deputation referred to the notice of objection lodged by the Hendon Council, and intimated that the scheme was a modified one to overcome the flooding of certain factories in the vicinity. The major and original scheme could not be approved by the Minister of Health during the present circumstances, and the deputation expressed the hope that Hendon would withdraw its objection to the modified scheme, which provided for the construction of a surface-water sewer from the Wembley district, crossing under the Edgware Road, and discharging into the stream at the rear of certain houses in The Greenway.

Certain technical details were discussed, and the deputation intimated that the Wembley Borough Council would be prepared to carry out various works to prevent erosion of the banks of the stream at the rear of the houses in The Greenway, and also to undertake certain works to the banks of the Silkstream to prevent flooding, the costs of the latter works to be reasonably divided between the two Councils.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the Council withdraw its objection to the proposed surface water sewer;
- (ii) That authority be given for the execution of an agreement with the Wembley Borough Council embodying the above terms;
- (iii) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a report by Miss J. Lawless, of the Women's Voluntary Service, regarding paper salvage during the month of May. In general, the work is proceeding steadily. There is some increase in the number of salvage stewards, further progress in appointing these and increasing the salvage is to be expected as soon as the new decentralisation scheme comes into full operation. Permit cards have been issued to approximately 164 salvage stewards; there are also many householders who assist in various ways.

The following are the approximate numbers of permit eards issued in the various Wards:---

Park, 30. Central, 4. West Hendon, —. Mill Hill, 15. Burnt Oak, 5. Edgware, 35. Garden Suburb, 40. Golders Green, 27. Child's Hill, 8.

In connection with this service, the Borough Surveyor reported that the W.V.S. had for some time past been running a depot in shop premises adjacent to the Royal Oak Public House, Temple Fortune. The depot forms a very useful local centre for the control of the street stewards scheme, the giving of information to the public, and general propaganda work, and would also be useful for exhibition purposes.

Subject to satisfactory arrangements being made with the owner, by which the use of the shop can be retained for the time being without rent, authority is required to carry out certain decorative repairs to the interior of the premises.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That Miss Lawless be thanked for her report and the assistance being given in connection with the collection of salvage;
- (ii) That authority be given for decorative repairs to be carried out to the shop premises at Temple Fortune, on the understanding that such premises can be retained without rent in connection with the salvage scheme.

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Before detailed consideration of the motion, the Finance and General Purposes Committee Recommend—That the following words be added to paragraph (ii) of the recommendation—

"and that application be made to the Middlesex County Council for approval to the carrying out of such decorative repairs."

#### 25.—SALVAGE OF RAGS:

The Borough Surveyor reported Circular No. 80 issued by the Ministry of Supply relating to the question of salvage and the collection of rags, and requesting local authorities to publish in the local Press a letter in a set form dealing with this subject.

A letter has accordingly been published, and approval is required to the action taken.

#### 26.—WEST HENDON SWIMMING POOL:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the Officer Commanding the Hendon Wing of the Air Training Corps, asking for permission to have the use of the above swimming pool on the evening of the 28th or 29th July for the purpose of a sports meeting.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That permission be given to the Hendon Wing, Air Training Corps, to have the use of the Pool on the evening of the 28th July, 1942.

# 27.—TRAVELLING FACILITIES—EXTENSION OF HOURS OF ISSUE OF WORKMEN'S TICKETS:

#### 2.—OUTBREAK OF FIRE:

The Chief Officer, Meels. Service, reported that an outbreak of fire occurred at the Restaurant early on Sunday morning, the 14th June. The counter was destroyed, the floor and decorations damaged, and two bot plates, one of which was on loan from the Briffault Range Company, irreparably damaged.

In reconstructing the counter it is proposed to instal a gas hot-plate already ordered for St. Peter's, and one electric hot-plate, and the Ministry of Food has been requested to provide this from the pool.

Two rescue squads, one from the Hendon Way Depot and one from Mill Hill Depot, repaired the floor on the Sunday afternoon, and delivered an electric hot-plate from store the following morning. In this connection the Committee wish to record their thanks to Mr. J. L. Pelham, Assistant A.R.P. Controller.

It was reported that the Borough Surveyor had installed a temporary counter and that all other necessary repairs were in hand. The Chief Officer, Meals Service, also referred to the manageress, Mrs. Owen (cook), and certain of the kitchen assistants, who worked all day on Sunday to clean the building in order to make possible the resumption of the normal service.

The cause of the outbreak is unknown. The Committee were informed that all replacements would be made by the Government.

The sum of £107 represents the difference between the original estimate and the lowest tender received.

#### 6.—OPENING DATE:

Consideration was given to the question of arrangements for the official opening of the Restaurant, and it was

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the opening ceremony be performed by his Worship the Mayor (Alderman R. A. B. Teare, M.B.E., J.P.) on Saturday, the 11th July, 1942, and that the Restaurant be opened to the public on Monday, the 13th July.
- (ii) That an ordinary tariff be provided on the opening day, at the usual charge.

#### 7.—VOLUNTARY HELPERS:

It was reported that the Women's Voluntary Services had offered to assist at this Restaurant, and it was agreed that such offer be accepted and the thanks of the Council accorded therefor.

#### \*8.-EDGWARE DISTRICT:

The Chief Officer, Meals Service, reported that the Harrow Urban District Council proposed to establish a British Restaurant at the Whitchurch Institute, at the corner of Whitchurch Lane and Buckingham Road, and that this Restaurant would be about three-quarters of a mile from the Council's proposed British Restaurant in this area. The Committee are of opinion that the Council's proposals to erect a British Restaurant on the site at Hale Lane adjacent to Penshurst Gardens should be proceeded with, and approved the site plan submitted by the Borough Surveyor.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit to the Ministry of Food plans and estimates for the proposed Restaurant on this site to accommodate 250 persons.

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# 9.-EDGWARE AND LITTLE STANMORE TOWNSWOMEN'S GUILD:

The Chief Officer, Meals Service, submitted a letter from the above Guild urgine the establishment of a British Restaurant at Edgware before the winter and intimating that members of the Guild would be willing to assist voluntarily.

RESOLVED. That the Cuild be informed that negotiations are proceeding for the provision of a Restaurant in the Edgware district and that the Council's thanks be conveyed to the Cuild for their offer of voluntary assistance.

#### 10,-GARDEN SUBURB:

A letter from the Hampstead Garden—Suburb Residents' Association was submitted suggesting two sites for the establishment—of a British Restaurant as follows:--

- (a) Adjacent to Temple Fortune or Bridge Lane;
- (b) Adjacent to Falloden Way or at Lyttelton Playing Fields.

Alternatively, it was suggested that a Restaurant jointly run by Hendon and Finchley might be provided at Childs Way School or the Church Hall, in Northway.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the Finchley Borough Council be approached on the matter;
- (ii) That further enquiries be made with regard to the suitability of the Orpheum Restaurant, and that the Borough Surveyor be requested to submit a report as to the adaptability of the heating system.

# 11.—CLOSURE OF BRITISH RESTAURANTS—MINISTRY OF FOOD CIRCULAR L.W.M.D. 46:

Consideration was given to the following extract from the above Circular:-

"Local Authorities are asked to take notice that where meals are sent out to factory workers from British Restaurants, this service must be continued throughout public holidays and Sundays, as necessary, whether or not the Restaurant is open for service to the ordinary public. Authorities will probably find it advisable to make enquiries at factories so served, in advance of public holiday periods, as to the demand for meals.

The opening of British Restaurants to the ordinary public during holiday periods is, of course, left to the discretion of Local Authorities, but the Ministry and the Local Authorities have to bear in mind the interests of any workers taking meals at, or from, the restaurant, and for whom special arrangements ought to be made."

The Committee were informed that the necessary action would be taken to comply with the terms of the Circular.

#### 12.—NASHCRETE HUTS, CRESSINGHAM ROAD SITE:

A letter was considered from the Ministry of Food stating that the Ministry of Works and Buildings had requested the Ministry of Food to reduce as far as possible building programmes in brick on account of labour shortage, and asking the Council to reconsider the erection of a Nashcrete hut at Cressingham Road.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

(i) That a deputation, consisting of the Chairman (Councillor F. J. Collins), Gouncillors F. H. Bate, A. W. Curton and L. Hirshfield, together with the Chief Officer, Meals Service, and the Borough Surveyor, be appointed to attend at the Ministry of Food at an early date, with a view to obtaining the Minister's approval to the erection of a brick building at the Cressing ham Road site in lieu of a Nashcrete hut:

(ii) That in the event of the Minister's inability to approve the erection of such building, authority be given for the immediate erection of a Nashcrete hut.

# 13.- EQUIPMENT:

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### (a) Cutlery.

It was reported for information that a recent Ministry of Food Circular states that future supplies of spoons and forks will be made of timed iron instead of nickel. Noted.

#### (b) Dustbins.

With reference to the Committee's previous approval of the purchase of 54 dustbins at 15s. each (B.R.C., 11/5/42-Item 5 (d)), it was reported that the firm had made an error in the price quoted, which was for a smaller size dustbin. The price for the required size was 21s., and as this was the lowest quotation received the order had been confirmed.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken be approved.

#### (c) Storage.

In accordance with the Committee's previous decision (B.R.C., 11/5/42-Item 5 (f)), it was reported that the stables at Church End Farm, Greyhound Hill, had been rented as from the 17th May to house Ministry of Food equipment, at a rental of £1 per week, exclusive of rates. A garage, forming part of a building in Broadwalk Lane, Golders Green, is also being used as a temporary equipment store. It was also reported that a letter from the Ministry intimated that when the Restaurants were operating this sum should be divided among those whose equipment is being stored, and regarded as a running charge.

#### (d) Theft, Loss, etc., of Consumable Equipment.

A further extract from Ministry of Food Circular L.W.M.D. 46 was reported, in which it was emphasised that local authorities should at once take steps to ascertain the state of affairs in this respect in the British Restaurants under their control, and take any action deemed necessary. The Committee were informed that, in accordance with their previous decision in this matter (B.R.C., 11/5/42-Item 5 (b)), reward notices had been exhibited.

#### 14.—THE HYDE BRITISH RESTAURANT:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a schedule of tenders received for the conversion The lowest tender received of the shops at The Hyde into a British Restaurant. amounts to £1,810, whereas the estimate for the work prepared in March last amounted to £1,645 19s. 3d. It will therefore be necessary to obtain the approval of the Ministry of Food to the acceptance of the tender.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Food, the lowest tender received, viz., that of the Kent and Sussex Contractors, Ltd., amounting to £1,810, be accepted, and that authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed in due course to any necessary documents.

# MEMORANDUM BY THE CHAIRMAN OF THE SPECIAL (WAR-TIME ALLOTMENTS) COMMITTEE.

25th June, 1942.

# FOOD PRODUCTION WEEK.

I have to report for the information of the Council that a representative of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries has had an interview with my Committee, together with the Borough Treasurer and the Borough Engineer, and details regarding the inauguration of a Food Production Week, from the 15th to 20th August, inclusive, have been discussed. The main proposals outlined included the showing of various exhibits, films, books, poultry, rabbits, pigs, bees, etc., and also exhibitions of produce grown by members of the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies and by private residents in their own gardens. The Ministry's representative submitted a comprehensive schedule of notes on organisation, and explained the various matters upon which the Ministry would be willing to render assistance and co-operation to help towards the success of the proposed exhibition.

The Committee have made preliminary enquiries in connection therewith, including:

Hire of marquees.

Camouflage of Marquees.

Co-operation with Hendon Allotment Societies.

Gas and Electric Light Companies to hold demonstrations of War-Time Cookery, Royal Horticultural Society (Photographic Exhibitions).

Trade Seed Growers.

Nursery Produce.

Pigs.

Bee-keeping.

Consideration was given to the question of the Ministry's co-operation by way of financial assistance regarding the cost of the hire of marquees, the provision of petrol for transport purposes; advertising, etc., and the Committee were given an assurance on these matters by the Ministry's representative, as follows:—

Marquees.-Ministry will bear cost of hire.

Transport.—Ministry will support representations to the Ministry of Mines to secure release of petrol for transport.

Advertising.—Ministry will supply street banners, posters, advertising, etc.

Speakers, etc.—The Ministry will arrange for popular speakers.

After consideration the Committee were of opinion that a Saturday would be the best day for opening, and it has been agreed that the exhibition be opened on Saturday, the 15th August, for a period of six days, ending on Thursday, the 20th August, 1942.

It was suggested that a small two-leaf programme be issued for sale, and it has been provisionally agreed that an admission charge of 6d, each person be made.

The Director of Education, who attended the meeting, expressed his willingness to co-operate as far as possible in the scheme, and stated that, as the exhibition was being held during the school holiday period, the Burroughs Playing Fields could be made available, and chairs and trestle tables provided, subject to the consent of the Education Committee, and the Committee has decided to make application to the Hendon Education Committee accordingly.

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In conclusion, my Committee are of opinion that the Council should be asked to. approve in principle the proposals outlined in connection with the Food Production Week, on condition that all necessary expenditure be charged to the War-Time Allotments Account, and not to the General Rates Account.

# REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENCE COMMITTEE

# HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Hendon.

Ladies and Gentlemen.

Since the last meeting of the Council the Committee has met on the 3rd and 17th June, 1942.

