

#### 1.-ANNUAL REPORTS OF HEAD TEACHERS:

The Head Teachers of the Dollis Junior and Infants', Garden Suburb Infants', Garden Suburb Junior, Edgware Junior and Infants', and Frith Manor Schools presented their Annual Reports for the consideration of the Sub-Committee. Arising out of the Reports, it was

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT all Head Teachers be requested to confer with their teaching staffs and to submit their views upon (i) the policy of the Middlesex County Council not to award prizes in Primary Schools, and (ii) the desirability of awarding certificates of merit to Primary School children in lieu of prizes.

#### 2.—ENTRANCE EXAMINATION FOR ADMISSION TO GRAMMAR SCHOOLS:

Letters were submitted from the Head Teachers of the St. Agnes' R.C. and the St. Mary's R.C. Schools with regard to two boys who were not offered places in R.C. Grammar Schools in 1947. The Borough Education Officer reported upon the procedure laid down by the County Council for the selection of candidates for admission to Grammar Schools with particular reference to that year.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the above-named Head Teachers be informed that, as all the available places for boys in Hendon Crammar Schools were filled by candidates with a mark higher than that prescribed by the County Regulations as qualifying, no "border-line" cases were considered by the Special Panel so far as boys were concerned.

## 3.—HYDE SCHOOL DAY NURSERY:

A letter was submitted from the Ministry of Education concerning the future organisation of the Day Nurseries in the Hendon area. The Minister states that in his opinion, the time has now come when the accommodation at The Hyde Infant School at present used as a Day Nursery under t'e Public Health authority should revert to school use.

## 4-BELL LANE SENIOR AND JUNIOR SCHOOL-PIANO:

The Sub-Committee at its meeting on 24th February, 1948, gave consideration to a request from the Head Teacher of the Bell Lane Mixed School for the purchase of a new school piano and issued instructions for a report to be submitted by Messrs. Kirby's on the condition of the existing piano. The Sub-Committee gave consideration to Messrs. Kirby's report, and it was

THAT approval be given to the overhaul of the school piano at the Bell Lane Mixed School at an estimated cost of £21 3s. 0d.

## 5.—STAFFING ESTABLISHMENT—QUOTA OF WOMEN TEACHERS:

The Sub-Committee gave consideration to a circular letter from the Ministry of Education drawing attention to the serious shortage of women teachers in certain areas of the country and explaining that, in order to achieve a more satisfactory distribution of women teachers, it has become necessary to fix a maximum establishment of full-time women teachers in each area. The establishment fixed for Hendon is 354 which represents a reduction of 8 full-time women teachers employed in Primary and Secondary Schools on 1st May, 1948. The effect of the establishment now imposed will be that with the exception of specialist teachers no more women teachers can be appointed until the number of women teachers is reduced to below the quota level. Vacancies for specialist teachers can only be filled henceforth by obtaining the specific approval of H.M. Inspector. Temporary teachers are excluded from the establishment figure. **Noted.**

1.—EDGWARE JUNIOR AND INFANTS' SCHOOL—PROVISION OF CHAIN LINK FENCING:

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the Borough Engineer be authorised to arrange for supplying and fixing chain link fencing six feet high along the playground boundary running parallel with the Edgware Road at an estimated cost of £75.

2.—BARNFIELD JUNIOR SCHOOL—PROPOSED SHELTER IN PLAYGROUND:

Pursuant to Item 7 (b) in the Report of this Sub-Committee, dated 24/2/48, the Borough Engineer submitted a plan for the erection of a lean-to-shed in the playground at this school at an estimated cost of £80.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (b) THAT the Borough Engineer be instructed to submit a report and estimate of cost for the provision of shelters in the playgrounds of all County Schools in the Borough where no such provision at present exists.
- 3.—BURNT OAK PRIMARY SCHOOL—PROPOSED DINING BOOM AND SCULLERY:

The Borough Engineer reported on a letter from the Middlesex Education Committee and plans for the erection of a dining room and scullery in the playground at The Committee were informed that the proposals will seriously restrict the area of playground space and will obliterate the existing playshed.

Part of this playshed can be retained if the dining room is sited 18" nearer the existing buildings and if the bay for cloaks is deleted. The Borough Engineer recommends that the County Committee be informed accordingly. Noted and approved.

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## 4.-ORANGE HILL GIRLS' SECONDARY SCHOOL:

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the Borough Engineer be authorised to arrange for the provision of light fencing above the boundary wall to the east and south sides of the girls' playground at this school, as specified in his report, at an estimated cost of £30.

### 5.-BELL LANE PRIMARY SCHOOL:

## (a) Provision of Wire Netting to Playground:

The Borough Engineer reported on a request for the provision of chain link fencing 10 feet high to the playground fronting Bell Lane, the estimated cost of which would be £140.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

#### (b) Removal of Blast Wall:

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT authority be given for the Borough Engineer to arrange for the removal of the blast wall mentioned and making good at an estimated cost of £20.

#### 6.-CHILDS HILL SCHOOL:

#### (a) Lavatory Accommodation and Fuel Stores:

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT authority be given for the Borough Engineer to arrange for the following works to be carried out at this school:—

Provision of two higher W.C. pans in each of the boys' and girls' lavatories. Estimated cost £40.

Provision of a fuel store in each playground at a total estimated cost of £50.

#### (b) Provision for Cricket in Playground:

Consideration was given to a request from the Headmaster for the fixing of wire netting to the windows on the ground floor of the main building and the prefabricated hut in the boys' playground in order to allow cricket to be played without damage to such windows.

The Borough Engineer pointed out that if wire netting is fixed to the windows of the hut it will prevent these windows being opened and suggested that the existing cricket net be repaired and a fifteen feet extension added thereto.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

THAT the suggestion of the Borough Engineer be approved.

## 7.-THE BURROUGHS PLAYING FIELD-RESURFACING OF NETBALL COURT:

Works in connection with the resurfacing of the netball court were put in hand in January, but had to be stopped as the Ministry of Education said that the work must await the award of a starting date.

Notification has now been received that the Ministry has agreed that a starting date is not required, and the Contractors have been notified to proceed with the work immediately. **Noted.** 

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## 8.—CRESSINGHAM ROAD PLAYING FIELD:

Pursuant to Item 3 (b) in the Report of this Sub-Committee, dated 24/2/48, the Committee were informed that work in connection with this contract has proceeded satisfactorily and will be completed by the middle of the present month.

The Borough Engineer wrote to the County Education Officer on 27th February, 1948, explaining why this contract had been proceeded with and the facts have been sent to the Ministry of Education for approval. At date, no reply has been received from the Ministry.

The work of sowing the grass seed will be undertaken by the Parks Department in the autumn, provided approval to the completion of the scheme is received from the County Council in time. It is essential that the fencing be provided to the Cressingham Road frontage before any seeding is undertaken. **Noted.** 

## 9.—REPAIRS TO SCHOOL PLAYGROUNDS:

The Borough Engineer reported that urgent repairs were required to the playgrounds in certain schools.

## 3.—STAFFING ESTABLISHMENT—QUOTA OF WOMEN TEACHERS:

It was reported that a letter had been received from the Chief Education Officer drawing attention to a recent communication from the Ministry of Education in which it was stated that owing to the present serious shortage of women teachers it had been decided as a temporary emergency measure to fix a maximum establishment of women teachers for each Local Education Authority. The maximum establishment fixed for Middlesex as a whole is 5,596 full-time women teachers and the allotment for Hendon is 354.

The number of women teachers at present employed in Hendon exceeds this quota by 8. It will therefore be necessary as vacancies arise to adjust the balance by the appointment of assistant masters. The Ministry have also decided that where the establishment of women teachers exceeds the quota, vacancies for specialist women teachers may only be filled provided sanction is first obtained from H.M. Inspector. Noted.

1.-NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946:

The Town Clerk reported that he had received a request from the Clerk of the County Council for a statement of properties and liabilities which would be transferred to the County Council in respect of functions to be transferred under the Act. informed the Committee of the effect of Regulations made by the Minister under Section 69 of the Act and reported that in order to protect the Council's interests within the time prescribed by such Regulations, he had made representations to the Minister that it was inexpedient that the following properties should be transferred:-

Health Centre adjoining Town Hall, The Burroughs, N.W.4-Site and buildings, Health Centre, Mill Hill-Site.

Day Nursery, York Road, N.W. 9 .- Site.

Day Nursery, Claremont Road, N.W. 2-Site.

He added that he had informed the County Council of the fact that representations had been made, and that any continued use of these sites and buildings should be the subject of agreement between the County Council and this Authority.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the action taken be confirmed.

### (e) Area Medical Officers.

The Town Clerk reported that since the last meeting of the Committee further discussions had taken place with the County Council on the subject of the status of the Medical Officer of Health and the position of certain other members of the staff who were affected by the transfer of functions. The Clerk of the County Council had asked that replies to certain specific questions should be given not later than May 21st, and the Town Clerk informed the Committee that after consulting His Worship the Mayor and the Chairman of the Committee, and having ascertained the views of the Medical Officer of Health and the Borough Treasurer, the following replies had been given:-

- 1. That the Council agree to the Medical Officer of Health entering the service of the County Council as Area Medical Officer on the basis that at least 60% of his time will be spent on County Council duties, including, where necessary, the discharge of County health functions in parts of the area outside the Borough.
- 2. That any decision as to the method of payment of the Medical Officer of Health be deferred for further consideration having regard to the provisions of the National Health Service (Superannuation Regulations) 1947.
- 3. That the Medical Officer of Health agrees with these views.
- 4. That the Council wish to utilise for as long as necessary after the 5th July, 1948, the services of the Senior Medical Officer (Dr. Bodkin) in a part-time capacity.
- 5. That the Council wish similarly to utilise the services of the Chief Clerk of the Public Health Department (Mr. Knudsen) in a part-time capacity for as long as
- 6. That arrangements for re-allocation of the work of officers engaged partly on National Health Service Act functions, partly on School Health Service functions and partly on functions not to be transferred will be made to ensure that there will be no difficulty in transferring staff in accordance with the provisions of the Act.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken be confirmed.

## 2.—"HEALTH OF THE PEOPLE" EXHIBITION:

A letter was submitted by the Town Clerk from the Association of Municipal Corporations drawing attention to the Exhibition arranged by the Central Office of Information to celebrate the centenary of Public Health. The Exhibition is open until June 5th in London and the Association express the hope that the Council will support the Exhibition by the attendance of their members. Noted.

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Recommend Finance and Purposes C 3\_DAY NURSERIES—ADDITIONAL FACILITIES:

The Town Clerk referred to the recommendations made by the Committee at the last meeting on the subject of additional Day Nursery facilities, and reminded the Committee that the recommendation regarding the provision of a new Day Nursery in New Brent Street at an estimated cost of £9,000 had been referred back by the Council for further consideration.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That no further action be taken with regard to the proposal for a new Day Nursery in New Brent Street.

4-MIDWIVES ACT, 1936-FEES OF MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS CALLED IN BY MIDWIVES:

The Town Clerk submitted Ministry of Health Circular No. 51/48 and Regulations made by the Minister of Health revising the fees payable to medical practitioners called in by midwives. The revision results in an increase of approximately 50%, in most cases, over the present scale which was prescribed in 1940. The Ministry asked that the revised scale should be brought to the notice of local doctors, and an appropriate communication has been sent to them by the Medical Officer of Health in consultation with the Borough Treasurer.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND...That the Borough Treasurer be authorised to pay fees in accordance with the revised scales.

5-PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936-NURSING HOMES:

The Medical Officer of Health submitted applications for exemption from registration in respect of the following Nursing Homes and he informed the Committee of the result of the inspections which he had made:--

- (ii) in the event of the Ministry of Transport not approving the provision of the pedestrian crossing, application be made for permission to erect appropriate notice boards indicating the presence of the Crippleage.

#### (b) Propaganda.

A letter was submitted from the London Council for the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents asking for the Committee's observations on the Society's propaganda material, particularly posters.

The Sub-Committee instructed the Campaign Organiser to inform the London Council for the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents that it considers that there is a growing demand for posters larger than those at present issued and having appeal to motorists. It is felt that these posters will be particularly valuable for display in car parks.

#### (c) Application for Co-option.

It was reported that the Middlesex County Automobile Club had applied for co-option to the Sub-Committee and the Campaign Organiser was instructed to inform the Honorary Secretary that the matter would receive consideration at the next meeting of the Sub-Committee and the Town Clerk was asked to report on the constitution of the Sub-Committee.

#### (d) Conferences.

The Chairman and Organiser submitted a joint report on the Delegate Conference for Road Safety Committees convened by the Pedestrians' Association and held at Caxton Hall, Westminster on the 10th April.

The Campaign Organiser submitted a report of the 5th Conference of Road Safety Organisers held at Acton Town Hall on the 10th May.

#### (e) Barnet Way.

It was reported that a complaint had been received from a parent living in Ellesmere Avenue regarding the danger to which children are exposed in crossing Barnet Way on their way to and from school.

It was reported that the Metropolitan Police had no recommendation to make except that children be urged to use the pedestrian crossing at Northway Circus (Apex Corner).

The Campaign Organiser reported that he had written to the schools concerned asking the Head Teachers to urge the children to use the pedestrian crossings and that he had suggested to the complainant that parents of children concerned might take turns in escorting 'he children across the Barnet Way.

The Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND—That no further action be taken in this matter.

#### (f) Display at Odeon Cinema.

It was reported that, at the invitation of the Manager, the Road Safety display was retained for a further week.

#### (8) Children's Cinema Club.

It was reported that the Canine Defence League gave a Road Safety demonstration to children at the Ambassador Cinema, Hendon Central on the morning of the 1st May.

### (h) Stag House Civic Restaurant.

It was reported that the Special (Civic Restaurants) Committee had fixed a fee of ten guineas in respect of the use of the Stag House Civic Restaurant for the purpose of an exhibition to be held in July.

#### (I) Parks.

The Sub-Committee

RESOLVED-That the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee be requested to grant the following facilities in the parks indicated during Safety Week:-

Conditional upon the above mentioned facilities being granted, the Sub-Committee authorised the Campaign Organiser to engage the services of Mr. Archie Potter for a series of Children's Entertainments incorporating Road Safety propaganda in the Parks indicated during Safety Week, and

RECOMMEND-That their action be approved.

#### (i) Loudspeaker Van.

The Sub-Committee approved the hiring of a Loudspeaker Van for two hours a day from the 19th to the 24th July inclusive at a cost of £7 10s. 0d., and

RECOMMEND-That their action be approved.

#### (k) Films

The Campaign Organiser reported on films to be hired in connection with the Outdoor Mobile Cinema Van. Noted.

#### (I) Photograph Exhibition.

The Sub-Committee approved the hiring of the new Photographic Exhibition from the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents at an inclusive charge of £45 for a fortnight, and

RECOMMEND-That their action be approved.

