#### MOBILE CANTEEN SERVICE:

The Committee considered a report submitted by the Chief Officer, Meals Service, on the provision of transport for the suggested mobile canteen service. The Civil Defence Organisation is unable,, for the reasons indicated to the Committee, to provide transport for a regular service, but the Hon. Organiser of the Ford Emergency Food Vans Trust, in a letter dated 26th October, stated that it might be possible to provide a van, and suggested that the Divisional Food Officer for the area should be approached, as all requests for such vans have to receive the endorsement of the Ministry of Food.

On the question of the operation of the suggested service, the Chief Officer, Meals Service, pointed out that the responsibility of the Meals Service must be restricted to the cooking of food and placing it in containers, and it would therefore be necessary to enquire of the Hampstead Garden Suburb Fellowship or the Centre Organiser for the W.V.S. whether they would be prepared to take over the organisation and administration of the service from the time when the cooked food is put into containers for delivery until the time when the empty containers are returned to the restaurant for the next day's issue. The organisation would have to assume responsibility for payment for meals when collected on a "cash-and-carry" basis at the restaurant.

A report was also submitted by the Borough Treasurer dealing with the financial implications based on the regular supply and delivery of 80 meals per day for two days each week; provision by the Council of six sets of suitable containers, at an estimated cost of £6 17s. 6d. per set; maintenance of a van to be provided free, and the services of a voluntary unpaid driver. On this basis the additional cost for transport and containers would be 2d. per meal.

The Borough Treasurer is of opinion that the delivery of meals is ancillary to the British Restaurant Service, and cannot, therefore, enter into the accounts of that Service without the consent of the Ministry of Food. Special deliveries must therefore cease, should the distribution service fail to cover expenses, as the Council have no power to charge the rates for such an activity.

The Committee considered the possibility of developing the service to cover other parts of the Borough where a similar need may exist, but before taking any further action in the matter they have given instructions for the following information to be obtained:—

(a) Whether, if the Council institute a mobile meals service and there should be loss through cost of deliveries, such loss could be charged to the British Restaurants Account; 2.—0

- (e) Whether the Hampstead Garden Suburb Fellowship will be prepared to take over the organisation and administration of the service on the lines indicated above.

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# 6.—HENDON ISOLATION AND EMERGENCY HOSPITAL:

It was reported to me that the Ministry of Health had agreed to the application put forward by the Council, pursuant to the resolution of the 26th July last (P.H. & M.S. 5/7/43—26), for the release of Block 6 for the purpose of the isolation of cases of infectious disease, as soon as accommodation can be found for the cases there. In view of the fact that the existing isolation accommodation at the hospital is very limited, I gave authority for a communication to be sent to the Ministry asking them to expedite the arrangement, and to indicate a date when the block will be released.

# 7.—MILL HILL HEALTH CENTRE:

An application was submitted to me from the Mill Hill, Middlesex 120 Detachment of the British Red Cross, for the use of the Mill Hill Health Centre for one further Friday evening, for the purpose of holding an examination at the conclusion of the course of lectures on home nursing which is at present being conducted at the Centre, pursuant to the authority of the Council (Minutes 27/9/43, page 712—Resolution No. 331). On the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health I granted the application, subject to the period of the indemnity being extended accordingly.

#### 8.—LIBRARY SERVICE:

- (a) The resignation of Mrs. I. Sheppard, senior assistant, having been received, approval has been given to the recommendation of the Borough Librarian that Miss N. Herman be transferred from the clerical to the library staff in Grade D, at a commencing salary of £195, as from 1/11/43, while she holds the position. It is not at present proposed to fill the vacancy for a shorthand-typist caused by Miss Herman's transfer.
- (b) An expenditure of two guineas has been approved on a puppet show to be given to the children in the Central Junior Library on 18th November.

That the Local Education Authority accept financial responsibility for the cost of the maintenance of this child at St. Catherine's Home, Ventnor, for a period of six months from the 30th October, 1943 (the date of the parents' removal into this area), the position to be then reviewed with a view to an extension, if necessary.

# II. Income Scale for the Provision of Additional Nourishment and the Reduction or Remission of Fees.

The Maternity and Child Welfare Act of 1918 and the Education Act of 1921 conferred on Local Authorities powers to reduce or remit the contribution of parents for additional nourishment, or for any treatment which is being provided under these Acts. The purpose of this power is to ensure that no family shall be reduced below a reasonable level of nutrition because of the need for treatment of another member of the family.

The Council, on the 18th March, 1940 (Minutes, pages 330-333), revised the economic scale then in existence, when the cost of living index figure and risen to 177. This figure has now increased to 200, and it would appear equitable that the scale should be adjusted to the present index figure.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that, as was anticipated, the increase of employment and the higher rate of wages has resulted in a decrease in the number of those seeking reduction or remission of fees. Nevertheless, those whose financial circumstances bring them within the scale, are in a more difficult position than previously, and in many instances they are the families of members of the armed Forces.

The Medical Officer of Health therefore recommended that the income scale for the provision of additional nourishment and the reduction or remission of fees be revised, and submitted a suggested amended scale, which, if approved, would require the approval of the Ministry of Health.

The following administrative memorandum No. 483, issued by the Board of Education, on the subject of "Aid to Students and Charges for School Meals and Milk," was also submitted:—

"Representations have been made to the Board by the Ministry of Labour and National Service that married women with families may in some instances have been deterred from taking employment outside their homes by reason of the possibility that the whole of their earnings would be taken into account by Local Education Authorities in re-assessing the fee remissions and maintenance allowances granted in respect of their children attending secondary or junior technical schools, or other institutions of higher education. Similar considerations arise in connection with Local Education Authorities' arrangements for total or partial remission of charges for school meals and milk.

"In view of the importance, in present circumstances, of encouraging mothers to engage in either full or part-time employment outside their homes, and of the possibility that this may involve expenditure in travelling to and from their work, and in paying for additional labour in the home, the Board consider that it would be appropriate for Local Education Authorities in administering their income scales to ignore earnings derived from such employment if they do not exceed £1 a week, and if they exceed £1 a week to take account only of the excess. It is hoped that Local Education Authorities generally will adopt this practice as a war-time measure."

The Committee are agreed as to the need for the revision of the income scales, and as to the desirability of effect being given to the recommendation contained in the Board of Education's memorandum, when assessing applications for the total or partial remission of charges for school meals and milk. They are, however, of opinion that the suggested scale should receive detailed consideration, and they have therefore appointed a Sub-Committee consisting of the following members to consider the whole question and to submit a revised scale:—

#### III. Dental Services.

On the 19th April last (Minutes, page 350) the Council adopted, subject to the approval of the Board of Education, the following resolutions:—

- (a) That an advertisement be issued for a full-time temporary Dental Officer, in accordance with the Council's grading scheme, at a commencing salary of £550 per annum, plus war bonus.
- (b) That an additional temporary Dental Attendant be appointed, in accordance with the Council's grading scheme, at a commencing salary of £130 per annum, plus war bonus.
- (c) That the necessary equipment be purchased for the re-establishment of the dental clinic at the Central Hendon Health Centre, at an estimated cost of £250.

The Board of Education were not prepared to approve for purposes of grant the expenditure involved by the appointment of a full-time Dental Officer, but after consultation between the Medical Officer of Health and officers of the Board, the Board intimated that they would offer no objection to the Council engaging a Dental Officer part time, and were prepared to agree to increase the allocation of the salaries of school dental officers from two and seven-tenths to three full-time for the treatment of elementary school children. Arrangements were accordingly made for the engagement of a part-time dental practitioner on a sessional basis, in accordance with the British Dental Association's scale of two guineas for a 2½-hour session.

Subsequently, Mr. Metcali, one of the Council's dental officers, resigned his appointment, and advertisements were issued inviting applications for the appointment of a successor, at a salary in accordance with the appropriate scale, the commencing salary to be determined according to the experience of the person appointed.

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The Medical Officer of Health reported that at the present time one dental practitioner is engaged on four sessions per week, but that there are still large arrears of work which cannot be overtaken without employing the equivalent of at least one additional full-time dental officer. He therefore recommended that, provided the applicants who were to be interviewed by the Committee in connection with the appointment of a dental officer vice Mr. Metcalf were satisfactory, an additional temporary dental officer be appointed to overtake the arrears in the examination and treatment of children attending the secondary schools (under the arrangements made with the Middlesex County Council), and the increased work in the Maternity and Child Welfare Section.

The appointment of the additional full-time dental officer would necessitate the implementation of resolutions (b) and (c) set out above.

The Committee were in agreement with the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, and proceeded to interview the following three selected candidates:-

Mr. D. F. Denniss, L.D.S., R.C.S.(Eng.), who, prior to accepting a commission in the Army Dental Corps (which he relinquished on medical grounds), was County Dental Officer to the Isle of Wight County Council.

Mr. E. C. Humphreys, L.D.S., R.C.S.(Eng.), Dental Officer, Bedfordshire County Council.

Mr. E. Kerpel, M.D.(Vienna), D.S.(Austria), L.D.S., R.C.S.(Eng.), Temporary Dental Officer, Hendon Borough Council.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That, subject to satisfactory medical examination, Mr. D. F. Denniss be appointed whole-time Dental Officer, vice Mr. Metcalf, at a commencing salary of £625 per annum, rising by one increment of £25 to a maximum of £650 per annum, plus cost-of-living bonus as approved by the Council.
- (b) That, subject to satisfactory medical examination, Mr. E. Kerpel be appointed temporary whole-time Dental Officer (subject to the Council's regulations relating to temporary officers), at a commencing salary of £550 per annum, rising by annual increments of £25 to a maximum of £650 per annum, plus cost-of-living bonus as approved by the Council.
- (c) That an advertisement be issued for an additional temporary dental attendant, at a salary in accordance with the Council's grading scale, commencing at £130 per annum, plus war bonus.
- (d) That the necessary equipment be purchased for the re-establishment of the dental clinic at the Central Hendon Health Centre, at an estimated cost of £250.
- (e) That the expenditure involved by the proposals indicated in recommendations (c) and (d) be charged to the Maternity and Child Welfare Services account.

#### IV. Dental Anæsthesia.

In 1937 a portable Walton gas and oxygen apparatus was purchased, and has since been in continuous use. The Committee are informed that this apparatus is not now suited to the duration of the present sessions and the volume of work which is being undertaken. The Medical Officer of Health reports that he has considered the matter very fully with a view to (a) finding a portable apparatus which would stand up to the continuous employment, or (b) a congregation of all anæsthetic cases at one or two surgeries, but neither alternative has proved satisfactory. He therefore recommends that each of the four dental surgeries be equipped with a Walton Model 2 gas-and-oxygen apparatus, each at an approximate cost of £68.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health be approved and adopted.

# V. Retirement of Mrs. Bascom, Health Visitor.

Mrs. Bascom, who was the first health visitor to be appointed by the Council (in 1919), will be retiring from the Council's service on the 12th December next. During the whole period of her service Mrs. Bascom has proved to be a very reliable and capable officer, invariably tactful in her dealings with the public with whom she came into contact, and to many of whom she became not only a health visitor but a confidant and friend.

The Committee desire to place on record its appreciation of the services of Mrs. Bascom, and have given instructions for a letter conveying an expression of such appreciation, coupled with good wishes for a long and happy period of retirement, to be sent to Mrs. Bascom.

# VI. Appointment of Temporary Health Visitor, School Nurse and Infant Life Protection Visitor.

In connection with the appointment of a temporary health visitor, etc., consequent upon the retirement of Mrs. Bascom, the Committee

The Director of Education submitted a letter which he had addressed to the Board thereon, which had been approved by the Chairman, and stated that he had subsequently interviewed officials of the Board of Education with regard to the above matters. It is hoped that as a result of such interview the Board will formally approve the erection of an additional overground shelter as specified.

# 6.—STRENGTHENING OF OVERGROUND SHELTERS FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN:

The Director of Education reported that, as instructed by the Committee at their last meeting, he had made strong representations to the Board of Education asking them to reconsider their decision with regard to the strengthening of all overground air-raid shelters for school children. Officers of the Board have been interviewed, and it is hoped that formal approval thereto will be forthcoming in due course.

#### 7.—EXTENSION OF SCHOOL MEALS SERVICE:

It was reported that subsequent to an interview between officers of the Board of Education and the Director of Education with regard to the Committee's scheme for the extension of their school meals service, a letter had been received from the Board stating that they have noted with appreciation the Authority's comprehensive proposals for the provision of school meals in their area. The Board point out, however, that, having regard to the available supply of building labour, it may not be possible to initiate simultaneously the whole of the proposals. The Board therefore ask the Committee to consider developing their scheme by stages, and suggest that a commencement might be made with two central kitchens, one for 2,000 meals daily and the other for 1,000 meals daily.

#### RESOLVED-

- (a) THAT the Board of Education be informed that the Education Committee agree to proceed with their scheme in the manner suggested.
- (b) THAT application be made to the Town and Country Planning Interim Development Authority for permission to erect the two kitchens mentioned above on the following sites:—

## 14.—NATIONAL CENTRAL LIBRARY:

The Chief Librarian submitted the following report on the work of the National Central Library, as shown by the 26th and 27th annual reports of the Executive Committee covering the years 1941-42 and 1942-43.

The reports, which are signed by Sir Frederick G. Kenyon, G.B.E., K.C.B., Chairman of the Executive Committee, show that the Library has continued its normal service to urban, county, university and other libraries, not only by lending books and arranging for the loan of books between one library and another, but also by the supply of bibliographical information. Special work has included assistance to Government Departments, national research associations and other institutions doing research; the loan of educational books to men and women serving in the Forces (at the request of the War Office); the compilation of special book lists for the Prisoners of War Department of the British Red Cross Society; the loan of educational books to aliens in internment camps (at the request of the Home Office); and the loan of books in their own languages, so far as the limited supply has made it possible, to sailors, soldiers, airmen and civilian refugees from allied countries.

Reference is made to the damage done on the night of 16th-17th April, 1941, when about two-thirds of the premises of the library were destroyed by fire caused by enemy action. The total number of books lost was 104,347. Following are relevant statistics:—

## 15.—REBINDING OF BOOKS:

The Chief Librarian reported that from July, 1942, to January, 1943, owing to arrears of work caused by shortage of staff, public library book binders could accept from libraries no books for rebinding. In November, 1942, the Council was advised that for the year 1943 binders could only cope with 75 per cent. of the volumes sent for binding in 1941. In current estimates provision was therefore made for rebinding 7,580 volumes, namely, 75 per cent. of the 1941 total. This should be contrasted with the total of 11,450 volumes actually rebound in 1938, the last pre-war normal year. From April, 1943, to date 9,375 volumes have been withdrawn for rebinding, including arrears brought forward from last year; 5,685 of these have been or are being rebound. It is anticipated that further withdrawals up to the end of March, 1944, will exceed the number (1,895) to be rebound, and that thereafter books withdrawn will continue to exceed those that can be rebound under the quota. At present there are 3,700 volumes awaiting rebinding (including arrears brought forward) for which no provision has been made in estimates, owing to operation of the quota referred to above.

The position has been explained to the binders, who have offered to accept 3,000 volumes over and above the 1943 quota, on condition that all are sent in one consignment. If the offer is accepted it would still leave in hand several hundred books withdrawn from circulation. The present shortage of novels, replacements, and children's books is such that it would be a public advantage to have these 3,000 books rebound and put back into circulation, as demands on the library service are almost back to pre-war volume. The estimated cost of rebinding the additional 3,000 volumes for all three libraries is £400, based on current prices. No provision for this expenditure has been made in the 1943-44 estimates, but notwithstanding this fact the Committee are of opinion that the rebinding of the additional 3,000 volumes is very necessary. They accordingly

## 16.—BRITISH RECORDS ASSOCIATION:

The following report was submitted by Miss E. E. Pyman, who was appointed as the Council's delegate to the 11th Annual Conference of the British Records Association, which was held at the Vintners' Hall, Upper Thames Street, London, on Tuesday, the 16th November:—

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"The Conference was attended by over 100 delegates, members and referees of various book recovery drives. The business meetings of the Technical and Records Preservation Sections and the annual general meeting of the Association were held during the morning session. The chief subject under discussion was 'Post-War Dangers to Records.' These were mainly due to the absence of central control, and could be met in some degree by the compilation of a national register. The Master of the Rolls had therefore set up a Joint Committee to consider this subject, comprising representatives of the British Records Association and the Historical Manuscripts Commission, and a preliminary meeting has already been held.

"In the afternoon session an informal discussion was held on 'The use of Microphotography by Students of Archives," and demonstrations in microphotography were given by members of the staff of the Public Record Office."

## 17.—STAFF:

The Chief Librarian reported that Mr. W. A. Taylor, who entered the library service in Hendon as a junior assistant in September, 1933, and resigned in December, 1936, to take up an appointment in St. Marylebone Public Library, has been awarded the Croix de Guerre and M.C. Mr. Taylor, now a captain in the Royal Artillery, has recently recovered from wounds received in Tunisia.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council do extend to Captain W. A. Taylor, R.A., their hearty congratulations on his being awarded the high military distinctions of the Croix de Cuerre and the Military Cross, and express their keen sense of satisfaction on his recovery from the wounds sustained by him in the service of the country.

Dyson, Organising Tutor of the University of London Tutorial Classes Committee for Middlesex, asking the Council to grant the Golders Green Branch of the Workers' Educational Association the use of accommodation at Golders Green Branch Library for the purpose of holding adult lecture-discussion courses or classes. The courses form part of the national provision for adult education, and in this connection it will be recalled that the Council have already agreed to grant the use of library premises for similar educational purposes.

One course of lectures has already been held under the auspices of the Association in the library premises, but no difficulty was experienced, because the librarian-in-charge voluntarily remained behind after the normal closing hours to open and close the premises outside her ordinary duties, but this cannot be further continued. To continue to use the library premises for the purpose of lecture courses will involve the presence of the caretaker for the required number of hours, and will necessitate payment of overtime at the appropriate rate—approximately 7s. 6d. per night for one night each week. It is pointed out that had these lectures been arranged under the auspices of the Council, as in peace-time they might well have been, payment of overtime would be a normal charge on the library services. The Committee feel that as a contribution to the cause of adult education the required facilities should be granted without charge, and accordingly

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ted as ssociaesday, RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application be granted, and that any expenditure involved by the payment of overtime to the caretaker be borne by the Council.

The Committee at its last meeting (B. & T.P. 4/10/43—15) refused the application of Miss R. F. Parker for permission to erect at the rear of 61, Daws Lane, Mill Hill, a single-storey brick building for the purpose of treating dogs and cats needing medical attention. The applicant has requested the Committee to reconsider its decision, and submits a petition signed by 19 persons, who occupy 12 dwellings, stating that they have no objection to the erection of the buildings, as they feel that the work to be carried on therein is beneficial to the surrounding neighbourhood. The site is included in a residential area in Hendon Planning Scheme No. 1.

After further consideration of the matter, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the necessary consent be granted, subject to the submission of plans for approval by the Committee.

## 29.-NO. 3, THE MARKET, HALE LANE, EDGWARE:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the City Engineering Company, Ltd., for permission to use the empty shop premises known as No. 3, The Market, Hale Lane, Edgware, for the manufacture of aircraft components. The total number of persons to be employed will be twelve, and it is proposed only to work a day shift.

- (a) That consent be granted to the user of the premises for the purpose indicated for the duration of the war, subject to the applicants entering into an agreement in the usual form relating to war-time consents, and containing clauses for the protection of adjacent property;

## 31.—GENERAL SCHEME FOR REPAIR OF HOUSES, ETC.:

## Ministry of Health Circular No. 2871.

The above-mentioned circular sets out in detail the procedure to be followed with a view to making the best practicable arrangements for applying in present conditions the principle adopted by the Government, that after the demands for war purposes have been met housing should have the first call on immobile building labour. The object of Government policy is to secure that available building labour and materials should be used so as to secure the maximum amount of improvement to the largest possible number of houses. The priority to be accorded to the work should therefore depend on the nature and not on the cause of the defects, and on the measure of the improvement in housing conditions which will result from the execution of the work.

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ants to ttee be Under the provisions of the Circular the Local Authority are required to give a certificate of essentiality in all cases where an application is made to the Ministry of Works for a licence for the repair of domestic property within the Borough. The work coming within the scope of the scheme covers the following:—

- (1) Essential work on the further repair of war-damaged houses;
- (2) Work in respect of which a Local Authority issues a statutory notice for the execution of works of maintenance and repair to a house under either the Housing or Public Health Acts;
- (3) Works of repair or maintenance which the Local Authority certify to be essential to avoid danger to health or grave deterioration of structure;
- (4) Works of repair, adaptation or conversion certified by the Local Authority as essential to bring into use for housing purposes accommodation not at present used for that purpose so as to relieve an urgent housing need in the district;
- (5) Works certified by the Local Authority as necessary for the completion of partly-built houses which the Authority are satisfied will be brought into occupation so as to relieve an urgent housing need in the district.

It should be noted that certificates of essentiality can only be issued in respect of work estimated to cost not more than £250 in respect of a house and £200 per dwelling in the case of flats or similar tenements.

The procedure adopted is that the Ministry of Works send all applications for a building licence to the Local Authority, who are required to make the necessary inspections and return the application with or without the necessary certificate within five days.

The Borough Engineer reported that, in order to prevent delay in the grant of the necessary licences, he had issued certificates of essentiality in respect of 23 properties detailed in his report; and that certificates had been refused in the case of 14 properties for the reasons indicated in his report.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken by the Borough Engineer be confirmed, and that he be authorised to deal with all future applications for certificates of essentiality under the provisions of Ministry of Health Circular No. 2871, details of action taken to be reported to this Committee.

## Part I .- Medical Services.

34.—ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1942:

The Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health and School Medical Officer for the year 1942, a copy of which had been circulated, was submitted and received.

## 35.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936 (PART VII.)—CHILD LIFE PROTECTION:

## (i) Case No. 337.

The Medical Officer of Health reported on an application (Case No. 337) for permission to undertake for reward the nursing and maintenance of children under the age of nine years apart from their parents.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the maximum number of foster children under the age of nine years that may be kept at the premises in respect of case No. 337 be fixed at one.

## (ii) Case No. 69.

On the 26th June, 1934, the Council fixed at 13 the maximum number of foster children under the age of nine years that may be kept at the premises in respect of Case No. 69. At that time the staff employed was adequate, having regard to the number of children permitted to be kept at the premises. Recently, however, there has been a drastic reduction in the number of staff engaged, and also a lowering of the standard of the staff. After consideration of the report of the Medical Officer of Health, the Committee

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the maximum number of children under nine years of age that may be kept at the premises in respect of Case No. 69 be fixed at four so long as only one nurse is engaged at the premises, and that this number be increased by four in respect of each additional nurse engaged, provided that the maximum number of children to be kept at the premises must not exceed twelve, and that one member of the staff shall be nursery trained or have some higher qualification.
- (2) That the children under five years of age be brought to the Health Centre for medical examination at least once in every three months.
- (3) That the second-floor rooms at these premises shall not be used for the accommodation of children.

## 36.—TEMPORARY ASSISTANT MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH AND ASSISTANT SCHOOL MEDICAL OFFICER:

It was reported that Dr. M. F. Coveney had tendered her resignation, and that to fill the vacancy His Worship the Mayor had authorised, under Recess powers, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Health, the appointment of Dr. Mary Watson, M.B., Ch.B., Assistant Medical Officer of Health and Resident Medical Officer under the Metropolitan Borough of Fulham, who was recently interviewed by the Committee for a similar appointment.

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## 37.—MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE CENTRE, ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH HALL, EDGWARE—ADDITIONAL SESSION:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that the attendances at the above Centre have increased to such an extent as to justify the holding of an additional session.

It was also reported that the heating facilities proved inadequate during the cold weather, and that the Church authorities are willing to arrange for the installation of two plugs, so that electric fires can be used for supplementary heating, provided the Council accept responsibility for 50 per cent. of the cost. The Northmet Power Company estimate the cost of the work at £13 4s. 8d.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That the sessions at the Maternity and Child Welfare Centre, St. Andrew's Church Hall, Edgware, be increased to two per week, and that it be left to the Borough Treasurer and Medical Officer of Health to agree with the church authorities as to the rent to be charged.
- (b) That the Council agree to bear half the cost of the installation of two electric plugs on the basis of the estimate above referred to.

## 38.—THE CARE OF ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN— MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR 2866:

The above-mentioned circular states that the Minister of Health has had under special consideration the problems arising under the war conditions in regard to illegitimate children, and calls the attention of welfare authorities to the importance of the matter, and asking them, even in the present difficult circumstances, to give earnest consideration to the problems presented.

The Minister suggests that welfare authorities should co-operate with and reinforce the work of existing voluntary moral welfare associations, and should formulate a scheme for this purpose. The range of work will be wide, and will necessitate the appointment of a trained worker experienced in the special problems she will have to handle. The Minister states that in county districts it would probably be desirable to arrange for a combination of areas, and he suggests that the County Council might call a conference of the separate welfare authorities within the County in order that a joint scheme might be prepared.

The Committee have deferred consideration of the matter pending information as to whether it is the intention of the County Council to convene a conference as indicated in the circular.

## 39.—"HOME HELPS" SCHEME:

A letter was submitted from the Mill Hill Queen's Nursing Association asking the Council to extend the operation of its "Home Helps" Scheme to patients attended by the nurses of the Mill Hill Queen's Nursing Association, who, since the war, have undertaken the care of midwifery cases under arrangements with the Medical Officer of Health.

Home helps are only provided under the Council's scheme in maternity cases where the municipal midwife is engaged for domiciliary confinements and the patient is unable to arrange privately for a home help.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Mill Hill Queen's Nursing Association be informed that, whilst the Council are unable to accede to their request, they are, nevertheless, prepared to allow them to inspect the list of home helps.

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Metfor a 40.—HEALTH CENTRES, ISOLATION HOSPITAL, ETC.—ROTA OF VISITORS:

The Committee decided to continue the Visiting Rota on the same lines as last year.

## 41.—CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF THE HENDON NURSING ASSOCIATION \_\_ REPRESENTATION:

Pursuant to the reference from the Annual Meeting of the Council relative to the appointment of representatives on the Central Committee of the Hendon Nursing Association, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Chairman of the Committee (Councillor L. Hirshfield), Councillor Mrs. F. E. Parvin and the Medical Officer of Health be appointed to serve on the above Committee for the ensuing year.

## 42.—THE TAVISTOCK CLINIC—FEES:

For many years the Council have paid for the treatment of children sent to the Tavistock Clinic on the basis of 7s. 6d. for the first consultation and 3s. for each treatment interview. A letter has now been received from the Medical Director of the Children's Department of the Clinic stating that most of their arrangements with public authorities are on the basis of the commonly accepted figure of 15s. for the first interview and 5s. for treatment, and enquiring whether the Council would be prepared to agree to this arrangement for cases referred on and after the 1st January, 1944. On consideration of the report of the Medical Officer of Health, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council agree to pay for all cases referred to the Tavistock Clinic on and after the 1st January, 1944, on the basis of 15s. for the first interview and 5s. for treatment.

## 43.—ACCOMMODATION FOR MATERNITY CASES — PROPOSED BOROUGH MATERNITY HOME:

It was reported that on Monday, the 1st November, the deputation appointed by the Committee, consisting of the Mayor (Alderman Copestake), Alderman Richardson and Teare; Councillors Hirshfield (Chairman), Bridge and Mrs. Parvin, together with the Medical Officer of Health, the Borough Engineer and the Town Clerk's representative, was received by Mr. Lindsay and other officers of the Ministry of Health, when the whole question of the proposed provision of a Borough Maternity Home was very fully discussed, and the Ministry's officers stated that the points put forward by the deputation would receive the fullest consideration by the Ministry, whose decision would be communicated to the Council.

The Ministry's decision was contained in a letter dated the 13th November, in the following terms:—

"Sir,

## Accommodation for Maternity Cases.

I am directed by the Minister of Health to refer to the correspondence which has taken place and the recent discussion in this office in regard to the provision of maternity accommodation by the Headon Borough Council.

As requested at the interview, a copy of the letter received from the Middlesex County Council is now forwarded, with the County Council's consent.

The whole position has again been carefully considered in this office, but for all the reasons given in regard to the most economical use of labour and materials, and the future policy for the organisation of hospital provision by the County Councils, the Minister is unable to depart from the decision already communicated to you in a letter dated 31st August last. The Minister is still of the opinion that the Home which will shortly be provided by the County Council in the neighbourhood of Hendon will go some way towards meeting the demands in your area.

The letter to the Ministry of Health from the Middlesex County Council, mentioned in the second paragraph of the letter set out above, is in the following terms:-

" 27th August, 1943.

Sir,

## Maternity Accommodation: Borough of Hendon.

I am directed to refer to the Minister's letter of the 12th August concerning a proposal of the Hendon Borough Council to provide a maternity home, and, in accordance with the Minister's invitation, to submit the following observations.

Pressure on institutional accommodation for maternity cases within the County has been accentuated during the war by (a) the rise in the birth-rate, which in 1942 was the highest for many years, (b) the inability of a number of voluntary hospitals in London to provide as many beds as they did before the war, and (c) the very unsatisfactory environmental conditions which exist in many homes in the County by reason of overcrowding and serious lack of domestic help, and the County Council fully appreciates that the provision of further accommodation of this kind in the County is highly desirable. The need for more maternity accommodation is, however, general throughout the County (and, indeed, it is suggested, in many other parts of the country), and no evidence has been forthcoming that it is more pressing in Hendon than in other districts.

I am to submit that the Borough Council's statement that the County Council only provides some 505 beds for the whole of the County does less than justice to the County Council, in as much as these beds, in the County Council's establishments alone, make provision for some 40 per cent. of all the births taking place in the County. The figure, moreover, takes no account of the beds provided in the Chiswick and Ealing and the Willesden Maternity Hospitals, both of which are largely financed by the County Council, and which together furnish approximately 100 further beds.

As already indicated, the County Council is fully alive to the needs of the situation, and at the present time steps are being taken which should result in a further maternity unit of some 60 beds being established in the Hendon-Finchley area and one of 40 beds in the Chiswick area; so that it is hoped that yet another 100 maternity beds will be available in the County in the next few months. It is true that Hendon cases will not receive priority in regard to admission to the proposed new unit in the Hendon-Finchley area, except to the extent that the County Council always endeavours to arrange for each patient to be admitted to such establishment as is most convenient, having regard to her place of residence, but Hendon will derive some benefit from that unit, and also from that at Chiswick.

The 700 maternity beds already in existence or shortly to be established will make provision for between 50 per cent. and 60 per cent. of all Middlesex births, as against those which take place in voluntary hospitals in London or elsewhere, in emergency hospitals provided by the Minister under his evacuation scheme, in private nursing homes, and in the mothers' own homes where conditions are satisfactory.

I am also to say that the Council adheres very definitely to its pre-war policy (which the Minister will be aware was reaffirmed in connection with a recent proposal of the Hornsey Borough Council to run a maternity home), namely, that maternity units should be established at or in association with County general hospitals; it deprecates the establishment, in an area such as Middlesex, of small maternity homes, which it considers are neither efficient nor economic.

The Committee are still not satisfied with the Ministry's decision, and are of opinion that the deputation previously appointed should interview the new Minister of Health personally. They accordingly

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Minister of Health be requested personally to receive the deputation at the earliest possible date.

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## 44.—CHILDS HILL HEALTH CENTRE:

- (i) Repair of Pathways.

At the last meeting of the Committee (P.H. & M.S. 4/10/43-27(2)) the Borough Engineer was instructed to submit an estimate of the cost of re-surfacing with concrete the forecourt and pathway leading to the perambulator shed, and to report as to the necessity for repainting the exterior of the premises. The Borough Engineer estimates the cost of re-surfacing the pathway at £70, and suggests that the outside paint work should be washed down and touched up where necessary at an estimated cost of £15.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND - That the estimates be approved and the Borough Engineer be authorised to put the work in hand.

## 45.—REQUISITIONS:

## Hendon Isolation and Emergency Hospital.

## 46.—SCARLET FEVER:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that the incidence of scarlet fever, which is prevalent throughout the country and has for some time been increasing, reached a point where real difficulty was being experienced in providing hospital accommodation, and it therefore became necessary to circularise local medical practitioners on the 29th October, asking them to isolate minor cases of scarlet fever at home, where the accommodation was suitable and the parents agreeable.

The following table shows the number of cases notified during the eight weeks ended 13th November:-

The Borough Engineer reported that the removal of the sand-bag protection to the roof lights, which are suitably protected against flying glass, would necessitate the provision of suitable black-out arrangements, the cost of which was estimated at £12.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND - That the estimate be approved.

## 50.-ETHER STORE:

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the estimate of £10 for erecting a concrete slab over the ether store, in place of the sandbagging and planking, be approved.

## 51.-BLAST WALLS:

The Committee considered the report of the Borough Engineer on the condition of the blast walls, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Engineer be instructed to arrange for all blast walls which are leaning away from the building to be put into a satisfactory condition.

## 52.—TENNIS COURT:

The Borough Engineer reported that the surface of the tennis court requires redressing with proper material and the provision of new line tapes, but no material for top-dressing this type of hard court is available; neither is it possible to obtain lead marking lines. A number of the vertical standards to the surrounds require to be reset in concrete bases, the cost of which is estimated at £15.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Engineer be authorised to carry out such works as may be necessary to put the tennis court in a playable condition, and that the estimate of £15 for re-setting the standards to the surrounds be approved.

In order to expedite the appointment of a foreman mechanic, in relation to which the last day for the receipt of applications is Wednesday, the 24th November, the Committee

## 57.—MEASURES TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF THE NATION'S MILK SUPPLY:

The Committee considered (a) Government White Paper (Command 6454), setting out the measures proposed to be adopted to improve the quality of the nation's milk supply; (b) Memorandum thereon submitted by the Sanitary Inspectors' Association, and (c) a Report of the Medical Officer.

The Government White Paper suggests that the standard of administration varies widely throughout the country, and that after careful consideration the Government have reached the conclusion that no substantial general improvement can be antici-

pated so long as the existing system, with its multiplicity of responsible authorities, is maintained, and that transfer of the existing powers of local authorities to a central authority, offers the only satisfactory solution to the problem. It is therefore the intention of the Government to submit to Parliament, after consultation with the local authorities concerned with the arrangements that will have to be made, legislation providing for the transfer to the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, as soon as conditions permit, of the functions of the local authorities relating to the conditions under which milk, including designated milks, is produced on the farm. The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries will thus become responsible for all matters relating to the production of milk.

The proposals in the White Paper which affect local sanitary authorities responsible for the conditions under which milk is produced has caused the Sanitary Inspectors' Association to approach appropriate local authorities as to their views on the matter. The Association suggests that the proposals outlined in the report strike at the very roots of democratic local government, and, if adopted, would no doubt be followed rapidly by other changes of a similar character. In short, the services now locally administered would become State-controlled, and the people would have little voice in the direction of the work.

The Committee have no observations to offer in the matter.

## 17.—TRAFFIC LIGHTS—JUNCTION OF ORANGE HILL ROAD WITH WATLING AVENUE:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Commissioner of Police regarding the Council's application for the reinstatement of the traffic lights at the above junction. The Commissioner states that traffic conditions at this junction have again been reconsidered, and it is still felt that the reinstatement of such traffic lights would not appear to be justified. During the past twelve months only three accidents are known to have occurred at this point, and in only one case was there any This junction, which has a good sight line, is personal injury, and that slight. used mainly by local traffic, which is now less than at any time previously. majority of drivers are well acquainted with the conditions there, and no difficulty or danger should be encountered either by drivers or pedestrians, provided ordinary care is exercised. A police constable is posted to assist school children during the hours of school assembly and dismissal.

In these circumstances, the Commissioner states that it would not appear to be a case in which the signals should be brought back into operation, but observation will be kept to ensure that the necessary action will be taken should conditions deteriorate. The Committee, however, are of opinion that a danger exists at this junction, owing to the removal of the traffic lights, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That further representations be made to the Commissioner of Police for the reinstatement of such traffic lights.

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## 18.—CHILDREN'S SAFETY COMMITTEES:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the London Council, Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents, suggesting the setting up of a Children's Safety Committee.

RESOLVED-That the matter be referred to the Education Committee.

## 19.—'BUS STOPPING PLACES—STANMORE CIRCUS:

The Town Clerk reported on a letter from the London Passenger Transport Board regarding a petition received from residents on an estate adjacent to Canons Corner for the 'bus stop for Route 142 (Watford-Edgware), which is now common with that for Route 141 (Boreham Wood-Edgware) to be moved to the west side of the roundabout. The present arrangements provide that the whole of the service on Routes 141 and 142-16 'buses an hour at peak times and 9 'buses an hour at other times-is available at the only practical position for a common stop for journeys from this point to Edgware Station. The petitioners' suggestion means that Route 141 would observe the present stop, and that the stop for Route 142 would be on the western side of the roundabout, some 100 yards away, so that passengers for Edgware would have to queue at one stop or the other, thus depriving themselves of the frequency of the combined service. In view of the need for economy in rubber and fuel, the Route 142 'bus could not be stopped at both points. Theoretically, at least, the present arrangements are correct, but the objections raised are that passengers may have to cross two roads to reach the stop, and that children especially, one route with a stop so placed as to avoid crossing Elstree Road would be far preferable, even at the cost of a less frequent service. The bulk of the demand does, in fact, originate on the western side.

The Board does not wish to make the change suggested unless it has the approval of both Local Authorities concerned.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the suggested alteration in the 'bus stop be approved, and the Board be informed accordingly.

## 20.—'BUS STOPPING PLACES:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the London Passenger Transport Board regarding a proposed alteration in the 'bus stop in Hale Lane, Edgware, which will involve the following:—

Removal of Signs: Hale Lane, Edgware.

Adjoining entrance to United Kingdom Optical Company's factory, at southbound 'bus stop No. 15622; two sections of shelter on south side of stop sign.

## 1,—APPOINTMENT OF CHAIRMAN:

His Worship the Mayor was elected to the Chair pro tem.

RESOLVED—That Councillor F. J. Collins be reappointed Chairman of the Committee for the ensuing year.

(Councillor F. J. Collins in the Chair.)

## 2.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £114 17s. 7d. were submitted and approved.

## 3.—VENTILATION OF KITCHENS:

At its last meeting the Committee recommended the provisional acceptance of the estimates of the Bradshaw Fan and Ventilating Company for the provision of mechanical ventilating plant at each of the six British Restaurants, including three in course of erection, at a total estimated cost of £1,256. In order to save time, immediately after the meeting of the Committee application was made to the Ministry of Food for approval and reimbursement. The Committee's recommendation was, however, amended by the Council, which gave instructions for at least two other competitive tenders to be obtained. The Ministry was informed of this amendment, and replied, in a letter dated 29th October, in the following terms:—

"I have to inform you that it will be in order for you to obtain two other competitive tenders for the ventilating of your British Restaurants. I would point out, however, that the Ministry will not necessarily accept the lowest, or any of the tenders so submitted."

Subsequently a letter, dated 12th November, was received, enclosing an official letter of approval of the total sum of £1,256 to cover the provision of ventilating plant in six of the Council's British Restaurants.

No action has been taken on this approval pending the receipt, and consideration, of the further estimates ordered by the Council. The Chief Officer, Meals Service, points out, however, that at Victoria Restaurant, where conditions were bad last winter, they are again bad, and already the manageress and staff are complaining of wet conditions in the kitchen in which they are compelled to work.

The Borough Engineer reported that pursuant to the Council's instructions he had arranged for Messrs. Benham & Sons and Messrs. McDowell, Ltd., to submit prices for the ventilating plant required at the six restaurants, and also in respect of the kitchen at St. John's British Restaurant, and hoped to receive these prices by the end of the week.

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RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Chairman of the Committee, in conjunction with His Worship the Mayor, be authorised (a) to accept a tender or tenders for ventilating plants for submission to, and approval by, the Ministry of Food; and (b) to accept a tender for the protected queueing space at Montrose Restaurant, and, in the event of such last-mentioned tender being within the amount which the Ministry of Food has approved, the work be proceeded with.

## 4.-PROGRESS REPORTS:

The Borough Engineer reported progress on the work in connection with the undermentioned restaurants as follows:—

- (a) Edgeworth: Some delay has occurred in the completion of this restaurant, owing to the breakdown of the arrangements with the contractor laying the asphalt flooring, which should have been completed early last week. It is hoped the floor laying will be completed by midday to-morrow; then the other contractors will be able to complete their work.
- (b) Hartley and The Fortune: Progress on both these restaurants has been slow, entirely owing to the shortage of labour. The plasterers' work at Hartley is now practically finished, and this gang will be transferred to The Fortune, where the brickwork has been completed and the plumbing is approaching completion.

Noted.

## 5.—ST. JOHN'S SCHOOL PLAYGROUND:

It was reported that the Rev. R. W. Townsend had agreed to accept the sum of £30 in full discharge of the Council's liability in respect of repairs to the playground at St. John's Hall, and that a letter had been received from the Ministry of Food agreeing to the expenditure, and stating that it should be charged to revenue, on the ground that the work was in the nature of the repair of damage incurred during the setting up of the restaurant.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the terms of settlement be approved and the Borough Treasurer authorised to make the payment.

## 6.—CHRISTMAS CLOSING:

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND— That the restaurants be closed on Christmas Day, and that the Chairman of the Committee be authorised to decide whether or not the restaurants shall be closed on Monday, December 27th, when definite information is available as to whether factories will be closed that day.

## 7.—MOBILE CANTEEN SERVICE:

At the last meeting of the Committee instructions were given to ascertain whether

- (a) If the Council instituted a mobile meals service, and there should be any loss through cost of deliveries, such loss could be charged to the British Restaurants account;
- (b) The Divisional Food Officer would recommend the provision of a van by the Ford Emergency Food Van Trust; and
- (c) The Hampstead Garden Suburb Fellowship would be prepared to take over the organisation and administration of a mobile canteen service for the Garden Suburb area.

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he had ices for kitchen of the With regard to (a) and (b), a letter was submitted from the Divisional Food Officer stating that it is the experience of the Ministry that mobile services are not usually satisfactory from the financial point of view, and the Ministry would only permit such a service to be incorporated in the British Restaurant Trading Accounts if it were independently self-supporting; that if the Council institute such a service it should be on an experimental basis in the first instance, and should not be continued longer than one month if it was found to be incurring a loss; and if the experiment is carried out an entirely separate income and expenditure account should be kept so that the financial result could be clearly seen. The Ministry's experience of such services would not justify them recommending the provision of a van by the Ford Trust for the purpose of a mobile meals service.

With regard to (e), the Hampstead Garden Suburb Fellowship state that, whilst wishing to give all the help possible with the mobile canteen scheme, they are unable to accept responsibility for the running of the canteen, such as undertaken by the Finchley Council of Social Service, but if the W.V.S. are prepared to play a similar part to that played in Finchley by the Council of Social Service, the Fellowship Committee would gladly co-operate with them in supplying the names of applicants desiring the dinners, and also in supplying an attendant for the van at least one day in the week if the W.V.S. or any similar organisation desired them to do so.

After careful consideration of the matter in the light of the information given in the foregoing letters, the Committee

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That the Divisional Food Officer be requested to reconsider his decision regarding the provision of a van by the Ford Trust for the purpose of the proposed service.
- (b) That the Hampstead Carden Suburb Fellowship be informed that it is doubtful whether the Council will be able to provide the proposed service unless they are prepared to render a greater measure of assistance than that indicated in their letter, and that the W.V.S. be asked whether they will be prepared to accept responsibility for the organisation and administration of the proposed service.

## 8.—FINANCIAL STATEMENT:

With regard to the difficulty experienced in obtaining suitable probationers, a letter was submitted from the Senior Regional Officer of the Ministry of Health intimating that the Minister approves, as a temporary measure only, the engagement of nursery assistants in lieu of probationers, but that the full quota of staff allocated for each war-time nursery should be maintained; that it is not desirable that a nursery assistant should be asked or expected to perform the work of two probationers, and that any nursery assistant appointed in lieu of a probationer should be replaced by a probationer as soon as the opportunity arises.

Difficulty is still being experienced in obtaining suitable staff, and the Committee have therefore given directions for an advertisement to be issued in the local Press, and to obtain Press publicity to the urgency of the need.

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The Committee have approved, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Health, additional perambulator accommodation at Hyde Cottage Nursery, at an estimated cost of £45.

## 5.—WAR-TIME DAY NURSERY, VANCOUVER ROAD, HARROW:

The Committee have duly noted a communication from the Medical Officer of Health of Harrow, intimating that the day nursery for 50 children at the lower end of Vancouver Road is nearing completion, and that applications will be entertained from residents of the Hendon area, and also that Harrow will be prepared to agree to llarrow children at present attending this Council's nurseries being transferred, if they so desire.

## 6.—WATLING ESTATE—ADDITIONAL NURSERY:

It was reported that the Ministry of Health had approved the acceptance of the tender of W. M. Glendinning, amounting to £1,989, for the work in connection with the additional war-time day nursery to be provided in Watling Avenue, Burnt Oak.

#### 7.—DAY NURSERIES GENERALLY—REDECORATIONS:

It was reported that the Ministry of Health had approved expenditure of a total amount of £32 2s. 6d. for carrying out minor redecorations at Addington House, York Park, Hyde School and Hoeroft Road Day Nurseries, as set out in item 7 of the Committee's report of the 9th September. (Minutes, p. 691.)

#### 8.—PROGRESS REPORTS:

#### (a) Hyde Cottage.

The work in connection with this contract, which is being carried out by H. Pickrill, Ltd., is nearing completion, the decorations being the main outstanding item.

#### (b) Dole Street.

The nursery building is practically completed, but the contractor has experienced great difficulty in obtaining suitable labour for the heavy work involved in the laying of the drains. For this reason progress with the drainage work, and also with the air-raid shelter, is very slow.

#### (e) Addington House: Extension.

The general structure of the building is completed, including the plastering and hanging of doors. The internal fittings and finishings, including decorations, remain to be executed.

#### (d) Claremont Road.

The Borough Engineer reported on the provision of additional cooking facilities rendered necessary by reason of the increased accommodation being provided at this nursery, and the Committee have authorised the removal of the existing cooker for use at the nursery proposed to be established in Watling Avenue, and its replacement by two domestic cookers to be hired from the Gas Light and Coke Co., at a cost of 6s. per cooker per quarter, plus the appropriate charge for fixing.

#### 9.—EDGWARE DAY NURSERY:

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Subject to the approval of the Ministry of Health to the estimate submitted by the Borough Surveyor, the Committee have authorised the turfing of the playing area at the Edgware Day Nursery, at a cost of £35.

#### 10.—CHRISTMAS FESTIVITIES:

On the report of the Medical Officer of Health, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council be asked to make a grant of five pounds to each day nursery for Christmas festivities.

#### 1.-APPOINTMENT OF CHAIRMAN:

Councillor E. J. Cox has been appointed Chairman of the Committee for the ensuing year.

The Committee has placed on record its appreciation of the services rendered by Alderman T. J. Scott as Chairman of the Committee during the past year.

#### 2.—CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTORS IN CIVIL DEFENCE SERVICES:

A reply has been received from the Minister of Home Security to the letter addressed to him regarding the directions contained in Home Security Circular 162/1943, relating to conscientious objectors enrolled in the Civil Defence Services (see item 6 of last report).

The Minister states that the Circular, which had been warmly welcomed by many local authorities, was issued as a result of questions raised in regard to the employment of conscientious objectors on extended duties. It did not purport to alter the law, but gave administrative guidance regarding certain types of duty on which it was desirable not to employ conscientious objectors. Defence Regulation 29B had been framed in wide terms to include in the range of Civil Defence duties any essential work undertaken by local authorities, or other work essential for the defence of the realm or for the efficient prosecution of the war or the life of the community, and it did not follow that all Civil Defence personnel were necessarily to be required to engage thereon.

#### 3.—PART-TIME DUTY BY CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL:

The Committee has noted suggestions contained in Ministry of Home Security Circular 178/1943, for meeting the operational requirements of the various Civil Defence (General) Services without unnecessary manning of depots, posts, etc., by day or night, and with the least number of hours stand-by duty by part-time personnel beyond those needed for the work of the Services, training or exercises.

#### 4.—SURRENDER OF CLOTHING COUPONS BY CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL:

The Committee has considered reports of the difficulties encountered by whole-time members of the Civil Defence Services in maintaining essential personal clothing and acquiring household needs for which clothing coupons have to be surrendered, in addition to meeting the demands made upon them for the surrender of clothing coupons in respect of their Civil Defence uniforms, and has directed that representations be made to the Board of Trade for a reduction in the number of clothing coupons to be surrendered annually by Civil Defence personnel in respect of the uniforms issued to them.

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#### 5.—PRODUCTIVE WORK IN DEPOTS:

Teams of Rescue and Report Centre personnel are now available to proceed with work of cutting patches from discarded Army battle-dress under a scheme prepared by the Ministry of Supply, when the necessary equipment and materials are to hand.

#### 6.—SOCIAL FUNCTIONS:

The Committee has noted with satisfaction that a sum of £40 has been placed at the disposal of the Hendon Naval Comforts Fund as a result of a dance recently arranged by the Hendon Report and Control Centre personnel.

The Hendon Civil Defence Choir has arranged a concert at the Brent Bridge Hotel on the 8th December, 1943, in aid of the Duke of Gloucester's Prisoners of War Fund.

#### 7.—RESCUE SERVICE:

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The Committee has noted the receipt from a neighbouring authority of an expression of appreciation of the services rendered by Hendon Rescue Service squads at a recent air-raid incident in the area of that Authority.

In addition to training, personnel of the Rescue Service have assisted in the following works:—

Repairs to slating, Christchurch Hall.

Taking down and removal of fittings at Group School.

Filling and delivering of sandbags to Wardens' Posts.

Assisting in fitting up the new Group Rescue Training School at Finehley-completed.

Raising flooring of lavatories at both depots.

Filling and storing 500 sandbags at each depot for dealing with anti-personnel bombs.

Dismantling footbridge over the River Brent-salvage.

Unloading flour for Ministry of Food.

Alterations to shelters, Golders Green Arches and West Hendon Broadway.

Painting detector boards and tops of pillar-boxes.

Exchanging and distributing emergency food stores.

Cutting steel joists for shelters with oxy-acetylene apparatus.

Repairs to emergency feeding sheds.

Repairs at "D" District Headquarters.

Loading and sorting sandbags, Montrose Park.

Demolition of 192-4, Golders Green Road.

Second garage at John Groom's Crippleage.

Assisting the L.M.S. Railway at Hendon Station, in the heavy goods section.

Assistance to British Restaurants, Meals Service, National Fire Service,

Women's Voluntary Service and the Food Office.

A further excellent supply of toys has been made by the personnel of the Reseue Service at Mill Hill Depot, in their leisure time, for presentation to the new Day Nursery at Dole Street. 8.-FIRS

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#### 8.-FIRST-AID POSTS AND PUBLIC GAS CLEANSING CENTRES:

An inspection of the Central, West Hendon and Mill Hill first-aid posts and the gas cleansing stations in Watling Avenue, Hendon Park and Edgware has been made by the Chief Casualty Services Officer of London Region. This officer reports that the first-aid posts offer good facilities for dealing with a large number of casualties, and he also comments upon the work done by the auxiliary personnel in connection with treatment of scabies and assisting at war-time nurseries. In regard to the gas cleansing stations, the Officer refers favourably to the revised system of lighting, and declares the "gas situation to be well in hand."

#### 9.—CORPORATION'S AMBULANCE SERVICE:

During the month of October, calls as under were received:-

Private cases ..... 219
Street accidents and illnesses ..... 40

Of these cases, 40 were conveyed in Civil Defence ambulances.

On the 21st November, 1943, the first year of operation of this service by Civil Defence personnel ended. During this time 2,620 calls were made in respect of private cases and 612 street accident and illness cases, a total of 3,232.

#### 10.-WARDENS' ORGANISATION:

The Middlesex County Council has agreed to meet the expenditure on one internal telephone extension at each of the Wardens' District Headquarters (see item 18 (d) of the last report).

During the census and inspection of respirators carried out by members of the Wardens' Service at the beginning of October, 113,600 respirators were examined and arrangements made for changing, repair and replacement where necessary.

#### 11.—FIRE PREVENTION:

The Regional Commissioners have approved an expenditure of £370, which will enable approximately 845 reconditioned steel drums to be placed in various parts of the Borough to provide supplies for replenishing stirrup-pump buckets.

Applications made by seven occupiers for approval to fire-prevention arrangements at their various premises have been considered and approved.

Approximately 2,300 further registrations were effected under the Fire Guard (Local Authority Services) Order, 1943, as a result of the Registration conducted on the 17th October, 1943. A further 160 registrations have since been effected at the Chief Warden's office.

The attention of occupiers of business premises in the Borough for which this Council is the "appropriate authority" is being called to the ruling that as from the 6th April, 1944, the payment of allowances at rates in excess of the standard laid down in the Fire Guard (Business and Government Premises) Order, 1943, will no longer rank as working expenses for taxation purposes. It is noted that increased payments made by some firms to persons earrying out fire-prevention duties at their premises has hampered the making of block schemes in certain instances. The standard rates only are paid to fire guards doing duty at premises owned by the Corporation.

During the month of October, 1943, the National Fire Service carried out first inspections of lofts in 235 houses. Second inspections were necessary in 12 instances.

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Rescue Day The preparation of the Fire Guard Plan is proceeding, and it is anticipated that it will be completed for presentation to the London Civil Defence Region early in December. After presentation and approval, and the holding of test exercises by Officers of London Region, a date will be fixed by London Region for the plan to come into operation.

#### 12.—EMERGENCY FEEDING SCHEME:

The change-over of emergency feeding stocks at the 21 static centres, seven mobile units and three British Restaurants is now in hand, and will be completed in approximately 14 days. Civil Defence labour and transport is engaged on this work, and the handling of approximately 120 tons of commodities is involved.

Positions in which lock-up stores for emergency food stocks can be provided at the under-mentioned schools have been agreed, and details of the work entailed, with estimates as noted below, have been forwarded to the Ministry of Food for approval:

#### 6a.—ESTABLISHMENT AND STAFFS SUB-COMMITTEE:

#### 7.—MIDDLESEX COUNTY COUNCIL BILL:

The Town Clerk reported that an application had been made to Parliament in the Session 1943-44 for an Act under the above name or short title, whereby it is proposed (amongst other things) to extend the time limited by the Middlesex County Council (Sewerage) Act, 1938, as extended by the Middlesex Sewerage (Extension of Time) Order, 1941, for the compulsory purchase of lands for the purposes of the sewers, sewage disposal and other works authorised by the said Act of 1938. The Bill also seeks to consolidate by repeal and amendment the provisions of some 16 Middlesex County Council Acts which are almost entirely repealed.

The Bill contains 459 clauses and 8 schedules, and it will be appreciated that time has not permitted at date a detailed examination. The Bill, however, does contain a new clause relating to making of bye-laws under the Public Health (Drainage of Premises) Act, 1937. This matter was the subject of much consideration in 1938 and will receive due attention.

It may be stated that some time ago the Middlesex Borough and District Councils were invited, through their Association, to submit suggestions for the extension or modification of the existing Middlesex Acts, particularly as regards the local provisions contained in Part III. of the Act of 1938. Various suggestions were offered and considered by the Association.

Parliamentary Agents have been instructed by the Middlesex Borough and District Councils' Association to examine the Bill in relation to existing Acts, and to report as to whether any action by petition or otherwise by the Local Authorities is advisable. The costs under this instruction will be borne by the Local Authorities.

Petitions, if necessary, are due for deposit in Parliament early in the New Year, and in order that the interests of the Corporation may be protected the Committee

RECOMMEND—That the Council give power to the Mayor and the Chairman of the Committee to authorise the submission of a petition against the Bill, should it be found necessary, and that the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

#### 8.—ABSENCES:

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It was reported that 83 members of the staff had been absent owing to illness since the last meeting, and that 26 members of the staff are still absent, including three members previously reported.

#### 9.-MAN POWER BOARD:

#### 18.—SALVAGE BONUS SCHEME:

In connection with the scheme for the payment of a bonus to employees in the Refuse Collection and Disposal Section engaged on salvage work, the Borough Treasurer reported that the amount realised from sales (of the type of salvage upon which bonus is to be calculated) during the six months ended the 25th September, 1943, was £5,417 16s. 1d. The amount available for distribution by way of bonus is £1,083 11s. 3d., being 20 per cent. of £5,417 16s. 1d.

RESOLVED-That authority be given for the immediate payment of the bonus.

#### 19.—NATIONAL FIRE SERVICE — CONTRIBUTION BY CORPORATION TO H.M. EXCHEQUER:

The Borough Treasurer reported that under the National Fire Service (Financial) Regulations, 1941, an annual contribution has to be paid by quarterly instalments to the Secretary of State as the Corporation's share of the cost of Fire Services. After negotiation the expenditure in the "standard" year 1941 has been agreed at £19,241 13s. 9d., of which the Corporation is to pay 75 per cent. per annum, or £14,431 5s. 4d.

The Secretary of State assumes responsibility for Employers' Contributions to the Fire Brigade Pensions Fund, which remains under the administration of the Council. He will pay an annual sum of £1,119 5s. to the Corporation, this being the **whole** of the Employers' Contributions included in the calculations of the "standard" year. The figure may be increased or diminished as liabilities increase or diminish.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That quarterly instalments of £3607 16s. 4d. be paid to H.M. Exchequer on the 30th June, 30th September, 31st December and 31st March in each year, as from 1st July, 1941.

#### 20.—HENDON EMERGENCY HOSPITAL:

The Borough Treasurer reported that he had now received from the Ministry of Health a notification of the agreement of the Council's claims for grant for the financial years 1940-41 and 1941-42, and, in connection therewith, the Borough Treasurer sub-

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er of bsent pply: mitted a statement for the information of the Committee. The necessity for estimating grants was due to the fact that the Ministry did not notify local authorities as to the formula for calculating grants until 18 months after the inception of the scheme, and the first audit did not take place until a period of two years and five months had elapsed, viz., in January, 1942.

Owing to the uncertainty of the admissibility of certain types of expenditure, it was considered advisable to bring in to credit estimated grants on a conservative basis. The effect of the finally ascertained position is that a surplus of £9,996 17s. 10d. is now available for the benefit of the Rate Fund.

Noted.

#### 21.—PRIVATE STREET WORKS — EDGWARE:

The Borough Treasurer reported that when Edgware was merged into Hendon the Council became the highway authority in succession to the Middlesex County Council. At that time certain private improvement works were either in account against frontagers or expenditure had been incurred for works in progress. An agreement has now been reached with the County Council, and authority is required to pay to the County Council a sum of £6,913 11s. 5d. in full discharge. This payment represents the balance of recoveries from frontagers after discharge of all outgoings.

(Council 25.10.43—Resolution No. 390.)

28.--LOANS:

The Borough Treasurer reported that a sum of approximately £11,600 is at present in the Superannuation Fund for investment, which, together with certain contributions and dividends falling due in the near future, will increase to approximately £20,000.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND — That a further loan of £20,000 at 3 per cent. per annum be taken from the Superannuation Fund at the 31st December, 1943.

29.—RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT, 1919—DELEGATION OF FUNCTIONS TO BOROUGH AND DISTRICT COUNCILS:

The Committee has considered the report of the General Purposes Committee of the County Council, and the resolution of that Authority regarding the delegation of powers to Borough and District Councils. The question arises on a representation from the Infestation Branch of the Ministry of Food, in which it was stated that in considering plans for a determined and sustained attack on rats and mice, the Minister of Food attaches importance to the maximum use of the provisions of the Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1919; but concern was expressed as to the position of authorities not in possession of powers under that Act, but who are, nevertheless, subject to the Infestation Order, 1943, of the Minister, under which his schemes for rat destruction are formulated. Without questioning the policy of County Councils who in peace-time did not see their way to delegate their powers under the 1919 Act to the Borough and District Councils, the Ministry now urges County Councils, for the period of hostilities, to grant delegation to the fullest extent.

The Ministry of Food is, of course, aware that under the 1919 Act no local authority can be compelled to accept delegation from a County Council, even if the latter wishes to grant it, but the Minister's powers of direction under the Infestation Order, 1943, are so far-reaching that he could probably compel the administration of the Act by local authorities who would not accept powers voluntarily.

The General Purposes Committee of the County Council report that they are strongly of opinion that the whole of the Borough and District Councils in the County should now take over, as regards their respective areas, the functions in regard to rats and mice destruction at present carried out by the County Council, and consider that the complete delegation indicated should not merely be a wartime expedient, but should be a permanent arrangement. The County Council have accordingly resolved

That the County Council is of opinion that each Borough and Urban District Council in the County should become the local authority, as respects its borough or district, for the purposes of the Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1919, in the place of the County Council, and that all such Borough and District Councils be urged to give consent to the delegation to them by the County Council of its powers and duties under the Act, in accordance with the appropriate provisions thereof.

A communication was also submitted by the Town Clerk from the Director of Infestation Control, Ministry of Food, referring to the County Council's decision to delegate its powers under the Act, and urging the Town Council to accept such delegation, in support of which the following considerations were submitted:—

- (1) It would assist the war effort.
- (2) Decentralisation would facilitate recruitment of man-power and avoidance of unnecessary travel.
- (3) Closer co-ordination of effort in tackling this difficult problem, i.e., infestation of private property and the contributory source in and from works and premises of local and other authorities and undertakings, would facilitate simultaneous and effective action, more especially in the rural or semi-rural parts of the country.
- (4) Financial cover for the new duties now available to local authorities will enable them to reclaim from the Ministry of Food their irrecoverable expenses, i.e., such as they are unable to recover under the statute from third parties.

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Section 2 of the Act of 1919 provides that where powers and duties of the County Council are delegated, the Borough or District Council shall be the local authority for the purposes of the Act, and expenses are accordingly to be defrayed as expenses under the Public Health Act.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

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- (1) That the Council accept delegation of the powers and duties under Section 2 of the Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1919.
- (2) That a further report be presented by the Medical Officer of Health, the Borough Surveyor and the Borough Treasurer on the lines indicated for the future administration of the powers and duties under the Act.

#### 1. APPOINTMENT OF CHAIRMAN:

#### 2. POST-WAR HOUSING DEVELOPMENT — PRIVATE ENTERPRISE:

The Town Clerk submitted a memorandum in connection with the conference with representatives of the National Federation of Registered House Builders, held on the 5th October, and reported that a communication had been received from the Secretary stating that it was not possible to give their views on matters referred to them by the 7th December, but confirmed that a further communication would be sent after the instructions of the appropriate Committee of the Federation had been given.

# 3. CONFERENCE—NATIONAL COUNCIL OF SOCIAL SERVICE:

The Place of the Community Centres in Post-War Social Development.

The Committee have received a report from Alderman G. R. Richardson and Councillor H. Connel, J.P., delegates to the above conference, held on the 18th-19th September last. After stating the names of the speakers and the subjects of the papers brought under discussion, the delegates report:

"There was general agreement that Community Centres should be regarded as an integral part of all estates, and that they should be so planned as to cater for both cultural and recreational pursuits. It was also agreed that a canteen should be provided at each Centre, but the suggestion that same should not necessarily be of the "dry" variety caused a little diversion.

"It was considered that the Centres should be placed in areas where the 'community spirit' existed, such as new housing estates, but, while agreeing that probably these areas have the most immediate need, we believe that the same community spirit could be built up in existing residential areas were the necessary provision made.

"The necessity of choosing wardens with the right kind of personality was emphasised, as was also the desirability of the Centres being bright and cheerful.

"A rough plan of a model estate, showing the relative positions of houses, schools, shops community centre, etc., was interesting.

"It was suggested that a population area of approximately 10,000 was a suitable unit for a Centre, and it was estimated that the capital cost would be in the neighbourhood of £25,000, which should be the responsibility of the Local Authority, maintenance to be covered by subscriptions by the users of the Centre.

"There was a further suggestion that in the case of a Centre being provided for a new estate built by a Local Authority, a contribution to the capital cost might be included in the rents.

"The conference covered a very large field, including such matters as education, amenities in houses, etc., and provided very large scope for discussion. We found it very useful, but, owing to most of the speakers reading papers, it was at times difficult to follow them, especially at the sessions in the Conway Hall, where there are no microphone facilities."

The Committee intend to bear the above report in mind for consideration in relation to any future development involving the desirability of the provision of a Community Centre, and have expressed their thanks to the delegates for their interesting statement.

# 4. CONFERENCE-NATIONAL HOUSING AND TOWN PLANNING COUNCIL:

#### Planning and Housing.

The Chairman reported that he had attended the above Conference held on the 7th-Sth October, at which some 1,600 delegates, representing 630 local authorities, were present. The chief interest arose from the speeches made by the Minister of Town and Country Planning on the Government's decisions and undertakings with regard to planning and reconstruction, followed by the Minister of Health, on the second day, with a statement on housing policy and plans.

Addressing the conference, Mr. Morrison, the Minister of Town and Country Planning, put the question: Why had the Government not yet announced a final decision on the problems dealt with in the Uthwatt Report? The Uthwatt Report is an admirable document, but it does not pretend to solve all the problems which hedge about this subject, nor to provide a blueprint of all the adminiistrative machinery which their solution would demand. The Government take the view that the solution of the compensation and betterment problem is a necessary precedent to successful planning. They have been working hard to see how they can get over certain difficulties in the report, and to determine what legislation and what administrative machinery would be required to carry out the complicated operations which any satisfactory scheme must involve, while they have given unremitting attention to the subject, they have been determined not to be hustled into premature conclusions. Their deliberate findings are now nearly ready for presentation. These include proposals for giving effect to the two pledges already given-that they accept the principle of the public acquisition of all land in reconstruction areas, and that the compensation payable for the public acquisition of land should not exceed the standard of values at March 31st, 1939. The pledges given by the Government meant that local authorities could go ahead with the making of plans, secure in the knowledge that they would have possession of the land in the reconstruction areas.

With regard to a suggestion that local authorities were being handicapped because they did not know what their planning duties and boundaries were to be, Mr. Morrison said the Ministry was proceeding on the assumption that, subject only to an extension of the system of joint committees, which the energy and goodwill of so many authorities had already chosen to provide, local authority areas would for planning purposes continue as they were at present.

In an address to the conference on the second day of the sitting, Mr. Ernest Brown, the Minister of Health, announced that a scheme for the concentration of the available labour and materials on essential housing work had been approved earlier in the day by a Committee of the Cabinet. In the last few months, he said, local authorities had drawn up preliminary programmes to provide for the first instalment of new houses, to be built as quickly as the resources of the building industry permitted. These covered 150,000 houses, involving nearly 9,000 acres of land. The Government had accepted the principle that after the demands for building for war purposes had been met, housing should have the first call on immobile building labour.

Continuing, Mr. Brown said the Secretary for Scotland, the Minister of Labour and the Minister of Works had worked out with him a scheme, which was approved by a Cabinet Committee, and he hoped to send a circular to local authorities about it next week. The basis of the scheme was the concentration of available labour and materials on essential housing work, and the exercise of discretion by local authorities, whose task it would be to decide in the light of the housing conditions of their districts what housing work should be done, and which of it should be done first. If private enterprise, local authorities and the Ministry of Health all went forward together on the plans they had worked out, he had no doubt they would deliver the goods, and be able, in the first ten or twelve years of the peace, to make good the war damage, to overtake the arrears of work of ordinary maintenance and repair, and to build the 3,000,000 to 4,000,000 houses required to give every family a separate house.

#### 5. PLANNING AND HOUSING POLICY:

- (A) Hendon and District Branch National Federation of Building Trades Operatives and
- (B) The Hendon Branch of the Amalgamated Society of Woodworkers.

Resolutions, to all intents and purposes in identical terms, have been received from the above organisations in the following terms:—

"That this branch is seriously concerned with the Government's decision not to make any definite policy on the housing question. Adequate housing forms a part, essentially linked with physical rehabilitation; and this Branch is therefore of the opinion that the mere renovation of worn-out properties is not a sufficient contribution.