# 1.-VISIT OF REGIONAL COMMISSIONER:

On the 25th June Admiral Sir Edward Evans, K.C.B., D.S.O., Commissioner of the London Civil Defence Region, inspected two depots, a first aid post and a fire station in the Borough, and addressed a parade of Civil Defence personnel.

# 2.—CAPTAIN A. G. PETRIE:

On the occasion of the birthday of His Majesty the King, Captain A. G. Petrie was appointed a member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, in recognition of his services to the Borough as Chief Warden from July, 1939, to July, 1941.

The Committee has tendered its warmest congratulations to Captain Petrie.

# 3.—WOMEN'S VOLUNTARY SERVICES:

In regard to the proposals for the reorganisation of the Hendon Section of the Women's Voluntary Services, a communication has been addressed to the Dowager Marchioness of Reading, D.B.E. (President of the Women's Voluntary Services) stating that in the opinion of the Committee:—

- (1) There should be one Women's Voluntary Services' representative—whether called "centre organiser" or by some other title—at Borough level.
- (2) The appointment should be made in consultation with the Local Authority, as contemplated in Home Office Circular of 24th June, 1938, and should be of a lady well known and respected locally.
- (3) Having been appointed in consultation with the Local Authority, the representative should not be removed except in consultation with that Authority.

# 4.—A.R.P. STAFF—COST OF LIVING BONUS:

Representations are being made to the Middlesex County Council that the cost-ofliving bonus payable to clerical staff engaged on A.R.P. duties should be at the same rate as that approved for the Council's staff generally.

# 5.-TRAINING:

A practice with mustard gas, arranged by Officers of the Air Ministry and Ministry of Production, was held in the Borough on the 23rd May. Members of the Rescue and Decontamination Services worked in a high concentration for a prolonged period, and gained complete confidence in the effectiveness of their anti-gas clothing and equipment. It is hoped to arrange for further tests of this nature in the future.

Basic training lectures are being given to members of the Women's Voluntary Services throughout the Borough.

6.—RESCUE SERVICE—TRANSPORT: The Regional Commissioners are not prepared to accede to a request for the provision of a stand-by vehicle for use by the Rescue Service at each of the two rescue depots in the Borough. It is understood that special reserve vehicles held by the County Council will be made available in a short space of time, in the event of any of the Council's vehicles becoming immobilised.

Mr. E. Jared has been appointed second-in-charge of the Rescue and Decontamination Service, consequent upon the departure of Mr. P. F. Croysdill to take up an appointment under the Government of India.

### 7.—AMBULANCE SERVICE:

In future Civil Defence ambulances will attend any non-enemy-action fires where it is reported that lives are endangered or persons are in buildings which are on fire and the attendance of ten or more pumps is necessary.

# 8.- WARDENS' ORGANISATION:

No further appointment to the post of Principal Warden is to be made following the resignation of the Hon. Arthur Howard. The Council is now fully responsible for its Wardens' Service as for its Civil Defence General Services, subject to the general direction of the Regional Commissioners.

# 9.—PROTECTED SLEEPING ACCOMMODATION AT DEPOTS:

The erection of buildings to provide protected bunk accommodation at the Mill Hill and Hendon Way depots is progressing.

Plans for similar accommodation at the John Groom's Crippleage and Clitterhouse ambulance depots have been deposited for the approval of the Middlesex County Council.

# 10.—DECONTAMINATION LAUNDRIES:

Tenders submitted by Messrs. E. S. Moss, Ltd., amounting to £230 and £295 (being the lowest tenders received) for work necessary to provide for the decontamination of civilian clothing at the premises of the Advance Linen Services, Ltd., and the Colindale Laundry Company, Ltd., respectively, have been provisionally accepted, and await the approval of the County Council.

# 11.—EMERGENCY FEEDING AND SPECIAL EVACUATION SCHEMES:

(a) Use of Schools.—Seven schools in the Borough were earmarked at the outbreak of hostilities by the Ministry of Works and Buildings, and that Ministry is not willing to vary the arrangements made with the Council for the schools to be available for the Ministry's purposes at short notice. In consequence, the Ministry of Food states that approval cannot be given to expenditure totalling €245 5s. on the preparation of these seven schools as emergency feeding centres.

The Committee has advised the Ministry of Food, the Ministry of Home Security and the Ministry of Health of the impossibility of operating the Emergency Feeding and Special Evacuation Schemes without the use of these premises (which offer the only suitable accommodation for such purposes within their respective areas), and have lodged a protest at the refusal of the Ministry of Works and Buildings to relinquish its claim upon the premises. The Committee

 ${
m RECOMMEND}$ —That the seven schools be prepared for use as emergency feeding centres, at the estimated cost of £245 5s.

(Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal. The Finance Committee also suggests that in the event of the sanction to the expenditure not being forthcoming the respective Ministries be requested to receive a deputation.)

(b) Emergency Cooking Stoves.—Arrangements are being made for an officer of the Ministry of Food to give demonstrations in the erection and working of emergency cooking stoves to Boy Scout, Girl Guide and kindred associations.

# 12.—AIR RAID SHELTERS:

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Work in connection with the concreting, waterproofing, etc., of Anderson shelters in the Borough has been undertaken in approximately 236 cases. During this period 33 indoor shelters have been issued, bringing the total distribution in the Borough of this type of shelter to 4,669.

The strengthening of 64 out of a total of 109 Communal shelters has been completed, and work is proceeding on a further 28.

# 1.—BROADFIELDS AVENUE SCHOOL:

# (a) Report of Architect.

The seven classrooms are now finished. Staffrooms, etc., are practically finished, only a few skirtings and architraves remaining to be fixed, and a very small amount of wall tiling to be done. The fillets for the assembly hall floor are now being fixed, and the floor will probably be laid down very shortly. Granolithic floors are progressing well. Drainage is complete. The caretaker's bungalow is ready for occupation.

# (b) Air Raid Shelters.

Pursuant to Item 1 (b) in the report of the Sub-Committee dated 2/6/42, a communication was submitted from the Board of Education stating that the Board are at present unable to approve further proposals for the installation of heating and electric lighting in school shelters except in areas where daylight alerts are both frequent and prolonged. In the absence of any evidence that such conditions exist in the Authority's area, the Board are unable to depart from their previous decision.

The Committee are of opinion that the necessity for heating, lighting and ventilating these air raid shelters is of vital importance, and

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT, subject to it being possible to obtain the necessary materials, the Borough Engineer be instructed to arrange for the work of heating, lighting and ventilating the air raid shelters at Broadfields Avenue Council School to be put in hand forthwith, and that authority be given for the chairmen of the Education Committee and the Works Sub-Committee to interview officers of the Board of Education with regard thereto.

# ADDENDUM:

The Director of Education reported that, after a telephone conversation with the appropriate officer of the Board of Education, the Board were unable to add anything further to the decision mentioned above.

The Borough Engineer reported that work on construction of these shelters is proceeding as rapidly as the supply of labour will permit. At present there are 11 men employed on the job. At date excavation work has been completed for four shelters, the foundation for two and the reinforced concrete brickwork for one.

# (e) Tar Paving of Playground and Accommodation Road.

THAT the Architect be authorised to accept, on behalf of the Education Committee, the tender of the General Asphalt Company, Ltd., at 4s.  $10\frac{1}{2}$ d. per yard for tar paving and 5s.  $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. per yard for tar macadam, and that the Town Clerk be instructed to arrange for the execution of the contract and for the Corporate Seal to be affixed thereto.

The estimated total amount involved is £723 12s., subject to measurement at completion. The above-named firm attach a clause to their tender covering rise in cost of material and/or labour. The tender is also subject to it being possible to obtain the necessary material.

# (d) Air Vent Heater Company, Ltd.

The Architect submitted an account from the above-named firm, amounting in the aggregate to £1,323 14s., in respect of heating installation, together with the report of the quantity surveyors thereon.

The Committee are of opinion that the above-named firm are entitled to some additional payment in respect of increased costs of labour and materials, etc., in connection with the installation of the heating system at Broadfields Avenue School, and instructed the Architect to arrange for the quantity surveyors to investigate the claim further, and report thereon in due course.

# ADDENDUM:

It was reported that the Board of Education had given further consideration to the proposal to complete the nursery block at Broadfields Avenue School. The Board have been informed by the Ministry of Labour and National Service that facilities for a War-time Nursery Class for children of mothers in employment are desirable in the locality. The Board are therefore prepared to approve the Authority's proposals so far as the nursery block is concerned, and will be prepared to take into account for grant the estimated expenditure of £1,900, subject to the conditions mentioned.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that Miss Morrison, who had been a most assiduous voluntary worker at the Child Welfare Centres for more than 20 years, has taken full-time employment, thus precluding her continuance with child welfare activities.

- (a) That the Council do place on record its keen appreciation of the valuable services rendered by Miss Morrison in a voluntary capacity in connection with the Council's child welfare activities, extending over a period of more than twenty years;

#### 24.—CONVALESCENT HOME FOR MOTHERS AND BABIES:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of a letter from the Ministry of Health intimating that a post-natal hostel of 50 beds, staffed by the Mothercraft Training Society, is established at Panshanger Park, near Hertford. Hitherto the hostel has been reserved for the reception of evacuee mothers and their babies, but arrangements have now been made for similar facilities to be extended to non-evacuee mothers in some parts of Region V., whether confined institutionally or not. Only

mothers needing no more than general convalescent care and management of feeding difficulties can be admitted. The maintenance cost will be 8s. 1d. per day, and Welfare Authorities must undertake to reimburse the Hertfordshire County Council at this rate, and also be responsible for the cost of transport to and from the hostel of cases from their areas. They must undertake responsibility for any financial arrangements in connection with the recovery of either part or all of these costs. It was requested that notification be given in the event of the Council being desirous of taking advantage of the facilities offered.

The Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the matter be left in the hands of the Medical Officer of Health, with authority to take advantage of the facilities offered as and when necessary.

### 25.—HEALTH CENTRES, WAR-TIME NURSERIES AND ISOLATION HOSPITAL:

The following report was submitted with regard to the visits to the Health Centres, War-Time Nurseries and the Hospital on the 6th July, 1942:—

We, the undersigned Members, submit our report on an interim visit made to the following on Thursday, the 2nd day of July, 1942:—

Central Hendon Centre.
Mill Hill Child Welfare Centre.
Watling Maternity and Child Welfare Centre.
Addington House Day Nursery.
Hyde Nursery School.
The Isolation Hospital.

The activities in progress at the various centres—i.e., diphtheria immunisation, orthopædic treatment, dental treatment and child welfare—proved to be extremely interesting, and we found the work in connection therewith proceeding very satisfactorily.

We wish to draw attention to the three skylights in the corridor at the Watling Centre. It was pointed out that the permanent black-out arrangement for these skylights necessitated the continuous daytime use of electric light, and WE RECOMMEND that adjustable frames supported by hinges should be supplied and fixed, thus obviating the use of electricity.

#### War-Time Day Nurseries.

Visits were made to Addington House and the Hyde School Day Nurseries, where we were pleased to note that both children and staff were very happy.

As regards Addington House, it was noted that the strand of wire by the entrance gate, referred to in the last report of the Visiting Rota (2/6/42), is still missing, and we would urge the speedy replacement of this. WE FURTHER RECOMMEND that perforated zinc or gauze be affixed to the windows of the larder and the milk kitchen.

#### Isolation Hospital.

Attention was drawn to the lack of adequate ventilation in Ward No. 6, and we are of opinion that this could be remedied by the provision of electric fans in the ward. We accordingly RE-COMMEND that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to obtain an estimate of the cost, and to submit a report to the next meeting.

The Committee gave consideration to the question of the provision of uniforms for the Hospital male staff who are in constant touch with the public. It is understood that the Board of Trade have sanctioned the issue of such uniforms in the case of the two ambulance drivers and the gate porter, and orders have been placed accordingly. In the case of the gate porter, however, it was pointed out that no further issue of uniform may be made after the 31st August unless full coupon value is surrendered.

Orders for the uniforms indicated above have been placed, and we RECOMMEND that the action taken be confirmed.

It is also recommended that dungaree overalls and uniform caps be provided for the handy man and general porters for the performance of their ordinary duties, tegether with coat overalls when they are required to act as ambulance attendants, and also that dungarees be provided for the use of the carpenter.

## 28.—HENDON EMERGENCY AND ISOLATION HOSPITAL:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that up to the outbreak of war the Isolation Hospital consisted of a modern unit of 120 beds. A portion of the accommodation was allocated for Emergency Medical Services purposes, and the position now is that on the Emergency Medical side there are three wards, one of which is being partially used for civilian sick (the average number of patients over the last six months being 22), and two wards are retained for the admission of casualties consequent upon air raids or invasion. There remain for the isolation of infectious diseases one ward of 26 beds, another of 20 beds, and a cubicle block at present reduced to six cubicles owing to enemy action, and proposals have been submitted for the reconstruction of this block.

In the past it has been the custom to make provision for the reception of notifiable infectious diseases, particularly scarlet fever and diphtheria, and at the present time one of the wards is allocated to scarlet fever and the other to diphtheria, the cubicles, of course, taking other conditions, such as typhoid fever, cerebro-spinal fever, complicated cases of measles, etc. The facts are, however, that the incidence of diphtheria and scarlet fever have been particularly low, but at the present time the incidence of measles has been, and still is, abnormally high. This disease is usually nursed at home unless the case is complicated.