#### (m) Hendon Way.

It was reported that a young child attending Wessex Gardens School had been involved in a fatal accident shortly after 2 p.m. on the 6th May on the Hendon Way near the junction of Wessex Gardens. A Police Officer is on duty on the Hendon Way near the entrance to the School each day to see the children across the road, but his tour of duty terminates at 2 p.m. and it would be extremely difficult to arrange for a further officer to take over his duties at that time. The Campaign Organiser reported the observations of the Head Teachers of Wessex Garden Schools on traffic conditions generally at this point.

It was pointed out that Wessex Gardens was the only Council School in the Borough situated on a de-restricted road.

The Sub-Committee, having considered this matter,

#### PECOMMEND

- (i) That the London Transport Executive be requested to re-site the 'bus stops in the vicinity of Wessex Gardens in order that northbound 'buses stop on the north side of the junction with Wessex Gardens.
- (ii) That the Education Committee be asked to consider the appointment of an Adult Patrol at this junction in order that children arriving late for school will be escorted across the road.
- (iii) That the Ministry of Transport be asked to authorise more conspicuous signs to replace the existing school signs.
- (iv) That the Ministry of Transport be requested to impose a 30 m.p.h. speed limit on Hendon Way from its junction with Finchley Road to the existing restricted section beginning near Park Road.
- (v) That dependent on the speed limit being introduced, application be made for a pedestrian crossing to be laid down across Hendon Way in the violinity of Wessex Gardens School.

#### (3) ROAD ACCIDENTS:

The Borough Surveyor submitted details of road accidents during the month of Murch, together with a summary of road accidents since April, 1946.

Of the total of 974 casualties since April, 1946, 27 adults and 3 children were killed, 95 adults and 22 children were seriously injured and 663 adults and 164 children were slightly injured.

In March, 1 adult was killed, 5 adults were seriously injured and 27 adults and 10 children were slightly injured.

With reference to paragraph 2 (m)—Hendon Way—the Town Clerk reported the receipt of a petition signed by 946 parents of children attending Wessex Gardens School and residents in the vicinity, urging that adequate provision should be made immediately for the safety of the children.

The petitioners pointed out that the crossing is used each school day by 200 to 300 children from 5 to 12 years of age, and by parties of children going to games, swimming and organised school outings during school hours (when the crossing is without police protection), and put forward a number of suggestions, some of which had been considered by the Sub-Committee.

The Committee decided to refer to the Education Committee a suggestion put forward by certain petitioners that a school 'bus should be provided for children attending Wessex Gardens School and living east of Golders Green Road.

In supplement and variation of the recommendations of the Sub-Committee the Committee

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That no action be taken towards the appointment of an Adult Patrol at this junction, but that the Police be urged to arrange for a Police Officer to be on duty for a quarter of an hour after the opening of the school each morning and afternoon.
- (2) That as a matter of long term policy the Ministry of Transport be asked to approve the provision of a subway under Hendon Way at this point.

#### **Adoption of Report:**

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the report of the Sub-Committee, as amended, be approved and adopted.

#### (b) Constitution of Sub-Committee.

The Committee have duly **noted** the report submitted by the Town Clerk on the constitution of the Sub-Committee.

#### 3.—STREET TRADING:

### (a) Resolution from the Central Hendon Chamber of Commerce.

The Town Clerk submitted a resolution passed by the Committee of the Central Hendon Chamber of Commerce strongly deprecating the use of barrows and stalls for street trading, and requesting the Council to take steps to stop this practice, which is described as a nuisance and unfair opposition to rate-paying traders.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Chamber of Commerce be informed that the Council must consider each application for a street trading licence on its merits, and that only a small number of traders have been licensed to trade in Central Hendon.

#### (c) Watling Avenue.

The Town Clerk reminded the Committee that as part of the re-arrangement of street trading sites in Watling Avenue with the object of relieving congestion, the site of one trader, who is licensed to sell fish and poultry, was changed from a point outside No. 11 to a point outside No. 17.

He submitted a complaint received from the occupiers of No. 15, Watling Avenue that the presence of this stall outside their shop was likely adversely to affect their trade since their stocks consist of lingerie, etc., and requesting that the stall might be changed to one whose type of business is not detrimental to their own.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, subject to the concurrence of the traders concerned and the licensees, the licences issued to Mr. F. Haslam and Mr. R. E. Mulcare be varied to permit Mr. Mulcare to sell vegetables and fruit outside No. 17 and Mr. Haslam to sell fish and poultry outside No. 9.

### (d) Alleged Transfer of Licence.

At their meeting on the 5th April, 1948 (Hi.C., 1/3/48-5 (b)) the Council disapproved an application from Mr. W. Laverack, who is licensed to trade outside No. 77, Watling Avenue, for the transfer of his licence to Mr. A. Drew.

The Committee were informed that it now appears that Mr. Drew is trading on the site for which Mr. Laverack is licensed. The Committee instructed the Town Clerk to report on certain legal aspects of this matter, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to ascertain from Mr. Laverack in what circumstances the site for which he is licensed is being occupied by Mr. Drew.

### (e) Warning Letters.

### 4.—'BUS STOPPING PLACES:

W. Edwards

Armitage Road

### (a) Reply from London Transport Executive.

The Town Clerk reported that in accordance with the Committee's instructions (Hi.C., 1/3/48-4) representations were made to the London Transport Executive for the reinstatement of the 'bus stops in Edgwarebury Lane (near Station Road). Hale Lane (near the Civic Restaurant) and Station Road, Edgware (near the Parish Church).

A reply has been received stating that the distances between the existing stops are such that the provision of intermediate stops at these points cannot be justified at the present time. In particular, the Parish Church is in close proximity to the Station Road/High Street junction where the stops are sited in what is considered to be the state the stops in question. Noted.

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#### (b) Finchley Road.

The Town Clerk submitted a complaint which Councillor Rowley had received from a resident that two 'bus stops on Finchley Road (one at each side of the road) between St. George's Road and Golders Green Road were removed during the war, and that the remaining stops are badly spaced, the Hoop Lane stop for north-bound 'buses being comparatively near the Station and the St. George's Road stop a considerable distance away.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND--That no action be taken in this matter.

#### 5.—PRIVATE STREET WORKS:

#### (a) Kenilworth Road.

As instructed the Town Clerk submitted a report on certain legal aspects of the question of making up the unmade portion of Kenilworth Road, Edgware.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare plans and estimates for the making up of the unmade portion of Kenilworth Road, Edgware, under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, in two portions, viz., the present built-up section and the section still to be developed.

#### (b) The Fairway and Fernside Avenue.

The Committee gave further consideration to their recommendation in regard to the Fairway and Fernside Avenue which was referred back by the Council at its meeting on the 5th April, 1948, and received a joint report of the Borough Treasurer and Borough Surveyor on this matter.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no contribution be made under Section 81 of the Public Health Act, 1925, towards the cost of private street works in these roads.

#### (c) Application for Loan Consent.

The Town Clerk reported that an Engineering Inspector of the Ministry of Health visited Hendon on the 6th May for the purpose of inspecting the 18 roads (including those on the Railway Estate) in respect of which application has been made for loan consent for private street works. The Ministry's decision on the application is awaited.

### 6.—HIGHWOOD GROVE AND HALEGROVE GARDENS:

The Town Clerk reported that in pursuance of the Council's instructions (Hi.C., 1/3/48—10) he had informed the 136 residents in Highwood Grove, Halegrove Gardens, Maxwelton Close and Maxwelton Avenue (northern portion) of the proposal to remove the trees and shrubs at the end of Highwood Grove, and had invited their observations thereon. He submitted replies received from 7 residents expressing opposition to the proposal and a petition signed by 128 residents urging the Council not to proceed with the proposed work. The Committee were informed that a deputation consisting of three of the petitioners was in attendance at the Town Hall in the prospect that they might be received by the Committee.

After consideration the Committee decided that it was not necessary to receive the deputation, but that they be informed that the Committee has

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no further action be taken in this matter.

#### 7.—WAITING RESTRICTIONS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Ministry of Transport stating that in view of the success of the present waiting restrictions in "yellow band" streets in the West End of London it is proposed to make similar Orders applying such

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restrictions in congested thoroughfares in the outer Divisions of the Metropolitan Police District. The letter enclosed a draft Order relating to a number of streets including Cricklewood Broadway, and invited comments thereon. It also stated that the draft Order includes the maximum number of streets in which, having regard to the present police resources, a reasonable degree of enforcement can be ensured, but enquired whether the Council wished to make suggestions for the inclusion of other roads in a future Order when the police manpower position has improved.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk inform the Ministry of Transport that the Council offer no objection to the inclusion of Crickle-wood Broadway in the proposed Order, and that they have no suggestions to make at the present time for the inclusion of additional roads.

### 8.—TRAFFIC DANGERS—EDGWARE WAY:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Ministry of Transport stating that close attention is being given to the Council's proposal that the construction of a subway under Edgware Way, which was approved before the war, should now be proceeded with. It is pointed out that in the present economic situation proposals involving capital expenditure require very careful consideration on their merits, and the large number of new works proposed renders the task of selection difficult. The Minister's decision will be communicated in due course. **Noted.** 

#### 9.—TRAFFIC SURVEYS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of Ministry of Transport Circular No. 612 stating that the Minister will be prepared to make grants from the Road Fund at the rate of 50% to highway authorities in respect of approved expenditure on origin and destination surveys designed to determine the need for the best location of new roads to alter substantially the distribution of through traffic, and the most suitable system of through traffic routes, especially within built-up areas.

Such surveys should be undertaken in collaboration with the Divisional Road Engineer, and applications for the Minister's approval to the line of a new road of the category mentioned should be supported by the results of a survey.

Where the Minister initiates a survey for trunk road purposes he will normally derray the whole cost. Noted.

#### 10.—WIRELESS RELAY SERVICE:

At their meeting on the 1st March, 1948, the Committee received a report of the officers on the Carrier Frequency Wire Broadcasting System installed by Multi-Broadcast (Engineering) Limited, and applications from that firm and from British Relay Wireless Limited for permission to operate a Relay Service in the Borough. Consideration of the applications was deferred to enable the Councillors for the Burnt Oak Ward to express an opinion on the desirability of permitting a Relay Service on the Watling Estate.

Councillor Sharpe informed the Committee that he had consulted Councillors Cope and Greenslade and the Secretary of the Watling Association on this matter, and they recommended that, subject to the consent of the London County Council, Multi-Broadcast (Engineering) Limited should be given permission to instal a Relay Service on the Watling Estate.

The Committee instructed the officers to bring this matter to the notice of the London County Council, and to submit a further report after consultation with Multi-on the Watling Estate, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application of British Relay Wireless

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### 11.-BRENT GREEN-TRAFFIC DANGERS:

The Town Clerk submitted a request from a Society who conduct a Boarding and Day School for 30 children at Brent Green, for the provision of a "School" sign or other warning to traffic to reduce the dangers to children from fast-moving traffic coming down the hill of Brent Street.

The Borough Surveyor submitted statistics of accidents at this point.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND.—That no action be taken in this matter-

#### 12.-PUBLIC LIGHTING:

### (a) Increased Charges.

The Borough Surveyor reported the receipt of notification from the Gas Light and Coke Company and the North Middlesex Gas Company of increases in the charges for gas which, under the terms of the public lighting contracts with these Companies, would involve increases in the public lighting charges. The annual additional cost involved amounts to £2,243 for full lighting hours in the North Middlesex Gas Company's area, and £716 for full lighting hours in the Gas Light & Coke Company's area. These amounts would be reduced by approximately 25% by reason of the present restricted hours of lighting.

He also reminded the Committee that the Council had agreed with the Gas Light and Coke Company in June, 1946, that the cost of labour and materials should be reviewed annually on the basis of a variation for each 10% rise or fall compared with pre-war costs, and that each such variation should be applied to the ensuing year. A variation was made in June, 1947, and the Company have applied for a further revision for the period 1948/49. In this connection no increase is claimed in respect of increased labour costs, but material costs have increased by amounts varying from 10% to 30% according to the type of lamp. The total amount involved in this revision of charges is approximately £245, and the amount involved in a similar application from the North Middlesex Gas Company is approximately £180.

The estimated additional charge for public lighting in the current financial year will, therefore, be £2.643. The sum of £3,000 was included in the financial estimates to cover possible increases in the public lighting costs.

The present cost of lighting two-light, three-light and six-light lamps shows an average increase of 59.5% over pre-war prices.

The Borough Surveyor also reported that he had informed the Companies of the Council's concern as to the standard of illumination provided on the main roads in the Borough, and considerable improvement has been effected. Recent tests show that the standard of illumination on the main roads complies with the standards laid down in the public lighting contracts. He also stated that the Companies' accounts, whether for gas or for labour and material charges, make due allowance for those lamps which are not in lighting. Noted.

#### (b) Improved Lighting.

The Borough Surveyor reported that the head of the Ministry of Transport Lighting Section had visited the district and inspected the proposed siting of new lamps, and discussed other technical details in connection with the improved lighting of the Edgware and North Circular Roads. He had also agreed to give further consideration to those roads in the Garden Suburb carrying a fair volume of traffic and acting as important links, which it is proposed to light with 60-watt lamps. An application had accordingly been submitted to the Ministry for approval to proceed with the improved lighting scheme on the following roads:—

Addison Way, Asmuns Hill, Meadway, Hampstead Way, Hermitage Lane, Meadway Gate, Hoop Lane, Temple Fortune Lane, Wellgarth Road.

Noted.

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#### 13.-PARKING PLACES:

### (a) Brampton Crove.

The Borough Surveyor reported the terms on which the Salvation Army were prepared to grant the tenancy of a piece of land in Brampton Grove for use as a car park. The rental of the land would be £26 per annum, exclusive, and the terms appeared to be reasonable.

He submitted a scheme for the levelling of the area and surfacing with clinker at an estimated cost of approximately £120 exclusive of fencing. The land would provide accommodation for the parking of approximately 25 cars.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the tenancy of the piece of land in question be accepted on the terms mentioned by the Borough Surveyor, and that authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to the necessary document.
- (2) That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to carry out the works of leveling and surfacing to enable the land to be used as a car park.

Recommendation of Finance and General Purposes Committee. Add the following paragraph to the recommendation:--

(3) That regulations governing the use of the car park be prepared by the Town Clerk and exhibited on a notice board on the site.

#### (b) Hodford Road.

The Borough Surveyor reported the receipt of a letter from the Ministry of Transport drawing attention to the fact that the 'bus stop for north-bound 'buses in Hodford Road is situated in the centre of an authorised parking place. The Ministry are of opinion that the stopping place serves a considerable public demand and that no suitable alternative site is available, and in view of the fact that the police have stated that the more northerly portion of the parking place (accommodating two cars) is not used to capacity, they suggest that steps should be taken for the cancellation of the authorisation for this section of the parking place. The Ministry also enquire whether the Council wish to suggest any alternative site for a parking place.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Town Clerk make formal application to the Ministry of Transport for the cancellation of the authorisation for the northerly section of the parking place in question.
- (2) That the Ministry of Transport be informed that no alternative site for a car park appears to be available.