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t) C "Although local authorities have been asked by the Ministry of Health to undertake surveys, we are of the opinion that this work is only necessary as a preliminary, and is not, therefore, enough to meet the urgency of the situation. Local authorities must be vested with the powers to act as recommended in the Uthwatt Report, through a central planning authority, so that no undue delay is experienced in the housing of the people. The regulations dealing with rents must be strengthened, so that no one can be debarred from decent housing from any economic disability.

"We regard housing of the people as an essential social service, and should therefore be taken out of the realm of doubt. Of course, it follows that profit should not be the sole motive, but that works to be done should only be judged on the criterion of need of the people.

"We urge on the Borough Council the necessity of pressing the Government to declare a minimum housing programme; that they should instruct local authorities to prepare definite plans. As a preliminary step there should be immediate legislation, so that land can be quickly acquired for this purpose. Where subsidies are necessary, the Government should at once announce its intention to grant such aid as is needed to meet the growing and very urgent demands.

"We also hold that housing standards should be fixed at a higher minimum and strictly adhered to, having regard to modern conceptions of amenities and comfort, not forgetting that it is the housewife's workshop, and the environment in which children spend their earliest and tenderest years.

"We feel that the considerations here put forward call for as vigorous a prosecution in the interest of post-war planning as is now being made for the war."

The Committee find themselves generally in agreement with the foregoing resolution, and desire to point out that the views expressed by the organisations largely coincide with the principles enunciated during the last eighteen months by the Council in connection with post-war planning and housing, on which action has to some extent been taken within limited powers at present available, and on which representations have otherwise been made to appropriate Ministries.

The Committee propose to inform the Associations accordingly and to thank them for their support.

#### (C) Watling Association.

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Representations have been received from the above Association urging further consideration of their resolution of 20.7.43—2. The Council in the past have wisely exercised their powers and made a generous provision of public open spaces. It is felt that the Association can properly be informed that no appropriations are contemplated for building purposes. In so far as the representation concerns the undesirability of the utilisation of undeveloped lands for future buildings, the Council will continue to administer the normal development control under the existing operative town-planning schemes.

The Committee RECOMMEND-That the Association be informed accordingly.

#### 6. FIRST YEAR'S HOUSING PROGRAMME:

The Committee have received a report from the Borough Surveyor with regard to certain lands contemplated for housing purposes in the above programme.

- (a) Wentworth Hall Estate: Agreement with the owner for acquisition appears to be doubtful, and it is suggested that an enquiry should be addressed to the Ministry of Health as to a compulsory purchase order under Section 74 of the Housing Act, 1936.
- (b) Brent Hill Estate: Inspection of the area has been made by representatives of the Ministry of Agriculture, and the Committee now suggest that the Minister of Health be pressed for his consent to the use of the land for the purposes of the housing programme.
- (c) Edgware: Proposals relating to the possible development of land have been submitted, and the Borough Surveyor duly instructed thereon.

The Committee RECOMMEND-That their proposals under (a) and (b) above be approved.

# 7. OBSOLETE AND RECONSTRUCTION AREAS:

The Borough Surveyor has reported on his negotiations and other proposed dealings with respect to lands included in the areas approved by the Council (13/8/43·21/9/43—1). In order to expedite the issue of decisions on the possible acquisition of interests in lands comprised in such areas, the Committee propose to suggest to the Finance and General Purposes Committee that they should recommend the Council to approve—

That, after consultation with the Chairman of the Special (Post-War Development) Committee, the Borough Surveyor, in conjunction with the Borough Treasurer, be authorised to accept offers for the acquisition by the Council of the freehold and/or leasehold interests on lands within the approved obsolete and reconstruction areas, subject to the terms of purchase being agreed by the District Valuer.

#### 8. COUNCIL'S SERVICES:

In order to assist in the consideration by the Special Committee of the general problem of post-war development in the Borough, it is deemed desirable for the several Committees of the Council to report as far as practicable on the probable early extension and development of their respective services, and that their proposals be incorporated in a general plan for the Borough.

- (1) That it be an instruction to all Committees of the Council to consider and report to the Special Committee on the post-war development of their respective services.
- (2) That the reference to the Special Committee be deemed to include the consideration and co-ordination of the proposals of the several Committees.

"Whether, in view of the proposals in the Government's Education Bill which would seriously restrict the independence of such local education authorities as that of Hendon, he will consider the question of taking immediate steps towards acquiring for the Corporation the powers of a County Borough?"

Reply by Alderman Teare:

"I am aware of the provisions of the Bill which seek to establish the County Council as the local education authority, and to reduce the status of the Borough Council as respects education to that of a "divisional executive" under a scheme to be prepared by the Borough Council in consultation with the County Council, and to be approved by an order of the Minister. The Town Clerk will be reporting to the next meeting of my Committee on the local administrative provisions of the Bill.

"With regard to the question of taking steps toward acquiring the status of a County Borough, such powers could only be obtained by the promotion of a local Act under powers conferred by the Local Government Act, 1933. In view, however, of the Local Elections and Register of Electors (Temporary Provisions) Acts, 1939-1943, which suspend the power to make Orders altering the areas or constitution of local authorities for the war period, I am advised that this would be used as a guide to Parliament, and would most probably result in the rejection of any local Bill applying for County Borough powers. Moreover, the close proximity of the Borough to London, and the potential effect of the grant to Hendon of County Borough powers on the Middlesex County Council, would undoubtedly give rise to serious opposition to any local Bill at this stage, and I do not think my Committee would be justified in recommending the promotion of legislation on the lines contemplated."

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# 5. RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT, 1919:

On the report of the Medical Officer of Health, I approved the under-mentioned proposals agreed with the Borough Treasurer, the Borough Surveyor and the Senior Sanitary Inspector on the 31st ultimo, subject to the Middlesex County Council delegating their powers under the Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1919, to the Borough District Councils throughout the County, in accordance with Section 2 of the Act:—

(i) That a foreman rat catcher experienced in this work be appointed, at a weekly wage of £5, plus bonus (at present 19s. 6d.). He will work under the direction of the Senior Sanitary Inspector. (The rate of wage was agreed between Mr. Van Os, of the Ministry of Food, and the Borough Treasurer's Department.)

(It is recommended that Mr. G. II. Valle, 81, Gaskell Road, Highgate, N. 6, at present employed by the Middlesex County Council in this capacity, be appointed as foreman rat catcher.)

- (ii) That as the amount of assistance the foreman rat catcher will require may fluctuate, it is proposed that this should be provided by the Borough Engineer and Surveyor from the personnel of the sewers section of his department, a number of whom will be trained.
- (iii) That the necessary poisons, traps, etc., be acquired. Storage and transport to be provided by the Borough Engineer and Surveyor.
- (iv) That where work is done for a third party proper charges shall be made.
- (v) That the Ministry of Food be asked to approve the scheme, including the cost of training the necessary personnel.

#### 6.—BRITISH RESTAURANTS—VENTILATION SCHEMES:

I considered prices received from three contractors for the ventilation schemes at seven British Restaurants. The prices submitted are as follows:—

It was pointed out that the tenders are not comparative, as in each case the contractor was at liberty to decide the best type of apparatus to use and the capacity of the plant which he considered it desirable to instal to prevent excessive condensation during the winter months. The prices quoted are for the engineering work involved, and, in addition, the Corporation will have to provide for the necessary building work, electrical connections, etc.

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After considering the schemes, I gave authority for the lowest tender to be accepted, viz., that of Messrs. Benham & Sons ,Ltd., subject to the approval of the Ministry of Food to the following expenditure:—

# 7.—PROPOSED USE OF LAND FOR MARKET GARDEN— NORTH-EAST SIDE OF GREAT NORTH WAY, HENDON (NEAR MURRAY'S GARAGE):

I considered an application from Mr.Leslie Raymond for permission to use an area of land on the north side of Great North Way for market garden purposes. This piece of land is reserved in Hendon Planning Scheme No. 1 as a public open space, and cannot be used for any other purpose without the consent of the Corporation under Clause 6. Prior to the war negotiations were opened for the acquisition of the land, but were suspended by the Corporation in October, 1939.

1 gave authority for the necessary consent under Clause 6 to be issued, subject to the applicant entering into a town-planning agreement embodying the following conditions:—

- (1) That the permission shall be for a period of seven years.
- (2) At the expiration of the period the owner will remove any buildings or roads which he may have constructed, and restore the land to its present condition.
- (3) That no buildings shall be erected on the site except those necessary for the purpose of the user of the ground as a market garden, and plans and elevations of any such buildings shall be approved by the Corporation before erection.

# 8. USER OF NOS. 1103 AND 1105, FINCHLEY ROAD, N.W. 11, FOR BUSINESS PURPOSES:

I considered an application received from Messrs. Vogue Aircraft, Ltd., for permission to use two ground floor shops, Nos. 1103 and 1105, Finchley Road, for manufacturing purposes, for a period of two years. I gave authority for the application to be approved, subject to the applicants entering into an agreement limiting the user of the shops to the period stated, and containing the usual clauses for the protection of residential property in the vicinity.

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# 10.—NATIONAL FIRE SERVICE—FIREMAN STOKES:

It was reported to me that Fireman Stokes, who was transferred to the National Fire Service when it was taken over from the Corporation, after a period of service in H.M. Forces, was discharged on the 14th November, 1943, following injuries sustained in the course of his duties, which rendered him unfit for further military service. By a letter received on the 11th December, 1943, the National Fire Service stated that it was possible to employ Fireman Stokes on duties other than full Fire Brigade duties, having regard to the extent of the National Fire Service. The Corporation was asked to concur in this arrangement. As the Corporation might not be in a position to continue Fireman Stokes' services in the duties now proposed, on the return to the Council's control of the local Fire Brigade, I authorised a communication to be sent to the National Fire Service stating that the Hendon Council concurred in the retention of Fireman Stokes in the National Fire Service, without prejudice to any action which the Council may find it necessary to take with regard to the continuance of the service of Fireman Stokes when the Fire Brigade is returned to the control of the Council.

The following matters have been dealt with during the time the Committee has been in Recess:—

# 1. CHILDS HILL SCHOOL PLAYGROUND — AIR RAID SHELTER:

A memorandum was received from the Borough Engineer stating that it was not practical to erect the proposed new overground air-raid shelter at Childs Hill School entirely within the boundaries of the school property. There is already a shelter for 100 children in the playground. If the new shelter were sited in this playground, it would seriously impede access and would reduce the playground area and prevent all organised games. I therefore gave the Borough Engineer authority to ask the Town Clerk to requisition under Defence Regulations approximately 25 ft. of the gardens of Nos. 137 and 139, Cricklewood Lane, to facilitate the erection of this shelter.

#### 2. GARDEN SUBURB SCHOOL:

In order to divide the classes which are accommodated in the assembly hall at this school, authority was given to the Borough Engineer to supply movable screens, at an estimated cost of £39.

#### 3. BARNFIELD COUNCIL SCHOOL:

- (a) Heating Installation.—A letter has been received from the Board of Education approving the Committee's proposals for improving the heating system at this school, at a cost of £857, to be met from revenue. The Board also issued the necessary certificate for the metal required to carry out the work.
- (b) Caretaker's Cottage.—It was found upon inspection that the hot-water storage tank in the caretaker's cottage was defective and needed repair. I authorised the Borough Engineer to carry out the necessary work, at an estimated cost of £12 10s.

#### 4. BELL LANE SCHOOL—CENTRAL KITCHEN:

Difficulty has been experienced with regard to the drain-pipe leading from the potato-peeling machines at this kitchen, and authority was given for the Borough Engineer to alter the waste pipe, at an estimated cost of £8 10s.

#### 5. BLACK-OUT OF SCHOOLS:

I gave authority for the Borough Engineer to carry out the following black-out work at the schools mentioned:—

- (a) Wessex Gardens Girls' School: One classroom for use by the G.T.C.; estimated cost £8 5s.
- (b) Orange Hill Central School: Two classrooms for use by the A.T.C.; estimated cost £22.
- (c) Frith Manor School: Practical room for "Make Do and Mend" evening class: estimated cost £30. (The Middlesex Education Committee have agreed to pay 50 per cent. of the cost involved.)

# 6. WOODCROFT COUNCIL SCHOOL—FIRE WATCHING:

#### 1.—WAR ALLOWANCE TO TEACHERS:

(a) The following Administrative Memorandum 494 from the Board of Education was submitted:—

#### War Allowance for Teachers.

"The Burnham Committees recently remitted to their Chairman, Lord Soulbury, as Arbitrator, the question of war allowance for teachers. Lord Soulbury has now made his award as follows:—

(a) For teachers under 21 years of age the war allowance shall be:-

Men: £32 per annum.

Women: €26 per annum.

(b) For teachers of 21 years of age and over, the war allowance shall be:-

Men: £52 per annum.

Women: £42 per annum.

These allowances shall be in substitution for the existing war allowances, and shall apply as from the 1st January, 1944.

The Board are prepared to recognise for grant purposes the expenditure of Authorities on applying the award.

In remitting the matter to arbitration the respective Panels of the Burnham Committees bound themselves to accept the findings of the Arbitrator, subject in the case of the Local Education Authorities' Panel to the war allowance so awarded being recognised by the Board for the purposes of their grants. Inasmuch as the Board have accepted the award for grant purposes, the war allowance awarded constitutes "recognised war allowance" within the meaning of Article 5 of Grant Regulations No. 1 and Article 8 of Grant Regulations No. 4, as amended by the respective Provisional Amending Regulations, 1942."

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT war allowance be paid to teachers on the Committee's staff in accordance with the terms of the award as set out above.

(b) A further letter was received from the Board of Education, stating that with reference to Administrative Memorandum 494, the Board are prepared to recognise for

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the purpose of grant the payment, as from 1st January, 1944, of a war allowance of £42 per annum for women supplementary teachers, provided that the basic rates paid have not otherwise been increased as a result of war conditions. The Board are also prepared to recognise for the purpose of grant the payment of a war allowance of 4s. per day to occasional teachers paid at daily rates.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT war allowance be paid to those teachers on the Committee's staff who come within the foregoing categories.

# 2.-HEAD TEACHERS' SALARIES-WAR BONUS:

A letter was submitted from the Hendon Head Teachers' Association drawing attention to the following extract from the "Schoolmaster" of 23rd September, 1943:

"The Enfield Education Committee has decided to pay from April 1st, 1943, a war bonus of £30 per annum to the seven head teachers in the Committee's service whose salaries are above the scale of the bonus award. These teachers were the only employees of the Urban District Council not receiving a bonus."

The Director reported that under previous Burnham Awards the ceiling for the award of war bonus was £525. As a result, headmasters with a basic salary of £560 and headmistresses with a basic salary of £553 received no bonus. On the staff of the Education Committee seven headmasters come within this category. Attention was drawn to the fact that any payment of a war bonus other than that authorised under the Burnham Award would not attract grant from the Board of Education, as no provision has been made for such payment in any previous award.

#### 3.—TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT OF TEACHERS:

Board of Education Circular 1643 (6th December) was submitted, stating that employers must give notice in writing of the termination of employment of permanent members of their staff to the Ministry of Labour, but that an exception is made in the case of teachers appointed and paid by the week or by a period shorter than a week, i.e., occasional teachers.

#### 4.—LETTERS FROM THE HENDON TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION:

(a) Appointment of Nursery Assistants to Assist in the Distribution of Cod Liver Oil and Orange Juice in Infant Schools.

A letter was received from the Hendon Teachers' Association suggesting that the Committee should consider the appointment of nursery assistants, similar to those who are attached to nursery schools and war-time day nurseries, to assist in the distribution of cod-liver oil and orange juice to children under five years of age in infant schools under the Committee's authority. Other duties would include the distribution of milk and supervision of lunch; the undressing and dressing of the children: preparation of beds and blankets, and general supervision of the children's washing and

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The Director of Education pointed out that all these duties have now to be carried out by one teacher, single-handed, in addition to the training and teaching of the children in a class of 20 to 30 children, all under five years of age.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the Board of Education be asked to approve the appointment of nursery assistants, at a saiary of £1 per week, in nursery classes attached to infant schools.

(b) A letter was submitted from the Hendon Teachers' Association requesting leave of absence for five members of the Association to form part of a deputation of the Middlesex Association of the National Union of Teachers to meet Members of Parliament representing the Middlesex constituency at the House of Commons during the afternoon of the second Wednesday after the reopening of Parliament.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND.

THAT leave of absence, with salary, be granted to the teachers concerned.

#### 5.—ST. MARY'S C. OF E. SCHOOL—"CLEANER" HOURS:

The School Architect has been asked to measure up the superficial area of St. Mary's C. of E. School. Having regard to the figures now obtained, and the scheme for allocating "cleaner" hours, it now appears that the number of "cleaner" hours should be increased from 24 hours to 30 hours per week.

#### 6.—SPECIAL SALARY ALLOWANCES:

# 1.—VITAMIN AND IRON SUPPLEMENTS FOR CHILDREN UNDER FIVE IN PUBLIC ELEMENTARY AND NURSERY SCHOOLS:

Administrative Memorandum No. 485 from the Board of Education was submitted, which states that the Board have now made arrangements with the Ministry of Food and Ministry of Health for supplies of cod-liver oil, orange juice and ferrous sulphate tablets to be available for school children under five. The Director of Education reported that 657 parents of school children under five years of age attending nursery classes in infants' departments were circularised to ascertain if they were willing to agree that their children should be given cod-liver oil and orange juice at the school. The result was that 440 parents accepted in writing, 21 declined, and 196 failed to reply.

The Director then drew attention to the fact that the expenditure by the Authority in respect of the cod-liver oil and orange juice, which would be free of charge to the parents, would rank for elementary education grant only from the Board in respect of nursery classes, and 100 per cent. grant from the Ministry of Health as regards wartime day nurseries.

Regarding the ferrous sulphate tablets, it was pointed out that the administering of these tablets would be to children under five selected by the Medical Officer of Health.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) THAT the Director of Education be instructed to write to the Board of Education emphasising the anomaly in the difference between the grant from the Board of Education and the Ministry of Health, and to ask the Board to consider the question of increasing their grant to that of the Ministry of Health.
- (b) THAT, subject to the approval of the Board of Education to the appointment of suitable nursery class assistants as outlined in item 6 (a) of the report of the Staffs and Salaries Sub-Committee, 4/1/44, cod-liver oil and concentrated orange juice be administered to those children under five years of age in the Committee's public elementary schools whose parents had accepted the offer in writing.

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(c) THAT the matter of administering ferrous sulphate tablets be referred to the School Medical Officer for necessary action.

# 2.—POST-WAR DEVELOPMENT IN EDUCATION:

#### 1.—ALGERNON ROAD SCHOOL—HEATING AND VENTILATING SYSTEM:

It was reported that, as instructed by the Education Committee, the Borough Engineer had made a detailed inspection of the heating and ventilating plant at this school. It appears that on investigation the trouble was due to the fact that the opening between the fan room and the ducts leading to the classrooms was half-closed by This restricted the normal flow of air from the fan to the classrooms. The door has now been removed and conditions have materially improved. The ventilating outlets above the roof have been overhauled and cleaned.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the Borough Engineer be instructed to arrange for periodical inspections of the plant to be made.

#### 2.—FUEL ECONOMY AND CENTRAL HEATING IN SCHOOLS:

The Borough Engineer reported on Board of Education Administrative Memorandum No. 490, regarding fuel economy and central heating in schools. The Board emphasise the danger of a serious shortage of fuel during the winter, and state that this can only be avoided by the greatest economy in the use of fuel. With regard to defective or inefficient heating apparatus, the Board will be prepared to give special consideration to cases specified.

In connection with the oil-burning plant at Colindale School, the Borough Engineer reported that a representative of the Ministry of Fuel and Power had recently inspected this plant, and agreed to its retention for the present winter. The necessary fuel permit has been issued.

The Memorandum further states that large and graded coals are in short supply, and that when schemes for improving efficiency are under consideration the possibility of making provision for the substitution of those classes of fuel in better supply should be examined.

The Borough Surveyor is of opinion that no further action by the Committee is needed at the present time. Noted.

# 3.—WOODCROFT SCHOOL—HOT-WATER SYSTEM:

In June last authority was given to replace the small hot-water cylinder at this school with a larger cylinder. This work was duly carried out, but it was subsequently found that the whole of the piping between the boiler and the cylinder was furred up. This piping had to be replaced, and a suitable pipe with an outlet over the cold water supply had to be provided. The additional cost of this work amounted to £67.

# 5.-INTER - LIBRARY LOANS:

It was reported that 38 volumes had been borrowed form 24 libraries, whilst 65 volumes had been lent to 34 libraries.

On the subject of inter-library loans, the Chief Librarian reported that a letter has been received, stating that the Birmingham Public Libraries Committee have decided that from January 1st, 1944, until further notice, libraries borrowing books from Birmingham shall not be asked to refund the cost of carriage, and as Birmingham probably lends more books to outside libraries than any other library in the country, this represents a considerable financial contribution to inter-library co-operation.

The Committee are informed that an increasing number of libraries, of which Birmingham is the latest, have abolished charges for postage and carriage. In the area of the South-Eastern Regional Library Bureau, the Science Museum Library, certain urban libraries, and most of the county libraries are included in the number. At present, when books are lent from Hendon, the borrowing library refunds cost of carriage, and when they are obtained for local readers the latter are charged actual cost of carriage, averaging 1s. 2d. per volume. If all charges for this service were abolished there would be a small saving in staff time in issuing receipts and handling cash, postal orders, and stamps. This is the chief reason given by other libraries for abolition of the inter-library carriage charges. Although in Hendon the volume of work is not very great, the Chief Librarian submitted for consideration whether or not all charges should be abolished for inter-library lending, both to libraries and to readers. total cost to the Council at the present time would be about £35 per annum.

It is pointed out that inter-library loans are a useful means of supplementing local book resources, especially at a time when an increasing number of books now out of print have to be borrowed when normally they would be added to stock. books are supplied only in response to a definite and specific demand from actual readers, and the removal of any hindrance, however slight, to them in their reading is a good thing.

# 8.—POST-WAR REORGANISATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE PUBLIC LIBRARY SERVICE—PROPOSALS BY THE COUNCIL OF THE LIBRARY ASSOCIATION:

The Committee considered the following memorandum submitted by the Chief Librarian on the proposals by the Council of the Library Association for the post-war reorganisation and development of the Public Library Service. A copy of the full proposals of the Library Association had previously been circulated to each member of the Committee:—

I. The most important of these proposals are embodied in paragraphs 10-11, as follows:-

# " Essential Conditions.

- 10. We believe there are four conditions of paramount importance to the development of sound library service throughout the country. They are discussed in greater detail in following paragraphs.
  - (a) The provision of adequate services by suitable library authorities must be made compulsory.
  - (b) There must be an appropriate department of the central government responsible for guiding, encouraging and co-ordinating the work of local library authorities, and insisting upon their efficiency.
    - (c) All local authorities must be rendered financially able to attain efficiency.
  - (d) The composition and size of local government areas must be such that the best results are made possible.

Such conditions would remove the causes of many undesirable variations in standards of efficiency. Variations there will always be, but in the new situation they would arise from the constant efforts of the best of many good authorities further to improve their libraries and anticipate the increasing and changing public demands.

- II. We consider the essential requirements of any system of library service to be
  - (a) An adequate service must be available to everyone, irrespective of where he may reside, and must include not only reasonable access to appropriate service points, but also the right, and the opportunity, to draw upon whatever wider resources of books and professional services each individual may require.
  - (b) Every accredited person must be enabled freely to borrow books from or consult them in any public library, regardless of his place of residence or employment. No barriers to the full and free use of libraries should exist.

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(c) The library service must be so organised and provided that it can meet all the legitimate requirements of the community for books and information. Supply must be related to actual and potential demands, both as to general requirements and those arising from particular local circumstances.

- (d) Libraries must be controlled by library committees, comprising men and women chosen for their interest in the service and their appreciation of its possibilities, and responsible directly to their local authorities. They should not be controlled by committees charged also with the responsibility for other functions, such as education, nor by sub-committees of such committees.
- (e) Libraries must be staffed by capable and experienced chief officers, with sufficient suitable and qualified assistance."
- 2. Paragraphs 10 (a), (b) and (c) imply the setting up of a central co-ordinating authority, with functions regarding libraries similar to those of the Board of Education regarding schools. Some parts of the country are not adequately served, and the residents are thus deprived of the facilities which a good library service is capable of giving. The setting up of a central authority or Government department should be accompanied by a system of grants in aid. Further reference to this is made in paragraph 17 of the report.
- 3. In regard to paragraph 10 (d), it is a matter of fact that some local government areas are too small and the financial burden too heavy for them to provide an efficient library service from their own resources.
- 4. In paragraph 11 (d) reference is made to the need for a library committee to be responsible directly to the local authority, and not, as in the counties, to another committee charged with responsibility for other functions.
- 5. Paragraph 12 urges that the local library service must remain "local," and not be placed directly under the control of either the central government or of larger regional authorities. At the same time (paragraphs 13-16), the point is made that the area of a library authority must be large and populated enough to provide for its residents a full library service.
- 6. The proposals regarding the establishment of a new central government department, grants in aid, etc., are developed in paragraphs 17-24.
- 7. Paragraphs 29-40 deal with the status of the library staff, covering, inter alia, the division of the staff into (i) technical and (ii) service. Detailed proposals on this matter are still under consideration of the Library Association.
- 8. Other paragraphs call for no particular comment beyond the fact that, as stated in paragraph 51, the principles embodied in the report will require a revision of the law relating to public libraries.

The Committee are in agreement with the proposals, and they acordingly

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council support the proposals of the Council of the Library Association for the post-war reorganisation and development of the Public Library Service.

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# (iii) REHOUSING IN REQUISITIONED PREMISES FAMILIES INADEQUATELY HOUSED:

The Sub-Committee considered a report by the Borough Treasurer on Ministry of Health Circular No. 2845, dated 4th August, 1943; London Civil Defence Region Circular No. 805, dated 10th Sept., 1943, and a letter dated 11th November, 1943, from the Senior Regional Officer of the Ministry of Health.

On the question of the charges to be made to the occupants of houses taken over for the accommodation of families inadequately housed, the last-mentioned communication states

"that although the relationship between the local authority and the occupants is not that of landlord and tenant, nevertheless a large proportion of the houses requisitioned will have a statutory 'standard rent' under the Rent Restriction Acts. This standard rent will normally form the basis of the compensation payable to the landlord in respect of the requisitioning, and it is considered that the local authority might reasonably determine the appropriate charge for the house by calculating what the landlord could legally have charged for it by way of rent, i.e., standard rent plus 8 per cent. of any structural alterations or improvements carried out since the house became controlled. In so far, therefore, as any expenditure by the local authority in preparing the house for occupation is in the nature of structural alterations or improvements, they should add 8 per cent. of that expenditure to the standard rent. Expenditure in respect of ordinary repairs or decorations, including War Damage repairs, should, of course, be omitted.

In cases where a requisitioned house has no standard rent, or if the standard rent cannot readily be ascertained, the local authority should consider the rents charged in the locality for comparable properties, in order to arrive at an appropriate charge.

The amount of the charge as calculated in accordance with the foregoing, plus an amount in respect of rates, if these are not included in the standard rent, is the maximum charge which a local authority should make for the house, and their aim should be to get that amount. On account of the general shortage of working-class houses, however, it is to be anticipated that the local authority will sometimes have to place working-class families in houses of a type which they would not normally occupy, and in these circumstances payment of the full charge as calculated in accordance with the principles set out above cannot be expected, and the authority, in determining the appropriate charge, will need to have regard to the current working-class rents prevailing in the district."

In response to a request by the Borough Treasurer for guidance as to the interpretation of the following words appearing in paragraph 10 of Ministry of Health Circular 2845—

"the rent to be charged should not be less than the amount that the person occupying the premises might reasonably expect to pay as rent if housed in the normal way in the district, and so far as possible the aim should be to obtain an economic rent,"

an officer of the Ministry of Health intimated that the test to be applied in all cases was the comparative urgency of the housing need, and this test had to be the first consideration. Having decided as to which cases were the most deserving, Councils are to endeavour to obtain, as far as possible, the economic rent (which must not in any case exceed the standard rent).

In the light of the foregoing information, the Sub-Committee considered as to the allocation of applicants to the 23 requisitioned premises, and one house acquired by the Council and passed to the Housing Department for rehousing purposes under the terms of Circular 2845. Having regard to the nature and situation of the requisitioned premises, and the circumstances of the families requiring to be rehoused, the allocation of such premises has been no easy matter, as so many factors have to be considered. Details of the allotments made, approximate economic rent, and the weekly amount to be paid for the accommodation allocated, are set out in the following schedule:—

The Chairman reported that it was not possible to obtain all the information required by the date originally fixed for the next meeting of the Housing Sub-Committee, and it was accordingly

RESOLVED—That the next meeting of the Sub-Committee be held on Wednesday, 2nd February, and that the Chairman be authorised to agree the charge to be made for any accommodation which may be allocated prior to the meeting of the Sub-Committee.

# 16.—REQUISITIONING OF HOUSES FOR FAMILIES INADEQUATELY HOUSED:

Ministry of Health Circular No. 2845.

The Borough Engineer reported that pursuant to the Committee's instructions (Housing C., 6/9/43—19), he had put in hand a survey of the houses contained in the lists supplied to him. In the first instance he had concentrated upon empty unfurnished bouses, and up to date had carried out approximately 112 surveys of such houses in the Golders Green, Childs Hill, Burnt Oak and West Hendon Wards. It is evident from surveys that since the lists were prepared a large amount of repair work has been carried out to the houses surveyed, as it has been found that approximately half the houses included in the lists in respect of which surveys have been made are now occupied.

The Borough Engineer submitted List No. 1 of properties suggested for repair or conversion, together with the approximate estimated cost of the necessary works. Houses in respect of which the survey shows that the cost of the necessary works would be excessive have not been included in the list. In cases where it is suggested more than one family could occupy the premises, provision has been made in the estimate for an additional kitchen, and where necessary an additional w.c. It has not been possible, however, in every case to provide for additional bathrooms, and it might be necessary in some instances to arrange for two families to share the one bathroom.

A report was also submitted by the Rehousing Officer intimating that one of the properties included in the list submitted by the Borough Engineer was under preliminary requisition for the purposes of homeiess and transferred war workers rehousing services, and he accordingly asked that such premises and four other properties included in the list should be excluded from consideration, in order that requisitioning notices may be issued under Circular 2081, to assist in bringing the quota of properties up to the standard required by the London Civil Defence Region.

The Committee have agreed to the exclusion from the list of the five properties mentioned in the report of the Rehousing Officer, and the list of properties as approved for requisitioning is set out hereunder:—

Before requisitioning notices can be served, it will be necessary to obtain the consent of the Senior Regional Officer of the Ministry of Health. Application for such consent must be accompanied by estimates of the cost of rendering the accommodation fit for occupation, and a statement showing the result of con-

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sultation with the owner as to the possibility of his letting the premises himself. It will, therefore, now be necessary to ascertain the views of the owners of the properties in question, and when these have been obtained the necessary details will be forwarded to the Senior Regional Officer of the Ministry of Health for consent to requisitioning.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council approve of the necessary steps being taken with a view to requisitioning the properties included in the list set out above as accommodation for families living in unsatisfactory housing conditions, in pursuance of Ministry of Health Circular No. 2845.

# 17.—POST-WAR DEVELOPMENT — HOUSING:

# 18.—PROPOSED SINGLE-STOREY BUILDING, REAR OF 61, DAWS LANE, MILL HILL:

In accordance with the Council's decision of the 13th December last, the Committee reconsidered the application of Miss R. F. Parker for permission to erect at the rear of No. 61, Daws Lane, Mill Hill, a single-storey brick building for the purpose of treating dogs and cats needing medical attention, and decided to re-affirm their original decision disapproving the application.

RESOLVED-That consent be refused under Clauses 28 and 30.

# 19.—NO. 1, MANOR PARK CRESCENT, EDGWARE — PROPOSED SHOWROOM AND BUILDER'S YARD:

The Borough Engineer reported on an application from Mr. A. J. Offredy for permission to use the ground floor front room of No. 1, Manor Park Crescent, Edgware, as a builder's and decorator's office, including the public display of goods, and to use a portion of the back garden and the existing buildings thereon for the storage of builder's and decorator's plant and materials, and also for the future erection of an additional building for the same purpose. The property is included in a residential zone of Planning Scheme No. 1.

RESOLVED-That consent be refused (Clauses 28, 29 and 30).

# 20.—NOS. 2 AND 2a, SUNBURY AVENUE, MILL HILL:

for the In 1932 the Council issued an interim consent to the owner of No. 2, Sunbury Avenue, to the erection of a small cottage on spare land at the side of the house, subject to the condition that the additional dwelling was to be inhabited in conjunction with the existing house, and not to be let or sold for separate occupation.

An application has now been submitted by Messrs. Hays, Roughton & Dunn, on behalf of the prospective owner of No. 2, Sunbury Avenue, for the cancellation of this condition, so that he can purchase and live in No. 2, and enable the cottage known as No. 2a to be let or sold separately.

The Borough Engineer points out that the surface-water drainage from No. 2a is connected to the surface-water drainage of No. 2. The Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the condition referred to be cancelled, subject to the surface-water drains of No. 2a being relaid and connected direct to the surface-water sewer in the road.

# 21.—SOUTH-WEST SIDE OF CLAREMONT ROAD—PROPOSED TEMPORARY SCHOOL KITCHEN:

An application was submitted from the Hendon Education Committee for permission to erect a temporary building for use as a school kitchen on the south-west side of Claremont Road, approximately opposite Quantock Gardens. The site forms part of the playing field attached to Clitterhouse School, and the land is scheduled in Hendon Planning Scheme No. 1 for residential purposes.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That consent be granted.

# 22.—SOUTH SIDE OF ABBOTS ROAD—PROPOSED TEMPORARY SCHOOL KITCHEN:

An application was submitted from the Hendon Education Committee for permission to erect a temporary building for use as a school kitchen on the south side of Abbots Road, near Colchester Road, Burnt Oak, on land which forms part of Watling Park.

The application will require to be considered by the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee, and it will also be necessary to obtain the consent of the London County Council, under the terms by which the land was conveyed to this Council.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, subject to the proposal being approved by the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee and the London County Council, consent be granted.

# 23.—CANCELLATION OF PERMITS—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936, SECTION 53:

The Borough Engineer reported on an application from Pickfords, Ltd., relating to the drainage of their premises in Ed gware Road, Cricklewood. The premises in question are situated on an area of land which is mainly occupied by the London, Midland & Scottish Railway, and there is no sewer vested in the Corporation in this section of the Edgware Road. Messrs. Pickfords have accordingly applied to the Willesden Borough Council, under the provisions of Section 35 of the Public Health Act, 1936, for permission to exercise their right to connect the drains of their premises with the sewer of another authority. The Willesden Council are prepared to assent, subject to an agreement with this authority and Messrs. Pickfords containing the necessary provisions as to payment for the reception and disposal of the sewage. It will also be necessary for the agreement to provide that the connection shall be made at the expense of Messrs. Pickfords.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That the proposal be approved, subject to the execution of an agreement in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk.
- (b) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to the necessary documents.

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# 25.—PROPOSED HOUSES, NORTH SIDE OF THIRLEBY ROAD, BURNT OAK:

The Borough Engineer reported on an application submitted by Mr. F. R. S. Yorke for permission to erect a pair of experimental houses in Thirleby Road on land vested in the London County Council. The applicants are investigating the possibility and cost of erecting pre-fabricated houses to a special design, and in collaboration with the London County Council it is proposed to erect two experimental houses on the site indicated.

The proposal cannot be approved under the bye-laws, as the plans will not comply with normal building bye-laws, but in view of the fact that the experiment is being conducted by responsible persons, and will be of general interest to local authorities, the Committee

The report deals, inter alia, with the remuneration, etc., of health visitors and child protection visitors, and as this is a matter which falls within the purview of the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee, the Committee have accordingly referred the matter to such Sub-Committee for favourable consideration.

# 38.—ACCOMMODATION FOR MATERNITY CASES — PROPOSED BOROUGH MATERNITY HOME:

The Council, at its meeting on the 13th December last, decided, on the recommendation of this Committee, to ask the Minister of Health personally to receive at the earliest possible date the deputation appointed by the Council, which was received by officers of the Ministry on the 1st November last. In this connection, a letter was submitted from the Private Secretary to the Minister of Health stating that "Mr. Willink does not feel that he could add to what the Council were told when a deputation was received on the 1st of November, and he was therefore reluctant to trouble a further deputation to come up on this subject."

The Committee feel that the urgency of the need for the provision of additional accommodation for maternity cases in the Borough justifies the pursuance of the matter to the fullest extent with a view to the need being met, and they are therefore of opinion that the Council should have the opportunity of placing its proposals before the Minister personally. The Committee therefore

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council renew its application for the deputation to be received by the Minister of Health personally, and that the Minister be informed that so far as the deputation is concerned, no inconvenience will be caused by its attendance at the Ministry.

# 3.—EDGWAREBURY PARK—STRAYING OF CATTLE:

In connection with the straying of cattle from Edgwarebury Park on to the wartime allotments, the Town Clerk submitted a report dealing with the legal position. The land in question is let to Mr. Noad for grazing purposes, and claims for compensation in respect of damage to crops alleged to be caused by cattle belonging to Mr. Noad have been received from certain allottees.

The Committee also considered a request from the Special (War-Time Allotments) Committee (10/12/43-5) for the land used for grazing purposes to be fenced.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Mr. Noad be requested forthwith adequately to fence the land used for grazing purposes.

# 4.—REMOVAL OF TREES-HEATHGATE, HAMPSTEAD GARDEN SUBURB:

The Borough Surveyor reported with regard to the removal of the poplar trees, and in connection therewith submitted letters from the Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust, Ltd., and from Miss M. H. Logan, Mr. H. Brown and Mr. C. J. Miller, residents of Heathgate. It was also reported that the Hampstead Garden Suburb Residents' Association had been communicated with, and an intimation had been received from the Association that it was in favour of the removal of the trees and the replacement thereof, at a convenient time, by trees of a more suitable character. The estimated cost of the work of removal of such trees is \$50. (Group 11. Citee, 22/11/43 E.P. & A.—9.)

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the estimate be approved and authority be given for the removal of the trees in question.

# 5.—REMOVAL OF TREES—BRAMPTON GROVE, HENDON:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a plan showing the trees which it is suggested should be allowed to remain in Brampton Grove. It will be necessary to remove 22 trees, which are gradually dying, and the estimated cost of this work is £80. (Group II. Citee. 22/11/43 E.P. & A.—10.)

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the estimate be approved, and that authority be given for the removal of the trees in question.

# 6.—HARVESTING OPERATIONS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the wheat crop on Copthall Playing Fields had now been completely threshed and disposed of to corn merchants at the controlled price. The total weight of corn sent to the merchants was 149 tons 9 cwts. 14 lbs., and was produced on an area of 110 acres of land. For the coming season Copthall Playing Fields has again been sown with wheat; also the Arrandene Open Space, a small area at Scratchwood, and an area of four acres at Moat Mount Open Space, adjacent to the Golf Club House. In addition, land at Woodfield Nursery and land fronting the North Circular Road near Claremont Road is to be used for the production of vegetables for the British Restaurants. In the past two years the Council has been handicapped by having to hire all the machinery required for cultivation, etc., and after consultation with the County War Agricultural Committee it is suggested that the Council should purchase the following machines:—

On several occasions negotiations have taken place with the Middlesex County Council, the authority responsible for the stream, but the County Council had decided that they were unable to undertake any improvement works to the stream at the present time.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Middlesex County Council again be requested to undertake temporary improvement works to the banks of the stream.

# 9.—DAWS LANE ALLOTMENTS:

It was reported by the Borough Surveyor that the Daws Lane Allotments Society required several loads of clinker to be delivered, and also two trees on plot 37 to be lopped.

# 10.-COOL OAK LANE:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the Cool Oak Lane Allotments Society had called attention to the bad condition of the fencing along the Cool Oak Lane boundary of the allotments. This fence is constantly being repaired after it has been broken down, and every effort will be made to keep it in reasonable condition.

# 14.—WHITE LINES, ETC., EDGWARE ROAD AND NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Middlesex County Council intimating that traffic lines on the Edgware Road, between Greenway Gardens and Station Road, Edgware, have already been provided, and that it is hoped to proceed with the lines along the North Circular Road in the near future. (Group 11. Committee 22/11/43 Hi.—25.)

# 15.—TROLLEY-BUS SERVICE—EDGWARE TO STANMORE CIRCUS—SERVICE 645:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the London Passenger Transport Board in regard to the Council's application for a more frequent service of trolley-buses on the above route. The Board state that the service is operated at six-minute intervals during the peak periods and at eight-minute intervals at other times. According to periodical observations, this service is adequate for the demand, and the augmentation suggested could not be justified, particularly at the present time, having regard to the shortage of rubber and staff. Unfortunately, occasionally a trolley-bus has had to be withdrawn from this service recently, owing to excessive staff sickness, and this may have given the impression that the service was infrequent. The operation of the route will be kept under close observation.

# 16.-ROAD SAFETY CAMPAIGN:

A letter was submitted from the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents, intimating that the Government's Road Safety Campaign is being maintained with special emphasis on child safety and black-out precautions. As in the past two years, the Society and all its local branches are asked to take an active part in the campaign. A sum of £16 has been allocated to Hendon towards the cost of a campaign in the Borough.

RESOLVED-That the matter be referred to the Education Committee.

# 17.—ENGEL PARK AND BITTACY RISE, MILL HILL:

The Borough Surveyor reported on letters from Mr. A. J. Inman, of Engel Park, and Mrs. H. Beko, of Bittacy Rise, complaining of the condition of the above roads. The roads in question are of a private character, and in January, 1943, estimates were prepared by the Borough Surveyor for carrying out temporary repairs at the expense of the frontagers. The estimate, however, did not meet with the approval of the frontagers. (Group II. Cttee. 1/3/43 Hi.—18.)

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the complainants be informed accordingly.

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# 18.—ACCIDENTS ON HIGHWAYS — STATISTICS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter forwarded by Councillor Bate from the London Council of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents, suggesting a form of analysing monthly accidents on highways. Fortunately, at the present time, accidents in the Borough are at a low figure, and the monthly analysis of these accidents has been suspended by the Committee.

Noted.

# 19.—GULLEY EMPTYING:

The Borough Surveyor reported that at the present time the Council is hiring a gulley emptier from a firm of contractors, to supplement the machine already owned by the Council, to carry out the work of clearing the gulleys in the district. The cost of this machine and the two men required to operate it amounts to £6 per day. The number of gulleys in the Borough is now sufficient to keep two gulley emptiers fully occupied, and it will be economical for the Council to purchase and operate a second machine. Subject to the necessary permit from the Ministry of War Transport, Dennis Bros., Ltd., Guildford, are in a position to supply a 750-gallons gulley emptier of their own manufacture for the price of £1,100, and delivery can be made eight weeks after the receipt of the necessary permit.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the purchase of a 750-gallons gulley emptier, at a cost of £1,100.

# 20.—TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNALS—JUNCTION OF ORANGE HILL ROAD WITH WATLING AVENUE:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an interview he had had with officials of New Scotland Yard, together with Inspector Luxton, of Edgware, regarding the Council's application for the reinstatement of the traffic-control signals at the above junction. It was pointed out to the officials that there was a very heavy pedestrian user of the crossing, and that, in addition to the normal traffic in Watling Avenue, there was a substantial amount of heavy traffic using Orange Hill Road and Watling Avenue. In these circumstances, the Council were of opinion that the traffic-control signals at this junction should be reinstated. Conforming to the Government's request for economy in man-power, materials and fuel, the police had arranged for numerous traffic-signals in the Metropolitan Police area to be extinguished for the duration of the war, but they were quite prepared to assent to the lighting of traffic-control signals if they were satisfied that special reasons existed. The information before the police at the present time as to accidents at this point did not appear to disclose any special reasons for dealing with these signals.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Commissioner of Police be asked to approve the reinstatement of such traffic control signals.

# WORKS AND FIRE BRIGADE. (Councillor C. F. Windust—Chairman.)

# 21.—REQUISITIONS:

# 22.—POST - WAR DEVELOPMENT:

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# 23.—WATER SUPPLY, SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL — POST-WAR WORKS —CIRCULAR 2899:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of Circular 2899, issued by the Ministry of Health, intimating that the Minister is now prepared to entertain applications under the appropriate statutory provisions for loan sanctions for the acquisition of land for the purposes of water supply, sewerage and sewage disposal schemes, in cases where it can fairly be said by the authority that the schemes are so urgently needed that the works should be begun at the earliest possible date after the cessation of hostilities in Europe. The circular also deals generally with the subject of the submission of applications for loan sanctions in respect of urgently needed post-war works of the character above indicated.

# 24.—POST - WAR FIRE SERVICES:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Fire Brigades Union, enclosing a memorandum dealing with the Post-War Fire Services. A letter was also submitted from the Association of Municipal Corporations upon the same subject, intimating that the Fire Brigade Committee of the Association at its next meeting will consider the memorandum published by the Fire Brigades Union. Upon the receipt of the observations of the Association of Municipal Corporations, the Town Clerk will submit a comprehensive report on the matter.

# 25.—SALVAGE BONUS SCHEME:

The Committee considered the question of the above bonus scheme, and are satisfied that such scheme should continue to operate, and

RECOMMEND accordingly.

# 26.—CLEARANCE OF LOFTS ORDER, 1942:

Statements were submitted from the National Fire Service giving details of 30 inspections under the above Order carried out during November, and 30 during December, 1943.

# 27.—SPECIAL CONSTABULARY HUT, HARTLEY AVENUE, MILL HILL:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Estate Surveyor for the Metropolitan Police District, giving three months' notice to determine the tenancy agreement in respect of this hut on the 31st March, 1944. The hut has been rented from the Council by the Receiver for the Metropolitan Police for some years, at an annual rental of £15, and the notice given is in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

Noted.

# 28.—STATEMENT OF VALUES OF SALVAGE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a statement showing the tonnage of salvage disposed of for the years ended 31st March, 1941, 1942, and to the end of November, 1943. Details of the statement appear in the Appendix to the Report of the Finance and General Purposes Committee.

# 29.—KITCHEN WASTE:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the Ministry of Supply, pointing out that the amount of raw kitchen waste collected by the Council and delivered to the concentration plant at Tottenham had decreased from 71½ tons per month during August and September to 65½ tons in October, and that the collections of kitchen waste in the Borough average only 50 per cent. of the standard amount required. The

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Ministry ask for observations on the cause of the decline. In the opinion of the Ministry a system of collection by communal bins should produce at least one ton of kitchen waste per 1,000 of the population per month. The Ministry emphasises the importance and urgency of obtaining the maximum amount of raw kitchen waste, and trusts the Council will do its utmost by distributing additional bins and by inaugurating publicity campaigns to impress upon householders in the Borough the need for saving and putting out for collection every available scrap of kitchen waste. In connection with the decrease from 71½ tons during August and September to 65½ tons in October, the Borough Surveyor reported that no useful purpose is served by comparing individual months in any one year. The yearly totals since the commencement of the collection are as follows:—

These figures indicate a steady increase in the amount collected, regardless of fluctuations between individual months. It is suggested that the Ministry be informed that the decrease to which it refers is due entirely to the fact that the labour force available for refuse collection and salvage is being gradually depleted by calling up under the National Service Acts and by transfer to industry. At the present time there are two lorries engaged whole time on collection of kitchen waste from premises and from communal bins. These lorries require six men to keep them going, but have been for the past month worked with four men. If the collection is to be increased it means putting out a larger number of aditional collection points, and this would require an additional vehicle and three more men. It is also suggested that before the Council undertakes either publicity campaigns or installing additional collection points, the Ministry should be asked if they could assist the Council in obtaining an adequate labour force to carry on the work in an efficient manner.

There are at present 23 pig clubs in the Borough, apart from farmers engaged professionally in rearing pigs. These clubs have their own systems of collection, and if they are averaged at the figure of one ton per club per week, it means that in the year 1943, in addition to the 843½ tons collected by the Council, 1,196 tons were collected by the pig clubs.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Ministry of Supply be informed on the lines indicated above.

# 30.—HOUSEHOLD BONES:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the Ministry of Supply calling attention to the importance of collecting household bones, and asks if Local Authorities, wherever possible, could arrange for their collectors, when making the usual calls for salvage, to enquire at the houses whether any bones are available. It is also suggested that salvage stewards and members of the Women's Voluntary Service be asked to assist by canvassing householders for this purpose.

RESOLVED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to make suitable arrangements on the lines suggested by the Ministry of Supply.

# 1.—ILLNESS OF COUNCILLOR LIGHTFOOT:

The Chairman reported that Councillor Lightfoot was unable to attend the meeting by reason of illness, and that he was at present in hospital. Instructions have been given for a letter to be sent to Councillor Lightfoot, expressing the sincere sympathy of the Committee and the best wishes for his speedy recovery.

# 2.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £174 5s. were submitted and approved.

# 3.—APPOINTMENT OF STAFFING SUB-COMMITTEE:

In view of the fact that the representatives of the Local Food Control Committee had not been appointed for the present year, the Committee deferred the appointment of the Staffing Sub-Committee until the next meeting.

# 4.—MOBILE CANTEEN SERVICE:

The Chief Officer Meals Service reported the receipt of a letter from the Divisional Food Officer, dated the 16th December, 1943, stating that in reply to the Council's request very careful consideration had again been given to the question of the provision of a van by the Ford Trust for the purpose of instituting a mobile canteen service for aged, sick and infirm residents of the Borough. It was regretted, however, that as this service was not considered to be essential the Council's application could not be supported.

It was reported that a letter had also been received from the Area Organiser of the Golders Green W.V.S., dated the 17th December, 1943, expressing regret that the responsibility of organising and administering the proposed canteen service could not be undertaken. The call-up of women up to 50 years of age had made it increasingly difficult to maintain certain services which required strength and vigour, and the younger personnel available were already engaged in driving and staffing the salvage van two days a week.

The Committee are not in agreement with the views expressed by the Ministry in this matter, and it was accordingly

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND— That strong representations be made to the Ministry of Food for reconsideration of their decision, on the grounds that the Council consider the institution of a mobile canteen service as essential and that the machinery for the operation of such service already exists in parts of the Borough.

# 5.—EQUIPMENT BOUGHT IN ADVANCE OF REQUIREMENT:

The Chief Officer Meals Service reported that during April and May, 1942, the Council had approved the policy of purchasing equipment, in particular crockery, cutlery and galvanised storage bins, in advance of requirement, in order to anticipate possible shortages and advances in price. The Ministry of Food was informed of this, and had assisted by providing licences, where necessary, on the understanding that reimbursement would be made at the time these items were received in the stock of a new restaurant. The Ministry has, however, declined to approve the complete stock lists submitted for Edgeworth, Hartley and the Fortune Restaurants in which the items in question have been included, on the ground that the quantities are in excess of the "Model" indent of equipment. These quantities are not greater than has been found necessary, and are based on the Ministry's allowance for restaurants similar in size at the time the purchases were made and the licences issued.

#### 8.—PROGRESS REPORTS:

- (a) Hartley.—Water is now laid on, and the plumbing contract should be finished by the end of this week. The dish-washer and café set will be fitted up directly the Gas Company has finished fixing the gas-meter. An order has been placed with the Stonart Asbestos Flooring Company, Ltd., for the floor, which will be commenced within a few days. It is anticipated that the whole of the contract and the sub-contractor's works should be finished by Monday, 7th February.
- (b) The Fortune: The general contractor has practically finished his work, except for the decoration and attendance on sub-contractors. The electrician and plumber will finish this week, provided delivery is obtained of the remainder of the cooking equipment. As far as can be foreseen the contractor's work should finish about the 21st February.

## 1.—PROCEDURE—ACCELERATION OF PROGRAMME:

The Committee have discussed at some length the procedure and instructions of the several Committees (as shown in their respective reports) on the reference made to them by the Special Committee, and, in order to avoid any duplication of effort in the post-war planning of such Committees, it is suggested that the Chief Officers should confer as far as possible before submitting plans for the consideration of their respective Committees.

The Special Committee RECOMMEND ACCORDINGLY.

## 2.—WATLING ASSOCIATION:

The Committee have considered a further representation from the Watling Community Association, requesting the Council "to urge upon the Government the necessity of building complete new towns, with houses, factories and the necessary community buildings, and need for implementing the Uthwatt, Barlow and Scott Reports."

In this connection, the Town Clerk submitted a report pointing out that the question raised in the first part of the letter, relating to "new towns with houses, factories and the necessary community buildings," has a relationship to the (Barlow) Report of the Royal Commission on the Distribution of the Industrial Population. outline the report is concerned with the control and regulation of the location of industries, for which purpose the Commission recommends the establishment of a National Industrial Board of a permanent character, whose functions would, inter alia, include the duty of preparing and submitting to the President of the Board of Trade a special report (which would be presented to Parliament) as to what further powers it requires for the purpose of giving effect to-

- (a) Continued and further redevelopment of congested urban areas, where necessary.
- (b) Decentralisation or dispersal, both of industries and industrial population, from such areas. In this connection, consideration to be directed to the methods by which such decentralisation or dispersal should be encouraged and secured, in the form of garden cities or garden suburbs, satellite towns, trading estates, or by the development of existing small towns or regional centres.

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statistical ts in operopened on a weekly neral Purrd number 926 meals (c) Encouragement of a reasonable balance of industrial development, so far as possible, throughout the various divisions or regions of Great Britain, coupled with appropriate diversification of industry in each division or region throughout the country.

This report is stated to be still under consideration.

Generally, the recommendations not only of the Barlow Report, but also those contained in the Report of the Expert Committee on Compensation and Betterment (Uthwatt) and the Report of the Committee on Land Utilisation in Rural Areas (Scott) are considered by the Government as being of a complicated character, and that it is of immense importance that the results which it is hoped to achieve out of the recommendations in these reports should be founded upon sound policy.

In view of the pressure which has been brought to bear in Parliament from time to time on the respective Ministers concerned with the reports, it would not appear that any further decisions will be taken by the Government without mature consideration. It should, however, be mentioned that Parliament has already given effect to certain recommendations of the Scott and Uthwatt Reports by the Town and Country Planning (Interim Development) Act, 1943, passed in July, which applies planning control to the whole country and gives increased powers of control over interim development to planning authorities and to the Minister. Further, the Government have already announced their acceptance of the principle of the public acquisition of all land in reconstruction areas, and progress has been made in the preparation of the necessary legislation. The Government have also announced their acceptance in principle of the recommendation of the Uthwatt Committee, that in order to prevent post-war reconstruction from being prejudiced, the compensation payable in the public acquisition or control of land should not exceed the standard of values at the 31st March, 1939, and they hope shortly to make a further statement on the detailed application of that principle.

The Special Committee continue to keep observation on the pronouncements made by Ministers in connection with the three reports, and are considering what practical steps can be taken to arrive at decisions as to how the interests of the Borough may be affected. The Committee appreciate the anxiety of the Watling Association for representations to be made to the Government, and should no pronouncement of Government policy be forthcoming at an early date they will consider the desirability of urging the Government to implement the Reports.

#### 3.—NATIONAL SMOKE ABATEMENT SOCIETY:

The following resolution of the above Society, adopted at a conference held in London on the 5th November, was submitted and **noted:**—

"That Local Authorities throughout the country be urged to appoint special smoke abatement committees, for the purpose of ensuring that full local examination of the problem in relation to reconstruction, and recommendations for action, may be made, with particular regard to town-planning, the establishment of smokeless areas, the zoning and control of industrial establishments, and the smokelessness of new housing; and that, further, Local Authorities be requested to support the efforts of the National Smoke Abatement Society and the Regional Smoke Abatement Committees in making appropriate representations to the Government."

#### 4.—WAR - DAMAGED SITE—12, BRENTME AD PLACE:

## 1.—CHRISTMAS AND NEW YEAR MESSAGE:

A Christmas and New Year message, addressed to all members of the Civil Defence Services and the Fire Guard by the Minister of Home Security and the Minister of Health, was received and duly circulated to all posts, depots, etc.

#### 2.—SURRENDER OF CLOTHING COUPONS:

In reference to item 4 of the last report, a reply has been received from the Minister of Home Security, to whom the representations made for a reduction in the number of clothing coupons which Civil Defence personnel are required to surrender annually in respect of their Civil Defence uniforms, has been referred by the Board of Trade, to the effect that the question has been carefully considered by all Government Departments responsible for Services comprising wearers of essential civilian uniform, and that the recent reduction in the number of clothing coupons to be surrendered annually from 18 to 16 represented the utmost concession which was regarded as practicable at the present time if equality between uniformed personnel and other members of the civilian population was to be preserved. The Minister suggested that no question of the issue of supplementary coupons could arise, as the annual tariff covered any replacements of uniform found to be necessary.

The position in regard to external garments appears to be covered in this way, but neither the Ministry nor the Board of Trade have dealt with the question of additional wear and tear on the underclothing of men engaged on such work as coal-heaving, demolition of property, structural repairs to depots, general building, unloading heavy goods at railway stations, and similar "extended duties" which the personnel were called upon to perform, and the Committee accordingly requested the Ministry to deal with this aspect of the matter.

In the meantime, it is understood that any men finding themselves unable to replace essential clothing by reason of the lack of clothing coupons, can submit special applications for a supplementary issue. Members of the Services finding themselves so placed are being invited to take advantage of this provision, and any such applications will be supported by the Council.

## 3.—REPAIR OF CIVILIAN RESPIRATORS:

During the months of January and February only, respirators in the hands of the public will be repaired free of charge. Payment will, however, be demanded for replacements occasioned by loss. This concession has been made by the Ministry of Home Security with a view to ensuring that the respirators in the hands of the public are maintained in an efficient condition, and special arrangements are being made, including the holding of a special census and examination of respirators by members of the Wardens' Service during week ended 22nd-24th January, to see that as many as possible of the respirators held by the public are put in order and checked for fitting.

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#### 4.—RELEASE OF PERSONNEL FOR NURSING AND MIDWIFERY:

Directions issued by the Ministry of Home Security in regard to the release of whole-time personnel now in Civil Defence Services who have nursing or midwifery qualifications or experience, and also those who, without previous experience, wish to volunteer for these duties, have been duly noted.

#### 5.—PRODUCTIVE WORK IN DEPOTS:

The scheme for work in connection with patch cutting to be performed by members of the Civil Defence Services (referred to in paragraph 5 of the last report) has been abandoned by the Ministry of Supply.

#### 6.—EXTENDED DUTIES:

Civil Defence personnel are to be invited and encouraged to volunteer to assist in the work of grave digging, either in their duty hours, by short-term release or on their off-duty days if not otherwise employed, if requests for such assistance are received by the Council from the Ministry of Labour.

#### 7.—CHARITIES:

The Committee has noted with great satisfaction that a sum of £431 has been raised as a result of an appeal and dance organised by the Wardens' Service in aid of St. Dunstan's. Certain of the wardens' districts have also "adopted" various naval craft, and the personnel at the Hendon Way Rescue Depot have "adopted" and sent gifts in cash, games, books and various comforts to an air-sea rescue unit of the R.A.F.

#### 8.—RESCUE SERVICE:

The personnel of the Rescue Service have assisted in the following works:-

Repairs to roof, "D" Ambulance Depot.

Lopping overhanging trees on allotments.

Alterations to shelters, Golders Green arches, and West Hendon.

Cutting steel joists for shelters.

Second garage at "A" Ambulance Depot now in hand again.

Extension to Wardens' Post D.23.

Coaling operations, Oakleigh Park Station, Barnet, for the L.N.E. Railway.

Assisting the L.M.S. Railway, Hendon, Heavy Goods Section.

Assistance to British Restaurants, Meals Service, N.F.S., W.V.S. and the Food Office.

Demolition of 192-194, Golders Green Road - completed.

Transport for the heavy section of the Rescue Service is being considerably improved by the replacement of the old lorries by converted ex-Army lorries.

## 9.—CIVIL DEFENCE AMBULANCE SERVICE:

A satisfactory report has been received following an inspection of the three ambulance depots by the Welfare Officer of the London Civil Defence Region on the 1st December, 1943.

Moderate progress is being made in connection with the preparation of the two houses in Golders Rise, which, when completed, will permit the release of accommodation at the Hendon County School now used for the purposes of an ambulance depot.

#### 10.—CORPORATION'S AMBULANCE SERVICE:

During the month of December 290 calls were made in respect of private cases and 58 in respect of street accidents and illnesses. Of these 348 cases, 36 were conveyed in Civil Defence ambulances.

The construction of additional garage accommodation for the two ambulances recently delivered is proceeding, and it is anticipated that the garage at Clitterhouse Farm Depot will be completed in the course of one week.

#### 11.—PROTECTION FOR WARDENS' POSTS:

In 1941 biast walls were erected to protect the doorways of a number of the Wardens' permanent posts. This expenditure became a local charge, as, although the Commissioners agreed that the extra wall would add to the protection of the posts, they considered that the lay-out of the standard type post provided an internal blast wall, and any addition thereto could not be approved in view of the vital need for economy.

Due to the exposed position of Post B.8, the Committee has considered a request from the personnel of this post for additional protection which was not provided in 1941, as the post abutted on a public footpath, and the wall would have constituted a danger to the public using the path. It is estimated that the bricking-up of the existing doorway, the cutting of a new door opening in the side wall of the post, and the provision of a blast wall which would not then foul the footpath, would cost a sum of £20, and the Committee

RECOMMENDED-That an expenditure of £20 on the work referred to be approved.

#### 12.-EMERGENCY FEEDING SCHEME:

The third revised edition of the Emergency Feeding Scheme for the Borough has been approved. The change-over of the emergency feeding stocks at the whole of the emergency feeding centres has now been completed. The Ministry of Food has approved an expenditure of £115 on the provision of lock-up stores for emergency food stocks at the five schools referred to in item 12 of the last report.

#### 13.—FIRE PREVENTION:

The Regional Commissioners have approved an additional expenditure of £31, which will enable a reconditioned steel drum for providing water for replenishing stirrup-pump buckets (as referred to in item 11 of the last report) to be made available for each of the 916 fire parties operating in the Borough. The distribution of these tanks has already commenced.

Three further cases in connection with failure to carry out fire prevention duties have been heard at the Hendon Court. Two of the defendants were fined 40s, each and the third £5, with the alternative, in default, of one month's imprisonment.

The Fire Guard plan has now been submitted to the Regional Commissioners for approval. Information as to the date on which the Regional Commissioners propose to carry out exercises to test the efficiency of the Fire Guard organisation in the operation of the plan is now awaited.

The Regional Commissioners have allocated five wheelbarrow pumps (petrol-driven pumping units capable of delivering 40 gallons of water per minute and mounted on a wheelbarrow frame) for use by street fire parties in the Borough. Conditions of the issue of these pumps include the enrolment of crews willing to undertake the manning

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ambuhe 1st of the pumps in addition to their normal fire-prevention duties. Proposals for siting the pumps have been submitted for the approval of the Regional Fire Prevention Officer. To provide a total water supply of 5,400 gallons for each unit, eighteen 300-gallon tanks are to be supplied in respect of each pump, which tanks will be spaced at not more than 200 ft. apart over the area covered by the pump. Proposals for the siting of the tanks are being submitted for the formal approval of the Regional Fire Prevention Officer.

During the months of November and December, 1943, the National Fire Service carried out an inspection of the lofts in 60 houses; in three instances it was found that the occupiers had not complied with the Clearance of Lofts Order.

The Committee has agreed to arrange for the inspection of fire prevention arrangements at premises in respect of which the Ministry of War Transport is the "appropriate authority" in the event of that Ministry finding it necessary to request the assistance of the Council.

Applications made by two occupiers of premises in the Borough for approval to their fire prevention arrangements have been considered and approved. The approval previously given to two schemes has been withdrawn to enable more efficient arrangements to be made by the inclusion of the premises concerned in the patrol of street fire parties.

At the request of the Ministry of Aircraft Production the Council has agreed to exercise the powers of the "appropriate authority" under the Fire Guard (Business and Government Premises) Order in respect of certain premises in Station Road, Edgware.

Since the main registration under the Fire Guard (Local Authorities Services) Order, 1943, took place on the 17th October, 1943, 592 males and 607 females have applied for registration. In all, 1,921 males and 1,117 females have been registered under the new Fire Guard Orders.

The authority previously given to the Chief Warden or his duly authorised representatives to give directions on behalf of the Council to compulsorily enrolled Fire Guards has now been extended to cover all persons, either voluntarily or compulsorily enrolled under the Fire Guard (Local Authorities Services) Order, 1943, and to cover the performance of such duties as are defined in that Order, including instruction, training and the taking part in exercises.

#### 14.—REHOUSING:

A revised scheme in connection with the rehousing of persons in the event of concentrated raiding has been approved. The Minister of Health has extended billeting powers to include the billeting of workmen engaged on war work whose names are notified by the Ministry of Labour and National Service.

#### 15.—AIR RAID SHELTERS:

Eleven of the glass panels fitted to the emergency opening devices of shelters in the Borough have been broken since January 1st. In eight instances repairs to frames were necessary, and two padlocks have been stolen. Difficulty in the obtaining of replacements to padlocks has caused several shelters to be left open and to get into a dirty condition. This matter is to receive special consideration at the next meeting of the Committee.

At the request of London Region, a further census of persons using the shelters was taken during a night at the end of December, 1943. On this occasion 12 people were found to be using the shelters, as compared with 10 on the previous occasion (September, 1943). There was no alert on either of the nights in question.

## 1. APPOINTMENT OF CHAIRMAN:

RESOLVED-That Alderman R. A. B. Teare, M.B.E., be appointed Chairman of the Sub-Committee for the ensuing year.

## 2. SECOND REPORT OF THE NURSES' SALARIES COMMITTEE:

## Health Visitors and Nursing Staff of War-Time Day Nurseries.

The Committee have considered a report from the Borough Treasurer as to the financial implications of the recommendations contained in the second report of the Nurses' Salaries Committee, which affect the classes of nurses mentioned in the report directly employed by the Council, viz., Health Visitors (occupying combined posts of Health Visitor, School Nurse and Child Protection Visitor) and Nursing Staff at War-Time Day Nurseries.

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#### (i)..... HEALTH VISITORS.

In Circular No. 2893 the Minister of Health commends the Nurses' Salaries Committee's recommendations to employing authorities for adoption, with effect from 1st April, 1943, which is the same date as that on which the recent recommendations relating to hospital nursing staff and midwives' salaries became operative.

The principal recommendations contained in the report relate to scales of salaries, holidays and post-certificate leave, and sick pay, and they are referred to in that order below. The following general considerations are, however, of importance:—

- (a) The Council is not bound to adopt the recommendations, in whole or in part, but the consequence of non-adoption would undoubtedly create staffing difficulties.
- (b) The scales of salaries are intended to be standard national scales, subject to the payment of additional allowances in London and the Metropolitan Police Area, and in Circular No. 2893 the Minister of Health indicates that he is in full agreement with both the Nurses Salaries Committee in strongly deprecating competition between different employing authorities.
- (c) Following upon adoption of the recommendations:-
  - (i) They will operate as from 1st April, 1943.
  - (ii) Health Visitors in the service of the Council at the date of the publication of the report (2.11.43) will have the option either of accepting the recommendations as a whole or of retaining their existing scale of salaries and conditions of service whilst they remain in their present grade.
  - (iii) Health Visitors appointed after the date of the report (2.11.43) or existing staff who are promoted to a higher grade will have the recommendations as a whole applied to them.
- (d) At paragraph 50 in the report of the Nurses' Salaries Committee it is recommended that the uniform be provided by the Local Authority, and shall be valued at £12 per annum for superannuation purposes. (Under present conditions a uniform allowance of £10 is made.)

