RATES-COUNCIL SECOND IN 'TABLE'

FOLLOWING THE announcement of the levy of rates for all the 32 London Boroughs, Barnet London Borough Council is placed joint second, with Wandsworth, in the "league table" for domestic rates.

Top of the league is the London Borough of Kensington and Chelsea, which shows an increase of 7.92 (1s. 7d) to 59.00p (11s. 10d.) Barnet shows an increase of 4.67p (11d.) to 59.50p (11s. 11d) and Wandsworth's is 2.58p (6d.) to 59.50p (11s. 11d.)

The London Borough of Tower Hamlets is at the lower end of the scale with an increase of 18.58p (3s. 8d.) to 90.50p (18s. 1d.)

ANOTHER PELICAN CROSSING

A NEW TYPE OF pedestrian crossing, known as a 'Pelican crossing', has been erected at High Road, Finchley, N.12., near to its junction with Lodge Lane, and another at Tally Ho.

The new signalling equipment has been developed by the Department of the Environment, and Barnet Council is erecting it on behalf of the Department and the GLC. Pedestrians wishing to cross at this point-where previously there has been an uncontrolled zebra crossing-will have to observe three figures.

A red figure denotes that it is dangerous to cross and the pedestrian will have to press a button. When a green figure appears on an illuminated panel, pedestrians have priority to cross the road. A flashing green signal denotes that the lights are about to change and warns pedestrians that they should not start to cross.

From the driver's viewpoint, the traffic signals are similar to those already in general operation, except that a flashing amber light warns the motorist to give way to pedestrians and only proceed if the crossing is clear. Amber on its own warns the driver to stop unless it is unsafe to do so.

COUNCILLOR JOHN DOR-RINGTON APTHORP was born in Edgware in 1935. His family have lived in Edgware from before the turn of the century, both grandparents being buried in Edgware Parish Church.

He was educated at Aldenham Public School, and went straight into the Navy, where he was com-missioned and served at the tail end of the Korean War.

After National Service he spent nearly a year in the United States of America, studying Marketing and Management techniques. On his return to the U.K. he joined the family business, E. A. D. Apthorp Ltd., the potato distributors, where he became Managing Director; on the sale of the Company to the Ross Group, he started the Frozen Food Supermarket Chain, Bejam Bulk Buying Limited, of which he is now Chairman and Joint Managing Director.

INTERESTS

His other business interests include farming in the fens, and a share in a hotel in the West Indies. He travels extensively throughout the world, and frequently pilots his own plane on trips around Europe.

A firm opponent of Plan C, and the introduction of Comprehensive Education; all his four children are being educated privately at Boarding Schools.

COMMITTEES

He has served on the Finance, Public Works, Planning and West Hendon Committees on the last Council, and presently serves on the Estates, Planning and Appeals Committees. He is also the senior elected Councillor for the Edgware Ward.

He is on the Management Committee of the Edgware Group of Schools, as well as Rosh Pinah (Jewish) and St. Agnes (R.C.) He also sits on the Steering Committee for the Hendon North Conservative Association as well as on several Trade Committees. His relaxation is shooting.



COUNCILLOR Mrs. D. BRADBURY was elected to the council for the Woodhouse Ward in 1968, and serves on the Housing and Education Committees, and formerly on the Planning Committee. Her work on the Education Committee consists of membership of the Schools and Special Services sub-committee, and the Joint Consultative sub-committee, in addition to which, she is manager of Group Four schools.

She has lived in the Barnet area since she was five, was educated at St. James C. of E. School, N.10. Won a scholarship to Tollington High School for Girls, and is married with two grown-up children. Prior to her marriage she worked for a building society. Councillor Mrs. Bradbury sees her main overall interest as people, particularly as everything to do with local government affects people. She believes that being on the Council gives people someone they can turn to when they are in trouble or any sort of difficulty.

This has led to her becoming involved in a large number of voluntary as well as official, local organisations. These include the Barnet Central Area Road Safety Committee, the Finchley Old People's Welfare Committee, Barnet and District Post Office Advisory Committee, the Manage-ment Committee of the Rendez Vous youth club in Coppetts Road, National Health Service the Middlesex Executive Council and recently the North London Branch Executive of the Family Planning Association to which she was appointed by the Council. She also serves on the Friern Barnet Summer Show sub-committee, and formerly, on the Hospital Management Committee. She is Treasurer of her Local Ward Committee,

In addition, Councillor Mrs. Bradbury takes a keen interest in primary education, because, as she says, "this is where the foundation for education is".