#### 14.—MAINTENANCE OF FOOTPATHS:

At their meeting on the 30th June, 1947 (Hi.C., 9/6/47—14) the Council authorised the scaling of contracts with Messrs. S. C. Brent and F. C. Cooksley for maintenance work to public footpaths,

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had obtained revised prices from these firms for maintenance work to be carried out during the present financial year. The prices appear to be reasonable, and provision for the expenditure has been made in the estimates.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That contracts be entered into with Messrs. S. C. Brent and F. C. Cooksley for maintenance work to public footpaths in the Borough for the year 1948/49, and that authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to the necessary documents.

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### 15.-ERECTION OF OVERHEAD CABLE-FORUMSIDE, EDGWARE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application from A. E. Spurrier & Sons Limited of 14. Station Road, Edgware, for permission to erect an overhead cable across Forumside in order to instal a departmental telephone system between their office and their factory.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That permission be given for the erection of a cable across Forumside at a height of not less than 16 feet 6 inches, subject to A. E. Spurrier & Sons Limited entering into an agreement in a form to be settled by the Town Clerk indemnifying the Council against any liabilities in connection therewith.

Recommendation of Finance and General Purposes Committee.

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That the following words be added to the recommendation:—
"such agreement to provide for payment to the Council of an annual way leave fee of 1/-."

#### 16.—OVERHANGING HEDGES:

The Borough Surveyor reported that hedges on the flank frontages of Nos. 23, Clifton Gardens, 1, Hampstead Way and 2 Forres Gardens were overhanging the public footway of Finchley Road. Letters had been addressed to the owners of the premises requesting them to cut back the hedges, without effect.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be authorised to take all necessary steps under Section 23 of the Public Health Act, 1925, for the prevention of the obstruction.

#### 17.-LAND AT THE JUNCTION OF WESTWAY AND FARM ROAD, EDGWARE:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter which he had received from the Edgware Horticultural Society complaining of the condition of a piece of land at the junction of Westway and Farm Road, Edgware, and making suggestions for its improvement.

The Committee instructed the officers to submit a report on this matter at a future meeting.

### 1.-REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £999 5s. 8d. were submitted and approved.

### 2.—BOROUGH HORTICULTURAL SUB-COMMITTEE—APPOINTMENT OF MEMBER:

Pursuant to the recommendation of the Borough Horticultural Show Sub-Committee (P.R.C., 20/4/48-5) the Committee were requested to appoint one member, other than a co-opted member, to serve on the Borough Horticultural Show Sub-Committee.

RESOLVED-That Councillor S. E. Arridge, F.I.S.M.A., be appointed to serve on the Borough Horticultural Show Sub-Committee.

#### 3.—CIVIL DEFENCE BUILDINGS—DAWS LANE—CONFERENCE WITH OFFICERS OF THE MIDDLESEX COUNTY COUNCIL:

The Town Clerk submitted a report regarding a conference which took place on the 30th April, 1948, with officers of the Middlesex County Council regarding the future user of the above-mentioned buildings. The attention of the officers of the County Council was drawn to the serious damage which was occurring at the premises and as a temporary expedient, it was agreed that the Borough Surveyor should arrange for boarding up the premises, clearing away the debris and engaging the services of night watchmen, the cost to be shared in equal proportions by the County and the Borough. Discussion took place with regard to the user of the buildings for the purposes of the Local Youth Committee and it was proposed that Hendon should put the buildings in order, the County Council agreeing to take a lease for ten years certain or, alternatively, for a period of fourteen years with an option to terminate at the end of seven years at an agreed rental which would take into consideration the work carried out (the County Education Committee would have to consult the District Valuer as to the rental). will, no doubt, be necessary to obtain the consent of the Minister of Health to the appropriation of the site from park purposes and an adjustment could be made in respect of the County contribution.

It was arranged that the County Education Committee would prepare estimates for the necessary adaptations and urge the District Valuer to expedite his report. County officials did not favour an alternative suggestion that the buildings might be taken over and adapted by the County and a lease of the site only granted by the 4-PRO BUR

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4.—PROVISION OF GAS SUPPLY TO NOS. 1 AND 2, UPPER WINCHES, BURTONHOLE LANE:

The Town Clerk reported that pursuant to the Council's instructions (E.P. & A.C., 1/3/48—14) enquiry was made of the tenants of Nos. 1 and 2, Upper Winches, Burtonhole Lane (which properties are owned by the Council and situate on land forming part of Burtonhole Lane Open Space) as to whether they would be prepared to pay increased rents on the basis of 8% per annum of the amount of the cost of the provision of a gas supply, approximately 2/6d, per week. Mrs. J. F. Johnson of 1, Upper Winches had replied to the effect that she would be very pleased to have the gas laid on and agrees to pay an additional 2/6d, per week rent. Mrs. Raman, the tenant of 2, Upper Winches, however, has replied to the effect that the application for the provision of gas was not made by her and points out that it is financially impossible for her to pay any additional rent and, therefore, she does not desire a gas supply to be provided. The Borough Surveyor has previously reported that the total cost of the provision of a gas supply, which involves the laying of a special service pipe is £141.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the provision of a gas supply to No. 1, Upper Winches.

5.—HENDON GROVE—CAMP DEMONSTRATION BY THE HENDON DIVISION GIRL GUIDES:

The Town Clerk reported a letter from Miss D. P. Dangerfield, Divisional Commissioner, Hendon Division Girl Guides, expressing appreciation and thanks to the Council for granting permission to the use of Hendon Grove for the purpose of a camp demonstration by Girl Guides of the District on the 17th April. **Noted.** 

6.-FOOTBALL PITCHES-INCREASED CHARGES:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Hendon and District Football League, asking the Council to re-consider its decision to increase the charges for the use of football pitches in the parks and open spaces and requesting that a small deputation be received in order to discuss the matter. Letters from the Hendon and District Football League and the North West Sports and Social Club addressed to His Worship the Mayor, protesting against the increased charges were also submitted. Hendon and District Football League suggested that in the circumstances a 50% increase would have been preferable, and that they felt that some system of grading might be applied, whereby Works Clubs which are not composed exclusively of Hendon personnel and often have a sports fund supported by deductions from wages, would pay a higher fee than smaller clubs without such financial assistance. With regard to West Hendon Playing Fields, the League ask for improvements to be carried out to the dressing accommodation and enquire whether it would be possible for two more pitches to be provided together with dressing accommodation on the western side of the ground near the Wembley area.

The Borough Surveyor submitted letters from the Watling Athletic Football Club, the Watling Community Association and the Catholic Youth Club of Hendon, asking for a revision of the fees. It was reported by the Borough Surveyor that in response to the recent public advertisement, 62 clubs made applications for football pitches in the parks and all pitches are now fully allocated and it had not been necessary to refuse the application of any club.

RESOLVED—That the Hendon and District Football League be informed that the Committee will be prepared to receive the deputation at the next meeting.

7.—THE MOAT MOUNT CAMP SITE—ALLOCATION OF 54 ACRES OF LAND FOR CAMP SITE:

In connection with the user of the above camp site by the Hendon Local Youth Committee, the Town Clerk reported that the negotiations to be entered into with the

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Middlesex County Council provide that such user is to be subject to members of the public being allowed to use the site for camping, on the understanding that they observe the camp rules and regulations prescribed by the Local Youth Committee and approved by this Council. The Committee's approval was sought to the following regulations which have been submitted by the Local Youth Committee, together with regulations numbers 13 and 14 suggested by the Borough Surveyor.

### Moat Mount Camp Regulations.

Moat Mount Camp Site is available for Camping and hiking, subject to the following regulations.

- (1) A permit for the use of the site must be obtained from the Local Youth Committee. In the event of overnight camping such permit will only be issued to an approved person. When mixed camping is being held two competent persons, one of each sex, must be in charge.
- (2) On arrival at the site, the person in charge should report to the Camp Warden to whom the permit will be handed and from whom a signed Clearance Certificate must be obtained before leaving.
- (3) In the event of the Campers arriving before the Camp Warden, the keys may be obtained from the Park Attendant.
- (4) Tents should not be pitched in the woods, and the hut should not be used for sleeping except in an emergency by the consent of the Warden.
- (5) All fires must be damped down at the appointed curfew hour. When the fire is to be lighted in the field, the turf should be removed beforehand, and camp. Only wood provided by the Park Attendant may be used.
- (6) All refuse should be burnt where possible, and the remainder deposited in the receptacles provided. All tins should be burnt out and flattened out before being thrown away in the refuse bins.
- (7) Any damage or loss to the Council's property must be reported to the Warden at once.
- (8) All tent pegs must be carefully removed and no litter should be left on the site.
- (9) The permanent washing and lavatory accommodation will be used solely by females.
- (10) Males will use the temporary accommodation at the north end of the field and must under no circumstances use the permanent building.
- (11) Mixed Camping.—In the event of mixed camping by Youth Organisations, the leaders' tents must be pitched between the boys' and the girls' tents.
- (12) All tents must be pitched as directed by the Camp Warden.
- (13) Fires. Under no circumstances should fires be lighted in or near the adjacent woods.
- (14) Protection of Woods and Fences.—Wood must not be removed from any of the woods, and care must be taken not to damage any of the existing fences or shrubs.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the regulations, as set out above, be approved and adopted.

#### 8.—ROAD SAFETY CAMPAIGN:

The Committee considered a request from the Road Safety Campaign Sub-Committee for facilities in connection with Road Safety in the under-mentioned parks during Safety Week:—

(2) Film shows in suitable parks from Mobile Cinema Van.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the necessary facilities be granted to the Road Safety Sub-Committee in the parks indicated above, subject to the sites being approved by the Borough Surveyor.

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9.—VACANT LAND—NEEDHAM TERRACE, CRICKLEWOOD, N.W.2—COMPULSORY PURCHASE ORDER:

It will be remembered that the Council duly made an order for the compulsory purchase of this land for the purposes of the Public Health Act, 1875 (Public walks and pleasure grounds), and the Physical Training and Recreation Act, 1937 (Children's playing fields). (The latter Act was included so as not to preclude the possibility of application for a grant.) The Town Clerk reported that the Order had been submitted to the Minister who, however, is not prepared to confirm the Order unless the land to be acquired for each specific purpose is clearly defined in the Order. The Borough Surveyor is of opinion that this would be undesirable, owing to the limited area of the site and that the better course would be to acquire the land under the powers conferred by the Public Health Act, 1875, without reference to the Physical Training and Recreation Act, 1937. In these circumstances the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council do make an Order under the Public Health Act, 1875, the Local Covernment Act, 1933, and the Acquisition of Land (Authorisation Procedure) Act, 1946, for the Compulsory Purchase of a piece of land on the south side of a road leading from Edgware Road to Campion Terrace, Hendon, Middlesex, containing an area of 0.70 of an acre or thereabouts for the purpose of public walks and pleasure grounds and that the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

#### 10.—WATLING PARK LAVATORY ACCOMMODATION:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Watling Community Association expressing the concern of the Association and their Bowling Club in particular, at the action of the Council in entirely depriving users of the Bowling Green of lavatory accommodation. In their view the provision of lavatory accommodation is an absolute necessity, and they again point out that the public conveniences in Orange Hill Road, by reason of their distance do not meet the needs of persons using the Green. The Association expressed the hope that the Council would re-consider its decision and provide suitable accommodation as soon as possible.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in the matter, and that the Association be informed accordingly.

#### 11.-LAND-CHURCH FARM, HENDON:

The Borough Treasurer reported on an application received on behalf of the tenants of Church Farm, for permission to cultivate an area of land at the rear of Church Farm as private kitchen gardens. The applicants are tenants of the Housing Committee on the land which forms part of the site of Church Farm which has not been appropriated for housing purposes, and remains under the Control of the Estates Committee. There would not appear to be any objection to the proposal subject to the payment of an appropriate rent and to the tenancies being regulated by a suitable agreement.

The following are details of the Plots:-

Plot A. Tenant, Mr. Jump ..... 11.5 poles.
Plot B. Tenant, Mr. Kraushaar..... 12 poles.
Plot C. Tenant, Mr. Jayne ..... 9.8 poles.

The Borough Treasurer, after consultation with the Borough Surveyor submitted suggestions as to a proper rental to be charged.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That such application be approved subject to the payment of a rental on the basis of 2/- per pole, and to the tenancies being regulated by a suitable agreement in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk.

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## 12.—EDGWAREBURY PARK—PROVISION OF TENNIS COURTS:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a letter from the Broadfields Park Residents' Association asking for consideration to be given to the provision of tennis courts in Edgwarebury Park. Whilst it is desirable that tennis courts should be provided in this park, the Borough Surveyor was of opinion that it was unlikely that authorisation could be obtained for expenditure on new tennis courts as at the present time.

RESOLVED--That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit a report as to the provision of tennis courts in the parks where they are most needed.

### 13.—SUNNY HILL PARK—HIRE OF TENNIS COURTS:

A letter was submitted by the Borough Surveyor on behalf of the Hendon Baptist Church, asking whether tennis courts could be let to the Club on Saturdays. They would require one court from 4 to 6 p.m. and two courts from 6 to 10 p.m. It will be remembered that a similar request made last year was refused in view of the demand for tennis facilities by the general public, particularly on Saturdays and Sundays.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That such application be disapproved and the Borough Surveyor instructed to inform the applicants accordingly.

#### 14.—SALE OF REFRESHMENTS:

#### (a) Brent Park.

The Borough Surveyor reported with regard to an offer of a sum of £25 from Mr. L. Greenwood, for the right to sell refreshments in Brent Park. The Contractor whose tender was accepted as a result of the public advertisement, has withdrawn his tender and the Borough Surveyor has given permission to Mr. Greenwood to take over the tender at the price stated, which is the same as that offered by the previous applicant.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken by the Borough Surveyor be approved.

#### (b) Silkstream Park.

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application from Mr. J. A. Caen, offering a sum of £3 for the right to sell refreshments in the above-mentioned park for the season ending March, 1949. No other application has been received in respect of this park.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the offer of Mr. Caen for the right to sell refreshments in Silkstream Park for the season ending March, 1949, be accepted.

### 15.—MONTROSE PLAYING FIELDS:

### (a) Watling Community Association-Fair-

The Borough Surveyor submitted a letter from the Watling Community Association relating to the decision of the Council to prohibit the holding of fairs in Montrose Playing Fields, and requesting the Council to re-consider their decision in the matter.

Having regard to the decision of the Council, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in the matter and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to inform the Watling Community Association accordingly.

## (b) Sports Meeting-Hendon Boy Scouts.

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had received an application from the Hendon Boy Scouts for permission to use the above-mentioned Playing Fields on Saturday afternoon the 29th May, for the purpose of a sports meeting, and that in view of the date of the sports meeting, he had granted the required permission on the under-

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app mar by standing that no structures should be erected on the ground, and that the meeting was to be limited to sports events for the Scouts. This is in accordance with the Council's general policy for sports meetings of this type, and the Committee accordingly

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken by the Borough Surveyor be confirmed.