#### 1. Scales of Salaries.

In Hendon those officers who are, for convenience, described as health visitors, actually occupy combined posts of health visitor, school nurse and child protection visitor, and in accordance with paragraph 45 of the report the holder of such a post is to be remunerated on the scale applicable to the highest paid of the combined posts held, provided the necessary qualifications are held. It is understood that all the health visitors employed by the Council hold the necessary qualifications applicable to the combined post. The following statement shows the number and grade of health visitors employed by the Council, and recommended scale and the existing scale:—

(The question has been raised as to the application of the new scale to five health visitors as superintendents of infant welfare centres under paragraph 35 and table III. of the report, and the Sub-Committee have directed that a ruling be obtained from the official Nurses' Salaries Committee as to the eligibility of the health visitors concerned to such recognition.)

The additional cost of putting the recommended scale of salaries into operation as from 1st April, 1943, based on the number of health visitors employed at present; their present scale of salary and current cost-of-living bonus; and a preliminary estimate of the past service of such health visitors which is to be taken into account for salary purposes, but excluding any increases which may be authorised after consideration of any representations made by the Medical Officer of Health, is approximately £530 in 1943-44, and this figure will increase to approximately £630 in 1952-53. Such additional cost will attract Government grant on the basis previously indicated.

#### 2. Holidays and Post-Certificate Leave.

The existing arrangements provide for 18 working days annual leave (which is equivalent to the three weeks recommended in the Report). Public holidays are not regarded as part of the annual leave. Leave of absence to attend courses of lectures, etc., has been granted on isolated occasions in the past, but any fees for such courses have been paid by the person concerned.

#### 3. Sick Pay.

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At the present time there are no fixed regulations as to sick pay, each case being considered on its merits. The practice is to pay full salary less any National Health Insurance benefits to which the employee is entitled. In the event of an extensive period of illness, the facts would be reported to the appropriate Committee.

#### (ii) NURSING STAFF AT WAR-TIME DAY NURSERIES.

The War-Time Day Nurseries administered by the Council through the Special War-Time Nurseries Committee are all non-residential, and (with the exception of the Hyde School Nursery) all train for the National Society of Children's Nurseries Diploma.

In the consideration of that part of the Report of the Nurses' Salaries Committee which relates to employees in such establishments, attention has been directed to London Region Circular 96 (with its accompanying memorandum), in which, by direction of the Minister of Health, the Senior Regional Officer states that the revised salary scale should be applied to all grades in the War-Time Nursery Service.

When the new salaries are in force the Senior Regional Officer should be informed, for each nursery, of (a) the total cost of the necessary salary adjustment from 1st April, 1943, to date, and (b) the estimated annual increase in running costs.

The following are the revised salary scales to be applied to the staffs of the war-time nurseries, except in respect of the matron at the Hyde School Nursery, who is a teacher paid on the Burnham Scale:—

#### 4. Holidays.

Matrons, deputy matrons and wardens shall be given up to three weeks' holiday, with pay, in addition to public holidays. Other staff shall be allowed 14 days' holiday, with pay, in addition to the public holidays. During annual holidays an allowance of 15s, a week may be paid to resident staff in war-time nurseries and to probationers living away from home who are given board and lodging.

#### 5. Sick Pay.

During sickness staff employed in nurseries shall receive, in any period of twelve months, sick pay for at least the periods shown below, subject in the case of compulsory contributors to deduction of any statutory sickness or disablement benefit payable under the National Health Insurance Acts:-

One month's full pay and (after four months' service) During the first year two months' half-pay.

Two months' full pay and two months' half pay, During second year

Three months' full pay and three months' half pay. During third year and thereafter .....

These periods are minima. When an employing authority wishes to extend them in individual cases, e.g., in accordance with a scheme which is applicable to their other staffs, the S.R.O. should be consulted.

Staff in day nurseries who are required to be resident will receive an allowance of 15s. a week during periods of sick leave on full pay and 7s. 6d. a week during periods of sick leave on half-pay, except where the absence is for less than a continuous week, in which case the allowance will not be payable.

Non-resident staff will not receive any additional allowance during sick leave; they would draw their inclusive salaries during sick leave on full pay, and half those salaries during sick leave on half pay.

#### 3. COUNCIL AND STAFF JOINT COMMITTEE-PROPOSED CONSTITUTION:

A letter was submitted from the National Association of Local Government Officers (Hendon Branch) referring to their application, approved by the Council (F. & G.P.C. 21.6.43-6), for the setting up of a Council and Staff Joint Committee, and enclosing for consideration by the Council a copy of the proposed constitution, rules and regulations which have been approved by the Branch Executive.

The proposed constitution, rules and regulations follows closely that set out in the Middlesex Whitley Council Scheme, and the Association expresses the hope that it will be approved and adopted by the Council.

The proposed constitution, rules and regulations as amended by the Sub-Committee are set out in the Appendix to this report, and it is now

RECOMMENDED-That the scheme for the "Council and Staff Joint Committee" be approved and adopted.

## 4. LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUPERANNUATION ACT, 1937:

#### (A) Scheme.

The Borough Treasurer submitted a general report with regard to the application of the scheme under the Act of 1937. Contributory employees under the scheme are divided into two classes, "officers" and "servants," and the definition of each class is contained in the Act. All whole-time officers (other than temporary officers) are automatically entitled to participate in the scheme, but servants are only to participate if they belong to a class or description which the authority have by a statutory resolution specified as a class or description, the members of or persons falling within which are to be contributory employees.

The 1937 Act defines a "servant" as being an employee who is not an "officer," and an "officer" is defined as follows:—

- "Officer means an employee as to whom either of the following conditions is satisfied, that is to say:
- (a) that his duties are wholly or mainly administrative, professional or clerical; or
- (b) that his remuneration is at a rate greater than £250 per annum, and that he is not an employed contributor within the meaning of the National Health Insurance Act, 1936."

With regard to "servants," the employees of this class to be brought within the scheme are defined in the following statutory resolution passed by the Council in March, 1939:—

"That all persons falling within the following classifications shall become contributory employees:

Class A shall consist of-

Employees to whom on the 31st March, 1939, the Local Government and Other Officers' Superannuation Act, 1922, applied, and such other employees as satisfy all of the following conditions:—

- (a) Age not to exceed 40 years on the 31st December in the year preceding that in which he is brought into Class A.
- (b) Continuous employment with the Council for not less than two consecutive years, or who transfer from the service of another local authority in such circumstances as will call for the payment of a transfer value to this Council.
- (c) Have been passed medically fit after examination by the Council's medical staff.
- (d) Have by specific resolution of the Council been transferred to Class A.

Class B shall consist of-

Employees who satisfy all of the following conditions:-

- (a) Whose appointments have been made in the terms of an advertisement inviting applications in which it was stipulated that the person appointed would be required to contribute to the Superannuation Fund.
- (b) Have been passed medically fit after examination by the Council's medical staff.
- (c) Have by specific resolution of the Council been included in Class B."

In pursuance of the statutory resolution referred to, departmental chief officers should, from time to time and in the usual manner, submit recommendations as to the transfer of employees to Class A, and so bring them within the superann uation scheme, and, in fact, 67 were so transferred up to June, 1939, when, owing to the incidence of war, it was considered that anomalies and inequalities would be created if some employees were not dealt with because they were absent on war service, and others were dealt with because, for the time being, they were still in the employment of the Council, but who might subsequently be called up for war service. It is probable that when further lists are considered after the war some relaxation of the conditions applicable to Class A servants may have to be allowed, in order that the position of certain employees shall not be prejudiced.

#### (B) Temporary Officers.

The position with regard to temporary officers under the scheme referred to at (A) above is that if their appointments are for a definite period of two years or less, and they have not previously been subject to the Local Government and Other Officers' Superannuation Act, 1922, or the Poor Law Officers' Superannuation Act, 1896, they are not entitled to participate in the scheme until they have completed two years' service. With a view to securing that no temporary officer should be appointed for a period of more than two years in the first instance, the following resolution was passed by the Council in February, 1939:—

"That in order to safeguard the Superannuation Fund, the following conditions be applied to such temporary officers as can by reason of age or service qualify for a superannuation allowance in accordance with the Local Government Superannuation Act, 1937:—

No temporary whole-time officer shall be:-

- (a) Engaged until such officer has submitted full details of any previous local government service and passed a medical examination by the Council's Medical Officer.
- (b) Engaged, without the express approval of the Finance and General Purposes Committee, if the contemplated period of such officer's employment by the Council when added to such officer's previous local government service exceeds ten years.

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classes, whole-time neme, but y have by ng within (c) Continued, without the express approval of the Finance and General Purposes Committee, in employment in a temporary capacity after the total period of such officer's local government service has reached ten years, or the period of employment in the service of the Council has continued for a period of two years, whichever first occurs."

By the operation of this resolution no temporary officer who is not otherwise qualified is brought into the scheme until the expiration of two years' service. It will be appreciated that war conditions have involved the appointment of many temporary officers in the service of the Council, and this fact, coupled with the provisions contained in certain Acts as to protection of superannuation rights whilst on war service, and reinstatement in former employment upon return from such service, has placed the superannuation scheme, so far as temporary officers are concerned, in a position it was not designed to meet. The effect of this will be reflected in the post-war valuation of the Fund, but at present it cannot be gauged.

In this connection, the Borough Treasurer reported on the financial effect on the superannuation fund of the engagement of temporary officers who have previous local government service, and, in order that the liability in respect of any such service may be determined before the appointment of any temporary officer concerned, the Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND—That the attention of all departments be directed to the Council's resolution of February, 1939, and requested to ensure that when making any temporary appointment, full particulars of the past local government service be obtained and submitted to the Borough Treasurer for prior investigation.

#### (C) Re-employment of Employees placed on Pension.

The Sub-Committee have considered a report on questions arising out of the re-employment of employees, which has become a desirable practice owing to staffing difficulties during the present hostilities. At the present time five employees are concerned, and are paid their normal remuneration, leaving their pension rights in abeyance. Two pensioners have been re-engaged.

In order that the rights of an employee who has become entitled to superannuation shall not be prejudiced as respects the surrender of a portion of the superannuation allowance to secure a pension to his spouse, the Sub-Committee are of opinion that such an employee, upon qualification, should be granted his allowances and re-engaged. They accordingly,

RECOMMEND—That where an employee becomes entitled to a superannuation allowance under Part I. of the Local Government Superannuation Act, 1937, otherwise than by reason of ill-health, he may surrender a portion of such allowance, in accordance with the rules made under Section 9 of the Act to secure the payment of a pension to his spouse, and the Corporation shall re-engage such employee forthwith at a remuneration which, together with the allowance receivable by him, shall equal the scale of the remuneration (including bonus, if any) which he was receiving when he became entitled to such superannuation allowance, provided that in the case of an employee attaining the age for compulsory retirement the provisions of Section 7 of the said Act shall apply.

#### 5. LOCAL GOVERNMENT STAFFS (WAR SERVICE) ACT, 1939:

#### (A) Service in Mines.

The Committee have considered the question in two cases of the recognition of service in the mines for the purposes of superannuation and the existing resolutions as to supplementation of war service pay. In one case the employee is serving in H.M. Forces, and enquires as to his position if he volunteers for employment in the mines; whilst in the second case the employee has volunteered for such service, and has been released from H.M. Forces for that purpose.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That service in the mines be recognised as war services for the purposes of the Local Government Staffs (War Service) Act, 1939, and that any necessary consents of the Minister of Health be obtained to such recognition.
- (2) That the Council's resolutions as to the supplementation of war service pay be deemed to apply to workers in the mines.

#### (B) Mr. F. E. Griffiths.

In view of the fact that the above officer has been called up for service in H.M. Forces, the question has arisen as to the calculation of war service pay. Mr. Griffiths is a member of the permanent staff of the Education Department and occupied the position of youth organisations officer. As from the 1st January, 1941, he was seconded to the Rehousing Department and transferred from Grade C.2, at £340 per annum, to Grade B, at £360 per annum, rising by annual increments of £20 to £440 per annum, and such transfer was to operate during such time as he was seconded to his

new duties as senior billeting officer. The question to be determined, therefore, is whether Mr. Griffiths' "civil pay" is to be taken at £340 per annum (the salary he was receiving before being seconded to Rehousing) or £400 (the salary he was receiving immediately before he was called up). The Sub-Committee are of opinion that the basis of calculation should be the rate payable in respect of his permanent staff appointment, viz., £340, and they

RECOMMEND accordingly.

## (C) Marriage of Female Staff whilst in H.M. Forces.

The Borough Treasurer reported with regard to the question of the marriage of members of the female staff whilst in the service of H.M. Forces, in relation to the supplementation of war service pay.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That members of the female staff be informed that in the event of their marriage whilst in H.M. Forces they must advise the Council of the fact, and upon such notification the Council do continue the payment of civil pay then being made, less war service pay, and marriage, family and other similar allowances from all sources.

#### 6. SICK PAY - EMPLOYEES DISCHARGED FROM H.M. FORCES:

The Borough Treasurer asks for directions as to the payment of sick pay in cases where an employee is discharged from H.M. Forces, and is unable immediately to resume his former employment owing to ill-health.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That payment of sick pay be made within the limits of the appropriate regulations, subject to examination by the Medical Officer of Health.

#### 7. RE-GRADING:

Consideration has been given to an application from Mr. A. E. Harding, Principal Assistant to the Town Clerk, for reconsideration of salary scale, together with a report from the Town Clerk thereon. The Sub-Committee have unanimously

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the scale of salary of the Principal Assistant to the Town Clerk be extended to a maximum of £900 per annum, and that on and from the 1st April, 1944, the salary of Mr. A. E. Harding be increased by annual increments of £50 to such maximum.

#### 8. BRITISH RESTAURANTS—HEAD COOKS:

It was reported by the Borough Treasurer that in April, 1943, it was decided that where there are two or more assistant cooks, the head cook be paid an additional 5s. per week to the existing basic rate. The Chief Officer, Meals Service, states that it has been found to be more satisfactory to base the payment of the additional 5s. per week on the number of meals served rather than on the number of assistant cooks employed. He suggests that the payment be made when the daily average number of meals sold reaches or exceeds 400.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the above suggestion be approved, and that any resolutions of the Council inconsistent therewith be varied accordingly.

#### APPENDIX.

## COUNCIL AND STAFF JOINT COMMITTEE: PROPOSED CONSTITUTION, RULES AND REGULATIONS.

#### Constitution.

#### 1. TITLE:

The Committee shall be called the "Hendon Borough Council and Staff Joint Committee," hereinafter called the "Joint Committee."

#### 2. CONSTITUTION:

The Joint Committee shall be composed of five Members of the Hendon Borough Council, to be appointed annually by the Finance and General Purposes Committee at their first monthly meeting after the Annual Council Meeting, and five officers of the Council, to be appointed by the members of the official staff within 21 days of the aforesaid meeting. The members thereof shall retire annually on the eighth day of November, and shall be eligible for reappointment. In the event of a member of the Joint Committee ceasing to be a member or officer of the Council, he shall thereupon cease to be a member of the Joint Committee, and such vacancy, together with any vacancies caused by death, resignation or other disqualification, shall be filled by the Finance and General Purposes Committee or the officers (as the case may be).

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#### 8. CHAIRMAN:

A Chairman and Vice-Chairman shall be appointed by the Joint Committee at their first meeting in each year. When the Chairman is elected from one side of the Joint Committee the Vice-Chairman shall be elected from the other. The Chairman of any meeting shall not have a casting vote.

#### 4. OBJECTS:

The objects of the Joint Committee shall be:-

- (i) The establishment of regular methods of negotiation on questions arising in respect of matters relating to the service between the Council and their officers or between officers with a view to the prevention of differences and to their better adjustment when they appear.
- (ii) To secure the largest possible measure of joint action between the Council and officers for the encouragement of the study of methods of administration, with a view to improving the service rendered by officers of local authorities.
- (iii) To consider all matters affecting the mutual interests of the Council, and the administrative, technical, professional and clerical staffs of the Council, and to make recommendations thereon to the Finance and General Purposes Committee through the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee, provided always that the question of discipline, promotion or efficiency of a personal nature shall be within the purview of the Joint Committee.
- (iv) To arrange for the officers to have a responsibility for the determination and observance of the conditions under which their duties are carried out.
- (v) To consider the general principles governing conditions of service, e.g., recruitment, hours, tenure and remuneration.
- (vi) To encourage the further education of the staff and their training in higher administration and organisation.
- (vii) To provide facilities for the full consideration and utilisation of experience and ideas of the staff, and of inventions and improvements in methods of machinery operating to the advantage of the local government services; and to consider claims of any persons concerned to obtain an equitable share of the benefits arising therefrom.

#### Rules and Regulations.

- 1. The Joint Committee shall meet as and when required. The Joint Committee shall, in any event, be summoned on a requisition delivered to the Town Clerk signed, by the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Joint Committee and two other members. The matters to be discussed at any meeting of the Joint Committee shall be stated upon the notice summoning the meeting.
  - 2. The quorum of the Joint Committee shall be three representatives of each side.
- 3. No resolution shall be regarded as carried unless it has been approved by a majority of the members present on each side of the Joint Committee, and in the event of the Joint Committee being unable to arrive at an agreement, it shall take the directions of the Finance and General Purposes Committee on the matter.
- 4. The Council shall afford the necessary facilities for the staff representatives to attend the meetings.
- 5. The proceedings of any meetings of the Joint Committee shall be reported to the Finance and General Purposes Committee through the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee in concise form, but before submission of the report it shall be signed by the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Joint Committee
- 6. The Joint Committee shall have power, from time to time, to call into conference any officer, or to invite any member of the Council or other persons by agreement in an advisory capacity to assist the Joint Committee.
- 7. In the event of the Finance and General Purposes Committee disagreeing with recommendations of the Joint Committee, such recommendations shall be referred to the Council for directions, with an intimation of the Finance and General Purposes Committee's reasons for disagreement, and with a view to reference back to the Joint Committee, if necessary.

In connection with Item 2 of the report, the Committee has considered a report by the Borough Treasurer to the effect that a reply had now been received from the Secretary of the Nurses' Salaries Committee stating that, in his opinion, the Senior Health Visitor at the five permanent health centres would, under the Committee's recommendation, be properly regarded and paid as superintendents of infant welfare

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centres. In these circumstances, it is suggested that the under-mentioned health visitors be regarded as superintendents of infant welfare centres, and paid an additional sum of £20 per annum, on the understanding that the selection of these health visitors at the present time shall not prejudice the position of those health visitors now on war service when they return to the service of the Council, and that such additional payment shall only be made during such time as those concerned are performing the duties by virtue of which they are regarded as superintendents of infant welfare centres:-

Miss Wharton,

Miss P. Trickett,

Miss Atkinson,

Miss M. Trickett.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the above suggestion be approved, and that the report of the Sub-Committee be otherwise approved and adopted.

## 7.—LAND, NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD—LEASE TO HALES CLINKERS, LTD.:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the solicitors for Hales Clinkers, Ltd., relating to the proposed renewal of the sub-leases granted by Hales Clinkers, Ltd. In view of the terms of the head lease, that consent to sub-leases shall not unreasonably be withheld, the solicitors have been informed that the Council will raise no objection to the sub-leases now in existence being renewed, provided that the covenants and conditions of the lease are duly performed and observed.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken be approved.

### 8.—BRENT HILL FARM—LEASE TO W. J. SMITH, LTD.:

The Town Clerk reported that W. J. Smith, Ltd., had made a request that the term of the lease be extended for 21 years or the duration of the war, whichever should be the shorter period. Negotiations have taken place in conjunction with the Borough Treasurer and the Borough Surveyor, and it is suggested that the proposed extended terms should be for seven years or the cessation of hostilities with Germany, whichever should be the shorter period, with a proviso that the lease shall not be determined earlier than the 29th September, 1945. The rent payable is £115 per annum.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the above suggestion be approved.

## 9.—POST - WAR PLANNING—ELECTRICITY SUPPPLY SERVICE:

The Committee duly noted the following report submitted by the Town Clerk:-

#### POST WAR PLANNING.

#### ELECTRICITY SUPPLY SERVICES.

## (A) London and Home Countles Joint Electricity Authority.

In 1943 (F. & G.P.C. 12.4.43) attention was drawn to the report of the Electricity Authority, containing a scheme which, in the opinion of the Authority, is the next step in the more complete, organisation and development of the electricity supply service in London and Home Counties Electri-

The scheme "aims at removing without delay the barriers in the way of the simplification of organisation and administration which have hitherto prevented the electricity supply service from taking its natural place in the social and industrial structure. Most of the difficulties are artificial-some created and encouraged by statutory commissions and omissions, others due to the industry being regarded as a profitable investment rather than as a public service. Such barriers ought not to be tolerated to-day, whatever their justification may have been in the past. scheme seeks to remove once and for all the opposing interests of public and private ownership by bringing the industry completely under public ownership, and entirely away from the sphere of speculative finance. The scheme further suggests the type of public body fitted at once to own and administer an undertaking of the nature and magnitude suggested, at the same time retaining a public representative character which the Authority considers is an essential and proper feature of public service in this country."

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Provision is made in the scheme for a reconstituted Board, to be known as the London Electricity Board, consisting of a reasonable number of representatives of Local Authorities, and other persons employed in connection with electricity supplies.

By paragraph 4 (1) of the scheme the specified undertakings, including the Northmet Power Company (part), would be transferred to and vested in the Board as from the 1st January, 1945, but it is urged, in the report, that the transfer should, if practicable, take place before the termination of the war, so as to enable an improved organisation to line up as a single concentrated organisation, and take its part as an essential feature of national planning. As consideration for the transfer, the Board propose to issue to the authorised undertakers electricity stock of a sum equal to the capital properly expended.

Every right under existing Acts, Orders or Agreements vested in any Local Authority to purchase the whole or any part of an undertaking is to be transferred to and vested in the Board (para. 4 (2)). It was to this aspect of the scheme that special attention was directed as most affecting the Council's interests.

The report of the London and Home Counties Joint Electricity Authority is still before the Minister of Fuel and Power, the Minister of Reconstruction and the Electricity Commissioners, but at date no progress appears to have been made in its consideration.

#### (B) Incorporated Association of Electric Power Companies.

The report of this Association, dated 24.11.43, is submitted "inter alia, to encourage, expedite and facilitate the development of the industry of supplying electrical energy for power, light and other purposes."

This Association is composed of 19 members (including the Northmet Power Company), with whom are associated five other companies, and their interests cover a very large part of the country. The aspect of their recommendations which most concerns the Council relates to purchase rights, viz.,

"That, as an initial step, legislation should be passed at or before the termination of the war, to suspend the exercise of the rights of purchase by Local Authorities and other bodies of any electricity undertaking, and to cancel any notices of purchase already given but which have not been exercised, but that such suspension and cancellation should not prevent the carrying out and completion of negotiations for the voluntary acquisition or amalgamation of such undertakings.

"As mentioned in paragraph 39 hereof, the report of the McGowan Committee states that the essential features of any scheme for the improvement of electricity distribution must include the prevention of the splitting up of comprehensive undertakings in consequence of the exercise of rights of purchase by individual local authorities."

The Association go on to suggest that the Electricity Commissioners should appoint a Scheme Committee for each electricity district, whose duty it would be, with a prescribed period to prepare and submit to the Commissioners a draft scheme for the improvement of electricity distribution in each district, in accordance with the views and recommendations of the McGowan Committee, as shown below (para. 39 of the Association's report):

["39 — (A) We are in general agreement with the views and recommendations expressed in parts of paragraph 471 of the report of the McGowan Committee, thus:—

- (i) An improvement can and should be effected in the present organisation, with its numerous undertakings, the widespread duplication of powers, the liability to further disintegration by the exercise of individual local authority purchase rights and the many and varied systems and voltages of supply and tariffs in operation.
- (ii) The essential features of any scheme of reorganisation must be:-
  - (a) A substantial reduction in the present number of undertakings by the substitution where appropriate of larger and more economic units;
  - (b) the prevention of the splitting up of comprehensive undertakings in consequence of the exercise of rights of purchase by individual local authorities;
  - (c) the elimination of duplicate powers wherever they exist in the same area.
- (iii) Adequate grounds do not exist for an immediate and complete reorganisation on a regional basis under public control, by the setting up of regional boards which would buy out all existing undertakings.
- (iv) Reorganisation should be based on the retention and utilisation, where possible, of the larger and more efficient of the existing undertakings, and the absorption by such undertakings of the smaller or less efficient undertakings.
- (v) Any attempt to carry through a scheme of reorganisation on a voluntary basis is bound to fail, and legislation must confer definite and adequate compulsory powers."]

The London and Home Counties Joint Electricity Authority, in commenting on the above proposal of the Association, point our that the Association does not apparently support their suggestion that appropriate public authorities should be established on such a basis as would enable the purchase rights to be exercised, as contemplated by Parliament, so as to avoid the splitting up of comprehensive undertakings.

The Association contemplate that the larger undertakings should be permitted, under a district scheme, to acquire the smaller undertakings, on terms, so far as company undertakings are concerned on the ordinary commercial basis of assets plus profits, or by the purchase of ordinary share capital; and as respects local authority on terms which would not exclude a sum for loss of profits. In this connection, the London and Home Counties Joint Electricity Authority observe that "while retained company undertakers, in acquiring other undertakings, compensate company owners for loss of profits in respect of the expiring tenure, and a municipality in respect of the limited amount which may be taken by a municipality from the revenue of its undertaking for the relief of rates, the tenure of such retained company undertakers, together with those acquired, shall be extended to a period of not less than fifty years, thereby automatically and immediately increasing the value on the market of the combined undertaking to a very considerable extent. Any subsequent scheme for the transfer of such an enlarged consolidated undertaking to a public authority would involve the payment of a very largely increased goodwill value. No safeguard against this result seems to have been provided in the Association's memorandum. It is clear that, like the Authority, the companies agree that existing difficulties can best be overcome by an amalgamation of undertakings; they do not agree as to the methods to be adopted to bring about the amalgamations."

#### (C) Hendon Electricity Supplies.

The following is a brief review of the devolution of the electricity supplies in the Borough:-

The original "Hendon Electric Lighting Order, 1899" (13th July, 1899), made by the Board of Trade under the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888 (confirmed by the Electric Lighting Orders Confirmation (No. 19) Act, 1899), authorised Messrs. Bauer & Schramm, trading as the Electrical and General Engineering Company, to supply electrical energy within the Urban District of Hendon, with power to sell to the Urban District Council the undertaking thereby authorised.

Clause 59 of the Order provided that the Council might within a period of six months . . require the undertakers to sell . . . upon the terms of the payment of such sum . . . as the estimated cost of obtaining this Order.

By the Indenture of the 11th September, 1899, between the Council and J. A. Bauer and L. E. Schramm, the undertaking was transferred to the Council in consideration of the sum of £150.

By the "Hendon Electric Lighting Order, 1899, Amendment Order 1903" (30th June, 1903), confirmed by the Electric Lighting Orders Confirmation (No. 6) Act, 1903, the Council were authorised, with the consent of and upon the terms approved by the Board of Trade, to transfer the undertaking to Crompton & Co., Ltd.

An Indenture of the 6th June, 1904, made between the Council and Crompton & Co., Ltd. (with the approval of the Board of Trade), transferred the undertaking to Crompton & Co., Ltd. This Indenture was made determinable at the expiration of 10, 15, 22, 29 and 42 years from the date of transfer, and thereafter at any recurring period of ten years, by not less than twelve calendar months' notice. Clause 4 provides as follows:—

(f) If the transfer shall be determined at the expiration of a term of 42 years (6th June, 1946), or at any recurring period of ten years thereafter, the Council shall pay to the Company the then value of the lands, buildings, works, machinery, plant and materials suitable to and used by the Company for the purposes of the undertaking, without the addition of any sum in respect of goodwill, profits or other consideration whatsoever, and the same shall be duly assured or transferred by the Company to the Council accordingly.

By the "Hendon Electric Lighting (Amendment) Order 1908," confirmed by the Electric Lighting Orders Confirmation (No. 3) Act, 1908, Crompton & Co., Ltd., were authorised to transfer the undertaking to the Hendon Electric Supply Company, Ltd., upon such terms and conditions as may be approved by the Board of Trade.

By the Indenture dated the 28th July, 1909, Crompton & Co., Ltd., transferred the undertaking to the Hendon Electric Supply Company, Ltd., subject to the provisions and conditions contained in the Indenture of the 6th June, 1904.

The North Metropolitan Electric Power Supply Act, 1939, transfers the Hendon Electric Supply Company to the Northmet Power Company, but by Section 25 of the Act "saving purchase rights of the Hendon Corporation," the Council's purchase rights are preserved.

It will be noted that reports at (A) and (B) above contemplate the ultimate loss of purchase right by the Council.

The present time does not appear appropriate for any action to be taken, but a close watch will be kept on any proposed legislative action which may affect the Corporation's interests.

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## 10.—EDUCATION BILL (LOCAL ADMINISTRATION):

The Town Clerk shmitted a report dealing with the provisions of the above Bill, on the conference of the Middlesex Part III. Education Authorities, and the amendments which it is hoped to secure.

## 11.—PARLIAMENTARY ELECTORS (WAR-TIME REGISTRATION) ACT, 1943:

The Town Clerk reported that the provisions of this Act, in so far as they directly concern the Council, are contained in Section 13, which by Sub-Section 1 applies the existing law under the Representation of the People Act, 1918, and makes the Clerk of the County Council the Registration Officer. Under Sub-Section 2 of the same Section the Town Clerk of a Borough is designated the "proper officer," and it is the duty of the Council to provide him with such staff as he may require for the discharge of his duties under the Act and national registration regulations made by virtue thereof.

By Section 13 (4) the Registration Officer may, if he so desires, require all or any of his functions to be performed through the "proper officer," and it is the duty of that "proper officer" to perform such functions in relation to his Borough.

By letter dated the 3rd January, the Clerk of the County Council, in his capacity as registration officer, gives notice to the Council that he desires the functions imposed on him by the Act in relation to the Borough of Hendon to be performed by the "proper officer" of the Town Council. So far as the provision of staff is concerned, satisfactory arrangements have been made for the employment of officers in their own time.

It was reported that 113 members of the staff had been absent owing to illness since the last meeting, and that 25 members of the staff are still absent, including six members previously reported.

#### 36.—RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT, 1919—DELEGATION OF FUNCTIONS TO BOROUGH AND DISTRICT COUNCILS:

The Town Clerk reported on a letter from the Middlesex County Council, intimating that the Councils of all the Boroughs and districts in the County have accepted the principle of delegation as proposed by the County Council in its resolution of the 28th October last, and that it is felt that the most appropriate date for formal delegation would be the 1st April. The Minister of Food, acting through his Director of Infestation Control, is understood, however, to be most anxious to commence operations in the various Boroughs and Urban Districts under the Infestation Order, 1943, and, apart from certain surveys which he has required, has withheld the issue of instructions to Borough and Urban District Councils because of the County Council's proposed delegation under the 1919 Act. The County Council is informed that he desires those authorities to be in a position to take action earlier than the 1st April next, particularly in regard to the right of entry on land and the serving of notices on occupiers, and that he intends, in accordance with his powers under the Infestation Order, to give further directions to the Borough and District Councils to commence operations as from the 1st February. The administrative difficulties involved by fixing a date for formal delegation earlier than the 1st April next are appreciated by the Director of Infestation Control, and accordingly he has asked the County Council to consider making arrangements with the several Borough and District Councils to act during the preceding two months on the County Council's behalf in their respective In view of the terms of the letter from the Infestation Branch of the Ministry of Food of the 18th August last sent to all local authorities in the County, on the question of reimbursement of local authorities' excess expenditure, the whole of a Borough or District Council's net expenditure in respect of such temporary arrangements during the two months in question will be refunded by the Ministry. In these circumstances, the County Council propose to formally delegate their powers and duties under the Act to the several Borough and District Councils, with effect from the 1st April next, but that, pending such formal delegation, the local Councils be asked to act in their respective districts as from the 1st February on behalf of the County Council as the statutory local authority, on the understanding that they will do so free of all cost to themselves, the Ministry of Food making full reimbursement of their net expenditure, except, of course, as respects their statutory liability as occupiers of property. The County Council desire to know as early as possible whether these arrangements are acceptable to the Council, in order that the necessary authority to act for the County Council may be issued.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

(1) That the Council accept delegation of the County Council's powers under the Act of 1919, as from the 1st April, 1944.

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(2) That, pending formal delegation of such powers, the Council act on behalf of the County Council as the statutory authority as from the 1st February, 1944, on the conditions above indicated.

#### 37.-TOWN HALL LETTINGS:

The Committee considered applications addressed to His Worship the Mayor for the use of rooms in the Town Hall from the Hendon Chamber of Commerce, for monthly meetings, from Mr. J. H. B. #### 40.—POST-WAR HOUSING—FINANCE:

The Committee duly **noted** a letter from the Blaydon Urban District Council, with the following resolution:—

"That, as we believe that local autonomy is desirable in the matters of siting, number and types of houses, and further recognise that there cannot be local autonomy in these matters without financial responsibility, we are of the opinion that Local Authorities' Post - War Housing programme should be financed by Government borrowing on the lines of National Savings Certificates, the proceeds to be lent to Local Authorities at 1 per cent. interest, the balance of interest being recovered by taxation in the normal manner."

#### 41.—SERVICE PENSIONS:

The Committee considered a letter from the Town Clerk, Borough of Willesden, asking the Council to support the under-mentioned resolution. The matter has been considered by the Association of Municipal Corporations, who has stated that it cannot see its way to take any action on the question to wives and dependants, and has deferred consideration of the question of pensions to persons discharged from the Forces as medically unfit pending the introduction of legislation by H.M. Government:—

"That as a result of consideration given to the circumstances of the wives and dependants of certain Council staff and employees who lost their lives whilst on service with H.M. Forces or in the Merchant Navy, and of men passed as physically fit for service with the Forces but subsequently discharged without pension, and found to be unfit to return to their civilian duties, this Council places on record its profound dissatisfaction with the methods adopted by the Minister of Pensions, and calls upon H.M. Government so to amend the existing regulations, or their application, as to ensure that the pension awarded in such cases shall be more commensurate with the great sacrifices made by men and women in all branches of H.M. Forces, and in the Merchant Navy."

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council support the views of the Willesden Borough Council on the matter.

## 42.—SUNDAY ENTERTAINMENTS:

The Committee considered a letter from the Whitefield Urban District Council, intimating that it is much concerned at the activities of the Lord's Day Observance Society, a body which, by taking advantage of the statutes, has been able to (a) deprive the public and members of the Forces of the enjoyment of certain Sunday entertainments, (b) hamper the work of many deserving charitable organisations by preventing Sunday entertainments being given for the benefit of their funds.

The Whitefield Council is confident that the Lord's Day Observance Society does not, by its actions, express the feelings of the great majority of the community, and the Council consider that steps should be taken to induce Parliament to introduce the necessary legislation to remove the existing anomaly whereby the Society are in a position to prevent Sunday entertainments being given for the benefit of members of the Services, the public and the charities for which they are organised.

The Council is asked to support the foregoing view, and to approach the Member of Parliament and the Association of Municipal Corporations thereon.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council support the views of the White-field Urban District Council on the matter.

### VENTILATION OF KITCHENS:

It will be remembered that the Ministry of Food approved an expenditure of £1,256 to cover the provision of ventilating plant in six of the Council's British Restaurants, based on the tender of the Bradshaw Fan and Ventilating Company. Subsequently, on the Council's instructions, further tenders were invited for the installation of ventilating plant in seven British Restaurants. The following tenders were received:—

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### Example 1.5 | Example 2.5 | Example 3.5 
and the Council accepted, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Food, the lowest tender, viz., that of Benham & Sons, Ltd., amounting in all to £1,100 los.

It was pointed out that the tenders were not comparative, as in each case the contractor was at liberty to decide the best type of apparatus to use and the capacity of the plant the contractor considered it desirable to instal to prevent excessive condensation.

In view of the difference in the prices submitted, the Ministry of Food enquired as to reasons for the proposed acceptance of Messrs. Benham's tender, viz., whether it was because the tender was the least costly or because it was the most effective scheme. The tender of Messrs. Benham & Sons, Ltd., is based on a rate of air change of 25 per hour, as against 40 times per hour specified by the Bradshaw Fan and Ventilating Co., and the Ministry of Food point out that when relating the price of Messrs. Benham's tender with the rate of air change, the Council are virtually accepting the highest tender, and state that it cannot be agreed that 25 changes per hour is a good figure.

The Committee have given careful consideration to the points raised by the Ministry of Food, and in view of the desirability of obtaining a plant of the highest efficiency, and also of the urgency of the need for its installation, they

RECOMMEND—That the Council comply with the requirements of the Ministry of Food, and accept the tender of the Bradshaw Fan and Ventilating Company, Ltd., for the provision of ventilating plant in the seven British Restaurants, as follows:—

### Maternity and Child Welfare Act, 1918, and Education Act, 1921.

Income scale for the provision of additional nourishment and the reduction or remission of fees.

### 1. REFERENCE (P.H. & M.S., 22.11.43):

To consider and submit recommendations for the revision of the Income Scale for the provision of additional nourishment and the reduction or remission of fees under the Maternity and Child Welfare Act, 1918, and the Education Act, 1921.

### 2. REPORT:

The Maternity and Child Welfare Act of 1918 and the Education Act of 1921 conferred on Local Authorities powers to reduce or remit the contribution of parents for additional nourishment, or for any treatment which is being provided under these Acts, the purpose being to ensure that no family shall be reduced below a reasonable level of nutrition because of the need for treatment of another member of the family. The economic scale at present in operation was fixed in 1940, when the cost-of-living index figure stood at 177; it has now increased to 200, and such increase justifies the adjustment of the income scale to the present index figure.

The increase of employment and the higher wages paid has resulted in a decrease in the number of those seeking reduction or remission of fees, but, nevertheless, those whose financial circumstances bring them within the scale are in a more difficult position than previously, and in many instances they are the families of members of the Armed Forces.

The Sub-Committee have given careful consideration to the whole question in the light of existing circumstances, and in arriving at their recommendations for the revision of the scale at present in operation, regard has been had to the suggestion contained in the Board of Education administrative memorandum No. 483, that in administering income scales in relation to the remission of charges for school meals and milk, the first £1 of the mother's earnings from employment should be ignored, account only being taken of any excess over this figure, and this principle has been extended to apply to all fees covered by the scale, which has been made comprehensive by the inclusion of certain items which were previously dealt with under special scales.

Details of the existing schedule of fees, to which no amendments are recommended, together with the existing economic scale showing the revisions suggested by the Sub-Committee are set out hereunder:

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### V. School Medical Services-Post-War Development.

In accordance with the Committee's instructions, the Medical Officer of Health submitted proposals for the post-war development of the School Medical Services. The proposals envisage (a) the provision of a new health centre for the Edgware area; (b) the building of subsidiary centres, mainly for maternity and child welfare, to replace the arrangements now in operation under which sessions are held in church halls in certain districts; (c) the provision of subsidiary centres for the Westcroft Estate, and also where new housing estates of sufficient size are developed remote from existing centres.

Attention was also drawn to the Central Hendon Centre, which, whilst it is an adequate and well-planned centre, is constructed of temporary materials, and it may be necessary at some future date to consider the question of its re-erection with permanent materials.

These proposals are based on the assumption that no fundamental changes will occur as a result of the Government's proposals for the post-war development and/or reorganisation of the public health and medical services, in respect of which a White Paper is shortly to be issued, and the future reorganisation of local government,

With regard to day nurseries, the future policy regarding the care of children under five years of age has not yet been defined. It is, however, probable that the 2-5 year old age group will be admitted to nursery schools at the public elementary schools where there is a real demand. Assuming, however, that it is considered desirable to provide accommodation for a younger age group, this, in the opinion of the Medical Officer of Health, could most efficiently and economically be provided by the extension of existing health centres. It is pointed out that day nurseries have, in fact, been erected and other premises adapted for this purpose, but their future use will depend largely on the policy which may be adopted by the Government.

# 15.—FIRST YEAR HOUSING PROGRAMME—WENTWORTH HALL ESTATE:

The Council, on the recommendation of the Special (Post-War Development) Committee, approved of negotiations being entered into for the acquisition of 20 acres of land situate on the Wentworth Hall Estate, for the purpose of erecting 150 houses, as part of the first year's housing building programme, and the Minister of Health has indicated that he will be prepared to consider an application for confirmation of a compulsory purchase order under Section 74 of the Housing Act of 1936, if the Council should so decide. In view, however, of the present stage of negotiations, as reported by the Borough Engineer, consideration of the question of making a compulsory purchase order has been deferred.

The Housing Manager submitted a comprehensive report showing the number of applications for Council houses which have been received up to the present time; an analysis of the various types of houses which should be provided, based on a programme of 1,000 dwellings, together with certain suggestions as to construction and planning of houses incorporating special features, and as to the siting and lay-out of new housing estates. It is of interest to record that many of the special features proposed in the planning of new houses and the siting and lay-out of estates are based on the replies of a number of the Council's tenants to questionnaires which were sent out to selected tenants in order to obtain a fair cross-section of (i) different income groups, and (ii) different types of families ranging from the large family down to the aged couple.

It is pointed out that the number of houses that will require to be provided by the Council will depend to a great extent on the post-war industrial position of the Borough and the general planning and development as a whole.

The Committee have approved the Housing Manager's report, a copy of which is entered in the Committee's Minute Book, and have referred the report to the Special (Post-War Development) Committee.

An application was considered from Messrs, F. C. Green & Son, for consent to the continuance of the user of an existing restaurant situate on the corner of Oak Greve, which is included in a special residential zone of Hendon Planning Scheme No. 2. After consideration of the report of the Borough Engineer, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That consent be granted (Glause 54), and that the applicant be informed that the Council's decision is without prejudice to its rights under any future legislation regarding non-conforming users.

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# 19.—GENERAL SCHEME FOR THE REPAIR OF HOUSES, ETC.:

Ministry of Health Circular No. 287.

A letter dated 29th January, 1944, from the Ministry of Health was submitted, intimating that the limits of expenditure under the general scheme for the repair, conversion and completion of houses had been raised to £500 per house, or £400 per flat or similar tenement, and that the raising of these limits will apply not only to work to be carried out by Local Authorities, but also to work to be carried out by private owners under certificates of essentiality.

The Borough Engineer reported that since his last report certificates of essentiality had been granted in 57 cases, and in 45 cases certificates had been refused, as indicated in the list submitted to the Committee.

# RESOLVED-That the action taken by the Borough Engineer be confirmed.

# 20.—POST - WAR DEVELOPMENT:

The Committee have agreed, for the reasons indicated to them, to the submission of the report of the Borough Engineer on proposals for post-war development in relation to Buildings and Town Planning being deferred until after the report of Professor Abererombie to the Minister of Town and Country Planning on the Town Planning of the Greater London area is available to local authorities.

# 21.—TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING (INTERIM DEVELOPMENT) ACT, 1943:

Pursuant to the Committee's instructions, the Borough Engineer submitted the following report on the above-mentioned Act, and the Memoranda issued thereunder by the Ministry of Town and Country Planning:—

# Town and Country Planning (Interim Development) Act, 1943.

This Act became operative on the 22nd July, 1943, and has from that date enlarged in many respects the powers hitherto exercised under the Town and Country Planning Act, of 1932. The new Act relates solely to the "interim development period," that is, the period between the taking effect of a resolution to prepare a scheme and the date on which the scheme becomes operative.

It should be noted that the main powers relating to town planning exercised by Local Authorities still flow from the provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act of 1932. The main features of the new Act, so far as it affects Local Authorities, are as follows:—

- (i) As from the 22nd October, 1943 (i.e., three months after the passing of the Act), a resolution to prepare a scheme has been deemed to have taken effect in respect of all land in England and Wales which was not already the subject of an operative scheme or a resolution and interim control over such land has operated from that date.
- (ii) (a) Interim development decisions become enforceable in the interim period. This will apply as from the 22nd July in those areas already subject to an effective planning resolution, and as from the 22nd October in those areas referred to in (i) above.
  - (b) The powers of Local Authorities during the interim period are strengthened in a number of points.

Practically the whole of the Borough of Hendon is covered by two operative town planning schemes, viz., the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 1, operative date 29th August, 1936, and Hendon Planning Scheme No. 2, operative date 22nd July, 1939. In respect of the areas occupied by these schemes, the Committee has no interim development powers, as it exercises the powers of the operative schemes which have statutory force. The new Act, therefore, does not affect the work of the Committee in the administration of the two operative schemes referred to. It should, however, be noted that certain areas in the Borough were excluded from the schemes mentioned above. The principal excluded area consisted of the estate administered by the Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust, as the development of this estate was controlled by the Hampstead Garden Suburb Act of 1906. Other areas, consisting of land vested in the Crown and railway companies, and held by them for the purpose of their undertakings, were also excluded from the scheme.

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and that prejudice ng users, Under the new Act it may be necessary in the future for the Committee to consider the necessity of preparing a scheme for the area of land coming within the powers of the Hampstead Garden useful purpose would be served by such a scheme. The manner in which land owned by the Crowa and railway companies is to be dealt with from a planning point of view will probably be the subject of future instructions from the Ministry.

# Circular No. 2, issued by the Ministry of Town and Country Planning, 11th August, 1943,

The object of this Circular is to call the attention of Planning Authorities to the new legislation regarding interim development, to which I have already referred and which does not need further explanation. The Circular also points out that the preparation of local planning schemes must be primarily the responsibility of the appropriate Local Authorities normally acting together in suitable groups, but it is at the same time essential that these schemes should be viewed in the perspective of wider requirements, and the Minister's powers in relation to interim development applications have been increased for that purpose.

Many Local Authorities are already members of Joint Town Planning Committees, and are agreed upon the value of co-operation. The Minister is satisfied that an extension of joint action by Local Authorities will lead to more efficient planning, and has, therefore, arranged for a review to be made of those areas in which Authorities have not yet formed or joined such groups. He contemplates that existing groups shall be disturbed only if in the interests of good planning some rearrangement is essential.

The Committee will remember that Hendon is included in the North Middlesex Joint Town Planning Committee, and has two representatives on this Committee. The Joint Committee has in the past exercised all functions essential to the co-ordination of the schemes within its area. The North Middlesex Joint Town Planning Committee has requested Local Authorities to give their observations on the proposals contained in this Circular. I therefore recommend that the Joint Committee be informed that in the opinion of the Town Council it is desirable that the North Middlesex Joint Town Planning Committee should continue to operate in its present capacity as a co-ordinating and advisory body.

# Circular No. 3, issued by the Ministry of Town and Country Planning, 12th October, 1943.

This Circular explains the combined effect of the 1932 and 1943 Acts, and, in particular, emphasises the different procedure necessary in view of the fact that under the last Act all land is deemed to be the subject of a proposed town-planning scheme, and therefore interim development control has to be exercised. As already explained in this report, the Hendon Town Planning Committee exercises control under operative schemes, and it is not necessary to go into detail in respect of the various points dealt with in this Circular.

# Circular No. 5 issued by the Ministry of Town and Country Planning, 3rd November, 1843.

The object of this Circular is to deal with planning work during the war period. It sets out in detail the nature and amount of the planning work immediately essential to the effective administration of interim development control within the powers at present available. It is intended primarily for the guidance of Authorities who have not hitherto exercised planning control. Its main object is to enable Authorities exercising town-planning control for the first time to prepare outline plans for the guidance of future development, and particularly such development as may be expected to take place within the first few years after the war. The Circular deals in detail with the various matters which should form part of a town-planning scheme, and its principles do not differ materially from those adopted by the Committee when the Hendon schemes were under discussion.

# Circular No. 6, issued by the Ministry of Town and Country Planning, 3rd November, 1943.

This Circular deals with the employment of technical planning staff during wartime, and points out that the amount of planning work depends on the extent to which qualified technical assistance is available locally, or can be made available from elsewhere. It may be that no efficier with planning experience is at present employed, or in some areas, where planning has already started, the planning officer is now on war service. In a few areas the planning officer remains, and is engaged at least part-time on planning work. In the case of Local Authorities having to make wartime provision for the performance of its planning duties, the Minister points out that there are four possible methods available:—

- (a) The appointment of a planning officer.
- (b) The appointment of a planning consultant.
- (c) The part-time use of a planning officer lent by a neighbouring authority.
- (d) Temporary surveillance by a group of technical officers.

In the case of Hendon the Committee has available the services of myself as planning officer, and of Mr. Borrill, who acts as planning assistant. The Corporation also has sufficient architecand of the staff available to carry on with essential wartime work, and it may be anticipated that the technical staff will be largely augmented by the demobilisation of assistants at present serving with the Forces.

The Committee have noted the report of the Borough Engineer, and

# 1. REFERENCE:

To interview selected applicants for the post of municipal midwife, and to make the appointment.

### 2. REPORT:

The Sub-Committee interviewed four selected candidates, and appointed Mrs. A. L. Dyer, of Hillingdon, Middlesex, as municipal midwife, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the appointment as set out in the advertisement. In the event of Mrs. Dyer failing to take up the appointment, the Sub-Committee decided to offer the post to Miss D. Twiddy, of Hampstead, N.W. 6.

# 27.—POST-CERTIFICATE LECTURES TO MIDWIVES:

A letter was submitted from the London County Council stating that it is proposed to arrange a course of post-certificate lectures for midwives, to commence during the month of April next. The lectures will be open to midwives residing or practising within the areas supervised by the London, Middlesex and Surrey County Councils; Ealing, Edmonton, Hendon, Heston and Isleworth, Tottenham, Twickenham, Willesden and Wimbledon Borough Councils, and the Enfield and Harrow Urban District Councils. It is proposed that the fee shall be 2s. for the complete series of lectures, and that any deficit on the courses shall be shared by the participating authorities on the basis of user.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Council participate in the scheme on the conditions indicated, and that arrangements be made for all the Council's midwives to attend the lectures.

28.—HOME HELPS:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted a report with suggestions for the revision of the Council's scheme for the provision of "home helps," under the powers conferred by the Maternity and Child Welfare Act. There are at the present time 14 home helps on the approved panel, one employed full time at the rate of £3 10s, per week, and who is available for duty in any part of the Borough, and 13 casual workers who undertake cases as and when their domestic commitments permit.

The total number of cases which have so far been dealt with under this scheme is 224, 174 having been completed and 50 pending. The supply of home helps is, however, not proving sufficient to meet the demands, particularly if the service is extended, as the Medical Officer of Health considers it should be, to provide also for domiciliary midwifery not undertaken under the Council's scheme.

The Ministry of Labour and National Service has agreed that work as a home help under the child welfare scheme of a Local Authority should be regarded as work of national importance, and his local officers, in interviewing women, will regard this work as suitable for women over 40 years of age, and will encourage them to take it up where there is a need for their services. The Ministry has therefore been asked to submit the names of women who are willing to undertake this work.

The Medical Officer of Health is of opinion that the number of full-time home helps should be increased, on the understanding that when they are not fully occupied their services should be utilised in extra cleaning and other duties in the war-time day nurseries or the health centres.

The Ministry of Health, in Circular 2729, also recommends that the services of home helps should, at the discretion of the Welfare Authority, be made available for such other types of cases as local circumstances may suggest, and that the availability of their services should depend on the needs of the patient for the service, and should be in no way dependent on the financial circumstances of the patient. A type of case where the services of a home help could be made available is where neglect of young children may be inevitable because of the illness of the mother.

The Committee are in full agreement with the views of the Medical Officer of Health, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, subject to the approval of the Minister of Health, the "Home Helps" Scheme be amended to provide:—

- (a) For the services of five full-time home helps, at a salary of £3 10s, per week, who would be available for duty in any part of the Borough.
- (b) That where the services of one of the Council's midwives is engaged, or a midwife from the Watling and District Nursing Association, a payment of 25 per cent. of the cost be made by the mother, as provided by the existing scheme.
- (c) That in all other approved cases a payment of 25 per cent. of the cost be made by the mother where the rateable value of the premises occupied is £26 or less per annum, and a payment of 50 per cent. of the cost where the rateable value of the premises occupied is in excess of this amount.

# 29.—MATERNITY ACCOMMODATION AND HOME HELPS:

Letters were submitted from (a) Edgware and Little Stanmore Townswomen's Guild, and (b) Edgware and District Social Services Committee, urging the provision

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of further hospital accommodation for maternity cases and more "home helps" for domiciliary confinements. The Committee have given instructions for the writers of the communications to be informed of the action already taken by the Council with regard to the provision of additional maternity accommodation, and of the extension of the "Home Helps" Scheme now proposed,

# 30.-NURSING HOME:

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The Medical Officer of Health submitted a report, which is recorded in MS. in the Committee Minute Book, with regard to the inadequate nursing assistance at a nursing home in the Borough. The Committee have approved the report, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That in the event of the person responsible for the management of the nursing home in question failing to obtain additional nursing assistance, the number of maternity admissions be limited to an average of three per month.

# VISITING ROTA.

A visit was made on the 2nd February to the Childs Hill, West Hendon, Mill Hill and Watling Health Centres; Hocroft and Addington House War-Time Day Nurseries, and the Hendon Isolation and Emergency Hospital.

# 1. Childs Hill Health Centre.

Instructions have been given for the broken panes of glass in the roof lights to the corridor to be replaced, and for the notice-board indicating the situation of the perambulator shed to be repainted.

# 2. West Hendon Health Centre.

(a) Ceilings, etc.

The ceilings and friezes at this health centre require to be washed down and redistempered. It is RECOMMENDED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit an estimate of the cost of carrying out the necessary work.

- (b) Black-out to Entrance Door.
  - It is RECOMMENDED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the blackingout of the glass panels of the swing doors inside the entrance to this health centre.

# 3. Watling Health Centre.

- (a) Walls and Ceilings:
  - It is RECOMMENDED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit an estimate of the cost of washing down the walls of the room used as an office, and also for repainting the ceiling of the minor ailments waiting-room.
- (b) Minor Repairs.

Instructions have been given for repairs to be carried out where necessary to the roof, and also for the refixing of the asbestos sheeting behind the radiators in the minor ailments waiting-room and the entrance-hall.

### 4. Hendon Isolation and Emergency Hospital.

- (a) Block 1 .- Wards and Kitchen.
  - It is RECOMMENDED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit an estimate of the cost of washing down the walls and ceilings of the wards and kitchen in Block 1.
- (b) Block 5.
  - It is RECOMMENDED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit an estimate of the cost of washing down walls and ceilings and repainting the ceiling, where necessary, of the male word
- (c) Block 6.
  - It is RECOMMENDED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit an estimate of the cost of washing down the ceiling of the wards in Block 6.

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(d) Marriage of Nurses in Training.

The Matron reported that an application had been received from a student nurse for permission to continue her training after her impending marriage, and instructions were sought as to the action to be taken in the event of applications of a similar nature being received in the future. The Matron recommended that, as a war-time measure, permission to continue training after marriage be granted only to student nurses who have entered for the complete preliminary State examination.

The Visiting Rota decided to refer the question to the Public Health and Medical Services Committee for consideration.

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# 40.-MILK AND DAIRIES ORDER:

Bacteriological Count for Rinsings of Churns, Bottles, etc.

A letter was submitted from the Amersham Rural District Council asking this Council to support a resolution urging the introduction of legislation to settle a standard of bacteriological count for all rinsings of churns, bottles, etc.

In reply to a question raised in Parliament on the 27th January last, as to whether he had considered representations on this matter and what action he intended to take thereon, the Minister of Health stated:

"Under the Milk and Dairies Order, 1926, persons who empty and return churns in which milk has been delivered to them are required to cause the churns to be thoroughly cleaned before they leave their custody or control; and producers and other dairymen are required to cause all vessels used for containing milk to be kept in a state of thorough cleanliness. A considerable amount of bacteriological testing and advisory assistance in relation to the cleaning of churns is now being given under the National Milk Testing and Advisory Scheme, but I think that it would be premature to prescribe statutory bacteriological standards at the present stage."

In reply to a supplemental question, the Minister of Health stated that the matter is receiving attention, but that it is not easy to lay down bacteriological standards for cleansing every bottle.

In view of the statement of the Minister of Health and the observations of the Medical Officer of Health on the subject, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That no action be taken in the matter.

# ESTATES, PARKS AND ALLOTMENTS.

# 1.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £289 3s. 11d. were submitted and approved.

### 2.—POST-WAR DEVELOPMENT:

The Committee has deferred consideration of the question of the post-war development of its services until a future meeting.

# 3.—WATLING PARK—PROPOSED BUILDING:

Correspondence was submitted in connection with an application from the Watling Community Association enquiring whether the Council would let to the Association the vacant site on the east side of Colchester Road, between the bowling-green and No. 78, for the purpose of erecting thereon a pre-fabricated building for use primarily for youth work. The land in question forms part of Watling Park.

# RESOLVED-

- (i) That the Watling Community Association be asked to supply further details of the work proposed to be carried on in such building.
- (ii) That the Finance and General Purposes Committee be requested to recommend to the Council that all cases where the public make application for their case to be considered by the Council, it shall be placed before the appropriate Committee, unless it can be dealt with under standing written instructions.

# 4.--WATLING PARK-SCHOOL KITCHEN:

The Committee considered an application referred from the Council (Group I. Cttee. 10/1/44, B. & T.P.--22) from the Hendon Education Committee for permission to creet a temporary building for use as a school kitchen on the south side of Abbots Road, near Colchester Road, on land which forms part of Watling Park.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, subject to the approval of the London County Council, permission be granted on condition that the building shall be removed on one year's notice being given by the Council.

### 5.—PLANT:

The Borough Surveyor reported with regard to the desirability of acquiring two "Loadmaster" trailers ,for use in connection with the general work of the parks and the production of crops. The cost of the two trailers is £192.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the purchase of two "Loadmaster" trailers, at a cost of £192.

# 6,-SUNNY HILL PARK:

The Borough Surveyor asked for authority to allow Mr. J. Hinge to cut and remove the grass from the above park, as in previous years, on payment of the sum of £15.

RESOLVED.—That consideration of the matter be deferred pending a further report to be submitted by the Borough Surveyor.

# 7.—HENDON PARK—REFRESHMENTS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from Mrs. E. Marriott for permission to sell refreshments in the above Park for the year commencing on the 1st April, 1944, on payment to the Council of a sum of £5.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application be approved, and permission given to Mrs. Marriott accordingly.

# 8.—MILL HILL PARK—BOWLING GREEN:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the Mill Hill Ladies' Bowling Club for permission to use two rinks on the old bowling-green, with the option of a third rink when necessary, on the same terms as last year, viz., £7 10s. per rink, plus 1s. per club member, with the use of the small pavilion at a rent of 30s. for the season; the charge for the use of the third rink being £3 15s. for the season.

The Borough Surveyor reported that the Board had made application to erect the shelter in the following position:—

In Finchley Road, Childs Hill, at southbound 'bus stop No. 4700 (trolley pole No. 174), adjoining "The Castle" P.H.

(Group II. Cttee. -22/11/43 - 23).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application be approved, subject to the inclusion of the shelter in the existing agreement.

# 15.—EDGWAREBURY LANE:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the work of widening and making up of Edgwarebury Lane, between a line joining the south boundary of No. 177 and the southern boundary of Crossgate, to a point 125 ft. north of the northern boundary of Hartland Drive, had now been completed by John Laing & Son, Ltd., in accordance with the terms of their agreement with the Council.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the full width of the widened road between the points above mentioned be dedicated as a highway repairable by the inhabitants at large, and that the necessary notices be duly posted.

# 17.—OPEN-AIR SWIMMING POOLS:

The Committee considered an application from the Entertainments Sub-Committee for permission to have the use of the Mill Hill and West Hendon Open-Air Swimming Pools on an evening in June and July respectively for the purpose of holding swimming galas in connection with the "Holidays at Home" programme.

An application was also considered from the Local Youth Committee for permission to have the use of the Mill Hill Swimming Pool on the evening of the 20th July for their annual swimming gala. In previous years this gala has been held at the West Hendon Pool.

It is desirable that the general public should not be excluded from the pools on too numerous occasions, and it is therefore suggested that the Local Youth Committee's gala should form one of the events in the "Holidays at Home" programme.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the applications of the Entertainments Sub-Committee and the Local Youth Committee be approved in principle, and that the above suggestion relative to the incorporation of the Youth Committee's gala with the "Holidays at Home" programme be referred to the Entertainments Sub-Committee.

# 18.—MILL HILL SWIMMING POOL—REFRESHMENTS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an offer from Mr. L. Nicolas of a sum of £50 for the right to sell refreshments at the Mill Hill Swimming Pool for the forthcoming season.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the offer of Mr. Nicolas be accepted.

# 19.—STATEMENT OF VALUES OF SALVAGE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a statement showing the tonnage of salvage disposed of for the years ended 31st March, 1941, 1942, 1943, and to the end of January. 1944. Details of the statement appear in the Appendix to the Report of the Finance and General Purposes Committee.

# 20.—PIG-KEEPING:

The Borough Surveyor reported with regard to the difficulties in feeding the pigs entirely on concentrate obtained from Tottenham. Pig clubs who use concentrate receive from the Government an allowance of meal, but this allowance of meal is not available to the Council. From the experience gained it would appear that no useful purpose would be served by attempting to fatten pigs solely on this concentrate, and in these circumstances the Borough Surveyor suggested that directly the existing stock of pigs are of sufficient size they should be disposed of, and that pig-keeping by the Council should cease.

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RESOLVED--That the Town Glerk be instructed to submit a report on the matter with a view to making further representations to the Ministries concerned.

# 21.—PETROLEUM LICENCES — RENEWALS:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a schedule of applications for the renewal of licences to store petroleum, and suggested that it would facilitate the granting of licences if the Committee would give authority for all applications for renewals to be dealt with as and when received, and for the action taken to be reported to the Committee for confirmation. # 1.-REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £102 13s. 7d. were submitted and approved.

# 2.—CO-OPTED MEMBERS — REPRESENTATIVES RECOMMENDED BY HENDON FOOD CONTROL COMMITTEE:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Food Executive Officer stating that at a meeting of the Hendon Food Control Committee on the 20th ultimo it was recommended that Councillor Mrs. D. M. Banwell, Mrs. R. S. Holt and Mr. E. O. Robinson be co-opted to serve as members of the Special (British Restaurants) Committee.

RESOLVED—That Councillor Mrs. D. M. Banwell, Mrs. R. S. Holt and Mr. E. O. Robinson be co-opted to serve as members of the Special (British Restaurants) Committee.

# 3.—APPOINTMENT OF STAFFING SUB-COMMUTTEE:

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND— That a Staffing Sub-Committee, consisting of the Chairman of the Committee (Councillor F. J. Collins), Councillor Mrs. D. M. Banwell, Mrs. R. S. Holt and Mrs. A. M. Lesty be appointed, and that such Sub-Committee be vested with power to act.

# 4.-KITCHEN STAFF:

The Borough Treasurer reported that his attention had been drawn to certain anomalies in the wages of the kitchen staff employed at the various restaurants. On going into the matter, he was satisfied that such anomalies do exist, especially in regard to similar work in other departments of the Council's organisation. Authority was requested that, in conjunction with the Chief Officer Meals Service the necessary adjustments should be made, subject to report in due course to the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the necessary adjustments be made, subject to report to the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee, and
- (ii) That the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee be requested to review the general position as to the wages paid to kitchen staff, and, if it is considered advisable, to make representation to the Joint Industrial Council with a view to such minimum being increased.

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# 5.--ADDITIONAL PART-TIME RELIEF CASHIER:

The Chief Officer Meals Service reported that in view of the expansion of the service it was considered necessary that an additional temporary part-time cashier should be engaged to assist at the busice restaurants, and to perform relief duty in this respect during periods of illness, annual leave, etc. Authority was therefore requested for the necessary appointment.

RESOLVED accordingly.

# 6.—MOBILE CANTEEN SERVICE:

The Chief Officer Meals Service reported that the Council's further representations in this matter (Minutes 17/1/44—4) have been forwarded by the Assistant Divisional Food Officer to the headquarters of the Ministry of Food, whose decision is awaited.

It was also reported that in a letter dated the 2nd February the W.V.S. Area Organiser, Golders Green, states that certain members of the staff hitherto engaged in the collection of salvage will now be available for staffing the proposed mobile canteen service in the Garden Suburb, if the proposal is proceeded with. The Hampstead Garden Suburb Fellowship were further prepared to guarantee a sum up to £20 against any loss on the cost of meals supplied by such service in the Garden Suburb. By assuming this responsibility the Fellowship hoped that some social service with greater facilities than their own would be able to organise a canteen at an early date.

In regard to Burnt Oak, the Secretary of the Watling Association had written to say that, in conjunction with the Edgware W.V.S., the necessary voluntary labour could be provided "for running a meals delivery service from the Montrose British Restaurant, if the vehicle, containers, etc., were made available."

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That, subject to sanction by the Ministry of Food and the provision of a van by the Ford Trust, a mobile canteen service for the aged, sick and infirm residents of the Borough be put into operation, and,
- (b) That no additional charge be made for any transport in excess of the prices charged for meals at a British restaurant.

# 7.—INSULATED FOOD CONTAINERS:

It was reported that owing to the increased supply of hot meals in insulated containers to local workshops, a requisition had been sent to the Ministry of Food for a further 12 containers. As this is necessary additional equipment the Ministry have been asked to include the cost as a capital charge subject to amortization.

At present 12 containers on loan from the Ministry are in daily use, and in order to meet a new call from a small group of workers at Elstree it became necessary to borrow containers from the W.V.S. Others are on loan from the W.V.S. to supply persons employed on a Ministry of Works contract in the North Circular Road.

As the Ministry of Food have now ceased to lend containers, it is considered desirable that the 12 on loan should become the property of the Council, and the Ministry has been asked to agree to their being purchased, the cost to be regarded as a capital charge subject to amortization. The total sum involved is £153 (£6 7s. 6d. per container), but there may be a small reduction in this figure, as the containers were second-hand when loaned to the Council.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND. That the action taken be confirmed.

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# 8.-MONTROSE RESTAURANT:

The Chief Officer Meals Service reported that on the night of 8th-9th February a burglary had taken place at this restaurant. No details of losses are yet available, but it has been ascertained that a small sum of money, certain equipment and a small quantity of food are missing. The matter is in the hands of the police, and the Ministry of Food have been informed.

# 9.—CRESSINGHAM ROAD:

The Borough Engineer reminded the Committee that the Ministry of Food had decided that this restaurant must be based upon a standard "A" type Nasherete hut, about 22 ft. wide by 109 ft. long. The prepared plan, however, indicated a very eramped lay-out, and it was almost impossible to plan proper counter space. The estimated cost of erecting and fitting up this hut in accordance with the plan is £2,265.

Since preparing the estimate it has been suggested that a scheme should be submitted on the lines of the special Nashcrete hut, modified to suit the Ministry of Works' standard hut. A plan showing the general lay-out of the restaurant on this scheme, at an estimated cost of £2,650, was submitted, and the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND:—That the plan for the special type Ministry of Works hut and estimate be submitted to the Ministry of Food for approval.

### 10.—THE FORTUNE RESTAURANT:

The Borough Engineer reported that the work on this restaurant had proceeded as far as possible pending delivery by the Ministry of the kitchen fittings. Decorations would be commenced this week, and the work then remaining will be as follows:

- (a) The fitting of the kitchen appliances mentioned above;
- (b) the laying of the floor, and
- (c) the completion of a few joinery items.

Noted.

# 11.—USE OF BRITISH RESTAURANTS—"SALUTE THE SOLDIER" WEEK:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of letters, dated the 22nd and 28th January, from the Hon. Secretary, Northern Division, Hendon Savings Committee, requesting the use of Edgeworth, Hartley and Montrose British Restaurants in the evenings during "Salute the Soldier" week (March 25th to April 1st inclusive) for the purpose of meetings, entertainments, dances, etc. It was stated that there was no other available accommodation in which to hold functions of this nature, which would be of great value in raising savings during such a week. The request was made in view of the public intimation that any such use of British Restaurants would be agreeable to, and in fact welcomed by, the Ministry of Food—and the Ministry of Labour.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That the Hon. Secretary of Northern Division Hendon Savings Committee be informed that the Committee regret they are unable to grant the application, as the difficulties to be overcome in the period before "Salute the Soldier" week are too great; and,
- (b) That a report be submitted by the officers concerned on the structural alterations that would be necessary before the restaurants could be let for the purposes indicated, and on the provision of additional labour required.