A new situation has, however, arisen by the employment of women in industry, and for the furtherance of the war effort it is felt that an endeavour should be made to provide at least limited accommodation for children suffering from either measles or whooping cough whose mothers are in war industry, by the transfer of cases of scarlet fever or diphtheria to other hospitals when the incidence of these latter diseases is low.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That suitable arrangements be entered into with other Authorities on the lines outlined by the Medical Officer of Health.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 29.-MRS, LIEBERT-ACTING MATRON:

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The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of a letter from Mrs. Liebert, acting matron at the Isolation Hospital, asking that consideration be given to the question of the adjustment of her salary in accordance with the matron's scale as from the date of her appointment.

In accordance with the Committee's instructions (P.H. & M.S., 8/6/42—34), the Senior Sanitary Inspector submitted a report on the case of the non-removal of an accumulation of fish offal referred to at the last meeting. It was pointed out that the offal had been removed on the morning of Tuesday, the 9th June, and that on the same day the proprietor of the premises was interviewed, when it was elicited that normally the offal would have been removed by his contractor on the previous Saturday, but that on this occasion the contractor's van did not arrive. The normal arrangements for the removal of offal from these premises is daily—Monday to Friday.

It was reported that during the present year only nine complaints of nuisance from trade refuse had been received, and these were in respect of eight premises—four fishmongers and four greengrocers.

Generally, throughout the district, the removal of offal from fishmongers' premises is by private arrangement, and is daily. Monday to Friday, with occasional Saturday removals, and from greengrocers two or three times weekly. The arrangements carried out in respect of caterers, provision merchants and butchers were outlined in the report and duly **noted.**

# 18,-KITCHEN AND CANTEEN ACCOMMODATION, TOWN HALL:

In accordance with instructions given at the last meeting, the Borough Treasurer submitted a further report hereon, and the Committee have referred the whole question of kitchen and canteen facilities in the Town Hall to a Sub-Committee consisting of the Chairman (Alderman H. The approximate effect of applying the decisions to all the frontagers will result in a rate charge of £1,179 11s. 2d. The Borough Surveyor has been asked to prepare the revised apportionments, and when these have been completed effect will be given to the Minister's decisions and sanction.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Treasurer be authorised to charge to Council's account the appropriate amount in accordance with the Minister's sanction.

The Council at its last meeting (F. & G.P.C., 22/6/42—27) decided to support the resolution passed by the Council of the Borough of Southall to the effect that the hours during which workmen's fares are issued should be extended until 8.30 a.m., and that such fares be made applicable to all types of vehicles within the area of the London Passenger Transport Board.

Letters have now been received from the Ministry of War Transport and the London Passenger Transport Board transmitting a copy of a question on the subject which was raised in Parliament, together with the reply of the Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of War Transport. The question and reply are as follows:—

"Mr. Thorne,—To ask the Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of War Transport whether he has considered the representations made by the Borough Council of Southall and the Southall Trades Council, and endorsed by many other county borough councils, asking for the hours during which workmen's fares are issued to be extended until 8.30 a.m., and that such fares be made applicable to all types of vehicles within the area and under the control of the London Passenger Transport Board; and what action he intends taking about the matter.

#### Mr. Noel-Baker:

- I have considered the representations to which my hon, friend refers, but I regret that I do not think it wise to modify the present practice.
- If workmen's tickets were issued up to 8.30 a.m. in the London area they would be used by many people who now take season and ordinary tickets, and the purpose of the specially low fare allowed on workmen's tickets would thus be defeated. The change might also cause passengers who now travel before 8 a.m. to travel later, and might thus lead to still greater pressure on services which at their loading peak are already heavily overtaxed.
- As I explained to my hon, friend, the Member for West Layton, on March the 18th last, the extension of workmen's tickets to London Transport omnibuses would tend to divert traffic to those omnibuses, and would thus lead to a demand for additional vehicles and staff, and to an increased consumption of motor fuel and tyres. For these reasons, I regret that I do not feel able to agree to such a change."

# 24,—REORGANISATION OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT:

The Committee have noted a communication from the Fleetwood Borough Council soliciting the support of the representatives of local authorities attending the Special General Meeting of the Association of Municipal Corporations on the 23rd July, to the following resolution, which the representatives of the Fleetwood Borough Council will move at the meeting:—

"That in view of the time and investigation essential to the proper consideration of reorganisation of local government, and the calls now made upon the local government service in connection with the national effort, this Association regards with apprehension the increasing tendency to devote attention to reorganisation of local government at the present time, and in the national interest now urges His Majesty's Government to take no further steps in this matter until the termination of hostilities."

# 25.—HENDON FOOD CONTROL COMMITTEE:

The term of office of the present Hendon Food Control Committee expires on the 3rd September next. In this connection the Committee considered a resolution passed by the Food Control Committee in the following terms:—

"That the Finance and General Purposes Committee of the Council be asked to recommend the Council on the 27th July, 1942, to reappoint the Food Control Committee for the period commencing the 3rd September, 1942."

Under Regulations made by the Ministry of Food, the Committee must consist of 15 members, of whom five shall be trade members. These five must be made up as follows:—

One butcher.

One grocer.

One officer of a retail Co-operative society.

Two representatives of other retail food trades.

The remaining 10 members (of whom two shall be women and one a representative of trade unions) shall be persons who, in the opinion of the Committee, are representative of all classes of persons within the area.

# 1.—APPOINTMENT OF CHAIRMAN:

His Worship the Mayor (Alderman R. A. B. Teare, M.B.E., J.P.) occupied the chair pro tem.

# 2.—INTERIM REPORT:

The Committee gave preliminary consideration to the matters coming within their terms of reference, and in particular the matters specifically referred to them by the Council set out under paragraph (ii) of the recommendation to Item 18 of the Report of the Buildings and Town Planning Section of Group I. Committee of the 8th June last (Minutes, page 449).

Under paragraph (e) of the specific reference the Committee are required to report on the implication of the development of the sites enumerated in paragraphs (a) to (d) on the town-planning schemes, including such matters as transport facilities, shopping sites, open spaces and other essential amenities. The Committee feel that this is too restricted in its terms, and are of opinion that its scope should be widened by the inclusion of sites other than those specifically mentioned. They accordingly

RECOMMEND—That the paragraph be amended to read: "The implication of the development of the sites enumerated above, and any other sites on the town planning schemes, including such matters as transport facilities, shopping sites, open spaces and other essential amenities."

The Committee understand that proposals for post-war development and reconstruction are at the present time receiving active consideration by the Government through the Government Departments concerned, and in particular the Ministry of Works and Planning and the Ministry of Health. Before proceeding further with their deliberations, therefore, the Committee deem it desirable to ascertain as far as possible the Government's policy in relation to post-war development and reconstruction, so far as it affects, or may affect, the activities of local authorities, and instructions have accordingly been given for such information to be obtained.



# HENDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Hendon.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Since the last meeting of the Council the Committee has met on the 1st and 15th July, 1942.

# 1.—WOMEN'S VOLUNTARY SERVICES:

The Committee was informed that the headquarters of the W.V.S. fully concurred in the views of the Council as set out in their previous report, and have expressed regret that a communication in reference to the proposed reorganisation of the W.V.S. in Hendon was not sent to the Council at an earlier date.

The valuable services rendered by Mrs. Lesty to the W.V.S. organisation were fully appreciated by headquarters, and it was desired to promote Mrs. Lesty to a sub-group appointment. Mrs. Lesty, however, has not found it possible to accept the office, and has tendered to headquarters her resignation as a member of the W.V.S.

# 2.—A.R.P. DEPOTS:

Sleeping, washing and sanitary, and messing and recreation accommodation for personnel at the various Civil Defence depots in the Borough is being reviewed following an alteration of the standards prescribed by the Ministry of Home Security.

# 3.—MAINTENANCE OF PART-TIME CARS:

Consequent upon the abolition of the basic petrol ration, arrangements have been made for the maintenance of part-time cars for gas identification and senior officers.

The Minister of Home Security has arranged for the W.V.S. Organisation to undertake the formation of volunteer car pools to ensure the maintenance of other essential part-time cars upon which Local Authorities and their officers are entitled to call for any purpose arising from emergency war work, such as billeting and evacuation work, emergency feeding and canteens, rest centres and care of the homeless, salvage, supplemental Civil Defence Services, information and administration centres, urgent education purposes and hospital purposes, where other suitable public transport is not available.

# 4.—DEPUTY MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH:

As a result of representations made to the Local Medical War Committee in relation to the retention of Dr. Livingston's services in Hendon, that Committee has decided not to transmit his name to the Central Medical War Committee at this stage.

# 5.—PROVISION OF MEALS:

The Committee has agreed in principle with representations being made by the Borough of Wembley that members of the Civil Defence General Services required to perform 24-hour duty periods should be provided with two free meals.

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# 6.—RECREATION:

A cricket team representing the Hendon Civil Defence Services reached the semi-finals of the Group 6 Cricket Competition.

A Hendon Civil Defence Sports Day has been arranged to take place on the Burroughs Playing Fields on Monday, 3rd August, 1942, at 2 p.m.

A Regional Sports Meeting, principally for whole-time Civil Defence personnel, will be held at Stamford Bridge on the 29th August, 1942.

#### 7.—CENSUS OF RESPIRATORS:

A total of 123,647 respirators were examined by members of the Wardens' Service during the respirator census carried out at the beginning of June, 1942; 3,651 respirators (approximately 3 per cent.) were found to require replacement due to damage, perishing, loss and other causes.

# 8.—AIR RAID SHELTERS:

In view of the persistent wilful damage to all types of shelter throughout the Borough, it is proposed to offer a reward of £1 to any person giving information which will result in a successful prosecution.

Work in connection with the concreting, waterproofing, etc., of Anderson shelters in the Borough has been undertaken in approximately 154 cases. During this period 40 indoor shelters have been issued, bringing the total to 4,709.

The work of lighting communal shelters is nearing completion. A further quantity of bunks has been received for installation in this type of shelter.

62 per cent. of the public shelters have now been fitted with glass panels to enable access to be gained to the shelters in emergencies.

# 9.—EMERGENCY FEEDING—USE OF SCHOOLS:

In regard to the communication addressed to the various Ministers pointing out the impossibility of operating the Council's emergency feeding scheme without the use of the seven schools earmarked by the Ministry of Works and Buildings, the Ministry of Food stated that it would not be possible to obtain the release of the schools in question. It would therefore be necessary for the Council to revise its emergency feeding scheme to provide adequate cover for the Borough without recourse to these premises. In view of this, the Committee directed that no action should be taken at present in regard to the preparation of the schools, for which the Council sanetioned an expenditure of £245 5s. at its last meeting.

Following an interview with representatives of the Ministry of Works and Buildings and Ministry of Food, information has been received that the views of the Council have been submitted for the further consideration of the Ministry of Works and Buildings, and that a further communication may be expected at an early date.

On consideration of the report of the Medical Officer of Health on an application from Mr. Leonard Coleman Hildebrand, M.R.C.Ch., of 19, Ashley Lane, N.W. 4, for a licence under the above-mentioned Act to carry on an establishment for massage or special treatment at No. 236, Station Road, Edgware, I authorised the issue of a licence for the period ending 31st March, 1943, to administer the following treatment in respect of conditions below the knee—

- (a) Chiropody.
- (b) Electro-therapy (infra red radiant heat and Faradism).
- (c) Foot massage and manipulation.

# 11.—STATIC WATER SUPPLIES:

# (a) Montrose Playing Fields.

At the request of the London Civil Defence Region tenders were obtained for the construction of a 250,000-gallon water tank in a corner of Montrose Playing Fields for the use of the National Fire Service. A tender was received from Messrs. Colerete, Ltd., amounting to £1,063–10s., and is being recommended for approval by the London Civil Defence Region.

Authority was given for the work to be put in hand on receipt of an approval from the National Fire Service undertaking to remove the tank and make good the park at the termination of the war, and also to make good any damage done to the park in laying mains in connection with this tank.

#### (b) Golders Hill Park.

It was also reported that the National Fire Service require an emergency water tank to be constructed in Golders Hill Park, the property of the London County Council.

I considered a letter from the London County Council giving the following conditions under which they are prepared to consent to the erection of the tank:—

- (1) The tank and foundation to be removed and the site reinstated to its former condition when so required by the Council.
- (2) No trees or shrubs to be removed or roots cut without the consent of the Chief Officer.
- (3) Any alteration to the boundary fence to be carried out to the satisfaction of the Chief Officer.
- (4) All surplus excavation to be removed from the site.
- (5) The works to be carried out without cost to the London County Council.
- (6) The London County Council to be indemnified against any accident or injury to its property or to third parties in consequence of the construction, maintenance and removal of the tank.

I gave authority for a communication to be addressed to the London Civil Defence Region regarding the indemnity to be given by the National Fire Service to cover the Corporation in connection with condition No. 6.

# (e) Junction of Montrose Avenue and Watling Avenue, Burnt Oak:

I also considered a report on the question of the erection of a circular static water tank on the London County Council's land at the junction of the above two roads. In this case also the London County Council lay down the following conditions:

- (a) No rent to be payable.
- (b) The occupying authority to be responsible for, and indemnify the County Council against, all liability for personal injury (whether fatal or otherwise), or damage to or loss of property, however caused (except where proved to have been caused by the neglect or default of the County Council, its servants or agents) arising out of the execution of any works or the use or occupation by the occupying authority or its servants or agents of any part of the site for civil defence purposes. Nothing in this clause shall impose upon the occupying authority any liability to the County Council for injury or damage arising out of King's enemy risks as defined for the purposes of Part II. of the War Risks Insurance Act, 1939.
- (c) Any expenditure as a result of this occupation, including general rates and water rates, to be borne by the occupying authority, and no expense to devolve upon the County Council.
- (d) The construction, maintenance and subsequent reinstatement to be to the County Council's satisfaction, and in such a manner as to ensure the safety and amenities of the County Council's property.
- (e) The occupying authority to remove the tank and reinstate the site and all disturbed work immediately upon the cessation of the present emergency or at any time upon receipt of three months" notice in writing from the County Council.