### 16.—SCRATCHWOOD OPEN SPACES—GRAZING RIGHTS:

At the last meeting the Committee agreed to grant to Mrs. Allen of Bury Farm, Edgware, the grazing rights in Scratchwood for the 4 months May to August inclusive, on payment of a rental of £30. The Borough Surveyor reported that Mrs. Allen now states that having inspected the ground she is unable to pay more than £15 for the period in question.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the offer of Mrs. Allen of £15 for such grazing rights be accepted.

17.—WOODSIDE PARK OPEN SPACE—PROPOSED SUB-FOOD OFFICE IN PUBLIC SURFACE SHELTER:

The Public Surface Shelter adjacent to Lullington Garth in the Riverside Walk has been taken over by the Council and one-half of the shelter is at present being used as a store and mess room for the park-keepers employed in that area. The Borough Surveyor reported on a request from the Ministry of Food, for permission to use the other half of the shelter from the 25th March, 1948, at a yearly exclusive rental of £10, the tenancy to be determined by a quarter's notice on either side. It is understood that the Ministry require the use of the building as they have given up the temporary premises they had on the Woodside Park Estate.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (a) That the Ministry of Food be granted a tenancy of half of the shelter in question on the terms above indicated, subject to the Borough Surveyor being satisfied with regard to the provision of windows in the building and to the execution of an agreement in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk.
- (b) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

#### 18.-WOODFIELD PARK:

In connection with carrying out trials of amphibious vehicles on the Welsh Harp from land in the possession of the Wembley Borough Council, the Borough Surveyor reported that the Ministry of Supply desire to erect 4 siting posts on which observations can be taken, on the Council's property adjacent to the Welsh Harp. There would not appear to be any objection to the proposal, and the Ministry of Supply suggests that the matter should be regularised by the payment to the Council of a nominal rental and by an exchange of letters. The conditions which the Ministry suggest should be incorporated in the letter are as follows:—

- (1) The Ministry of Supply to have the consent of the Hendon Borough Council:-
  - (i) To construct and maintain four concrete sockets on the Hendon Borough Council's land adjoining the Welsh Harp in the positions shown on the attached plan.
  - (ii) To erect therein four siting posts during the times when tests of amphibious vehicles are being carried out.
- (2) The period of the consent to be from the date when the sockets were first constructed to the 31st December, 1948.
- (3) The Minister to pay to the Hendon Borough Council by way of acknowledgment of this consent the sum of.......

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- (4) The Minister to indemnify the Council against all actions, claims and demands which may be made arising out of this consent, provided that the Council will refer such actions, claims and demands to the Minister, who will decide whether they shall be resisted or compromised.
- (5) If called upon to do so at the end of the period of consent, the Minister to remove the sockets and fill in the holes and make good these sites.

It is anticipated that the consent will not be required after the 31st December, 1948.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council grant permission to the Minister of Supply on the conditions above indicated, if approved by the Town Clerk, and subject to the payment of a nominal rental of £1 per annum.

#### 19,-FENCING IN PARKS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had obtained quotations for the supply and erection of fencing—provision for which had been included in the approved annual estimates—and he recommended the acceptance of the following tenders:—

### 20.—EQUIPMENT FOR CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUNDS IN PARKS:

The Borough Surveyor submitted three quotations received for equipment in children's playgrounds in the parks. The equipment covers 12 different playing fields and comprises swings, see-saws, rocking horses, plank swings, plane swings, etc., there being 30 items in all.

The tender of Charles Wicksteed & Co. (1920) Limited, amounting to £1,306–16s. 0d. is slightly higher than the other two tenders, but in the opinion of the Borough Surveyor, the equipment is of superior construction, and in view of the fact that the Council already own a large amount of equipment obtained from this firm, it is desirable in the interests of standardisation, that a further order should be placed with this firm.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the tender of Charles Wicksteed & Co. (1920) Limited, amounting to £1,306 16s. Od. be accepted, subject to the operation of the usual rise-and-fall clauses, and that the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents in connection therewith.

#### 21.-WATLING PARK:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a letter from County Councillor C. Kartriber, expressing appreciation of the work recently undertaken in Watling Park, by the provision of additional flower beds and other improvements which have enhanced the amenities of the park.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to convey the contents of County Councillor C. Kartriber's letter to the Parks Superintendent and the members of his staff responsible for this park.

## 22.—INSTITUTE OF PARKS ADMINISTRATION ANNUAL CONFERENCE, BUXTON:

The Chairman submitted a report on the annual conference of the Institute of Parks Administration, held at Buxton which he attended in company with the Park's Superintendent. The Committee have expressed their thanks to the Chairman for attending the conference and for his report thereon.

## 23.—ISLAND SITE—JUNCTION OF WATFORD WAY WITH THE BURROUGHS, HENDON:

The attention of the Committee was drawn to the condition of the above island site, the maintenance of which is the responsibility of the Ministry of Transport.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to call the attention of the Ministry of Transport to the condition of such site and to suggest that in future the maintenance of the site might be undertaken by this Council, at the expense of the Ministry.

### ALLOTMENTS COMMITTEE.

#### 24.-LAND, THORNFIELD AVENUE, HENDON:

Pursuant to the Committee's instructions (E.P. & A.C., 12/4/48-14), the Town Clerk submitted a report with regard to the powers of the Committee in relation to the requisitioning of land for temporary allotments, having regard to the requisitioning powers of the former Special (War-Time) Allotments Committee. **Noted.** 

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## 25.—WAR-TIME ALLOTMENTS-MILL HILL SCHOOL:

Further consideration was given to the question of the release of the above-mentioned land, together with the letter from the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, submitted to the Council at its last meeting, asking the Council to approach the Mill Hill School authorities in an endeavour to secure the continued use of the land for allotment purposes. Pursuant to the Council's instructions a copy of the Ministry's letter was forwarded to the School authorities and a letter in reply, from the Bursar of the School was submitted by the Town Clerk. The Bursar refers to the terms of the agree. ment under which the land was used for the purposes of War-time temporary allotments and points out that while the School is under no obligation to provide alternative accommodation for the plot-holders, they have, in deference to the wishes of the Council, already offered to make available a suitable area of land for the eleven residents of the Drapers' Cottage Homes. Further, it is pointed out that some weeks ago the County Agricultural Executive Officer for Middlesex made a comprehensive tour of the School estate and expressed himself as being fully satisfied that all available spare ground is already under cultivation for food production, and it is assumed that the report on this visit, which was undertaken at the request of the Ministry of Agriculture, will have since reached that Department.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council re-affirm its previous decision to release the land from allotments on the 30th September, 1948, and that the Town Clerk be instructed to send a copy of the letter from the Bursar of Mill Hill School to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, together with a notification of the Council's decision in the matter.

#### 26.—BROADFIELDS AVENUE ALLOTMENTS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies enclosing a number of claims for compensation received from the allottees at the above-mentioned allotments in respect of damage alleged to have been caused to crops through cattle straying on to the plots. There would not appear to be any liability on the part of the Council in the matter, and the claims should have been forwarded to the owner of the cattle immediately after the damage was caused.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk inform the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies accordingly.

#### 27.—LAND—EDGWARE ROAD—OPPOSITE HAY LANE:

The Borough Treasurer submitted an application from Mr. H. B. Little, the owner of the above land, asking the Council to release such land from allotments, as it is required for commercial purposes. The land comprises ten allotments, seven of which are occupied, and the situation of the land is such that it would not be possible to provide other plots.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That such land be released from allotments at the end of September, 1948, and that authority be given for the service of the necessary notices to quit to expire on the 30th September, 1948.

### 28.—CHILDS HILL ALLOTMENTS—PLOT 72:

In September, 1947 (E.P. & A.C., 15/9/47—19), the Committee considered a report by the Town Clerk on the proposal to let the above plot for the purpose of gardening instruction to the pupils of Childs Hill Mixed School, and the following recommendation was subsequently confirmed by the Council:—

"That provided the existing tenant does not desire to retain the plot, such plot be let to the new caretaker of the school and that the use of the land for instructional purposes be referred to the Borough Education Officer to arrange."

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The tenant referred to was the late carctaker and the Borough Treasurer reported that it was subsequently found that he did not in fact wish to give up his tenancy; in consequence the matter could not proceed.

The tenancy of the plot has, however, recently been terminated and application has been received from the Headmaster of the School for the original proposals to be revived. It is understood that the new caretaker is prepared to take over the plot on the lines originally advised by the Town Clerk, and that facilities will be available for instruction to the scholars as desired by the Headmaster.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the matter be referred to the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies for consideration and report.

#### 29.—DAWS LANE ALLOTMENTS—PLOT 27:

It was reported by the Borough Treasurer that he had received a communication from the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies regarding the use of the above plot which, according to the Borough Treasurer's records, is let to the Daws Lane Pig Club and the rent is paid on behalf of the Club by Mr. Inwood, the Secretary. Mr. Inwood is also the tenant of Plot 33. It is stated by the Federation that the area of Plot 27 used for pigs is about one-tenth of the whole and that the remaining nine-tenths is cultivated as an allotment by Mr. Inwood. It is further pointed out by the Federation that this arrangement would appear to be a violation of the Council's decision that where a waiting list for plots exists, not more than one plot shall be let in respect of each householder. A recent inspection of the plot indicates that the above facts appear to be correct.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to serve a notice to quit on Mr. Inwood, in respect of the portion of Plot No. 27, which is under cultivation by him.

#### 30.—ABERCORN ROAD ALLOTMENTS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a suggestion by the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies that a water supply should be provided for these allotments, and also that a larger gate should be provided at the entrance from the roadway. The estimated cost of providing such water supply and a larger gate is £30 and £15 respectively.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the provision of a water supply and a larger gate at these allotments, at the estimated costs indicated.

#### 31.—WISE LANE ALLOTMENTS:

An application was submitted from the Federation for an extension of the existing water supply from Plot 43 to Plot 52, and for the erection of a latrine. The Borough Surveyor estimated the cost at £35 and £5 respectively.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for an extension of the water supply and the provision of a latrine at the estimated costs indicated.

### 32.—GOLDERS GREEN ALLOTMENTS—FENCING:

Pursuant to the instructions of the Committee the Borough Surveyor submitted the under-mentioned estimates for the provision of the necessary fencing posts and barbed wire to enable the allottees to erect a fence along the boundary of these allotments:—

### 33.—FINCHLEY ROAD ALLOTMENTS-WATER SUPPLY:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a letter from Mr. P. G. Mayer, one of the allottees at the above-mentioned allotments regarding a suggestion that the allottees would be prepared to meet the cost of the provision of a water supply. Mr. Mayer asks to be informed of the estimated cost of such provision, together with an indication of the proportion which the Council would be prepared to pay. The estimated cost of the work is £14, if permission can be obtained from the owners of the adjacent tennis courts to connect to their supply. If it is necessary to connect to the main in the Finchley Road the cost will be £25.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to communicate with the owners of the tennis courts, with a view to obtaining permission to connect to the water supply at the courts, and that Mr. Mayer be informed as to the estimated cost.

#### 34.—HOSPITAL FIELDS ALLOTMENTS:

The representatives of the Federation asked that the stream along the boundary of the above allotments should be cleaned out and the course straightened where there are rather sharp bends.

RESOLVED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit a report on the matter to the next meeting.

## 35.—NATIONAL ALLOTMENTS AND GARDENS SOCIETY LIMITED—ANNUAL CONFERENCE—BRIGHTON:

The Chairman reported that he regretted he would be unable to attend the above Annual Conference to be held at Brighton from the 27th to 29th May, 1948, but that Mr. C. F. Windust would be attending. Noted.

#### 1.-REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £2,493 6s. 9d. were submitted and approved.

#### 2.-FIRE SERVICE MATTERS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of notification of the following decisions of the County Council on matters relating to the Fire Service:—

- (a) The County Council will permit the attendance of officers of the County Fire Service at meetings of local Councils and their Committees when any special circumstances render it necessary in connection with the discussion of Fire Service matters.
- (b) The Chief Fire Officer will continue the practice of the National Fire Service of furnishing to Local Authorities statistics regarding fires and fire calls in their areas, as required.
- (c) The County Council will allow officers of the Fire Service to give assistance and advice free of charge to Local Authorities in connection with those statutory responsibilities for which such advice is required.
- (d) As required by Section 1 (1) (f) of the Fire Services Act, 1947, the County Council will make available to occupiers of premises and to Local Authorities the services of the Fire Prevention Officers on Fire Prevention matters generally, and will make no charge therefor. **Noted.**

#### 3-AMBULANCE SERVICE:

### (a) County Council Proposals.

The Town Clerk reported that on fuller consideration of the revised proposals of the County Council for the provision of an Ambulance Service it had appeared that a more efficient service would be provided if one of the two ambulances which the County Council proposed to house at the Central Fire Station were stationed at Mill Hill. This would correspond with the Borough Council's proposals for development had the Ambulance Service remained under its control.

On the authority of the Chairman, representations on these lines were made to the Ministry of Health and the County Council were informed. An intimation was later received from the County Council that they would be prepared to amend their scheme to meet these representations before submitting it to the Ministry of Health, if they could have an assurance that the Council would not then consider the provision made for the southern part of the Borough inadequate.

An immediate reply was required to enable the scheme to be submitted to the Ministry before the 28th May, and after consultation with the Chairman the required assurance was given to the County Council.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken be confirmed.

### (b) Inception of County Service.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter received from the Clerk of the County Council pointing out that a number of administrative matters must be dealt with by the County Council before the Appointed Day for the transfer of the Ambulance Service. To ensure the smooth working of the County Service from its inception the co-operation of Local Authorities was sought in allowing the progressive transfer of ambulances from local stations to their new quarters prior to the Appointed Day and the transmission of instructions and information to personnel.

The Committee have instructed the Town Clerk to inform the Clerk of the County Council that this Council will be prepared to co-operate as requested, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That their action be confirmed.

#### 4-SALVAGE:

### (a) Salvage Circular 133.

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of Salvage Circular 133 emphasizing the need for increased salvage of metal and household bones, and stating that members of the Papermakers' Association and the Waste Paper Merchants' Association have intimated their willingness to pay Local Authorities until 31st December, 1950, the appropriate maximum controlled prices for waste paper, and in the event of prices being de-controlled before that date, to continue to pay until that date the prices in force at the time of de-control. **Noted.** 

#### (b) Salvage Bonus.

The Town Clerk reported that pursuant to the Committee's instructions he had enquired whether the Joint Industrial Council's decision on the question of a salvage incentive bonus could be expedited. He submitted a letter received from the Provincial Joint Industrial Council stating that the National Council is in consultation with the Board of Trade on the question of introducing an incentive bonus for salvage collection and consider it undesirable that individual Local Authorities should introduce incentive bonus schemes in the meantime. The letter accordingly asked that no action be taken pending a further communication from the National Joint Council.

The Committee **noted** the letter and instructed the Town Clerk to send a reply urging the National Joint Council to come to an early decision on this matter.

### (c) Kitchen Waste.

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of information from the Southgate Borough Council that the proposed conference on the question of allowances for kitchen waste sent to the Tottenham processing plant cannot yet be arranged as the accounts are not yet available for circulation. **Noted.** 

#### (d) Return.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a statement (copies of which had previously been circulated) showing the tonnage of salvage disposed of for the years ended 31st March, 1946, 1947 and 1948, and the month of April, 1948, together with particulars of the value of the salvage under the various headings.