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#### 12.—CERTIFICATES OF IDENTITY:

The attention of the Committee was directed to the difficulties encountered by individual members thereof in the course of visits to the restaurants, owing to the fact that there was no means of establishing their bona fides with the members of the staff in charge.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND — That each member of the Committee be furnished with a suitable certificate of identity.

#### 13.—FIRE WATCHING:

It was reported that in regard to the Hartley Restaurant, the Chief Warden has advised that the Council's contribution to the Committee of the Joint Scheme for firewatching will be £1 per month, and approval for this expenditure is requested.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the necessary expenditure.

#### 14.—FINANCIAL STATEMENT:

The Borough Treasurer submitted a detailed statement of accounts and statistical data for the four weeks ended 29th January, 1944, in respect of the seven restaurants at present in operation in the Borough. During this period 77,597 meals were sold, a weekly average of 19,399. (See Appendix to the Report of the Finance and General Purposes Committee.) The attention of the Committee was also directed to the fact that from the inception of the service in October, 1941, to Saturday, 5th February, 1944, main meals sold numbered 996,534, while receipts amounted to £55,198 8s.

#### 15.—APPRECIATION:

The Committee were informed that a letter of appreciation of the service afforded at St. John's Restaurant had been received, signed by eight employees of the Goods Department of Hendon (L.M.S.) Station. The letter states that most of the signatories have been regular patrons for over a year, and have always found the food provided to be of consistently good quality. Reference was also made to the willing service and courtesy of the manageress and staff.

No. 98 (Region V)), intimating that new arrangements have been made for the provision of toys and educational equipment for war-time nurseries. A London Regional Toy Committee has been established to co-ordinate the supply and distribution of toys, and all war-time nurseries opened in future will be supplied with toys through this Committee from voluntary working parties organised by the N.F.S. and Civil Defence personnel, W.V.S., etc. In these circumstances, the initial allowance of 10s. per approved place, referred to in the Ministry's circular letter of the 26th August, 1942, will be reduced to 7s. 6d. per approved place in respect of new nurseries, but the replacement allowance of 2s. 6d. per approved place after a nursery has been in operation for twelve months will not be affected. The per capita allowance of 7s. 6d. should be expended primarily on consumable educational equipment, but in view of the pressing necessity for conserving timber, applications for certificates for the purchase of larger items of equipment, such as chutes and climbing frames, cannot normally be approved.

Noted.

#### 5.—ELECTRIC POWER POINTS:

The Committee's attention was drawn to the advisability of power points which are within the reach of children being fixed at a higher level, and the Committee have authorised the Borough Engineer to take the necessary action, at an estimated cost of £8, in respect of power points at Hocroft, York Park, Claremont and Edgware Day Nurseries.

#### 6.-PROGRESS REPORTS:

The Borough Engineer reported as follows:-

#### (a) Addington House Extension.

Owing to delay in delivery of shelving material, it has not been possible to complete the new kitchen ready for occupation, but it is anticipated that the new building will be ready for occupation on the 17th February.

#### (b) Hyde Cottage.

The slow-combustion stove for the ablution room has now been delivered, and the contractor has been instructed to fix this in position. Other minor items have been put in hand.

#### (c) Dole Street.

The air-raid shelter has been completed, but progress on the soil drainage is slow, and it is considered that the completion of the work will require a further fortnight. The electrical installation is the only other outstanding item in connection with this contract.

On the instructions of the Regional Commissioners "Invasion Defence" is now to be known as "Home Defence," and the word "Home" substituted for "Invasion" in all further references to such organisation in the London Region.

The conditions heretofore applicable to the payment of this bonus still remain in

- (a) The Local Authority must be paying not less by way of cost-of-living bonus to members of its staff generally.
- (b) Subject to the arrangement made regarding grant on the salaries of administrative, technical and clerical staffs, bonus paid to persons engaged full time on airraid precautions work will be recognised for grant if the ordinary remuneration of the employees concerned does not exceed £850 per annum and has been approved for grant.
- (c) Bonus paid to employees, if any, who are engaged as substitutes for staff seconded for air-raid precautions and whose ordinary remuneration ranks similarly for grant will be eligible for grant under the same conditions as in (b) above.

#### 4.-CHEVRONS FOR WAR SERVICE AND WOUND STRIPES:

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Instructions have been received from the Ministry of Home Security in regard to the issue to members of the Civil Defence (General) Services administered by Local Authorities and falling within the responsibility of the Minister of Home Security and the Minister of Health, and also persons performing fire-prevention duties under Local Authorities and under the Fire Guard (Business and Government Premises) Order, 1943, at premises for which the Local Authority is the appropriate authority, of (a) chevrons, red in colour, for war service; (b) narrow gold stripes for wounds sustained in this war, and (c) red braid stripes for wounds sustained in previous wars.

#### 5.—FOOD COUPONS—PERSONNEL ON RE-INFORCEMENT DUTY:

Instructions have been issued by the Minister of Home Security, in conjunction with the Minister of Food, for the collection of food ration books held by personnel of the Civil Defence Services sent on re-inforcement duty for periods of seven days or more (during which period all meals will be provided for such personnel), and the cancellation of coupons applicable to the period of absence, as provided in Article 15 of the Rationing (General Provisions) Order, 1942. In accordance with the instructions, Mr. E. C. Hurford has been nominated as the officer to be authorised to retain the ration books and to act on behalf of the Ministry of Food in the matter of cancellation and, where applicable, removal of coupons and points vouchers from the ration books, and to account for the disposal of any coupons so removed from the books.

#### 6.-REPAIRS TO CIVILIAN RESPIRATORS:

A further communication has been received from the Minister of Home Security relating to the response to the offer of free repair during the months of January and February of respirators held by the civilian population, and stressing the need for the public to be sure that their respirators are in order in view of the continued possibility of gas attack. The Minister asks that publicity given in the national Press to this matter should be followed up by publicity in the local Press and by posters, to stimulate local interest during the remainder of February, as it was not proposed to extend the time during which faulty respirators would be repaired free of charge.

The Chief Warden has experienced great difficulty in arranging for the fitting of children's respirators, as the inspections have, in the main, to be carried out by part-time personnel largely in the evening, at times when many of the children are in bed—a difficulty which has not arisen previously, as the respirators held by children attending schools were inspected there during school hours.

The Committee considers that the vital necessity of ensuring that the respirators held by children in the Borough are in good order and correctly fitted justifies the re-introduction of arrangements for the requisite inspections to be made at schools, and the Chief Warden, in collaboration with the Chairman of the Education Committee

and the Director of Education, has been requested to make such arrangements, commencing with a trial inspection of respirators at one school immediately following the close of an afternoon session.

#### 7,—SECURITY:

On the instructions of the Regional Commissioners, all personnel in the Civil Defence Services are being notified that they are not to disseminate information acquired by them in the course of their duties, which, on security grounds, ought not to be disclosed, and that discretion must be exercised not only in ordinary conversation, but also in private correspondence, telephone conversations, etc.

#### 8.—PRODUCTIVE WORK IN DEPOTS:

The sum of £3 0s. 7d. has become available for the benefit of the personnel, as a result of productive work undertaken at John Groom's Crippleage Depot, in accordance with the terms of Home Security Circular 249 of 1942; 25 per cent. of this amount has been allocated to the Civil Defence Comforts Fund, and the balance of £2 2s. 5d. placed at the disposal of the personnel, who have donated this sum to the British Red Cross Society.

#### 9.—RESCUE SERVICE:

The personnel of the Rescue Service have assisted in the following works:-

Further repairs to roof, "D" Ambulance Depot.

Lopping overhanging trees on alletments.

Erecting partition at Ravensfield.

Extension to Wardens' Post D.23.

Coaling operations, Barnet, for the L.N.E.R.

Assisting L.M.S. Railway, Hendon Station, heavy goods section.

Further repairs to emergency feeding sheds.

Alterations to shelters, Golders Green Arches and West Hendon.

Delivery\_of tanks throughout the district for static water supplies to the Fire Guard Service.

Unloading shelters at Wembley.

Cutting and removing railway lines, Scratchwood Sidings.

Assisting the British Restaurants Meals Service, N.F.S., W.V.S. and Food Office.

Shoring works, general repairs and salvage of furniture, house damaged by A.A. shell.

In addition to the replacement of transport for the heavy section of the Rescue Service referred to in the previous report, first line transport of the Light Service is now being replaced with new, completely enclosed vehicles fitted to carry all tools inside with the exception of ladders and stretchers. The reserve Light Rescue vehicles allocated to this Borough have been reduced from two to one. Arrangements have, however, been made for the replacement of this reserve vehicle as and when the required number of part-time personnel reaches the establishment figure.

For some considerable time the payment of drivers of heavy vehicles at the rate applicable for drivers similarly employed by Local Authorities has been authorised, and accordingly such drivers in this Borough are paid in accordance with grade "E" of the J.I.C. award, which at present stands at £4 10s. 2d. per week. Despite addi-

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tional responsibilities for the care and maintenance of the vehicles, the safety of their parties, etc., the rate authorised for drivers of Light Rescue vehicles is the general rate for party members, i.e., £3 18s. 6d. per week. A reserve of 50 per cent. of the number of full-time drivers is also required by London Region to be fully trained, and to be available for driving vehicles of either section at any time. Such reserve drivers are, in fact, often called upon to take the place of regular drivers absent through sickness, leave, etc., for periods frequently extending to one month or more, and although these men, when driving heavy vehicles, perform duties which the Commissioners recognise for higher reward when carried out by the regular drivers, it is ruled that the deputies should not, during these periods, be paid in excess of the party rate—in the view of the Committee a direct contravention of the principles recognised by the Commissioners in the case of the regular staff.

The Committee has directed that the Regional Commissioners should again be urged to approve (a) the application of the same principles in regard to the payment of drivers of Light Rescue vehicles as appertain in the case of drivers of Heavy vehicles, i.e., payment of the rate applicable to drivers of cars belonging to the Corporation., viz., Grade "D" of the J.I.C. award, at present £4 7s. per week; and (b) the payment of reserve drivers at the rate applicable for the particular class of vehicle on which they are employed when deputising for regular drivers. The Committee has also directed that the various Local Authorities in the County should be invited to make similar representations to the Regional Commissioners.

The Committee has received a report made by the Chief Casualty Services Officer to the London Region, following an inspection made by him of the two Rescue Service Depots in the Borough on the 25th January. The report comments favourably on the equipment, cleanliness and training programmes at the depots, and refers to the Hendon Rescue Service as highly efficient, reflecting great credit on the head of the Service, Mr. J. L. Pelham, and his deputy, Mr. Jarred.

#### 10.—CORPORATION'S AMBULANCE SERVICE:

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During the month of January 263 calls were made in respect of private cases and 65 in respect of street accidents and illnesses. Of these 328 cases, 27 were conveyed in Civil Defence ambulances.

The construction of additional garage accommodation at the Clitterhouse Farm and John Groom's Crippleage Depots for the two additional ambulances is now nearing completion.

#### 11.—HEATING OF WARDENS' POSTS:

The whole of the Wardens' Posts are not now open during the full twenty-four hours, and difficulty has been experienced in obtaining a suitable temperature within a reasonable time of manning by the present electric heaters, which have elements of a 750-watts capacity. Tests made indicate the desirability of increasing the capacity of the elements to 1000 watts, which for 80 out of the 94 posts manned for varying periods daily would cost £50. The annual cost of additional current required would be approximately £420. Endeavours are, however, being made to negotiate with the supply company for a reduction in this figure on condition that heating is not used during the peak hours (7 a.m. to 10 a.m.). The Committee recommend

- (1) That the Borough Engineer be authorised to proceed with the alteration of the heating elements, at an approximate cost of £50.
- (2) That the Borough Engineer continue his negotiations with the Northmet Power Company for a reduction in the annual cost of the additional current required, and
- (3) That representations be made to the Middlesex County Council for the recognition of this expenditure for A.R.P. grant purposes.

#### 12 .- FIRE PREVENTION:

Exercises involving 255 sector, 824 assembly and 174 block points took place on the 7th February, to enable the Regional Commissioners to test the efficiency of the Hendon Fire Guard organisation in the operation of the Fire Guard plan. All sector, assembly and block points were manned. At the conclusion of the exercise the Regional Commissioners announced their satisfaction with the test, and that the Fire Guard Plan would come into operation in the Borough of Hendon on the 28th February, 1944.

Proposals for the staffing of the Fire Guard Organisation, based on the principles laid down in London Region Circular 843 and as set out in the schedule on page 246, have been approved for submission to the London Civil Defence Region.

Prosecutions have been authorised against two persons in the Borough for failure to perform fire prevention duties under the Fire Guard (Local Authority Services) Order, 1943.

The National Fire Service carried out first inspections of lofts in 89 houses, second inspections in five houses, and third inspections in three houses in the Borough during the month of January, 1944.

The siting of the five wheelbarrow pumps allocated to the Borough by the Regional Commissioners (see last report) has been approved, and it is understood that this number of pumps will shortly be increased by two. The recruitment of crews to operate pumps is now proceeding.

A scheme for fire-prevention arrangements in respect of business premises in Finchley Road has been considered and approved. The approval previously given to Joint Scheme No. 59 has been withdrawn, and the premises incorporated in the patrol of street fire parties in the vicinity.

The Committee has delegated to the Elstree Rural District Council the exercise of powers under the Fire Guard (Business and Government Premises) Order, 1942, in respect of premises situate in Barnet Lane and falling within the area administered by the Elstree Rural District Council for Civil Defence purposes.

#### 13.—SHELTERS:

Original regulations prescribed that the wages of the Council's workmen engaged on shelter cleansing for a full day or days would rank for reimbursement, but that part day apportionment of men's wages could not be claimed. The trench shelters in this Borough, which provide accommodation for some 9,150 persons, are sited in 23 of the public parks and open spaces, and are distributed over various points over an area of upwards of 10,300 acres. The cleansing of such shelters is carried out by regular Council employees working at, or attached to, the staff of the respective parks and open spaces, involving an average daily labour expenditure equal to three "man hours," an arrangement which makes for prompt and regular cleansing, and is less costly than the employment of whole-time labour, in view of time saved travelling from site to site and additional outlay on transport costs. Representations were made that some recompense should be given to local authorities carrying out the work under an arrangement which so reduced its own labour availability, and made for economy in a general sense, and the County Council and the Regional Commissioners have now approved proposals worked out in the Borough Treasurer's Department for the recognition for reimbursement purposes of the cost of labour for cleansing trench shelters in parks, etc., on the basis of three "man hours" per day in respect of the 23 sites. Accordingly, a sum of approximately £1,900 per annum will rank for reimbursement. instead of falling to be borne by the Local Authority, as in the past.

#### CLAIMS AND QUESTIONS:

The Committee considered 6 Claims and 3 Questions. A summary of the decisions of the Committee is set out hereunder:—

#### Claims:

5 allowed at the full rate of 10s, weekly.

1 disallowed by reason of claimant's yearly means exceeding £49 17s. 6d.

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#### Questions:

- 1 pensioner disqualified by reason of yearly means exceeding £49 17s. 6d.
- 1 pensioner disqualified by reason of being detained in a mental hospital within the meaning of the Lunaey and Mental Treatment Acts, 1890 to 1930.
- 1 pensioner disqualified by reason of the receipt of Indoor Poor Relief.

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#### 2.—OLD - AGE PENSIONS ACT, 1936—SUGGESTED AMENDMENTS:

A communication was submitted from the Hull Local Pensions Committee asking the Committee to support representations which that Committee had made to the Minister of Health for the introduction of legislation to amend the Old Age Pensions Act. 1936, to remedy hardships caused by the operation of the existing conditions regulating the grant of old-age pensions.

The Committee decided to support the representations, with certain modifications, and

RESOLVED—That the Minister of Health be urged to give his earnest consideration to the question of introducing legislation to amend the Old Age Pensions Act, 1936, to provide—

(i) That increases in allowances from charitable institutions for cost of living purposes due to the war, be not taken into account, owing to the fact that by so doing the amount of the pension is reduced or withheld.

- (ii) That the value of board and lodgings provided by members of the family of an applicant for a pension or a pensioner shall not be taken into account in assessing means.
- (iii) That in the case of pensioners who are so unfortunate as to have to be admitted to a nursing home, and their pensions cancelled owing to their means being calculated upon the present basis, the persons who take the responsibility of paying the maintenance charge in the nursing home should not be penalised by having to meet the extra cost caused by the cossation of the pension.
- (iv) That when a pensioner is admitted to hospital, a proportion of his pension is allotted to him for his own use.
- (v) For an appreciable increase in the maximum allowance of carned and uncarned income of £49 17s. 6d. in the assessment of the amount of pension to be paid to a claimant or pensioner, this Committee being satisfied from their experience that many persons are suffering hardship by this restriction.

It was further

RESOLVED—That a copy of the foregoing resolution be forwarded to the Prime Minister, the Member of Parliament for the Hendon Division, and Members of Parliament representing all other constituencies in the County of Middlesex, and that the Hull Local Pensions Committee be informed of the action taken.

#### 25.—LIAISON OFFICER:

The Committee considered the reference from the Council (31/1/44—Resolution No. 104) regarding the appointment of a liaison officer. A letter addressed to His Worship the Mayor from Miss Purves, the Hon. Secretary Hendon Citizens' Advice Bureau, was also considered, regarding the large number of citizens of the Borough who make use of the facilities provided by the Bureau. In 1943 approximately 20,000 cases were dealt with, and an average of 1,600 citizens are interviewed during a month. These Bureaux have for the past four years been acting as a clearing-house for information, as an interpreter of current legislation, and as a liaison between the various local statutory and voluntary bodies. They are constantly in touch with the different departments of the Town Hall, and a sympathetic hearing and free advice is given to all enquirers. The Citizens' Advice Bureau ask the Council to consider the adequacy of these services that are available to Hendon citizens before appointing a special liaison officer, whose work and that of the Citizens' Advice Bureau would almost inevitably overlap in a way that would hardly prove satisfactory.

In the Borough of Hendon there are many voluntary societies in connection with which Miss Purves is appointed liaison officer by the London Council of Social Service. Miss Purves suggests that a conference with representatives of the Council might be convened for the purpose of working out a scheme of all possible channels of help for the citizen.

Having regard to the facilities already provided by the Citizens' Advice Bureaux and other organisations in the Borough, the Committee are satisfied that the appointment of a special liaison officer would serve no useful purpose at present. It is, however, suggested that further publicity of the facilities available might be given, and the Committee.

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#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That suitable notices be exhibited in the entrances to the Town Hall and the Public Libraries calling attention to the facilities provided by the Citizens' Advice Bureaux.

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# 29.—RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT, 1919—DELEGATION OF FUNCTIONS TO BOROUGH AND DISTRICT COUNCILS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Middlesex County Council formally delegating, on and from the 1st April, 1944, its powers and duties under the above-named Act:—

"That the powers and duties of the County Council under the Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1919, be, and are hereby, delegated on and from the 1st April, 1944, to the several Borough and District Councils throughout the County, as regards their respective boroughs or districts, in accordance with the relevant provisions of that Act."

With regard to the operation of the temporary arrangements, the County Council authorises the Town Council, on and from the 1st February, 1944, until the delegation takes effect, to act as agent of the County Council in the discharge of its functions under the Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1919, in the Borough. In addition, the Town Clerk and any other officer who may be duly approved by the Town Council are authorised, as respects the Borough, to sign all such notices and other documents and do all such things as the Clerk of the County Council or other duly authorised officer of the County Council is empowered by, or under the said Act to sign or do; provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to authorise the institution of any legal proceedings prior to the 1st April, 1944, under the Act without previous reference to the Clerk of the County Council.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That there be added to the references in Standing Orders to the Public Health and Medical Services Committee—
  - "To consider and report on all questions relating to the administration of the Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1919."
- (ii) That for the purposes of Article 27 of the Sanitary Officers (Outside London) Regulations, 1935, the sanitary inspectors of the Council be directed to act (under the supervision of the Senior Sanitary Inspector) as officers of the Local Authority under the Rats and Mice (Destrutcion) Act, 1919, and under any orders or regulations made thereunder, and furnished with such authorisations by the Town Clerk in writing as may be deemed expedient.

#### 30.—TOWN HALL LETTINGS:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Hendon Chamber of Commerce in further reference to their application for the use of a room in the Town Hall for the purpose of meetings. An application was also considered from the Hon. Secretary of the Young Farmers' Club for the use of premises at which the Club could hold meetings, and also for the use of land for experimental growing of crops and for earrying on the other activities of the Club. (F. & G.P.C., 24/1/44—37.)

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—

- (1) That the Council adhere to its resolution in the matter.
- (2) That the application of the Young Farmers' Club for the use of land be referred to the Estates, Parks and Allotments Section of Group II. Committee.

#### 31.—INTERNATIONAL UNION OF LOCAL AUTHORITIES:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the International Union of Local Authorities, enclosing a copy of the proposed constitution for the British Section of the International Union of Local Authorities, and inviting the Town Council to appoint a representative and an accredited deputy to serve on a general council of the Union in Great Britain. The minimum subscription for individual local authorities and societies interested in local government is £2 2s. per annum, and a general meeting of the representatives and members has been convened for Friday, the 25th February, 1944, at the County Hall, Westminster Bridge.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That His Worship the Mayor be appointed as the Council's representative on the Ceneral Council of the Union, and that the Town Clerk be appointed his accredited deputy, under paragraph 7 of the proposed constitution.
- (ii) That authority be given for the payment of the annual subscription of £2 2s.

#### 32.—ROYAL SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION OF ACCIDENTS:

The Committee considered an application from the above Society for the renewal of the annual subscription. The scale of subscription for all local authorities other than County Councils is £2 2s. per annum for each 20,000 population or fraction thereof.

DEATH OF LIEUT.-COL. F. W. HEARN, O.B.E., FREEMAN OF THE BOROUGH OF HENDON:

His Worship the Mayor paid tribute to the late Lieut.-Colonel F. W. Hearn, O.B.E., in the following terms:—

"It is with profound regret that I have to refer to the passing of Lieut.-Col. Hearn, who answered the call to 'higher service' on the 15th of this month. The final rites were observed on the 18th, and these I attended officially, with several Members and Chief Officers of the Council. The whole of the Borough of Hendon

mourns the loss of this distinguished gentleman. All who were privileged to know him will cherish the memory of their happy associations with him. His greatheartedness, kindly sympathy and inspiring personality will long be remembered. Colonel Hearn was a great Christian, who applied his religious principles to every walk of life. At all times his aim was to serve others. He never spared himself, and he has set us all a wonderful example of unflagging devotion to duty.

It is difficult for some of us to visualise the village of Hendon as it was in the boyhood of Colonel Hearn, and I think it is a great pity that he never committed to paper the memories of its life and customs in those days. In 1895, when the District Council was constituted, he became an original member, and, but for one year, served in this capacity for a continuous period of 33 years, retiring in April, 1929. In 1897 he was made Chairman of the Council, a position to which he was appointed again in 1906 and 1914. On this latter occasion he gave up the post to join his battalion. He served on numerous Committees as Member and Chairman, but I suppose the one which claimed his deepest interest was the Education Committee, for on this he was an original member and occupied the chair for 25 years. Such a splendid record of public service is indeed unique.

Colonel Hearn devoted the best years of his long and energetic life to building up the district he loved so much. It was he who played a large part in laying the foundations of the Services which the Borough enjoys to-day. Words cannot adequately express the debt which the Borough owes to Colonel Hearn. It was fitting that in 1934 Hendon conferred upon him the most honourable distinction which it was in their power to bestow, by appointing him the first Freeman of the Borough. Hendon could have done no less than honour his services in this way. When the history of the Borough comes to be written, the name of Lieut Col. Hearn and the record of the magnificent work he has accomplished will shine as part of that volume.

## II. Treatment of Children Suffering from Minor Postural Defects.

The Council's scheme for treatment of orthopædic defects provides for out-patient treatment at the Central Hendon and Watling Health Centres, and in-patient treatment, where necessary, by arrange ment with the Royal National Orthopadie Hospital at their country branch at Stanmore. A surgeon attends at the Health Centre each month, and the musseuse for seven sessions per week. Apath however from the manner of the seven sessions per week. however, from the grosser defects which are dealt with under this scheme, a considerable number of children are found to be suffering from what can be regarded as minor postural defects. To meet

this situation and to avoid overcrowding at the orthopædic sessions, a scheme was inaugurated in 1941 by which the treatment of these minor defects was carried out in the schools by a prescribed series of remedial exercises under the supervision of the teacher in charge of physical training.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that he had been informed by the Director of Education that the teaching staff in many schools has now been so depleted that the scheme is not working with uniform success. At the present time 532 children should be receiving treatment under the scheme. The Medical Officer of Health therefore recommended that a specialist teacher of physical training and remedial exercises should be appointed to undertake the responsibility for the treatment of these children. Such an appointment is envisaged in Board of Education Administrative Memorandum 482 dated 20th October, 1943, which states that the Board have had under consideration the position of medical gymnasts who are employed as specialist teachers of physical training and remedial exercises, and have decided that recognition as specialist teachers under Schedule 1 (3) (c) of the Code of Regulations for Public Elementary Schools may be granted in cases in which certain conditions are fulfilled. These conditions are:-

- (1) The specialist must normally have completed satisfactorily a three-years' course of training at a physical training college, and must hold the diploma of the Chartered Society of Massage and Medical Gymnastics. Candidates who have completed courses of physical training other than the three-years' course may also be considered.
- (2) She must be employed in substantially full-time service as a teacher.
- (3) Her work must be under the expert direction of an orthopædic surgeon or of the School Medical Officer.

Local Education Authorities who wish to claim this recognition in respect of any officers in their employment should submit an application, which should be accompanied by full particulars as to the conditions of the employment, the qualifications of the specialist, and the rate of salary proposed.

The Committee are in agreement with the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, and RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That, subject to the approval of the Board of Education, a specialist teacher for physical training and remedial exercises, possessing the qualifications set out in Administrative Memorandum No. 482, be appointed, such specialist teacher to work under the direction of the School Medical Officer and the orthopædic surgeon.
- (ii) That a further report be submitted after the scheme has been in operation for three months.

#### III. Treatment of Speech Defects.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that his attention had been drawn to the fact that the speech defects of children attending schools served by the Health Centre, Garth Road, Childs Hill, are not receiving treatment, due to the fact that parents cannot find the time to attend with their children at the speech clinic, which is held at the Central Hendon Health Centre, at the rear of the Town Hall. The head teachers of the schools concerned were therefore asked to submit particulars of children suffering from speech defects, with the result that 34 children were given appointments to see the speech therapist; 22 attended and 21 were found to be suffering from speech defects in need of treatment. The children who did not attend will be given a further appointment. To undertake the treatment of these children the Committee are advised that it will be necessary to engage the Council's speech therapist for two additional sessions per week, and to establish a speech clinic at the Health Centre, Garth Road, Childs Hill.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the Council's speech therapist (Miss Badcock) be engaged for two additional sessions per week, at a fee of 17s. 6d. per session.
- (ii) That approval be given to the purchase of the necessary equipment, at an estimated cost of £6.

S-VITAMIN AND IRON SUPPLEMENTS FOR CHILDREN UNDER FIVE YEARS:

With reference to Item 1 (a) in the report of the School Management Sub-Committee, 4th January, 1944, it was reported that a reply had been received, from the Board of Education, to the Director's letter requesting that the Board increase the local standard grant of 331 per cent, to 100 per cent, for the cost of providing vitamin and iron supplements for all children under five in public elementary schools whose enrolment has been duly authorised because of home conditions. In their reply the Board of Education stated that they could see no reason for departing from the usual grant practice in respect of this specific item of expenditure.

Noted.

# 9.-FIRE - WATCHING ORDERS:

It was reported that, as instructed by the Committee, the Director of Education had conferred with the Fire Guard Staff Officer on the question of schools being desig-a report was considered from the Chief Warden, stating that the views of the Committee thereon had been duly appreciated. In order to meet the wishes of the Committee as far as possible, and the requirements of the Fire Guard Plans, the following proposals were submitted in respect of the Council schools concerned:

- (a) In the event of the party leader of an adjoining street fire party being willing to accept the additional responsibility, it is proposed to cancel the appointment of block leader, eliminate the school from the list of block points, and include it in the street fire party area. The school staff would continue to man the watching post for fireprevention duties, in accordance with the approved arrangements for the premises, but would be required to comply with instructions issued by the party leader in the same way as members of a street party, both in operations and training.
- (b) In the event of the above proposals being acceptable, the Education Committee are asked to permit the use of a room or entrance-hall in a school as an assembly point where its situation in the street party area is tactically more advantageous for operational purposes than the existing assembly point.

It was noted that the above arrangements could not be extended to Frith Manor School, which would have to be dealt with on an exceptional basis.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the proposals as outlined in paragraphs (a) and (b) above be approved in principle, and that the Director of Education be asked to confer with the head teachers of Council schools thereon.

### 3.—FOOTWEAR FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN:

Pursuant to Item 1 in the Report of this Sub-Committee dated 21/9/43, a letter was submitted from the Board of Trade stating that the purpose of the supplementary issue of clothing coupons to children was to offset the additional coupons which a child needing adult sizes in footwear has to surrender. The Board state further that it has been found necessary from the beginning of clothes rationing to require the surrender of adult coupon rates for a much smaller size in women's shoes than in men's shoes. It is likely, therefore, that a higher proportion of girls reach the qualifying size before they are 14 years of age. Other Authorities have suggested that the Board's present scale of foot measurement is too generous for girls, and this question is being examined by their technical experts. It is appreciated that measurement of a child's feet is not a very satisfactory way of determining the size of footwear a child needs.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

(a) THAT the Board of Trade be informed that this Committee are not satisfied as to the adequacy of the present scheme for the issue of supplementary clothing coupons for children, and again desire to urge the Board to amend their existing regulations so as to ensure that a greater number of boys will benefit by the issue of such supplementary coupons.

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(b) THAT the Board of Trade be also urged to arrange for the release of some form of indoor footwear for children, coupon free, which could be worn by such children in school when they arrive there with wet feet.

The following statistics of attendances during previous holiday periods, when schools were opened for the above purpose, were submitted:—

(a) Midsummer Holidays, 1942:

44 school departments were opened.

Actual daily average attendance, 845. (School roll on 24/7/42 was 13,700.) This equals 6.2 per cent. of school enrolment.

(b) Christmas Holidays, 1942:

35 school departments were opened.

Number of children who promised to attend, 842.

Actual daily average attendance, 448. (School roll on 22/12/42 was 13,775.) This equals 32 per cent. of school enrolment.

(c) Midsummer Holidays, 1943:

Six school holiday centres were opened.

Number of children who promised to attend, 503.

Actual daily average attendance, 263. (School roll on 21/7/43 was 13,813.) This equals 1.9 per cent. of school enrolment.

Having regard to all the information before them, the Joint Consultative Sub-Committee for Education are unanimously of opinion that there is no justification for the opening of elementary schools during holiday periods, and

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#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the School Management Sub-Committee be informed accordingly,

#### 6.—REPAIR OF CHILDREN'S FOOTWEAR:

Consideration was given to a reference from the School Attendance Sub-Committee regarding the possibility of introducing a course of instruction in handieraft centres for repairing children's footwear. Certain difficulties in connection therewith were raised, and the Committee were of opinion that the introduction of such a course under wartime conditions was not a practicable proposition. The teacher representatives present, however, agreed to confer with their Association thereon.

#### 7.—FUTURE SCHOOL PLANS:

The Sub-Committee were informed that the Hendon Teachers' Association were of opinion that the existing progressive policy of the Education Committee might be improved by calling into consultation experienced teachers when planning new schools and alterations and adaptations to existing buildings in future.

#### 8.—MILK IN SCHOOLS SCHEME:

The Committee's attention was drawn to the existing method of delivering milk to schools in one-pint or larger bottles. Under the milk in schools scheme a child receives either one-third pint or two-thirds pint of milk daily. Prior to 1941 milk was delivered in one-third pint bottles, and distribution was consequently a simple matter. Under present conditions, however, a considerable amount of time is spent by teachers in measuring and distributing the requisite quantity of milk to each child.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Central and Branch Libraries be closed at 7 p.m. from April to September.

#### 7.—BOOKS ON THE UNITED STATES:

In April, 1942, the Council decided to support a scheme sponsored by a Government Department in co-operation with the National Central Library for the purchase of books on the United States written by Americans. The idea underlying the scheme was the development of a better and wider understanding between the English and American peoples through the media of books. In recent weeks a number of these books have been delivered from the United States, and the Chief Librarian asked for approval to the suggestion which had been made that a special display be held at the Central Library for a fortnight in May.

The Ministry of Information had been approached to see whether it would be possible for them to provide a speaker to open the exhibition, and also to address a public meeting to be held in a suitable building. So far as is known at present, the only expenditure for which the Council will be responsible is the cost of a book-list which it is proposed to print and publish.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That approval be given to the proposed exhibition and to the necessary expenditure in connection with the printing and publishing of the book list.

# 8.—POST-WAR REORGANISATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE PUBLIC LIBRARY SERVICE—PROPOSALS BY THE COUNCIL OF THE LIBRARY ASSOCIATION:

### 16.—ADVANCE PREPARATION OF HOUSING SITES:

Ministry of Health Circular 14/44.

The Town Clerk submitted the following report:-

Ministry of Health Circular 14/44 states that, in order to enable the building of houses to start without delay as soon as circumstances permit, the Government have examined, in consultation with the associations of local authorities, the possibilities of assisting local authorities to carry out works of site preparation, including the provision of roads and sewers in advance during 1944. It is anticipated that during the next few months the organisation, specialist labour and plant of a number of civil engineering contractors who have been engaged on the construction of airfields will be freed from this work, and it has been decided to make these resources available for the preparation of housing sites.

The main outlines of the proposed scheme are as follows:-

(1) Sites should be grouped in order to provide a contract of sufficient size. Either, therefore, the area should be confined to the sites belonging to one large authority with a sufficiently large programme to justify this, or the authorities in an area should form a group, and one of their number acting on behalf of them should be responsible for the contract.

To obtain the best results an area for the purpose of a contract should include sites sufficient for, say, 2,000 houses within a radius of, say, 30 miles, and no individual site of less than five acres should be included. It is the desire of the Minister that local authorities should act in agreement, and that they should arrange local conferences in order that arrangements for grouping may be agreed. For economical working a single contract should be entered into by one authority on behalf of the group constituting the area. The conference should agree on a group leader, and as soon as possible after the conference the individual local authorities should let their leader and the Ministry of Health, through the Senior Regional Officer, have particulars of the sites which they desire to have included in the scheme.

Sites, whether already in the possession of the authority or to be acquired, may be included to the extent to which the authority contemplate that they will be used for the erection of houses within the first two years after the war.

- (2) In each area a site preparation contract will be let to a suitable large contractor, and this contract will cover all the sites in the area.
- (3) If the authorities in any area, while unable or unwilling to form a suitable group, still wish to take advantage of the scheme, the Ministry of Health will ask the Ministry of Works to accept responsibility for placing and running the contract as agent for the local authorities, which will remain responsible for the lay-out of sites and the provision of all necessary information.

The Ministry of Works estimate that the cost of carrying out the work at present prices, provided runway contractors' methods are used on a large scale, would be approximately £55 per house, excluding water, gas and electricity services, except at street crossings, and the cost will form part of the cost of the housing scheme of the local authority.

Directions are given as to the procedure to be followed in the case of land which it is proposed to develop under the scheme, and which is at present under cultivation either as allotments or as agricultural land. The requisite powers will be granted to local authorities to take possession of sites owned by the authority but let to a tenant before the expiration of the tenancy, the compensation to be payable to form part of the cost of the housing scheme.

The circular also states that it is desirable that water mains should be laid, if possible, at the same time as the development of roads and sewers, and gas and electricity undertakings should be given an opportunity of co-operating in the scheme, as it will be necessary for sections of gas and water mains, and also electricity ducts, to be laid at street crossings. Trenching or ducting undertaken on behalf of the water, gas and electricity undertakings should be carried out by the main contractor, the cost being recovered from the undertakings by the authority responsible for the contract, but the actual laying of mains should normally be done by the undertakings themselves.

I have conferred with the Borough Treasurer and Borough Surveyor on the proposals, and we are of opinion that in the first instance a conference should be convened of representatives of this and certain adjoining Councils, with a view to the formation of a suitable group.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to convene a conference of representatives of this and certain adjoining Councils, with a view to the formation of a suitable group, and that His Worship the Mayor, the Chairman of this Committee, and the appropriate officers be appointed to represent the Council at such conference.

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17.—REQUISITIONING OF PREMISES FOR HOMELESS PERSONS AND FAMILIES INADEQUATELY HOUSED:

The Borough Treasurer submitted a report drawing attention to the difference between the procedure to be followed for requisitioning premises for the Homeless Services and that laid down in Circular No. 2845 for taking possession of premises for the purpose of rehousing families inadequately housed. The procedure prescribed by Circular 2845 is not as simple as that relating to Homeless Services, and the Borough Treasurer suggested that, with a view to obtaining more speedy possession of houses for rehousing persons inadequately housed, all properties considered suitable for requisitioning be dealt with under the powers relating to Homeless Services, and that the allocation of such houses to the various purposes for which they can best be utilised be left to the Chairman of the Committee, the Re-housing Officer and the Housing Manager, with power to act subject to report to the Housing Committee in due course.

The Borough Treasurer also submitted a list of ten properties, which the Housing Manager had inspected, and suggested that, subject to such premises being found to be habitable, they be requisitioned forthwith under the suggested new procedure.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the proposals outlined in the Report of the Borough Treasurer be approved and adopted, and that, subject to the premises referred to being found to be habitable, they be requisitioned forthwith under the powers relating to requisitioning for homeless services.

25.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936, SECTION 192 — REGISTRATION OF NURSING HOMES:

Applications were submitted by the Hendon Cottage Hospital and Manor House Hospital for exemption from the operation of the provisions of the above Act relating to nursing homes. On the report of the Medical Officer of Health, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That pursuant to the provisions of Section 192 of the Public Health Act, 1936, Hendon Cottage Hospital and the Manor House Hospital be granted exemption from the operation of the provisions of the Act relating to nursing homes, for a period of one year as from the 1st April, 1944.

The Borough Engineer submitted an estimate amounting to £8 as the cost of washing down the walls of the office and repainting the ceiling of the minor ailments waiting-room at the Watling Health Centre.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the estimate be approved, and that the Borough Engineer be authorised to put the work in hand.

## 27.—PROVISION OF TEMPORARY ACCOMMODATION FOR CHILDREN DURING ILLNESS OF PARENT:

A letter was submitted from Mr. E. Sewell Harris, J.P., stating that at a conference of Watling Organisations it was decided to urge the Council to establish a home in the neighbourhood of Watling to accommodate, for a temporary period, children whose mothers were unable to look after them by reason of illness or other causes. The Committee have instructed the Medical Officer of Health to consider the matter and to submit a comprehensive report thereon on sympathetic lines.

## 28.—NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE CENTRES AND FOR THE PREVENTION OF INFANT MORTALITY:

A letter was submitted from the above Association inviting the Council to be represented at the Annual Conference on Maternity and Child Welfare, to be held at Friends House. Euston Road, N.W. 1, on the 13th and 14th July next. The price of the tickets for the conference is 5s. for two days and 3s. for one day. It is understood that the Minister of Health has sanctioned payment of the reasonable expenses of not more two delegates of any Local Authority whose accounts are subject to district audit.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That on the understanding that the expenses involved cannot be charged to public funds, authority be given for the lady members of the Committee, if they so desire, an assistant medical officer, and such of the health visitors as can be spared, to attend the conference.

### 29.—ISSUE OF CLOTHING COUPONS FOR EXPECTANT MOTHERS:

In September last the Council decided to make representations to the Ministry of Health and the Board of Trade in support of views put forward by the National Baby Welfare Council urging that the duty of distributing clothing coupons to expectant mothers, which was transferred from health departments to food offices, should be restored to health departments, on the grounds that the transfer of functions deprived health departments of early unofficial notification of pregnancy, the opportunity of doing a large amount of educational work, and quick contact with the health visitor and the distribution of literature on the early care of the ante-natal mother.

In reply to such representations, the Ministry of Health stated that the transfer of the issue of extra clothing coupons to expectant mothers to food offices was agreed by the Ministry of Food and Board of Trade after consultation with the Ministry of Health, and that until the new arrangements came into force the position was that an expectant mother had to present the medical certificate of pregnancy (on Form R.G.50) required by the Ministry of Food at the Food Office before her grant of priority allowances of foods could be authorised. This certificate had to be signed by a doctor, or a certified midwife or a health visitor. The expectant mother also had to procure a second medical certificate to present at the welfare centre in order to obtain extra clothing coupons. Under the new arrangement the certificate on Form R.G. 50 required by the Ministry of Food will serve both for food supplies and clothing coupons.

The Minister considers that this simplification of procedure should reduce unnecessary calls on the expectant mother's time and energy. It should not interfere with the medical supervision of the ante-natal mother, as she will still have to get her certificate signed by her own doctor, or a midwife, or at the ante-natal clinic by the medical officer in charge, or by a health visitor, and little, if any, reduction is anticipated in the contact hitherto maintained with the expectant mothers, as welfare centres continue to distribute cod-liver oil and fruit juices, as well as pre-natal allowance forms for servicemen's wives.

The Board of Trade stressed the point that the expectant mother is now able to obtain all her food and clothing ration documents in connection with pregnancy at one and the same time, on production of a single medical certificate.

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Representations on similar lines to those made by this Council have been made by the Erith Borough Council, eliciting replies in the same terms as those received by this Council. The Town Clerk of Erith has therefore been instructed to pursue the matter with the Government Departments concerned, and to ask all maternity and shild welfare authorities in the area of the London (Outer) Civil Defence Region Standing Joint Committee to support his Council, and to take such action to that end as appears most effective.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND — That the Council support the action being taken by the Erith Borough Council, and that the Town Clerk be instructed to make further representations to the Covernment Departments concerned,

## **30.—ACCOMMODATION** FOR MATERNITY CASES — PROPOSED BOROUGH MATERNITY HOME:

· The Committee have **noted** the following letter from the Private Secretary to the Minister of Health in reply to the further request, made on the directions of the Council, that the deputation appointed by the Council should be received by the Minister of Health personally:—

In reply to your letter of the 2nd February, about the shortage of materinity accommodation in the Borough of Hendon, Mr. Henry Willink has asked
me to say that he has had before him a full account of the present position
and of the views of the Council on the situation. He regrets to find that
there is still some shortage of maternity provision in the area, but he notes
that the County Council are doing all that is possible in present circumstances,
with the help of the Department, to expedite the establishment of the home
which they are setting up in the neighbourhood. This home will provide three
times the accommodation now proposed by the Borough Council.

Mr. Willink is afraid he is not able to agree to an additional scheme for the provision of accommodation, and, as I stated in my letter of the 21st December last, he does not consider that any useful purpose would be served by the attendance of a deputation.

### 31.—NURSES ACT, 1943:

The Town Clerk reported as follows:-

Part I. (Sections 1-5) of the Act provides for the formation by the General Nursing Council for England and Wales of a roll of assistant nurses. Section 6 contains provisions intended to protect both the nursing profession and the general public from persons without any nursing qualifications who describe themselves as nurses. As from such date as the Minister of Health may by order direct, persons other than State registered nurses or duly enrolled assistant nurses, will commit an offence if they take or use the name or title of "nurse," either alone or in combination with any other words or letters.

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Part II, of the Act regulates the conduct of agencies for the supply of nurses, and it is provided that such agencies must supply only registered nurses, duly enrolled assistant nurses, certified midwives, or such other classes of persons as may be prescribed by the Minister. Section 8 provides for the licensing of all such agencies, and deals with the licensing procedure. Outside the London County Council area the licensing authority will be the County or County Borough Council. Section II. provides for the delegation of their functions by County Councils to County District Councils, and empowers the Minister, on the application of a County District Council, to direct a County Council to delegate their functions. None of the provisions of Part II, of the Act come into operation until the Minister by Order so appoints, but he does not consider it practicable to bring any of the provisions of this part of the Act into operation until the roll of assistant nurses is in being. When he decides to bring them into effect he will issue a further communication to local authorities giving guidance as to the action to be taken.

The Middlesex Borough and District Councils Association have had the Act under consideration, and recommend all the constituent authorities, on ascertainment of the date upon which Part II. of the Act will come into force, to apply to the County Council for their agreement to the delegation of their functions to the County District Councils.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, at the appropriate time, the Middlesex County Council be asked to delegate to this Council their functions under Part II. of the Nurses Act, 1943, in so far as they relate to the area administered by the Borough Council.

### 32.-MILL HILL HEALTH CENTRE:

The Committee considered the report of the Medical Officer of Health on an application from the Middlesex 310 Detachment of the British Red Cross Society for permission to use the Health Centre, Hartley Avenue, Mill Hill, for a course of lectures.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND - That the Middlesex 310 Detachment of the British Red Cross Society be granted the free use of the Mill Hill Health Centre in connection with the course of lectures in question, subject to the Society indemnifying the Council against any claim which may arise out of, or in connection with, the proposed user.

### 6. SWIMMING POOLS:

Committee. Route 28-To stop at a point opposite the centre window of No. 735.

An application has also been received in respect of Bittacy Hill as follows:— Bittacy Hill, Mill Hill:

Sanders Lane—Erect post and request sign at the south end of Bittaey Farin House, 15 yards north of Sanders Lane.

Mill Hill East Station—Erect post and compulsory stop sign 13 yards north of drain outside danger hut in Mill Hill Barracks, 30 yards north of station exit.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That such applications be approved.

### 22.—PUBLIC LIGHTING:

Under the agreement between the Northmet Power Company and the Council for the lighting of the lamps in the Edgware district, the columns and fittings were provided and erected by the Company, the Council paying an annual sum per lamp to the Company in respect of the provision of the lighting and maintenance of the columns and fittings.

This annual sum includes the repayment to the Company of the capital costs incurred by them in installing the lighting. The agreements have been in force since the Council took over the area (1931), and the Borough Surveyor reported that he had been in negotiation with the Company regarding the continued payment of that proportion of the annual charge which represents the repayment of capital costs. As a result the Company is now prepared to transfer to the Council the ownership of all street lighting and fittings as and when the capital charges have been paid for a period of ten years or on the 31st December, 1943, whichever is the later date. As the lamps complete their ten-year periods the reduction in the annual accounts would be progressive, in the following manner:—

The Town Clerk submitted an application from the Local Youth Committee to have the use of the West Hendon Swimming Pool on one evening between the 10th and 15th July, from 7 p.m., for the purpose of running off heats in connection with the swimming gala at the Mill Hill Swimming Pool on the 20th July, 1944. It is understood that it will not necessitate the closing of the Pool to the general public.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That such application be approved.

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### 28.—OPEN-AIR SWIMMING POOLS - SEASON TICKETS:

An application was considered from the Hendon Youth Council for the issue of season tickets at special prices, valid at week-ends and on weekdays to members of Youth Organisations affiliated to the Local Youth Committee. Having regard to the facilities already available to members of the public, the Committee

### 29.—OPEN-AIR SWIMMING POOL — TRAINING FACILITIES:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the Local Youth Committee asking for facilities for swimming training at one of the Council's swimming pools, and suggesting that organisations affiliated to the Youth Committee should have the exclusive use of one pool one evening each week, from 7.30 to 9.30 p.m. The Youth Committee also call attention to the need for an indoor swimming pool in the district.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Local Youth Committee be informed that the Council is prepared to grant facilities for training purposes, but is unable to agree to the exclusive use of a swimming pool for this purpose.

#### 30.—PIG - KEEPING:

The Town Clerk submitted a report dealing with the representations made in August last on behalf of the Council to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries and to the Ministry of Food for permission to retain a portion of pig-swill for the purpose of feeding pigs. The Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, by letter dated the 21st September, 1943, after being in communication with the Ministry of Supply on the matter, were unable to grant permission to the Council to retain any portion of pigswill, and suggested that pig-breeding should cease, and that the concentrate be fed to store pigs only. The question of a licence for the Council to collect swill does not arise, as under an Order of the Ministry of Supply dated the 23rd March, 1943, the Council are compelled to sell and deliver to the Council of the Borough of Tottenham all unboiled kitchen waste collected by the Council, but persons authorised by licence granted by the Ministry, collecting or receiving on behalf of pig clubs, poultry clubs or rabbit clubs, and persons collecting and receiving kitchen waste for consumption by his own pigs or poultry, are exempt from the terms of the Order.

RESOLVED—That the Ministry of Supply be requested to receive a deputation, consisting of the Chairman (Councillor C. F. Windust), Councillors F. J. Collins, A. W. Curton and H. P. Small, with a view to obtaining permission to retain a portion of pig-swill for feeding pigs.

### 31.—STATEMENT OF VALUES OF SALVAGE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a statement showing the tonnage of salvage disposed of for the years ended 31st March, 1941, 1942 and 1943, and to the end of February, 1944. Details of the statement appear in the Appendix to the Report of the Finance and General Purposes Committee.

### 32.—SALVAGE CANVASS:

### 2.—W.V.S. REPRESENTATION ON COMMITTEE:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Borough Organiser of the Women's Voluntary Services stating that Mrs. E. M. Thwaites had resigned her position in the organisation, and that at a meeting of the Area Organisers it had been proposed that Miss J. Lawless should be appointed as the W.V.S. representative on the Committee.

### 3.—APPOINTMENT OF STAFFING SUB-COMMITTEE:

The Committee reconsidered the constitution of the Staffing Sub-Committee which was referred back by the Council on the 28th February (Resolution No. 127), and in view of Section 85 of the Local Government Act, 1933, which requires that at least two-thirds of the members of every committee shall be members of the Local Authority, it was

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That a Staffing Sub-Committee be appointed, consisting of the Chairman (Councillor F. J. Collins), Councillors (Mrs.) D. M. Banwell, F. H. Bate and W. A. Hicks, Mrs. R. S. Holt and Mrs. A. M. Lesty, and that such Sub-Committee be vested with power to act.

#### 4.—MOBILE CANTEEN SERVICE:

The Chief Officer Meals Service submitted a letter from the Assistant Divisional Food Officer, dated the 10th instant, stating that the Ministry of Food must adhere to its original attitude that it cannot, in view of the existing demand for transport, support the provision of a van for the above-mentioned purpose. The Assistant Divisional Food Officer pointed out, however, that some other boroughs had inaugurated such schemes, but presumably they were able to provide their own vehicles. If the Council, for example, were able to obtain from the L.C.C. one of the redundant canteens recently offered, they would be in a position to start the service, and the Ministry of Food would offer no objection.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND — That (a) the Borough Engineer be authorised to purchase a suitable vehicle for the delivery of hot meals in containers, and (b) the Ministry of Food be requested to approve the cost as a capital charge subject to reimbursement.

### 5.-LETTING OF RESTAURANTS:

Pursuant to the Committee's instructions (14.2.44—11) the Chief Officer Meals Service reported that the following additional labour would be required for a restaurant let for evening use:—

### (a) Cleaning:

Extra staff hours per day needed for cleaning duty would average 10 (or two persons each working five hours), at a cost of approximately £3.5s, per week. Further staff hours would be required for moving furniture. Men are not available for this work, and the kitchen staffs, which are mainly composed of elderly women, could do it only slowly. On the assumption that the stacking and replacement of tables, etc., would take up a further eight staff hours per day (two persons each working four hours), and that the necessary labour could be obtained, the total additional weekly cost would average between £5 and £6 per restaurant, plus cost of supervision. It is difficult to maintain the number of assistants required for normal work (present staff shortage in five restaurants number 9 full-time and 7 part-time assistants), but if additional staff could be obtained they would have to be engaged for the whole week, even if the restaurant were let for a few evenings only.

### · (b) Supervision:

At five restaurants no member of the staff would be available during the evening to supervise and lock up. From one to three persons might be available at the other three restaurants. The restaurant staffs are composed of elderly women, or women with children, all with homes that require attention in the evening after a hard day's work. In some cases persons, even if willing, could not stay late to lock up, because of the relatively early hour at which the last 'bus leaves for their home district.

Lack of response is, however, mainly due to inability to remain at the restaurant during the evening, after working there all day, and it is felt that if members of the staff were persuaded to work in the evenings the certain result would be a breakdown of staff, with consequent harmful effect on the normal work of the service. In this connection, the Ministry of Food Circular L.W.M.D. 41, dated 27th February, 1942, states that "the normal staff of the British Restaurants must be under no compulsion to serve at evening functions, for extra pay or otherwise, and must not be allowed to volunteer if by so doing they would be rendered unfit for their normal duties." Apart from any other consideration, the staffing position is such that the letting of restaurants during the evenings is not recommended.

In regard to the question of structural alterations, the Borough Engineer reported that before granting the necessary licence for music and dancing, the Middlesex County Council would require the provision of lavatory accommodation for both sexes, entrance and exit doors opening outwards, and a secondary means of lighting. It was further pointed out that the existing black-out would be insufficient for use during the hours of darkness, and light traps would be needed at the doorways. Accommodation would also have to be provided for the storage of the chairs and tables in the restaurant. Compliance with the Middlesex County Council's requirements might be effected in the case of the two church halls used as British Restaurants if the difficulties relating to black-out and storage could be overcome.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in regard to the letting of British Restaurants for the purposes of meetings or entertainments.

The deficiencies in the heating arrangements at these nurseries have been considered by the Medical Officer of Health and the Borough Engineer, and on their recommendation the Committee decided (a) that a second solid fuel stove be provided in the Claremont Road extension, and that, in the meantime, an electric fire be purchased to supplement the present heating in the colder weather; and (b) that an electric fire be purchased to make good the deficiency in the heating of the new nursery at York Park during the colder weather. The heating in the corridors of both nurseries is inadequate, and the Committee have authorised an application to the Ministry of Health for approval to the installation of electric tubular heating units to be fixed to the walls at high level.

### 6.-YORK PARK NURSERY:

The Committee have approved an estimate of £2 10s, for fixing a wicket-gate to the door opening of the new wash-room in York Park Nursery.

### 2.—CAMDEN SCHOOL PLAYING FIELDS:

The Committee has considered a letter from the Clerk to the Governors of the Camden School, intimating that the school had returned from evacuation to London, and that it was in urgent need of the full use of its playing field at Burnt Oak. In these circumstances the school authorities ask for the release of the playing field, which is at present utilised for the purpose of war-time allotments. The land in question was requisitioned under the Cultivation of Lands Order (Allotments), 1939, by the Council as agents for the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, and 51 out of the 53 plots are tenanted. It has been decided to inform the school authorities that the Council regrets it is unable to release the land.

### 3.—CRESSINGHAM ROAD:

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The Committee has considered a request from the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies for the repair of the fencing at Abbots Road entrance to the above allotments, together with the supply of one padlock and key. The estimated cost of such work is £5. It has been agreed to under take the necessary repairs to the fencing and to provide a padlock and key.

### 4.-EDGWAREBURY PARK ALLOTMENTS:

The Borough Surveyor has reported on a request from the Federation for the fencing round the wardens' post and the entrance gate to be repaired, and the rubbish removed from plot 5. The Committee has given authority for the necessary work to be undertaken.

### 5.—FRITH MANOR:

The Borough Surveyor has reported on a letter from the Frith Manor and District Allotments Association asking for an extension of the water supply and the provision of a new latrine. It has been decided to inform the Association that the Council are unable to provide an extension of the water supply, and that the necessary repairs will be undertaken to the existing latrine.

### 6.-COOL OAK LANE:

The Borough Surveyor has submitted an estimate amounting to £58 for an extension of the water supply at the above allotments. A modified scheme for an extension of the water supply, amounting to an estimated cost of £25 to £30, has been approved, and authority given for the necessary works to be carried out.

### 7.-12, BRENTMEAD PLACE, GOLDERS GREEN:

The Borough Treasurer has reported on a further application made by the Halifax Building Society for the release of the garden at the above property, in view of the impending sale of the premises situate thereon. An inspection has been made of the site, and it would appear that no attempt has been made to cultivate the garden as an allotment, and in these circumstances the Committee has decided to request the Ministry of Agriculture to authorise the release of the land in question.

### 8.-HENDON SHOW:

The Borough Treasurer has submitted a report with regard to the possibilities of organising a Hendon Show during 1944, and the Committee has deferred consideration of the matter until a future date.

#### 1.—AIR RAID INCIDENTS:

The Committee has reviewed detailed reports on the operations of the Council's Civil Defence Services, both locally and in support of services operating in other areas, in connection with recent air-raid incidents. The Committee was impressed by the efficient manner in which all sections discharged their duties under the capable leadership of the heads of the Services, and has placed on record its appreciation of the effective assistance rendered by all Services. The Committee has also noted with satisfaction a communication from the Rev. S. Maurice Watts, of the Union Church, Mill Hill, expressing great admiration of the work of the Civil Defence Services at an incident in the Borough, and referring to many expressions of appreciation heard by bias of the magnificent, untiring and unselfish manner in which the personnel carried out their duties, and of gratitude for the prompt help of the Town Hall staff in the matters of food, removal of furniture, attention to damaged houses, provision of coupons, money and rehousing. Expressions of appreciation of services rendered have also been received from neighbouring Authorities.

The Committee has directed that a communication should be sent to the Home Office in regard to certain matters connected with the operation of the National Fire Services in connection with a recent incident.

The Committee's attention has been drawn to the satisfactory manner in which a 24-person surface shelter (communal type) withstood the effects of a bomb which fell approximately 35 ft. from the shelter. Although the shelter was moved bodily two or three inches, it sustained minor damage only, and was not rendered unusable, a few bricks only being displaced, and the tie between the roof and the walls being in no way disturbed. The Committee consider it probable that the public does not appreciate the excellent protection which this type of shelter affords from the effects of high-explosive bombs.

### 2.—WAR SERVICE INJURIES ALLOWANČES:

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The Association of Chief Wardens (London Region) has drawn attention to the difference in the treatment accorded to part-time personnel as compared with full-time personnel in the payment of war service injury allowances. Whole-time members of the Civil Defence Services are entitled to receive the equivalent of full pay during incapacity for work resulting from war service injuries for a period or periods not exceeding 26 weeks in respect of the same injury. Part-time members, however, may receive compensation not exceeding the amount payable to whole-time members in respect of loss of wages due to incapacity for work resulting from a war service injury for a period or periods not exceeding 12 weeks only.

The Association of Chief Wardens has been advised that the Minister of Home Security does not recognise that an anomaly exists, and infers that part-time members who are gainfully occupied, and who earn their living in some other way than as members of the Civil Defence Services are generously treated compared with the wide variety of other forms of national service, in which no provision for the supplementation of injury allowances exists. The duties which Civil Defence personnel are called upon to perform, and the hazards they have to face, in no way vary according to the terms

of their appointment, and it is considered that any who sustain injury in the execution of their duties should be provided for to a like extent, regardless as to whether they are whole or part-time servants. While there is, no doubt, a number of part-time Civil Defence personnel whose terms of civilian employment would cover payment of salary during absence from work in excess of 13 weeks, the Committee is satisfied that the greater percentage is employed on an hourly or piecework basis, thus not enjoying pay during absence for any reason, or are employed by firms not in a financial position to meet wages of employees absent for periods in excess of three months.

The Committee does not think it equitable that after 13 weeks part-time personnel suffering from war service injuries should have to depend upon the meagre benefits accorded to a gainfully-occupied person under the Personal Injuries (Civilians) Scheme, and is therefore urging the Minister to rectify what would appear to be an unfortunate distinction between the two sections of Civil Defence personnel whose obligations differently in the length of duty performed.

### 3.—DECORATION—CIVIL DEFENCE SERVICES:

The Committee is supporting representations being made by the County Borough of East Ham for the award of a general service decoration to members of the Civil Defence Services in recognition of the services rendered by them during the Battle of Britain, 1940-41. In view of the award of the 1939-43 Star to members of the armed forces, it is felt that a claim for a similar decoration might be made by those Civil Defence Services who, during the months of September, 1940, to May, 1941, saw almost continuous action, and rendered service of the highest value, equally worthy of commemoration.

#### 4.—SURRENDER OF CLOTHING COUPONS BY CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL:

In addition to Hendon, 16 other Authorities agreed to support the representations being made to the Board of Trade by the Borough of Edmonton for a reduction in the number of clothing coupons to be surrendered by members of the Civil Defence Services (see Item 2 of Report to Council 17.1.44). The Minister of Home Security, in consultation with the Board of Trade, has referred to difficulties in assessing the possible entitlement of members of the Civil Defence Services by reason of the varying nature of the "extended duties" undertaken by the different sections of the Civil Defence Organisation, and the fact that these duties, in turn, depend upon the incidence of raiding, and he suggests that the problem of wear on underelothing can only be met by purchase, so far as is possible, of appropriate garments, and by recourse, if necessary, to special individual applications to the Board of Trade.

The Borough of Edmonton is endeavouring to arrange for a deputation to wait upon the Board of Trade and the Minister of Home Security in regard to this matter, and the Committee has agreed to give its support.

### -5.—AMBULANCE DEPOT—RECREATIONAL ACCOMMODATION:

The Committee is resisting a proposal by the Ministry of Aircraft Production to take over certain accommodation used by the personnel at one of the Council's ambulance depots (unless alternative accommodation is provided), as this would remove all recreational facilities for the personnel based on that depot.

### \*6.—STORAGE OF SALVAGED FURNITURE:

An authority issued by the Regional Commissioners for the Council to increase the accommodation held in reserve for the storage of furniture salvaged from sites of airraid damage is receiving attention.

### 7.—FIRE PREVENTION:

The members of the public have been informed through the medium of the Press, and by the delivery of a leaflet to all occupiers of residential, business, industrial and

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ster of Home time members than as menwith the wide applementation tre called upon g to the terms Government premises within the Borough, of the local operation of the Fire Guard Plan and the reporting system described therein. Confirmation has been received of the increase from five to seven in the number of wheelbarrow pumps allocated to the Borough, and arrangements for the supply of ladders for each of the wheelbarrow and also trailer pumps.

Schemes for fire-prevention arrangements in respect of 11 business premises in the Borough have been considered and approved.

Two cases in connection with the failure to carry out fire-prevention daties heard at the Hendon Police Court on the 28th February last, resulted in a fine of £3, with an alternative of two months' imprisonment in one case and fines of £1 on each of two summonses, with 10s. 6d. costs, in the other. Authority has been given to the Town Clerk to institute proceedings against a further resident in the Borough for failure to register under the Local Authority Services Order.

### 8.—AIR RAID SHELTERS:

In regard to the broken glasses, it should be noted that there have been several "alert" periods, and a number of these glasses have been broken to permit legitimate entry into shelters.

A request from 39 residents in Homefield Road, Burnt Oak, for the provision of a surface shelter in that road for the use of the residents, has been forwarded for consideration by the Middlesex County Council.

In May, 1941, supplies of blankets kept in shelters were withdrawn, following repeated damage to the store boxes and consequent losses. A similar position has now arisen in connection with the first-aid equipment in the First Aid boxes. A liberally equipped box, which will be available in the event of heavy raiding, will be placed in the neighbourhood of each group of shelters, in addition to which the resources at each of the Wardens' Posts will be available to meet any emergency prior to the arrival of the Ambulance and Rescue Services.

### 9.—INSPECTION OF RESPIRATORS AT SCHOOLS:

In reference to Item 6 of the last Report, arrangements were made for the inspection on the 1st of March of the respirators held by the 707 children attending the Childs Hill School. In view of the short time that could be arranged after school hours for inspection, the customary fitting and minor repairs, in addition to inspection could not be effected. 595 respirators were produced for inspection, and, principally due to damaged face-pieces or need for a larger-sized respirator, adequate protection was lacking in 92 (15 per cent.) instances. The 92 children were instructed to attend at either of the District Wardens' headquarters in "K" and "N" districts for exchange or repairs; 12 only, however, had attended up to the sixth of this month.

The Committee has directed the Chief Warden to carry out similar inspections. etc., at the remaining schools in the Borough, using as many of the wardens personnel as possible for this purpose, and that adequate record should be kept of the holders of defective respirators, in order that the ultimate exchange or repair of the respirator can be confirmed.

In each case the new wage includes the current Joint Industrial Council bonus, plus 2.10d. in the case of head cooks and 3.7d. in the case of assistant cooks. Future increases in Joint Industrial Council bonus will be applied if such bonus has the effect of exceeding the fixed rates mentioned, in which event the fixed rate will be increased to the nearest shilling. The wages proposed are consistent with those paid for similar work in other branches of the Council's service.

With regard to the review of the general position as to the wages paid to the kitchen staff, the Borough Treasurer calls attention to the "Hetherington" Report. This is a report of a Committee appointed "to make recommendations as to the minimum rates of wages and conditions of employment which should be recognised for the purpose of any special arrangements which may be instituted for meeting the needs of hospitals, establishments for the care of young children and of sick, aged or disabled persons, the School Meals Service, and similar organisations, for domestic help," The Hetherington Committee has made recommendations as to wages, etc., to be recognised in certain occurations where rates of wages and conditions of employment are not at present regulated by agreement.

The "Hetherington" wages are not equal to those now being paid by the Council. The only instance in the Council's service where the wages, etc., for domestic help are at present regulated by agreement is that of the British Restaurants, where the wages are regulated by the Joint Industrial Council. The wages paid to cleaners are as fixed by the Joint Industrial Council; other help is paid wages in excess of J.I.C. rates.

It is understood that the Joint Industrial Council will shortly consider the wages of the classes of staff now under discussion, with a view to bringing all branches of domestic help within the scope of their awards.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- That the adjustments in the wages of the kitchen staffs of the British Restaurants, as set out above, be approved and adopted.
- (ii) That the review of the general position as to wages paid to kitchen staff be deferred, pending the receipt of further information from the Joint Industrial Council.

- "(3) Since the Sunday Entertainments Act, 1932, became law, there has not been any-'common informer actions' taken against Sunday concerts, stage plays or variety shows in any Court in the country by any person or persons whatever."

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The Society feels sure that with these facts before the Council the circular letter from the Whitefield Urban District Council, based upon a misapprehension of the facts, will be weighed with due and proper consideration, and appropriate action taken.



The following report was submitted by the Borough Surveyor:-

#### Ministry of Health Circular 14/44.

"In connection with the above Circular, which was issued to Local Authorities on the 21st February, a conference was held at the Ministry of Health on 13th March, to which representatives of all the Local Authorities in Middlesex were invited. A general explanation of the Circular was given by a representative of the Ministry, who explained that the object of the scheme was to utilise the services of contractors and their staffs who were at present engaged on work nearing completion, and the contractors and their men would be available for other purposes.

"The Ministry had decided to use this labour directly it became free for the construction of roads and sewers on housing sites, so that directly materials became available for building purposes there would be no delay in getting to work on the actual construction of the houses. For this purpose it was necessary that Local Authorities should be formed into groups, one Authority acting as group leader, and that there should be one contract between the group leaders and the contractors for the construction of roads and sewers on all available sites within the group.

"It was emphasised that Local Authorities were entirely free to take part in the scheme or not, but in the event of their deciding not to come into a group it was improbable that there would be labour available for them to carry out the work through their own contractors. It was decide at the meeting that there should be a conference of the technical officers of the Local Authoritis in the scheme to explain the details further, and decide whether the Local Authorities within the County could be recommended to take part in the proposals.

"On the 20th March a further meeting was held, consisting of the Borough Engineers to the Local Authorities in Middlesex, at which were two representatives of the Ministry of Health and one of the Ministry of Works. The scheme was discussed in detail, and many technical points desired with which it is not necessary to discuss in this memorandum. It was, however, made quite clar by the Senior Regional Architect that it would be to the advantage of Local Authorities to entering the scheme, to take the opportunity of getting the preliminary work completed on their houses sites. The fact that roads and sewers were constructed under the scheme was not, of course, a guarantee that the building of houses would commence directly afterwards, but Local Authorities who had the preliminary work done would be in a much better position to commence building operations when it was possible to do so. Councils deciding not to come into the scheme might find themselves in an unfortunate position at a later date through being unable to commence house building at the same time as other Authorities who had their sites prepared.