Authority was given for the London Civil Defence Region to be communicated with in respect of these conditions and the indemnity required from the National Fire Service in connection with Clause 2.

I gave authority for the following contracts to be placed for the construction of static water supplies, subject to the National Fire Service undertaking to repay the Corporation's expenditure in connection therewith:—

# II.—MEMORANDUM ON CLOSURE OF AND EXCLUSION FROM SCHOOL:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on the Addendum to the above Memorandum issued jointly by the Ministry of Health and the Board of Education. formed the Committee that since the last edition of the Memorandum was issued experience in infectivity and the cause of epidemies generally has suggested that the number of cases is not influenced to any appreciable extent by the exclusion of contacts, and it is realised that the loss of school life which this procedure involves does not result in any corresponding advantage to public health.

He further stated that recently he had, from his own experience, reduced the exclusion period for contacts of diphtheria and searlet fever from 14 to 10 days in the case of diphtheria, and from 14 to 7 days in the case of searlet fever, and that, in his opinion, the following recommendations should be adopted: —

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# III.—SCHOOL MEDICAL SERVICES — BOARD OF EDUCATION CIRCULAR NO. 1604:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of the above Circular, dated 28/8/42, asking, in view of the growing demands of the Forces, together with the need of safeguarding the health of young children whose mothers are in employment, that Local Authorities should again review their arrangements for the School Medical Service. Certain proposals by the Board of Education recommend that the inspection of the intermediate age group in the elementary schools should be discontinued because of the additional work thrown on medical departments by the admission of children at an early age and the rapid development of nursery classes and day nurseries. In order that this may to some degree be offset, it was suggested that more frequent visits should be paid to the schools by the school nurses, and that any case in need of medical advice should be referred to the School Medical Officer. It was also suggested that where nurses are employed on such work as head inspection and cleansing, and as dental attendants, that this should be discontinued.

The Medical Officer informed the Committee that this had been very largely carried out in this area, and recommended that an endeavour be made to continue with the intermediate inspection, which could be overtaken by a careful organisation of the medical work, and that only if it should prove impossible should it be discontinued.

#### 1.—BROADFIELDS AVENUE SCHOOL:

# (a) Report of Architect:

This school was officially opened on 24th August, 1942, although there were various items which were not quite completed. The playgrounds and access road are now finished. Work has commenced on the completion of the nursery unit.

# (b) Drainage Contract:

The Architect reported that he had received a statement from the quantity surveyors showing that an additional sum of £950 is due to Messrs. E. S. Moss, Ltd., in respect of a large amount of surplus earth which was excavated and moved by them, and which would normally have been done by direct labour under the Committee's foreman. Such labour was short and very inefficient. In point of fact, this has been the great problem in carrying on the work in all trades in which direct labour has been employed. When Messrs. Moss commenced their drainage contract it became obvious that the digging could not be done with the labour available, and it would be practically impossible to complete the drainage contract in a reasonable time unless other measures were taken. Accordingly Messrs. Moss, who were using a mechanical excavator for their drainage contract, were instructed by the Architect to do the necessary excavation and digging mentioned above with this machine.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the Architect be asked to instruct the quantity surveyors to check the quantity of surplus earth excavated and moved by Messrs. E. S. Moss, Ltd., and that if he is satisfied that the claim is reasonable he be authorised to issue a certificate not exceeding 80 per cent. of the value of the work involved.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

# (c) Air Vent Heater Company, Ltd.:

Pursuant to Item 1 (d) in the report of this Sub-Committee dated 30/6/42, the report of the quantity surveyors on the account submitted by this firm was considered. A copy of such report had been circulated to each member of the Committee. It would appear that the balance due to the Air Vent Heater Company, 14d., including an agreed sum of £30 for overheads, is £370 8s. 1d.

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#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the Architect be authorised to issue a certificate for a sum not exceeding £214 to the Air Vent Heater Company, Ltd., in respect of the account rendered.

The Architect was instructed to confer with the Town Clerk regarding the sum of £90 retention already held.

#### (d) Air Raid Shelters:

#### 2.—ALGERNON ROAD SCHOOL—WATER SUPPLY:

It was reported that for some time past difficulties have been experienced at this school owing to the inadequate water supply. The Borough Engineer had an inspection made of the whole system, and found that it was necessary to instal additional supply tanks, a new water main and supply pipes, at a total estimated cost of £300.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

# THAT the action of the Borough Engineer be approved.

# 3.—FIRE PREVENTION (BUSINESS PREMISES) (NO. 2) ORDER, 1941:

The Borough Engineer reported on the recommendations submitted by the Group Fire Prevention Officer for carrying out additional works, and for the provision of extra equipment at the 12 schools mentioned. The total estimated amount involved is £484.

It will be remembered that the provision of equipment, including ladders and pumps, and of access to roofs by means of trap-doors, etc., was made by the Committee on the recommendations contained in a report prepared by the Chief Officer of the Fire Brigade. In view of the expenditure involved, it was

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for a further report to be obtained from the Divisional Commander, National Fire Service, as to the necessity for carrying out the recommendations made by the Group Fire Prevention Officer.

#### 4.—COLINDALE SCHOOL:

The Borough Engineer reported that the Petroleum Board had fixed the maximum quantity of liquid fuel to be supplied at this school between the 1st August, 1942, and the 31st July, 1943, at the figure of 9,000 gallons, which is about 75 per cent. of normal consumption. The question has been discussed in detail with the caretaker of the school, and from the information so obtained it appears that the normal user of the boilers is as follows: During the winter both boilers are in operation during school hours; one is shut down at 3.30 p.m. and restarted at 6 a.m., but the second boiler is kept on continuously. After a week-end the second boiler is started at 10 p.m. on Sunday instead of 6 a.m. on Monday. Each boiler consumes approximately two gallons of fuel per hour.

In order to reduce the consumption to the limits required by the Petroleum Board it is proposed to make the following alterations in the methods of working: Both boilers to be shut down at 3.30 p.m. and restarted at 4.30 a.m. the following day. This will allow sufficient time to give a reasonable temperature in the school before opening. These proposals should give a sufficient saving on present consumption to reduce the total to the 9,000 gallons allowed.

In order to assist the caretaker, it is proposed that the Borough Engineer should arrange for the installation of an electric control switch in the bungalow which will operate the mechanical firing plant. It was pointed out, however, that in the event of periods of exceptionally cold weather being experienced it will be necessary to modify the above arrangements.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the above proposals be approved.

5.—CONVERSION OF AUTOMATIC STOKERS TO HAND-FIRED BOILERS: RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—.

THAT the Borough Engineer be authorised to proceed with the work of converting automatic stokers to hand-fired boilers at Frith Manor, Brent Modern, Edgware Junior, Clitterhouse and Deansbrook Schools, at a total estimated cost of £80.

# 6.—HENDON GIRLS' TRAINING CORPS:

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# PUBLIC HEALTH AND MEDICAL SERVICES.

#### Part I .-- Medical Services.

19.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936, PART VII.—CHILD LIFE PROTECTION:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on applications (Cases No. 320 and 321) for permission to undertake for reward the nursing and maintenance of children under nine years of age apart from their parents.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the maximum number of foster children that may be kept at the premises in each case be fixed at one.

20.—MIDWIFERY SERVICES—PROVISION OF MATERNITY HOSPITAL ACCOM-MODATION:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that the policy of the Ministry of Health with regard to this matter is that such accommodation as would be adequate to meet the legitimate needs of the County should be provided at the County Council's general hospitals, and to give effect to this considerable extensions were made to the existing accommodation.

The reasons for sending women to hospital for their confinements are (1) on medical grounds and (2) because of unsatisfactory environmental conditions. A new group, however, is emerging as a result of the war, in which neither of these conditions can be said to apply, but in which no responsible person is left to look after the mother, owing to the breaking up of family life which is taking place. The Couneil's Home Help Scheme is, of course, helping to meet this situation to some extent. The Medical Officer further stated that the demand on County beds is so great that a number of women whom he would prefer to be admitted to hospital for their confinement cannot be admitted, and that endeavours were being made to make arrangements with other hospitals. It was further stated that the problem was not a local one, and that a useful purpose would be served by drawing the attention of the County Council to the fact that their hospital provision is not proving adequate under present conditions, and that it may be that a solution could be found by providing country annexes. The main difficulty likely to be encountered would be in providing a satisfactory staff, as the services of competent midwives are becoming increasingly difficult to obtain. After consideration the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Medical Officer of Health be instructed to make a survey of the whole position, and ascertain what arrangements could be made with local nursing homes and hospitals for the reception of cases in an emergency.

# 21.—DOMICILIARY MIDWIFERY SERVICES:

It was reported that there had been a steady increase in the number of births attended by the Council's midwives since the domiciliary service was commenced in 1938, and that during the six months ended the 30th June 232 women had been attended. In addition, the future bookings are heavy, the increase being due to the rise in the birth rate, and also to a reduction in the number of private midwives now practising in the Borough. The Medical Officer pointed out that the midwifery staff consists of a total of six midwives, one of whom acts as a relief and the others are allocated to districts. He stated that the question as to whether a re-allocation of the midwives' districts would assist the position, as the increase is not uniform, had been considered, and that a little had been done along those lines, but he was of opinion that the midwifery staff should be increased by one.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the appointment of one additional midwife.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

22.— REGISTRATION OF NURSING HOMES—45, PATTISON ROAD, CHILDS HILL, N.W. 2:

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In this connection the Chairman reported that subsequent to the receipt of the letter he had, in company with His Worship the Mayor, the Town Clerk and the Medical Officer of Health, interviewed the Ministry's officers at Sector Headquerters, at which appreciation was expressed of the great assistance given by Dr. Adamson and Dr. Livingston in the past. Sector was anxious to obtain as close co-operation as possible, and desired to have closer official contact with Dr. Livingston, and be in a position to give him instructions. All matters of high principle would, of course, be referred to Dr. Adamson, as heretofore, but Dr. Livingston would approach Sector direct on matters of routine. It was pointed out that the surgical side of the Hospital would benefit by a man on the spot.

The Committee concur in the suggested designation of Dr. Livingston, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Dr. Livingston be recognised as Mcdical Officer in charge of the emergency side of the Hospital, and that he should deal with all routine matters directly under Sector; all matters of policy to be referred to the Medical Officer of Health.

#### 4.—CHILDREN'S ENTERTAINMENTS:

#### (a) Mr. Archie Potter.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter received from Mr. Archie Potter confirming the four additional engagements for West Hendon Playing Fields, and stating that programmes for each performance would be forwarded. The programme for the first two weeks of the Children's Entertainments, commencing on Saturday, the 25th July, was approved by the Committee.

Mr. Cole, of the Watling Association, suggested that a programme might be arranged for children on dance nights in the concert enclosure at Watling, in order to minimise the influx of children to the dancing green.

#### RESOLVED -

- (i) THAT a children's performance be arranged at Watling Park on dance nights, at a charge of 2d.;
- (ii) THAT arrangements for such performances be left in the hands of the representative of the Watling Association.

# (b) Programme.

The Town Clerk submitted the programme arranged for children from Saturday, the 25th July, 1942, to Monday, the 24th August, 1942, inclusive, which was approved. In connection therewith, the Committee were asked to authorise the payment of one guinea for out-of-pocket expenses incurred by the "Rise and Shine" Revue Company, to be presented by Mr. L. Blyth on Saturday, the 5th August.

In connection with the concerts for children to be organised by the Watling Association, it was suggested that a charge of 2d, be made for children and 3d, for adults for admission to the enclosure, and that arrangements should be made for the hire of loud-speaker equipment. The services of a pianist for dancing displays for children would be required, at a fee of 10s, per performance.

RESOLVED .- THAT the above suggestions be approved and authority given accordingly.

# (c) Local Talent Competitions.

# 6.-LOCAL TALENT COMPETITION, IST AUGUST, 1942:

In connection with the above, it was a greed that the competition should be open to entrants of 16 years of age and upwards, and that prizes be offered to the value of £4 4s. The Committee suggested that 1,000 handbills be printed for distribution in the parks, inviting entries to be sent to the Town Hall by Wednesday, the 29th July; also that the services of a professional accompanist be engaged at a fee not exceeding £2 2s.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That authority be given for the printing of 1,000 handbills advertising the competition;
- (ii) That authority be granted for the expenditure of a sum of four guineas (£4 4s.) in respect of prizes;
- (iii) That a professional accompanist be engaged, at a fee not exceeding two guineas (£2 2s.).

#### 7.—VARIETY AND COMMUNITY SINGING CONCERTS:

The Committee considered the question of the cancellation of the two remaining dates which had been provisionally fixed for the above entertainment, and were of opinion that dancing would prove a greater attraction.

RESOLVED—That the necessary arrangements be made for dancing on the green on August 29th and September 7th, and that authority be given for the engagement of dance bands on these dates.