He also reported that the number of streets or large blocks of flats on a weekly basis of collection was 740 and the number on a basis between 1 and 2 weeks was 68.

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(e) Collection of Pig Food.

The Borough Surveyor drew attention to the activities of a Pig Club occupying land which was purchased by the Corporation for housing purposes and in respect of which application is being made to the Minister of Health for his consent to the appropriation of the land as a public open space.

The Committee decided to refer this matter to the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee for necessary action when the Minister has consented to the appropriation of the land, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to the Pig Club asking for particulars of their licence for the collection of pig food in the area; to inform them that their containers must not be placed on the public highway, and that the removal of pig food from the Council's bins will render them liable to prosecution.

### 5.-PUBLIC MORTUARY:

The Town Clerk informed the Committee that the Finance and General Purposes Committee had referred to them the question of providing two cottages on the site adjacent to the Town Hall in order to provide accommodation for a Mortuary Keeper and Assistant Mortuary Keeper.

RESOLVED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit at a future meeting a report on this matter with a scheme for the provision of the cottages.

#### 6.-REFERENCES FROM THE WHITLEY WORKS COMMITTEE:

The Town Clerk submitted the following references from the Whitley Works Committee, which would be reported to the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee on Wednesday, 2nd June, 1948:—

- (a) That two suits of overalls be issued to each employee in the Council's service who at present is entitled to be supplied with overalls.
- (b) That the Works Committee consider the question of the Council making arrangements for the laundering of the overalls issued to their employees.
- (c) That the Works Committee consider the question of engaging additional men to act as reliefs in the Refuse Section gangs during the holiday period so that the gangs can be maintained at full strength. At present during the holiday season the gangs are reduced from four men to three, and are expected to maintain normal collections, receiving overtime pay if they work longer than the normal working day.
- (d) That arrangements be made for the messroom used by the Highways Section at Mill Hill Depôt to be opened daily at 7 a.m. instead of 7.30 a.m.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That an additional suit of overalls be provided for each refuse collector in the Council's service who is at the present time entitled to be supplied with overalls.
- (2) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to obtain quotations for the laundering of overalls and to inquire into the possibility of obtaining overalls on hire from a firm who will arrange to launder them regularly.
- (3) That no action be taken on the recommendation for engaging relief refuse collectors during the holiday season.
- (4) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to make suitable arrangements for the opening of the messroom at the Mill Hill Depôt at 7 a.m. daily or as soon as practicable thereafter, either by one of the Council's employees living at the Depôt or by a member of the Highways Section.

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# 7.—PURCHASE OF DIESEL OIL ROLLER:

At their meeting on the 5th April, 1948 (W.C., 8/3/48-11 (a)) the Council authorised the acceptance of the tender of Marshall, Sons & Co. Ltd., amounting to £1,750, for the supply of an 8-ton Diesel road roller.

The Town Clerk reported that the quotation includes a clause providing for adjustment in relation to the prices ruling at the time of delivery, and sought the instructions of the Committee as to the amendment of the previous resolution.

The Committee instructed the Town Clerk to enquire from Marshall, Sons & Co. Ltd. whether in view of the policy of the Government that price increases should be avoided they propose to insist on a rise-and-fall clause in the Contract.

# 10.—DISMANTLING OF ANDERSON SHELTERS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the work of dismantling and collection of Anderson shelters in the Borough was completed on Saturday, 29th May. Noted.

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# 11.-REMOVAL OF MORRISON SHELTERS:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a schedule of tenders received for the dismantling and collection of Morrison shelters. He recommended the acceptance of the tender of Mr. W. Flynn, which was the second lowest received for dismantling, collection, loading and removal and the lowest received for collection, loading and removal only, and pointed out that in 90% of the cases no dismantling would be involved.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the tender of Mr. W. Flynn amounting to 7/- per shelter for dismantling, collection, loading and removal and 3/- per shelter for collection, loading and removal only be accepted.

#### (b) Frith Manor.

A letter was submitted from Mr. C. D. Barnard, A.R.I.B.A., Chairman of the Woodside Park Ratepayers' and Residents' Association enquiring whether the Mobile Library might attend at Woodside Park on two occasions-on morning and one afternoon-instead of the one day.

The Chief Librarian informed the Committee that it would not be possible to alter the time table for the Mobile Library at the present time, but a complete re-organisation would be possible when a second vehicle is provided.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Woodside Park Ratepayers' and Residents' Association be informed accordingly.

# (c) Proposed Travelling Libraries.

The Borough Surveyor submitted quotations received from two firms of coachbuilders for the bodies required for the two Travelling Libraries and called attention to the measures which had been adopted to make conditions inside the libraries as pleasant as possible in hot weather. The lowest tender was that of Spurling Motor Bodies Limited amounting to £2,970. This amount together with the quotation of Spurling Motor Bodies Limited amounting to £1,279 for the tractors and chassis required (Li.C., 19/4/48-13 (b)) gives a total cost of £4,249 which is £239 in excess of the amount provided in the Rate Estimates.

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# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the quotation of Spurling Motor Bodies Limited amounting to £2,970 be accepted;
- (ii) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents;
- (iii) That the Finance and General Purposes Committee be asked to approve a supplementary estimate of £239 for the provision of Mobile Library Vehicles.

#### 8.-EXHIBITION:

The Chief Librarian reported that it had been suggested that an exhibition illustrating the work of local societies would serve to draw attention to an aspect of community life that does not usually get much public attention. A preliminiary enquiry among local societies has had a good response, and while many have no suitable exhibition material a sufficient number have offered material covering pictures, photographs, handierafts, models, antiquities, designs, etc. These backed by suitable historical items drawn from the Local Collection would make possible the organisation of an exhibition.

The Chief Librarian suggested that the exhibition could be held from the 6th—20th November inclusive at an estimated cost of £50 for which provision is made in the Estimates.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Chief Librarian be instructed to proceed with the arrangements for an Exhibition of the nature indicated at an estimated cost of £50.

#### 9.-- "FENELLA":

The Chief Librarian reported that there is no accommodation in this building for clothing and personal possessions of the library staff working there.

RESOLVED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit estimates for the provision of a wardrobe cupboard and lockers at "Fenella."

## 10.—LIST OF RECENT ADDITIONS:

The Chief Librarian reported that before the war a select list of recent additions to stock was published regularly and was appreciated by borrowers who had no other means of finding out what books had been put into circulation. He suggested that publication of these lists should now be resumed and reported that a provisional estimate received for the first list is £3 per thousand copies. At the present time there is no certainty about printing costs but adequate provision has been made in the current estimates for these lists of new books to be published every other month.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That approval be given to the resumption of the pre-war practice of issuing every other month a list of recent books added to stock.

# 11.—PROVISION OF DAILY NEWSPAPERS:

The Chief Librarian submitted details of daily newspapers taken at the Central and Branch Libraries together with a letter from the "Daily Mirror" asking that the "Daily Mirror" should be displayed in the libraries. Having considered the whole question of the provision of daily newspapers, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the "Daily Mail" and "Daily Express" be provided at the Central and Branch Libraries and that the "Manchester Cuardian" be provided at each Branch Library.

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12.-CONFERENCES:

# (a) Library Association Conference—Report of Delegates.

The Committee duly **noted** a report of the Council's delegates to the above-mentioned conference held at Scarborough from the 3rd to the 7th May.

# (b) Association of Special Libraries and Information Bureaux.

The Chief Librarian reported that the Conference of the above Association will be held at Ashborne Hill. Warwickshire from the 17th to 20th September and recommended the appointment of two delegates, namely the Librarian-in-Charge of the Reference Library, Miss E. E. Pyman and the Chief Cataloguer, Miss K. Middleton.

The maximum fee for the whole conference, including sleeping accommodation and meals, will not be more than 5 guineas per delegate.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, subject to the approval of the Minister of Health to payment of the expenditure involved, Miss E. E. Pyman and Miss K. Middleton be appointed as the Council's delegates to the conference in question.

# 13.—EXCHANGE OF LIBRARY ASSISTANTS:

With reference to the decision of the Council (F. & G.P.C., 19/1/48 - 5 - 16) the Chief Librarian reported the receipt of a letter from the Chief Librarian, Auckland, New Zealand intimating that his Council had agreed to the proposed exchange of Miss B. # 4.—NEW TOWNS—HEMEL HEMPSTEAD DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION:

The Town Clerk submitted a report received from the above-mentioned Development Corporation of an informal meeting between officers of the Borough of Willesden, Hendon and The Urban District of Harrow, and officers of the Development Corporation held at 13, Grosvenor Square on the 30th April, 1948.

Mr. Hart, the Corporation's General Manager, explained that he had invited Council representatives to meet again so that he might report what had happened during the three months since the last meeting, and give some idea of the Corporation's construction programme during the next year or two. Mr. Hart reported with regard to the question of the provision of water supply, sewerage, labour, etc. It was agreed that a further meeting should take place in June when the Ministry of Health's housing allocation was known. Noted.

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# 5.—REQUISITIONED PREMISES—LEGAL PROCEEDINGS—13, WEST HEATH DRIVE, N.W. 11:

In connection with the proceedings taken by the owner of the above premises claiming damages for trespass consequent upon the requisitioning of the premises in 1944, the Town Clerk submitted a letter received from the Plaintiff's Solicitors, suggesting that the matter might be compromised and setting out terms on which the matter might be settled.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council do not agree to a compromise on the lines suggested by the Plaintiff's Solicitors.

# 6.—HOUSING PROGRAMME—AUTHORISATION FOR THE ERECTION OF HOUSES:

The Town Clerk reported that a deputation consisting of His Worship the Mayor, Councillor Knowles, The Borough Treasurer, The Borough Surveyor and The Deputy Town Clerk, attended at the Ministry of Health on Thursday the 20th May, 1948, and were received by officers representing the Minister. The Council's representatives stressed the extreme gravity of the present housing situation and the position which would arise by the dissipation of the present labour force owing to the withholding of further licences to build. The officers of the Ministry informed the deputation that they were prepared to authorise the following building:—

- Completion of the Wentworth Hall scheme by the erection of 6 shops with flats over.
- 2. Completion of the Claremont Road scheme by the erection of 33 houses and 5 shops with flats over.
- 3. The erection of 60 flats on The Fairway site.
- 4. The erection of 24 further houses at Kenilworth Road and the completion of the Milespit Hill scheme by the erection of a further 24 flats.
- 5. The erection of about 100 Easiform houses on the Kenilworth Road site.
- 6. Completion of Brent Hill scheme by the erection of 26 dwellings for old people.

As a result of the deputation to the Ministry of Health, the Borough Surveyor reported that the following action was being taken in order that building operations on the schemes approved shall be commenced as soon as possible.

The Fairway Estate, Mill Hill—60 Flats. Advertisements for tenders are being issued immediately, as the necessary plans, specifications, etc., are all ready.

Wentworth Hall Estate—6 Shops and Flats. This scheme is also being advertised, as all the necessary documents are ready.

Claremont Road—33 Permanent Houses. This scheme comprises three separate groups of houses, and negotiations have been entered into with various firms with a view to securing tenders for the erection of the houses within the limits of cost laid down by the Ministry of Health.

Kenilworth Road Estate. Negotiations have been entered into with Messrs. John Laing & Son with a view to obtaining a satisfactory tender for the erection of 100 "Easiform" houses on this estate.

Brent Hill Estate—26 Aged Persons Dwellings. Arrangements are being made to proceed with the preparation of detail plans for the 26 aged persons dwellings on the Brent Hill Estate.

Edgeworth Crescent — Site No. 20 and Broadfields Avenue—Site No. 19.—It is also proposed to put in hand the preparation of detail plans for the development of the Edgeworth Crescent site (No. 20) (80 flats) and the Broadfields Avenue site (No. 19) (approximately 300 houses). The Borough Surveyor recommended that the necessary steps be taken to acquire the freehold of these two sites from the owners.

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Claremont Road-5 Shops. It is further proposed to put in hand, detail plans for the erection of the above shops.

The Committee have duly noted the position and have

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND--That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to enter into negotiations with the owners for the acquisition of the freehold of Housing Sites Nos. 19 and 20.

# 7.-HOUSING SITE NO. 14, LAWRENCE STREET, MILL HILL:

On the report of the Town Clerk in connection with the compulsory purchase of the land forming the above housing site, it was

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council do make an Order under Part V of the Housing Act, 1936, and the Acquisition of Land (Authorisation Procedure) Act, 1946, for the Compulsory Purchase of the land indicated on the plan submitted, and that the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents in connection therewith.

# 8.—LAND ADJOINING GRANVILLE RESTAURANT, CRICKLEWOOD LANE:

The Town Clerk submitted an application from a Mr. W. G. Wells for permission to park a lorry on ground adjoining the former British Restaurant in Cricklewood Lane, for the purpose of trading in fruit and greengrocery. The-Borough Surveyor reported that the use of the land for the purpose indicated would be a contravention of the Town Planning Scheme.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application of Mr. Wells be disapproved.

## 9.—ERECTION OF COTTAGES FOR OLD PEOPLE:

The Town Clerk reported as to a suggestion put forward on behalf of the Trustees of the Will of a former resident in relation to the erection of cottages for old people. It was decided to await a report from the appropriate officers after further investigation of the proposals.

# 10.—13, COLIN PARK ROAD—APPLICATION FOR RELEASE FROM REQUISITION:

In connection with an application from Mr. G. C. Thomas, for the release of the above-mentioned premises from requisition, the Town Clerk submitted a letter from Mr. Thomas objecting to the clause in the Council's usual form of undertaking which requires that in the event of his vacating the property within five years from the date of the undertaking, he will offer the property to the Council for requisition.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Mr. Thomas be informed that the Council are unable to waive the clause in question.

# 11.—NATIONAL HOUSING AND TOWN PLANNING COUNCIL—ANNUAL MEETING, LONDON, 3rd JUNE, 1948:

The Town Clerk reported that notice had been received from the National Housing and Town Planning Council that the annual meeting of the Council will be held at the Connaught Rooms on Thursday, 3rd June, 1948, at 3.30 p.m. for the purpose of receiving the annual report and statement of accounts, electing Committees and appointing honorary officers, for the ensuing year. **Noted.** 

# 12.—DISINFESTATION OF HOUSEHOLD GOODS:

The Council have approved in specific cases expenditure incurred by reason of the fumigation of household goods belonging to applicants being rehoused in Council property. In this connection the Housing Officer asked for general authority to be given for incurring this liability in future cases where it is considered necessary to undertake disinfestation.

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RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given to the Housing Officer to incur expenditure in future cases where it is considered necessary to undertake disinfestation.

# 13.—MEDICAL SERVICES ON COUNCIL ESTATES:

The Housing Officer reported on applications received from two Doctors requesting:

- (a) That consideration be given to the allocation of a tenancy of a Council House at the Wentworth or Claremont Estates to each of the applicants, or alternatively, permission be given to allow the use of a room as a branch surgery in a Council House, in order that they may set up practices in one of these areas, and
- (b) That the Council support representations to the newly formed Executive Panel Committee of the National Health Scheme for permission to set up practices in these areas.