"It was also stated that a model form of agreement between the Local Authorities in a group and a model form of contract between the group leaders and the contractors were in course of preparation, and would be submitted to Local Authorities as soon as possible. Having regard to all the circumstances of the case, the conference fel; that, subject to the Councils approving the terms of the agreement and contract, and other documents to be submitted, Local Authorities would be well advised to take part in the scheme, in order to accelerate the construction of houses at a later date. It was also decided that as regards the County of Middlesex it would facilitate the arrangements if the County were divided into two separate groups, the boundaries of each group coinciding with the boundaries of the North Middlesex Joint Town Planning Committee and the Westminster Joint Town Planning Committee,

"The conference also decided that one Borough Engineer in each group should act temporarily as chairman of a technical committee to deal with the preparation of the necessary data which would have to be submitted to the Ministry of Health. It was emphasised by the representative of the Ministry of Health that the first step was to obtain a decision from the Local Authorities as to whether they were prepared to co-operate in the group or not, and if possible this decision was desired within a period of fourteen days."

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

### 1. REPORT OF CONFERENCE OF CHIEF OFFICERS:

#### Conference of Chief Officers, held on the 29th March, 1944.

Present: Borough Engineer and Surveyor, Medical Officer of Health, Director of Education, Chief Librarian, Town Clerk.

In considering any scheme for the post-war development of the Borough, we feel that at the present time any proposals must of necessity be purely of a preliminary character. The extent of the problem to be faced will not be apparent until the Government has settled its policy with regard to the redistribution of industrial development.

While the provision of houses will be one of the most pressing needs, these must not be provided at such a distance from places of work as to involve difficult transport problems. The requirements of industry will largely decide the centres of population, and upon the distribution of population will depend the distribution of services. It is, however, appreciated that so far as this Borough is concerned there is very little land which remains to be developed.

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of the Golders a further course a partment at the partment of overline We have had before us the proposals of the various Committees, with the exception of the Works and Fire Brigade Committee, which has not yet reported. Those proposals appear to be based on the assumption that the future development of the Borough will proceed on lines very similar to those prevailing in the past, regard being had to existing Town Planning restrictions. They form a Peneral outline which can well serve as a basis for operations in the years immediately following the termination of hostilities. None of the proposals of the several Committees condict, and they are capable of suitable co-ordination as development proceeds. New factors may, however, present themselves, and, in any case, it will be essential to ascertain the intentions of adjoining Authorities in order that the best results may be attained.

We draw attention to certain matters which apparently have not as yet been dealt with by the appropriate Committees. The list is not, of course, exhaustive, and other matters may from time to time arise.

- (a) Civic Centre and Public Hall.—We understand that your Committee have called for a report on this matter.
- (b) Shopping Sites, Community Centres, etc.—It is assumed that where housing estates of sufficient size are developed, shopping centres for basic trades, community centres, sites for schools, play spaces for children, and any other necessary amenities will be provided. These sites can only be determined when the detailed development plans are prepared.
- (c) Swimming Baths.—We feel that future development plans should provide for further swimming-baths, including a closed bath, and doubtless this question will be considered by the Works and Fire Brigade Committee.
- (d) Young People's Colleges.—In view of the educational developments which are envisaged in the new Education Bill, it appears that it will be necessary to provide two Young People's Colleges, each occupying a site of some 12 acres. It is, however, not at present possible to decide on actual sites, but doubtless the need will be borne in mind.
- (e) Education Proposals.—It is pointed out that the provision with regard to education is based on the present school population, a school-leaving age of 15 years, and classes of 40 children. In the event of an increase in the school population, a reduction in the size of classes and the raising of the age of compulsion to 16, it will be appreciated that further provision will become necessary.

### 2. POST-WAR DEVELOPMENT PROPOSALS OF THE SEVERAL COMMITTEES OF THE COUNCIL:

We have received and considered the following reports indicating the post-war development proposals of the several Committees. Our observations follow the respective reports:—

#### LIBRARIES COMMITTEE.

#### Report of the Chief Librarian approved by the Committee 7.2.1944.

Following are the chief points for consideration in formulating a policy for post-war development of the Library Service:—

- General.—While the provision of housing accommodation will have priority in the reconstruction period
  immediately following the war, when new houses have been built and occupied residents will soon
  press for facilities that can be provided by a good library service.
- 2. Demands on the present partly-developed system are likely to be much heavier after than before the war. This statement is supported by the fact that 32 per cent. of the ration-book population are now borrowing books, compared with 29 per cent. of the estimated population in 1939. It is true that total resident membership has fallen slightly (from 47,000 to 43,000), but there has been 3 greater proportionate fall in population. As total circulation is as high as it has ever been, despite the fall in membership, it is clear that borrowers now read more books per head than before the war.
- 3. A large group of keen readers has been lost to the libraries through enlistment in the Forces, and their return to civil life will almost certainly result in a big increase in membership and use of looks, apart from increases that would follow the provision of more libraries. Hence the need for providing for extensions at the Central and Golders Green Libraries mentioned hereafter in this report. The provision of new branches is not likely to ease congestion at these two buildings.
- 4. It is therefore considered that post-war development should be directed towards (i) restoring the bomb-damaged Mill Hill library; (ii) extending the system of branch libraries, to afford an adequate service to all parts of the Borough, and (iii) enlarging the Central and Golders Green Libraries. It is also suggested that steps should be taken to establish a local museum.
- 5. The need for restoring the library at Mill Hill calls for no further comment, but before discussing the other proposals some consideration should be given to the service area of a library and selection

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- i. Service Area of a Library .- In Hendon the maximum radius of influence of a library may be placed at one mile. This, however, may be extended for a short distance on either side of good transport routes that converge on or pass the library. It is contracted where there is any obstacle (such as a railway or open space) tending to isolate a district that may be within the mile radius.
- 7. The point is illustrated at the Central Library, used by about one-third of the combined population of Central and Park Wards. At West Hendon, on the other hand, the percentage for the whole ward is only 15, reduced to 7 in the district nearest to Burnt Oak.
- s. Sites. Formerly it was customary to assume that a site in the most central position should be sought, but experience has shown that this may not be the best policy. The ideal site is one situated at the best tradic and shopping centre in the district. A library is as dependent as a shop upon position for its success, and an inconvenient site may prove to be a bad bargain.
- 9. Burnt Oak .- In April, 1939, the Council approved the purchase of a portion of the unused part of land at Wattley Centre for the purpose of a branch library. The Borough Surveyor states that negotiations were suspended at the outbreak of war and have not since been resumed.
- 10. After Mill Hill Library was damaged in 1940, children's libraries were opened in the Broadway, Mill Hill, and Watling Centre. Experience of operating the latter has raised doubts whether the vacant land adjoining the Centre would provide the best site for a library. Attendances of children and issues of books are less than half those at The Broadway. Following are the figures for 1943:-

The Broadway 95.593 vols. Watling Centre 33,747 vols.

- 11. Experience with adults might be similar, although larger attendances of both children and adults might be achieved in a properly planned and equipped building. On the other hand, a library situated at or near the junction of Watling Avenue and Orange Hill Road would get maximum use. Its service area would include not only Watling Estate, but also a considerable part of Colindal2, because of good transport facilities and the attractions of Washing Avenue as a shopping centre. The proportion of residents attracted to Watling Centre is probably small compared with those drawn to the shops in Watling Avenue. If there is difficulty in securing a site on the main thoroughtare, a relatively narrow frontage leading to a more roomy plot at the back would suffice.
- 12. The site, if possible, should be big enough for a building with adult and junior lending departments, an intermediate department, reference room, a story-hour or lecture room, staff and storage rooms, etc. The intermediate department would be an innovation, but with a trained assistant in charge it should be a useful addition to the service in Burnt Oak, where there is scope for co-operation with local youth clubs, discussion groups, and other activities in library work with young people.
- 13. Edgware.—In 1937 the Council, having regard to the anticipated development of Edgware, decided to reserve a site for a branch library at the junction of Spur Road and Watford By-Pass. This site has not yet been acquired, and the Borough Surveyor states that it will not be possible to carry out the acquisition until the plans for the development of the land in this area, vested in All Souls College, are completed. He does not, however, anticipate any difficulty in obtaining a site in the position indicated.
- 14. The service area of a library in this position would cover Station Road district. One at Station Road-say, where Edgeworth Restaurant is situated-would provide for Edgware as at present developed, but would overlap the service area of Mill Hill Branch.
- 15. If development of Edgware after the war proceeds according to pre-war plans, then the proposals for a library at Spur Road should be maintained. It would lead to dissipation of resources to provide two libraries for Edgware, one at Spur Road and another at Station Road. One large branch to serve a given area is more economical to run, and gives better service than two small ones.
- 16. The site, when bought, should be big enough for a building containing adult and junior lending departments, a larger reference-room than at Mill Hill (because of the distance from the Central Library), an intermediate department, a story-hour or lecture room, staff and storage rooms, etc.
- 17. Woodside Park (Frith Manor).-A site for this area has been purchased, and is available for library purposes after its temporary use for war-time allotments is terminated. It is not, however, necessary to build until further housing development has taken place and the population is much greater than at present.
- 18. In 1937 the Council entered into a reciprocal arrangement which enables Woodside Park residents to use Finchley public libraries. At present 420 Woodside Park residents are enrolled at Finchley. With this, and the mobile library service mentioned below, the needs of the district could be met until further development justifies the erection of a library building,
- 19. Golders Green.-The percentage of population enrolled as members of Golders Green Branch averages about 40 in Golders Green and Garden Suburb Wards and only 20 in Childs Hill Ward. before the war this library, small as it is in floor space, was included among the 16 busiest urban libraries in London and Greater London. It has long been apparent that the building is too small

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for its present use, and that considerable congestion and inconvenience to readers occurs at busy periods. There is, therefore, urgent need for extension in order to provide for a larger leading fibrary, an intermediate room, and other desirable improvements. Extension is possible only if certain property adjoining the library is purchased.

- 20. Central Library.—It is considered that this building should be extended and rearranged to provide for the following:—
  - (a) A larger lending department, giving more clbow room for borrowers and more shelving for books,
  - (b) A bigger book store for lending and reference reserve stock.
  - (c) A properly equipped work-room for cataloguing, order and school fibrary sections, preparation of books for circulation, repair of books, typing staff, etc.
  - (d) A larger staff rest-room, with kitchen.
- 21. Childs Hill.—Parts of this ward, namely, in the West and Central Polling Districts, are not well served by Golders Green Branch. Nevertheless, it is not considered that the creetion of a library would be justified, chiefly because of there being no large concentration of population or good stopping centre. As far as Cricklewood itself is concerned, it is not thought that the number of reders would justify a branch, which, if creeted, would have to be so near the boundary of the Borough at to be almost on top of the Cricklewood branch of the Willesden Public Libraries in Olive Road.
- 22. The Council pays the sum of £15 per annum to Willesden, to enable Childs Hill residents to use the Olive Road library, and this, coupled with the proposal to provide a book van, should suffice for this area.
- 23. Mobile Library Service: Pending the provision of buildings at Burnt Oak, Edgware and Woodside Park, and in order to supply the needs of Childs Hill, Colindale and other outlying parts of the Borough, it is suggested that a book van should be provided. A similar service is operated in St. Paacras and most of the county libraries. A widespread area of Hendon makes suitable the institution of this form of library service.
- 24. Local Museum: It is suggested that Church End Farm, recently acquired by the Corporation, should be carmarked as a local museum, for the exhibition of material selected from the local collection. This collection now numbers nearly 5,000 items, of which 1,750 are prints and photographs, 250 water-colours and pastel drawings, 900 deeds and manuscrips, and 250 maps of Hendon and Middlesex. The number suitable for exhibition is such that frequent changes would be possible, and the interest of the public thus sustained.
- 25. The farmhouse is itself of some local importance as a survival from the past. It is said to be one of the oldest in the parish, and has been listed by the Royal Commission on Historical Monuments in its "Inventory of the Historical Monuments in Middlesex."
- 26. The building, when reconditioned, would make an appropriate setting for the pictorial and other records of the history of Hendon now stored at the Central Library, where they are seldom seen by the public, and then only in very small selections.

#### 27. Summary of Recommendations.

#### (a) Purchase of Land.

- (i) At or near junction of Watling Avenue and Orange Hill Road, for a branch library for Burst Oak. If a site is not available in this neighbourhood, part of the unused land at Watling Centre.
- (ii) At or near the junction of Spur Road and Watford By-Pass, for a branch library for Edgward, when plans for development of the land are completed.
- (iii) Adjoining the Golders Green Branch Library, for extension of the building.

For (i) and (iii) it is suggested that the Corporation's powers for compulsory purchase of land should be exercised at a not too distant date.

#### (b) Buildings.

- (i) Restoration of Mill Hill Branch Library.
- (ii) Erection of branch libraries at Burnt Oak, Edgware and Woodside Park.
- (iii) Extensions to Golders Green and Central Libraries.

## (e) Mobile Library Service.

Provision of a library book-van as soon as possible after the end of the war, to serve districts beyond the reach of existing libraries.

### (d) Church End Farm.

Reconditioning and appropriation of the farmhouse for use as a Local Museum.

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#### Observations

- 27 (a) (i) Site for a library in Burnt Oak,-It is recommended that the site at the junction of Watling Avenue and Orange Hill Road be tentatively approved.
- Mobile Library Service.-This proposal has been duly noted, but it would appear to be a matter for implementation by the Libraries Committee at the appropriate time.
- Church End Farm -Suggested appropriation for use as a Local Museum.-We are of opinion 27 (d) that this proposal should be considered when the question of the use to which the building is to be put is considered by the appropriate Committee.

## PUBLIC HEALTH AND MEDICAL SERVICES COMMITTEE.

Report of the Medical Officer of Health approved by the Committee 7/2/44.

In accordance with the instructions of the Committee, I have prepared the following proposals for consideration. It will be appreciated, however, that the post-war developments of health and medical services generally is at present receiving the consideration of the Government, and it may be that the White Paper, which is expected in the near future, will affect these proposals to a considerable extent, as may also, of course, the question of the future control of local government in general. Assuming, however, that conditions are not fundamentally altered, the following appears to me to be the proposals which should receive the consideration of this Committee:-

#### Health Centres:

- 1. A new health centre to be provided for the Edgware area,
- 2. Subsidiary centres to be built, mainly for maternity and child welfare, to replace the arrangements which are now in force by which the sessions are held in existing church halls in the following districts: -

Temple Fortune. Frith Manor. Colindale.

Holders Hill. Broadfields.

- 3. Subsidiary centres for the Westcroft Estate, and where new housing estates of sufficient size and remote from existing centres are developed.
- 4. The situation regarding the Central Hendon Centre also requires consideration, as, while it is an adequate and well-planned centre, it is of temporary material.

#### Day Nurseries:

The future policy regarding the care of children under five years of age has, of course, not yet been defined. It is probable that the two-five year old age group will be admitted to nursery classes at the public elementary schools where there is a real demand.

Assuming that it is considered desirable to provide accommodation for a younger age group, this, in my view, could most efficiently and economically be made by the extension of existing health centres. The Committee will, however, be aware that day nurseries have in fact been erected, and premises adapted for this purpose, the use of which will depend largely on the policy pursued by the Government in this connection.

#### Isolation Hospital:

Here, again, the future of the hospital services throughout the country has not been defined. I believe that hospitals capable of extension, such as the Isolation Hospital, will be asked to provide for a wider area, and be extended accordingly. The following, however, should be given consideration, irrespective of the general policy:-

- 1. The re-establishment of the existing cubicle block,
- 2. The rebuilding of the damaged portion of Block 1.
- 3. The provision of additional cubicle accommodation, with small surgical unit for such surgery as has to be undertaken in the treatment of infectious diseases, and where operative treatment for tonsils and adenoids, now carried out by arrangement with other hospitals, could also be undertaken.
- 4. The adaptation and modernisation of the existing administrative accommodation, with the addition of a nurses' home, should this prove necessary.
- 5. The extension of the laundry.
- 6. The rebuilding of the lodge.

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- 7. The provision of housing accommodation for the Resident Medical Officer and such members of the male staff whose duties make it necessary for them to be on eall.
- 8. The provision of additional storage accommodation.

#### Ambulance Station:

The Committee will be aware that the general ambulances are at present being operated by Civil Defence personnel, but will almost certainly fall to be dealt with by Corporation staff after the Civil Defence personnel have been demobilised. There are four such ambulances and two maintained for the removal of infectious diseases. The provision of an ambulance station will, therefore, be necessary to house the existing general ambulances and the infectious diseases ambulances, which could be provided either at the Isolation Hospital or, possibly more adequately, at a central point within the Borough.

#### Observations.

Subsidiary Health Centres.—We agree in principle with the proposals as to the provision of subsidiary health centres, and recommend: That the Chairman of the Public Health and Medical Services Committee, the Medical Officer of Health and the Borough Engineer confer, with a view to submitting suggestions as to suitable sites for the purposes in question.

Day Nurseries and Isolation Hospital.—We have deferred consideration of these items until such time as the future policy of the Government is defined.

Ambulance Service.—We are of opinion that the ambulance service would be more satisfactorily and efficiently operated by the provision of two ambulance stations, one to be located in the northest and the other in the southern portion of the Borough. We have indicated to the Borough Engineer sites which may be considered suitable for the purpose.

#### HOUSING COMMITTEE.

Report of the Housing Manager: Approved by the Committee 7/2/44.

#### Post - War Development.

Referring to your Minute No. 17 of 31st January, 1944, I have to report, with regard to the post-war housing development, that applications for accommodation are being received at present at the rate of about 100 per month. Although a certain proportion are made by persons requiring to be temporarily rehoused, owing to war-time emergencies, the majority are from young married people, who will remain in Hendon, and who have not been able to find separate accommodation on marriage

The number of houses that will require to be provided by the Council depends to a great extent on the post-war industrial position in the Borough and the general planning and development as a whole.

There are at the present time some 1350 applications on the waiting list, 1010 from people having the necessary qualifications of five years residence in Hendon and at least one child; in additional applications are now being accepted from persons without these qualifications, and these number of present 341.

It is most important at this stage, when the first year's housing building programme is already under consideration, that a decision should be made as to the various types of houses that are required. This can be determined from information regarding the size and types of families to be dealt with I have therefore analysed all the applications as follows:—

Although a standard of occupation based on "permitted numbers" has been laid down in the Housing Acts, this standard is often unsatisfactory in practice, and allows for the occupation of two-bedroom houses by persons having mixed families. This has been avoided as far as possible on the Hendon estates, increased accommodation being offered to families wherever possible when the need arises. Conversely, families whose numbers have decreased have been offered smaller houses.

In arriving at the types of houses required, I have allowed for the following standard:-

- 1. One bedroom for husband and wife.
- 2. Sexes separate when one child is over 10 years.
- 3. Not more than three under 10 years in any bedroom.

At the same time, it is assumed that the families in category A are all prospective parents. The demand for anything larger than 3-bedroom parlour houses is small. I suggest that the majority of 3-bedroom houses to be built should be of the parlour type, and that a certain number of 2-bedroom parlours should be included in the programme; there are at present none; families in categories D and E above usually require more than one living room, and the parlour can be used as a bedroom, if desired.

As far as a choice between living in a house or flat is concerned, there are very few families who will prefer the flat, though it may be necessary to build a certain number in order to provide sufficient accommodation in the areas where it is most needed. I suggest that any flats built should be of the two-bedroom type only; when families become too large for these flats they should be granted a house. This filtering has taken place successfully in the present two-bedroom flats, and there are very few families who wish to continue in a flat when the family requires more than two bedrooms.

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Aged Persons.—Although there are at present a few applications from aged persons, this is no indication of lack of demand, but is probably due to the fact that no provision has so far been made for them. Suitable dwellings should be included in the general scheme of the estates, provided, of course, there is ready access to shops and means of transport.

Survey of Tenancies of Council Houses.—A survey of tenancies on all the estates has recently been made. Owing to war-time conditions, certain tenants have their married sons and daughters residing with them temporarily, while in other cases overcrowding will arise when various members of the families return from serving in the Forces. There are, at the present time, 53 houses and data suitable for families with children but occupied by married couples (chiefly aged) or by single persons. While a further 57 houses are occupied by families who do not require the accommodation provided, there are 37 cases of statutory overcrowding, and 79 families are occupying two-bedroom houses with children of different sexes, requiring additional rooms.

The following summary shows the number and types of houses that will be released or required if the necessary transfers are made:—

Estates Generally .- The Government is at present erecting demonstration houses from which the post-war houses are to be evolved, but the following information based on experience of housing estates in Hendon may be taken into consideration when the more detailed plans are being made. A recent enquiry on the subject of the design of dwellings was based on questionnaires to tenants and house managers, 150 tenants on the Hendon estates taking part. They were carefully selected on a sample basis, in such a way as to give a fair cross-section of (i) different income groups, (ii) different types of family, ranging from the large family down to the aged couple. Much information has thus been obtained from your own tenants, and as this is related to their experience of living in houses on the present estates, a certain amount of it may be of value when considering the design and planning of future houses. These points are dealt with in the following paragraph.

Position of Estates.-The choice of sites must, of course, be considered in relation to the planning of the Borough as a whole, but where land near shopping centres and means of transport can be made available for housing, such as clearance areas, the majority of families will be far more satisfactorily rehoused than they can ever be on such estates as Dole Street and Clitterhouse, unless, of course, the estates are to be large enough to be provided with their own shops and proper transport and recreational facilities. Some form of community centre should be included in the plan of every new cottage estate, unless it is adjacent to a centre of communal life, in which case it naturally forms part of the larger community.

Relation of Housing Estates to Shops,-The majority of tenants consider a quarter to half mile as a reasonable walking distance to shops, and where the estate is further away there is a demand for a frequent 'hus service running right on to the estate. Frequent complaints as to the lack of shopping facilities are made by those living at Dole Street and Clitterhouse, where, although there are small groups of shops in the vicinity, there is no direct access to a large shopping centre. Tenants of other estates are satisfied.

Natural Amenities.—Appreciation is shown throughout for trees, shrubs and other natural ameni-The tenants also consider as very desirable planted corners of shrubs and grass (90 per cent. of those answering wanted them).

Roads .- The majority (over 80 per cent.) prefer to live in a quiet through road with little traffic, rather than in a cul-de-sac, which less than 18 per cent, favoured this preference is ;the same whether they now live in a busy road, quiet road, or cul-de-sac.

Gardens .- On the whole, tenants are satisfied with the size and shape of their present gardens, but want more privacy, chiefly in their back gardens, by having (a) better fencing: (b) better arrangement of paths. High bourded fences for a few feet between the backs of houses should be

Paths .- Over half are dissatisfied, chiefly owing to (a) bad surface; (b) arrangement of paths: those to middle houses of blocks running through the neighbours' gardens far too near to the houses; paths at the ends of the back gardens or through archways in the middle of the blocks are preferred.

Sheds .- Every house should be provided with a shed in the back garden for tools, prams, bicycles, etc.

Allotments.—Gardens should be supplemented, when desired, by allotments on a piece of land specially set aside for this purpose, as near as possible to every housing estate. This would also contribute towards giving the estate an open outlook and a sense of space, which is greatly appreciated by tenants.

#### Heating and Cooking:

- (i) Living Rooms.-Of tenants with (a) open coal fire in living room (Dole Street Estate), all are satisfied, without exception. Of tenants with (b) inter-oven stoves (other estates), nearly half are dissatisfied, and the majority of these would prefer open coal fires (out of a choice of eight heating methods). Stoves and ranges in living rooms are extravagant, and seldom used for cooking by tenants.
- (ii) Parlours.-78 per cent, satisfied with present form of heating, i.e., by open coal fire, but the fireplace is often too small, and placed in an awkward position. Parlours should be heated by open
- (iii) Bedrooms.-75 per cent, dissatisfied with present heating of bedrooms. There should be provision for heating in all bedrooms, one of which should have a coal fire. All rooms should be provided with gas or electric points.
- (iv) Water and Scullery .- An independent boiler in the scullery is much preferred both by those who have them at present (Dole Street), and also by those who now have a back boiler to the living room fire. Water should be heated by means of an independent boiler in the scullery, with a

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hot-water cylinder and main storage tank fixed in a cupboard on the first floor room above; this could be used as an airing cupboard. It is economical and useful for rubbish disposal, and it will no longer be necessary to have a fire in the living room in summer in order to obtain hot water

(v) Cooking.-94 per cent, wished to cook by gas or electricity, and only 6 per cent, favoured coal

#### Planning of Rooms:

#### Living Room, Parlour and Scullery.

(i) Use.—There is a definite demand for an increased proportion of parlour-type houses, 82 per cent, of those not having parlours wanted one. Where a parlour is not provided, the scullery should be large enough to use for meals. In parlour houses only 9 per cent, eat in the scullery, 91 per cent, eat in the living-room, and the majority of these are satisfied. In non-parlour houses 32 per cent, eat in the scullery, 68 per cent, eat in the living-room; but the majority are dissatisfied, and many ask specifically for a larger scullery.

#### (ii) Size .-

Living Room: 71 per cent, both from parlour and non-parlour houses are satisfied. For a medium sized family it is desirable that the living-room should be at least 180 sq. ft.; although it might be slightly less for a small dwelling, it should be considerably increased for a large one.

Parlour: 69 per cent, having a parlour find it too small. It is desirable that the size of the parlour should not be less than 140 sq. ft.

Scullery: 73 per cent. from both parlour and non-parlour houses consider their sculleries too small. For a medium-sized family it is desirable that the scullery should not be less than  $100\,$  sq.ft. clear of cupboard space; where there is no parlour it should be larger.

(iii) Arrangement of Rooms.—In many cases the living-room is placed between the scullery and the front door and staircase, necessitating its use as a passage, which is much disliked. The arrangement of the living-room and scullery both opening off the hall is much preferred.

Bedrooms: All bedrooms should be large enough to take two beds. The smallest should not be less than  $95~\mathrm{sq.}$  ft.

Bathroom: Less than 32 per cent. satisfied. The majority need a larger, and especially a wider, bathroom, and prefer it to be upstairs (over half have downstair bathrooms at present). Bathrooms should not be less than 60 sq. ft., assuming a separate w.c., and should be, as far as possible, rectangular but wide. The bath should be encased to prevent dust getting behind and under it, and there should be a hand-basin fitted in every bathroom.

W.C.: This should be separate from the bathroom. Only 46 per cent, wanted it to be upstairs.

Storage Room: There is a general need for the provision of adequate cupboards in bedrooms and sculleries, and also for airing cupboards.

#### Generally.

There are many further details with regard to construction, fittings, plumbing and ventilation, which reflect themselves in the subsequent cost of maintenance. It will, however, he more apprepriate to examine these when a decision has been reached as to the types of materials and methods of construction that are to be adopted.

#### Programme.

I feel that it would be useless at this stage to attempt to set out a programme of Council houses to be built, as so much depends on the future course of development of the Borough and the potential maximum population capable of being accommodated in the area in all types of dwelling whether provided by the Council or by private enterprise. For the time being, I consider it enough to indicate the type of dwelling necessary. The number of units of each type and the final programme thus becomes a mere matter of arithmetic in relation to the character of the Borough as a whole.

We have no observations to make on the Report.

## ESTATES, PARKS AND ALLOTMENTS COMMITTEE.

17th March, 1944.

## 1. PARKS AND OPEN SPACES:

The Committee considered the following report submitted by the Borough Surveyor:-

## The Post-War Development of Parks and Open Spaces.

In order to consider and define a post-war policy in connection with the provision of public open space, it is necessary to have in mind the standards which have been adopted by the Corporation in connection with the Town Planning Schemes which are at present operative in the Borough. The standard then adopted as applying to modern residential development was a figure of seven acros per thousand of the ultimate population. Assuming that the remainder of the Borough is developed in accordance with the provisions of the Planning Schemes in operation, it may be anticipated that the ultimate population of the Borough will not exceed a figure of 200,000. On the standard given above, this population will require a total of 1,400 acres of open space, suitably allocated between ornamental parks, playing fields, and natural open spaces not requiring special treatment. Having regard to the position of Hendon in relation to the Metropolis, it is essential that this standard should be fully maintained.

It is also desirable that ample provision should be made for the establishment of a "green belt," designed to separate Greater London from the satellite towns which are already showing signs of development in the adjacent county. It should be realised that the "green belt," although forming part of the open spaces of the Borough, will not necessarily be wholly available for public use. Parts of it are likely to be used for agricultural purposes for many years to come.

I have prepared a map of the Borough (No. 1752), which I submit herewith, showing, in green colour, the existing open spaces of all types, which have a total area of 1,458 acres. The map also indicates the areas reserved in the Planning Schemes for future open spaces, but which have not yet been acquired by the Corporation. In addition, I have indicated certain additional areas which I suggest should be acquired in due course. These acquisitions are necessary either to secure the continuity of the "Green Belt" across the northern boundary of the Borough, or are specially suitable for open space by reason of their exceptional altitude and for the views afforded over the London area.

If the Committee adopt the suggestions put forward, the final position regarding open spaces will be as follows:

This provision of open space would be equal to 8.9 acres per thousand of the estimated population, and cannot be considered as in excess of modern requirements, particularly having regard to the position of the Borough in relation to the County of London.

RESOLVED-That the Report of the Borough Surveyor be approved and submitted to the Special (Post-War Development) Committee, with a recommendation that provision be made, if possible, for children's playing grounds in various areas of the Borough.

It may be assumed that circumstances, after the termination of the war, will reduce the present number of allottees, but it is difficult to form any estimate of the extent of such reduction or the rate at which it will take place. If in the post-war period a controlled agricultural policy is established by the Government, the provision of market gardens on the outskirts of the greater London area would become an attractive commercial proposition, and may have an important effect on the demand for allotments, and tend to a more rapid reduction in the existing number. On the other hand, it must be assumed that the propaganda carried out during the war period by the Committees concerned will have a permanent effect on the demand for allotments.

I would, therefore, suggest that the Committee should adopt as a post-war planning basis the assumption that the pre-war demand for allotments will be increased by a figure of 50 per cent. The number of pre-war allotments was 2,200, and an increase of 50 per cent. on this figure gives an ultimate demand of 3,300 plots, or an equivalent area of about 220 acres.

I submit the following suggestions for consideration, with a view to providing areas of land reasonably situated for the purpose, and of sufficient extent to meet this anticipated demand:-

As regards the proposed temporary allorments, I suggest these should be taken over for allotment purposes for a period of years, and the situation reviewed at the end of the period.

RESOLVED-That the Report of the Borough Surveyor be approved and submitted to the Special (Post-War Development) Committee, with a recommendation that provision be made for an additional 700 allotments on a temporary basis over a period of ten years.

#### Observations.

Parks and Open Spaces:--

We have called for a further report from the Borough Engineer as to the land to be reserved as open spaces and the land to be used as playing grounds.

## Interim Report on Post - War Reconstruction in Education.

#### 1. ASSUMPTIONS:

The following assumptions are made in the opinion that they will be included in the new Education Bill which has been promised for presentation to Parliament during the present year:-

- (a) Education up to 11 + will be Primary.
  - Education over 11 + will be Post-Primary (Higher).
- (b) Hendon will be an "All-Purposes" Authority, administering all stages in education, i.e., possess County Borough powers.
- (c) The school-leaving age will be raised to 15, without exemptions.
- (d) There will be separate Codes and Regulations for Primary and Post-Primary Education, i.e., different staffing standards, building regulations, etc.
- (e) The staffing standard for Post-Primary Schools will be based on one teacher for 30 children.

  To-day in senior schools this is one teacher for 40 children; in infant and junior schools it is one teacher for 48 children; in secondary schools it works out at one teacher for 20 pupils approximately.
- 2. PROBLEM OF NUMBERS (being statistics showing numbers in the 11-12 year group):

(Ages are reckoned at 31st July in the year, because transfers take place at the beginning of the new school year, which begins after the summer holidays.)

It is assumed, therefore, that the number of children in each of the year groups from 11-15 will average 1,550, boys and girls being equal in numbers. Provision must be made for approximately 6,200 children in the Post-Primary organisation. All these children will not, however, complete a full four-years' course. The maximum numbers will be present during the first two mouths of the school year only, because school leaving is legally permitted at the end of the school terms, viz., 31st October, Christmas holidays and Easter holidays. Hence one-fourth only will stay for four complete years, three-fourths for three and three-quarter years, half for three and a-half years, and one-fourth for three and a-quarter years.

Note.—If classes remain at 40, post-primary education is approximately 2,000 places short; if classes are 30 there are 2,750 places short. In any case, there is a shortage of accommodation for boys.

#### 4. HOW TO FILL THE GAP OF 2,750 PLACES:

If post-primary education is to be real and worth while, I feel that classes must be reduced to units of 30. In secondary schools, as at present organised, staffing, inclusive of specialist teachers (music, art, handicraft) is approximately 20 per teacher. This staffing standard should certainly remain in secondary schools, because the age range is 11-16, and 18 in the case of sixth-form students. In other post-primary schools, where the leaving age is 15, the staffing standard should be not less than one teacher to 30 pupils.

### 5. POST-PRIMARY SCHOOLS - SITES AVAILABLE:

- (a) Secondary School sites in the ownership of the Middlesex Education Committee are available at
  - (i) Broadfields-16 acres.
  - (ii) North Circular Road, Claremont Road 13 acres,

#### (b) Pre-War Plans.

The Hendon Education Committee decided before the War-

- (i) To enlarge the Edgware Senior School. Plans were approved by the Board of Education and a tender was accepted. The outbreak of war involved cancellation.
- (ii) To build two senior departments in Claremont Road, on the site of the old sewage farm, one for boys and one for girls. A site of 10.5 acres was transferred from the Town Council to the Education Committee. The scheme as originally planned involved the reorganisation of the whole of the area at present served by All Saints, Wessex Gardens, Childs Hill and Cliticrhouse. All 11 + children were to be transferred to the two new departments. All Saints was to be closed after agreement with the Managers. The outbreak of the war stopped the project.

#### (e) Brent Modern.

This school was planned to cater for an additional housing estate which was projected in the vicinity. It is desirable that a playing space should be allocated, if and when the housing estate is implemented.

#### (d) St. James' R.C. School.

The Dominican Sisters have sufficient land available adjacent to the present school on which to erect additional accommodation.

#### (e) Page Street.

The Education Committee own land at the head of Page Street, adjacent to the railway bridge. The area of the site is 4.96 acres.

This land would prove valuable if extra accommodation were required.

#### 6. PRIMARY SCHOOLS:

- (i) Bell Lane, The Hyde, Burnt Oak and the Garden Suburb Schools would be decapitated with an age range up to 11 + only. All children over 11 + would be absorbed into the most convenient schools in the post-primary system.
- (ii) Sites are available at Frith Manor, Dollis, Clitterhouse and Colindale on which to erect a second department, provided that the numbers of children available warranted the division of the existing school into two separate departments of infants and juniors. The demands on accommodation at Deansbrook have already been met in this way.
- (iii) The only all-standard school remaining in the area would be the St. Agnes' R.C. School. It would be necessary to open negotiations with the Managers. It will be recalled that this school was enlarged and modernised just before war was declared. The intention then was for the Managers of St. Agnes' to combine with an adjacent Roman Catholic parish in Willesden, and provide a joint R.C. school for 11 + children.

#### 7. CONCLUSION:

All the major educational developments, as set out in this Interim Report, were projected and approved by the Education Committee before the declaration of war. In the main, this report is therefore a summary of the pre-war programme of the Committee, adapted to meet the anticipated requirements under the new Education Bill. If Hendon becomes an "All-Purposes" Authority, the rate of progress and the actual implementing of the scheme would be the responsibility of the local Committee.

This site was allocated by the Borough Council, to whom the land belongs, just prior to the declaration of war, but it has not yet been approved by the Board of Education, owing to the war. Application was made to the Board for approval but the Board was not prepared to act during the national emergency.
  - 3. Page Street, Mill Hill-4.96 acres.]

#### Observations.

We have deferred consideration of the foregoing report, pending an indication of the powers in regard to education which will be left to the Council when the Education Bill, now before Parliament, is entered on the Statute Book.

RECOMMENDATION: We recommend that the reports of the several Committees, in so far as they are capable of implementation at the present time, be now referred to the Borough Engineer to submit, in due course, a comprehensive plan showing how the various proposals can be incorporated in a general plan.

#### 3. MUNICIPAL BURIAL GROUND:

The Committee recommend-That provision be made in the Council's post-war development plans for a municipally-owned burial ground.

#### 4. POST-WAR HOUSING-PURCHASE OF LAND:

Ministry of Health Circular 28/44 was submitted, enclosing a copy of a statement made by the Minister of Health in the House of Commons on the 8th March, announcing a number of decisions of the Government on housing policy and legislation, and on the measures to be taken to ensure that local authorities can start building houses immediately the war in Europe is over.

Under the Government decision, local authorities are to be enabled—under legislation to be introduced shortly after the Easter Recess—to buy in advance (if necessary under compulsory powers) land required for their housing operations under the Government programme, and the war-time ban on capital expenditure will be relaxed to enable this to be done. It is not the intention at the present time to sanction the purchase of the large areas of land required for a long-term housing programme. These purchases must be deferred pending decisions on the major questions of planning which are still under consideration. Local Authorities will, however, without prejudice to these considerations, now be able to acquire as much land as is required for proposals which they are likely to be able to put in hand for meeting urgent needs in the two years after the war. Care is to be taken to ensure that the sites to be bought are suitably sited in themselves, and do not prejudice future planning policy, and the local authorities' proposals should be referred to the Regional Planning Officer of the Ministry of Town and Country Planning.

The Committee have duly noted the circular, which it is understood will be submitted to the Housing Committee, who are responsible for recommending the acquisition of housing sites.

#### 5. ADJUSTMENT OF BOROUGH BOUNDARIES:

In relation to post-war reconstruction, a letter was submitted from the Willesden Borough Council submitting proposals for an adjustment of the Borough boundaries. This is a matter within the purview of the Finance and General Purposes Committee, and the communication will accordingly to placed before that Committee at its next meeting.

#### II. School Medical Service.

The Committee have noted with satisfaction the following communication from the Board of Education:—

"I am directed to state that the Board have had under consideration a report on the Authority's School Medical Service, made by Dr. Hendorson, one of their Medical Officers, after his recent visit to the area. I am to express the Board's appreciation of the Authority's comprehensive and well-administered medical service, and of the good work being done by the staff."

#### III. Income Scale-School Medical Services.

On the 28th February last the Council approved a revised income scale, to be applied in cornection with the provision of additional nourishment and the reduction or remission of fees under the Maternity and Child Welfare Act, 1918, and the Education Act, 1921.

With regard to the application of the scale to the School Medical Services, a letter was submitted from the Board of Education in the following terms:—

"The Board are glad to learn that the Authority propose to adopt a more generous income scale for use in assessing the charges to be made to parents for the medical treatment and medical supplied to their children. It appears, however, that the scale proposed by the Authority for free provision is as follows:—

It will be seen that in some cases increments for additional children of only 4s. and 4s. 3d. are proposed, which are insufficient to cover, on the average, the bare out-of-pocket expenses of maintaining a child. I am therefore to say that, while the scale appropriate to the area is in the first instance a matter for the Authority's determination, the Board would feel difficulty in regarding the proposed scale as satisfactory, and I am to suggest that the Authority should consider revising the scale so as to provide increments of, say, 8s., or at least 7s., in the case of families of more than four in number."

The Committee have referred the matter to the Sub-Committee previously charged with the revision of the income scale, for consideration and report.

# PUBLIC HEALTH AND MEDICAL SERVICES.

(Councillor L. Hirshfield-Chairman.)

# Part I .- Maternity and Child Welfare...

# 20.—CARE OF PREMATURE INFANTS:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on Ministry of Health Circular 20/44, which embodies the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on the welfare of mothers and young children. These recommendations, which concern the domiciliary and institutional care of the premature infant, have been accepted by the Minister, who states, however, that he appreciates it will not be possible for welfare authorities to deal adequately with the matter at the present time, but that they should take such action as is practicable, and bear the outstanding points in mind for future development.

The provision to be made falls into two categories, domiciliary and institutional. It is with the former that this Authority is concerned, and the following recommendations are made in this connection:—

#### Domiciliary.

- (a) A separate bedroom for the mother and infant.
- (b) The provision of adequate and suitable equipment in the home. Where required special equipment for each infant should be lent by the Welfare Authority, and should include draught-proof cots with detachable linings, warm and suitable clothing, hot-water bottles (stone or reliable rubber), electric blanket pads, special feeding bottles, thermometer and mucus catheters.
- (c) A supply of expressed breast milk where this is necessary.
- (d) The services of a pædiatrician.
- (e) The giving of particular attention to the babies by midwives or health visitors, preferably with special training and experience with premature infants.
- (f) The services of a home help.

### Transport.

Some special form of transport is required for the conveyance of the children to hospital, and for this purpose the Committee recommend the use of an ambulance of car, equipped with a supply of oxygen, a heated basket or other carrier, and with a nurse in attendance. As the County Council will be responsible for the institutional provision, that Authority should be responsible for arranging transport. Finally, the Committee recommend that the closest liaison should be maintained between the hospital and the welfare authority, in order that the appropriate officer should follow up insmediately the infant is discharged from hospital to its own home.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the recommendations contained in the circular be implemented, as far as practicable, and that the necessary equipment be obtained for this purpose.

# 22.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936 (PART VII.) — CHILD LIFE PROTECTION:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on an application (Case No. 343) for permission to undertake for reward the nursing and maintenance of children under the age of nine years apart from their parents.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the maximum number of children under the age of nine years that may be kept at the premises in respect of Gase No. 343 be fixed at one.

#### (b) Case No. 69.

The Medical Officer of Health submitted a further report regarding certain premises (Case No. 69) which are used for the nursing and maintenance of children apart from their parents (P.H. & M.S. 22.11.43—35 (ii); 6.3.44—40).

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the person having charge of the premises be informed by letter that until such time as adequate staff is obtained no further children are to be admitted to the premises, and that the number of children to be kept at such premises be limited according to the staff engaged, as laid down in the Council's resolution of the 13th December, 1943.

# 23.--A NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE-GOVERNMENT WHITE PAPER:

In accordance with the Committee's instructions, the Medical Officer of Health submitted the following report and observations on the Government's proposals for a National Health Service, as indicated in the recently issued White Paper:—

The White Paper is divided into three portions, affecting:--

- (1) General practitioners' services.
- (2) Hospital and consultant services.
- (3) Clinics and other services.

The following is a diagram of the projected administrative structure:-

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#### MINISTER OF HEALTH

#### CENTRAL HEALTH SERVICES COUNCIL

Statutory consultative and advisory body appointed by Minister in consultation with professional and other organisations concerned; primarily but not wholly medical in constitution. CENTRAL MEDICAL BOARD.

Executive body, mainly but not wholly professional, its membership and organisation to be settled by Minister in consultation with the profession. Subject to general direction of Minister, this body will be the "employer" with whom the doctor will contract to provide the new general practitioner service. The Board will concern itself with the distribution and the welfare of general practice.

- NEW JOINT HEALTH AUTHORITY.

(combination of county and county borough councils in joint boards)

LOCAL HEALTH SERVICES COUNCIL

Expert technical advisory body representative of all professional interests; constitution and membership to be settled later. To cover area of Joint Health Authority, which must consult the Council in preparing area plan and in subsequent alterations to it. Council is free to submit its views to Minister, Joint Authority, and individual local authorities.

Area to be settled by Minister after consultation with local interests, but to cover a population and financial resources sufficient for adequate hospital service. Membership restricted to elected members of constituent authorities. Functions: To examine general health needs of area; to prepare and submit area plan to Minister in consultation with local Health Services Council, voluntary hospitals, medical schools and other interests. To provide complete hospital and consultant service for area, including tuberculosis, maternity, mental, infectious diseases, cancer, and probably V.D. The Joint Authority to become owners of all local authority hospitals. Area plan to include proposals as to allocation of responsibility for providing various local services between itself (hospital and consultant services) and constituent authorities (local clinic and domicifiary services not in hospital and consultant sphere).

LOCAL COMMITTEES
OF THE BOARD

To be set up in each area. Membership act dealt with, but these committees will include local authority members. Insurance committees abolished and their must day to day functions transferred to these new committees.

COUNTY OR COUNTY BOROUGH COUNCIL.

To be responsible for provision and administration of local clinic and domiciliary services not belonging to hospital and consultant sphere as approved under area plan. To provide, equip and maintain health centres, as approved under area plan, and to be a party, with the Central Medical Board, to the contract with doctors practising at health centres.

#### General Practitioners Services:

The Medical Practitioners Service will be a combination of grouped and separate practice. Group practice means a practice by a group of doctors working in co-operation, and "separate practice" means practice by a doctor working on his own account "group practice" being conducted normally, although not exclusively, in specially-equipped and publicly-provided health centres. All members of the public, irrespective of financial status, will be contributors to the scheme, and will, in turn, be entitled to the benefits of the services if they so desire. As far as the doctors are corned, a compromise has been reached by which a doctor may be employed as a full-time saintid servant, as a part-time servant, or he may continue in private practice. The Central Medical Beard, however, will have power to require a recently-qualified doctor to give his full time to health centre work, and from this it may be not unreasonably assumed that ultimately a full-time salaried medical service will develop.

# Hospital and Consultant Services.

It will be the duty of the Joint Authorities to secure a complete hospital and consultant service for their area, including sanatoria, isolation, mental health services, ambulances and anciliary services, in accordance with the approved area plan. The powers of present Local Authorities in respect of these services and the ownership of their hospitals will pass to the Joint Authorities.

#### Clinics and Other Services.

It will be the duty of the Joint Authority to include in its area plan provision for all necessary clinics and other local services-for example, child welfare, home muraing, health visiting, midwifery and others, and to provide for the co-ordination of these services with the other services in the plan.

County and County Borough Councils will normally provide most of these local services; the exact allocation of responsibility between the individual County and County Borough Council will be finally settled in each case in the approved area plan, but the principle will be that services belonging to the hospital and consultant sphere will fall to the Joint Authority, while other local and clinic services will fall to the individual County or County Borough Council. Child welfare duties will always full to the authority responsible for child education under the new Education Bill. It will be evident that the scope of the services to be administered by this Authority will depend very largely on the extent of the delegation given by the Middlesex County Council under the Education Bill, when that becomes an Act of Parliament.

#### General Observations.

- 1. Little is said in the White Paper about health, the emphasis being on the hospital services and the treatment of disease, which, while admittedly being important, should not be the main consideration of a Ministry of Health or a Local Health Authority.
- 2. An opportunity has been missed of bringing all health services under the control of one Minister. The school medical services, for example, still remain under the control of the Board of Education, and the industrial medical services under the Government Departments concerned. The reason advanced for this is that these services require experts. This, of course, is equally true of maternity and child welfare, or any other branch of the proposed National Health Services.
- 3. Health depends upon a larger variety of factors, many of them, such as housing, recreation, open spaces, environmental hygiene, etc., being already administered by local authorities. It would have been better to have created new authorities of sufficient size to administer a comprehensive service, expert advisory committees being created to assist.
- 4. General Practitioners Services: The establishment of health centres should be the subject of genuine experiment, as it is by no means certain how the public will respond to this development, nor, for that matter, what functions can be most appropriately carried out at these centres. Whatever one's views as to the desirability or otherwise of a full-time salaried medical service may be, the establishment of such a service should not be by way of the approach which may follow from the powers vested in the Central Medical Board,
- 5. Hospital Services: All Public Health administrators are agreed that an extension and co-ordination of existing hospital services is necessary. The function of the majority of hospitals is the treatment of the patient, and, while this is so as regards isolation hospitals, they also serve a further purpose in the isolation and control of infectious diseases. An isolation hospital is, therefore, of particular value to a Sanitary authority and to their Medical Officer of Health. So long as the Medical Officer of Health is in charge, he can vary his admissions, duration of stay, etc., on the type and severity of disease prevalent in his district at any one time, and also can have regard to the home conditions of particular patients of which he has knowledge, by way of his sanitary and other services. Moreover, a hospital gives him a constant touch with the vagaries of infectious disease, which helps him to maintain a higher standard as a consultant in that subject. that a number of the smaller hospitals are inefficient and uneconomic, and should cease to exist in any comprehensive scheme. In view, however, of their importance to local sanitary authorities, the more modern and efficient hospitals could be extended to deal with larger populations, operating under a joint board of authorities concerned, the co-ordination of numbers of such hospitals being easily arranged, and, in fact, is now operating to a limited extent. In my view, the ideal isolation hospital unit is one of about 300 beds, with a liberal provision of cubicle accommodation.
- 6. Clinics and Other Services: The administration of these services will be in the hands of County and County Borough Councils (the major authorities), presumably as these are regarded as having a sufficient population and financial resources to justify this. It is interesting to note that of 83 County Boroughs 39 have populations of under 100,000, and their financial resources are very vari-For the purposes of the scheme, the Borough of Hendon is regarded as a minor authority. The clinic services have, in fact, been developed by progressive local authorities, and in this development the minor authorities have played a not inconspicuous part, and in many instances have established services greatly in advance of those enjoyed by districts in which the County Councils were the responsible authorities. It is true that there will probably be a wide delegation by County Councils to authorities who have proved their capacity to establish and administer efficient services. It would, however, have been more reassuring if such authorities had been given autonomy in regard to those services which they have already successfully developed, and in which they have had an extensive administrative experience,

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As far as this Authority is concerned, it will be seen that the services ultimately to be affected are:-

- 1. The Isolation Hospital.
- 2. The Clinic Services.

After full consideration of the proposals, and the observations of the Medical Officer of Health thereon, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Association of Municipal Corporations and the Non-County Boroughs Association be asked to consider making representations to the Covernment to provide that Authorities who have established and maintained modern and efficient infectious diseases hospitals shall be permitted to retain control of such hospitals, and that they be extended, if necessary, to provide for larger areas.

#### 24.—HOME HELPS:

A letter was submitted from the Ministry of Health intimating that the Minister had noted with satisfaction the Council's proposal to extend the Home Helps Service as indicated in the resolution passed by the Council on the 28th February last (P.H. & M.S. 7.2.44—28). The letter further stated that, whilst there would be no objection to the women employed as "home helps" being occupied in giving additional domestic assistance in war-time nurseries when they are not required as home helps, their services must be primarily given as home helps, and it is not anticipated that they will be available more than occasionally for other duties, and it is, therefore, not possible to allow any part of the cost to be borne by war-time nursery account for reimbursement by the Exchequer.

The Borough Treasurer reported that he was taking up with the Ministry the question of charging to war-time nurseries accounts, with a view to reimbursement the proportion of time home helps are engaged on work in connection with war-time nurseries, and the Committee have approved the action of the Borough Treasurer.

#### 25.- MILL HEALTH CENTRE:

The Committee considered the report of the Medical Officer of Health on an application from the Mill Hill, Middlesex 120 Detachment of the British Red Cross Society, for permission to use the Health Centre, Hartley Avenue, Mill Hill, for a course of lectures.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Mill Hill, Middlesex 120 Detachment of the British Red Cross Society, be granted the free use of the Mill Hill Health Centre, in connection with the course of lectures in question, subject to the Society indemnifying the Council against any claim which may arise out of or in connection with the proposed user.

# 26.—THE CARE OF ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN — MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR 2866:

The Committee, on the 22nd November last, deferred any action under the above mentioned circular pending information as to whether it was the intention of the County Council to convene a conference of the separate welfare authorities within the County, as suggested in the circular. A letter has now been received from the County Council inviting welfare authorities to appoint three representatives to attend a conference at the Guildhall, Westminster, on Tuesday, the 9th May next, at 3.30 p.m. with a view to considering in what directions co-operation between the authorities in the formulation of joint arrangements appear desirable.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Mrs. W. M. Maughan, J.P., and Mrs. B. J. Munro, J.P. (co-opted members of the Committee for Maternity and Child Welfare) and the Medical Officer of Health be appointed to represent the Council at the proposed conference.

# 27.—POST-GRADUATE COURSE FOR SUPERVISORS OF MIDWIVES:

On the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, it was

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That authority be given for Dr. Mary Watson, supervisor of midwives, to attend the post-graduate course to be held in London from the 17th to 20th May next, and that the fee of two guineas for the course be paid by the Council.

### 28.-HEALTH CENTRES, ETC.-ROTA:

The Committee considered and approved the portion of the Visiting Rota report dealing with the Childs Hill Health Centre, referred to in Part III, of this report (item 30).

At the present time the Corps headquarters is established at Barnfield Road School.

RESOLVED-That the matter be referred to the Hendon Local Youth Committee.

#### 6.—WATLING PARK — PROPOSED BUILDING:

The Town Clerk reported the receiptof a letter from the Watling Community Association in further reference to their application asking the Council to let the Association the vacant site on the east side of Colchester Road, between the bowling-green and No. 78, for the purpose of erecting thereon a prefabricated building for use primarily for youth work (Group II. Cttee. 7/2/44, E.P. & A.—3).

The Association state that the proposed building would be used as a youth club for young people between the ages of 14 and 21 years, and there might be occasions when older groups of persons would meet there if accommodation was available. Generally, the building would be used for special group activities of the club, dealing with special subjects such as dramatic work, light handicrafts, stone carving, artistic subjects and discussions. There might also be occasions when games such as table-tennis or darts would be played.

The land in question was conveyed by the London County Council to the Town Council for the purposes of a public open space, and is scheduled as such in the Hendon Planning Scheme No. 1.

RESOLVED—That the Town Clerk be instructed to submit a report with regard to the legal position in relation to the user of the land.

#### 7.—BOWLING GREEN—WATLING PARK:

The Borough Surveyor reported that, pursuant to the resolution of the Council (Group II. Cttee. 7/2/44—E.P. & A.—9), the Chairman of the Committee had had an interview with representatives of the Watling Association, the London Transport (Central Buses) Sports Association, and the London Transport Athletic Club, regarding the use of the above bowling green, and that it had been agreed to allocate the rinks on a similar basis to last year, as follows:—

Watling Association: Exclusive use of two rinks, with the use of a third rink on Saturdays and Sundays.

London Transport (Central Buses) Sports Association: Exclusive use of two rinks, except at the week-ends.

London Transport Athletic Club: Exclusive use of two rinks.

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In the event of members of any one club awaiting a game, and rinks allocated to other clubs being unused, it was agreed that in such cases, after 6.30 p.m., a club could hire an unused rink from the groundsman in the normal way, it being understood that not more than one rink shall be taken from any club under this arrangement.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the above arrangements be approved, and that the fees be charged on the same basis as last year, viz., £7 155, per rink for exclusive user (apportioned in the case of part user), plus is, per club member.

# 8.—DAMAGE TO TREES-LAND ADJOINING THE NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD:

The Town Clerk submitted a report with regard to damage to trees on land adjacent to the old sewage farm, on the north side of the North Circular Road, alleged to have been caused by five boys, of the ages of 14 and 15 years, all of whom were attending Brent Modern School. The boys were caught by the police chopping a lime tree, which was half-severed, and lying near by was another lime tree which had just been felled. The trees in question formed part of an avenue of approximately 30 trees, planted across the site when the land was used for a sewage disposal works,

Ministry of War Transport, referring to the Council's application (28/2/44—Resolution No. 121) for the restoration of the above 'bus route along Devonshire Road and Sanders Lane, and intimating that the Commissioner appreciated the extent to which local residents had come to rely on the service, the diversion of which was authorised to avoid withdrawing the facility, and therefore, before issuing instructions that 'buses

on the route should follow the main road, he surveyed the route personally to satisfy himself whether the diversion could be allowed to continue. He was, however, satisfied that the operation along Sanders Lane, where it approaches the bridge over the railway, is not safe, and he therefore had to decide, with regret, that the service should be restored to the authorised route.

Having regard to the urgent need for travelling facilities for the large number of persons resident in the vicinity of Dole Street and Devonshire Road, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Regional Transport Commissioner be asked to reconsider his decision, and to urge the appropriate railway company to make the Sanders Lane bridge safe for 'bus traffic.

#### 14.-TRUNK ROADS ACT, 1936:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Ministry of War Transport regarding a statement on highway policy made in the House of Commons on the 25th January, when it was indicated that it was proposed to frame legislation substantially to increase the existing mileage of trunk roads. The Minister has considered the procedure which might be followed in drawing up a list of the roads which could suitably be added to the First Schedule of the Trunk Roads Act, 1936, and he suggests that the matter should be dealt with by areas coincident with those of the Divisional Road Engineers of the Ministry. The Minister encloses a list of roads for the consideration of the Council in so far as they affect the Borough of Hendon, as follows:—

#### 1.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £229 0s. 5d. were submitted and approved.

#### 2.—CRESSINGHAM ROAD:

The Chief Officer Meals Service submitted a letter from the London Divisional Food Officer strongly recommending the Council to reconsider the question of proceeding with the Cressingham Road scheme. Although general approval had been given by the Ministry of Food to the principle of establishing the restaurant some time ago, experience had since been gained in the success or failure of restaurants in similar areas. In the case of two other Local Authorities, one such restaurant had to be closed down because it was financially a failure, and it had only been possible to save another by devoyting it to the service of school-feeding.

The Divisional Food Officer's opinion was that the chances of success in the case of Cressingham Road were not good enough to warrant proceeding with the scheme. He would, however, be glad to have any evidence to the contrary which the Council might possess, and in that event he would be prepared to reconsider his attitude in the matter.

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The Committee have authorised the Chairman (Councillor F. J. Collins), Councillor C. P. Kartriber and the Chief Officer Meals Service to confer with the London Divisional Food Officer on the matter.

# 3.—MOBILE CANTEEN SERVICE:

A letter was submitted from the Assistant Divisional Food Officer stating that the Ministry of Food would not regard the cost of a suitable vehicle for the delivery of hot meals in containers as a capital charge eligible for reimbursement, but that if the Council decided to embark on the scheme the Ministry would offer no objection. It would be for the Council to ensure, however, that the service did not result in a loss on the trading account.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND— That the Chairman of the Committee (Councillor F. J. Collins), Councillor C. P. Kartriber, and the Chief Officer Meals Service be authorised to interview the London Divisional Food Officer with a view to the Ministry reconsidering their decision in regard to the question of reimbursement.

The Chief Officer Meals Service submitted a letter received from the Ministry of Food approving expenditure of the sum of £202 10s. to cover the cost of the proposed ventilation scheme at St. John's British Restaurant.

It was also reported that Mrs. Spinks, who was appointed as nursery assistant at Addington House, had failed to take up her appointment, and that Miss D. Webb, appointed as probationer at Dole Street Nursery, reported for duty on the 13th March, and, after working for the morning only, notified her intention not to continue the employment.

#### (c) Vacancies.

It was reported that vacancies exist for the following staff:—Wardens, 2: nursery assistants, 5 (2 whole-time, 3 part-time): probationers, 4.

#### (d) Appointment of Warden.

The Committee considered an application from Miss J. I. Cox for appointment as warden, and authorised the women members of the Committee to interview the applicant at a convenient time, and, if considered suitable, to make the appointment.

#### (e) Miss Dawson (Matron) -- Leave of Absence,

The Committee approved an application from Miss Dawson (matron at Claremont Road Nursery) for six months leave of absence, without pay, to attend a health visitors' course, subject to Miss Dawson undertaking to remain in the service of the Council for one year after qualifying as a health visitor.

#### 4.-TOY - MAKING:

It was reported that arrangements had been made with Mr. J. L. Pelham, M.B.E., head of the Rescue Service, for the Rescue Service personnel at Hendon Way Depot to make toys for the war-time day nurseries. Certain members of the day nurseries staff have also volunteered to assist, and arrangements have been made for them to be instructed in toy-making by the staff of the Rescue Service. The scheme is working very satisfactorily, and will shortly be extended to the Mill Hill Depot.

The Committee have placed on record their high appreciation of the gifts of toys made by the Rescue Service to the day nurseries, and their helpful co-operation in supplying further toys and training the staff, and have given instructions for an expression of their appreciation and thanks to be conveyed by letter to Mr. Pelham.

### 5.- HYDE SCHOOL NURSERY:

The Committee have authorised, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Health the provision, at an estimated cost of £15, of accommodation at this day nursery for two tons of coke.

#### 6.-HYDE COTTAGE NURSERY:

It was reported that this nursery was entered during the week-end of 22nd-23rd April, and that the matter had been placed in the hands of the police, and all other necessary action taken.

#### 7.—DOLE STREET NURSERY:

#### (a) Lay-out of Grounds.

The Committee have instructed the Borough Engineer to submit an estimate of the cost of putting the grounds of this nursery into a suitable condition, with a view to the approval of the Ministry of Health being obtained for the work to be put in hand.

#### (b) Structural Defects.

It was reported that certain minor structural defects, to which attention had been drawn by the Visiting Rota, were receiving attention, and would be remedied by the contractor under the terms of the contract.

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# 8.—INTERNAL DECORATION OF DAY NURSERIES:

The walls and ceilings of several of the day nurseries are in an unsatisfactory condition and require to be redecorated. The Committee have therefore instructed the Borough Engineer to prepare an estimate of the cost of carrying out necessary internal decorations, and given authority, after consultation with the Chairman of the Committee, for the estimate to be forwarded to the Ministry of Health for approval.

# 9.—WATLING AVENUE DAY NURSERY--PROGRESS REPORT:

The Committee have duly noted the report of the Borough Engineer to the effect that good progress has been maintained on the work in connection with this contract.

# 10,-EDGWARE NURSERY-SAND-PIT:

The Committee have given instructions for the sand-pit at this day nursery to be enlarged.

# 11.--INSPECTION OF WAR-TIME DAY NURSERIES:

A letter was submitted from the National Society of Children's Nurseries referring to the recent visit of the Association's technical adviser to Edgware, Addington House, Hocroft, Hyde School and York Park Day Nurseries, and transmitting her observations on these nurseries. Satisfaction was expressed with the running and general atmosphere of the nurseries and with the high standard of training given.

#### 12.—FIXED FIRE GUARDS:

A communication was submitted from the Senior Regional Officer of the Ministry of Health (Circular S.R.O. No. 103 (Region V.)), calling attention to the risk of serious accidents in war-time nurseries arising from fire-guards which are insecurely fixed, and stating that fire-guards should be fixed firmly to the wall both at the top and bottom of the guard. Further, that a kerb similar in design to that shown in the circular should be provided for all fire-guards, and that the provision of these fittings should be put in hand forthwith, and applications for formal approval to the expenditure incurred submitted to the Senior Regional Officer in due course.

The Committee have given the necessary instructions on the lines indicated in the circular.

### 13.-RESIDENTIAL ACCOMMODATION FOR WAR-TIME NURSERIES STAFF:

A letter was submitted from the Senior Regional Officer of the Ministry of Health stating that the Minister of Health is advised by the Minister of Labour that vacancies for nursery assistants, and possibly nursery nurses, could sometimes be filled by women from the Provinces, if arrangements could be made for their board and lodging. Where, therefore, the Ministry of Labour indicate that women from the Provinces are available to fill these vacancies only if residential accommodation is provided, the Authority is requested to obtain suitable board and lodging for them if it is not otherwise available.

In such cases the salaries payable will be subject to the normal deduction of £52 per annum for emoluments of resident staff, but reasonable expenditure on the provision of board and lodging not exceeding 30s, per week per nurse will be eligible for reimbursement.

The Committee have duly noted the terms of the communication.

#### HENDON SHOW:

The Committee considered the question of holding a Hendon Show during the summer of 1944, and in this connection the under-mentioned representatives of local organisations, at the invitation of the Committee, were present:-

The Chairman outlined the difficulties of the Council in organising a Hendon Show this year, particularly owing to the shortage of staff, and the Borough Treasurer reported generally with regard to enquiries he had made with various Government Departments, the Middlesex County Agricultural Executive Committee, and firms interested in food production, etc. It would appear that very little assistance would be forthcoming in the event of the Show being held this year. The representatives of the organisations present were informed that the time had arrived when, if the Show were to be held this year, it must largely be taken over by the voluntary local associations to organise. The representatives of the associations, however, intimated that they were not in a position to undertake the organisation of the Show.

In these circumstances, the Committee, with regret, decided to postpone the Show for the present year.

# 1.—INSPECTION OF RESPIRATORS AT SCHOOLS:

In reference to item 9 of the last report, at a conference of Head Teachers of the Schools and Officers of the Chief Warden's Department, under the chairmanship of the Director of Education, it was agreed that schools in the Borough should be visited by wardens three times per annum, during school hours, for the purpose of inspecting, fitting, changing or repairing the children's respirators.

# 2.—STRENGTH OF CIVIL DEFENCE (GENERAL) SERVICES:

Instructions have been received from the London Civil Defence Region in regard to measures to be taken for maintaining the paid strength of the Civil Defence (General) Services by the recall of former whole-time members released to industry, and by the invitation to present part-time members to volunteer for whole-time duty, should the necessity arise.

#### 3.—WAR SERVICE INJURY ALLOWANCES:

In reference to item 2 of the last report, discussions have taken place in the House of Commons in regard to the difference in the period in respect of which whole and part-time personnel are eligible for war-service injury allowances, and, in the light of such discussions, the Minister has intimated that he is unable to agree to the extension of the existing arrangements in the direction suggested by the Hendon Civil Defence Committee.

#### 4.—SURRENDER OF CLOTHING COUPONS BY CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL:

At a meeting of the Authorities supporting the proposal of the Edmonton Borough Council, that a deputation should wait upon the Board of Trade and the Minister of Home Security to appeal for a reduction in the number of clothing coupons to be surrendered by members of the Civil Defence Services (see item 4, Report to Council, 13.3.44), the Chairman of the Committee was appointed, with four others, to form the proposed deputation.

# 5.—W.V.S. REPRESENTATIVE FOR THE BOROUGH OF HENDON:

Consequent upon the resignation of Miss Paton as W.V.S. representative for the Borough of Hendon, the W.V.S. Administrator for Group 6 has formally submitted the name of Mrs. Mercer—at present deputy Borough representative—as Miss Paton's successor. The Committee has noted the proposed appointment with pleasure, and has tendered to Mrs. Mercer its best wishes for success in her new office.

#### 6.-RATES OF PAY-DRIVERS IN RESCUE SERVICE:

Replies have been received from 23 out of the 30 local authorities in Group 6 who were invited to support this Council in representations being made for the authorisation of a higher rate of pay for drivers of light rescue vehicles and for reserve drivers when acting in that capacity (see item 9, Report to Council, 14.2.44). Eighteen of the Councils have agreed to support. In one further case, while not expressing its own views, the Authority has, nevertheless, referred the matter to the Outer London Joint Committee for further consideration. In four cases only have the Authorities either deeided to take no action or expressed themselves as unable to support.

#### 7.—RESCUE SERVICE:

The personnel of the Rescue Service, in addition to assisting a neighbouring Authority in connection with air-raid incidents, have also been engaged on the following works :-

Coaling operations for the L.N.E.R.

Lopping overhanging trees on allotments.

Extension to Wardens' Post D. 23.

Repairs to I.B. shed, "D" District II.Q.

Construction of washing-down yard "A" depot for ambulances.

Assisting L.M.S. Railway, Hendon, Heavy Goods Section.

Delivery of tanks, static water supplies for the Fireguard Organisation.

Construction of new I.B. shed, Farm Road.

Laying concrete areas for phosphorus-bomb training, "B" Depot and Ravensfield.

Providing new black-out to "E" Depot.

Unloading Morrison shelters at Wembley.

Spreading clinker from the Refuse Disposal Works.

Filling and delivering 20,000 sandbags throughout the Borough.

Assisting British Restaurants, School Meals Service, W.V.S. and Food Office.

Building field ovens at ambulance depots.

In addition, considerable work has been carried out for "Salute the Soldier" campaign.

The Committee has noted with much pleasure that a good selection of toys made by the personnel at the Mill Hill Rescue Depot in their leisure time was handed over on the opening of the Council's new day nursery in Dole Street on the 20th March.

A Turkish Medical Mission visiting this country made an inspection of the Mill Hill Rescue Depot on the 14th March.