She finds the work of the Council completely absorbing, and much of her spare time is given over to reading the considerable amount of paperwork that is in-volved in "keeping in touch" with the residents of the Borough.



COUNCILLOR V. S. HOCKLEY was first elected as a represent-ative for Hendon Ward in 1968 and was re-elected at the Municipal Elections in May, 1971.

He is vice-chairman of the Council's Finance Committee and a member of the Education Committee, Further Education and Youth Service Sub-Committees, and also of the Budgetary Control Sub-Committee.

Councillor Hockley is a Chartered Accountant in practice in the City, where he also acts as a consultant on business finance and taxation.

He is a Bachelor of Commerce of London University and a Fellow of the Association of Certified Accountants, of which Association he was Education and Technical Officer from 1963 to 1965. He was a lecturer and examiner in Accountancy at the London School of Economics, a post he held for three years, and has been lecturing in Accountancy at Birmingham and Cardiff.

Councillor Hockley is currently Visiting Lecturer in Business, Finance at Brunel University, Uxbridge and is senior lecturer for the Institute of Bankers, as well as being a lecturer to other accountancy and professional bodies. Further, he is an assessor and moderator of examinations in Business Studies to more than a dozen polytechnics.

Particularly interested in religious education for over ten years, Councillor Hockley became Joint Treasurer of the London Board of Jewish Religious Education and he was a governor of the Jews' Free Comprehensive School, Camden Town, from 1966 to 1968.

He is a governor of Hendon College of Technology, the College of Speech and Drama, and a manager of St. Mary's Church of England School, as well as being a governor of the Hasmonean Grammar School and Menorah Primary School.

Formerly Treasurer of Hendon 4th Scout Group, Councillor Hockley is now Joint Treasurer of the Jewish Blind Society.

BARNET COLLEGE EXTENSIONS GO AHEAD

PLANS ARE now well advanced for Phase III of Barnet College of Further Education. Phase III involves an extension of the College's present premises at Wood Street, Barnet and this will permit the work of the Art Department, presently carried out at the old John Hampden School annexe, to be transferred to the main College site.

The new accommodation will include, not only classrooms, but also art studios, photographic and craft studios, a students' common room and a hall. It is hoped that building will start in 1972 and be completed in 1974.

ALTERATIONS AT HENDON LIBRARY

THE BOROUGH OF BARNET'S Central Library at The Burroughs, Hendon is to be closed for structural alterations in the near future. Members of the public will be warned well in advance of the closure.

The alterations, which are expected to take up to 18 months will involve the extension of the ground floor at the back of the building, and the addition of two extra floors above the present lending library. The front of the library facing out on to The Burroughs, will not be affected.

Purpose of the alterations, as

well as increasing the amount of material that can be displayed at any one time, is to make more room available for viewing present book and record stocks, and to create better facilities for students. It is anticipated that the present area of the lending library will be nearly trebled.

While the library is closed for alterations, the Council will be providing alternative temporary facilities at St. Mary's Community Centre, Egerton Gardens, N.W.4 (reference library), and Sunny Gardens Road, Hendon (adult lending library, junior library and music library.)

BEWARE OF THESE CHILDREN'S SEASONAL HAZARDS

THE DROWNING SEASON is upon us. Most fatalities take place in June, July and August, during holiday time when children all too frequently are allowed to wander off unsupervised.

Despite the publicity for RoSPA's National Water Safety Campaign 'Water Can Be Dangerous' it is evident that parents are still ignoring or not recognising the danger of water, by the continued reports of child drowning accidents reported in the press. In one month alone the hazards are highlighted by details such as the following :

1. The four year old girl whose body was found in an unfenced canal only 75yards from her home. 2. The six year old boy who drowned in the river at the bottom of his garden whilst in the charge of an adult.

3. The nine year old who used the family barge to collect his dog, but drowned in only one foot of water.

4. A five year old who dived into a canal while playing with his friends.

5. The youngster who fell overboard from a hired boat after his father let him remove his lifejacket between locks.

RoSPA reminds all parents of their responsibility in keeping children under strict supervision when playing near water, whether it be inland, coastal, quarry or simply the garden pond, and of the utmost necessity to teach children to swim and life save at the earliest possible age.

As a guide to parents the Barnet London Borough Council issues this safety plan for a drownproof summer.

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1. Never leave young children alone when playing near or in water.