#### 8.—CIRCUS AND MENAGERIE:

The Borough Surveyor reported that arrangements had been made with Mr. Laurence Phillips for a Circus and Managerie to take place as follows:—

Hendon Park: For three days from the 24th August. Montrose Playing Fields: For three days from the 27th August.

There will be no cost to the Council, and an undertaking will be given to reinstate the ground afterwards.

Noted and approved.

#### 9.—CLOSURE OF PERFORMANCES:

It was suggested that at the final performances on Sunday, the 13th September, his Worship the Mayor should attend the Parks, in company with members of the Committee, formally to close the entertainments season. The Chairman stated that he would ascertain if such an arrangement could be made, but that, in any event, the members of the Committee would be present in the respective Parks on this occasion.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Report of the above Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

# 4.—FELLING OF TIMBER ON OPEN SPACES:

The Committee considered a letter from the Ministry of Supply pointing out the urgent necessity for felling timber trees on open spaces. The County Council is reluctant to sanction the felling of trees on lands over which it has control, but feels, however, that in the present national emergency it is the duty of the County Council to take what steps it can to meet the views expressed by the Ministry of Supply. In some cases lands leased by the County Council to Local Authorities do not expressly reserve the timber to the County Council, but the Local Authority is under covenant not to cut down trees (except where decayed or dangerous to the public) without the consent of the County Council and a provision on similar lines has frequently been inserted in agreements under which the County Council has contributed towards the purchase of open spaces by Local Authorities. In these circumstances, the County Council would be disposed to consider applications from Local Authorities for permis-

sion to fell certain timber trees on lands so leased, or the subject of contribution agreements which, in the opinion of the Local Authorities' advisers, could appropriately be felled to comply with the request from the Ministry of Supply. The County Council would, however, stipulate as a condition of any consent that an appropriate financial adjustment should be made according to the basis on which the cost of acquisition was defrayed by the County Council and the Local Authority respectively of the proceeds arising from the sale of timber, in so far, of course, as the amount realised is not to be applied towards the cost of replanting. Local Authorities, in submitting applications to the County Council, are requested to indicate their proposals in regard to the replacement of the timber that may be felled.

The Borough Surveyor informed the Committee that a survey was being made of suitable trees for timber, and that he would report thereon to the Committee in due course.

# 5.-LETTING OF FOOTBALL PITCHES IN PARKS:

The Committee duly noted a report by the Borough Surveyor regarding the present position of the letting of football pitches in the public parks.

#### 6.—PARKS DEPARTMENT—APPRENTICESHIP SCHEME:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application from Mr. H. S. Hawkins to be employed as an apprenticeship under the Parks Superintendent, in accordance with the Council's approved scheme.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That Mr. H. S. Hawkins' application be approved, subject to his satisfactorily passing a medical examination.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

#### 7.—DEPUTY PARK SUPERINTENDENT:

At the request of the Chairman of the Committee, the Borough Surveyor reported with regard to the desirability of appointing Mr. Joyner, who has been acting for some time as Mr. Erith's deputy, as Deputy Parks Superintendent.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That Mr. Joyner be appointed Deputy Parks Superintendent.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 8.—SAILING CANOE WATER, HENDON PARK:

The Committee considered a scheme and sketch plan submitted by Lieut. L. C. Slater, R.N.R. (Rtd.), for the provision of a sailing canoe water in Hendon Park. The scheme provides for the construction of a triangular course or waterway comprising three pools connected by channels 7 ft. wide, containing water 9 inches deep, and the provision of a boathouse having storing capacity for 150 to 200 canoes. It is suggested that a canoe of the double "Rob Roy" type would be suitable for sailing on the waterway, and that such scheme would cost approximately £500 (by direct labour).

The Borough Surveyor reported with regard to certain difficulties which would arise, in the event of the proposals being carried out, owing to the levels of the land.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That Lieut. Slater, R.N.R. (Rtd.), be informed that the Council regret they are unable to take any action in the matter.

# 9.- LAND--HILLTOP GARDENS, GREAT NORTH WAY:

The Committee considered an application from Mr. Frederick Wilson for the renewal of his street trading licence for the year ending 31st March, 1943, to enable him to sell fruit, vegetables and flowers from a stall on the carriageway in front of No. S3, Watling Avenue.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the above application for the renewal of the licence be approved, subject to the existing conditions, and the necessary licence issued for the period ending 31st March, 1943.

# 13.—APPLICATION—MR. JOHN A. HERRIDGE:

The Committee considered an application from Mr. John A. Herridge, of Colchester Road, for a street trading licence to enable him to sell fruit, etc., from a stall on the carriageway outside No. 19, Watling Avenue.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That such application be disapproved.

# 14.—HENDON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE (BURNT OAK BRANCH):

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the above Chamber of Commerce asking for certain information in connection with the number of street trading licences granted in the Borough.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to supply the necessary information to the Hendon Chamber of Commerce.

# 15.—SURFACING OF ROADS, WATLING ESTATE:

The Committee considered a letter from the Watling Association protesting against the way in which many of the roads on the above Estate have recently been surfaced.

The Borough Surveyor reported that the work had been carried out in a proper manner as on previous occasions.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Association be informed accordingly.

#### TRAVELLING FACILITIES.

# 16.—'BUS STOP, EDGWAREBURY LANE:

In connection with the Council's application for the provision of a 'bus stop in Edgwarebury Lane, near the A.R.P. Wardens' Post (Group II. Ctte. 8/6/42 Hi.—19), the Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the London Passenger Transport Board pointing out that, as the 'buses stop in the vicinity as and when required, it is not considered necessary to appoint a fixed stopping place as suggested. The Committee, however, are of opinion that it is desirable to have a definite stopping place in Edgwarebury Lane, as some 'buses do not stop for passengers in this road.

It is also suggested that the London Passenger Transport Board be requested to consider the desirability of illuminating 'bus stop signs at night time, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the London Passenger Transport Board be informed accordingly, and asked to reconsider the Council's application.

#### 17.—'BUS STOP, THE BURROUGHS, OUTSIDE PUBLIC LIBRARY:

The Committee's attention was called to the fact that 'buses do not stop at the above position when requested by the public, and the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the attention of the London Passenger Transport Board be called to the matter.

# 18.—KENILWORTH ROAD, EDGWARE:

The Borough Surveyor reported that in connection with Taylor Woodrow, Ltd., estate north of Edgware Way, there remains one road, Kenilworth Road, which has not been taken over by the Council. This road was included in an agreement between the Council and Taylor Woodrow, Ltd., under which the owners made up the road to the Council's specification and paid the Council's supervising charges in connection therewith. The actual work of making up the road was completed in July, 1939, since when the company has been responsible for its maintenance. On one occasion the company made good all defects in the road, but they are now unable to carry out further repairs, as they have no available labour. In view of the circumstances of the case and of the fact that they have had the road under maintenance for an exceptionally long time, it has been agreed that the company pay a sum of £250 in discharge of any liability they may have to carry out for further maintenance works. This payment is in addition to the 3 per cent, supervision charge due to the Council. The company has, therefore, paid the sum of £250, together with the supervision charge, and the Committee

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# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That Taylor Woodrow, Ltd., be released from their responsibility of future maintenance work to this road on payment by them of the sum of £250, in addition to the Council's supervision charges.
- (ii) That the portion of Kenilworth Road between the northern boundary of No. 116 and a point 369 yards to the south thereof be dedicated as a public highway and the necessary notices posted.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes

Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 19.—TRAM RAILS IN PUBLIC HIGHWAYS:

It was reported that the last contract for the removal of tram rails in roads maintained by the Council had now been completed.

Noted.

#### 20.—TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNALS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had been informed by the Ministry of Transport that arrangements are being made for the supply of the half-moon type of masking for fitting to traffic control signals, and the Ministry ask the Council to provide the labour for fixing the masks when received from the manufacturers. The Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis, in conjunction with the Minister, is considering which signals can, with safety to the public, be eliminated. Directly this question has been decided, it will be necessary to indent for the number of half-moon fittings required. The question of the existing maintenance contracts in respect of signals which are to be discontinued will be dealt with in due course.

Noted.

# 21.—BRIDGE CARRYING DEANS LANE OVER THE LONDON & NORTH EASTERN RAILWAY:

The Borough Surveyor reported that in view of the bad condition of the surface of the road over the above bridge, and to the fact that the railway company have established the position that they are only liable to maintain a surface equal to that in existence at the time of their special Act, the following estimate of the cost of surfacing the bridge and its approaches with tarred macadam has been prepared and submitted to the Minister of Transport.

The Ministry has approved this estimate, subject to the County Council agreeing to the proposals, and the Borough Surveyor asked for authority to negotiate with the London & North Eastern Railway Company, with a view to the company paying a capitalised sum to discharge their legal liability in respect of this bridge, and also the bridge carrying Sanders Lane and Dole Street over the same railway line. After such sum is paid, the Council to take over the responsibility. In the case of Deans Lane Bridge, such arrangement will require the approval of the County Council.

1.-MINISTER OF WORKS AND PLANNING ACT, 1942:

# (a) Ministry of Works and Planning Circular No. 1.

Circular No. 1 issued by the Ministry of Works and Planning on the 21st July (a copy of which had been circulated to each member of the Committee) was considered and noted.

The circular calls attention to the provisions of the Minister of Works and Planning Act, 1942, under which the functions hitherto exercised by the Minister of Health under the Town and Country Planning Act, 1932, with the exception of those exercisable under Sections 32, 51 and 55, have been transferred to the Minister of Works The circular states that the object of the Government's policy is to secure the right use of the land of the country for all purposes, and that the Minister has accordingly been charged with the task of guiding the formulation by Local Authorities of town and country planning schemes which will adequately reflect the national policy for urban and rural development. It is also stated that further legislation will be introduced in due course, in order to improve the present system, and to give effect to this wider scope of planning, but in regard to current administration the orders, circulars and memoranda already issued by the Minister of Health will continue to

In order to facilitate collaboration with local authorities, the Minister will appoint planning officers, with headquarters at convenient centres, who will be available to help and advise them. Each of these officers will keep the Minister informed of the problems of the authorities in his area, and will keep the authorities informed of the requirements of national policy as it is developed.

The circular further states that, whilst the Minister recognises that the war has laid many extra burdens upon local authorities, and has depleted their staffs, nevertheless, it is important that they should make as much progress with the work of survey and planning as they can, and should seek to earry their work to the stage of provisional conclusions, though it will generally be impossible during the war to make progress with the formal stages of statutory schemes.

The circular points out that the problem of replanning is particularly urgent in the case of towns that have suffered war damage, and contain areas which must be reconstructed at the earliest practicable moment, and that the existence of provisional plans of reconstruction will greatly assist the War Damage Commission in deciding upon the type and extent of the appropriate "specification," and in exercising its powers to impose conditions when making payments.

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In all planning schemes, the circular states, it will be necessary to consider not only health and convenience, but thought must be given to such matters as the practicable size and shape of building blocks, the relation between streets, buildings and open spaces in respect of height and scale, and the appearance of new development seen in association with, or as a contrast to, the old.

# (b) Institution of Municipal and County Engineers.

A letter from the Institution of Municipal and County Engineers relative to the policy of the Ministry of Works and Planning was submitted and noted.

# 2.—POST - WAR DEVELOPMENT:

The Committee received and considered a report, together with plans, submitted by the Borough Engineer in accordance with the resolution passed by the Council on the 27th July. Arising out of the report, the Borough Engineer has been requested to prepare a summary of the report of the Expert Committee on Compensation and Betterment (under the chairmanship of the Hon. Mr. Justice Uthwatt), which has been presented to Parliament by the Minister of Works and Planning. The Committee have also asked the Borough Engineer to submit a report with proposals for development in respect of a certain area of land owned by the Corporation, and have given directions for specific information to be obtained with a view to ascertaining as far as possible the probable post-war housing needs of the Borough.

The letter also asked whether the Council would consider the establishment of a British Restaurant at this Hall. It was reported that the hall is used as a Rest Centre, and that after an inspection in August, 1941, it was not then considered suitable for adaptation as a Restaurant, owing to the fact that its situation in the midst of a purely residential area without any association with either a shopping centre or factories made it doubtful whether a Restaurant would be a success.

The Chairman reported that the Temple Fortune area had been explored, and that two shops in Bridge Lane were considered to be suitable for adaptation as a British Restaurant.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the Chief Officer, Meals Service, be instructed to inform the Ministry of Food that other premises suitable for adaptation were under review;
- (ii) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to inspect the two shops in Bridge Lane, Temple Fortune, and submit a report to the next meeting.

#### 13.—REQUISITIONS:

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Requisitions amounting to £92 17s. 10d. were submitted and approved.

#### 14.—BRITISH INSTITUTE OF ADULT EDUCATION:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from Lady Elizabeth Clark confirming her recent visit to the Council's British Restaurants, and drawing attention to a scheme for the above Institute, which the Ministry of Food is supporting, to provide pictures, lithographs or murals in British Restaurants. Such pictures would be sent free of charge on the understanding that the Council, at its own expense, would send them on to one of the neighbouring Boroughs, which would be indicated, on the expiration of three months.

The letter stated that the St. John's British Restaurant had very little room for pictures, but it was suggested that a few lithographs or students' work could be sent to the St. Michael's British Restaurant, and that arrangements could probably be made for a mural decoration.

RESOLVED—That the offer be accepted, and the thanks of the Council conveyed to Lady Clark.

(Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes Committee concur in the proposal subject to the Council being fully indemnified against any claims for damage or for any other reason in respect of the fictures).