### -8.—AMBULANCE DEPOT—ACCOMMODATION:

In reference to item 5 of the last Report, the Regional Commissioners have intimated their willingness to provide alternative accommodation for use by the Council's Civil Defence personnel, to enable that required by the Minister of Aircraft Production to be released as soon as possible.

Occupation has now been taken of Nos. 33 and 35, Golders Rise, which has enabled the accommodation previously used in the Hendon County School building to be released, with the exception of the medical inspection room attached to the gymnasium and that part of the playground used for parking the vehicles.

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# 9.—CORPORATION'S AMBULANCE SERVICE:

During the month of March 182 calls were made in respect of private eases and 72 in respect of street accidents and illnesses. Of these 254 cases, 51 were conveyed in Civil Defence ambulances.

A request from the district official of the Transport and General Workers' Union for the payment of A.R.P. personnel at J.I.C. rates when engaged in driving the Corporation's ambulances has been received. This request, together with a report of the Medical Officer on arrangements made by a neighbouring Authority for the recognition of services rendered by A.R.P. personnel in the operation of the Corporation's Civil Ambulance Service, will be considered at the next meeting of the Committee.

### 10.—HEATING OF WARDENS' POSTS:

With reference to item 11, Report to Council, 14.2.44, the County Council has approved an expenditure of £50 on increasing the capacity of the elements of the heaters at 80 of the wardens' permanent posts, and to the additional running costs, not exceeding £288 per annum. The work is in hand and nearing completion.

#### 11.—FIRE PREVENTION:

The proposals for staffing the Fire Guard Organisation referred to in item 12 of the last Report have been approved by the Regional Commissioners. The Commissioners agreed that the responsibility carried by whole-time Senior Fire Guards in the London Region generally warranted their classification as grade 1. posts, but nevertheless decided that Head Fire Guards in Hendon—under whom the Senior Fire Guards operate, are to be classified as grade 11. appointments, and therefore paid on a lower scale. The Commissioners were advised that it appeared the considerations which led to the placing of Senior Fire Guards in category 1 were equally applicable to the Head Fire Guards, but the Commissioners are not prepared to depart from their original decision. The Commissioners are, however, giving consideration to the duties of the Head Fire Guards in certain of the wardens' districts, with a view to their re-classification in grade 1.

By agreement with the Regional Commissioners, this Council will act as the "appropriate authority" under the Fire Guard Orders in respect of the under-mentioned premises:—

Hyde British Restaurant.

Hendon Cottage Hospital.

Industrial Orthopædic Society and the Optical and Dental Departments, Manor House Hospital.

Royal National Orthopædic Hospital, Hale Lane, Edgware.

Upon the instructions of the Ministry of Home Security, some 30,000 sandbags are being filled and distributed over the Borough for the purpose of dealing with possible incendiary bomb attacks.

Schemes for fire-prevention arrangements submitted by nine occupiers of business premises in the Borough have been considered and approved.

In regard to the broken glasses, it should be noted that there have been several "alert" periods, and a number of these glasses have been broken to permit legitimate entry into shelters.

Since the 1st January and up to the 18th April, 1944, a further 1,175 indoor shelters have been issued free and a further 611 sold. Approved applications outstanding total 42.

Councillor Rodway has been asked to supply details of the cases referred to by him at the Meeting of the Council held on the 27th March, where the issue of indoor shelters had been refused. It is hoped that this information will be forthcoming, in order that the matter may be clarified at the next Meeting of the Council. A case of the non-issue of a shelter reported in the local Press has been investigated, and it was found that the applicant omitted to indicate in the appropriate place on the form that there were four children resident in the house. In view of this additional information the application was subsequently approved.

The First Aid boxes have now been withdrawn from the various trench shelters (see item 8, Report to Council, 13.3.44). A check of the contents of the Boxes has revealed the following losses:-

### 1. MIDDLESEX WHITLEY COUNCIL—SALARY ADJUSTMENTS:

The Sub-Committee considered a letter from the Middlesex Whitley Council forwarding an amended scheme of salary adjustments, operable from the 1st April, 1944, made by the National Joint Council for Local Authorities' Administrative, Technical and Clerical Services. Scheme has been considered and approved by the Middlesex Whitley Council, and is recommended to all Local Authorities in Middlesex for adoption, with effect from the 1st April, 1944.

A letter was also considered from the National Association of Local Government Officers (Hendon Branch), expressing the hope that the Town Council will adopt the amended scheme.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council will adopt the amended scheme of salary adjustments, as recommended by the Middlesex Whitley Council, with effect from the 1st April, 1944.

### 2. MIDDLESEX WHITLEY COUNCIL-ANNUAL LEAVE:

The Sub-Committee considered a letter from the Middlesex Whitley Conneil, intimating that consideration had been given to a resolution of the National Joint Council to the effect that the normal annual leave of officers should be restored, subject to a maximum of three weeks, and the Middlesex Whitley Council recommend accordingly,

### 3. STAFF KETHREMENTS:

The Sul-Committee has considered the desirability of sending to each employee upon retirement a formal letter of appreciation of service in the following terms, and signed by His Worship the Mayor:--

"On the occasion of your retirement from the Local Government Service, the Corporation desires me to express to you their appreciation of the faithful services you have readered during a period of more than . . . years, of which . . . years have been spent with this Authority.'

KESOLVED TO RECOMMEND--That a formal letter of appreciation in the above terms be sent to each employee apon retirement.

### 4. FEMALE MARRIED STAFF:

An application was considered from Mrs. Hunt, a member of the staff of the Public Health Deparament, for permission, upon her marriage, to continue in the service of the Council for the duration of the war.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That Mrs. Hunt be permitted to continue in the service of the Council.

### 5. APPOINTMENT OF DEPUTY MATRON SISTER TUTOR, ISOLATION HOSPITAL:

It was reported that as a matter of urgency, and with the concurrence of His Worship the Mayor, the Chairman of the Public Health and Medical Services Committee and the Chairman of the Finance and General Purposes Committee had interviewed Miss N. M. Birch, Sister Tutor at the Boundary Park General Hospital, Oldham, the only applicant for the post, which had been duly advertised, and they recommended that Miss Birch be appointed to the post.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That, subject to satisfactory medical examination, Miss N. M. Birch be appointed to the position of Deputy Matron-Sister Tutor at the Hendon Isolation and Emergency Hospital, at the appropriate salary, and subject to the conditions of service set out in the First Report of the Nurses' Salaries Committee,

### 6. HOME HELPS SCHEME:

in connection with the above scheme, which has been approved by the Minister of Health, and which provides for the employment of five established or full-time home helps, the Sub-Committee considered proposals submitted by the Medical Officer of Health, after consultation with the Borough Treasurer relative to the conditions of service, hours of duty, holidays and periods of leave. Since the scheme was first approved certain amendment; have from time to time been made thereto. These amendments have now been consolidated, and the scheme set out hereunder is recommended for approval.

### Scheme.

- (1) That the services of the home helps shall be available in maternity cases and in certain other cases approved by the Medical Officer of Health, in any part of the Borough.
- (2) That the home helps be under the supervision of the midwife in charge in maternity cases, and of the district health visitor in other cases.
- (3) That the remuneration be £3 10s, per week, with necessary travelling expenses.
- (4) That during intervals between cases home helps be employed at the Council's clinics or day nurseries as required.
- (5) That the home helps be allowed two days off duty after the completion of a case and before attending another case or their services being utilised in some other capacity. This time off to be cumulative if the exigencies of the service require her attendance at another case before she has been able to take her period off duty.
- (6) That sick pay and holidays be in accordance with the regulations relating to staff of special establishments.
- (7) The home helps to provide their own ricals. Reasonable time to be allowed for necessary shopping.

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e 1st April, 1944.

- (8) That when the services of one of the Council's midwives is engaged, or a midwife from the Watling and District Nursing Association, the person responsible to pay 25 per cent of the cost to the midwife in charge of the case.
- (9) That in all other approved cases the person responsible to pay 25 per cent, of the cost where the rateable value of the premises occupied is £26 or less per annum, and 50 per cent, where the rateable value is in excess of this amount, to the Borough Treasurer weekly in advance.

### Duties.

- (1) On being summoned to a case, to notify the Public Health Department as soon as possible of her commencement of duty.
- (2) To commence duty on the instruction of the midwife, and to attend each day thereafter for a period of 14 days (this period may be varied by the Medical Officer of Health).
- (3) To be responsible for the domestic arrangements of the household between 8.20 a.m. and 6 p.m. on weekdays and 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Sundays.
- (4) To do the washing, cooking, and such general duties as the mother would normally do, this to include the removal and washing of soiled linen from the patient's room.
- (5) Not to interfere with the work of the doctor or midwife.
- (6) To attend punctually each day, and not to leave a case without authority.
- (7) To carry out the instructions of the doctor or midwife with regard to the mother and baby,
- (8) To report immediately to the midwife any contact with infectious disease.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the scheme as set out above be approved and adopted.

### 7. EMPLOYEE - SEWER SECTION OF BOROUGH ENGINEER'S DEPARTMENT:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from the Secretary of the National Union of General and Municipal Workers asking for the reception of a deputation in connection with an employee of the sewer section of the Borough Engineer's department.

RESOLVED -- That representatives of the Union, together with the employee concerned, be interviewed at the next meeting of the Sub-Committee.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND — That the Report of the above Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

### 17.-HOUSING REPAIRS ACCOUNT:

By Section 131 of the Housing Act. 1936, a Local Authority is required to appropriate from the Housing Revenue Account each year such a sum as is thought proper (not being less than 15 per cent. of the net rent income) for the repair and maintenance of the houses to which the Account relates. At the present time the appropriation made by the Council is 20 per cent. of the net rent income. The sum is barely sufficient to meet the cost of repairs and maintenance at present levels, and there will be no surplus available in the Repairs Account to meet the additional expenditure which will be necessary after the war. If the present percentage appropriation to the Repairs Account is continued, a deficiency in the Account will inevitably arise. This deficiency will be chargeable to the Housing Revenue Account in the first instance, and ultimately to the Rate Fund. It would therefore be advisable to equalise the charge to the Rate Fund as far as possible by increasing the appropriation to 25 per cent. commencing with the present financial year. The additional percentage is primarily intended to meet increased outlay in the immediate post-war years.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND accordingly.

### 18.—ACQUISITION OF PROPERTY IN REDEVELOPMENT AREAS:

The Committee considered a report by the Borough Surveyor regarding the acquisition of certain property in the redevelopment areas which have been approved by the Conneil. A copy of the Borough Surveyor's report is contained in the Committee's Minute Book.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That authority be given for the acquisition of such property under Sec. 137 of the H.U.D.C. Act, 1923.

The land has an area of approximately 160 square yards, and the Club desires to purchase or lease the land in order to extend its premises, it will be recalled that the Council has approved a resolution under which Corporation property cannot be sold during the period of the war.

### 20.-HUT, HARTLEY AVENUE, MILL HILL:

In connection with the above hut, which was formerly let to the police for the use of the Special Constabulary, the Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the 24th Middlesex Battalion Home Guard for permission to rent the hut on the same terms as those granted to the police. The Special (British Restaurants) Committee also desire to make use of this hut in connection with the Meals Service, in order to provide additional accommodation for the Hartley Avenue British Restaurant, where further space is urgently required.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application of the Home Guard be not granted, and that the hut be let, at a rental of £25 per annum, to the Special (British Restaurants) Committee, for use in connection with the Meals Service.

### 21.—HENDON FOOD CONTROL COMMITTEE:

It was accordingly suggested that, so far as the castern boundary of the Borough of Willesden is concerned, where it joins the Borough of Hendon, adjustment should be effected by the transfer to Willesden of that portion of the Borough of Hendon lying between the L.M.S. Rail-

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way (Midland) Line and the Edgware Road, bounded on the south by the Metropolitan Borough of Hampstead and on the north by the Crieklewood Curve. The Willesden Borough Council point out that the proposal is, of course, only in its initial stages, and they would be glad to know the views of the adjoining Boroughs on the question of such adjustments before proceeding with certain aspects of their reconstruction proposals.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Willesden Borough Council be informed that the Town Council do not approve the proposed suggestions for an adjustment of the Borough boundaries.

### 24.-DAMAGE TO IMMOBILE PROPERTY BY SERVICE VEHICLES:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Association of Municipal Corporations enclosing a form of agreement which the Association has made with the Claims Commission of the War Office for the disposal of claims for damage to immobile property by service vehicles. In the event of the adoption of the agreement, the Claims Commission should be informed accordingly. There would not appear to be any objection to the adoption of the agreement.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council adopt the agreement, and the Claims Commission be informed accordingly.

### 25.—ADDITIONAL REPRESENTATION ON MIDDLESEX COUNTY COUNCIL:

The Committee has considered the question of additional representation on the Middlesex County Council, and the Town Clerk has been instructed to submit a report on the matter to the next meeting of the Committee.

### 26.—REORGANISATION OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT:

The Committee considered a letter from the Worthing Borough Council asking the Council to support the under-mentioned resolutions:—

"That this Council view with the greatest concern the proposals of various departments of H.M. Government which in effect will deprive municipal authorities such as Worthing of most of their important powers and duties. We refer especially to the Fire, Education and Public Health Services. In addition, proposals are now under consideration which will take away or weaken municipal control and enterprise in connection with electricity, water and libraries.

The proposals made and those in preparation all tend to culminate in bureaucratic dictatorship, and are quite contrary to the principles of democracy which our people are fighting to preserve.

To the Prime Minister.

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"Also resolved, that copies of the above resolution be forwarded to every Member of Parliament and to all Municipal Authorities throughout the country."

The appropriate Associations have the question of the reorganisation of local government under review, and in these circumstances the Committee has duly **noted** the communication.

#### 13.—POST-WAR HOUSING:

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Pursuant to the Committee's instructions, the Borough Engineer submitted a largescale map showing the five sites it is proposed to develop for housing purposes, as indicated hereunder:-

#### No. 1.-Brent Hill, Hendon.

This site has an area of 12.6 acres and an approximate capacity for 140 houses. The land, which is owned by the Council, is at present used for temporary allotments, and an application for consent to re-appropriation for housing purposes is at present before the Ministry. In addition to providing housing accommodation, the development of the site will solve some difficult planning problems which exist in this part of the area, and, having regard to its proximity to the existing Brent Hill Estate, the Borough Engineer suggested that it would be desirable to make provision in the detailed plans for a small shopping site in the position indicated to the Committee.

#### No. 2,-Wise Lane, Mill Hill.

The area of land available on this site is 11 acres, with an approximate capacity for 90 houses. The site, which is owned by the Council, was acquired for housing purposes, but is at present occupied by war-time allotments. The development plan provides for the retention of an area of about three acres for permanent allotments,

#### No. 3.-Wentworth Hall Estate, Mill Hill.

This site has an area of 19 acres and an approximate capacity for 186 houses. All the roads are laid out and concreted and granite kerbs provided. Sewers and surface water drains are also completed and house connections laid under the roads. It is, therefore, in a favourable position for the commencement of building operations as soon as labour and materials are available.

Taken in conjunction with the adjacent Wise Lane site, an opportunity is afforded for providing a shopping centre in a position convenient for both estates. Furthermore, the site is suitable for the incorporation of a small scheme to provide special houses for aged persons, and its development will also facilitate the provision of improved communications in relation to the surrounding estates.

#### No. 4 .- Kenilworth Road Estate, Edgware.

Negotiations are at present in progress for the acquisition of this estate, which has an area of 29 acres and an approximate capacity for 200 houses.

#### No. 5.- Edgwarebury House Estate, Elstree.

The development of this estate, which has an area of about 70 acres and an approximate capacity of 500 houses, is dependent upon the completion of the Tube Railway extension, and subject to negotiations for purchase.

#### Sites 1 and 2-Lay-out Plans.

The Borough Engineer reported that he had been interviewed by an Inspector of the Ministry of Health regarding the development schemes for sites 1 and 2 (Brent Hill and Wise Lane), and that he had been requested to submit to the Ministry, as soon as possible, site plans and lay-out plans showing the proposed roads and sewers.

Detailed plans of these two estates showing the roads and sewers were submitted to the Committee.

The Committee have duly noted the report of the Borough Engineer regarding sites 1 to 5, and have given directions for detailed plans to be submitted in due course showing the position of the proposed shopping sites.

With regard to sites 1 and 2, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the lay-out plans in respect of the Brent Hill and Wise Lane schemes now submitted, showing the roads and sewers, be approved, and copies forwarded to the Ministry of Health.

14.—INDUSTRIAL USE OF SHOP AT 9, ASHBOURNE PARADE, N.W. 11—MILITON MANUFACTURING CO.:

The Borough Engineer reported on an application from the Milton Manufacturing Company for permission to use the ground-floor shop known as 9, Ashbourne Parade, N.W. 11, in connection with an existing business of a utility clothing manufacturer. The premises will be used for the storage of stocks, cutting of garments and dispatch of goods.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That consent be granted to the use of the premises for the purposes indicated for the duration of the war, subject to an agreement being entered into, in form to be approved by the Town Clerk.
- (b) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to the agreement in due course.

#### 15.—USE OF 52, ASHBOURNE AVENUE, N.W. H, AS A NURSING-HOME—MIDDLESEX NURSING ASSOCIATION:

The Borough Engineer reported on an application from the Middlesex Nursing Association for consent to use No. 52, Ashbourne Avenue, N.W. 11, as a nursing-home for maternity and medical cases.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That consent to the user of the premises as a nursing-home be granted, subject to the residential appearance of the property being maintained, and to there being no nuisance which would adversely affect the amenities of the adjacent dwellings.

#### 16.—TEMPORARY BUILDING AT NORTH END OF KENILWORTH ROAD, EDGWARE:

An application was submitted from the Rev. II. A. H. Lea for permission to erect a temporary hut on vacant land at the end of Kenilworth Road, Edgware, to be used for Sunday School purposes and also in connection with the youth organisations attached to the Edgware Parish Church.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the applicant be informed that the Council will be prepared to approve the proposal subject to compliance with the following conditions:-

- (a) The structure to be a minimum distance of 50 feet away from the nearest house.
- (b) Sanitary accommodation to be provided for both sexes.
- (e) An exit door opening outwards to be provided in the rear end of the hut.
- (d) The site to be maintained in a clean and tidy condition, and nothing to be done at the hut which would cause annoyance or nuisance to the occupants of adjacent houses.

#### 17.—LAND—CORNER OF HENDON WAY AND NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD:

A letter was submitted from the Ministry of Works, Directorate of Lands and Accommodation, submitting proposals for the erection of a multi-storey building on land owned by the Council at the junction of Hendon Way and the North Circular Road. The structure would be a temporary office building and used for Government The Ministry state, however, that it is not possible to decide now what will be done with the building after the war, but that they will have close regard to the essential planning considerations and work in consultation with the Local Authority. The letter stressed the urgency of the matter, and asked for the Council's observations within the course of a few days.

The Committee have received the observations of the Borough Engineer on the proposal, and as a matter of urgency have given directions for a reply to be sent to the effect that the development of the site by the Council is intimately connected with the general development of the various services of the Council, and for this reason the Council are unable to agree to any part of the land being used for the purpose indicated by the Ministry. The Committee

RECOMMEND—That their action be approved.

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#### 18,--TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT, 1932:

#### Formation of Executive Joint Committees.

A letter was submitted from the Ministry of Town and Country Planning inviting the Council to appoint representatives to attend a meeting of Middlesex Authorities at the Guildhall. Westminster, at 3 p.m. on Monday, the 22nd May, to consider the formation of Executive Joint Committees, and submitting a provisional grouping of Local Authorities in Middlesex. At the present time Middlesex is covered by two Joint Town Planning Committees, the North Middlesex and the West Middlesex Joint Committees. Hendon is a constituent member of the North Middlesex Joint Committee. The grouping suggested by the Ministry envisages three Joint Committees, viz., North Middlesex, West Middlesex and South Middlesex, Hendon being included in the West Middlesex Joint Committee.

Enclosed with the letter were two draft resolutions, one of which it was intended should be passed at the Conference, and the other to be passed by the individual Local Authorities. The purport of the first resolution, which does not commit the various authorities concerned, is that the Conference should agree to the establishment under Section 3 of the Town and Country Plauning Act, 1932, of a Joint Committee for the area covered by the Local Authorities included in the Joint Committee; the appointment of members to serve thereon; the delegation by the Councils represented on the Joint Committee of all their powers and duties in connection with the preparation of a scheme for their respective areas to the Joint Committee; and the basis of contributions by the respective Local Authorities to meet the expenses of the Joint Committee.

The second resolution is consequential upon the Local Authorities agreeing to adopt the former resolution.

A letter was also submitted from the Middlesex Borough and District Councils' Association, enclosing a copy of a circular letter from the Urban District Councils' Association, dealing inter alia with the powers and functions of Joint Committees established under the Act.

The Committee appointed His Worship the Mayor (Alderman T. J. Scott, J.P.), the Chairman of the Committee (Alderman R. A. B. Teare, M.B.E.), the Town Clerk and the Borough Engineer to represent the Council at the Conference, and instructions were given for a copy of the circular letter from the Urban District Councils' Association to be circulated to the members of the Committee for the next meeting.

#### 19.—GENERAL SCHEME FOR THE REPAIR OF HOUSES, ETC.:

Ministry of Health Circulars No. 2871 of 1943 and No. 9 of 1944, which have previously been reported, outlined the procedure to be followed for making the best practicable arrangements, so that after the demands for war purposes have been nethousing should have the first call on immobile building labour and available materials so as to secure the maximum amount of improvement to the largest possible number of houses. A further circular (No. 49/44) has now been received referring to the circulars mentioned above, and urging local authorities to prepare a programme, after making allowance for the volume of work which private owners will themselves wish to do under certificates of essentiality, to provide for the completion, in so far as it may be practicable, of all war damage repairs by the end of the year. In addition, local authorities are now asked to extend their programme of repair to cover all the seriously damaged houses which are now regarded by the War Damage Commission as repairable at the Commission's expense.

The extent of the work to be done to any particular house is left to the discretion of the local authority, subject to the limitation imposed by the availability of labour and the supply of various materials. In cases where the local authority may consider it possible and desirable to go beyond the standard of first-aid repairs or the specification outlined for the repair of seriously damaged houses, the War Damage Commission will be glad to see this further range of work undertaken.

With regard to the requisitioning of premises under Circular 2845 for rehousing families inadequately housed, to speed up the procedure, local authorities are now relieved from the necessity of furnishing the Senior Regional Officer with an estimate in cases where the cost of the work to be earried out would not exceed £100.

The Committee have given instructions for a programme on the lines indicated in the circular, to be submitted by the Borough Engineer to the next meeting, and also for an epitome of the circular to be circulated to each member of the Committee.

## 22.—DOMICILIARY MIDWIFERY SERVICE—GAS AND AIR ANALGESIA:

The Medical Officer reported that there is a growing demand amongst expectant mothers for the induction of gas and air analgesia during labour. At the present time three midwives are qualified in its administration, but by the Rules of the Central Midwives Board, a copy of which was submitted to the Committee, it is essential that a second person shall be present during administration of gas and air. In the past the midwives who were using this method relied upon pupil midwives to assist. This source of assistance has, however, become irregular, and the Medical Officer of Health has therefore approached the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John to obtain volunteers for this service. Volunteers will also be forthcoming from full-time female personnel of the Civil Defence Ambulance Service.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That facilities for the administration of gas and air analgesia be made available to expectant mothers under the Council's Domiciliary Midwifery Scheme.
- (b) That a panel be prepared of members of the British Red Cross Society, Order of St. John, and Civil Defence Ambulance Service who are prepared to attend with the midwife when requested.
- (c) That instruction in the use of the "Minitt" apparatus be given to these volunteers by Dr. Watson, the Council's supervisor of midwives.
- (d) That as the exigencies of the service permit, arrangements be made for Council midwives to be sent for training to an approved school.
- (e) That authority be given for the purchase of the necessary apparatus for each midwife who has taken an approved course.

# 23.—PROVISION OF TEMPORARY ACCOMMODATION FOR CHILDREN DURING ILLNESS OF PARENT:

Pursuant to the Committee's instructions (P.H. & M.S. 6.3.44-27), the Medical Officer of Health reported that Ministry of Health Circular S.R.O. No. 90, dated 8th September last, states that "consideration has been given to the question of admitting children other than those of women workers, to war-time nurseries. Where domestic hardship arises, such as the confinement of the mother, or sickness requiring the mother's removal to hospital, children of nursery age may be admitted to a war-time nursery, subject to the following conditions:---

- (a) That there is to be no displacement or delay in the admission of children of  $w_{0rk}$  ing women, including part-time workers;
- (b) that there will be no increased accommodation or staff. For example, whereas if a 24-hour service is already in operation and there are vacancies for night care they may be filled by these children, a day nursery should not provide night accommodation solely for such children:
- (c) that a nursery found to be superfluous to the needs of working women will not be kept open for other cases; and
- (d) that staff found to be excessive for the primary purpose of a nursery will not be retained for other cases. It is anticipated that admissions on these conditions will not be numerous, and for an experimental period the rates charged in such cases need not exceed the standard rates for children of working women."

The Committee are informed that a number of such children have been eared for in the daytime under the provisions of the Circular, and at present 10 are attending the day nurseries. It is probable that this arrangement provides for the majority of cases, but there is an occasional case in which the care of a child during daytime only does not meet the circumstances. The number of such cases obviously fluctuates, and no estimate can be given. Assuming that the Ministry of Health were prepared to agree, accommodation could be provided at one of the existing nurseries for such children. It would then, of course, be necessary to engage additional staff for night duty. It will be seen, however, that paragraph (b) of the Circular does not favour this course, although the Ministry might be prepared to consider some arrangements being made along these lines, providing the additional cost involved was charged to the Local Authority's Maternity and Child Welfare Services.

Another possible alternative would be to make arrangements with an Authority in a reception area providing residential nursery accommodation. It is understood that the Hertfordshire County Council are proposing to establish a residential nursery, and that Council might be asked whether they would be prepared to take an occasional case where day-nursery accommodation would not prove sufficient to meet all circumstances. Should such an arrangement be made, transport would have to be provided.

After consideration of the report of the Medical Officer of Health, the Committee

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That children under five years of age continue to be admitted to the day nurseries under the provisions of Circular S.R.O. No. 90.
- (2) That the Ministry of Health be asked if they are prepared to permit of one of the day nurseries being used for the reception, during the night, of a small number of such children, subject to the necessary financial adjustments being made, and also to such facilities being made available for the children of mothers on war work, where necessary.
- (3) That the Hertfordshire County Council be asked if they are prepared to receive selected children from this area into their residential nursery.

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## 24.—CRESSINGHAM ROAD HEALTH CENTRE:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on an application from the Chief Warden for permission to use the waiting-room at the Cressingham Road Health Centre as a Sector Point under the Fire Guard Plan.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application be granted.

## 25.—A NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE—GOVERNMENT WHITE PAPER:

A letter was submitted from the Edmonton Borough Council suggesting that a conference of Local Authorities in Middlesex who are Maternity and Child Welfare Authorities should be convened to consider the proposals contained in the Government White Paper in relation to their present functions, particularly the maternity and child welfare, midwifery and school medical services, and enquiring whether the Council would be prepared to be represented at such conference.

The Committee are of opinion that such a conference would serve a useful purpose, and they have accordingly appointed the Chairman of the Committee (Councillor Hirshfield) and the Medical Officer of Health to represent the Council thereat.

# 26.—ACCOMMODATION FOR MATERNITY CASES — PROPOSED BOROUGH MATERNITY HOME:

The Council on the 3rd April last decided to submit a further request to the Minister of Health to receive a deputation to discuss proposals for the establishment of a Borough maternity home. In this connection, a letter was submitted from the Minister's private secretary, stating that the Minister had again considered the request that he should receive a deputation from the Council, but he does not feel able to agree to an additional scheme to provide further accommodation, and, in the circumstances, he regrets he cannot see his way to receiving the suggested deputation.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That a communication be addressed to the Minister of Health expressing the surprise and deep concern of the Council with his refusal to receive the deputation, which, in the opinion of the Council, is a negation of democracy.
- (b) That the Middlesex County Council be asked to receive a deputation from the Council, in order that the present position regarding maternity accommodation in Hendon can be examined with a view to increased facilities being provided.
- (c) That the proposed deputation consist of His Worship the Mayor (Alderman T. J. Scott, J.P.), the Chairman of the Committee (Councillor L. Hirshfield), Alderman C. R. Richardson, Alderman R. A. B. Teare, M.B.E., and Councillor Mrs. F. E. Parvin.

# 27.—MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE—THE CARE OF ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted a report on the conference of representatives of Maternity and Child Welfare Authorities in Middlesex, which was held at Middlesex Guildhall on the 9th May, at which the Council was represented by Mrs. B. J. Monro, J.P., Mrs. W. M. Maughan, J.P., and the Medical Officer of Health. The Committee have duly noted the report, and it is understood that arising out of the conference proposals will shortly be submitted by the County Council to the Maternity and Child Welfare Authorities in Middlesex for consideration.

#### 28.—BRITISH SOCIAL HYGIENE COUNCIL:

A letter was submitted from the British Social Hygiene Council suggesting that the Council should purchase a series of pictorial posters on "Population and the Family," which has been produced by the Population Advisory Board of the British Social Hygiene Council as a basis for popular education on problems of population. The Committee have deferred consideration of the matter pending the receipt of further information.

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## 29.—WEST HENDON HEALTH CENTRE:

Pursuant to the Committee's instructions, the Borough Engineer submitted an estimate of the cost of washing-down and re-distempering the ceilings and friezes at the West Hendon Health Centre. The cost of the work is estimated at £30.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Engineer's estimate be approved, and that he be authorised to put the work in hand.

#### 30.—HEALTH CENTRES, ETC.—ROTA:

The Committee duly noted the report of the Visiting–Rota, which is set  $\delta_{HI}$  in Part III. of this report (item 32).

#### 32.—REPORT OF VISITING ROTA:

The following report was submitted:

#### VISITING ROTA.

Present: Councillor L. Hirshfield (Chairman) and Alderman H. G. Potter, J.P., F.S.I.

Mrs. W. M. Maughan, J.P., and Mrs. B. J. Monro, J.P. (Co-opted Members for Maternity and Child Welfare).

A visit was made on the 10th May, 1944, to St. Mary's C.E. School, where a dental inspection session was in progress; the Dole Street War-time Day Nursery; Watling Avenue War-time Nursery (which is in course of construction); Mill Hill Health Centre, and the Hendon Isolation and Emergency Hospital. There are no matters arising from our visit to the War-time Day Nurseries and the Health Centre calling for the attention of the Committee.

#### Hendon Isolation and Emergency Hospital.

#### (a) Boundary Fence:

To prevent children from the adjoining estate entering the hospital grounds by climbing over the boundary fence, the double strands of barbed wire surmounting the fence should be renewed. It is accordingly

RECOMMENDED—That authority be given to an expenditure of £5 8s. for the purchase of eight coils of barbed wire, subject to the necessary permit being issued by the Middlesex War Agricultural Committee.

#### (b) Gas Incinerator—Flue Pipe:

The Sugg gas incinerator installed in the Nurses' Home is fitted with an asbestic compound fluepipe which has no provision for interior cleaning when required. Consequently the pipe gets choked with sooty deposits, and it has been necessary periodically to have it dismantled and cleaned by the Gas Company's workmen. This could be avoided if the existing flue were replaced by a metal pipe fitted with cleaning ports at the angles, thus enabling regular cleaning to be carried out by the hospital porters. The Gas Light and Coke Company have been asked to submit an estimate of the cost of the conversion, and it is

#### 34.—GREATER LONDON ADVISORY COUNCIL FOR SMOKE ABATEMENT:

#### (a) Report of Conference.

The following report was submitted:-

"On Monday, the 9th inst., the Chairman of the Public Health and Medical Services Committee (Councillor L. Hirshfield), the Chairman of the Buildings and Town Planning Committee (Alderman R. A. B. Teare, M.B.E.), the Medical Officer of Health and the Senior Sanitary Inspector attended, as representatives of the Council, a conference on 'Post War Smoke Prevention in Greater London, held in a Committee Room at the House of Commons.

"The opening address by the Rt. Hon. H. U. Willink, K.C., M.P., Minister of Health, was followed by introductory addresses on 'Smoke Prevention in New Housing,' 'The Prevention of Industrial Smoke, and Smokeless Zones. With the Minister of Health were representatives of the Greater London Advisory Council for Smoke Abatement and the National Smoke Abatement Society.

"The three principal proposals of primary importance agreed upon were:-

- (1) That in all new houses (a) heating and cooking appliances should be smokeless, and (b) there should be not more than one open grate, which should be of a modern type capable of burning any kind of solid smokeless fuel, so that, even if the use of ordinary coal cannot at first be avoided, a transition to smokeless fuel may be made without any alteration of the grate.
- (2) That all new fuel-burning appliances for premises other than dwelling-houses should be approved for smokelessness and general suitability by a competent authority before they are installed.
- (3) That the question of establishing smokeless zones be examined in detail,

"The hope was expressed that with the aid of modern technology it would be possible to give London a pure and health-giving atmosphere and a cleanliness and brightness that would rival those of any of the world's great capitals."

# (b) Appointment of representatives to serve on the Advisory Council,

The Council at its last meeting decided to become a member of the Greater London Advisory Council for Smoke Abatement. Under the constitution of the Council this Authority is entitled to appoint not more than two representatives, one of whom shall be an officer of the Authority.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Chairman of the Public Health and Medical Services Committee (Councillor L. Hirshfield) and the Medical Officer of Health be appointed as the Council's representatives on the Creater London Advisory Council for Smoke Abatement, and that the Senior Sanitary Inspector (Mr. C. Luck) be appointed as substitute for the Medical Officer of Health.

A plan of the seating accommodation at the tournaments has been submitted by the Borough Surveyor and approved.

#### 2. SWIMMING GALAS:

The Sub-Committee has arranged with the organisers of the swimming galas to provide programmes of the events, and to retain the proceeds from the sale thereof.

## 3. PERFORMING RIGHTS SOCIETY:

The Sub-Committee has approved a report by the Borough Treasurer to the effect that, in addition to the fee of approximately £16 16s, payable to the Performing Rights Society, there would be a small supplementary fee payable by the Council in respect of the Choral Concert to be given by the Choir of the Watling Community Association in Hendon Park on the 5th July.

#### 4. PHONOGRAPHIC PERFORMANCE, LTD.:

The Sub-Committee has authorised the payment of a fee of £6 6s, to the above company for the necessary licence in connection with the performance of music by means of gramophone records for dancing in the parks.

#### 5. PUBLICITY:

The Town Clerk has reported the receipt of the necessary licence from the Ministry of Supply, Paper Control, in connection with the posters and programmes required for advertising the entertainments. Quotations for the supply and printing of such posters and programmes have been invited, and it has been decided to accept the quotation of Warden & Co., Ltd., amounting to £80 14s. 6d. The question of the lay-out of the posters and programmes has been referred to the Chairman of the Sub-Committee.

REOLVED-That the Report of the above Sub-Committee be confirmed.

#### 3.—WATLING PARK—PROPOSED BUILDING:

In connection with the application of the Watling Community Association for permission to erect a prefabricated building on land forming part of Watling Park, for the purpose of a Youth Club, the Town Clerk submitted a report with regard to the legal position in relation to the user of the land. (Group II. Cttee. 17/4/44, E.P. & A.—6.)

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Watling Community Association be informed that the Council regret they are unable to approve the erection of such building on the land in question.

#### 4.—WATLING PARK—ADDITIONAL BOWLING GREEN:

The Town Clerk reported the result of the recent prosecution against Mr. Lorenz in respect of damaging trees at Scratchwood. (Group II. Cttee. 6/3/44-9.)

#### 6.-LAND, REAR OF SHOPS, DEANS PARADE:

The Town Clerk reported on a letter from Mrs. Rogger suggesting that a piece of land at the rear of the shop in Deans Parade, at present used for the purpose of wartime allotments, should at the earliest possible date be laid out as a recreation ground.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the suggestion be disapproved, and that Mrs. Rogger be informed accordingly.

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#### 7.—TENNIS FACILITIES:

The Committee considered a letter from the Local Youth Committee in further reference to their application for the exclusive use of one tennis court in each area for the members of affiliated Youth Organisations, and suggesting that one court should be reserved in each of the following parks and playing fields:—

Sunnyfield Park: Montrose Playing Fields; Childs Hill Park. (Group II, Citee. 6/3/44, E.P. & A,--5.)

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council adhere to its previous decision in the matter, disapproving such application.

## 8.—PRESERVATION OF CERTAIN AREAS OF LAND:

The Committee duly noted a report by the Chairman (Councillor Curton) regarding a conference held at Guildhall, Westminster, on the 19th April with representatives of the Middlesex County Council, in connection with the preservation of certain areas of land,

#### 9.—REFRESHMENTS IN PARKS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from Mrs. E. Reed offering a sum of £5 for the right to sell refreshments at the kiosk in Sunny Hill Park for the period ending 31st March, 1945.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND - That such offer be accepted.

#### 10.-HENDON PARK AND BASING HILL PARK:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the Northern Polytechnic for permission to hold chain-surveying classes in Hendon Park and Basing Hill Park. It is understood that no surveying work will be carried out over flower-beds, shrubberies, allotments, tennis-courts, or any other laid-out space.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That permission be granted, subject to the Northern Polytechnic indemnifying the Council against any damage to the parks and any claims which might arise in connection with the proposed user.

#### 11.-MONTROSE PLAYING FIELDS-CIRCUS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from Ginnett's Circus for permission to have the use of a portion of Hendon Park or Montrose Playing Fields on the 3rd, 4th and 5th July, for the purpose of their Circus.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That permission be given for the Circus to be held in Montrose Playing Fields, subject to the payment of a sum of £15 and to the deposit of a sum of £25 against any damage caused to the Council's property, and to the Council being indemnified against any claims which may arise in connection with the proposed user.

#### 12.—LAND—WEST HENDON PLAYING FIELDS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that Mr. D. J. Andrews had terminated his annual tenancy of a portion of the above playing fields, and that such land was given up at the end of March.

Noted.

## 13.—PROVISION OF PERMANENT ALLOTMENTS:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Federation of Middlesex Horticultural and Allotments Societies calling attention to the urgent necessity of providing for permanent allotments in the scheme for post-war planning.

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RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Federation be informed that this matter has already been considered, and the necessary provision will be made.

## 14.—ARCHFIELDS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a request from the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies for the supply of an additional Anderson shelter at the above allotments. One shelter has already been supplied, and it will be necessary for the authority of the London Civil Defence Region to be obtained before further shelters are supplied for allotment purposes.

## 15.—BOOTH ROAD AND COOL OAK LANE:

The Borough Surveyor reported that clinkers would be supplied to the above aliot ments, as requested by the Federation.

#### 16.—DAWS LANE:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the Federation requested the provision of new wooden supports under the water-pipes and for new washers to be fixed. The work will be put in hand as early as possible.

The Federation requested the supply of 100 agricultural pipes for draining plots 46, 47 and 48, at the above allotments.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Borough Surveyor, with authority to supply the pipes if considered necessary.

#### 19.—COLINDEEP LANE:

The Federation of Allotment Societies reported that the fencing at the above allotments had been repaired by Garstins, Ltd., and that the rubbish had been removed from plot 23 in accordance with the Council's request. (Group II. Cttee. 17/4-44, E.P. & A.—10.)

#### 20.—REQUISITIONS:

Pursuant to the Council's resolution No. 190—8/5/44, the Committee considered a memorial signed by residents of the streets in the vicinity of Dole Street, Sanders Lane, and also by visitors to the Paddington Council's Cemetery, regarding the above 'bus route, and suggesting the continuance of the single-deck 'bus (Route 240) from Mill Hill Broadway to Daws Lane, Wise Lane, Dole Street and Devonshire Road to Mill Hill East.

The Committee is of opinion that there is an urgent necessity for travelling facilities in this area, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the memorial be forwarded to the London Passenger Transport Board, and that they be informed accordingly.

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#### 22.—UNLICENSED STREET TRADER:

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The Town Clerk reported that John Thomas Wrench, on the 29th April, was observed by the police to be trading in Watling Avenue without a street trading licence, thus contravening Section 149 of the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That proceedings be instituted against John Thomas Wrench for the recovery of the penalties provided by Section 149 (1) of the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929.

#### 23.-FOULING OF FOOTWAY:

### 1.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £141 3s. 6d. were submitted.

### 2.—W.V.S. REPRESENTATION ON COMMITTEE:

The Chief Officer Meals Service submitted an apology for absence from Miss J. Lawless, and, in view of the information given to the Committee regarding Miss Lawless' association with the W.V.S., the Committee have instructed the Chief Officer Meals Service to submit a further report on the matter.

### 3.—INTERVIEW WITH DIVISIONAL FOOD OFFICER:

It was reported that, in accordance with the Committee's instructions, the Chairman (Councillor F. J. Collins), Councillor C. P. Kartriber and the Chief Officer Meals Service had interviewed the London Divisional Food Officer on the 4th instant concerning (a) the scheme for Cressingham Restaurant, and (b) the proposed mobile service for aged and infirm persons.

### (a) Cressingham Restaurant,

The case for the approval of this scheme was discussed at length. The Divisional Officer explained that, owing to the financial difficulties involved, he could not take the responsibility of approving such a scheme at this stage of the war. If, however, a detailed case were made in writing he would submit it to the headquarters of the Ministry of Food for their decision. The case has now been prepared and sent to the Divisional Food Officer for transmission to the Ministry, whose decision is still awaited.

### (h) Proposed Mobile Service.

On this question the Divisional Food Officer reaffirmed his decision that the cost of a vehicle could not be approved as a capital charge subject to reimbursement by the Ministry of Food, nor could the cost be met out of accumulated profits of the restaurant service. He stated, further, that such a service was not the responsibility of the Ministry of Food, but of the Local Authority in conjunction with the Ministry of Health.

In view of the Divisional Food Officer's statement regarding responsibility for the proposed mobile service, the Committee

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the Ministry of Health be asked to approve the provision of a suitable vehicle for the purposes of a mobile meals service.
- (ii) That the Public Health and Medical Services Committee be asked to support the application.

### 4.--BURGLARIES:

The Chief Officer Meals Service reported that on Saturday morning the 29th April, the store-room of Granville Restaurant was broken into and certain food stocks stolen. The boys responsible were subsequently apprehended by the police, and on May 9th were charged at Hendon Police Court and remanded for a fortnight for further inquiries relating to other charges. Part of the missing stocks were recovered, leaving a net loss valued at £1.78, 9d.

During the week-end 29th-30th April Hartley Restaurant was also broken into, but the only article stolen was a portable wireless set in the manageress' office, the property of the manageress.

### 6.—THE FORTUNE RESTAURANT:

In this connection, the attention of the Committee was drawn to the difficulties and delays encountered in the progress of the work at this restaurant, and in these circumstances, and also the fact that the restaurant would be able to seat only 90 to 100 persons, it was

### 1.—SERVICE PAY FOR CIVIL DEFENCE SERVICES:

Increases in the basic pay of whole-time members of the Civil Defence Services and Fire Guards, according to length of service of the members after attaining their twentieth birthday (aggregated where a member has served in different sections of Civil Defence, Fire Guard, National Fire Service, Police War Reserve, etc.) have been authorised by the Ministry of Home Security, with effect from the 1st January, 1944, as indicated below:—

Lorry drivers in receipt of a local authority's rate of pay (as is the case of the drivers in the Hendon Heavy Rescue Service) continue to receive that rate if higher than that quoted in the above schedule.

No service pay is payable where the Civil Defence pay exceeds the basic rate by more than 20s, per week in the case of men and 13s, in the case of women. In view of this, depot superintendents, district wardens, shift supervisors at Rescue depots, and leaders of Heavy Rescue parties do not benefit.

. The Committee has endorsed the general view of the heads of the services that it would have been preferable, with a view to encouraging training, to have introduced "proficiency pay" rather than "service pay"; as, however, the principle of "service pay" has been adopted, it is considered that this should have been granted to all ranks, and the Minister has been advised accordingly.

The Ministry has also been advised that the Committee consider it unfortunate that service with His Majesty's Forces has been excluded from the list of Services in which previous service by present whole-time members of Civil Defence can be aggregated when computing service pay.

### 2.—SALARIES:

The County Council has approved the granting of increments in the salaries payable to the following officers, with effect from the dates shown:--

### 3.—SURRENDER OF CLOTHING COUPONS BY CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL:

The case to be presented by the deputation appointed to represent 17 authorities in Group 6 of the London Civil Defence Region, including Hendon, appealing for a reduction in the number of clothing coupons which have to be surrendered annually by whole-time uniformed members of the Civil Defence Service has been prepared, and arrangements made for the reception of the deputation by the Board of Trade and Minister of Home Security on the 23rd May, 1944.

### 4.—CORPORATION'S AMBULANCE SERVICE:

During the month of April, 1944, 203 calls were made in respect of private cases and 47 in respect of street accident and illnesses. Of these 250 cases, 31 were conveyed in Civil Defence ambulances.

The Committee, having considered the request of the Transport and General Workers' Union that A.R.P. personnel should be paid at J.I.C. rates when engaged in the operation of the Corporation's Ambulance Service, has recommended to the Finance and General Purposes Committee the approval of the payment of a bonus based on the difference in the J.I.C. rates applicable to drivers and attendants of ambulances and the normal Civil Defence rates of pay, such bonus to be shared by all members of the Council's Civil Defence Ambulance Service.

### 6.—INSPECTION OF RESPIRATORS AT SCHOOLS:

It is anticipated that the inspection of respirators at the various schools in the Borough will be completed by the 13th June next. Statistics collated to date show that 13 per cent. of the respirators examined required to be changed by reason of defect or incorrect size.

### 7.—FIRE PREVENTION:

Consequent upon the resignation of Mrs. Binney, Mrs. I. Worby has been appointed Records Clerk in the Fire Guard Section of the Chief Warden's office, at a salary of £4 5s. per week, plus bonus, with effect from the 29th May.

The Regional Commissioners have now approved the classification of the Head Fire Guards in "B," "D," "G," "H," "J" and "L" Districts as grade 1 appointments (see item 11 of the last Report).

During the month of April the National Fire Service made 92 first inspections of lofts in various houses in the Borough. Seven not complying with the Order were found to be satisfactory on a second visit.

### 17.—INSURANCE — FIRE:

At the last meeting of the Finance and General Purposes Sub-Committee of the Education Committee, consideration was given to a report dealing with certain matters arising out of the damage by fire to the caretaker's bungalow at Colindale School, and reference was made to the adequacy of the figure at which the bungalow was insured against the risk of fire. The Borough Treasurer reported that the insurance of buildings against the risk of fire is not normally subject to average, and in the event of damage the amount recoverable is the cost of reinstating the damage or the amount insured, whichever is less. Owing to the war, building values have increased substantially, and in the event of a total loss it is probable that some part of the cost of reinstatement to an insured building would not be recoverable from the insurance company concerned.

Insurance of contents against the risk of fire is often subject to average, and such insurance should therefore be maintained at the full present-day values, as far as possible. Following upon the completion of the valuation of the moveable property of the Corporation by Mr. Adamson, recently reported to the Committee, amendments will be made in the insurances in respect of the contents of the various Corporation properties, and at the same time suitable amendments will be made in the insurances in respect of buildings. A substantial beginning has been made with the preparation of the schedules, and these will be sent to the companies as early as possible.

It is suggested that this practice should be discontinued, and that when a member of the Association comes to a decision which involves combined action the far more effective course will be to communicate with the Association, so that the proposals may be considered by the Council or the appropriate standing committee.

### 27.-LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION PLAN:



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ldleses rdance Article On the 28th February last the Council approved a revised income scale, to be applied in connection with the provision of additional nourishment and the reduction or remission of fees under the Maternity and Child Welfare Act, 1918, and the Education Act, 1921.

With regard to the application of the scale to the School Medical Services, a letter was submitted from the Board of Education in the following terms:—

"The Board are glad to learn that the Authority propose to adopt a more generous income scale for use in assessing the charges to be made to parents for the medical treatment and meals supplied to their children. It appears, however, that the scale proposed by the Authority for free provision is as follows:—

It will be seen that in some cases increments for additional children of only 4s, and 4s, 3d, are proposed, which are insufficient to cover, on the average, the bare out-of-pocket expenses of maintaining a child. I am therefore to say that, while the scale appropriate to the area is in the first instance a matter for the Authority's determination, the Board would feel difficulty in regarding the proposed scale as satisfactory, and I am to suggest that the Authority should consider revising the scale so as to provide increments of, say, 8s., or at least 7s., in the case of families of more than four in number."

The Sub-Committee, after further consideration of the scale, are in agreement with the observations of the Board of Education, and submit the following revised scale, which in general meets the points raised by the Board, and also includes certain other revisions based on such observations:—

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# 2.—BOARD OF EDUCATION CIRCULARS:

# (a) Entry to Training Colleges in Autumn, 1944.

Board of Education Circular No. 1655 was submitted, stating that men students under the age of 18 on the 1st October, 1944, may be admitted to training colleges, and would be reserved until the end of the term in which the age of 19 was reached, or to the end of March, 1946, whichever is the earlier. Reservation will be subject to satisfactory progress in studies and to the performance of part-time national service in a senior training corps. Men students of medical grades III. and IV. may take the full course of six terms. The Ministry of Labour will permit these men to enter training colleges, and will not require them to take up or continue in any work of national importance.

# (b) Extension of School Life in Suitable Cases and the Supply of Teachers.

Board of Education Circular No. 1654 was submitted, stating that the McNair Committee has drawn attention to two ways in which assistance can be given towards meeting the problem of the supply of teachers. The first is that steps should be taken to prevent suitable pupils being lost to the profession by premature withdrawal from school owing to economic pressure. Local Higher Education Authorities have full powers to grant maintenance allowances to pupils at the advanced stage of secondary school life where justified. The second is that the increasing importance of the teaching profession should be brought clearly to the notice of boys and girls in the higher forms of secondary schools. The McNair Committee urge the provision of continued education for suitable recruits to the teaching profession up to the age of 18 in appropriate cases.

Although the development of educational policy will at a later stage make further facilities available on a wider range of post-primary schools than at present, for the time being the most obvious course is to transfer suitable pupils at the age of 13 from senior to secondary schools, as now defined, and the Board desire that every effort should be made to accelerate this development before the beginning of the school year 1944-45. The Board also ask Authorities to consider the cases of pupils of 14 or 15 who would otherwise leave the elementary schools, but who might with advantage be transferred.

## 7.—EXHIBITION OF AMERICAN BOOKS:

The Chief Librarian submitted the following report on the Exhibition of American Books, which was held at the Central Library from May 20th to June 6th:—

"The public meeting in the Town Hall on May 20th, addressed by Lt.-Commander Herbert Agar, was attended by about 200 people. The exhibition consisted of approximately 500 books, plus a certain number of American periodicals. About 90 of the books were recently imported under the Government scheme to promote Anglo-American understanding and goodwill, the rest being drawn from the library stock. The book display was enhanced by photographs lent by the U.S. Office of War Information and others; posters executed by members of the library staff; a globe of the world, lent by Bell Lane School; ferns, flowers, etc. from the Council's nurseries. A 14-page booklist, entitled 'Introducing the United States,' was also distributed.

"During the fourteen days that the exhibition was open it was visited by over 3,200 people, including 900 senior school children and students from the Hendon Technical College. Many of the children came in organised school parties, accompanied by teachers, who said that the visit had been preceded by a suitable preparatory lesson. A party of members of the London and Middlesex Archaeological Society also attended.

"Members of the public were warmly appreciative of the exhibition, mentioning especially their satisfaction at the Council's participation in the Government's scheme for importing books from America, and the decision to show the books in bulk for public examination before they went into circulation. A satisfactory feature is the fact that some 1,150 reservations of books were handed in by the public. Many further reserves from the booklist are still being made both at the Central and Branch Libraries.

"An expression of thanks for loans and assistance has been sent to various people, but special reference must be made of Dr. Richard Heindel, of the American Library, U.S. Office of War Information, and Mrs. E. Gawme, also of the Office of War Information. Dr. Heindel also followed up Commander Agar's address with a presentation of a U.S. Government treatise on American foreign policy, entitled 'Peace and War, 1931-1941.'

"Certain members of the library staff assisted in the considerable amount of work involved in organising the exhibition, but the bulk of it was undertaken by Miss E. M. Jowett, M.A., acting senior cataloguing assistant."

The Committee have noted the report with satisfaction.

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# 8.—CHILDREN'S BOOK EXHIBITION:

The Chief Librarian reported that it had been suggested that, in co-operation with the National Book Council, a Children's Book Week might be arranged some time in November. This would include an exhibition of about 400 books, and talks for children given by well-known authors and lecturers. The total cost, including lecturers' fees would be about £30, and the National Book Council state that in other districts where the Book Week has been held the cost has been shared by the Library and Education Authorities. The Committee are of opinion that the proposal is one which should commend itself to the Council, and they accordingly

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council approve the proposal to hold an exhibition of children's books on the lines suggested, and that the Education Committee be asked to make a contribution towards the cost involved.

# 9.—ENGLISH BOOKS FOR DUTCH CHILDREN:

It was reported to the Committee that, at the request of the Education Department of the Dutch Government, Miss E. H. Colwell, the children's librarian, had prepared a list of representative modern English books for children. These books are to be purchased in England and taken to Holland after the war, where they will be exhibited to children and adults to stimulate interest in English books and life, and to encourage a friendly spirit between the two countries.

RESOLVED—That the amount to be charged for the accommodation provided in 8, Hillcrest Avenue, be increased from 32s. 6d. to 35s. per week as from 22.5.1944.

(ii) 34, Cissbury Ring South.

On the report of the Housing Manager on an application for reassessment, it was

RESOLVED—That the charge for the accommodation provided in 34, Cissbury Ring South, be reduced from 35s. to 30s. per week as from 19.6.44.

(c) Requisitioning of Further Premises.

The Borough Engineer submitted List No. 4 (set out hereunder) of further properties suggested for requisitioning for rehousing families inadequately housed, under the terms of Circular 2845. The list comprises 29 properties (excluding the two properties owned by the Council, which do not require to be requisitioned), which, after repair or conversion, will provide accommodation for 38 families.

A report was also submitted summarising the position regarding requisitioning. Up to the present 16 properties are in the possession of the Council.

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RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council approve of the necessary steps being taken, in pursuance of Ministry of Health Circular 2845, with a view to requisitioning the properties included in the list set out above as accommodation for families living in unsatisfactory housing conditions.

# 15.—ADVANCE PREPARATION OF HOUSING SITES:

A letter was submitted from the London Master Builders' Association deprecating the scheme proposed by the Government for the carrying out of works for the advance preparation of housing sites by selected large contractors operating for a group of local authorities, and asking the Council to support any movement to secure (a) that the smaller and medium-sized builders in this area may be afforded an opportunity (at present denied to them) of tendering for this work, which will be a charge upon local rates; and (b) that the ratepayers generally will not be mulcted in extravagant costs resulting from the ill-conceived grouping proposals of the Ministry.

A communication was also submitted from the National Federation of Building Trades Employers, setting out their reasons why it is considered to be in the best interests of the community that the decision of the Government should be modified, and urging that the work of advance preparation of housing sites should be let by individual authorities in single contracts, capable of being undertaken by local firms.

A letter in similar terms to the communication from the London Master Builders' Association has also been received from Buckingham & Sons, Ltd., building contractors of Hendon. The Committee have duly **noted** the communication.

# 16.—CO-OPERATION WITH LOCAL AUTHORITIES FOR THE PROVISION OF HOUSES:

A communication was submitted from the National Federation of Housing Societies drawing attention to the provisions of Sections 93 and 94 of the Housing Act, 1936, which authorises local authorities to promote the formation or extension of, or assist a housing association. The Society stress the following advantages which, in their opinion, would be gained by implementing the powers given by the Act:—

- (1) A Housing Society can usefully supplement a Local Authority's work, and assist it in its development and redevelopment schemes. This will be of significant value after the war in helping the Authority speedily to accomplish its desired task of overtaking the acute housing shortage.
- (2) Since Housing Societies, by constitution, do not trade for profit, an Authority may be assured that it will be supported in housing its own people at rents which they can afford.
- (3) A Housing Society can provide, in addition to dwellings for the lower income group, other accommodation suitable for those in a higher group. Thus mixed development can be undertaken, which is materially important and helpful in creating real live neighbourhood units, complete with amenities, thereby avoiding the undesirable segregation of classes.
- (4) By placing a part (or even the whole) of its housing schemes in the hands of a Housing Society, a Local Authority will ensure that no losses fall as a charge upon the general rates. Furthermore, finance normally allocated for housing projects is thereby released, and may be devoted to other necessary work, such as civic buildings and amenity improvements, etc., beneficial to the town or village and its community life.

The Committee have noted the communication.

# 17.—HOME FOR AGED PERSONS:

. A letter was submitted from the Hendon Committee of the Charity Organisation Society putting forward proposals for the establishment of a hostel in the Borough for aged persons of both sexes, and asking for the Council's co-operation on the lines indicated in the letter.

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Whilst the Committee are not at this stage in a position to submit any recommendation in relation to the proposals contained in the letter, they are of opinion that the whole question of the provision of accommodation for aged people should be fully investigated, and they have accordingly appointed a Sub-Committee, consisting of the Chairman (Councillor Pryke), Aldermen Richardson and Teare; Councillors Hirshfield and (Mrs.) Parvin, to consider the question and to submit a report thereon. In the meantime, instructions have been given for a reply in suitable terms to be sent to the Hendon Committee of the Charity Organisation Society.

# BUILDINGS AND TOWN PLANNING.

(Alderman R. A. B. Teare, M.B.E. — Chairman.)

# 18.—GENERAL SCHEME FOR THE REPAIR OF HOUSES, ETC.— MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR NO. 2871:

# (a) Programme of Repairs.

The Borough Engineer reported that, in accordance with Ministry of Health Circular No. 49/44 (which was reported at the last meeting of the Committee), he had prepared a programme of repairs to war-damaged houses which can be undertaken by the Council. Under the terms of the circular, expenditure is limited to £500 per house; expenditure in excess of this amount cannot be incurred without the special approval of the Senior Regional Officer of the Ministry of Health. The Borough Engineer has also been in communication with the War Damage Commission, with a view to eliminating from the repair list any houses which the Commission have classified as suitable for value payments.

In the opinion of the Borough Engineer, 30 houses can be repaired at a cost of less than £500 each, and these will be put in hand in the first instance. This number is in addition to the 11 houses already in course of repair by the Council. As regards houses in respect of which the cost of repair is likely to exceed £500, these number 46. and it is proposed, subject to the approval of the Ministry, that these should be dealt with after the first list has been completed. In addition, a list of 14 houses has been submitted to the War Damage Commission as houses which will require to be demolished and rebuilt, but no action will be taken with regard to this list until the decision of the War Damage Commission has been received.

A programme on the above lines has been submitted to the Ministry of Health for Noted. approval.

# (b) Certificates of Essentiality.

The Borough Engineer reported that during the months of April and May certificates of essentiality had been issued, under the provisions of the above circular, in respect of 89 dwellings, representing repair works amounting to £13,163 1s. 9d.

Noted.

# 19.—HAMPSTEAD GARDEN SUBURB RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATION:

A letter, in the following terms, was submitted from Engr.-Admiral Hefford, O.B.E., Chairman of the Hampstead Garden Suburb Residents' Association:-

" 12th June, 1944,

The Hampstend Garden Suburb is world-renowned as a very successful and unique example of town-planning, of which its founders and developers, and the municipalities concerned, are justly proud, and it is highly desirable to maintain the special features which have contributed to its success as a community, and to reinstate those

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which have been temporarily suspended during the war, and the relevant bye-laws. With this object in view, the Hampstead Garden Suburb Residents' Association has taken steps to ascertain the views of the 44 societies, etc., religious, social and practical, which have functioned in the Suburb before the war (including those which have suspended action during hostilities), and they all agree that a meeting of representatives should be called towards the end of July to discuss plans for the future well-being of the Suburb and for the restoration of its amenities. The speakers who will address the meeting to open the debate will be specially selected to state the various view points and interests, and in order to facilitate freedom of speech the Press will not be invited to report the proceedings.

"In these circumstances, the Residents' Association will be glad to receive from your Corporation an assurance of your sympathetic attitude towards our endeavours, which will necessarily be of mutual benefit to our community and to the municipalities, etc.,, concerned, and will involve no conflict of interests. We desire to quote your satisfactory reply to this letter at the meeting of representatives in July, where it will give much encouragement, and stimulate the good work to support our efforts."

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Hampstead Garden Suburb Residents'

Association be informed that in relation to town-planning it is the policy
of the Council not only to preserve existing amenities, but to improve the
amenities of the Borough as far as possible, and that the Council will give
sympathetic consideration to any proposals of this nature by associations
and other bodies.

21.—TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT, 1932:

# Formation of Joint Executive Committees,

The Town Clerk reported that at the conference of representatives of Middleser Authorities convened by the Ministry of Town and Country Planning, to consider the formation of Executive Joint Committees—at which His Worship the Mayor. Alderman Teare, the Borough Engineer and himself were present—agreement could not be reached as to the formation of a Joint Committee, with executive powers, and the matter was referred to the North Middlesex Joint Advisory Town Planning Committee for consideration. A Sub-Committee appointed by the Joint Committee considered the matter, and reported to the Joint Committee in the terms of a confidential report.

The Joint Committee—at which Alderman Teare, Councillor Pinkney, the Borolgen Engineer and the Town Clerk were present—did not arrive at an agreement, and decided to submit the report of the Sub-Committee to the Local Authorities concerned for their observations. A copy of the Confidential Report has been circulated to each member of the Committee, and is also recorded in MS. in the Committee's Minute Book.

The recommendations of the Sub-Committee in so far as they deal with matters of broad principle, provide for—

- (a) A Joint Executive Committee consisting of those Authorities at present included in the North Middlesex Joint Advisory Town Planning Committee, with the addition of Barnet, East Barnet and Cheshunt—which are in Hertfordshire—but leaving Harrow, Wembley and Hendon at liberty to join a new West Middlesex Joint Committee, if they so desire.
- (b) The delegation to the Joint Committee of the powers and duties of the Local Authorities in connection with the preparation of a scheme.
- (c) The constituent authorities to be responsible for carrying out the scheme in so far as it affects their area.

A comprehensive and informative memorandum on the proposed establishment of Joint Executive Town Planning Committees prepared by the Borough Engineer—a copy of which had been circulated to each member of the Committee and is also recorded in MS.—was also considered by the Committee.

With regard to the areas of the proposed Joint Executive Committee, it is suggested by the Borough Surveyor that, instead of sub-dividing the county into smaller areas, as is proposed, it would be sounder from a town-planning point of view to maintain the area of the existing North Middlesex Joint Town Planning Committee east of the Edgware Road, and to add thereto the Local Authorities' areas in the adjacent county referred to in his report, as these are already developing concurrently with the Authorities in Middlesex, and possess a high degree of community of interest with them, and are confronted with the same problems.

The existing boundary between the North Middlesex Advisory Committee and the West Middlesex Advisory Committee is too indefinite, and it is suggested that the county could be divided into two Executive Committees, taking the Edgware Road as the dividing line. The Northern Committee would then consist of 10 local authorities within the County of Middlesex, to which should be added the adjacent local authority areas in Hertfordshire mentioned in the Borough Engineer's report, whilst the existing West Middlesex Committee would be enlarged to take in the authorities up to the Edgware Road, and further enlarged by the addition of suitable areas from the adjacent counties. The suitability of the Edgware Road as the boundary is emphasised by the fact that it is completely developed for the greater part of its length, and is a trunk road under the jurisdiction of the Ministry of Transport as the highway authority.

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After consideration of the report of the Town Clerk and the memorandum submitted by the Borough Engineer, the Committee

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council agree to the formation of a Joint Executive Committee and to the adoption of the following general principles:--

- (1) The transfer to such Committee of the powers of the constituent local authorities in relation to the preparation and submission to the Minister for approval of a "master" planning scheme setting out the general lines of development of the combined areas of such authorities, in so far as such development relates to
  - (i) Zoning or regulation of the user of land for the most suitable purpose.
- (ii) Roads forming the main lines of communication throughout the Joint District, including in respect of such lines of communication the laying down of new roads, widening existing roads, and the establishment of building lines along such roads.
- (iii) Open spaces necessary for the general benefit of the Joint District.
- (iv) The preservation of amenity of the Joint District.
- (2) That the Minister be requested to take all necessary steps to ensure that each constituent authority shall prepare and submit to the Minister for approval and subsequently carry out a detailed planning scheme in respect of its own area, incorporating therein such provisions as may be necessary to give effect to the "master" scheme.

Provided that where compliance with the provisions of the master scheme involves financial obligations, the Joint Committee shall decide the amount of contribution to be made by each constituent authority, having regard to

- (i) The amount of benefit to be derived by such constituent authority in relation to the Joint District as a whole.
- (ii) The expenses incurred or to be incurred by such constituent authority in relation to similar provision in its area which benefits the Joint District

Any such decision of the Joint Committee shall be subject to appeal to the Courts.

(3) All land acquired for the purpose of the master scheme shall be acquired by and vest in the respective constituent authorities in whose areas such land is situate.

# PUBLIC HEALTH AND MEDICAL SERVICES. (Councillor L. Hirshfield—Chairman.)

22.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936 (PART VII.)—CHILD LIFE PROTECTION:

Case No. 345.

The Medical Officer of Health reported on an application (Case No. 345) for permission to undertake for reward the nursing and maintenance of children under the age of nine years apart from their parents.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the maximum number of children under the age of nine years that may be kept at the premises in respect of Case No. 345 be fixed at one.

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# 23.—HEALTH VISITOR:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that Miss Williams, one of the Council's health visitors, who was called up for service with H.M. Forces on the 3rd January, 1940, had been discharged on medical grounds, and that she would be taking up her duties in the Public Health Department on the 20th instant. The Committee have referred to the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health that the services of the temporary health visitor who was appointed in the place of Miss Williams be retained.

# 24.—HOME HELP SCHEME:

The present scheme provides for the employment of five full-time home helps, together with a panel of casual workers who undertake cases as and when their domestic commitments permit. The services of five women as full-time home helps has been obtained, but since the last report of the Medical Officer of Health the number of casual workers in this service has decreased from 13 to 5. There is no doubt that this form of service is very much appreciated by the mothers, particularly under present conditions, but although every endeavour has been made to increase the panel of casual workers, this has not met with any success.

The Medical Officer of Health has interviewed the Manager of the local offices of the Ministry of Labour and National Service on this matter, and he arranged to call up for interview a number of women who might prove to be suitable. Unfortunately, however, no further names were submitted for inclusion on the panel of casual home helps as a result of these interviews, but one woman was referred who was prepared to undertake this work in a full-time capacity, and was appointed to complete the complement of five full-time home helps.

Recent experience suggests that at present it is easier to obtain the services of full-time home helps than to maintain a panel of casual home helps. The Committee therefore

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the engagement of such additional full-time home helps as may from time to time be found necessary, such appointments to be of a temporary character, and regulated as far as possible by the demand for this service, the terms and conditions of service of the home helps to be in accordance with the official scheme.

# 25.—EXERCISES FOR EXPECTANT MOTHERS:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted the following report:-

"There is a growing volume of evidence to the effect that training in relaxation, combined with exercises, is of value in promoting easier labour in selected cases. This training has been in use for some considerable time at St. Thomas's and the Royal Free Hospitals, and more recently in the health centres of the Royal Borough of Kensington, whose Medical Officer of Health has been most helpful in permitting members of my staff to see these classes in operation. The question of suitable staff to conduct such exercises presents a difficulty, the qualities required being some ability to teach, a sense of rhythm, and sympathy with the mothers and with the ideals of a physiological childbirth. A member of the Civil Defence First Aid personnel, however, has volunteered for this work, and, with training, should prove suitable.