The Committee have instructed the Housing Officer to submit a report to the next meeting as to the number of persons resident in these areas, and as to the desirability for providing facilities for medical services on these estates.

#### 14.—HOUSING APPLICATIONS SUMMARY:

The Housing Office reported that he did not propose to submit the monthly summary of applications until the re-grouping of applications in accordance with the new scheme had been completed. It was anticipated that this would be completed by the date of the next meeting.

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# 25.—HOUSING DEVELOPMENT:

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With reference to the future housing schemes of the Council, the Borough Surveyor reported that it had been suggested that a large number of dwellings could be provided if the development took the form of blocks of multi-storey flats. It will be remembered that the schemes already in hand and projected provide for a substantial number of flats, limited to two or three storeys in height. Most of these flats are of the twobedroom type, but there is a small proportion of the three-bedroom type. opinion of the Borough Surveyor it is very improbable that the Minister of Health would agree to the erection in Hendon of blocks of multi-storey flats. Such flats are expensive both in construction and maintenance and are not suited to the general lay-out and development of an outer London area. Even if the necessary permission could be obtained it would make very little difference to the number of dwellings provided. The density of the population for new estates is limited by the Greater London Plan to fifty persons per acre and this is generally taken as allowing a maximum building density of twelve houses per acre. Some increase on these figures is allowed in the case of small flats, on the assumption that only small families are accommodated therein and the maximum figure of fifty persons per acre is not likely to be exceeded. If, therefore, development by multi-storey blocks of flats were permitted, it would only result in the provision of an extensive number of the smaller type of dwelling which in the course of time would lead to complaints of overcrowding. Noted.

#### 26.—ISSUE OF BUILDING LICENCES:

# 2.-TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT, 1947:

# (a) Area Planning Committee.

The Town Clerk referred to the Scheme of Delegation of Functions of the County Council under this Act, and submitted a letter from the Clerk of the County Council asking for the name of the Member appointed by the Council on the Area Planning Committee.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That Alderman R. A. B. Teare, M.B.E., be appointed as the Council's representative on the Central Middlesex Area Planning Committee for the period expiring April, 1949.

The Council are members of this Association, and the Committee have appointed Alderman A. W. Curton, F.R.S.A., M.Inst.B.E. (Deputy Mayor), Alderman R. A. B. Teare, M.B.E. and Councillor R. H. Taylor, as the Council's representatives.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the action taken be confirmed.

# 4.-3, LAWRENCE AVENUE, MILL HILL:

The Town Clerk referred to the authority given at the last meeting of the Committee for the service of notices in respect of a contravention of the Planning Scheme, by reason of the use of a temporary garage at this address as a workshop incidental to the business of a glazier. He submitted a letter from the occupier stating that in view of the Council's representations he proposes to cease carrying on business at this address and asking the Council to defer any action for a period of three or four months in order that he might be allowed time to arrange for the transfer of his business.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in the matter for a period of four months expiring 21st October, 1948, and that the Town Clerk inform the occupier accordingly.

## 5.-174, WEST HENDON BROADWAY:

The Town Clerk reported that the Committee's recommendation for a determination in this case (B. & T.P.C., 19/4/48—41) had been referred back for further consideration following a suggestion by a Member that the premises were being used in contravention of Defence Regulation 68 C.A.

The Town Clerk reported on the circumstances of the ease in which there would not appear to be any breach of the Defence Regulation in respect of the premises the subject of the determination.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council do determine—

- (1) that the use of the large front room on the first floor of 174, The Broadway, West Hendon, for the purpose of the manufacture of soft toys fails to comply with Planning Control as contravening Clause 28 of Hendon Planning Scheme No. 2, but
- (2) that, having regard to all relevant circumstances, the user shall be deemed so to comply for a period of forty-six weeks expiring on 10th May, 1949.

## 6.—CONTROL OF ADVERTISEMENTS:

The Committee discussed the general question of the control of advertisements and the Town Clerk reported on the Council's powers.

At present, by the combined operation of the Hendon Planning Schemes and Section 47 of the Act of 1932, where advertisements or hoardings are set up which seriously injure the amenity of land in use zones I, II or III, the Council may require their removal. An appeal may be made to a Court of Summary Jurisdiction.

The control of advertisements is, however, dealt with under Section 31 of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1947, which enables the Minister to make Regulations for restricting or regulating the display of advertisements (which may also apply to existing advertisements) so far as appears to him to be expedient in the interests of amenity or public safety. Until such Regulations have been made, it is not possible to define the powers which will be conferred on local planning authorities, and it will be remembered that under the Scheme of Delegation any action under the Regulations will be subject to prior consultation with the County Council.

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# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Town Clerk be instructed to communicate with the Railway Executive drawing their attention to the unsightly appearance of certain hoardings erected on their land and requesting them to consider the removal of these hoardings and the planting of a suitable hedge in their place.
- (2) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to carry out a survey of the Borough and submit a list to the Committee of those advertisement hoardings in respect of which it is desirable that the Council should exercise control.

# 7.—GARAGES—1, 2 AND 3, BABINGTON ROAD, N.W. 4:

The Town Clerk referred to consideration by the Committee (B. & T.P.C., 14/7/47—35) of the contravention reported in respect of the use of 35, Church Road and these garages for the making of nuts and screws. 35.—PROPOSED USE OF LAND REAR OF SUTTON PARADE, HENDON. BETWEEN CHURCH ROAD AND FLORENCE STREET, FOR A GARAGE AND TEA STORE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application for consent to the erection of a building approximately 60 ft. x 18 ft. x10 ft. high for the purposes of a depôt for the storage of tea and for the garaging of small vans. The application has been advertised and three objections received. The property is situate in a special business zone of Scheme No. 1 and is adjacent to residential property.

RESOLVED-That consent be refused (Clauses 28 and 30).

36.-CONVERSION OF 21, CHEYNE WALK, HENDON, INTO 2 FLATS:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application for permission to convert this property into 2 flats, including the provision of an outside stairway. The property is situate in a residential zone of Scheme No. 1.

RESOLVED-That consent be refused (Clauses 28, 30 and 46).

37.—PROPOSED LICENSED PREMISES—EDGWARE ROAD, OPPOSITE HAY LANE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application for permission to use a site in Edgware Road, opposite Hay Lane, for the erection of a public house. Consent to development of this site will also be required from the Ministry of Transport under the Restriction of Ribbon Development Act, 1935, and Trunk Roads Acts, 1936 and 1946. The application has been advertised and two objec-The property is situate in a special business zone of Scheme No. 1. tions received.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That consideration of the application be deferred until the meeting of the Committee to be neld on 5th July, 1948.

39.—NOS. 1 AND 3, HALE LANE, MILL HILL, THE MAIN ENGINEERING

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application for permission to continue the use COMPANY LIMITED: of these premises for the manufacture of automatic lathes. The industrial use of these premises which are situate in a residential zone of Scheme No. 1, was permitted by the Council in 1943 and the use was the subject of an Agreement dated 29th March, 1943, between the Company and the Council.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That consideration of the application be deferred until the meeting of the Committee to be held on 5th July, 1948.

# 40.—FISH FRYING RANGE-87, BELL LANE, HENDON:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application for consent to use these  $sh_{0p}$  premises for the trade of fish frying and to the erection of an external gas vent  $iro_{100,10}$  fish frying range. The premises are situate in a special residential zone of Planning Scheme No. 2 and have been used as a shop premises since 1910.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application be approved, subject to the following conditions:—

- (a) That the vent pipe shall be painted to harmonise with the existing back ground.
- (b) That nothing shall be done on the premises which, by reason of noise, smoke, fumes, smell or otherwise, would, in the opinion of the Council, be a nuisance to the occupiers of adjacent properties.

- (1) that the use of 112, Brent Street, Hendon, N.W. 4, for the purpose of glass blowing and the manufacture of special types of glassware for electrical purposes fails to comply with Planning Control as contravening Clause 28 of Hendon Planning Scheme No. 2, but
- (2) that having regard to all relevant circumstances the user shall be deemed so to comply for a period of 12 months expiring on 21st June, 1949.

# 46.-PRIVATE SCHOOL-11, ST. MARGARET'S ROAD, EDGWARE:

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# 49.—JOINT PLANNING COMMITTEE—DRAFT DEVELOPMENT PLAN:

The Borough Surveyor referred to the Committee's decision (B. & T.P.C., 8/3/48\_39) to put forward to the Central Middlesex Joint Planning Committee suggested amendments to the draft plan, including provision for the use of land to the north of Spur Road for housing purposes. The amendment has been considered by the Central Middlesex Joint Planning Committee who have given consent, subject to the reservation for parkway treatment of Spur Road and Watford Way, and who have decided that the Planning Consultant, in consultation with the Borough Surveyor, should indicate to the County Council in due course the precise extent of the amendment which will be needed to the draft Development Plan.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a suggested lay-out of the area incorporating additional land to the north of Spur Road already scheduled for development. The total area available for development is approximately 40 acres.

# 1.-REQUISITIONS:

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Requisitions amounting to £90 7s. 6d. were submitted and approved.

#### 2.-TRADING ACCOUNTS:

The Town Clerk reminded the Committee that the Council at their meeting on the 10th May, 1948, had decided, on the recommendation of the Finance and General Purposes Committee, to ask this Committee to give further consideration to the question of charges.

RESOLVED-That this matter be considered at the next meeting of the Committee in the light of a report to be presented by the Borough Treasurer and the Chief Officer Meals Service dealing with the question of charges and the financial position of the restaurants as finally determined in relation to the year 1947/48.

# 3.—STAG HOUSE CIVIC RESTAURANT—MANAGEMENT:

The Committee gave consideration to the question of filling the vacancy for the post of Manager of Stag House Civic Restaurant, and

RESOLVED-That authority be given for the advertisement of the vacant post of Manager or Manageress of the Stag House Civic Restaurant at the appropriate scale salary.

# 4.—CATERING OUTSIDE RESTAURANT PREMISES:

As instructed at the last meeting the Town Clerk submitted a report on the question of catering by the Meals Service otherwise than in the Civic Restaurants, for private functions. Under Section 1 of the Civic Restaurants Act, 1947, the Council is empowered "to establish and carry on restaurants and otherwise provide for the supply to the public of meals and refreshments, and may carry on such activities as are reasonably incidental or ancillary to the activities aforesaid." It appears that eatering for private functions, whether at a Civic Restaurant or not, is an activity reasonably incidental to the supply to the public of meals and refreshments, and is, therefore, within the Council's powers.

#### RESOLVED-

- (i) That a Sub-Committee consisting of Councillors Arridge, Jones and Sheill with the Chairman (ex-officio) be appointed to consider the question of catering by the Meals Service outside the Civic Restaurants with a view to formulating a list of the types or organisations for whom such catering should be undertaken.
- (ii) That the Chief Officer Meals Service be instructed to submit at each meeting of the Committee a schedule of outside functions for which the Meals Service has arranged to cater.

(iii) That details of the numbers of functions, both inside and outside the Restaurants, other than normal trade, and of the income derived therefrom be shown separately in the statistics presented to future meetings of the Committee.

# 5.—SELECTION OF CANDIDATES FOR INTERVIEW:

In accordance with an intention expressed at the last meeting the Committee considered the method of selection of candidates for interview by the Appointments Sub. Committee when filling vacancies on the staff of the Meals Service.

The Town Clerk reported that the present practice in regard to all departments when filling vacancies at salaries outside the General Division but within the National Scales, is for the applications to be submitted to the Chairman of the Committee, who, in consultation with the Chief Officer concerned, selects a short list of candidates for interview by the Appointments Sub-Committee.

RESOLVED—That the present practice be adhered to in regard to future appointments on the staff of the Meals Service.

## 6.—TRADING ACCOUNT—1947/1948:

The Borough Treasurer submitted a report, with a provisional trading account, on the working of the Civic Restaurants for the year 1947/48. Certain adjustments to the figures may be necessary in regard to rentals, amortisation charges and Renewals Fund. In regard to the Renewals Fund, the Borough Treasurer is in communication with the Ministry of Food and on receipt of their decision will submit a comprehensive report dealing with the final accounts for the year. **Noted.** 

### 7.—FINANCIAL REPORT:

The Borough Treasurer submitted a statement of trading accounts and statistical data for the month of April, 1948 (5 weeks) in respect of the 5 Civic Restaurants. The net result shows a surplus of £45 for the period, compared with a deficit of £18 for the previous period of 5 weeks. The statistics show an increase in the percentage of food costs to sales, but the proportion of wages to sales is reduced to 34.1%.

Details of the statement are contained in the Appendix to the report of the Finance and General Purposes Committee. **Noted.**

The Chief Officer reported that as a result of longer experience of the working of the restaurant he was of opinion that such a scheme would seriously curtail the space available for private functions, and that it would be preferable, while retaining the snack-bar in the front portion of the restaurant, to provide a dance floor in the main restaurant and use that portion for private functions. He had accordingly asked the Borough Surveyor to submit an additional estimate for a scheme on these lines.

RESOLVED-That the action taken be confirmed.

# 11.—PREVENTION OF NUISANCE FROM FLIES:

The Chief Officer submitted details of "Aerovap" units which were available for installation in the Civic Restaurants for the purpose of exterminating flies by the use of D.D.T. 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6.-PRINTING:

The Town Clerk submitted quotations received from four firms who had been invited to submit estimates for printing and delivering 40,000 copies of the Bulletin. The Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND—That the tender of the Hendon Printing Works Limited, based on the price of £33 for the delivery of 10,000 copies be accepted.

# 7.-ESTIMATES:

# 1.-ROOKERY CLOSE AND COLIN GARDENS, N.W. 9:

In connection with the reference from this Committee to the Public Health and Medical Services Committee regarding a petition from residents of Rookery Close and Colin Gardens complaining of a nuisance arising from certain industrial buildings in the vicinity, the Committee duly **noted** an extract from the report of the Medical Officer of Health submitted to the Public Health and Medical Services Committee at its last meeting indicating measures being undertaken with a view to reducing noise, and stating that no public health nuisance exists.

## 5.—GOLDERS GREEN WAR MEMORIAL:

The Town Clerk referred to consideration at the last meeting of an application from the Golders Green, Childs Hill and Garden Suburb Branch of the British Legion for permission to inscribe on the Golders Green War Memorial suitable words to commemorate those men and women who lost their lives in the 1939/45 War. The Committee had recommended that, subject to the proposal being carried out in a manner approved by the Borough Surveyor, the application should be granted. This recommendation had not been adopted by the Council, however, the matter being referred back for consideration to be given to the possibility of the Council bearing the expense. The Town Clerk informed the Committee that Section 133 of the Local Government Act, 1948, gave the Council power to incur such expenditure, but the Committee heard from Alderman II. G. Potter that it was the desire of the British Legion that the expense should be borne privately.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application to place an additional inscription on the Golders Creen War Memorial be approved subject to the work being carried out to the satisfaction of the Borough Surveyor.