# 15.—SITE AT MONTROSE AVENUE, WATLING ESTATE:

Pursuant to the Committee's instructions (Minutes 13/7/42—14), the Town Clerk submitted a letter from the London County Council stating that it was not possible for a tenancy of any specified duration to be granted, as the question of the development

of the site under the statutory obligations of the London County Council might arise, in which case the tenancy would of necessity have to be terminated. It was pointed out, however, that this was unlikely to occur, and that the use of the land could, in effect, be granted for the duration of the emergency.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the Council accept a tenancy of the necessary land on the terms indicated by the London County Council, and that the Town Clerk be instructed to prepare the tenancy agreement;
- (ii) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents.

[Having considered the matter in its financial bearing, the Finance and General Purposes

Committee concur in the proposal.]

# 16.—PROPOSED BRITISH RESTAURANTS AT BRENT STREET, MONTROSE AVENUE AND CRICKLEWOOD LANE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a schedule of tenders received for carrying out the work required in connection with the erection of Restaurants at the above sites. Councillor Curton declared an interest in the matter and retired during consideration thereon.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, subject to an undertaking being given that the erection of the three Restaurants will be completed within a period of three months from the 15th September, 1942, the lowest tender, viz., that of Messrs. Buckingham & Sons, Ltd., amounting to £1,770 13s. (Brent Street), £1,690 (Montrose Avenue) and £1,700 (Cricklewood Lane), be accepted, but, failing such undertaking, the question of the acceptance of alternative tenders be referred to His Worship the Mayor and the Chairman of the Committee.

The Borough Surveyor pointed out that in submitting the tenders to the Ministry of Food the following additional costs must be included:—

## Death of Dr. Francis W. Andrew.

His Worship the Mayor made the following announcement:-

"It is with feelings of profound regret that I have to refer to the passing, yesterday, of Dr. Francis W. Andrew.

"Dr. Andrew was appointed in November, 1892, as Medical Officer of Health under the Hendon Local Board, and on the formation in 1895 of the Hendon Urban District he was appointed Medical Officer of Health, which position he held until November, 1920. He also held the office of Medical Officer and Public Vaccinator for the whole of the Hendon Union area, and was later Medical Officer of Health for the Kingsbury Urban District Council. In addition, Dr. Andrew was one of the police surgeons for Hendon and also the Post Office surgeon.

"Dr. Andrew will, perhaps, be best remembered for his long association with, and the keen interest he took in, the Hendon Cottage Hospital, of which he was Hon. Medical Superintendent from the foundation of the Hospital in 1912 until the spring of 1941, after which he became its President. He was for many years Chairman of the Hospital Fête Committee, from which office he resigned in 1938 owing to ill-health, but he maintained his association with the Committee in the capacity of President. In recognition of his lively interest in and many services to the Hospital, the new wing which was erected in 1934 was named after him. During the last war Dr. Andrew was in charge of the War Emergency Hospital at Spalding Hall, Brent Street.

"A man of likeable and genial personality (affectionately known to Old Hendonians as 'Dr. Frank'), Dr. Andrew took a keen interest in everything that was for the good of the Borough, in which he was a familiar figure. Local charities found in him a generous supporter, and he was always a very good friend to the needy. As did his father before him, he took a very keen interest in the Hendon Oddfellows, and was an honorary member of the Flower of Hendon Lodge. In his younger days he was a prominent cricketer, and made many big scores for the old Hendon Cricket Club, which held a leading place in London cricket fifty years ago. He was also for many years associated with Hendon Golf Club. By the death of Dr. Andrew the Borough has lost a worthy citizen, whose work will live on and form a perpetual memorial.

"I propose, on your behalf, to convey to the family the sincere sympathy of the Council with them in their sad bereavement."

His Worship intimated that the funeral would take place on Wednesday, the 30th September, and that he proposed officially to attend the service at the Parish Church, at 2.30 p.m.

Following the Mayor's announcement the Council stood for a brief period in silence.

War Service Fund, the object of which is to provide clubs and hostels at naval bases, in camps and on isolated R.A.F. stations, for the women and girls in His Majesty's Forces. The Mayor further stated that the Co-ordinating Committee had given their approval, and that, subject to the concurrence of the Council, he proposed to issue an appeal. To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Hendon.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Since the last Ordinary Meeting of the Council the Committee has met on the 29th July, 2nd and 16th September, 1942.

#### 1.—NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER:

In accordance with the wish of the Regional Commissioners, facilities were granted to Civil Defence workers who so wished to attend local services held in connection with the National Day of Prayer.

#### 2.—MRS. A. M. LESTY:

The Committee has conveyed to Mrs. A. M. Lesty its sincere appreciation of the able and willing manner in which, as the Hendon Centre Organiser of the W.V.S., she co-operated in all matters connected with A.R.P. from the middle of 1938 until the spring of this year, and for the material contribution she thus made to the successful operation of the Council's Civil Defence Services during that period.

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#### 3.-DR. MARY ROUTLEDGE.

The Committee has conveyed to Dr. Mary Routledge its appreciation of the valuable services rendered by her to the Borough as Medical Officer in charge of the West Hendon First Aid Post, from which appointment she has resigned upon her retirement from general practice. Dr. W. A. Dunlop has now undertaken the duties previously discharged by Dr. Routledge.

## 4.—PRESERVATION OF RESPIRATORS ISSUED TO THE PUBLIC:

The Minister of Home Security emphasises that the decision that respirators should not be carried by the public at all times, but that they should be left at home so long as they can be reached easily in the case of need, does not mean that the danger of gas attack is in any way past. Failure to maintain preparations for meeting gas attack may have serious consequences; it is of the utmost importance that the public should practise the speedy putting on and wearing of respirators, and that the respirators should be proporly kept and regularly examined by the public themselves, and by the Civil Defence Services on their behalf, with a view to any damage or defect being immediately remedied.

Arrangements are being made for the respirators issued to school children to be examined at monthly intervals. Inspections of all respirators in the Borough are conducted at six-monthly intervals.

#### 5.—CIVIL DEFENCE REVIEW:

A preliminary notice has been received of a proposal to hold a review representative of the Group Civil Defence Services at Wembley Stadium on the 18th October, 1942, to mark the seventh anniversary of A.R.P. It is hoped that some 5.000 personnel will take part in a series of events and a march past, and that the Minister of Home Security will be present to take the salute.

Proceeds from the sale of tickets of admission will be divided between Local Authorities in the Group, to assist in the provision of social and recreational facilities to Civil Defence personnel.

#### 6.—REGIONAL RESCUE SERVICE COMPETITION:

The Hendon Rescue Service was successful in winning the Light Rescue Section of the Group 6c Rescue Service Competition.

#### 7.—SCHEME-MAKING AUTHORITIES—DELEGATION OF POWERS:

The London (Outer) Civil Defence Region Standing Joint Committee has, at the request of this Committee, considered the desirability of County Councils delegating their powers as scheme-making authorities to local authorities in their respective areas.

It is suggested that the functions of the County Council should be limited to operational co-ordination, mutual aid, and the establishment of any mobile services which would supplement the Local Authorities' resources, leaving full powers to the Local Authorities to incur any necessary expenditure on Air Raid Precautions, subject only to such limits as are imposed by the Government.

The Executive Committee of the Standing Joint Committee has drawn up a memorandum on this matter for submission to the Regional Commissioners.

### 8.—CIVIL DEFENCE EXPENDITURE:

As the policy governing Civil Defence Services is absolutely in the hands of the Central Government, the London (Outer) Civil Defence Region Standing Joint Committee consider that financial responsibility for Civil Defence should rest entirely with

the Government, and that the whole of the expenditure incurred by Local Authorities on Civil Defence should be fully reimburseable. The Standing Joint Committee also considers that the whole of the Emergency Services should be administered by one financial group, thereby drastically curtailing the present elaborate system of detailed approvals, claims and returns, and removing complication and administrative difficulties. The Standing Joint Committee is making representations to H.M. Government accordingly.

The Middlesex County Council proposes that it should, in future, receive from the Government the grant payable in respect of administrative, technical and elerical salaries and office expenses, and apportion it between Authorities in Group 6 strictly on a basis of expenditure (capital and revenue).

The County Council has been advised that no objection to this course will be raised by this Council provided the County Council submits an annual certified statement showing the total amount received for distribution and expenditure (as audited) in respect of each Authority in the Group (including the County Council itself) on which the percentage calculation is based.

#### 9.—ESTABLISHMENTS:

The Regional Commissioners have fixed a revised establishment of 2,268 for the Wardens' Service (to include shelter wardens and supervisory ranks). Of this number 240 may be engaged on a full-time paid basis.

The Regional Commissioners have also approved a revised personnel establishment of 216 for the Hendon Report and Control Centre Services, of which number 34 may be engaged on a full-time paid basis.

#### 10.—PRODUCTIVE WORK IN CIVIL DEFENCE DEPOTS:

The general policy of the Minister of Home Security concerning the employment of Civil Defence personnel on productive work which will contribute to the national war effort, and can be undertaken effectively in Civil Defence depots, is being brought to the notice of the Civil Defence personnel in the Borough. An opportunity will be given to the personnel to volunteer to co-operate in the scheme.

No compulsion will be placed on any member to undertake the work, and no individual additional payment is to be made to personnel for any work undertaken. After deduction of transport costs, charges for the use of equipment provided by Local Authorities, and a sum to cover overheads from the amount received from contractors as the value of any work done, 50 per cent. of the balance is to be allocated to the Exchequer and 50 per cent. is to be expended for the collective benefit of personnel.

#### 11.—STANDARD OF ACCOMMODATION AT CIVIL DEFENCE DEPOTS:

The contract for the provision of protected bunk accommodation at Mill Hill Depot has been completed and is proceeding at Hendon Way Depot. The extent to which similar work should be undertaken at John Groom's Crippleage, Clitterhouse Farm and Hendon County School Depots, to provide the revised standards of accommodation as prescribed by the Ministry of Home Security, is being discussed with the Middlesex County Council.

#### 12.—RECREATIONAL FACILITIES:

The Committee has noted the various recreational facilities now available to all members of the Civil Defence Services, which include football, cricket, tennis, swimming, rifle shooting and darts fixtures.

The Hendon Civil Defence Choir gave a rendering of "The Creation," by Haydn, at the Orpheum Theatre on the 23rd August, 1942.

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a e: A Borough Sports Day was arranged on August 3rd, and a dance in aid of war charities on August 19th. A ladies' relay team, composed of members of the Hendon Report and Control Centre staff, represented Group 6 at a Regional Sports Meeting on the 29th August, 1942. In the Sub-Group Tennis Tournament Hendon players were successful in winning the men's doubles and ladies' singles, and in reaching the finals in the ladies' doubles.

Members of the Civil Defence Services and their relatives can attend performances at the Orpheum Theatre at a reduced charge of admission.

#### 13.—CIVIL DEFENCE COMFORTS:

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The Committee has reviewed the issues of comforts made to members of the Civil Defence Services during last winter. A quantity of garments are in stock for issue during the coming season. To enable this work to continue, it is hoped to replenish the funds by the arrangement of social functions later in the year.

#### 14.—A.R.P. STAFF—COST OF LIVING BONUS:

An increased rate of bonus for members of Local Authorities' staffs engaged full time on air-raid precautions work has been approved by the Ministry of Home Security (Circular 156/42), and is being applied in this Borough where the rates authorised are not in excess of those being paid by this Council to its staff generally.

#### 15.—DISTRICT AND DEPUTY DISTRICT WARDENS:

The following higher weekly rates of pay approved by the Regional Commissioners for District and Deputy District Wardens within the approved establishment are now being applied in this area:—

#### 16.—CYCLE ALLOWANCES:

Cycle allowances for messengers providing their own cycles for use on duty, and wardens essentially required to use cycles in the performance of their duty, have been approved by the Ministry of Home Security and are being applied in this Borough.

#### 17.-EQUIPMENT:

Where desired, assistance is being given to public utility companies and firms within the Borough in inspecting and testing the efficiency of anti-gas equipment in their possession, and advising as to its proper keeping.

#### 18.—EMERGENCY FEEDING—USE OF SCHOOLS:

With reference to Item 9 of the Report to the meeting of the Council held on the 27th July, 1942, in view of the extreme improbability of the Ministry of Works exercising its option to occupy the seven schools in the Borough earmarked by that Ministry for use in emergencies, the Ministry of Food has approved the inclusion of the schools in the Council's Emergency Feeding Scheme. Approval to an expenditure of £19 15s. on works of preparation at four of the schools has been received, and the submission of proposals for setting up emergency kitchens at the remaining three schools have been requested by the Ministry. Revised estimates of expenditure on all seven schools are being prepared in view of the lapse of time since the original estimates were submitted.

#### 19.—CIVIL DEFENCE (COMPULSORY ENROLMENT) ORDER, 1942:

Under the above Order a registration is to take place throughout the London Region on the 3rd and 4th October, 1942, when the following British subjects are required to register:—

- (a) All male persons who on the 19th September, 1942, are not less than 18 but under 60 years of age;
- (b) All female persons who on the 19th September, 1942, are not less than 20 but under 45 years of age.