"The matter is partly experimental, and it is proposed, in the first instance, to hold one class each week at a health centre, the class being divided into two sessions of approximately one hour's duration. The equipment required is not elaborate, consisting of a gramophone and records, certain wooden steps and bars, which would probably be provided through the Rescue Service, and a certain number of rugs and blankets to supplement those already in existence at the health centre."

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The Committee have approved the report of the Medical Officer of Health, and

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That a course of exercises for selected expectant mothers be established.
- (2) That the exercises be conducted by an instructress under the general supervision of Dr. Mary Watson, supervisor of midwives.
- (3) That the fee payable to the instructress be determined by the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee.
- (4) That the necessary equipment be purchased at an estimated cost of £25.
- (5) That details of the scheme be forwarded to the Ministry of Health for information.

# 26.--NURSING AND MATERNITY HOME, 390, WATFORD WAY, N.W. 4:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted a report arising out of an inspection of the above nursing and maternity home. This nursing home was originally registered by the Middlesex County Council for seven patients. At that time the staff consisted of Mrs. Taylor and two general trained nurses, both of whom were non-resident. Subsequently the staff was reduced to Mrs. Taylor and one part-time untrained helper. The Council therefore passed a resolution on the 6th December, 1937 (P.H. & M.S. 15/11/37—20), as a result of which the number of patients permitted to be in residence at any one time was reduced to three, only two of whom were to be maternity cases, with the proviso that in the event of these numbers being exceeded, a general trained nurse or one in possession of the certificate of the Central Midwives Board must be employed. Since that date Mrs. Taylor has engaged one full-time trained assistant, who is resident, and one part-time non-resident untrained assistant, and last year Mrs. Taylor adopted a child, with the result that the accommodation for nursing cases has been reduced. In view of the altered circumstances, the Committee

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the resolution passed by the Council on the 6th December, 1937 (P.H. & M.S. 15/11/37—20) be amended by the addition of the following conditions:—

- (i) That at no time shall the number of patients exceed five, and that only two shall be maternity cases.
- (ii) That each maternity case shall have a separate room.

# 27.-MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE CARE OF ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN:

Ministry of Health Circular 2866.

The following statement of the proposals of the County Council's Maternity and Child Welfare Committee, which was submitted to the conference of representatives of welfare authorities in Middlesex at the Guildhall, Westminster, on the 9th May, was considered:—

# THE CARE OF ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR 2866.

#### Preliminary Considerations

The Circular draws attention to the problems of illegitimacy under war conditions, and urges welfare authorities to give consideration to them. The war-time increase in the number of illegitimate births may be only a temporary matter, and any scheme to deal with the problem, therefore, should not involve long-term commitments, but, on the other hand, should be capable of easy expansion.

Investigations carried out before calling the conference indicated that the problem was at present largely a county concern, in that it was being encountered by the almoners in the maternity departments of the county hospitals (where 50 per cent. of the births occur) by the Public Assistance Department, the special services section of the Education Department, in the County V.D. clinics, and in the County's maternity and child welfare area by the county midwives and health visitors.

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n num health The cases to be dealt with fall into three classes: (a) those in which the girl is able to return home to her parents with her baby. (b) those in which adoption of the child is advisable on access of the extreme youth of the mother, or of the fact that she is a married woman, and (c) those for which there is need of shelter to which the mother, after confinement, may go with her baby and stay for a time in an atmosphere of security, notil with sympathy and help she is able to re-establish herself and make a permanent home for herself and child.

### Present Facilities.

Classes (a) and (b) do not present any particular administrative problem, as fairly adequate arrangements for dealing with them already exist. There is, however, a shortage of hostel or similar accommodation, and arrangements for sorting cases and advising on particularly difficult cases leave something to be desired. At the present time advice and assistance is given both by the almost, and the health visitors, who come in contact with girls during pregnancy, and who work in close conjunction with the moral welfare societies, both Church of England and Roman Catholic. These societies do admirable work in providing hostel accommodation both before and after the birth of the child, but their representatives have stated quite definitely that they are not prepared to extend their work owing to difficulties of securing premises and staff.

In addition, the Council maintains a home as Poor Law Authority, for some 16 mothers and babies, not all of whom are illegitimate.

#### Proposed Arrangements.

The chief needs appear to be the provision of a hostel for mothers after confinement, and of a skilled social worker who could sort the cases requiring hostel accommodation, and assist the mothers in obtaining affiliation orders where possible and in adjusting their lives to the new conditions.  $T_{22}$  Committee would wish to suggest that the County Council should itself set up a hostel, or series of small hostels, to deal with such cases, but the difficulties already found in securing staff for existing institutions make this impracticable.

The Middlesex Branch of the British Red Cross Association has offered the Council the whole of the accommodation at its Hendon Hostel, which would accommodate 11 mothers and babies, at a weekly inclusive charge of 35s. (for mother and baby), subject to a minimum payment at the rate of £15–15s, per week (i.e., the rate for nine cases). The difficulty of obtaining staff for this hostel is met by the special facilities of the Red Cross for using voluntary personnel. Mothers would stay at the hostel for about two to three months, and some 60 cases per year could be received, at a conference of £820. The Society would be prepared to consider the opening of similar small hostels if the need arose.

It is proposed that this offer should be accepted, and that the District Welfare Authorities should participate, payment being made to the Council on the basis of user. The County Council, as welfare authority, would be liable to the Society, and make the necessary agreement with it, and the Council would have subsidiary agreements with each of the other participating authorities.

With regard to the employment of a special social worker, the County Council has recently appointed, in accordance with Circular 2834, a special services almoner (Miss Myer), whose duties involve visiting in the whole of the county area. Subject to the concurrence of the Council's Public Health Committee, under whose direction she works, it is considered that she could undertake, in addition to her present work, that of a special social worker in connection with illegitimacy. The County Maternity and Child Welfare Committee are satisfied with Miss Myer, who is an experienced hospital almoner, is well qualified to undertake the work in its area, and if other welfare authorities wished to make use of her services in their areas steps would be taken to secure the necessary approval. Miss Myer's salary is already a charge over the whole county. It is suggested that Miss Myer should act in a consultative capacity, co-operating with health visitors, almoners, etc., and should make arrangements for the reception of mothers and babies in the hostels.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—

- (i) That the Middlesex County Council be informed that this Council is prepared to participate in a joint scheme with reference to the care of illegitimate children on the basis of the proposals indicated above.
- (ii) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents in due course.

# 28.—PROVISIONAL NATIONAL COUNCIL FOR MENTAL HEALTH:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that, arising out of a letter from the Provisional National Council for Mental Health, he arranged for Miss Ruth Thomas, the educational psychologist of the Provisional National Council for Mental Health, to

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address a joint meeting of the assistant medical officers and health visitors. project is to advise mothers with children of pre-school age on behaviour problems, and generally to give advice upon their attitude towards, and the upbringing of, the difficult child. The Committee are informed that the general opinion amongst psychiatrists is that the earlier the problem is tackled the better. The difficulties are often created by the attitude of the parent towards the child, and these can often be improved by wholesome advice if given sufficiently early. Under existing conditions the overanxious mother is a common cause of behaviour problems on the part of the child.

The Medical Officer of Health points out that in a service of this kind it is difficult to estimate accurately the results produced; these can be roughly gauged by the general attitude of the mother and child after the period of treatment. After discussing the matter at length with the medical members of his staff, the Medical Officer of Health is of opinion that there is a need for such a service, and that it should be given an opportunity to prove itself.

The Committee are in agreement with the views put forward by the Medical Officer of Health, and accordingly

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That an arrangement be made with the Provisional National Council for Mental Health for the attendance of a psychologist for one session per week, at a fee of two guineas per session, and that the matter be reviewed after the expiration of a period of six months.

### 29.—PROPOSED MEMORIAL HOSPITAL, FLOWER LANE, MILL HILL:

A letter was submitted from Mr. Hamilton Bailey transmitting proposals to use Nos. 41 and 43. Flower Lane, Mill Hill, for the purposes of a memorial hospital for surgical cases. The Committee have deferred consideration of the matter pending the decision of the Buildings and Town Planning Committee on the proposal.

### 30.-LONDON WOMEN'S PARLIAMENT:

A letter was submitted from the London Women's Parliament intimating that it is proposed to call a conference early in July to mobilise every possible woman for the hospitals, nurseries, home help service, and factory canteens, which play an important part in the war situation to-day, and suggesting that, in the meantime, a call from the Public Health Committee for labour of this type for local hospitals would bring an immediate response. The Committee have duly noted the communication.

There are will shortly be ready for occupation, and there are no matters arising from our visits to the Health Centres and Day Nurseries calling for the attention of the Committee.

### Hendon Isolation and Emergency Hospital.

#### (a) Refuse Disposal:

At the present time the refuse from the hospital is tipped into a covered container, which is removed at irregular intervals and the contents disposed of at the refuse destructor works. The accemulation of refuse gives rise to conditions which are undesirable, and we are of opinion that the best method for dealing with such refuse is by incineration. We accordingly

RECOMMEND-That the Borough Engineer be instructed to submit a report, together with an estimate of the cost of the provision of an incinerator, and that, pending the provision of an incinerator, arrangements be made for the emptying of the existing refuse container once each week.

### (b) Removal of Broken Crockery, etc.:

A considerable quantity of broken crockery, etc., has been deposited in the hospital grounds. We have given the necessary instructions with a view to the discontinuance of the practice, and

RECOMMEND-That the Borough Engineer be instructed to arrange for the removal of the broken crockery, etc., from the hospital grounds.

#### (c) Laundry:

It was reported to us that it has been necessary temporarily to shut down the hydro-extractor in the laundry pending the delivery of a spare part which was ordered some months ago. This has diminished the volume of washing which can be dealt with at the hospital laundry, and arrangements have therefore been made, for the time being, to send to the Hendon Laundry part of the non-infected linen from the nurses' home, at a cost of approximately three pounds per week. We

RECOMMEND-That approval be given to the action taken and the continuance of the arrangements until such time as the hydro-extractor is able to operate.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from Miss G. M. Stettauer, the W.V.S. Administrator, Group 6, stating that Miss J. Lawless had resigned her position as area organiser for Central Hendon Area, and suggesting that Mrs. M. Mercer, centre organiser for the Borough, be substituted as the representative of the W.V.S. on the Committee.

RESOLVED—That Mrs. M. Mercer be co-opted as the W.V.S. representative on the Committee in place of Miss J. Lawless.

# 3.-EVENING USE OF BRITISH RESTAURANTS:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from Mrs. I. Homa, chairman of a group of women in Golders Green forming part of a society known as the "League of Jewish Women." in support of a request by the National Women's Council that evening cafes be established for the use of Service men and women and industrial workers. The letter stated that difficulty had been encountered in securing suitable accommodation, but it was understood that in certain other areas the local authorities had permitted the use of British Restaurants for this purpose. In regard to Hendon, the writer suggested that if the cleaning of the room or rooms used in British Restaurants was the only obstacle, the group above mentioned was prepared to undertake that responsibility and to form a rota of women workers, in which they had been promised the co-operation of the local W.V.S.

A letter was also submitted from the Hon. Secretary of the Hendon Local Labour Party (Edgware Ward Committee), urging that consideration be given to the question of opening at least some of the restaurants in the Borough for evening meals and/or social functions, as it was felt to be a great pity that buildings so admirably adapted for the purpose should be closed for a great part of the day.

The Committee have appointed a Sub-Committee, consisting of Councillors F. J. Collins (Chairman), Mrs. D. M. Banwell, B.A., and W. A. Hicks and Mr. E. O. Robinson, to consider the opening of British Restaurants in the evening and to report thereon, such Sub-Committee to be convened for Tuesday, the 4th July, at 6 p.m., and instructions have been given for Mrs. I. Homa and the Hon. Secretary of the Hendon Local Labour Party (Edgware Ward Committee) to be informed that the matter is under consideration.

The Borough Engineer has prepared a scheme for an outside store, and has also obtained estimates, the lowest of which is £48 16s., and he advises that, though this appears to be very high, it is the lowest obtained from four contractors. The Committee have deferred consideration of the matter until the next meeting for 4 further report to be submitted by the Borough Engineer on the lines indicated by the Committee.

# 5.—FIRE PREVENTION AT HYDE RESTAURANT:

The Committee were informed that at the meeting held on the 8th March, 1943, it was reported that the A.R.P. Officer bad made arrangements with Messrs. Woolworth for a joint scheme to operate under the Fire Prevention (Business Premises) (No. 2) Order, 1941, and that Messrs. Woolworth had agreed to provide accommodation, heating and lighting for fire-watchers. It was suggested that the Council's contributions to the scheme should be the provision of the necessary bunks and bedding. The following articles were therefore supplied, and charged to the British Restaurants account:

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# 6.-NON-INSURANCE OF VOLUNTARY PART-TIME HELPERS:

In connection with the instructions given by the Committee at the previous meeting, it was reported that in a letter from the Ministry of Food dated the 24th May the view was expressed that it was not the Ministry's practice to agree to any insurance of voluntary part-time workers in British Restaurants. Any payment made to a voluntary worker in case of accident would be regarded as a proper charge against the trading account, and, should this involve a trading loss, the payment would be regarded as eligible for reimbursement to the Council. The prior consent of the Ministry, however, would be required before any such payment to a part-time worker could be made.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND - That a copy of the Ministry's letter be exhibited in each of the Council's restaurants, where it can be easily seen and read by voluntary part-time workers.

# 7.—DECORATION OF BRITISH RESTAURANTS:

It was reported that the Hendon, Golders Green and Mill Hill Artists' and Designers' Group had submitted a proposal for the decoration of British Restaurants in the Borough, and the Committee were asked to receive members of their executive in erder that their projects could be explained. A memorandum was also submitted on the Victoria Restaurant, in which it was stated that the cost of decoration of this restaurant would vary between £50 and £100, according to the particular scheme selected.

The Ministry of Food now has its own art department, and any local authority wishing to decorate its restaurants is required to submit the matter to the Ministry. The Committee therefore

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That no action be taken in the matter.

### 8.-BURGLARIES:

The Chief Officer Meals Service reported that, with reference to the recent burglary at Granville Restaurant, the ringleader of the boys responsible, aged 15, was sent to an approved school, while the others were each fined £2, plus £1 costs. It was also reported that during the week-end June 3rd-5th the Hyde Restaurant was broken into and a collection of duplicate keys stolen. These keys included one for the store containing emergency feeding food stocks. Stocktaking has revealed that certain of the latter items are missing, but the losses have been reported to the Civil Defence Committee and the Ministry of Food. All locks to external doors have now been changed, and the matter is in the hands of the police.

# 9.—THE FORTUNE RESTAURANT:

It was reported that the electric range had now been delivered, and arrangements had been made to open this restaurant for public use on Monday, the 26th June.

### 10.—FINANCIAL STATEMENT:

The Borough Treasurer submitted a detailed statement of accounts and statistical data for the four weeks ended 3rd June, 1944, in respect of the eight restaurants in operation in the Borough. During this period 76,584 meals were sold, a weekly average of 19,146. (See Appendix to the Report of the Finance and General Purposes Committee.) Consideration was given to the variation in the cost of meals provided at the different restaurants, and the Borough Treasurer was instructed to prepare a statement showing the total weight of the food purchased for the Council's British Restaurants during a period of one month, for submission to the next meeting.

# 3.-HYDE COTTAGE NURSERY:

# (a) Lay-out of Grounds.

It was reported that the Ministry of Health had approved for reimbursement expenditure amounting to £51 7s. ld. on the lay-out of the grounds of Hyde Cottage Nursery.

(b) Burglary.

It was reported that this nursery was entered during the week-end of the 6th-7th May. The matter was investigated by the police, with the result that four boys were convicted and placed on remand.

# 4.—DOLE STREET NURSERY:

It was reported that the Ministry of Health had approved for reimbursement expenditure amounting to £68 8s. on the lay-out of the grounds of this nursery.

# 5.—HEATING OF DAY NURSERIES:

### Claremont and York Park.

It was reported that the Ministry of Health had approved for reimbursement expenditure of £9 in respect of each of the above nurseries for the installation of electric tubular heating units to provide adequate warmth in the corridors.

## 6.—HYDE SCHOOL—FUEL BUNKER:

At the last meeting the Committee authorised, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Health, the provision of a solid-fuel bunker at this nursery, at an estimated cost of £15. The Ministry have approved the expenditure for reimbursement, but the Committee are now informed that the lowest estimate for carrying out the work amounts to £23. The Committee have, therefore, authorised an application to the Ministry for approval to a further expenditure of £8.

# 7.—INTERNAL DECORATION OF DAY NURSERIES:

It was reported that, pursuant to the authority given at the last meeting (26.4.44—8), application had been made to the Ministry of Health for approval to expenditure estimated at £69, for the carrying out of interior decorations at the York Park, Claremont and Edgware Day Nurseries.

### 8.—FIXED FIRE GUARDS:

It was reported that, arising out of Ministry of Health Circular S.R.O. No. 103 (Region V.), regarding the provision of fixed fire guards and kerbs in war-time nurseries, the Ministry had approved the acceptance of the tender of Messrs. F. W. Porter & Soar, Ltd., amounting to £50 2s. for the provision of fire guards at Addington House, York Park, Edgware, Hyde Cottage and Hyde School Day Nurseries.

# 9.—WATLING AVENUE DAY NURSERY:

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The Medical Officer of Health reported that, whilst this nursery is now ready for occupation, in view of the fact that the number of applications for admission which have been received is only seven, the equipment has not yet been ordered; neither has any staff been engaged.

The Watling Community Association has been notified that applications for admission can be received, and notices to the like effect have been exhibited in the Watling Health Centre. It is pointed out that this nursery was provided as a result of representations made to the Ministry of Health by the Ministry of Labour that their investigations indicated that a need existed for further day nursery facilities in this area. The nursery is intended to accommodate 55 children.

In view of the position indicated above, the Committee have given directions for the facts to be reported to the Senior Regional Officer of the Ministry of Health for his decision as to whether the nursery should be staffed and equipped at the present time.

# 10.-AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS:

The present instructions to the matrons at the day nurseries as to action to be taken under raiding conditions are as follows:—

"In the event of an air-raid alarm, the children should be marshalled immediately and placed in the air-raid shelter allocated, and kept there until the 'All clear' is sounded.

"Trial practices of getting to the shelters should be held at frequent intervals."

In view of the conditions obtaining at the present time, as a result of which the children have to spend prolonged periods in the air-raid shelters, such periods overlapping meal times, the Medical Officer of Health asked for the Committee's instructions in the matter.

After careful consideration of the matter, the Committee came to the conclusion that it is neither practicable nor desirable that the children should be kept in the airraid shelters for such lengthy periods. They have therefore given instructions for the windows of the most suitable rooms of all the nurseries—to be decided by the Borough Engineer—to be protected from glass fragmentation by wire-netting, and for all the children to be kept in the ground floor rooms of the non-prefabricated type nurseries. Instructions have also been given for the mothers to be notified that, whilst it is not intended to remove the children to the air-raid shelters during every alert, every possible precaution will be taken for the safety of the children.

### 11.—DANGER FROM FUMES FROM SLOW-COMBUSTION STOVES:

Ministry of Health Circular S.R.O. No. 105 (Region V.) was submitted, drawing attention to the need for securing that slow-combustion stoves are kept in proper working order; emphasising the importance of constant examination of the stoves to ensure that there is free passage for the escape of fumes; and giving instructions for a general overhaul of such stoves which have been installed in war-time nurseries and in connection with any of the services for which the Minister of Health is responsible.

The Committee have instructed the Borough Engineer to take such action in relation to the day nurseries as may be necessary to comply with the terms of the circular.

# 1.—CLAIMS FOR COMPENSATION—EDGWAREBURY PARK, THE FAIRWAY, AND RAMHLEES ROAD:

At the request of the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies and the West Hendon and District Allotment Association, it has been decided to relinquish the above site. The remaining nine tenants will be transferred to alternative plots situated on the Cool Oak Lane site.

### 4.—LAND-MARKET GARDENING:

The Borough Treasurer has reported on an application from Mr. G. A. Turner for the use of approximately two acres of land for the purpose of market gardening, and it has been decided to offer him an area of land at Copthall.

### 5.—HOLCOMBE HILL—EXTENSION:

The Committee has approved the letting of an additional area of 13 poles adjoining the above site to Mr. G. Matthews, for the purpose of bee-keeping.

# 6.—LAND, REAR OF BRENT CROSS GARAGE:

The Borough Surveyor has reported on an application from E. H. Jones (Machine Tools), Ltd., for the use of approximately 32 poles of land at the rear of the above premises, for the purpose of war-time allotments for the firm's employees. # 1.-REMUNERATION OF DEPUTY CHIEF WARDEN:

Although various officers in the Civil Defence Service receive increased pay for rank, at no time has a rate above that of a District Warden been fixed for a Deputy Chief Warden. Over the past two years representations had been made from time to time for the fixing of a salary for the Deputy Chief Warden commensurate with the duties of this officer. When Mr. G. L. Collins was promoted from a whole-time District Warden to whole-time Deputy Chief Warden the County Council would only permit Mr. Collins to be paid the District Warden's rate, subject to the establishment of paid District and Deputy District Wardens in the Borough not exceeding 13. His present total remuneration is £269 per annum. In view of the time devoted by Mr. Collins to the duties of his office, and the extremely satisfactory manner in which he discharges them, the Committee has

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Deputy Chief Warden, Mr. C. L. Collins, be paid a salary of £400 per annum, plus cost-of-living bonus according to the Ministry of Home Security scale.

The Controller has been instructed to renew the representations made to the London Civil Defence Region for recognition of this increase in salary

## 2.—SECOND IN CHARGE, RESCUE AND DECONTAMINATION SERVICES:

Having regard to the duties performed by Mr. E. Jared as Second in Charge of both the Rescue and Decontamination Services, embracing the administrative work, direction of operations and training, and also in view of the considerable increase in constructional work and alterations carried out under his supervision for the Corporation, as well as in connection with Civil Defence, the Committee has

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND — That the salary payable to Mr. Jared be increased from £375 to £420 per annum.

## 3.—ASSISTANCE AT ROAD ACCIDENT:

The Committee has noted the prompt and efficient manner in which wardens attached to Post J66, assisted by members of the W.V.S. and local Fire Guards, rendered first aid to some 12 casualties resulting from an accident when two vehicles collided at the junction of Sevington and Elliot Roads on the 12th June. The Committee is of the opinion that the effective action of the wardens and those organised by them did much to alleviate the suffering of the injured and to ensure their speedy dispatch to hospital. The Committee has commended those concerned on the ready and efficient manner in which they acted in this emergency.

# 4.—ANNUAL LEAVE:

Until further notice the granting of annual leave to full-time Civil Defence personnel has been suspended.

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# 5.—SERVICE PAY:

# 6.—TRAINING OF TEACHERS AND RESETTLEMENT OF DISABLED PERSONS.

At the request of the Minister of Home Security, details of an emergency scheme for the recruitment and training of teachers will be brought to the notice of suitable members leaving the Civil Defence Services.

# 7.—CO-OPERATION BETWEEN LOCAL AUTHORITIES AND INDUSTRY:

At the request of the Regional Commissioners the Committee has reviewed the present arrangements for maintaining contact with commercial and industrial undertakings in the Borough who have Civil Defence organisations. By this contact the Council has a potential reserve of trained personnel, and benefit also accrues to the firms' organisations.

### 8.-FOOD PRODUCTION:

The Minister of Home Security desires that the Council should do all in its power to meet requests for help in the vital work of gathering the harvest by releasing, where possible, members of the Civil Defence Services willing to undertake this work. Special arrangements are to be made to provide a free, packed lunch for Civil Defence personnel undertaking this work during their duty hours.

### 9.—TRANSPORT SERGEANTS — RESCUE SERVICE:

Four Rescue Service drivers (one per depot per shift) act as officers-in-charge of the other drivers, and are responsible for inspection of the vehicles, the reporting of defects and checking of oil and petrol consumption, etc., in addition to their normal Reseur Service duties. The Ministry of Home Security does not recognise these duties for extra remuneration, and the normal rate for two of the drivers is 4s. 8d. per week less than their colleagues. The Committee has

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the wages payable to the two men in question be increased by 4s. (d. per week, and that this additional payment be borne by the Council as a local charge.

# 10.—FIRST - AID POSTS AND GAS - CLEANSING STATIONS:

Satisfactory reports have been received from the Regional Casualty Service Officer following inspections made by him of the three first-aid posts and four public gascleansing stations in the Borough.

# 11.—CORPORATION'S AMBULANCE SERVICE:

During the month of May, 1944, 211 calls were made in respect of private eases and 62 in respect of street accidents and illnesses. Of these 273 cases, 40 were continuously (Carl 1) and an accidents and illnesses. veyed in Civil Defence ambulances.

# 12.—WARDENS' SERVICE:

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# 13.—INSPECTION OF RESPIRATORS AT SCHOOLS:

The examination of respirators held by children attending various Council schools in the Borough has been completed. A total of 12,048 respirators were inspected; defects or incorrect fitting necessitated changes being made in 1,877 cases. Sixteen cases of loss have been recorded.

# 14.-FIRE PREVENTION:

At the Hendon Court on the 12th June one resident in Hendon was fined £10, plus £2 2s. costs, for failing to carry out fire guard duties under the Fire Guard (Local Authorities Services) Order, 1943.

During the month of May, 1944, the National Fire Service carried out 69 first inspections of lotts of houses in the Borough. Nine not complying with the Order were found to be satisfactory on a second inspection.

The fire-prevention arrangements at the Hendon Emergency Hospital have received the approval of the Regional Commissioners.

Revised arrangements providing for the use of telephones from certain of the Fire Guard sector points, for summoning N.F.S. assistance and for simplifying the procedure for summoning such assistance as laid down in the Fire Guard Plan, are to be put into operation.

Schemes for Fire Prevention arrangements submitted by 71 occupiers of business premises in the Borough have been considered and approved.

### 15.-EMERGENCY FEEDING STOCKS:

The loss, as the result of a burglary, of 100 lbs, of tea, a case of beef hash and six tins of meat-roll, forming part of emergency food stocks held at Hyde British Restaurant, has been reported. The police have the matter in hand.

### 16.-AIR RAID SHELTERS:

Until further notice all public and unallocated communal shelters will be left open at all times, irrespective of whether they are fitted with emergency opening devices or not. Damage done to the emergency glass panels fitted to the various public and communal shelters since the 1st January, 1944, is as under:—

In regard to the broken glasses, it should be noted that there have been "alert" periods, and a number of these glasses have been broken to permit legitimate entry into shelters.

Since the 1st January and up to the 17th June, 1944, a further 1,230 indoor shelters have been issued free and a further 634 sold. Approved applications outstanding total approximately 70.

In view of the renewed user of communal shelters as a result of the present emergency, the Borough Engineer is giving attention to the need for arranging for all communal shelters, hitherto unused for long periods, to be thoroughly cleaned.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Head Postmaster, Edgware, intimating that consideration is about to be given to a request by the postmen and postwomen employed at the Edgware and Stanmore Post Offices, for the time of commencement of the afternoon letter delivery on Saturday to be advanced to before noon, in order that they may finish early on one day of the week. If the concession is agreed to, approximately 6,000 of the local number of items which are delivered on Saturday afternoon in the whole of the Edgware and Stanmore postal area, including items posted in time for the first collection in the City and in neighbouring towns, will be held over for delivery on Monday mornings. Adequate provision will be made to ensure that the time of completion of the morning delivery on Mondays is not materially worsened, and the change will in no way affect the present times of collection from the street letter-boxes or the normal dispatch of mails on Saturdays. The Head Postmaster will be glad to hear that the proposal will meet with the approval of the Council.

### Diversion via Sanders Lane and Devonshire Road-'Bus Route 240.

I am directed by the Regional Transport Commissioner to refer to your letter of 9th May in regard to above, and to inform you that the Commissioner has consulted the London Passenger Transport Board on the question of 'bus facilities for residents on the Dole Street Estate, and has surveyed the roads passing this estate.

Owing to the condition of Sanders Lane and the bridge over the railway, as well as a similar railway bridge in Dole Street, it seems to be impossible to provide improved facilities for residents on the Dole Street Estate without either undertaking considerable road improvement work or providing additional 'buses to operate a special service, and even for this purpose road improvement work would be necessary.

There are undoubtedly a number of estates throughout London, and indeed throughout the country, where improved 'bus facilities would be desirable for the convenience of local residents, but they cannot be provided during war-time, because it is not justifiable to provide labour, and the heavy demand for 'bus services for munition workers make it impossible to give new facilities, which would require the operation of additional vehicles.

The Commissioner is communicating with the Divisional Road Engineer, to obtain his observations on the suggestion contained in your letter of 9th May that the Sanders Lane bridge and approaches to the bridge should be made suitable for operation by public service vehicles.



EDUCATION ACT, 1944—CLAIM FOR EXCEPTION FROM SCHEME OF DIVISIONAL ADMINISTRATION:

Alderman Richardson stated:

"When the first White Paper was produced in July, 1943, it indicated that only Councils of Counties and County Boroughs would be the Local Education Authorities, and it also indicated that County Divisions would be arranged for districts having approximately 60,000 population, or 7,000 school children. Each was to have a District Committee, to which the Council could delegate many functions but those functions were left to the discretion of the County.

"This matter was very fully considered by the Education Committee at the time, and they reported to the Council; and on September 27th, 1943, the Council resolved that the Hendon Education Committee should continue their opposition to the proposals contained in paragraphs 117 and 118 of the White Paper on Educational Reconstruction, and that their delegates be instructed to support the resolution outlined above at the annual conference of the Association of Education Committees. The proposals of the Association of Education Committees referred to were demands that Authorities of the size of Hendon should be 'All-Purposes Authorities.'

"Your representatives, through the Association of Education Committees and the Watching Committee of the Part III. Authorities in Middlesex, and by approach to their own Member of Parliament and other Members of Parliament, carried out that instruction, and, I may say, with such effect that when the Government issued a further White Paper in December, 1943, it indicated that Boroughs and Urban Councils with the population and school population already referred to could if they so desired, be excepted from the scheme prepared by the County, and prepare their own schemes of delegation, only the power to borrow money and raise a rate being reserved to the County Council. That was a great concession.

"When the Bill came before the House, amendments in accordance with the motion adopted in September were definitely moved by various Members of Parlisment and through the Associations of Education Committees and Part III. Authorities, when such assurances were given by the Minister or his representative, Mr.

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Chuter Ede, that they were in the main withdrawn. The assurances given were that all the matters which Part III. Education Authorities asked for could be included in their Scheme of Delegation, and it was made quite clear that the County had no right to interfere with that scheme. They could not delete or amend, but they could make representations to the Minister, and that is the position to date.

"Now, following on that, the Part III. Authorities Committee has drawn up a Scheme of Delegation for all the Part III. Authorities of Middlesex, and in that scheme they claim to exercise the functions of a Local Education Authority in respect of primary and secondary education. The secondary education goes to the age of 18 years. They also claim powers in regard to further education, parttime education, and also cultural occupations and part-time educational pursuits of adults. In fact, that is a very brief summary of the scheme which is being put forward, but in effect it asks that we shall retain the powers we now have, plus the control of secondary education, leaving, of course, the County to arrange the rate, and they will also be the Authority to raise any loan. The scheme also asks that the Divisional Executives shall have the right of appointment of officers and of teaching staff, and I now ask that you will accept this resolution which I am moving, because that is the natural consequence to the policy you adopted in September last, and is the only way that we can now seek to carry that out, and proceed to present our Scheme of Delegation."

### 7.—PRELIMINARY TRAINING SCHOOL FOR STUDENT NURSES:

Owing to difficulties which precluded the continuance of the preliminary training course for student nurses at Ealing, I gave authority for the present course of instruction to be completed at the Hendon Isolation Hospital.

### 8. MILL HILL HEALTH CENTRE—COURSE OF LECTURES:

An application was received from the Mill Hill Middlesex 366 Detachment of the British Red Cross Society for permission to use the Mill Hill Health Centre for a course of lectures on First Aid, on Tuesday evenings, commencing on July 18th and terminating on the 12th September. On the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, I gave permission for the free use of the premises for the course of lectures in question, subject to the British Red Cross Society indemnifying the Council against any claim which may arise out of or in connection with the proposed use of the premises.

### 9. EMERGENCY MORTUARY SERVICE:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that, in order to obtain efficient supervision and control of the emergency mortuary service, it was necessary for a telephone to be installed at the private residence of the supervisor, Mr. R. E. Young, and I gave the necessary authorisation.

### 10. WAR-TIME NURSERIES:

S.R.O. Circular No. 112, dated 11th August, 1944, from the Ministry of Health, stated that, in view of the evacuation of mothers and children from the London districts, and its effect on the attendances at the war-time nurseries, it may become necessary at short notice to arrange the transfer on loan of some of the members of the staff for temporary duty in reception areas. The Circular gives details of the financial arrangements, and asks for a report by the Council's Medical Officer on the general nursery position in the area.

Following a meeting with Lady Reading and an administrative officer of the Ministry of Health, I approved the following arrangements, pending the submission to the Ministry of a comprehensive report on the general nursery position in the area:—

- 1. That the Hocroft Road Day Nursery be closed, and used only as an assembly point for children to be transferred to and from the Claremont Road Day Nursery (where necessary by means of Civil Defence transport).
- 2. That the equivalent of one day nursery staff complete be transferred to a day nursery in a reception area, together with the equipment from the Hocroft Road Day Nursery.

### 11. EVACUATION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE HOSPITALS:

It was reported to me that a conference was convened by the County Medical Officer, when the question of hospital evacuation was discussed with the medical officers of health of local authorities within the county, and it was recommended that infectious disease cases should, as far as possible, be moved to outlying districts. In conformity with this recommendation, I authorised the Medical Officer of Health—

- (a) To make arrangements for the evacuation of the patients from the Hendon Infectious Disease Hospital, and
- (b) To enter into negotiations with outlying Authorities for the reception of patients from this area.

### 12. EMERGENCY DRINKING WATER SUPPLIES:

It was reported to me that on the instructions of the Ministry of Health, the Metropolitan Water Board are carrying out a scheme for providing emergency drinking water supplies throughout the area, under powers contained in Defence (General) Regulation No. 50. The sources of supply will be various takes within the Borough, and the water is to be pumped from the takes through mobile filter units and stored in two overhead storage tanks sited on public footpaths, as follows:—

- (1) Bell Lane, outside Brent Park.
- (2) Milton Road, West Hendon.

The storage tanks will be used to supply 11 distribution points, also situated on the public footpaths, as follows:—

At each distribution point a concrete ramp, 44 ft. long by 10 ft. in width, is to be constructed, to provide a platform for water relay lorries which bring the water from the two storage tanks.

I gave authority for the Metropolitan Water Board to be informed that the Corporation has no objection to the proposals, subject to the site of the works being duly requisitioned under the appropriate Defence Regulations.

### 13. STABLES:

It was reported to me that on the advice of the Corporation's Veterinary Surgeon, it had been necessary to sell horses Nos. 8 and 11. Authority was given to purchase one horse in replacement.

### 14. GOLDERS GREEN FOOTBALL CLUB:

I considered an application from the Golders Green Football Club for permission to lease a section of the car park and tennis courts within their ground for the erection

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of two temporary buildings, required for purposes in connection with the war. I gave authority for the application to be approved, subject to the letting being for a period of three months, and thereafter monthly, together with an undertaking from the Club that the site will be cleared within a period of not more than six months from the termination of European hostilities.

### 15. MONTROSE PLAYING FIELDS—TELEGRAPHIC POST—THE MEADS ALLOT. MENTS:

I considered applications from the Postmaster-General asking permission to place a telegraphic post and stay in the Montrose Playing Fields, adjacent to the fence by Montrose Avenue, and a telegraphic pole on the allotments at the junction of Gold Hill and The Meads. I gave authority for the applications to be approved, subject to the Postmaster-General paying a nominal rental of 1s. ½d. per annum in each case, and indemnifying the Corporation against any claim which may arise from the existence of the posts and stay.

### 16. HENDON PLANNING SCHEME NO. 1-APPLICATIONS FOR CONSENT.

(1) Mr. W. F. Thorpe, in respect of User of Nos. 41-3, Flower Lane, Mill Hill, as Hospital.

I considered an application for consent to the use of the houses known as  $N_{08,\,41}$  and 43, Flower Lane, Mill Hill, for the purpose of a hospital. In accordance with the terms of the Scheme, this proposal was advertised in the local newspaper, and, in view of the number of objections received from adjacent property owners. I gave authority for the application to be disapproved.

An application for permission to use the above empty shops for the purpose of the manufacture of thermometers for medical use was submitted to me. I gave authority for it to be approved, subject to the applicants entering into the usual wartime agreement.

(3) Messrs. Rudson, Wood & Co., Ltd., in respect of Nos. 27 and 27a, The Burroughs, Hendon, N.W. 4.

I also considered an application for permission to use Nos. 27 and 27a. The Burroughs, Hendon, as offices and workroom. The applicants are manufacturers of haberdashery lines and distributors of domestic hardware goods. No machinery will be installed. I gave authority for it to be approved, subject to the usual wartime agreement.

### 21. MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE—CARE OF ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN:

At the meeting of the Council held 10th July, 1944, the following recommendation of the Public Health and Medical Services Section of Group I. Committee was approved:

(i) That the Middlesex County Council be informed that this Council is prepared to participate in a joint scheme with reference to the care of illegitimate children on the basis of the proposals indicated (see pages 520-1 of Reports).

22

(ii) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents in due course.

The proposals referred to provide--

- (a) that the County Council shall reserve accommodation at the Hendon Hostel of the British Red Cross Society for nine cases, and make a minimum payment of £15 15s. per week for same:
- (b) that payment shall be made to the County Council by the participating authorities on the basis of user of such accommodation at the rate of £1 15s, per week per case.

The County Council now point out that in the event of the reserved accommodation not being fully occupied, a deficiency charge will fall upon them, and suggest that any such charge shall be borne by the participating authorities (including the County Council) on the basis of population.

I approved the suggestion of the County Council, and gave instructions accordingly.

### 22. MOAT MOUNT GOLF COURSE:

The Council will remember that the present lessees of the Moat Mount Golf Course gave notice to terminate their lease as at 16th September, 1944, and that negotiations have been taking place with a Committee formed by the members of the existing Mill Hill Golf Club, with a view to a lease being granted to a newly-formed club as from the date of the expiration of the existing lease. These negotiations have now been completed, and the following terms have been agreed by the negotiating committee on behalf of the proposed new club and by the Deputy-Mayor and myself on behalf of the Council:—

- 1. The Club to take an assignment of the present lease of the 18-hole golf course.
- 2. The rent to be a minimum of £500 per annum, or 20 per cent. of the Club's receipts, whichever is the greater. The Club receipts to include the following items, and others of a like nature, but locker rents are to be excluded:—

Annual subscriptions, including entrance fees (if any).

Temporary members' fees.

Tennis subscriptions (gross).

Compensation rents for military or other occupation.

Grazing and agricultural rents.

Ascertainment of rent for any year will be made by reference to the audited accounts for that year.

- 3. The Corporation will allow the use of all furniture and equipment (per inventory) by the Club, the same to be maintained by the Club (subject to fair wear and tear), and the Club to pay annual rent calculated at—
  - 4½ per cent. per annum on the purchase price for first two years.
  - 5½ per cent. " " " for the second two years.
  - 6½ per cent. , , for last three years.

This condition is made on the understanding that the Corporation shall be able to purchase the said furniture and equipment either through the Club or by direct arrangement with Ingram's Trustees.

4. The Club to deposit £1,000 with the Council as security for the carrying out of the obligations of the lease; this sum to be secured by mortgage in the names of the Mayor and Borough Treasurer of the Borough for the time being. Interest at 3 per cent. will be paid to the Club.

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- 5. There will be an option (mutually exercisable) to continue the lease for a further term of seven years, on terms to be then arranged. The Council will not exercise the option against the Club unless they require the property for purposes other than that of a golf club.
- 6. That a schedule of conditions be prepared and agreed between the parties, such schedule to cover any repairs or redecorations carried out by the present lessees at the termination of their lease.
- 7. Provided it is decided by the competent legal authority that the War Agricultural Executive Committee, or any other third party, is not liable to restore the golf course, then the Club is not to be held liable to undertake the work.

With regard to item 3 of the agreed terms, arrangements have been made to purchase the furniture and equipment (per inventory) through the proposed new club, at a price of £3,500.

# 1. EVENING OPENING OF BRITISH RESTAURANTS:

# (a) Report of Sub-Committee.

The following report of the Special (British Restaurants) Sub-Committee was submitted:-

4th July, 1944.

Present: Councillor F. J. Collins (Chairman), Councillors (Mrs.) D. M. Banwell, B.A., and W. A. Hicks; and Mr. E. O. Robinson.

#### PROPOSED EVENING OPENING OF BRITISH RESTAURANTS:

(i) Terms of reference (B.R.C. 26/6/44-3).

To consider the opening of British Restaurants in the evening, and to report thereon.

(ii) Report.

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The Sub-Committee considered the following points submitted by the Chief Officer, Meals Service:-

#### (a) Choice of Restaurant.

The most suitable for an experimental opening in the evenings would appear to be the Victoria Restaurant, in Brent Street. Approximately 150 soldiers plus a few civilians use this restaurant for morning coffee, and a nucleus of evening users might be expected from soldiers billeted in the neighbourhood. The experiment, if tried, should be for a strictly limited period, and only if the necessary paid staff can be obtained.

(b) Days and Hours of Opening:

Each week-night, from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. This closing hour is suggested to allow the staff time to tidy the restaurant and catch a late 'bus home.

It is suggested that this should consist of the sale of cakes, pastries, sandwiches and beverages.

## (d) Staff:

Paid staff required would be one evening supervisor and one other helper to wash up, plus additional hours for cleaning floor, etc. It would also be necessary to ascertain whether the W.V.S. would be prepared to form a rota of voluntary workers for service each week-night. If no voluntary workers were forthcoming, the number of paid kitchen hands would have to be increased according to the amount of trade done, but in any case by one. The engagement of an evening supervisor would be necessary, as the manageress had other commitments and could not undertake evening work, and the same applies to her assistant. Paid staff for evening work would not be easy to obtain, and it was doubtful whether volunteers would be forthcoming for the general public use of a restaurant, but they might be forthcoming if the restaurant were used for the Forces only.

#### (e) Food Stores:

The employment of a separate evening staff would make it necessary for the manageress to issue stores each afternoon for evening use, and lock-up accommodation for such stores would therefore be required.

#### (f) Black-out:

The existing black-out was provided for occasional emergency use, and might not be substantial enough for regular daily use.

#### (g) Running Costs:

These are estimated as follows:-

£2 10 0 per week. One evening supervisor (24 hours a week), say £1 12 0 " One kitchen hand (24 hours a week) Additional cleaning hours (24 per week) £1 12 0 £5 14 0

Should there be a failure to obtain voluntary workers, the above numbers and costs would be increased. Costs would, of course, be higher if longer hours of opening operated.

In view of the fact that the suggested opening of the Victoria Restaurant is largely dependent upon its use by members of the Forces billeted in the vicinity, and also of the possibility that these might later be transferred to other areas, the Sub-Committee came to the conclusion that it would be inadvisable to try the experiment at the Victoria Restaurant.

In the opinion of the Sub-Committee a greater public demand exists in the Mill Hill and Edgware areas. So far as Mill Hill is concerned, the proximity of the Hartley Restaurant to the public library and the cinema would appear to offer encouraging prospects.

The Sub-Committee therefore

RECOMMEND—That the Hartley Restaurant be selected for an experimental opening for evening use on weekdays, between the hours of 6 p.m. and 9 p.m.

With regard to service, the Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND-That soup and other light refreshments be added to the suggested menu.

With regard to the question of procuring additional staff, the Sub-Committee consider that the members of the existing staff might be prepared to undertake evening duty if suitable arrangement, were made. In these circumstances, the Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND-That the Chief Officer Meals Service be instructed-

- (a) To ascertain whether the manageress and the assistant manageress of the Hartley Rectaurant are prepared to undertake the duties of supervisor during the evening, in which event a suitable adjustment of the daily hours of duty would be made;
- (b) Alternatively, to advertise for the necessary additional staff required;
- (e) To report thereon to the full Committee at their next meeting.

On further consideration of the question of staff, the Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND-That no voluntary workers be employed for evening duty at the restaurant.

The provision of separate lock-up accommodation for stores intended for evening use will not be necessary if the services of the manageress or assistant manageress can be obtained. It will, however, be necessary before the end of August to arrange for the restaurant to be adequately "blacked-out." The Sub-Committee therefore

RECOMMEND--That the Borough Engineer be instructed to prepare an estimate of the cost involved, for submission to the next meeting of the full Committee.

On the assumption that the necessary authority will be given by the Council for the Special (British Restaurants) Committee to meet during the Summer Recess, it was

RESOLVED-That the foregoing report be submitted to a meeting of the full Committee to be convened for Monday, the 17th July, at 6 p.m.

#### (b) Staff.

With regard to recommendation (a) above, the Chief Officer Meals Service reported that neither the manageress nor the assistant manageress at the Hartley Restaurant was prepared to undertake the duties of evening supervisor. One of the cooks is, however, willing to do so, provided she is paid for the work. The rate of pay suggested is 8s. 6d. per evening, i.e., from 5.30 to 9.30 pm. If, in order to do this work, fewer hours are worked during the day as cook, an adjustment in normal wages would be necessary.

The estimated cost of opening would therefore be-

Evening supervisor, six evenings at 8s. 0d. \_\_\_\_\_\_ £2 11 0

Two assistants, at 32s. per week each \_\_\_\_\_\_ 3 4 0

Additional cleaning \_\_\_\_\_\_ 1 12 0

Total \_\_\_\_\_ £7 7 0 per week.

None of the existing kitchen assistants at the Hartley Restaurant will undertake evening work. Since the question of evening opening was first considered a new position has arisen. At St. Michael's Restaurant some 50 building workers drafted into London are to be both billeted and provided with breakfast, packed lunch, and evening meal on seven days a week, and in the near future other returnats may have to feed (but not billet) similar groups of men. The Committee are informed that kitchen staffs at all restaurants are prepared to perform extra duty for essential work of this kind, but not for ordinary evening opening. Furthermore, the labour position is more difficult than ever, and so far no additional workers have come forward for evening work. This may be due to recent bombing, as many women with children have temporarily left home.

#### (o) Charges.

To make successive pots of tea for odd customers, spread over a three-hour opening, is less profitable than to make ten for several hundred during the lunch hour. If evening opening is found practicable, the charge for tea should, therefore, be increased from 1d. to 2d. per cup. This would involve a corresponding increase in the charge for coffee from 2d, to 3d, per cup.

#### (d) Black-out.

The Borough Surveyor reported that the cost of providing adequate black-out for the Hartley Restaurant would be from £45 to £50. In his opinion, it would not be necessary to provide a light trap, providing that the door leading from the queueing space was used instead of the main doors fronting Hartley Avenue. Reference was made to the need for a hand-rail on the stairs and an electric light in the outside queueing space.

#### (e) Recommendations.

On consideration of the Sub-Committee's report, in conjunction with the reports of the Chief Officer Meals Service and the Borough Surveyor, the Committee

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND ---

- (i) That the Hartley Restaurant be opened for evening use on weekdays, between the hours of 6 p.m. and 9 p.m.
- (ii) That the service consist of the sale of cakes, pastries, sandwiches, beverages, soup, and other light refreshments.
- (iii) That the cook at Hartley Restaurant be engaged as supervisor in the evenings, at a rate of payment of 8s. 6d. per evening, and that the Chief Officer, Meals Service, be authorised to engage paid assistants at the rate of payment indicated in item (b) and voluntary workers as required.
- (iv) That the Sub-Committee's recommendation in regard to the employment of voluntary workers be not adopted.
- (v) That the prices for toa and coffee served in the evening be increased to 2d. and 3d. per cup respectively.
- (vi) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to proceed with the blacking-out of the Hartley Restaurant on the basis of his estimate, and to provide a temporary handrail, pending the provision of a permanent one, in the outside queueing space, plus an electric light.

#### 2. ST. MICHAEL'S RESTAURANT:

The Committee's attention was directed to the use of the above restaurant for the purpose of billeting building workers transferred to London for the repair of bomb damage. It was appreciated that the building would be used as a rest centre in the event of absolute necessity, as originally arranged, but the Committee were of opinion that from the hygienic point of view it was undesirable that war damage repair workers should be accommodated therein, and, furthermore, as it was understood that the premises would be utilised as a reception hostel, the work of the restaurant might be impeded.

The Borough Treasurer reported that under the arrangements the Ministry of Health propose to pay 4s, per man per day. As the cost of meals is estimated at 3s. 6d. per day, the margin of 6d. per man does not seem sufficient to cover incidental expenses which will be incurred for lighting, heating, possible cleaning and supervision, and it was therefore suggested that the Town Clerk should make representations, urging that the proposed allowance should be increased. British Restaurants staff would, of course, have to work extra hours, and would have to be paid overtime rates. It would be necessary to acquaint the Ministry of Food with these proposals, as it was thought unlikely that they would consent to any financial arrangements which did not adequately safeguard the British Restaurants Account; in other words, the billeting of Ministry of Health workmen could not be subsidised out of the Special (British Restaurants) trading accounts.

# 1.—APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE:

# 2.—AIR RAID INCIDENTS:

The following message, received on the 28th June from Sir Ernest Gowers, Regional Commissioner, London, has been noted and circulated to the Civil Defence Services:—

"In the House of Commons, on the 23rd June, the Home Secretary said that the Civil Defence Services had maintained during the past week the high reputation which they had earned in the days of the blitz. In asking that this tribute may be brought to the notice of the members of all the Services, I should like to endorse it whole-heartedly on behalf of the Regional Commissioners. The mean and women of the Services are playing their part in this supreme moment of the

war with the splendid spirit which they have always shown, and with a skill, efficiency and team spirit of the highest order, gained not only from experience in action, but also from unwearied application to training and exercises during long and trying periods of inaction. That unremitting devotion to duty has now its reward, and Londoners will not forget it."

A considerable number of letters have been received from members of the public expressing appreciation of the services rendered by all sections of the Civil Defence and ancillary Services at incidents within the Borough. The Committee has placed on record its keen appreciation of the highly efficient manner in which all sections of the Borough's Civil Defence and ancillary Services have carried out their duties since the commencement of the flying-bomb attacks, and of the excellent co-operation and team work of all the personnel concerned.

[Note.—Details of specific action taken by the Civil Defence Services will be circulated to members of the Council. Such information is not for general publication.]

#### 3.-EVACUTION:

On the 24th July the Minister of Health conveyed his decision that facilities for evacuation were to be extended to the Borough of Hendon, and were to be made available, if desired, to the following classes, irrespective of whether they have been rendered homeless:—

- (i) Unaccompanied school children.
- (ii) Mothers with children under five. (If mothers with children under five also had children of school age, they can be evacuated together.)
- (iii) Expectant mothers who are suitable for evacuation with organised parties, i.e., not within six weeks of the expected date of confinement.

In addition to the foregoing, mothers with children of school age who had been rendered homeless by enemy attack since the 12th June, 1944, and had not been satisfactorily rehoused, were eligible for evacuation, notwithstanding that they might have no children under five. (Subsequently the homeless qualification was removed.) Travel vouchers and billeting certificates can also be issued in respect of unaccompanied children, mothers accompanied by children of school age or under, expectant mothers, infirm and invalid persons (including the blind), and aged persons who can make private arrangements for their accommodation, and desire assistance in connection with billeting cost and travelling expenses.

Initial arrangements were made for the registration of persons desirous of availing themselves of evacuation facilities at the Methodist Hall. Later, in co-operation with the Director of Education, a meeting of Head Teachers was arranged, and volunteers recruited for manning six registration centres, and also to act as party leaders and escorts. The registration centres at present in operation are:—

St. James' R.C. School, Orange Hill Road, Sunnyfields School, Sunningfields Road, Childs Hill School,

# 4.—PROTECTION AT DISTRICT HEADQUARTERS:

In view of the lack of protected accommodation for Wardens required during air raids to man the 13 district headquarters, which are, in the main, private houses, authority is being sought for the provision of a Morrison shelter at each of these headquarters.

# 5.—FIRE PREVENTION:

Schemes for fire prevention arrangements submitted by 84 occupiers of business premises in the Borough have been considered and approved.

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During the month of June the National Fire Service carried out 66 first inspections of the lofts in houses in the Borough. Second inspections were found to be necessary in 11 cases, and a third inspection in one instance.

# 6.-AIR RAID SHELTERS:

In view of the increased use of shelter accommodation by the public, the electric light and heating systems in all public shelters are being overhauled. It is noted that a large amount of damage has been done to fittings, fuses, lamps and switches, and conduits have been torn away from the walls. As far as is possible, with materials available, damaged bunks are also being repaired. Electrical installations in communical shelters are also being made good, and repairs undertaken to certain of the roofs, where, as a result of expansion cracks, water is percolating into the shelters.

Since the 15th June, 4,100 applications for Morrison shelters have been received. Up to the 29th of July, 2,800 shelters have been delivered. The supply of the balance depends on deliveries made by the railway company. Thirty-five Anderson shelters have also been issued in cases where the applicants were unable to provide the labour for the erection. Over 400 bunks for Anderson shelters have been distributed, and a further request made to the Ministry of Health for the provision of another 2,000 bunks to meet the numerous applications which are being received.

The extended use of public shelters has also necessitated a revision in the cleaning arrangements. The Borough has been divided into two areas, each with a gang of cleaners under a charge-hand. Large groups of shelters are being covered by a small gang equipped with a lorry for visiting the shelters as early as possible in the morning, to carry out the cleaning and emptying of lavatories directly after vacation by the public.

A shelter census conducted at the end of June showed that 2,620 people were using the shelters, as compared with approximately 160 in March. A weekly census taken in the last two weeks in July showed a slightly lesser number. Between the 5th and 25th July, 1,774 tickets were issued for bunks in public shelters; rather less than half the accommodation available in public shelters has now been allocated. During the same period 1,867 tickets were issued for bunks in communal shelters. Approximately one-third of the total bunk capacity in this type of shelter has now been allocated.

# 7.—PROTECTION OF STAFF AT TOWN HALL:

At the request of the Medical Officer, consideration was given to the protection available for the staff of his department engaged at the Town Hall. The Committee was of the opinion that, subject to the carrying out of window protection, the use of the corridors in the Town Hall formed the most practical solution.

# 8.—BILLETING OF WAR WORKERS:

On the directions of the Regional Commissioners that a hostel should be opened up for the purpose of receiving 50 men in the employ of contractors called to London from the Provinces to assist with first-aid repairs, St. Michael's Second Line Rest Centre was selected, and arrangements made for the St. Michael's British Restaurant to supply the men with a hot meal at night, breakfast in the morning, and a packed lunch.

The following matters have been dealt with during the time the Committee has been in Recess:-

# 1. BROADFIELDS AVENUE WAR-TIME DAY NURSERY:

Owing to the fact that the number of children in attendance was reduced to two, due to private evacuation, I gave instructions for the Broadfields Avenue War-Time Day Nursery to be closed at the end of the morning session on Saturday, 22nd July, 1944. The services of Miss J. D. McPherson (teacher-in-charge) will be utilised in one of the Committee's schools. Miss S. Rawlins, nursery assistant, has been seconded for duty with Goldbeaters Infants' nursery adispensed with as from the above-named date. The services of the cook and cleaner were must under elementary school arrangements.

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# 2. ORANGE HILL GIRLS' CENTRAL SCHOOL—ONFORD SCHOOL CERTIFICATE EXAMINATION:

In view of the present emergency I accepted the offer of the use of Woodcroft Hall for the purpose of holding the Oxford School Certificate examination in July. I agreed that a nominal payment of £1, on account of electric current used, be made, and that an honorarium of £2 2s. be paid to the caretaker (Mrs. W. Smith) in respect of services rendered.

# 3. ALL SAINTS' C.E. SCHOOL:

Owing to enemy action this school had to be closed on 20th and 21st July,

#### 4. DANGER WARNING FOR FLYING BOMBS:

In response to a request from the Air Raid Precautions Officer, I gave authority for Brent Modern, Woodcroft and Bell Lane Council Schools to be used as klaxon points, subject to the understanding that no expense will fall upon the local Education Authority in connection therewith. It was also understood that it will be unnecessary for these points to be manned.

#### 5. MEADS COUNCIL SCHOOL—FIRE WATCHING:

Under Fire Guard Orders it is the duty of the Education Committee, as occupiers, to provide the necessary amenities for fire-watchers in their elementary schools. In the absence of suitable adult lavatory accommodation outside the Meads School premises, I gave permission for the compulsorily enrolled fire guards to use the internal staff lavatory whilst on duty, subject to the condition that this is kept in a scrupulously clean condition.

### 6. SCHOOL MIDSUMMER HOLIDAYS:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of a letter from Dr. A. Hall, County Tuberculosis Officer, asking that facilities be given to him for estimating the tuberculinisation of the children attending the elementary schools in Hendon. The method consists of rubbing into a small area of skin a tuberculin ointment, and those children who have been exposed to infection sufficiently severe to call upon their resistance to combat it, react by a red area appearing. There is no generalised reaction, and no risk of any kind. The only difficulty which is likely to arise is that of explaining to parents that whilst children are positive they are not necessarily tubercular.

Board of Education Circular 1657 was submitted, giving particulars of modifications of the arrangements in respect of the reservation of women students entering courses of training for teaching in the autumn of 1944. Under the new regulations all students whose 19th birthday is on or before 1st October, 1944, will be reserved for the full period of any of the courses of training set out as follows :--

A two-years' course at a training college; a three-years' course at a Froebel training college; a three-years' course at a domestic subjects or physical training college; a three-years' degree course at a university, followed by a year of training for teaching,

These arrangements are made restrospective for students admitted under the age limits specified in Circular 1620. If an applicant has been engaged in full-time teaching (e.g., as an uncertificated teacher), the entry age limit of 19 may be waived

  - (b) The new machinery of local administration is to be set up so as to be ready to function on 1st April, 1945.
  - (c) Boroughs and Urban District Councils which before 1st October next lodge with the Minister a claim to be excepted districts will be informed of his decision.
  - (d) New building regulations for primary and secondary schools will soon be issued.
  - (e) On 1st April, 1945, it will become the duty of Authorities to take steps with a view to the preparation and submission of development plans.
  - (f) It is not proposed at this juncture to ask for the submission of schemes of further education.
  - (g) It will be necessary for every Local Education Authority to have adopted an Agreed Syllabus of religious instruction not later than 1st April, 1945. tion 114 (4) meets the immediate needs of Authorities which have adopted a syllabor of many syllabus of religious instruction, and in their case the convening of a conference is not the convening of the conven ence is not, therefore, a matter of urgency.

- (h) There will be an Instrument of Management and Rules of Management for every county primary school, and an Instrument of Government and Articles of Government for every county secondary school.
- (i) In view of the impossibility of securing the necessary teachers and school accommodation on 1st April, 1945, the Minister proposes to make an Order retaining the school leaving age at 14. It is not possible to say how long the Order will remain in force, but Authorities may take it that it will not cease to have effect earlier than the 1st April, 1946.

6. MINISTRY OF EDUCATION COMPULSORY SCHOOL AGE (POSTPONEMENT) ORDER, 1944.

The above-named Order was submitted, stating that under Sub-Section (3) of Section 108 of the Education Act, 1944, the school leaving age will remain at 14 instead of 15 years of age.

#### 7. EMPLOYMENT OF SCHOOL CHILDREN:

#### 1.—ANNUAL REDECORATION OF SCHOOLS:

The Borough Engineer reported that it was not possible to put any of the work of external redecoration in hand during the midsummer holidays, as all available men were concentrated on first-aid repairs to houses. It is possible that during the autumn term painters may become available.

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# 3. ELECTRICAL INSTALLATIONS IN SCHOOL AIR RAID SHELTERS:

The Committee were informed that, as a result of recent enemy action, the school air-raid shelters are being extensively used by the general public. It had therefore been necessary for the Borough Engineer to take steps to make good the damage which had been done to the electrical equipment in these shelters. The reconditioning of the ventilating fans is nearing completion, and the replacement of defective heaters and fittings has been carried out where necessary. Additional lighting points have been put in some of the lavatories where no lighting had been provided. The old transformer units and emergency battery lighting have not been repaired, owing to the difficulty of obtaining spare parts and labour involved. The estimated cost of carrying out the above-named work is £250.

Pursuant to item 6 in the Report of this Sub-Committee dated 13/6/44, the Borough Engineer reported that he had made further enquiries from safe makers, but was definitely informed that none of these wall safes are now in stock, and that they will not be again manufactured until after the war.

The Education Officer responsible has visited Golders Green Library, and was given information on methods of classifying, cataloguing and issuing books; also assistance in compiling a list of periodicals.

#### 10,-SOUTH-EASTERN REGIONAL LIBRARY SYSTEM:

The Chief Librarian reported that the Annual Report of the Executive Committee of the South Eastern Regional Library Bureau for the year 1943-4 shows that 29,333 applications were received, an increase of 3,994 over the previous year, and 5,806 over the record year of 1938-9. Of these the system supplied 20,162 volumes (68 per cent.) and together with the National Central Library 26,277 (89 per cent.). The Committee has now introduced a scheme for all books to be sent carriage paid, and for postages to be settled annually through the Bureau. No library can lose financially by the scheme, and all will be saved much clerical labour.

The large number of books now out of print and otherwise unobtainable increases the importance and usefulness of this inter-library lending system to the co-operating libraries and their readers.

In order to assist Housing Authorities in meeting the immediate shortage of housing accommodation, the Government have decided to recommend Parliament to confer powers on the Ministry of Health to supply temporary houses, to be erected by the Ministry of Works on land belonging to Local Authorities, and to make these houses available to Local Authorities on agreed terms.

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- 2. A Bill giving effect to this decision was introduced in Parliament on 1916 July. If the Bill becomes law, it will be necessary for Local Authorities who design July. It the Diff becomes to avail themselves of the facilities offered by the Bill to secure such land as is required, and to carry out the necessary development. In order to avoid delay at a later stage, the Minister is now prepared to consider provisional applications of tamperary houses. from Local Authorities for an allocation of temporary houses. It is not possible at present to indicate the total number of such houses that it will be possible to provide within the period of approximately two years proposed to be covered by the legislation, but it is thought that the number will be approximately equal to the regimeter, the number of permanent houses that can be provided by Local Authorities during this period, and in the allocation of temporary houses it is the intention of the Government to give a special preference to towns which have suffered exceptionally from war damage. Such Authorities may properly take account of this factor in In making arrangements for distribution, account will be taken their applications. of the order in which applications from Local Authorities are received.
- 3. Terms upon which the houses will be made available to Local Authorities are being discussed by the Minister with representatives of Local Authorities, and further information on this matter will be supplied as soon as possible. In general it is contemplated that the period for which the houses will remain will be approximately ten years, and that the annual rate charge on the Local Authority in respect of the provision of the temporary houses so long as they stand will not be in excess of that payable by them for permanent houses under housing legislation.
- 4. The selection of the sites will, as in the case of sites intended for the erection of permanent houses, be primarily a matter for the Local Authority, but it appears to the Minister that wherever this course is practicable there will be advantage in selecting sites which, so far as can be judged, are likely to be suitable at a later date for the erection of permanent houses. Sites for temporary houses should, wherever possible, be sufficient for not less than 100, or, in the case of Authorities with smaller programmes, for not less than 50.
  - 5. The Minister will be glad to be informed as soon as possible-
    - (1) whether the Council desire to apply for an allocation of temporary houses, and, if so, for what number;
    - (2) to what extent they already have in their possession land which they think can appropriately be used for the erection of these houses without prejudice to their immediate programme for building permanent houses."

The Borough Surveyor reported verbally on the implications of the Circular, and after careful consideration, the Committee

#### RESOLVED-

- (1) That application be made to the Ministry for an allocation of 500 temporary houses.
- (2) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit to the next meeting details of sites available for the erection of such temporary houses.

# 1.—19.—PROVISION OF HOUSES AND POLICY AS TO ALLOCATION:

A letter was submitted from the Rev. A. G. Hardie, the Vicar of St. Alban's, Golden Green, stating that in his capacity as chaplain to a number of military units, and in the course of conversations with members of the Forces, it was obvious that a burning question in the minds of those now in the Forces was that of securing a house after the war, and he asked to be informed of the Council's policy in this matter, and as in whether service men and women are going to receive priority over civilians, and also the extent of the provision being made in the Borough.

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RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND--That the Rev. A. C. Hardie be furnished with details of the housing provision so far approved by the Council, and that he be informed that the allocation of housing accommodation will be determined according to the urgency of the need.

# 20.-BRENT HILL ESTATE DEVELOPMENT:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Brent Hill Estate Tenants' Association, making application for a community centre to be built on the Estate when the plans for expansion are considered. It was stated that the tenants of the Estate desired a building in which they could hold their meetings and social evenings.

RESOLVED-That the Association be informed that the matter would receive consideration at the appropriate time.

# 27.—ANNUAL REPORT OF MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH.

The Committee have duly noted the annual report of the Medical Officer of Health and School Medical Officer for the year 1943, a copy of which had previously been circulated to all Members of the Council.

#### 28.-EVACUATION:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted details of the number of mothers and children who had taken advantage of the official evacuation scheme, and also of the assisted scheme, and pointed out that if evacuation is maintained for a sufficient period there will be a decrease in the work for the medical, health visiting and midwifery staff, but that reception areas may correspondingly be short of staff, particularly for the midwifery services. He had, therefore, asked for volunteers from these staffs to go to the reception areas should the need arise, and asked for approval to his action.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That in the event of a request being made for additional staff for the reception areas, the Medical Officer of Health be authorised to send such staff as may be necessary, having regard to the maintenance of local services. [See report of Finance and General Purposes Committee—item 7 (ii)]

## 29.—MATERNITY CASES-QUEEN CHARLOTTE'S MATERNITY HOSPITAL:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the receipt of a letter from the above hospital suggesting that in view of the very heavy increases in cost the charge per patient per day be increased from 11s. 3d. to 13s.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be granted for the payment of the increased charge.

## 30.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936 (PART VII.)—CHILD LIFE PROTECTION:

The Medical Officer of Health reported on an application (Case No. 344) for permission to undertake for reward the nursing and maintenance of children under the age of nine years apart from their parents.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the maximum number of children under the age of nine years that may be kept at the premises in respect of Gase No. 344 be fixed at one.

# 31.—TEMPORARY ACCOMMODATION FOR CHILDREN DURING ILLNESS OF PARENT:

The Council, at its meeting on the 12th June last (P.H. & M.S. 15.5.44—23) decided to ask the Ministry of Health for approval to the use of one of its day nurseries during the night-time for the temporary care of children whose mothers were not able to look after them by reason of illness or other causes. As an alternative, it was suggested that it might be possible to make arrangements with an authority in a reception area to take an occasional case. A communication has now been received from the Ministry of Health stating that the Minister is not prepared to agree to the Council's proposal and, further, that nursery accommodation in reception areas is greatly in demand. The Ministry suggested, therefore, that the children concerned might be evacuated under the Government Evacuation Scheme to friends or relatives in the country.

The Committee have duly noted the communication.

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# 32.—USE OF MILL HILL HEALTH CENTRE—RESUSCITATION LECTURES:

A letter was submitted from the Commandant of Mill Hill (Middlesex No. 310) Detachment, British Red Cross Society, thanking the Council for the use of the health centre for a course of lectures, and stating that such lectures were well attended, and 100 per cent. passes were obtained at the end of the course.

Noted.

# 33.—MIDDLESEX COUNTY COUNCIL ACT, 1934, PART VII. — LICENSING OF MASSAGE, ETC., ESTABLISHMENTS:

# 36.—PRELIMINARY TRAINING SCHOOL:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that, owing to damage by enemy action, it had been necessary to discontinue the Preliminary Training School, but that arrangements had been made in the case of five students from Hendon and six from Willesden to continue the course of training at the Isolation Hospital, the teaching being carried out by the Sister-Tutor appointed for the Preliminary Training School. This permitted of the training course then in progress being completed for these particular students, but further consideration would require to be given to the re-establishment of a preliminary training school generally. In the meantime, however, the Matron of the Isolation Hospital had arranged for the Deputy Matron and Sister-Tutor to carry on a course analogous to the preliminary training school for the student nurses on the Hospital staff.