# 6.-MILL HILL WAR MEMORIAL:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Hon. Secretary of the Mill Hill War Memorial Appeal asking for the Council's approval to the placing on the Mill Hill Memorial of a bronze plaque commemorating the dead of the 1939/45 War, the cost to be borne by the Appeal Committee out of funds already subscribed. The Trades Council ask the Council's assistance in obtaining the required reduction in rents.

1L-FLY POSTING:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Hampstead Garden Suburb Residents' Association asking for the Council's support in action which the Association is taking with a view to stopping the practice of fly posting on bins, etc., throughout the Garden Suburb.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform the Association that the Council are prepared to give support provided that suitable evidence is forthcoming.

12.—WAR CHARITIES:

(a) "British Aid for German Workers (Arbeiterwohlfart)."

The Town Clerk submitted an application for registration under the War Charities Act, 1940, of the above Charity. The application has been advertised and one objection received.

# 17.—BYE-LAW RELATING TO WIRELESS LOUDSPEAKERS, GRAMOPHONES, ETC.:

The Committee considered the following Good Rule and Government Bye-Law relating to wireless loudspeakers, gramophones, etc:—

- (1) No person shall—
  - (a) in any street or public place or in or in connection with any shop, business premises or other place which adjoins any street or public place and to which the public are admitted, or
  - (b) upon any other premises

by operating or causing or suffering to be operated any wireless loudspeaker gramophone, amplifier or similar instrument make or cause or suffer to be made any noise which shall be so loud and so continuous or repeated as to be or cause a nuisance to occupants or inmates of any premises in the neighbourhood.

Provided that no proceedings shall be taken against any person for any offence against this bye-law in respect of premises referred to in paragraph (b) thereof, unless the nuisance be continued after the expiration of a fortunght from the date of the service on such person of a notice alleging a nuisance, signed by not less than three householders residing within the hearing of the instrument as aforesaid.

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(2) Any person offending against the foregoing Bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That a statement be made by the Chairman at the meeting of the Council on the 21st June, 1948, drawing attention to this Bye-law and to that relating to noisy animals.

# 18.—CONFERENCE—INTERNATIONAL UNION OF LOCAL AUTHORITIES:

The Committee expressed their appreciation to His Worship the Mayor for a report (previously circulated) submitted on this Conference which had been held at Harrogate. Arising from the report the Committee gave consideration to the question of district heating and to support of the International Union of Local Authorities by the Association of Municipal Corporations,

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Town Clerk be instructed to request the Middlesex County Council to include in their next General Powers Bill provisions enabling district heating to be provided.
- (2) That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform the Association of Municipal Corporations that the Gouncil recommend the Association to support the International Union of Local Authorities with the object of increasing the efficiency and usefulness of the Union.

#### 19.—CIVILIAN WAR DEAD-MARKING OF GRAVES:

The Town Clerk reported receipt of Circular 35/48 from the Ministry of Health stating that Exchequer assistance would be available for the permanent marking of graves of civilian war dead. The number of graves provided by the Council for the burial of civilian war dead is fourteen all of which are at Mill Hill. The Borough Treasurer reported that in connection with negotiations with the Paddington Borough Council on the question of the future maintenance of these graves it had been suggested that, arrangements which have been made by the Paddington Council to invite proposals for suitably marking the graves maintained by them should include the 14 at Mill Hill Cemetery. In such event the Paddington Council would carry out the work and claim the appropriate grant.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the suggestion by the Paddington Council be adopted, subject to the marking arrangements being approved by this Council.

# 20.—HENDON FOOD CONTROL COMMITTEE, 1948:

The Town Clerk reported receipt of approval from the Minister of Food to the nomination of Mrs. G. E. Fuller as a Consumer Member on the Hendon Food Control Committee.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND.—That Mrs. C. E. Fuller be appointed as a Consumer Member of the Hendon Food Control Committee until 31st December, 1948.

# 21.—CHILDREN AND YOUNG PERSONS ACT, 1933:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Town Clerk of Wembley stating that his Council had decided to make representations to the Sceretary of State at the proper time objecting to the Bye-laws proposed to be made by the County Council prohibiting the employment of children in the delivery of newspapers, milk, etc., in the mornings. The Town Clerk added that he had informed the Town Clerk of Wembley of the terms of the Resolution passed by the Council on 10th May, 1948. The Wembley Council ask for the support of neighbouring Local Authorities in representations to the Secretary of State.

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RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be authorised to  $m_{ake}$  representations at the appropriate time in support of the action being taken by the Wembley Council.

# 22.—LAND, NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD, OCCUPIED BY HALES CLINKERS LIMITED.

The Town Clerk referred to the refusal at the last meeting of the application by Hales Clinkers Ltd., that another firm should be allowed to stand vehicles and plant and to erect temporary buildings on land at North Circular Road. The Lease provides that the land may not be sub-let nor buildings erected without the Council's consent and further provides that such consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

The Town Clerk submitted a further letter from the Company asking for reconsideration of the application and stating that the vehicles to be used by the other firm will not exceed 6 and that there will be two temporary buildings, one 21 ft. x 10 ft. and one 39 ft. x 15 ft.

After considering the report of the Borough Surveyor, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council re-affirm its previous decision in this matter.

# 23.—ALTERATION OF ELECTORAL DIVISIONS:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Clerk of the County Council stating that the question of reviewing the electoral divisions was under consideration and indicating the lines of the representations the appropriate Committee were proposing to recommend the County Council to approve for submission to the Secretary of State. In view of the changes of Local Government areas, including alterations in the County boundary which may result from the work of the Local Government Boundary Commission, any alterations at the present time will need to be regarded as temporary, a further review to be undertaken in a few years' time. It is, therefore, proposed that certain County Districts which are under-represented in regard to their present electorate should be given increased representation, but that for the time being no changes in the numbers of electoral divisions should be made in other County Districts.

The Town Clerk submitted a statement received from the County Council giving a list of County Districts, the Registrar General's estimate of population at September, 1947, the Local Government Electorate as shown in the 1947 registers and the number of electoral divisions as at present and as now proposed. No variation is proposed in regard to Hendon which comprises six Electoral Divisions.

Having considered the number of existing electoral divisions and the number proposed for certain other County Districts and the figures of population and electorate shown, and in view of the fact that any observations on the proposals are to be submitted to the County Council by the 10th June, the Committee have instructed the Town Clerk to make representations to the County Council to secure an increase from 6 to 8 in the number of Electoral Divisions for Hendon.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken be approved.

## 24.—COUNTY EDUCATION COMMITTEE AND COUNTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the County Council concerning the representation of County Districts on the County Education Committee. Under the existing arrangement Hendon is grouped with Willesden and each Authority in turn appoints a representative either to the Education Committee or to the Advisory Committee. During the present year Hendon's representative (Councillor R. J. Knowles) serves on the Advisory Committee and Willesden's representative serves on the Education Committee. The Willesden Council have intimated their willingness to support the nomination of this Council of a member to represent the two Authorities on the Education Committee for the year 1948/49.

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The question of the extension of the periods of office of representatives on the Education Committee and the Advisory Committee is under consideration by the Middlesex Excepted Districts Association and the Town Clerk informed the Committee that the matter would be discussed at the meeting of the Association to be held on the 16th June. The County Council have, however, asked to be notified not later than the 28th June of the Council's nomination of a representative to serve on the Education Committee.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, subject to the concurrence of the Willesden Borough Council, the Town Clerk be instructed to inform the County Council and the Middlesex Excepted Districts' Association that it is desired that the present representatives should continue to serve on the County Education Committee and the Advisory Committee respectively for the ensuing year.

# 25.-LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOUNDARY COMMISSION:

The Town Clerk reported on a conference which had been held on June 2nd of representatives of Non-County Boroughs in the Greater London area attended by the Deputy Mayor (Alderman A. W. Curton, F.R.S.A., M.Inst.B.E.), Alderman A. A. Naar, M.B.E., and the Town Clerk's representative. The conference had considered that part of the Local Government Boundary Commission Report for 1947 dealing with Greater London and decided to ask the Association of Municipal Corporations to urge the Minister of Health to introduce legislation without delay, with a view to:—

- (a) An amendment of Section 1 (1) of the Local Government (Boundary Commission) Act, 1945, so as to bring the administrative County of London within the terms of reference of the Commission thereby enabling the latter to deal with the administrative County and the Greater London area at the same time; and
- (b) the repeal of the Proviso to Section 2 (1) of the Local Government (Boundary Commission) Act, 1945, (which is to the effect that no part of the administrative County of Middlesex shall be constituted a County Borough). Noted.

# 26.-LETTING OF ROOMS:

The Town Clerk submitted an application from the Citizens' Advice Bureau for the use of a Committee Room for an "At Home" on Thursday, 21st October, 1948. Application is also made for the use of the kitchen.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application be granted on payment of the scale charge of £1 1s. Od. for the room and that no charge be made for the use of the kitchen.

#### 27.—ABSENCES OF STAFF:

The Borough Treasurer reported that 34 members of the staff had been reported absent owing to illness since the last meeting of the Committee; 11 members of the staff were still absent, including 3 previously reported. **Noted.**

# 11.-BOROUGH SURVEYOR'S DEPARTMENT -- STAFF:

### (a) Engineering Section.

#### (b) Assistant Parks Superintendent.

#### 1.-MINUTES:

The Minutes of the meeting held on the 17th February, 1948, were confirmed and signed by the Chairman.

#### 2.-SALVAGE BONUS SCHEME:

The Employees' Representatives presented a copy of a scheme adopted by another Local Authority, a copy of which had been previously circulated to members of the The Committee were advised of the resolution of the Council of 5th April last that no action on the question of a salvage incentive bonus should be taken until such time as an award in the matter had been made by the Joint Industrial Council. The Joint Secretary read communications from the Ministry of Health on the subject of the introduction of a schome of bonus payment.

The Joint Secretary also submitted a letter of May 3rd from the Employers' Secretary of the Joint Industrial Council stating that the National Council was discussing with the Board of Trade the question of incentive in the collection of salvage and that it was expected that these discussions would be completed shortly and a further communication sent.

In view of the decision of the Council and of the communication from the National Joint Industrial Council the Committee did not agree to a request made by the Employees' Secretary that the District Organiser of the National Union of Public Employees should be allowed to attend before the Committee.

RESOLVED-That further consideration of the question of salvage incentive bonus be deferred pending an award by the National Joint Industrial Council.

# 3.—HENDON URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL ACT, 1929;

The Joint Secretary reported that in accordance with this Committee's recommendation the Finance and General Purposes Committee had given consideration to the granting of an allowance or gratuity in eight border-line cases, but they were unable to recommend any departure from the existing regulations of the Council in respect of any of the cases referred to them.

In order that employees may be aware of the provisions of the Act and the regulations made by the Council governing the grant of an allowance or gratuity, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That instructions be given for the display in the Council's establishments of notices indicating clearly the conditions of eligibility for the grant of allowances or gratuities under the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929.

# 4.—ROAD SWEEPERS--PAYMENT FOR SNOW CLEARING:

The Joint Secretary reported that the consent of the Minister of Health had now the some concerns, the same in respect of the payment of £1 to each of the men neen received to the Borough Engineer as having been engaged mainly on snow clearing during the winter of 1946/47.

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#### 5.—PROTECTIVE CLOTHING:

The Joint Secretary submitted a letter from the Secretary of the Provincial Joint Industrial Council stating that to date there was no report on the subject of protective clothing. The Committee were reminded that this question had been deferred pending a report to be issued by the Joint Industrial Council as to which articles of clothing could be regarded as coming within the category of "protective clothing."

The Secretary of the Joint Industrial Council stated that in view of the present difficulty in obtaining permits for such clothing from the Board of Trade there  $\mathbf{w}_{34}$  a natural disposition on the part of the Joint Industrial Council to delay any recommendation as to the type of protective clothing which should be supplied.

The Employees' Side referred to the pre-war practice of men engaged on the Cleansing Section being issued with two suits of overalls; the present practice being for the men to be issued with one suit of overalls and one donkey jacket. They asked if arrangements could be made for two suits of overalls to be issued to each man entitled to have an issue of overalls.

#### RESOLVED-

- (1) That the Works Committee be recommended to arrange for the issue of two suits of overalls to each employee in the Council's service who at present is entitled to be supplied with overalls.
- (2) That the Works Committee be asked to give consideration to the question of the Council making arrangements for the laundering of the overalls issued to their employees.

#### · 6.—CONSTITUTION OF COMMITTEE:

The Joint Secretary submitted a letter from the Organiser of the National Union of Public Employees stating that one of the Employees' Representatives no longer held the confidence of the men who had elected him. The Joint Secretary informed the Committee that the member concernd was still qualified to retain his membership of the Committee and submitted suggestions for amendments to the Constitution if the Committee should wish to revise the period of office for Employees' Representatives (at present three years) or to revise the provisions for the period of office of the Employers' Representatives in view of the Representation of the People Bill.

RESOLVED-That consideration hereof be deferred to the next meeting.

#### 7.—CLEANSING SECTION—ANNUAL HOLIDAYS:

The Employees' Representatives referred to consideration given by the Committee at their meeting on the 24th June, 1947 (paragraph 2 (e)) to the question of additional men being engaged to provide replacements during the holiday period.

The Borough Surveyor informed the Committee that the tonnage collected during the summer months was substantially less than that during the winter months and that the normal practice was for not more than one man at a time to be absent from each gang of four. Overtime is paid for any extra hours actually worked. The Employees' Representatives stressed the point of view that gangs which were short owing to men absent on holiday still had to carry out the allotted quota of work and they asked for extra men to be available as relief to those absent on holiday.

MESOLVED—That the Works Committee be asked to give consideration to the question of additional men being engaged to act as relief for employees of the Cleansing Section absent on annual holiday.

#### 8.-MESSROOM-MILL HILL:

On consideration of a request from the Employees' Representatives for an earlier opening of the Messroom used by the Highways Section at Mill Hill, the Committee

RESOLVED-That the Works Committee be recommended to arrange for the Messroom to be opened at 7 a.m. each working day.

#### 9.—TIPPING GEAR:

The Employees' Representatives referred to an award of the Joint Industrial Council granting an extra 6d, a day to drivers of vehicles with trailers or tipping genr, and asked for retrospective payment thereof. The Borough Surveyor informed the Committee that the rate would be paid with effect from the date of the award now that the question of interpretation had been settled by the Joint Industrial Council.

# 10.--LAVATORY FACILITIES--EDGWARE:

The Employees' Representatives drew attention to the insufficiency of lavatory facilities in the Edgware area and were informed of the proposals in hand for providing lavatory accommodation at Edgwarebury Park.

# 11.-NOTIFICATION OF GRADING:

With the object of ensuring that employees should be advised of their grading, the Employees' Representatives asked that the grading should be indicated on the employee's pay packet. After discussion, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the Borough Treasurer be instructed to notify each employed of his or her grading and also of any changes of grading which may occur.