#### Except :--

- (1) Persons who were registered under the Civil Defence Duties (Compulsory Enrolment) Order, 1941;
- (2) Any member of any of the armed Forces of the Crown;
- (3) Any member of the Royal Observer Corps;
- (4) Any constable;
- (5) Any licensed or certificated pilot;
- (6) Any duly qualified medical practitioner;
- (7) Any master or any member of a crew of a ship engaged in sea-going service;
- (8) Any person who is the subject of an order or inquisition under the Lunacy and Mental Treatment Acts, 1890 to 1930, etc.;
- (9) Any registered blind person;
- (10) Any deaf and dumb person.

Eleven registration places will be open throughout the Borough, and facilities for registering will also be made available at various wardens' district headquarters.

#### 20.—FIRE PREVENTION:

The Fire Prevention (Business Premises) (No. 3) Order, 1942, amending the (No. 2) Order, 1942, came into force on the 14th September, 1942, and covers the compulsion of women (subject to certain exceptions) to perform fire-prevention duties, the provision of amenities for women fire-guards, the training of persons undertaking or required to perform duties, and the extension of the phrase "working at the premises."

The Regional Commissioners have delegated to this Council their functions as the "appropriate Authority" under the Fire Prevention Orders in the case of the undermentioned premises:—

Applications made by 72 occupiers of business premises for approval to Fire Preventions arrangements at premises within the Borough have been considered and approved.

Lectures given to members of the W.V.S. on "Fire Prevention and the Control of Incendiary Bombs." and "A.R.P. Organisation" have been attended by 1,329 persons. A further 14 lectures have been arranged to take place during September.

#### 21.—AIR RAID SHELTERS:

Work in connection with the concreting, waterproofing, etc., of Anderson shelters in the Borough has been undertaken in approximately 252 cases; 143 indoor shelters have been issued, bringing the total to 4,906. The installation of lighting in communal shelters has been completed, with the exception of the actual connection of the supply in three cases.

The fixing of glass doors to enable access to be gained to the shelters in an emergency, has now been completed. The Committee is much concerned to note the damage that has already been done to these emergency door fittings, 150 glasses having been broken, nine of the frames being totally destroyed and repairs being necessary to a further six; approximately 18 of the padlocks have also been stolen. The Committee has directed that every endeavour should be made to trace the persons responsible for this damage, with a view to appropriate action being taken.

The construction of external lavatory accommodation for trench shelters is proceeding, and has been completed in 65 out of 94 cases.

The strengthening of Hirst's Garage and 12 basement shelters is proceeding. With the approval of the County Council and the Regional Commissioners, the following tenders for strengthening work to public surface air-raid shelters, to give the standard of protection now required by the Ministry of Home Security, have been accepted:—

The work in the Nursery Classroom is proceeding satisfactorily, the plastering of the ceiling being well advanced. The electrical work is proceeding slowly, as the men are working under some difficulties owing to the school being in use.

Noted.

#### (b) Nursery Classroom.

#### (i) RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

#### 1.—TEACHERS' WAR ALLOWANCE:

The following Administrative Memorandum No. 413 from the Board of Education was submitted:-

#### "War Allowance for Teachers.

"The Burnham Committees remittted to their Chairman, Lord Soulbury, as Arbitrator, the question of war allowance for teachers. Lord Soulbury has now made his Award, as follows:---

(a) For teachers under 21 years of age the war allowance shall be:-

Men: £26 per annum. Women: £19 10s. per annum.

(b) For teachers of 21 years of age and over the war allowance shall be:-

For teachers in receipt of salaries up to £262 10s. per annum:-

Men: £45 per annum. Women: £36 per annum.

For teachers in receipt of salaries exceeding £262 10s. but not exceeding £525 per annum:--

> Men: £35 per annum. Women: £28 per annum.

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Provided that in the case of any teacher whose salary immediately exceeds the limiting rates of remuneration indicated above an allowance shall be given sufficient to bring his or her salary, with allowance, up to the same level as that of a teacher whose salary is at the limiting rate.

For the purpose of assessing the war allowance the salary to be taken into account shall be the scale salary, and any allowances payable in accordance with the Reports of the Burnham Committees, but excluding any emoluments falling outside the scope of those Reports.

These allowances shall be in substitution for the existing war allowances, and shall apply as from the 1st July, 1942.

In making my Award, I have had some regard to the fact that the many extraneous duties undertaken by teachers in war-time in connection with their professional work are not reflected in their normal remuneration.

The Board are prepared to recognise for grant purposes the expenditure of Authorities on applying the Award.

In remitting the matter to arbitration the respective Panels of the Burnham Committees bound themselves to accept the findings of the Arbitrator, subject in the case of the Local Education Authorities' Panel to the war allowance so awarded being recognised by the Board for the purposes of their grants. Inasmuch as the Board have accepted the Award for grant purposes, the war allowance awarded constitutes 'recognised war allowance' within the meaning of Article 5 of Grant Regulations No. 1 and Article 8 of Grant Regulations No. 4, as amended by the respective Provisional Amending Regulations, 1942."

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT war allowance be paid to the teachers on the Committee's staff in accordance with the terms of the Award as set out above.

#### 2.—BURNT OAK SCHOOL—HEADMASTER:

The Director of Education reported that Mr. Harold Jacques, Headmaster of the Burnt Oak School, died on 4th September, 1942.

The Chief Librarian reported the receipt of 174 volumes from six donors.

#### 5.—WITHDRAWN BOOKS:

It was reported that 220 volumes withdrawn from the Lending Libraries had been sent to Mill Hill Barracks.

#### 6.—BOOKS AND BINDING:

The Chief Librarian reported the receipt of a letter from Cedric Chivers, Ltd., library bookbinders, of Bath, regarding the increasing arrears of work at all the main library binding establishments, and that this position has led to a decision not to accept further consignments of books from libraries until some progress has been made with the present accumulated arrears. Messrs. Chivers have therefore announced their inability to accept further orders for re-binding until further notice. It was stated that books for re-binding in Hendon would accumulate at the Central and Branch Libraries, and that it seems doubtful if it will be possible to send off a consignment to any of the firms with which the Council deals before next December. The average period now elapsing between despatch and return of library consignments is from three to four months. As lending library issues are now increasing, there is a danger that owing to this inability to get books rebound, stocks of fiction and children's books will be seriously depleted unless purchases on a larger scale are sanctioned than were anticipated when the current estimates were prepared. The market for serviceable editions of suitable standard fiction is perpetually shrinking, and purchases of such books should be made as and when they become available.

The Medical Officer of Health reported on applications (Cases No. 322 and 323) for permission to undertake for reward the nursing and maintenance of children under the age of nine years apart from their parents.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the maximum number of foster children that may be kept at the pre mises be fixed at one in respect of case No. 322 and two in respect of case No. 323.

24.—MIDWIFERY SERVICES: PROVISION OF MATERNITY HOSPITAL ACCOMMO-DATION:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that pursuant to the Committee's instructions (P.H. & M.S., 7/9/42—20), a survey of the existing position had been made regarding nursing home accommodation, and he was of opinion that there were five cases which should be admitted to hospital because of unsatisfactory environmental conditions. The situation, however, tends to vary from day to day. All nursing homes known to take maternity cases had been approached, with only one response, an offer of five maternity beds at a special fee of six guineas per week being made, provided a succession of cases could be guaranteed.

As regards hospital accommodation, it was reported that Queen Charlotte's and the City of London Maternity Hospitals had been approached, and that the former hospital was prepared to take a limited number of cases, an average of two cases per month being suggested, commencing in April, 1943. The charge would be 11s. 8d. per day, subject to review at the end of a year. No reply had been received from the City of London Maternity Hospital. The Medical Officer further stated that other accommodation was sought, and ultimately secured at the Ashbridge Hospital. Berkhampstead, by arrangement with the Charing Cross Hospital, the cost being at the rate of £4 10s. per week per patient, and that arrangements had been made for the admission of the five cases above referred to. It was not proposed at this stage to enter into any arrangements with the Nursing Home mentioned above. After consideration the Committee

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—

(i) That the action taken by the Medical Officer of Health be approved, and that he be authorised to take similar action in respect of any other cases which may arise.

#### HENDON ISOLATION HOSPITAL.

#### 27.—HEALTH CENTRES, WAR-TIME NURSERIES, AND ISOLATION HOSPITAL:

The following report was submitted with regard to the visits to the Health Centres, War-Time Nurseries and the Hospital on the 17th September, 1942:-

We, the undersigned Members, submit our report on the interim visit made to the following on Thursday, the 17th September, 1942:-

> Central Hendon Centre. Colindale Health Centre. York Park Day Nursery. Hyde School Day Nursery. The Isolation Hospital.

#### Health Centres.

We found the work in connection with Diphtheria Immunisation and the treatment of orthopædic defects at the Central Hendon Clinic proceeding very satisfactorily.

As regards the Colindale Health Centre at the Congregational Church, various matters require attention, in particular the provision of better heating arrangements, and it has been left to the Chairman and Medical Officer of Health to interview the church authorities with a view to such improvement being effected.

#### War-Time Day Nurseries.

Visits were made to the York Park and the Hyde School Day Nurseries, and we were pleased with the manner in which both Nurseries were functioning. We recommend that, as regards the York Park Day Nursery, the Borough Surveyor be instructed to carry out certain improvements. Isolation Hospital.

#### 2. Staffing Matters.

It was reported to us that four members of the staff at the Hospital had resigned, but that the vacancies had been filled. We also considered representations from the Matron regarding the difficulty under present conditions in maintaining an adequate domestic staff, and the measures which had been taken to overcome the difficulty. The matter has been left in the hands of the Medical Officer of Health.

#### 3. Medical Panel.

On the report of the Medical Officer of Health, we gave consideration to the advisability of establishing a Medical Panel for the resident staff of the Hospital, and issued instructions for the Medical Insurance Committee to be approached.

#### 4. Service with H.M. Forces.

It was reported that M. Haggins (general porter) had been called up for service with H.M. Forces during August.

Following the call-up for military service of one of the ambulance drivers (G. Porter), arrangements were made for the duties to be undertaken by C. Potter (general porter), who had had previous experience as a driver. Mr. Potter's home is in Mill Hill, and when required during his period of "stand by," he is summoned by a telephone message to the Tennyson Road Fire Station (which is next door to his house). The journey to the Hospital by cycle takes about a quarter-hour, and although the arrangement has worked well up to the present, it may present difficulties during the winter months, and it was suggested that it might be desirable in this instance to provide housing accommodation nearer to the Hospital.

The question of the occupancy by Mrs. Porter and her family of the cottage at 8a, Goldsmith Avenue, during the absence of her husband on military service, was also considered.

We recommend that, if possible, housing accommodation be found for Mr. Potter in the vicinity of the Hospital.

#### 5. Machinery, Furniture, etc.

#### (a) Laundry.

In view of the fact that the existing laundry facilities are proving inadequate for the present volume of work,

We recommend that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit a report as to the possibility of augmenting the existing plant.

#### (b) Main Kitchen.

We recommend that a large ventilating fan be installed in the main kitchen.

#### (c) Washing and Ironing Facilities for Staff.

It was reported that the adaptation of the former nurses' cloakroom for use as a staff washing and ironing room, as previously authorised, had not yet been commenced, and that, as this room is now required as an office for the Deputy Matron and the Home Sister, it is proposed that the ironing, etc., shall continue to be carried out in the existing quarters, and that the necessary clothes-airing cupboard be erected by the carpenter in the Administrative Block basement. The estimated cost of materials for this cupboard is £5 10s.

We recommend that the former decision of the Council (P.H. & M.S., 30/3/42-13) for the adaptation of the former nurses' cloakroom for use as a staff washing and ironing room be rescinded, and authority given for the erection of a clothes cupboard in the Administrative Block basement by the Hospital carpenter, at a cost of £5 10s.

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#### (d) Nurses' Lecture Room.

We recommend that a cupboard be provided in the nurses' lecture room for the housing of books, charts, models, etc., at an estimated cost of £7 5s., such cupboard to be erected by the Hospital carpenter.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that the Ministry of Health had for some time been carrying out a propaganda campaign, particularly through the national newspapers, cinemas, and by broadcasts, urging immunisation against diphtheria, but that the Ministry of Health feels that to be really successful this should be followed by localised campaigns undertaken by Local Authorities. A brochure had been received containing various suggestions from which Local Authorities could select those likely to be most applicable to their particular district for a campaign of six weeks duration. Articles in the local Press, the exhibition of slides at local cinemas, the exhibition of posters, and "word-of-mouth" publicity were among the Ministry's suggestions. The Medical Officer informed the Committee that arrangements had been made with the Chief Librarian for the exhibition of the film "Defeat Diphtheria" by the Ministry of Information's mobile film units, and that it was proposed to intensify the propaganda efforts already in force. The Committee shall consist of five trade members and 10 consumer members. The trade members shall consist of one grocery member, one butcher member, one co-operative member and two unclassified trade members. Of the consumer members, one must be a representative of trades unions and at least two shall be women.

All the members of the existing Food Committee who were appointed in July last are eligible for reappointment, and have indicated their willingness to serve on the new Committee. With regard to the trade representatives, Mr. S. W. Mitchell has been re-nominated as the representative of the grocery and provision trade; and the name of Mr. G. A. Hoskins, of 57, Avondale Avenue, East Barnet, who is employed as grocery branch manager of Tesco Stores, Apex Corner, Mill Hill, has also been put forward to represent the grocery trade by the National Amalgamated Union of Shop Assistants, Warehousemen and Clerks. Only one representative of the grocery and provision trade can, however, be appointed to the Committee. The Trades Union representative (Mr. H. W. Gardner) has been nominated by the Hendon and District Trades Council and two branches of the National Union of Railwaymen.