2. Encourage them to gain water confidence at about the age of 3 or 4 in the safety of the local swimming baths and then to go on to learn how to swim. If there is no swimming pool in your area get your friends to help pressurise for one.

3. Teach children to keep away from canal and river banks, and gravel pits where dangers lurk for the young and unwary.

4. If your children are wearing swimming aids, and these should only be used in pools, it must be remembered that these are no substitute for close supervision. Many swimming experts are against their use because they can carry a child out of his depth.

GOING ON HOLIDAY

1. Sea bathing can be dangerous. If there are lifeguards bathe in their patrol area.

2. Know the time of tides, they come in with a rush and can cut you off from the shore.

3. Go in the sea with children and keep them within waist depth. 4. Airbeds and floating toys should never be used in the sea, where winds and currents can carry

Concessionary fares scheme in operation

FROM JULY 1, 1971, the London Borough of Barnet began operating a concessionary bus fares scheme which will allow permit holders to travel at child-rate on Red Buses from Monday to Friday, inclusive, for journeys commencing between 9.30 a.m. and 3.30 p.m.

The following categories of person are invited to apply for permits at :-

(A) COST PRICE :

All men over 65 years of age and women over 60 years of age resident in the Borough. (B) REDUCED RATE:

- (1) men over 65 years of age and women over 60 years of age who are resident in the Borough and are in receipt of supplementary benefit, or are entitled to a rate rebate, and their spouses if they are also of retirement age;
- (2) residents in Residential Homes for the Elderly provided by the Council and residents in Voluntary or Private Homes registered by the Council whom the Director of Social Services or the Matron concerned, as the case may be, consider would by reason of his/her physical capabilities be able to benefit from the fares scheme; and
- (3) any resident who would otherwise be required to pay the full adult fare and who IS
 - (i) a registered blind person, or
 - (ii) a registered disabled person who, in the opinion of the Medical Officer of Health, is suffering from any disability or injury which seriously

impairs his or her ability to walk.

All permits expire on March 31, 1972.

For the nine month period July 1, 1971 to March 31, 1972 the charge made per permit will be as follows :-

(A) At Cost Price - £2.51p (B) At Reduced Rate — 36p

The charge made per permit for the period indicated will decrease proportionately according to the month from which the permit is operative.

A Teachers' Centre at West Harrow has, since March 1967 been jointly financed by the London Boroughs of Barnet, Brent and Harrow. This partnership, although highly successful, was only intended as an interim development because there are many Barnet teachers for whom Harrow is virtually inaccessible.

An organiser was appointed in September 1970, and within a week or two he and his secretary found there was considerable support from Barnet teachers for almost every activity initiated by the centre.

All matters of policy are decided by the Governing Council which reflects the needs of the teachers in the Borough. Advice is available from Her Majesty's Inspectorate, Head Teachers, the Borough's own specialist Advisers and the Institute of Education of the University of London. Whatever the needs of Barnet teachers, these are conveyed to the Governing Council by the Organiser, who then tries to fulfil them.

Study panels in a number of subjects, at primary and secondary level, are flourishing. These began merely as meetings of subject teachers who were glad to be able to exchange ideas on Curriculum Developments. From these more or less informal meetings Working Parties are now operating. Many courses have been implemented by the Borough advisers and although these have become well-established over the years, they are now being held more conveniently at the Teachers' Centre. Sometimes teachers attend from Brent schools.

LITTER FINE IS NOW £100

BARNET LONDON BOROUGH COUNCIL wishes to draw the attention of all residents to a recent amendment of the Litter Act of 1958, which states that offenders can now be fined a maximum of $\pounds 100$ instead of a fine of $\pounds 10$.

The Act further provides that, in sentencing a person convicted of an offence under the Act, a court shall have regard not only to the purpose of the Act in preventing the defacement by litter of places in the open air, but also to the nature of the litter and any resulting risk, in the circumstances of the offence, of injury to persons or animals or of damage to property.

Leaving an old car abandoned on a public highway would constitute an offence under the Dangerous Litter Act, and residents are reminded that they may drive their unwanted vehicles to the Greater London Council depot at Summers Lane, N.12, and leave them free of charge, provided they take along the vehicle's log book.

There is also a scheme whereby the Council will collect the vehicle, if it is not drivable, at a rate of £2 for towing, or £3 if the vehicle cannot be towed. Enquiries for this service should be made to 01-349 9121—the Borough Engineer and Surveyor's Department.