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# Hendon Isolation Hospital.

#### 37.—EVACUATION:

The Medical Officer of Health reported with regard to the evacuation of the Hospital (Mayor's Recess Report—item 11), and stated that arrangements had been made with the St. Alban's Hospital for the reception of infectious disease cases, and for any future cases which may occur during the evacuation period. The evacuation of the Hospital had made more beds available for air-raid casualties, and it had been singlested to sector headquarters that 150 cases could be accommodated, on the assumption that Sector will provide the necessary additional medical and surgical staff.

38,—REFUSE DISPOSAL:

Pursuant to the Committee's instructions at its last meeting (P.H. & M.S. 19.6.44—33), the Borough Surveyor reported that the approximate cost of construction of a small brick incinerator would be £50. It was, however, pointed out that, in his opinion, it was not desirable to construct an incinerator of this type at the Hospital, as nuisance would be caused by reason of both smoke and smell to the Hospital and to the adjacent residential buildings. He suggested, therefore, that the following arrangements be

- (a) All bandages and dressings to be burnt in the boiler fires.
- (b) Waste food to be placed in covered galvanised iron bins kept for the purpose.
- (c) The remaining refuse to be kept in covered galvanised iron bins to be cleared weekly, or more frequently if possible.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the suggestions of the Borough Surveyor be approved, on the understanding that the refuse from the Isolation Hospital is removed at least not less frequently than twice weekly.

39.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936—SECTIONS 93 AND 94:

14a, Second Avenue, N.W. 4. 164, The Broadway, N.W. 9.

The Senior Sanitary Inspector reported that default had been made in complying with the requirements of statutory notices served on the owners of the above-mentioned premises for the abatement of nuisances.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be authorised to institute legal proceedings in each case.

# 40.—GREATER LONDON ADVISORY COUNCIL FOR SMOKE ABATEMENT:

In April last the Council agreed to become members of the Greater London Advisory Council for Smoke Abatement, and to pay the appropriate membership fee (P.H. & M.S., 17.4.44—35). The ordinary membership fee is two guineas, but during the war this has been reduced to one guinea. The Advisory Council now state that they are restarting their activities, particularly in regard to post-war reconstruction problems and it has been decided by the Executive Committee to revert to the full subscription fee of two guineas.

### 15.—DIVERSION OF 'BUS ROUTE NO. 240:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the London Passenger Transport Board regarding the memorial signed by residents of the thoroughfares in the vicinity of Dole Street and Sanders Lane, and visitors to the Paddington Council's Cemetery, suggesting the continuance of the single-deck 'buses on route 240 from Mill Hill Broadway to Daws Lane, Wise Lane, Dole Street and Devonshire Road to Mill Hill East. The Board state that it is not practicable to adopt the suggestions, owing to the physical unsuitability of sections of the road, and it is therefore not possible to accede to the request contained in the memorial. A letter was also submitted from the Regional Transport Commissioner, Ministry of War Transport, with reference to travelling facilities in this area, and intimating that owing to the condition of Sanders Lane and the bridge over the railway, as well as a similar railway bridge in Dole Street, it seems to be impossible to provide improved facilities for residents on the Dole Street Estate, without either undertaking considerable road improvement work or providing additional buses to operate a special service, and even for this purpose road improvement work would be necessary. The Commissioner is, however, communicating with the Divisional Road Engineer, to obtain his observations on the suggestion contained in the Council's letter of the 9th May, that the Sanders Lane bridge and approaches be made suitable for operation by public service vehicles. The Committee considered a further suggestion by residents in the vicinity of Dole Street, deferred from the last meeting (Group IL Cttee. 19.6.44, Hi.-12), that the 'bus route No. 240 (single-deck 'bus) between Edgward and The Broadway, Mill Hill, should be extended to the Paddington Council's Cemeters, Dole Street, via Daws Lane and Wise Lane, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND — That the above suggestion be forwarded to the London Passenger Transport Board for consideration.

# 16.—UNLICENSED STREET TRADER:

The Town Clerk reported that Sidney Burgess, on the 22nd June, 1944, was observed and cautioned by the police for causing an obstruction on the footway of Selvage Lane at its junction with Hale Lane, near the fence at the rear of the "Green Man" Public house. Burgess was selling fruit from a van parked in the roadway, had two boxes on the footway, and was trading without a street-trading licence, thus contravening Section 149 of the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929.

RESOLVED TO BECOMMEND—That proceedings be instituted against Sidney Burgess for the recovery of the penalties provided by Section 149 (1) of the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929.

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17.-FRITH LANE, MILL HILL:

Frith Lane has for some time been a one-way traffic street, entry being only from Bittacy Hill. Widening works have been carried out to the Lane, and the carriageway now has a minimum width of 18 ft. The Borough Surveyor reported that the Ministry of War Transport now suggest that it is no longer necessary to have one-way working in Frith Lane; and propose making an Order cancelling this restriction but retaining one-way working in respect of Partingdale Lane. There would not appear to be any objection to the proposal, but it is desirable for the hedge at the junction of Bittaey Hill and Frith Lane to be cut down to provide a sight line for traffic leaving or entering the lane, and for a temporary footpath to be constructed on the greensward wherever possible, for the use of pedestrians.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the above proposal be approved, and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit an estimate of the cost of the necessary works to the Ministry of War Transport for a contribution towards such cost.

### 19.—CHURCH FARM HOUSE, HENDON:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Hon. Secretary, Hendon (St. Mary's) Parochial Church Council with the following resolution passed unanimously at an extraordinary meeting of the Church Council held on the 27th August, 1944:-

"That the Parochial Church Council of Hendon Parish Church, recognising that the Hendon Borough Council is the trustee for the amenities of the Borough, and being of the opinion that the area of Old Hendon which centres on the ancient Parish Church is a very important part of those amenities, considers it right to express alarm at the proposal to demolish Church Farm House, and prays the Borough Council to give full consideration to the appearance of this area as a whole before taking steps which might irretrievably damage it."

A letter was also submitted from Mr. Herbert A. Welch, asking the Committee to receive a deputation on behalf of a number of inhabitants and ratepayers of Hendon, who regret the suggestion of the Committee to demolish Church Farm House. With the consent of the Chairman the deputation was invited to attend the meeting, and the Committée received such deputation, consisting of Mrs. B. J. Monro, J.P., Mr. T. Hawes and Mr. H. A. Welch.

The deputation referred to the historical interest of Church Farm House, and the desirability for the preservation of this corner of Old Hendon, with the ancient Parish Church of St. Mary's as its centre. In the opinion of the deputation, no sufficient reason had been given by the Council for demolishing the building, which was referred to in a letter to the Council dated the 24th March, 1944, from the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings in the following terms:-

"There is no doubt that the house is capable of and well worth reconditioning, and the Council is to be congratulated in taking over the building and in conserving it as part of the old town. We have little doubt that, if properly repaired, the building will be by no means a liability, but should command an economic rent."

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The deputation expressed the hope that the Council would refrain from demolishing Church Farm House, and take the necessary steps to recondition the building, thus preserving the familiar landmark at the top of Greyhound Hill. The deputation thanked the Committee for being received.

Having regard to the fact that the Council cannot at present expend large sums on repairs of this kind, and in view of the possibility of the general post-war development plan for Hendon being affected by an immediate decision, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That consideration of the matter be deferred for a period of six months, and, in the meantime, the Borough Surveyor be authorised to take any necessary steps to preserve the property against the weather.

# 20.—STAY TO TELEGRAPHIC POST ON LAND, NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the Postmaster-General for permission to place a stay to a telegraph-post on the land belonging to the Council at the North Circular Road, opposite Claremont Road.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND— That permission be given, subject to the Post-master-General paying a nominal rental of 1s. per annum, and to the Council being fully indemnified against any claims arising in connection therewith.

# 21.—CLEARANCE OF LOFTS ORDER, 1942:

Statements were submitted from the National Fire Service giving details of 76 inspections under the above Order carried out during May, 78 during June, and 33 during July, 1944.

# 1.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £71 10s. 1d. were submitted and approved.

#### 2.—CRESSINGHAM ROAD:

The Chief Officer Meals Service reported that the Town Clerk had received a letter dated 12th July, from the Ministry of Food, stating that, in view of the arguments put forward by the deputation to the Divisional Food Officer, the Ministry did not feel in a position to refuse the Council the right to proceed with the proposed restaurant at the above site if, in view of the stage the war has now reached, there is still a strong desire to go on with the scheme. In a further letter, dated the 18th July, the Ministry indicated that consideration had been given to the plan for a special-type hut for this scheme, but that it is impossible for further special types to be supplied. It was understood that a type "A" Nasherete hut would, in fact, go on the site, and it was requested that plans and proposals be submitted on this understanding.

In view of the present developments in the war situation, the Committee have deferred the further consideration of the question to the next meeting.

# 3.—ST. MICHAEL'S RESTAURANT—BILLETING OF BUILDING REPAIR WORKERS:

The Committee were informed that experience so far at this restaurant had shown the men to be very appreciative and helpful, and that there had been no interference with the normal restaurant activities. The A.R.P. Controller had made it clear to the Ministry of Food that the billeting of the men at this restaurant was only intended as a stop-gap until alternative arrangements could be made. In connection with the prices to be charged for meals supplied, the Ministry had stated that these should be in accordance with the normal British Restaurant prices, and that any loss on the provision of meals should be met by the British Restaurant Account. If there is a deficit on the British Restaurant Account, such deficit, not exceeding the estimated loss necessarily incurred in providing meals to the workmen concerned, would be regarded as unavoidable, and eligible for reimbursement by the Ministry of Food. Any other expenses incurred in connection with the accommodation of the workmen would not be chargeable to the British Restaurant Account.

The number of men billeted up to the 26th August ranged from 14 to 41, and subsequently increased to 45. It was understood from the Group Rehousing Officer that hostels for these men were in course of preparation. Inspectors of the Ministries concerned have commented on the absence of a drying-room and a separate recreation room, and it is hoped that these omissions will cause St. Michael's to be placed high on the list for release from this service. No definite date for this has, however, because

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# 4-PROVISION OF EMERGENCY MEALS:

In several restaurants during the past few weeks persons who have either been bombed out or have been deprived of cooking facilities in their own homes have been provided with midday meals, and at the request of the A.R.P. Controller, Montrose Restaurant was opened for midday meals for such persons and for N.F.S. and Civil Defence personnel on Sunday, 6th August, and Bank Holiday, 7th August. Arrangements were made for the meals to be provided between 1 and 2 p.m. on both days; 100 meals were prepared on the Sunday and 120 on the Monday, but only 31 persons arrived on the first day and 50 on the second. Twenty-seven N.F.S. personnel working on a bombed site were provided with a midday meal at St. Michael's Restaurant on Sunday, 27th August.

Granville Restaurant was slightly damaged by blast as a result of enemy action on the 20th July and the 15th August, but the service of meals was not affected. This matter has been reported to the Ministry of Food.

Noted.

# 5.-EVACUATION:

The Chief Officer Meals Service reported that restaurant trading had been adversely affected during the fly-bomb period and the consequent evacuation of residents. In a letter dated 28th August, the Ministry of Food state that they fully appreciate the difficulties of Local Authorities in the London area in operating their British Restaurants economically in the present circumstances, and, while the principle that the restaurants are intended to be self-supporting must not be lost sight of the Ministry had provided, in the circular dated 15th November, 1940, that unavoidable losses caused by circumstances outside the control of the Council will be due for reimbursement by the Ministry.

The letter, however, also suggests that the Council could assist the position by raising the prices of meals up to the limit consistent with fairness to the public, and asking that this should receive immediate and serious consideration. Attention was also drawn to the staff position, and it was stated that there would be no justification for retaining staff beyond the requirements of current operation; this was important both from the financial angle, and because there is an acute shortage of British Restaurant staff in many London districts, and it is essential that any temporarily redundant personnel should be made available for work elsewhere.

The letter further intimated that the Ministry would like to arrange for one of its war-time meals advisors to visit Hendon at an early date, and to review the question as to whether it is necessary to dispense with any of the staff at the restaurants. Further than this, it was requested that the Ministry be kept closely informed, especially if the position deteriorates further, so that the continuance or otherwise of the restaurants in operation may be agreed between the Council and the Ministry.

With regard to the suggestion of the Ministry that the position could be assisted by raising the price of meals, the Committee have given the matter full consideration, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the charge for tea supplied at all restaurants be increased from 1d. to 2d. per cup.

# 6.—MOBILE MEALS SERVICE:

In connection with the application made to the Ministry of Health for approval to the provision of a suitable vehicle for the purposes of a mobile meals service to aged and infirm residents, a letter was submitted from the Ministry of Health stating that the Minister has no power to approve the proposal, and that he does not consider that he could properly use the proviso to Section 228 (1) of the Local Government Act, 1933,

### (d) Vacancies.

It was reported that a vacancy existed for one nursery nurse at York Park Nursery.

### (e) Promotion.

# (f) Generally.

On consideration of an application from Mrs. G. Francis, teacher, Hyde School Nursery, for a reduction of hours of duty, on medical grounds, the Committee approved such application, subject to the appropriate salary adjustment, to be determined by the Borough Treasurer.

#### 3.—DOLE STREET DAY NURSERY:

The Medical Officer of Health reported that the children normally attending this nursery had been transferred to Hyde Cottage and Hyde School Day Nurseries, pending the completion of repairs, and the Borough Surveyor reported that it was anticipated that the Dole Street Day Nursery would be ready for reoccupation in approximately two weeks' time.

### 4.—HOCROFT ROAD NURSERY—MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR S.R.O. NO. 112:

The Medical Officer of Health reported the closure of the Hocroft Road Nursery under the terms of the above-mentioned Circular, and submitted details of the transfer of an equivalent of one day-nursery staff and equipment to a nursery in a reception area. A comprehensive report on the general nursery position in the Borough arising out of evacuation has been made to the Ministry of Health, and the matter is to be reviewed in four weeks' time. In connection with the closure of the nursery, it was reported that Mrs. Good had been appointed to act in the capacity of caretaker, and the Committee authorised a payment of 30s, weekly to Mrs. Good, plus fuel and light, during the period in which she acts as caretaker at the Hocroft Road Nursery.

# 5.—MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR NO. 111/44—RESIDENTIAL AND WAR-TIME NURSERIES:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted the above Circular, which stressed the necessity and desirability of Welfare Authorities responsible for the nurseries making arrangements for the medical examination, particularly with regard to tuberculosis, of the nurses already employed, and of candidates for future appointments to nursery posts. The Medical Officer of Health reported that a large proportion of the staff had

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already been X-rayed, and suggested that the remainder of the staff should be X-rayed when the X-ray unit is next in this area, and that, in the meantime, the records of the staff who had not been so X-rayed would be examined, and appropriate action taken where necessary.

The Committee have approved the suggestion of the Medical Officer of Health.

# 6.—YORK PARK, EDGWARE AND DOLE STREET NURSERIES—APPROVAL TO EXPENDITURE:

It was reported that the Ministry of Health had approved an expenditure of £25 16s. for the provision of Vent Axia stale-air extractors in each of the above-mentioned nurseries.

# Report of the Civil Defence Committee.

#### 1.-AIR RAID INCIDENTS:

A further eight flying bombs have fallen in the Borough since the last report of the Committee, making a total of 43 in all since the commencement of the flying-bomb attacks. Thirty-seven persons were killed; 85 (five of whom have died) were removed to, and detained in, hospital, and 114 persons were slightly injured. The number of houses destroyed now totals 67, and approximately 5,380 houses have Of the damaged houses, 5,296 have been received varying degrees of damage. made wind and weather proof, and of this number 2,550 have received permanent repairs to roofs, windows, doors, internal partitions, etc. The bulk of the building labour within the Borough has been engaged on this work, together with about 100 men allocated from other areas. Much assistance in connection with first-aid repairs to houses has been given by the Council's Rescue Service. Homes salvaged and removed to Corporation's stores and other addresses, with subsequent removals added, total 278.

Much valuable assistance has been given at incidents by N.F.S. personnel, Home Guard, W.V.S., the Police, and men from the Corporation's Highway Section. A high degree of proficiency has been reached by Rescue parties composed of part-time personnel, which have played a prominent part at several of the incidents. The Hendon Rescue Service has at times been reinforced by parties from Harrow, Wembley and Hornsey, and the Hendon Service has on occasions rendered assistance in the Willesden and Wembley areas.

Further letters have been received from members of the public, expressing appreciation of services rendered by the Civil Defence and ancillary Services at incidents in the Borough. Extracts from letters received from official sources read as under:-

"I cannot praise too highly the wonderful work carried out by your Service on the night of . . . Their untiring efforts, after just leaving another bomb incident to come to us, was a model of what we term 'devotion to duty.' Actually, their work was so well organised and so enthusiastically performed that it was an inspiration to all present, and I would deem it a favour if you would convey our great appreciation to all concerned."

"Will you please convey to all ranks of all Services under your command my appreciation of their prompt action and generous help to . . . whose house was damaged by a flying bomb on . . . It was a great comfort to us all to know that had there been any casualties we should all have been so extraordinarily well looked after."

# 2.—HENDON AND DISTRICT TRADES COUNCIL:

The Hendon and District Trades Council has expressed its desire "to establish closer relations with the Borough authorities, with a view to assisting in emergency situations resulting from flying-bomb attacks," and, in this connection, has appointed a Liaison Committee, consisting of its President, Treasurer and Secretary. The Trades Council seeks the observations of the Borough Council as to how this Liaison Committee can best serve its own members and the Borough in the general emergency.

The Trades Council has been thanked for their kind offer of assistance, which, in view of the present circumstances, has been noted for future reference.

# 3.—BATTLE OF BRITAIN SUNDAY:

Battle of Britain Sunday is to be observed on Sunday, the 17th September, and an invitation has been received for members of the Civil Defence Services, W.V.S., Joint War Organisation of the British Red Cross Society and Order of St. John, and other ancillary organisations and post-raid services, to attend a service being held at the Aerodrome. The Regional Commissioners have expressed their desire that Local Councils should accept such invitations, and arrangements are being made accordingly.

# 4.—PUBLIC LOCAL DANGER WARNINGS FOR FLYING BOMBS:

Certain instructions were received as a result of the decision of the Government that a danger warning for flying bombs should operate daily between 06.00 hours and 22.00 hours. Subsequently, however, instructions were received that all work of this nature was to be suspended.

# 5,-LIGHTING OF STREETS AND PREMISES:

The Committee has noted the contents of two circulars issued by the Minister of Home Security dealing with street lighting and the lighting of premises. The earlier circular referred to the possibility of allowing increased standards of lighting, in the light of the latest developments in the war situation. The restoration of unrestricted lighting would still involve excessive risk, but considerable improvements may become possible later, either throughout the country or in specified areas. Where street lighting is covered by a reliable system of control, permitting street lights to be extinguished on receipt of a "purple" or "lights" message, the new standard contemplated is 0.2-foot candles on the ground, which compares favourably with much pre-war average street lighting. Where no such control exists, the maximum permitted will be 0.02 candles on the ground, equivalent to pre-war side street lighting. In all cases lighting is to be so screened that no direct light will be visible above the horizontal.

The second Circular intimated that in London Region, and in the Lighting Authority areas bordering the Thames Estuary, higher street lighting was not at present practicable, but special consideration will be given to this area and further instructions will be issued.

In regard to lighting of premises, the regulations covering the display of lights from buildings are being amended to permit the substitution of "half-light" for the previous black-out. This relaxation will come into force on 17th September, and is applicable to all classes of buildings throughout the country, except in special coastal areas. Complete obscuration will no longer be required, and the amendment will provide that no offence is committed provided the window or other aperture (other than a skylight) is covered with material which is of (a) such a nature that objects inside the building are not distinguishable from outside the building, or (b) is black. On a public warning or on demand by a constable complete obscuration must be restored.

#### 6.—BILLETING OF FIRST-AID WORKERS:

The Committee has considered the direction of the Council that the Controller be asked to find other sleeping accommodation for the bomb-damage repair workers billeted at St. Michael's British Restaurant. St. Michael's Hall was selected, in conjunction with the Group Rehousing Officer, for the purpose of housing the men, as the primary earmarking of the Hall was for a second-line rest centre, and protected accommodation was available for the men. The Group Rehousing Officer has marked the accommodation as available for 50 men. Forty-three reported the first night, and

this number has dropped steadily over the past five weeks. Over the two weeks ending 26th August the average number in residence was 24. The Hall is not, therefore, overcrowded. The men leave before 8 o'clock each morning, after having cleared and cleaned up the Hall satisfactorily, and there is then ample time to air the Hall ready for its use for British Restaurant purposes.

The use of this accommodation is a temporary measure. It is understood by the Group Rehousing Officer that the preparation of hostels for accommodating the men is proceeding apace. All temporary accommodation at present in use is being inspected by representatives of the Ministry of Labour and Ministry of Works, and listed according to the suitability of the facilities available at each temporary hostel. The most unsatisfactory will be closed first as the specially constructed accommodation becomes available. It is not anticipated that the accommodation at St. Michael's Hall will have to be used for any considerable length of time, but no date for its closure can be given at this stage.

#### 7.—SALARY OF DEPUTY CHIEF WARDEN:

Representations have been made to the London Civil Defence Region for the recognition of an increase in the salary granted by the Council to the Deputy Chief Warden (see item 1-Report 26.6.44). The A.R.P. Officer of the Middlesex County Council has, however, been advised by the Regional Commissioners that they are not prepared to approve the payment of a salary of £400 per annum, plus cost-of-living bonus, to the Deputy Chief Warden in the Borough of Hendon.

#### 8.—INCREASE IN PAY—WHOLE-TIME CIVIL DEFENCE PERSONNEL:

In accordance with the terms of Home Security Circular 103/1944, the basic pay for whole-time weekly paid members of the Hendon Civil Defence General Services, and Head and Senior Fireguards, aged twenty years and over, has been increased by 2s. per week in the case of men and 1s. 6d. in the case of women. The revised weekly basic rates are therefore:-

No increase has been authorised for persons under twenty years of age.

The increases apply to personnel holding posts carrying pay in excess of the basic rate, except-

- (i) Rescue Service drivers may continue to receive the Local Authority's rate where such is higher than the Civil Defence basic pay plus service pay, where appro-
- (ii) trained nurses employed as such at First Aid Posts, for whom an increase of pay was notified in Ministry of Health Circular 81, dated 18th July, 1944.

Superintendents in charge of depots with a unit establishment of more than 180. who are at present receiving £6 4s. 6d., and are not eligible for service pay, are to receive £6 14s. per week as from the 28th May, 1944.

### 9.—SERVICE PAY:

The Council will remember that representations were made to the Minister of Home Security for the authorisation of the same rate of service pay to all members of the Services, irrespective of their rank and total earnings, and also that service in H.M. Forces should be allowed to rank when taking into account previous service (see item 5 -Report 26.6.44). The Minister of Home Security has now added to the list of Services in which previous whole-time paid service as an enrolled member may count for the purpose of assessing the amount of service pay due, as under:-

#### 10.—SURRENDER OF CLOTHING COUPONS:

The annual tariff of coupons due to be surrendered in respect of Civil Defence uniforms for the year ending August, 1945, by whole-time uniformed members of Civil Defence Services is to remain the same as for the previous year (i.e., 16 coupons in the case of a full uniform). At the same time, the Board of Trade has agreed that the withdrawal of coupons from individuals who have surrendered coupons for two years or more shall be waived for 1944-5, and the number abated for those who have surrendered for more than one year. The general effect of the concession is to relieve the personnel of the obligation to surrender coupons when they have surrendered at least twice the annual coupon surrender value of the garments they hold. All arrears of clothing coupons up to August, 1944, must, however, be cleared.

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# 11.—OFFICE ACCOMMODATION AT RESCUE DEPOTS:

The Committee has authorised an expenditure of approximately £7 in connection with the fitting up of office accommodation on the ground floors of the two Rescue depots, to provide more protected accommodation for the personnel manning the superintendent's office and control room.

# 12.—RESCUE EQUIPMENT:

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1944,

A lighting system devised and constructed by Mr. Jared, of the Rescue Service, has been used with conspicuous success at air-raid incidents. The Committee has approved an expenditure of approximately £5 for the provision of a further lighting device of this kind. The County Council will be asked to recognise this expenditure for A.R.P. grant.

The Committee has noted the contents of Circular 97/1944, in which the Minister of Health refers to the manning, maintenance and operation of local civil ambulances by Civil Defence personnel, and to the fact that the J.I.C. rates for this work are almost invariably higher than Civil Defence rates of pay, while the hours of duty are less. The Minister considers the position unsatisfactory from the point of view of the personnel, and refers to the practice of some Local Authorities of supplementing the pay of Civil Defence personnel engaged on civil ambulances as open to objection, both because of the lack of uniformity and because it conflicts with the normal practice applicable to Civil Defence personnel when on extraneous duties.

The Minister of Health, in consultation with the Minister of Home Security, has therefore decided that where the local Ambulance Service is such that Civil Defence personnel are, or could be, employed whole-time on the work, they should be granted conditional release from Civil Defence, as provided for in Home Security Circular 88, of 1942. The Minister states, however, that where conditions do not permit or necessitate whole-time employment in the work, no change need be made.

The Committee consider that the present arrangements in this Borough do not permit of a change being made.

#### 14.—PROTECTION AT WARDENS' DISTRICT HEADQUARTERS:

The Minister of Home Security has decided that the limited supply of Morrison shelters makes it impossible for authority to be given for a Morrison shelter to be issued to each district headquarters for the protection of the personnel required to man Wardens' district headquarters in the Borough. (See item 4—Report 31.7.44.)

#### 15.—FIRE PREVENTION:

As a result of proceedings instituted against Mrs. C. E. Silver and Miss Silver for failure to earry out fire-prevention duties, each has been fined £5, with an alternative of two months' imprisonment. The Committee has authorised the Town Clerk to institute proceedings against two other persons for failure to perform duties under the Fire Guard (Business and Government Premises) Order.

During the month of July, 1944, the N.F.S. carried out first inspections of the late of 27 houses in the Borough. A second inspection was necessary in six cases.

Schemes for fire-prevention arrangements submitted by two occupiers of business premises in the Borough have been considered and approved.

A "wakeful watch" by personnel of street fire parties is no longer required, and duty rotas need not be maintained except in the case of key personnel, such as Sector Captains, Sector Point Staff and Street Fire Party Leaders. Fireguards are to turn out for duty, and assembly and sector points are to be manned if gunfire is heard. Sector captains are to be responsible for ensuring the efficiency of the street fire-party organisation, and routine functions such as the maintenance of static water supplies, care of equipment and appliances are to be carried out. In regard to business premises, there is to be no reduction at present in the number of fire guards required to be on duty during the hours of black-out, but the situation is being kept constantly under review by the Commissioners, and relaxation will be authorised as soon as the progress of the war makes it possible. During daylight hours, as from the 12th September, there is to be a complete relaxation of duty. The "wakeful watch" need not, however, he maintained, but fire-guards are to be instructed that on the sounding of an "alert" they must be ready to turn out at two-minutes' notice, and sector points in wholly business premises areas, block points and fire posts are to be manned when gunfire is heard.

#### 16.-EVACUATION:

To date 5,518 applicants for evacuation have registered, of whom some 4,679 have actually travelled. On the 27th August, 1944, it was found possible to reduce the number of registration centres from six to three, and from the 9th September one centre at Ravensfield House has operated. On the 5th September an intimation was received that the parties for that week would be the last until further notice, though further registrations would continue to be accepted. Approximately 5,571 travel vouchers and billeting certificates have been issued to eligible persons able to make private arrangements. The Committee has noted the efficient manner in which Mr. A. Smith (assistant A.R.P. officer) has directed the operation of the scheme.

Civil Defence personnel were called upon to assist in the evacuation of hospital patients. A letter addressed to the Head of the Rescue Service by the Acting Medical Superintendent of the Colindale Hospital reads as follows:—

"I desire to place on record my deep appreciation and thanks for the assistance rendered by your colleagues of the Rescue Services, under Mr. Pinkney, in acting as stretcher-bearers during the removal of patients from the hospital. The smooth working and careful handling during the move was largely due to their able and expert assistance, and should it ever become necessary for this move to be carried out in the future, I should desire nothing else than to be able once again to call upon your valuable help."

# 17.—AIR RAID SHELTERS:

The work of making good public and communal shelters is proceeding. Work-completed since the commencement of "fly-bombing" have covered the waterproofing of 63 roofs, the replacement of lamps, fuses and lighting fittings in 366 shelters, and

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Porks white repairs and replacement of heating fittings in 29 shelters. Since the commencement of "fly-bomb" attacks, 1,313 adult and 351 children's bunks for Anderson shelters have been issued. Since the 1st of January, 6,214 Morrison-type shelters have been issued. Deliveries of this type of shelter within the Borough now total 11,620. Bunk allocations in public shelters now total 4,295 and in communal shelters 6,244. Evacuation has caused tickets for some 200 bunks to be surrendered.

# 12.—MR. G. A. E. SALMON (REF. NO. 1122) — PENSION:

# 13.-DEATH OF PENSIONERS:

# 22.—EDUCATION ACT, 1944—SECTION 110—RATE ADJUSTMENTS:

The Borough Treasurer reported that the above Act contemplates the levy of a uniform Education Rate through the County area, but, subject to certain conditions, provision is made by Section 110 and the seventh schedule for different Education Rates to be levied in the separate rating areas during a period to be determined, but not exceeding five years from the commencement of the operation of Part II, of the Act. The authority for such variations would be an Order made by the Minister following upon application being made to him by the County Council or the Council of a County District within the County area.

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# 23.—HOUSING ACCOMMODATION FOR FAMILIES INADEQUATELY HOUSED:

The Council (10.7.44) approved a recommendation of Group I. (Housing) Committee to utilise premises known as 127a and 127b, The Broadway, N.W. 9, for the provision of housing accommodation under the Ministry of Health Circular 2845. These premises were acquired by the Council in 1926 for the purpose of establishing the West Hendon Day Nursery. Since the premises are in the ownership of the Corporation, the provisions of Circular 2845 as to "requisitioning" do not apply. The Minister of Health, in response to an application for directions hereon, has notified approval to the use of the premises for housing purposes, and to an expenditure of £219 on repairs and adaptations to the first and second floors of the building. The ground floor (lockup shop) is unsuitable for housing accommodation. The Minister has directed that an appropriation of the land and premises in question would be subject to a suitable adjustment being made to the Maternity and Child Welfare Capital Account, and to the transfer of any outstanding loan at the date of appropriation to the Housing Account. For the purpose of issuing his formal consent to the appropriation, the Minister will require to be furnished with plans (in triplicate) showing the site to be appropriated, together with a copy of the Council's resolution authorising the application.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That application be made to the Minister of Health for consent to appropriation of the premises in question for housing purposes.

# 24.—EVACUATION OF ISOLATION HOSPITAL PATIENTS TO ST. ALBAN'S HOSPITAL:

The Borough Treasurer reported that he had communicated with the Joint Hospital Board in connection with the arrangements made for the reception of Hendon's infectious disease cases at the St. Alban's Hospital. A charge at the rate of 9s. per patient per day has been provisionally agreed. The normal charge made by the Joint Board is 12s. per day. Having regard to the loan of certain of the Council's nursing staff to the St. Alban's Hospital, and to that authority making no charge for meals supplied to such staff, the proposed charge of 9s. per patient per day is a reasonable one.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND — That the charge at the rate of 9s. per patient per day be approved.

#### 25.-MOAT MOUNT GOLF COURSE:

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Seal

The Borough Treasurer reported that the Moat Mount Golf Club had, in accordance with the agreed terms, deposited a sum of £1,000 with the Council as security for the carrying out of the obligations of the lease. The Borough Treasurer also reported with regard to representations made by Mr. Sturt, who suggests that arrangements should be made for golfing facilities for local residents. Particulars were submitted of the present charges at Mill Hill for occasional players, and the Committee decided to take no action in the matter.

# 26.—TOWN HALL LETTINGS:

Pursuant to the Committee's resolution (F. & G.P.C. 20.3.44-25), the Committee further considered the general principle of letting rooms in the Town Hall.

RESOLVED — That a Sub-Committee, consisting of Aldermen Copestake and Richardson and Councillor Pryke, together with the Chairman (Alderman Teare) be appointed to consider and report on the matter to the next meeting of the Committee.

# 27.—BILLETING OF ESSENTIAL WAR WORKERS:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Farnborough Urban District Council asking the Town Council to support the following resolution passed by the Farnborough Council urging H.M. Government to increase the weekly allowance to the householder who is obliged to provide accommodation for the essential war worker:—

- "(i) That this Council records its grave concern as to the totally inadequate weekly payments made to householders by H.M. Government for the accommodation of Essential War Workers who are billeted by the Local Authority, and is of opinion that the inadequacy of these payments is one of the principal causes of the difficulties which have arisen, and still arise, in billeting of this character.
- (ii) That representations be made to H.M. Government that the present sum of 5s, per week paid to the householder in respect of each worker accommodated be increased to such a sum as will adequately reimburse the householder the actual expenses incurred in accommodating the worker and providing such facilities as are necessary.
- (iii) That the Clerk be instructed to forward a copy of this resolution to the Minister of Health and to the Member of Parliament for this Division; and
- (iv) That the Clerk also forward a copy of this resolution to the Councils of County Boroughs, Boroughs and Urban Districts within England and Wales, with a request that such Councils should, if they concur with the view expressed therein, take similar action to that taken by the Council."

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Council support the above resolution of the Farnborough Urban District Council.

### 28.—POST-WAR CIVIL AVIATION:

The Committee duly **noted** a letter from the Association of Municipal Corporations intimating that the report of the Municipal Aerodromes Committee, which was adopted at the annual meeting of the Association on the 18th May, 1944, was transmitted to the Air Ministry, with a request that the Secretary of State for Air would be good enough to receive a deputation from the Association. The Department suggested that it would be useful if, in the first instance, representatives of the Association discussed the report with the Director-General of Civil Aviation. An interview accordingly took place on the 13th July, and the Director-General undertook to bring the view of the deputation to the Secretary of State for Air.

# 29.—INTERNATIONAL UNION OF LOCAL AUTHORITIES:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the International Union of Local Authorities inviting the Town Council to renew its membership of the British Committee (which carries with it membership of the Union) to appoint a representative on the General Council, and to nominate a representative for the Executive Committee. The minimum subscription for individual Local Authorities and societies interested in local government is £2 2s. a year.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the Council renew its membership of the British Committee of the International Union of Local Authorities, and that authority be given for the payment of the annual subscription of £2 2s.
- (ii) That His Worship the Mayor be appointed as the Council's representative on the General Council, and that he be nominated to serve on the Executive Committee.
- 30.—MIDDLESEX WHITLEY COUNCIL FOR LOCAL AUTHORITIES' ADMINISTRATIVE, TECHNICAL AND CLERICAL SERVICES AMENDMENT OF CONSTITUTION:

The Town Clerk reported on a letter from the Joint Secretaries (Employers and Staffs) of the Middlesex Whitley Council regarding an amendment of the constitution of the Provincial Councils.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Council and Staff Joint Committee.

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# 31 -- HENDON FOOD CONTROL COMMITTEE:

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It was reported that Mr. H. F. Wheeler had tendered his resignation as a Trade (Employee) Representative on the above Committee.



### II. Establishment of Aural Clinic.

The School Medical Officer reported that defects of the ear, nose and throat are comparatively common amongst school children, and that, whilst the majority respond satisfactorily to approved methods of treatment at the minor ailment clinics, a residue tend to become chronic and resistant to treatment. These cases are referred to hospital, but under existing conditions it is difficult to obtain the opinion of a consultant, and impossible to arrange for the necessary prolonged specialised treatment demanded. In this connection, the Committee were informed that Dr. F. P. M. 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## 2.—SCHEDULE OF LEAVERS AND LIVE REGISTER:

#### 3.—BUILDING INDUSTRY—APPRENTICES AND YOUTHS ENGAGED FOR TRAINING:

Circular 54/142 from the Ministry of Labour was submitted intimating that, in connection with arrangements that are being made by the Building Apprenticeship and Training Council for training workers to meet post-war demands of the building industry, the Council propose to compile and maintain a register of apprentices. For this purpose the following information will be required:—

- (a) Particulars of apprentices and youths in training on 30th September, 1944, and of the number of apprentices engaged in various crafts on that date.
- (b) Particulars of youths who, on and after 1st October, 1944, enter the building industry as apprentices or for training, in order to qualify as journeymen; also of all youths under the age of 18 who enter as builders' labourers or as labourers to designated crafts.

  Noted and approved.

# 4.—PAYMENT OF TEMPORARY MAINTENANCE ALLOWANCES TO TRANSFERRED YOUTHS:

A meeting of the "Ad Hoc" Sub-Committee was held on 4th July, 1944, when the following resolutions were adopted:—

- (a) THAT temporary maintenance allowances be paid to William S. Love and Allan G. K. Eede, at the rate of 16s. per week, for a further period of eight weeks, and that the cases be reviewed at the end of such period.
- (b) THAT, having regard to the total minimum wages paid for a 47-hour week of 31s. 5d. at 17 years and 43s. 5d. at 18 years, plus an average bonus of approximately 15s. per week in each case, under agreements between the Engineering Federation and all trade unions concerned, this Sub-Committee are unanimously of the opinion that the rates of pay at R.E.M.E. should be increased proportionately.

At a subsequent meeting of the "Ad Hoc" Sub-Committee held on 22nd August, 1944, it was reported that the Ministry of Labour had disallowed the applications, as the average earnings were considered sufficient to enable the above youths to be self-supporting, and with regard to Resolution (b) the Ministry had intimated that the wages of employees of the War Department at R.E.M.E. depots are a matter for settlement between the War Office and the Trade Unions concerned, either directly or through the Engineering Trade Joint Council.

It was reported that under M.L. Circular 99/444, dated 2nd August, 1944, it has been decided that the recruitment of boys for training should now normally be limited to those who can be placed in local employment, in view of the fact that the wages paid in industrial establishments and in K.E.M.E., and auxiliary workshops are generally insufficient to provide a reasonable margin over the present cost of lodging accommodation, etc.

# MINISTRY OF EDUCATION CIRCULAR NO. 5, DATED 15.9.44:

Ministry of Education Circular No. 5, regarding Local Administration of Education—Schemes of Divisional Administration, was submitted. (A copy thereof had been duly circulated to each member of the Education Committee.) The circular relates primarily to schemes of Divisional Administration prepared by County Local Education Authorities and Joint Education Boards, but the general principles which it enunciates should be borne in mind by the Councils of Excepted Districts when they prepare their schemes.

## POSTPONEMENT OF THE RAISING OF THE SCHOOL LEAVING AGE:

A letter was submitted from the Hornsey Education Committee stating that at a recent meeting consideration had been given to Ministry of Education Circular No. 1, from which it was noted that the Minister had made an Order delaying the raising of the school-leaving age to 15 years. The Hornsey Committee resolved to record their regret that the Minister had found it necessary to make such an Order; that if the war situation permitted they would welcome the expiry of the Order before 1st April, 1946, and trusted that every effort would be made to prevent its continuance after that date.

The Hornsey Local Education Authority at a subsequent meeting approved a recommendation of their Education Committee that a resolution in similar terms be sent to the Minister of Education and to Local Education Authorities in the Middlesex Area, with a request for their support.

RESOLVED-

THAT the Hendon Education Committee support the resolution of the Hornsey Education Committee as outlined above.

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## 17.—FACTORY-MADE HOUSES—MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR 105/44:

In accordance with the Committee's instructions (Housing 4/9/44—18), the Borough Surveyor submitted a report as to sites available for the erection of temporary factory-made houses, in respect of which a provisional application has been made to the Ministry of Health for an allocation of 500 of the steel type houses. The Committee were informed that the Council has already in its possession land, not included in its scheme for the erection of permanent houses, sufficient to provide for the erection of approximately 300 factory-made houses, and it will therefore be necessary to acquire other land for the remaining 200 houses of this type. The Borough Surveyor submitted a plan showing the land which he suggested should be acquired for the remaining 200 factory-made houses, and for other purposes which the Council have in view as part of its post-war development proposals. # 18.—PROPOSED HOUSING SITE—WISE LANE, MILL HILL:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a letter from the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries stating that the Ministry of Town and Country Planning has been informed that from an agricultural point of view there is no objection to the proposed development of the site at Wise Lane for housing purposes. #### Part I .- Medical Services.

#### 22.—EVACUATION OF EXPECTANT MOTHERS AT THE END OF EIGHT MONTHS.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that this evacuation scheme, which has been in operation for the period of the war in the Metropolitan area, was extended by the Minister of Health on the 8th September last to certain extra-Metropolitan areas, including Hendon. Women desirous of taking advantage of the scheme are required to register at the nearest ante-natal clinic, and arrangements are then made with the London County Council for their evacuation a month before the expected date of confinement, but under certain circumstances the period may be extended to six weeks. Arrangements can also be made in the case of a mother who is unable to find someone to look after her children under five years of age, for such children to be received in residential nurseries in or near the reception area to which the mother is being evacuated. The attention of mothers attending the ante-natal clinics has been drawn to the provisions of this scheme, and arrangements have also been made with the Evacuation Officer to refer applicants to the Public Health Department.

Noted.

#### 23.—EXERCISES FOR EXPECTANT MOTHERS:

A letter was submitted from the Ministry of Health stating that the Minister noted with interest the Council's decision to establish a course of exercises for expectant mothers (P.H. & M.S. 19/6/44-25). In this connection it was pointed out that such exercises should form part of general ante-natal care, and that it is of the first importance that instruction should be carried out by trained physio-therapists.

The proposal previously approved by the Council provided for a member of the Civil Defence First Aid personnel, after suitable training, to be employed under the general supervision of Dr. Watson, the Supervisor of Midwives, at a fee of 10s. 6d. per session, in respect of sessions undertaken outside her periods of Civil Defence duty.

In view of the point raised by the Ministry of Health, that instruction should be carried out by a trained physio-therapist, the Committee

From official records it would appear that during the entertainments season (10th June to 19th August) the "alert" was sounded on 19 occasions while performances were in progress, and 35 events were affected. In addition, on 12 occasions the "alert" was sounded shortly before performances were due to commence, and 18 events were affected. Out of a total of 64 performances, 53 were affected directly or indirectly by "alerts." The "alerts" mentioned relate only to performances where gate-money was charged, including the boxing tournament and swimming gala, and do not include the children's entertainments where no money was taken or records kept of attendances. With regard to the weather, out of 32 days, 20 were fine, 10 were considered very bad and two were showery; 14 performances were cancelled for varying reasons, mainly due to the weather.

1.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £27 15s. 6d. were submitted and approved.

#### 2.—PROPOSED BRITISH RESTAURANT — CRESSINGHAM ROAD:

The Committee gave further consideration as to the desirability of proceeding with the proposed restaurant at Cressingham Road. As previously reported (B.R. 11.9.44/2), the Ministry of Food had stated that they did not feel in a position to refuse the Council the right to go on with the scheme if, in view of the present war situation, there was still a strong desire to do so. A special type hut could not, however, be supplied, and it was understood that in the event of the Council proceeding with the proposal they would require the submission of plans and estimates for a type "A" hut.

After full consideration of the matter, the Committee came to the conclusion that this type of hut would be unsuitable for post-war purposes, and, in view of the present stage of the war,

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the scheme to provide a British restaurant of the type referred to at Cressingham Road be abandoned, and that authority be given for the disposal of the equipment which has now become redundant.

#### 3.-MOBILE MEALS SERVICE:

Further consideration was given to the proposal for the provision of a mobile meals service for the aged and infirm residents of the Borough. The Minister of Health has already intimated that he had no power to approve the proposal, and that he does not consider that he could properly use the proviso to Section 228 (1) of the Local Government Act, 1933, for the purpose of sanctioning any expenditure in connection therewith. The Committee are advised that the W.V.S. could undertake to organise and operate this service, employing the W.V.S. utility van for the purpose, subject to the approval of the Middlesex County Council and an allocation of petrol. This van, however, is not in good mechanical condition, and the service could start only if an alternative means of transport is available.

The Committee are further of opinion that a service of the nature indicated will become increasingly essential during the winter months, and they accordingly

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND — That the Civil Defence Committee be asked whether they could provide a suitable alternative vehicle if the W.V.S. van should break down.

#### 4.—MONTROSE AND GRANVILLE RESTAURANTS—BURGLARIES:

The Chief Officer Meals Service reported that Montrose Restaurant was entered during the nights of 14th-15th September, 21st-22nd September, and the 27th September. The losses of food and equipment as a result of the first two burglaries is estimated at £4 19s. 6d.; no losses occurred on the 27th September, but two windows were broken and the cashier's desk damaged. It was also reported that Granville Restaurant was entered during the week-end of the 23rd-25th September, when the losses were £2 petty eash takings and also an unknown amount of silver from the Red Cross box. These burglaries are being dealt with by the police, and the Ministry of Food has been informed.

#### 5.—HARTLEY RESTAURANT — EVENING OPENING:

It was reported that the cook who had undertaken to supervise at this restaurant during the evenings was no longer able to to do so, in addition to her day work. Arrangements have been made for a cook-supervisor to be appointed, and it may be necessary for her to start at 4.30 p.m. each day, in order to do the preparatory cooking before the restaurant opens. The Chief Officer Meals Service asked for authority to increase the wages of the cook-supervisor, if necessary, from 8s. 6d. for a four-hour shift to 10s. 6d. for a five-hour shift.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the requested authority be given.

The Committee were informed that the provision of a protecting hand-rail in the waiting space leading to the side entrance was essential, and instructions have been given to the Borough Engineer to give the matter his early attention.

#### 6.—FINANCIAL STATEMENT:

The Borough Treasurer submitted a detailed statement of accounts and statistical data for the four weeks ended 23rd September, 1944, in respect of the nine restaurants now in operation in the Borough. During this period the total number of meals sold was 69,159, a weekly average of 17,290. Details are shown in the Appendix to the Report of the Finance and General Purposes Committee.

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# 7.—ST. MICHAEL'S RESTAURANT:

# (a) Financial Position.

In accordance with instructions given by the Committee at their last meeting, the Borough Treasurer submitted a special report on the financial position of the above restaurant, in which it was indicated that from the opening date, the 11th July, 1942, until the 23rd September, 1944, there had been a total deficit of £704.

#### (b) Billeting of Building Repair Workers.

It was reported that the men employed on building repair work ceased to be billeted at this restaurant on Saturday, the 23rd September. An expression of appreciation of the services rendered by the restaurant staff had been received from the men who were billeted at the restaurant, and the Committee have given instructions for a letter of thanks to be addressed to the Manageress.

# 2.—DOLE STREET NURSERY:

It was reported that the repairs to the Dole Street Nursery have now been completed, and the Medical Officer of Health suggested that in view of the gradual increase in the numbers of children attending the nurseries, by reason of the return of mothers with their children, the nursery should be reopened. This will necessitate the return of the staff temporarily transferred to Weston-super-Mare. The Committee are in agreement with the suggestion of the Medical Officer of Health, and have accordingly given instructions for an application to be made to the Ministry of Health for approval to the reopening of the nursery and for the return of the staff from Weston-super-Mare.

#### (c) Vacancies.

With a view to filling the vacancies for probationers, the Committee have authorised the issue of advertisements in the local Press.

## (d) Miss Lutter, Addington House Nursery.

It was reported that Miss Lutter (deputy matron), of the Addington House Nursery, had acted as matron at the nursery from 1st July to 25th September, the interval which

elapsed between the resignation of one matron and the appointment of her successor, thus undertaking increased responsibility and working longer hours of duty. On the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, the Committee agreed to grant Miss Lutter an additional week's holiday this year, and also, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Health, that she be paid at the minimum rate of the matron's scale for the period from 1st July to 25th September, 1944.

#### (e) Termination of Appointments.

The Medical Officer of Health reported that three members of the Day Nursery staff, i.e., a warden and two nursery assistants, who had been transferred to Westonsuper-Mare, left their posts on the 2nd October without first obtaining the sanction of the Medical Officer of Health. One of the nursery assistants proceeded to relatives at Bristol, and communicated with the Medical Officer of Health from there, whilst the warden and the other nursery assistant reported at the Public Health Department on the 3rd October, when they were interviewed by the Medical Officer of Health and suspended from duty pending consideration of the position by this Committee.

The Committee have interviewed the warden and nursery assistant who returned to London, and also considered the letter from the other nursery assistant, and aftervery full consideration of the whole of the circumstances, decided that the services of the warden and nursery assistant who were suspended (whose names are recorded in MS.) be terminated as from the 4th October, and that the services of the other nursery assistant be terminated as from the 2nd October, 1944.

#### 4.—WATLING AVENUE DAY NURSERY:

A letter was submitted from Councillor C. P. Kartriber transmitting a letter received by him from the Watling Community Association with proposals for the temporary use of the Watling Avenue Day Nursery premises for the purposes of the Association. The premises have been ready for occupation for some time, but up to the present the number of applications for admission have not been sufficient to justify the opening of the nursery.

The Committee have given instructions for the views of the Ministry of Health tobe obtained, and in the event of the Ministry agreeing in principle to the proposed user, negotiations will be opened with the Watling Community Association.

#### 6.—DOMESTIC STAFF:

The Committee's attention was drawn to the present arrangements for payment of wages to the domestic staff, and they have made certain suggestions for the consideration of the Borough Treasurer.

#### 1.-FIRST AID REPAIRS TO HOUSES:

To date 76 houses have been destroyed by "fly-bombing" and 5,869 received varying degrees of damage. Of the damaged houses 5,724 have been made wind and weather proof, and of this number 3,410 have received sufficient permanent repairs to make them reasonably comfortable. The total force of building labour engaged on this work is 420. To assist in this work, glazing parties have been formed from personnel of the Rescue Service and equipped with glass-cutting benches. The parties are operating in five roads in the Borough.

#### 2.—FURNITURE REMOVAL:

#### 3.—RELEASE OF MEN FOR BUILDING TRADE WORK:

The Regional Commissioners have decided that all skilled craftsmen in the following categories in excess of the number required to provide one leader and one skilled man for each Heavy Rescue Party are to be released at once from the Rescue Service:

The craftsmen are to be given one week's notice, and during this period granted any leave due to them. The Ministry of Labour and National Service will then proceed to allocate the men in accordance with the needs of the situation, and any men not summoned at the end of their notice are to be retained in the Civil Defence Services on a day-to-day basis. The men will remain subject to recall to the Rescue Service should the necessity arise.

The Committee has reviewed the assistance already being given in connection with repairs to houses within the Borough by skilled operatives in the Rescue Service, and are of the opinion that it would be more desirable that the men should continue to do this work as members of the Rescue Service, thereby remaining available to carry out rescue work should further incidents occur.

The Controller has been directed to convey this view to the Regional Commissioners, and the discharge of skilled men from the Hendon Rescue Service is being deferred while the matter is under consideration.

# 4.—BILLETING OF FIRST-AID REPAIR WORKERS:

The use of St. Michael's Hall. Golders Green, as a hostel for billeting first-aid repair workers ceased on the 23rd September, 1944.

# 5.—COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF CIVIL DEFENCE EQUIPMENT:

Preliminary information concerning arrangements which will be required in connection with the collection and ultimate disposal of Civil Defence equipment now in the hands of Local Authorities has been received from the Minister of Home Security. Local Authorities will be afforded an opportunity to purchase for their peace-time purposes any items of equipment now in their possession for war-time use. Officers of the Council have accordingly been asked to consider whether any of the equipment would be useful in connection with the normal functions of the Council.

• At the request of the Minister, and in view of the delay which will be inevitable in the eventual collection of the equipment by the Ministry, storage arrangements within the Borough are being reviewed, due consideration being given to accommodation now available in requisitioned property which might, in the public interest, have to be released for its primary purpose on the cessation of hostilities. Consideration is also being given to the selection for retention of whole-time Civil Defence personnel capable of dealing with equipment both now and immediately after the war, and for driving vehicles which will be necessary for the transportation of the equipment.

#### 6.—RETENTION OF CIVIL DEFENCE UNIFORMS:

Authority has been received for whole-time Civil Defence personnel leaving the Services on or after the 1st September, 1944, for any reason other than to join H.M. Forces, and who have surrendered all clothing coupons due from them, to retain the following articles of uniform, providing they form part of their issued uniform:—

1 part-worn greatcoat.

1 part-worn battledress blouse or woman's jacket.

1 part-worn pair of trousers or slacks or skirt.

1 part-worn pair of boots or shoes.

1 or 2 part-worn nursing overalls.

1 part-worn wrap-over overall.

Certain coupon equivalent values have been fixed for each of these items of uniform, and any Civil Defence personnel who are in arrear with coupon surrender can either forego the privilege of retaining part or all of their uniform to reduce their coupon debt.

All whole-time personnel may, if they so desire, retain Civil Defence armlets, berets, felt hats or peaked caps, war service chevrons and wound stripes, shoulder titles, local markings, badges of rank, etc., respirator spectacles, artificial dentures and surgical boots or appliances. In all cases, steel helmets, Service or C.D. respirators, eye-shields, hand-lamps, whistles, anti-gas clothing, etc., must be returned.

#### 7.—FREE HOLIDAY FARES:

Annual leave for whole-time Civil Defence personnel was suspended between the 18th of June and 28th of July, 1944, due to the "fly-bomb" attacks. A fortnight after the resumption of leave the Minister of Home Security authorised the reinstitution of the Free Holiday Fares Scheme, under which one free-travel warrant per annum could be granted to whole-time personnel proceeding on leave for a period of three days or more, a privilege which was first granted from July, 1941, until March, 1942, in areas which had been subjected to heavy raiding.

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Personnel who proceeded on leave during the fourteen days prior to 11th August, 1944, were not eligible to benefit by the scheme, and have expressed much disappointment at being denied such a valued concession. Representations have been made by the Middlesex County Council on behalf of the Authorities within Group 6, but the Minister has decided that the Free Holiday Fares Scheme could not take effect before the date of the issue of his circular, i.e., 11th August, 1944.

The Committee consider that the personnel affected are equally deserving of the concession. The Controller has been instructed (1) to report on the number of personnel concerned, and the amount which would be involved in meeting their claims for reimbursement of railway fares incurred by them, and (2) to press the Minister of Home Security to give further consideration to this matter.

#### 7.—BATTLE OF BRITAIN SUNDAY:

Personnel of the Hendon Civil Defence Services, supported by detachments from the Police, N.F.S., British Red Cross and St. John Ambulance Brigade, attended a Drumhead Church Service and Parade held at the Hendon Aerodrome on Sunday, 17th September, 1944, in commemoration of the culminating engagement in the Battle of Britain.

#### 8.—HENDON COTTAGE HOSPITAL BED FUND:

The Committee has noted with great satisfaction that, as a result of a collection made in the Wardens' Organisation, a cheque for £185 has been presented to His Worship the Mayor as a contribution to the Fund being raised by him for the endowment of a bed in the Hendon Cottage Hospital.

#### 9.—RESCUE SERVICE:

In addition to the carrying out of repairs to houses (see item 1 above), personnel of the Rescue Service have been engaged on the following work:—

Repairs to detector boards throughout the district.

Construction of 73 Incident Officers' tripods.

Building sand-pit, Hyde Cottage Day Nursery.

Removals of homes from store for rehousing.

Delivering blankets, beds, etc., and loaned furniture from 240, Hendon Way.

Salvage of coal from blitzed properties.

Salvage of timber from blitzed properties.

Repairs to furniture stores.

Repairs to I/B shed, Farm Road.

Repairs to black-out, "E" Depot (damage by Hamilton Road bomb).

Redecorating lavatories, "E" Depot.

Unloading static water-tanks for wheelbarrow pumps.

Levelling and fitting up static tanks.

The Committee has noted with interest that further consignments of toys made by personnel of the Rescue Service in their leisure time have been delivered to the Day Nurseries at York Park, Clitterhouse, Hyde School, Addington House and Hyde Cottage, and that a considerable number of broken toys have also been collected for repair. In addition, the personnel have undertaken the repair of furniture at the various Day Nurseries.

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#### 10.—DANGEROUS STRUCTURES:

Complaints have been received from the police regarding children playing adjacent to dangerous structures on sites of air-raid incidents. All dangerous parts of buildings adjacent to public footways have been pulled down. In other cases "Dangerous Building" notices have been posted, and it is feared that little else can be done until it is possible to carry out demolition and clearance works.

#### 13.—WARDENS' SERVICE:

In response to an appeal from Group 6 for volunteers to carry out Wardens' duties in Group 12, Wardens La Salle and Evans were transferred for duty at the Sompting Refugee Camp between the 1st July and 16th September. A letter from the Senior Regional Officer of the South Eastern Region reads:—

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"Now that the Wardens from London have returned from the Sompting Refugee Camp, I would like to place on record the appreciation of the Commandant of the Camp (Colonel Ford), and, in fact, every officer and man connected with the Camp, for all the grand work these Wardens have undertaken. Although there was no need for their services in the original capacity for which they were loaned, they have made themselves extremely helpful in Civil Defence matters, and indeed in many other matters, and by their friendly and co-operative attitude have established themselves in the affections of everybody who was connected with the Camp.

"I do not know whether it is possible for you to pass on a word of praise to them, but if it could be done I should be grateful, as it is thoroughly deserved. I myself did see them before their departure, and informed them, on behalf of the Regional Commissioner, how appreciative he was for all they had done during their stay there."

The Regional Commissioners have also expressed their gratification that the volunteers earned this high praise, and upheld among strangers the high traditions of the London Wardens' Service.

#### 14.—FIRE PREVENTION:

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As a result of proceedings instituted by the Council, Mrs. Fromhold was fined £10 10s., with £4 4s. costs, for failure to carry out duties under the Fire Guard (Local Authority Services) Order, 1943. The Committee has authorised the institution of proceedings in a further two cases for failure to perform Fire Guard duties, and one case of non-compliance with a notice served under the Fire Guard (Business and Government Premises) Order, 1943.

Preliminary instructions have been received in regard to the discharge of officers of the Fire Guard Service by Local Authorities whose areas have been "deprescribed," or in which there has been complete relaxation of Fire Guard duties. The Borough of Hendon, however, is not so far affected.

In all, 120 static water-tanks for use in connection with wheelbarrow-pumps have been sited in various parts of the Borough. The filling of these tanks with water has been undertaken by the N.F.S.

During the months of August and September 55 first inspections of lofts in houses in the Borough were undertaken by personnel of the N.F.S. Second inspections were necessary in 11 cases and a third inspection in one case.

At the request of the Regional Commissioners, amended schemes for fire prevention have been submitted in respect of seven schools in the Borough and the Council's Depot at Hendon Way.

The Regional Commissioners have designated the Hendon Council as the "appropriate authority" under the Fire Guard (Business and Government Premises) Order, 1943, in respect of the Woodfield Nursery, Cool Oak Lane, and the Fortune British Restaurant.

Fire Prevention arrangements at various premises within the Borough submitted by 18 applicants have been approved.

A ruling has been received from the Regional Commissioners that Fire Guards operating at business premises, not able to take advantage of the daytime relaxation by reason of the distance of their residence from their place of employment, and who remain on the business premises from the time of ceasing work until the time they are required to commence their night duties, may be regarded as being on duty from the time of cessation of work when computing rates of subsistence allowances. The ruling does not apply to Sundays or half-holidays. Fire Guards taking advantage of the relaxation to proceed home during the interval between the cessation of work and the commencement of Fire Guard duties may apply to their employers for a reimbursement of any reasonable additional travelling expenses incurred thereby.

#### 15.—AIR RAID SHELTERS:

MIDDLESEX WHITLEY COUNCIL FOR LOCAL AUTHORITIES ADMINISTRATIVE, TECHNICAL AND CLERICAL SERVICES — AMENDMENT OF CONSTITUTION,

Pursuant to the reference from the Finance and General Purposes Committee (18.9.44—30), the Joint Committee considered a letter from the Joint Secretaries (Employers' and Staffs') of the Middlesex Whitley Council on the subject of the proposed amendment of the Constitution of Provincial

After protracted negotiations, the National Joint Council for Local Authorities' Administrative, Professional, Technical and Clerical Services has been reconstituted—under the independent chairman-ship of Sir Horace Wilson, appointed by the Minister of Health—by the inclusion therein of representatives of the County Councils' Association, Association of Municipal Corporations, Urban District Councils' Association, Rural District Councils' Association, and the Metropolitan Boroughs Standing Joint Committee.

Upon the reconstitution, the National Council considered the terms of the Constitution of the Provincial Councils, and, with the view to securing uniformity consequent upon the revised functions of the National Council, a Model Form of Constitution was prepared and submitted to the Provincial Councils, with a recommendation that those Councils should adopt such model, and amend their existing constitution so as to conform therewith.

Under the previous Constitution of Joint Provincial Councils they were able to take executive action upon any of the matters coming within the ambit of their functions. The amended Constitution, however, provides that Provincial Councils shall not take any executive action upon any of the matters referred to in sub-clause 12 (b) (1)—which relates to the consideration of hours, salaries and service conditions, etc.—unless and until the approval of the National Council has been obtained, and such approval may be given with or without modification or amendment. This amendment is designed to secure throughout the Provincial Councils a reasonable measure of consistency.

. The Employers' Representatives on the Middlesex Provincial Council, after lengthy consideration of the matter, prepared an amended draft Constitution, but this was unacceptable to the Staffs' Representatives on the Joint Council in consequence of the omission of the model clause 9 (ii), which precludes executive action in relation to consideration of hours, salaries and service conditions, etc., without reference to and approval by the National Joint Council. In the view of the Employers' Representatives, the proposed amendment in the constitution should first be approved, or otherwise, by the constituent employing authorities, and the Council were asked to express their opinion whether, with a view to obtaining approval of the draft Constitution, the model clause should be included, and the present right to consider salaries, hours and all other conditions of service without supervision by the National Council, be resultantly abandoned.

The Model Constitution prepared by the National Joint Council has been approved by the Local Authority Associations, and has already been accepted by 13 of the Provincial Councils in the country.

The Joint Committee are unanimously of opinion that the revised model form of Constitution prepared by the National Whitley Council should be adopted for the Middlesex Provincial Council, and they recommend accordingly.

### 22.—OFFICERS' CAR MILEAGE ALLOWANCES:

In connection with the scale of allowances made to officers using private cars on Council business, the Borough Treasurer reported that representations had been made that the present scale is inadequate, particularly on the grounds that, whilst the present scale is applicable to all cars irrespective of horse-power, cars of higher horse-power rating are more costly to run than those of lower rating. The following scales are at present in operation:—

### General Scale -

(All outgoings, including cost of petrol, paid by owner.)

### Special Scale -

Fixed annual sum (equal to cost of Road Fund licence and normal insurance), plus a mileage allowance of 2d. per mile to cover cost of petrol, running repairs, etc. The allowance of 2d. per mile is subject to adjustment to  $3\frac{1}{2}$ d. per mile if less than 3,000 miles are run in a period of twelve months.

It is suggested that the present "General Scale" be amended as indicated below, the "Special Scale" to remain unaffected for those persons who chose to remain on that scale:—

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the amended "General Scale" be approved, with effect from the 1st October, 1944, subject to the question of car allowances being reviewed, if necessary, when the basic petrol rationing scheme is restored.

### 23.—COST OF MAINTENANCE OF PATIENTS IN ISOLATION HOSPITAL:

In connection with the reciprocal arrangements made some time ago with the Willesden Borough Council for the treatment of cases of infectious disease, the Borough Treasurer reported that the Willesden Town Council had now intimated that they propose to increase their charge to 15s. per patient per day (plus ambulance charges and extraordinary expenses, if any). The charge made for treatment of outside authorities' patients and special cases in the Hendon Islation Hospital is at present 12s. per patient per day. The latest audited accounts of the Isolation Hospital, however, show the net cost per patient per day as 14s. 114d.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council's charge be amended to 15s. per patient per day (plus ambulance charges and extraordinary expenses, if any), with effect from the 1st October, 1944.

### 24.—THE FOOD CONTROL COMMITTEES (CONSTITUTION) ORDER, 1943:

Under the provisions of the Food Control Committees (Constitution) Order, 1943, made by the Minister of Food, the Council are required to nominate persons to serve on the new Food Control Committee, which will operate as from the 1st January next. The names of the persons proposed to be nominated are to be forwarded to the Ministry of Food by the 31st October, and the Council shall before the 31st December next

appoint as members of the Committee such persons included in the list as are approved by the Minister. Under the provisions of the above Order the Committee shall consist of five trade members, one trade (employee) member, and not less than 10 nor more than 12 consumer members, at the discretion of the appointing authority. The trade members shall consist of one co-operative member, one grocer member and one butcher member, and two unclassified members. Of the consumer members, one must be a representative of trade unions, and at least two shall be women. With regard to the trade (employee) member, employees of co-operative societies and of multiple shops are equally eligible with employees in other food shops for this seat.

It was reported that all the present members of the existing Food Control Committee were eligible for appointment, and were willing to serve on the Committee for the ensuing year, with the exception of Mrs. Holt, who has intimated that she is unable to serve on the Committee. It is also necessary to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mr. H. F. Wheeler, trade (employee) representative, reported at the last meeting (F. & G.P.C. 18.9.44—31).

### DEATH OF MR. A. E. HARDING, PRINCIPAL ASSISTANT TO THE TOWN CLERK:

His Worship the Mayor referred to the death of Mr. A. E. Harding, Principal Assistant to the Town Clerk, and said:

"As you all know, the Council have recently suffered the loss of a very able and valued officer in the person of Mr. A. E. Harding, whose death, after a long and painful illness borne with great courage and fortitude, occurred on the 10th instant. Mr. Harding had served the Council for a little over 37 years, and I feel that this is a fitting opportunity for me, in your name, to pay tribute to his memory.

"At the age of fifteen Mr. Harding entered the service of the Council as a junior in the Education Department, where he rose to the position of Chief Clerk. In June, 1828, he was appointed to the Town Clerk's department, and held the position of Principal Assistant. He also acted as secretary to successive Mayors since the incorporation of the Borough. On the outbreak of war he was appointed Chief Billeting Officer, and subsequently Rehousing Officer, and he carried out the onerous duties of these offices under the most trying and difficult conditions in a manner which brought great credit upon himself and the Borough he so loyally served.

"Mr. Harding was a highly efficient and conscientions officer, and everything he undertook he carried through with that high standard of efficiency we knew we could expect from him, and which we all admired. He was a well-known and popular personality both inside and outside the Town Hall. His brusque and forthright manner masked a generous and deeply sympathetic disposition, known only to those most closely associated with him. In addition to the duties he carried out in his official capacity, Mr. Harding also acted as Clerk to the Trustees of the Nicholi's and Daniel's Charities, and honorary clerk to the Trustees of the Mrs. Burgess' Fund for Children. Recently he was elected to the Board of Governors of the Hendon Cottage Hospital.

"By the death of Mr. Harding we mourn the loss of a highly esteemed officer, whom we shall remember with feelings of great affection, and to Mrs. Harding and her daughter we extend our heartfelt sympathy in their great sorrow."

The Town Clerk submitted letters he had received from Sir Reginald Blair, M.P., expressing his sympathy to all those associated with Mr. Harding, and also from the Minister Plenipotentiary of the Belgian Government, expressing appreciation of Mr. Harding's work in connection with the Belgian refugees in the Borough, and conveying his sincere sympathy and that of his compatriots in the Hendon district.

The Town Clerk, on behalf of his fellow officials and himself, paid a tribute to the memory of Mr. Harding, with whom he had been closely associated for many years, and expressed his full appreciation of Mr. Harding's innumerable good qualities, his unswerving loyalty and unfailing devotion to duty.

As a tribute to the memory of Mr. Harding, His Worship the Mayor and others present at the meeting stood for a brief period in silence.