#### 6.—IMMUNISATION AGAINST DIPHTHERIA AND WHOOPING COUGH:

The Medical Officer reported that the above treatment was now being carried out at the Day Nurseries, the materials being combined so that the number of injections was not increased by the introduction of the whooping-cough antigen. The Committee were informed that the primary injection had now been carried out at each Nursery by Dr. Maclean, of St. Mary's Hospital, Paddington, and that no reactions had been reported.

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The Borough Surveyor reported that all work in connection with the erection of the three Restaurants was proceeding satisfactorily.

#### 9.—HAMPSTEAD GARDEN SUBURB—TEMPLE FORTUNE AREA:

The Chief Officer reported that the Rest Centre referred to in the report of the last meeting (Item 12), even if the size and position were considered suitable, would require the addition of kitchen and washing-up accommodation.

Pursuant to the Committee's instructions, the Ministry of Food have been informed that further enquiries are being pursued in the Temple Fortune area. It was thought that the best method of serving the Garden Suburb would be for Hendon to establish a British Restaurant in Temple Fortune, and for Finehley to establish one in Falloden Way, as if Hendon opened one in Temple Fortune and Finehley one in the Church Hall, Northway, the two Restaurants would be less than half-a-mile apart and would compete with each other. The attention of the Ministry of Food has been directed to this point. A letter was submitted from Miss E. M. Locke pressing for the opening of a Restaurant in the Temple Fortune area.

The Borough Surveyor reported that, pursuant to the Committee's instructions, two empty shops at the junction of Bridge Lane and Bridge Way had been inspected, and that the floor space available would only be sufficient to provide accommodation for 120 persons, and would probably be too small to make an economic unit. After consideration, however, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare a sketch plan showing the total seating capacity, storeroom accommodation, etc.

#### 10,—PROPOSED RESTAURANT, HARTLEY AVENUE, MILL HILL:

The Chairman submitted a letter from the Personnel Department of the London Wholesale Meat Supply Association, Ltd., "Maxwelton," Hale Lane, Mill Hill, N.W.7. stating that approximately 50 of the staff now employed would be willing to support a British Restaurant if one were established in Hartley Avenue.

The Borough Surveyor submitted plans in respect of the above proposed Restaurant, and, in view of the fact that the plot of land is already vested in the Council, he suggested consideration should be given to the question of materials of construction and the appearance in relation to other buildings in the road. In this connection, therefore, the Borough Surveyor suggested that instead of the present system of construction by pre-fabricated slabs, a different method should be adopted, known as the "Orlit," whereby the building is constructed of pre-fabricated wall planks let into the grooves of reinforced concrete stanchions. The building is covered with a flat roof, and the general appearance of the structure is superior to that of the "Nasherete" huts. The capacity of the proposed Restaurant is 150, and the estimated cost is £2.056, plus the cost of hut sections estimated at £750, making a total of £2,806. The Committee are, however, of opinion that preference should, if possible, be given to the erection of brick buildings, which could be utilised after the war, and accordingly

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare plans and estimates for the erection of a building of the "Orlit" type on the lines of his report, and also for the erection of a brick building, both sets of plans and estimates to be submitted to the Ministry of Food.

#### 11.—CRESSINGHAM ROAD SITE:

Consideration was given to the Restaurant proposed to be erected on the above site, and, having regard to the fact that the Ministry of Food are not prepared to sanction the erection of a brick building, the Committee

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RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND.—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare and submit to the Ministry plans and estimates for the construction of an "Orlit" building on similar lines to the proposed Restaurant at

# 12.—SPECIAL TARIFF FOR CHILDREN:

With reference to the Committee's decision at the last meeting (Item 7), the Chief Officer, Meals Service, reported on a Memorandum received from the Board of Education pointing out that a school canteen is being opened at the Clitterhouse School, and will be open, within limits, to any Wessex Gardens School children who are prepared to undertake the journey there and back. It was further stated that a new school kitchen at Bell Lane has been fully equipped, and is at present awaiting delivery of double-purpose boilers. When this centre is completed a canteen will be opened in the Garden Suburb School. As regards Wessex Gardens, immediately all three kitchens are in full operation a school canteen will be established there, but in the interim Clitterhouse can be used.

#### 13.—BRITISH INSTITUTE OF ADULT EDUCATION:

The Chief Officer, Meals Service, submitted a further letter from Lady Elizabeth Clark indicating that the proposed arrangement regarding a mural decoration at the St. Michael's British Restaurant free of cost could not be undertaken, but that several good artists had volunteered to carry out such work for expenses only, and that she could arrange for one of these artists to execute a decoration at St. Michael's on these terms. On the motion for the adoption of the report, Alderman Potter asked the Chairman of the Committee whether, in view of the statement in the Press and the recent wireless broadcast, he could give any information as to the general health position in the Borough at the present time.

The Chairman of the Committee (Alderman Maughan) stated that he welcomed the opportunity to say a few words on health conditions in general, and submitted the following statement:-

"Certain misapprehensions may have arisen in the minds of the public regarding this vitally important subject. I can say straight away that the health conditions in Headon have remained good, and that there is no cause for any vague fears on that account.

You have all had a copy of the Medical Officer of Health's Annual Report for 1941, and perhaps I can in this brief statement summarise for you the features which indicate the health conditions as a whole.

On the debit side the infantile mortality rate, that is, the number of deaths of children under one year of age per 1,000 live births, has increased to 57-not so high as that of the country generally or of the great towns, but higher than that which prevailed in Hendon in the pre-war years, though it must be said that the rate in 1938, namely, 38 per 1,000 live births, was particularly low, and unlikely to be materially lowered until much more knowledge, which can only be the fruits of research, is available.

The incidence of pulmonary tuberculosis showed a slight increase, and this, I may say, is common throughout the country, and is at present the subject of special investigations. number of deaths showed a definite increase, but it must be remembered that pulmonary tuberculosis is a disease of long duration, and a number of deaths occurring now are undoubtedly the result of infection of many years standing.

One other condition should be referred to, not for its seriousness but for its nuisance value; that is, scabies, more commonly called the itch. The incidence of this disease has increased, and as it is intensely irritating, especially when the patient is warm in bed, it can lower the physical standards and consequently affect industrial output quite appreciably. Authority has taken steps to deal with this by making treatment available.

These are the points which I feel should be mentioned on the debit side. What, now, can be placed on the credit side of the balance? The incidence of the main notifiable infectious diseases, with the exception of measles annd whooping-cough, has remained low, and in the case of diphtheria singularly low. Nearly 4,000 children were immunised against this disease by the Local Authority during the year, and I should like to take this opportunity of drawing the attention of all parents to a procedure which can give their children a very high degree of protection.

There was an increase in the number of notifications received of cerebro-spinal fever, a disease which tends to be more prevalent during war. Twenty-six cases were notified to be suffering from this disease, and 11 were admitted to the Borough Isolation Hospital. Of the 11 cases admitted to the Hendon Isolation Hospital, however, the diagnosis of cerebro-spinal fever was only confirmed in two cases. It may be, therefore, that not all the remaining were in fact true

The incidence of typhoid fever, also liable to be more prevalent in time of war, remained cases of this disease. very low. There was at one time an apprehension that damage to water mains consequent upon enemy action might result in outbreaks of this disease, but I can assure the Conneil that the precautions taken by the water companies, with the collaboration of the Local Authorities, have

The nutritional standards of the children, both under five years of age and attending the been most complete. public elementary schools, have remained good, and compare satisfactorily with pre-war standards. The scheme for the provision of milk and supplementary foodstuffs, where considered accessary, was continued, and I should like to take this opportunity of paying tribute to the local Education Authority for the excellent work which is now being undertaken by the provision of a midday meal for the children attending the public elementary schools.

The general birth rate and death rate call for no comment.

This is a very brief picture of the salient facts, and from these I think it is fair to state that the health conditions of the inhabitants of the Borough are being well maintained."

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Since the last meeting of the Council the Committee has met on the 30th September and 14th October, 1942.

#### 1.—MIDDLESEX CIVIL DEFENCE REVIEW:

A total of 255 members of the Hendon Wardens, Rescue, Ambulance, First Aid Post, Report and Control, and Messenger Services took part in a Civil Defence Review and Display arranged by the Middlesex County Council at the Empire Stadium, Wembley, on the 18th October, 1942, to mark the seventh anniversary of Air Raid Precautions. The proceeds of the display, after deducting expenses, will be divided between the Local Authorities in Group 6, to assist in the provision of social and recreational activities for Civil Defence personnel.

#### 2.—ENTERTAINMENT:

The Committee has noted with extreme satisfaction that as a result of a concert arranged by the Wardens' Service at the Brent Bridge Hotel on the 30th September, a donation of £269 has been sent to the Merchant Seamen's Hospital Association.

#### 3.—CIVIL DEFENCE DUTIES (COMPULSORY ENROLMENT) ORDER, 1942:

#### 4.—PRODUCTIVE WORK IN CIVIL DEFENCE DEPOTS:

80 per cent, of the personnel of the Rescue Service and 90 per cent, of the Ambulance Service have volunteered to participate in schemes for the earrying out of productive work by Civil Defence personnel while on duty at the various depots.

Difficulty has, however, been experienced in arranging for the provision of necessary machinery, benches, etc. Enquiries are therefore being made into the possibility of arranging for members of the Services to attend at factories in the vicinity of the depots.

# 5...PROTECTED SLEEPING ACCOMMODATION AT DEPOTS AND POSTS:

A tender submitted by Messrs, H. Pickrill, Ltd., amounting to £475, for the construction of protected sleeping accommodation at John Groom's Crippleage Depot has been provisionally accepted and submitted for the approval of the Regional Commissioners and the Middlesex County Council.

Plans and estimates for the provision of a new building at the Clitterhouse Farm Depot, to provide an adequate recreation room and protected sleeping accommodation (at an estimated cost of £775), and for the erection of a new building at the Hendon County School Depot to overcome the disadvantages of the present arrangements (at a cost of £1.466), have been passed by the Committee for submission to the Middlesex County Council for approval.

The Ministry of Health has approved an expenditure of £483 2s. 5d. on protective works at the Central Hendon, West Hendon and Mill Hill First Aid Posts.

## 6.—EMERGENCY FEEDING SCHEME:

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The following approvals have now been received from the Ministry of Food to an expenditure of £181 5s, on the preparation of the schools previously earmarked by the Ministry of Works and Planning and now released for use as emergency feeding centres:—

The approval of a further expenditure of £22 10s, in the case of Deansbrook School is still under discussion with the Ministry.

The black-out arrangements at the various schools, as originally provided at the expense of the Ministry of Food, are adequate for the purposes of the emergency feeding scheme. The black-out at Sunnyfields School was found to be defective, due to the periodical use of these premises during hours of darkness by a local club and Civil Defence Services. The Committee consider that the Education Committee should be responsible for the cost of the repairs to the black-out at this school, and at such other schools where lettings have involved the use of the black-out provided at the expense of the Ministry of Food. The Education Committee has accordingly been requested to deal with this matter.

#### 7.—FIRE PREVENTION:

(a) Prosecutions.—Proceedings instituted against two persons for failure to perform fire-watching duties have resulted in fines of £100 and £10, plus costs, being imposed.

(b) Town Hall and Adjoining Buildings.—A request received from the Staff F re Watching Committee for the granting of leave of absence to members of the staff prior to reporting for and after completing tours of fire-watching duty has been referred to the Finance and General Purposes Committee, with a recommendation that favourable consideration should be given thereto.

In view of the application of the Fire Prevention (Business Premises) (No. 3) Order, 1942, to the Town Hall and adjoining buildings, the Borough Engineer has been instructed—

- (i) To prepare a register of women employees available for fire-watching,
- (ii) To arrange for the election of female representatives on the Staff Fire Watching Committee.
- (iii) To provide for the appointment of one woman to be generally responsible for the supervision of arrangements made for the female staff.
- (iv) To arrange for the necessary sleeping accommodation, a duty room, and other amenities, as laid down by the Minister of Home Security.
- (e) Business Premises.—Applications made by 19 occupiers of business premises for approval to fire-prevention arrangements at premises within the Borough have been considered and approved.

#### 8.—SHELTERS:

Further works in connection with the waterproofing, concreting, etc., of 107 Anderson shelters have been carried out.

4.926 shelters of the indoor type have now been delivered to households in the Borough. The Ministry of Home Security has been advised of the number of applications in hand for this type of shelter, and a further supply has been promised.

The construction of external lavatories at trench shelters and the lighting of communal shelters has now been completed. Works on strengthening the various public shelters in the Borough and the erection of a shelter at the Watling Rest Centre are proceeding.

While it is appreciated that much of the damage done to public shelters is attributable to youths, some is caused by children throwing stones at the glass panels on doors and the electric light bulbs. The Director of Education has therefore been requested to arrange for masters at the various schools to address the children on this matter.

#### 9.—NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF SPOTTERS' CLUBS:

The Hendon and District Branch of this Association has been successful in obtaining the first two awards for the highest number of marks for general efficiency at recent tests carried out by the London Civil Defence Region.

This Branch, which was inaugurated by the Hendon A.R.P. Department in June. 1941, now has a membership of 106, and is recognised by the Ministry of Home Security as being the official means of training industrial spotters and maintaining their efficiency by way of lectures, identification tests, sound films, etc.