# 12.-DECISIONS OF THE JOINT INDUSTRIAL COUNCILS:

The Employees' Representatives referred to a decision of the Joint Industrial notification of this decision had not been received by the Employers' Secretary, the Committee instructed the Joint Secretary to communicate with the Provincial Joint Industrial Council asking for earlier notification of the Joint Industrial Council's decisions.

Arising from paragraph 11 (Notification of Grading) the Borough Treasurer reported that it was hoped to include on wage packets a code indicating the employee's grading. question of notification to each employee of his grading and of changes as they occur would appear to be a matter for the appropriate Chief Officers.

The Sub-Committee

#### RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Chief Officers be instructed to notify each employee of his or her grading and also of any changes of grading which may occur.
- (2) That with the exception of the recommendation in paragraph 11, the report of the Whitley Works Committee be approved and adopted.

## (2) ROAD SAFETY CAMPAIGN:

#### (a) Co-option.

The Sub-Committee gave further consideration to the letter from the Middlesex County Automobile Club seeking representation on the Sub-Committee.

The Sub-Committee were of opinion that it would also be desirable for a representative of the Pedestrians' Association to serve on the Committee, and

RESOLVED-That Mr. C. I. Robinson of the Middlesex County Automobile Club and also a representative of the Pedestrians' Association be invited to serve on the Sub-Committee.

# (b) Hampstead Garden Suburb Residents' Association.

The Sub-Committee considered a request for co-option from the Hampstead Garden  $8ub_{\Phi f_0^*}$  Residents' Association.

The Campaign Organiser was instructed to inform the Hampstead Garden Suburb Resideater Association that whilst the Sub-Committee appreciate their interest in Road Safety it is felt that Co-opted Members should represent organisations covering the whole of the Borough kid that in these circumstances they were anable to accede to their request.

## (c) Hasmonean Grammar School.

A request was submitted from the Hasmonean Grammar School for appropriate road signs to be erected in Holders Hill on either side of the School. The Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND—That "School" signs be erected on both sides of Holders Hill Road to indicate the proximity of the Hasmonean Grammar School.

#### (d) Road Safety Film Library.

It was reported that an invitation had been received from the St. Pancras Metropolitan Borough Council for representatives of the Sub-Committee to attend a Conference at 8t. Pancras Town Hall on the 22nd June to discuss the establishment of a Joint Film Library for the use of authorities in the London Area.

The Sub-Committee appointed the Campaign Organiser to attend this Conference.

#### (e) Propaganda Pamphlet.

A draft of a pamphlet to be circulated to the public during Safety Week together with three quotations for printing were submitted.

The Sub-Committee have authorised the Chairman to approve the acceptance of a tender for 20,000 pamphlets printed in three colours, and

### (g) Children's Safety Comic.

The Sub-Committee authorised the purchase of 5,000 copies of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents' new Children's Safety Comic "The Happy Highway" at a cost of £21 3s. 9d., to be distributed during Safety Week, and

RECOMMEND-That their action be approved.

#### (h) National Safety Congress.

Details of the National Safety Congress sponsored by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents, to be held from the 12th-15th October, 1948, were submitted. The fees for the Congress, which rank for grant, are £3 per delegate. The Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND—That the Campaign Organiser and the Borough Surveyor's representative be appointed to attend the National Safety Congress.

### (i) Safety First Narrative Crossword.

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#### (k) Resignation.

It was reported that Mrs. O. Dove had resigned from the Hendon Local Youth Committee and was therefore no longer eligible to serve as the Youth Committee's representative on the Sub-Committee.

## (3) ROAD ACCIDENTS:

The Borough Surveyor submitted details of street accidents during the months of April and May, together with a summary of street accidents since April, 1947.

Of the total of 620 accidents since April, 1947, 19 adults and 2 children were killed, 58 adults and 12 children were seriously injured and 414 adults and 415 children sustained only slight injuries.

In April, 1948, 4 adults and 1 child were seriously injured and 24 adults and 9 children were slightly injured.

In May, 1948, 4 child was killed, 3 adults seriously injured and 15 adults and 12 children slightly injured.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the report of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

#### 1.—TERMS OF REFERENCE:

(Hi.C., 9/6/47-9 (a)). To consider the whole question of Street Trading in Watling Avenue, with the object of making a recommendation for the alleviation of congestion in this road.

#### 2.-REPORT:

In their report adopted by the Highways Committee on the 2nd February, 1948, the Sub-Committee recommended the approval of the scheme prepared by the Boraugh Engineer and Surveyor for the provision of a car park and open-air market, including public layatory accommodation, in the neighbourhood of Watling Avenue. The Borough Treasurer was instructed to report further on the various financial questions involved, including the provision of stalls by the Council and appropriate charges made and, alternatively, for stalls to be provided by the traders.

At this meeting, the Borough Treasurer submitted a comprehensive report dealing with the financial implications of the scheme in relation to alternative methods of administering the market and car park.

The Town Clerk reported that as instructed he had investigated the possibility of obtaining an order from the Ministry of Transport prohibiting the parking of cars in Watling Avenue when the proposed car park has been provided. An application for such an order would require the support of the Commissioner of Police, who had stated, however, that in his opinion no application should be made until an opportunity had been given to study the effect of the remedial measures proposed by the Council.

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The Sub-Committee then proceeded to detailed consideration of the scheme, and RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Officers be instructed to proceed with negotiations for the acquisition of the land required for the market and car park;
- (2) That the scheme be put in hand as early as possible, on the basis that stalls shall be provided by the Council in accordance with the design now submitted by the Borough Surveyor;
- (3) That the Borough Surveyor he instructed to prepare plans and estimates for the making up of Back Lane under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875;
- (4) That the Finance and General Purposes Committee be asked to make the necessary financial provision.

Further particulars and recommendations are contained in manuscript in the Committee's Minute Book.

The estimated cost of the scheme on the lines now recommended by the Sub-Committee is £9,600. The annual expenditure involved is estimated at £2,078 and the annual income at £2,156, leaving a net surplus of £78.

The Committee expressed their appreciation to the officers for the comprehensive nature of the report which had been submitted, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the report of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

## 4.—TRAVELLING FACILITIES:

## (a) Canons Corner and Broadfields Estate.

The Town Clerk reported that pursuant to the Council's instructions (Hi.C., 1/3/48—4 (b)) he had made further representations to the London Transport Executive for the provision of a 'bus service from Edgware Station along Edgware Road to Canons Corner and for a circular route serving Broadfields Estate.

A reply has been received stating that examination of the traffic using trolleybus route 645 north of Edgware Station does not indicate that the present service is inadequate. The Executive cannot see their way to divert 'bus route 141 over the trolleybus route as this would considerably worsen conditions in the area of Edgwarebury Lane.

With regard to Broadfields Estate, the Executive point out that facilities are available by three 'bus routes on the Watford Bye-Pass within half-a-mile and there does not appear to be a strong traffic case for the provision of a 'bus service into the Estate; in any case the shortage of 'buses precludes the introduction of new services at the present time. An assurance is given, however, that should the Estate develop in a northerly direction the question of establishing a new service will be reviewed again. Noted.

## (b) 'Bus Stop-Lawrence Street, Mill Hill.

The Town Clerk reported that as instructed by the Council (Hi.C., 12/5/48-5 (b)) he had made further representations to the London Transport Executive for the reinstatement of the stopping place for southbound 'buses' on service 251 near the bottom of Lawrence Street.

In reply, the London Transport Executive state that the matter has been carefully considered but the traffic is considered insufficient to justify the reinstatement of the bus stop. It is pointed out that there is barely sufficient traffic to justify the retention of the stop for northbound buses, but it has been retained as the Executive do not wish to deprive the few who wish to use the facility they have enjoyed for so long.

# (c) High Street, Editware-Trolleybus Turning Points.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Edgware Ratepayers' Association drawing attention to obstruction caused by trolleybuses parking at the turning points in High Street, Edgware, and to the lack of conveniences for the employees of the London

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tim Cor Transport Executive at this point. The Association suggested that representations should be made to the Executive for the extension of the trolleybus service to Canons Corner, and for the erection of conveniences on the waste land in the vicinity of Canons

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the attention of the London Transport Executive be drawn to the maiters raised in the letter, and that they be asked whether they have any suggestions to make thereon.

# 5.—PRIVATE STREET WORKS:

## (a) Application to Ministry of Health.

The Town Clerk reminded the Committee that as reported to the Council at its last meeting the Minister of Health had intimated that he was prepared to apply for a starting date and to issue loan consent in respect of private street works in the following streets when notices had been served and competitive tenders obtained for the works:-

> Bittacy Rise Engel Park (part) Mount View Needham Terrace Johnston Terrace Gratton Terrace Midland Terrace Campion Terrace.

Notices have already been served in respect of the roads on the Railway Estate at Cricklewood, and in respect of Bittacy Rise, Engel Park and Mount View notices will be served on the frontagers at an early date.

The applications to which the Minister's decision relates covered 18 streets, but approval had not been given in respect of works for the following streets:--

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to obtain tenders for the carrying out of private street works in those cases in which the Minister's approval has been indicated.
- (2) That the cases for which approval has not been given by the Ministry be brought before the Committee for further consideration in January, 1949.

# (b) Footpath from Glendor Gardens to Millway, Mill Hill.

The Town Clerk reported that notices had been served on the five frontagers to the footpath between Glendor Gardens and Millway, and the period allowed for making up would expire on the 4th August, 1948. Objections have been made by all the frontagers concerned to the making up of this footpath to the standard proposed at the present time, and they also contend that the cost should be horne in full by the Borough Council.

RESOLVED -That consideration of this matter be deferred for a report by the Town Clerk on the legal position in relation to the making up of ancient highways.

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6.—STREET TRADING:

# (a) Alleged Transfer of Licence.

The Town Clerk reported that pursuant to the Committee's instructions (Hi.C., 24/5/48-3 (d)) he had enquired of Mr. Laverack as to the circumstances in which the site for which he was licensed to trade was being occupied by a Mr. Drew.

Mr. Laverack had stated that he had traded with Mr. Drew's assistance until Christmas, 1947, but had since given up trading pending the return of his son from H.M. Forces. He had now decided, however, to discontinue street trading in Watling Avenue and had returned his licence to the Town Clerk for cancellation. Noted.

## (b) 59, Watling Avenue.

In connection with the recent re-arrangement of street trading sites in Watling Avenue, in order to prevent obstruction to the view of traffic entering Watling Avenue from Barnfield Road, the fruit vendor previously licensed to trade outside No. 57, Watling Avenue was moved to a point outside No. 59.

The Town Clerk submitted a complaint received from the occupiers of No. 59, Watling Avenue, who are retailers of fruit and vegetables, that the presence of the street trader outside their premises has done considerable harm to their trade. It had been pointed out that the vendor in question had been trading outside the adjoining shop since 1939, but the complainants asked that he should now be moved.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That subject to the concurrence of the shopkeeper concerned, the licence issued to Mr. H. T. Whytock be varied to permit him to sell fruit and vegetables outside No. 63, Watling Avenue.

### (c) Applications for Licences.

The Town Clerk submitted the following applications for Street Trading Licences:—

The Committee were informed that the Commissioner of Police strongly recommended that on traffic grounds licences should not be granted for Street Trading in Back Lane or Barnfield Road. He also had in mind the Council's decision of 26th July, 1947 (Hi.C., 7/7/47—2 (a)) that Watling Avenue be no longer considered a suitable place for Street Trading but that the existing licensees be permitted to continue trading there for the present.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the applications be disapproved. (d) Offences.

The Town Clerk reported that in accordance with authority given (Hi.C., 15/9/47—3 (b)) warning letters had been addressed and proceedings taken in respect of street trading offences as follows:—

#### (e) Mill Hill.

Reference was made to two cases of unlicensed street trading in the Mill Hill Ward and the Committee gave instructions for the necessary investigations to be made with a view to the discontinuance of such trading.

#### 7.—STREET LIGHTING:

## (a) Attachments to Trolleybus Poles.

The Town Clerk reported that in connection with the improved lighting scheme for Edgware Road the London Transport Executive had given permission for street lighting fixtures to be attached to 86 trolleybus poles, subject to the execution of a suitable agreement and to the payment of a nominal rental of 1/- per annum for each fixture.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the terms suggested by the London Transport Executive be accepted, and that authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to the necessary documents.

## (b) Hampstead Carden Suburb.

The Borough Surveyor reported that in response to the application for approval to proceed with the improved lighting scheme in the Garden Suburb the Ministry of Transport had intimated that the general position is still such that support cannot be The Council's desire to effect given, even to the modified proposals put forward. improvement in the lighting is appreciated, but only work which is considered essential for traffic safety or for the prevention of crime can be permitted at the present time. The Council's proposals will be borne in mind and re-examined when conditions improve. Noted.

## 8.—MAINTENANCE OF FOOTPATHS:

## (a) Contracts.

At their last meeting (Hi.C., 24/5/48-14) the Committee authorised the execution of contracts with Messrs. S. C. Bent and F. C. Cooksley for maintenance work to public footpaths in the Borough for the year 1948/49.

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The Borough Surveyor reported that the firm of Messrs. Cooksley were in liquidation, but he had received a quotation from Mr. A. G. Palin which was the same as that of Messrs. Cooksley except that the price for re-laying kerbs was slightly lower.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND -

- (1) That a contract be entered into with Mr. A. C. Palin for maintenance work to public footpaths in the Borough for the year 1948/49 and that authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to the necessary document.
- (2) That the Borough Surveyor he instructed to endeavour to obtain and accept quotations from other contractors for the carrying out of footpath repairs within the amount of the financial estimates.

## (b) Green Lane, Edgware.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Edgware Ratepayers' Association drawing attention to the bad condition of the pavements in Green Lane, Edgware, and asking that some improvement might be effected.

The Borough Surveyor stated that it was hoped to deal with the pavements in this road at an early date under the Contracts already held, and the Committee

RESOLVED-That the Edgware Ratepayers' Association be informed accordingly.

#### 9.—USE OF CINEMA CAR PARKS:

The Town Clerk reported that in accordance with the Council's instructions (Hi.C., 17/11/47—17 (d)) enquiry had been made of the proprietors of local cinemas whether the use of their car parks could be allowed to the general public during shopping hours. He submitted a summary of the replies received. In three cases car parks could not be made available, in three other cases the use of the car parks was offered on terms including the provision of an attendant by the Council, and in the remaining two cases the proprietors enquired whether, in the event of facilities being granted, the Council would provide an attendant.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no further action be taken in this matter.

#### 10.—CYCLING ON FOOTPATHS:

## (a) Proposed Bye-law.

The Town Clerk reported that pursuant to the Council's instructions (Hi.C., 5/1/48—8) he had approached the Home Office with a view to obtaining their approval to the making of one bye-law prohibiting cycling on the five footpaths which have recently been considered in this connection.

He reported that the Secretary of State had intimated that he is prepared, subject to the consideration of any objections which he may receive, to confirm a bye-law in the terms of the draft submitted with slight drafting amendment, if it is formally adopted by the Council and submitted in accordance with the usual procedure.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND ---

- (1) That the Gouncil make a bye-law in the form set out in the Appendix to this report prohibiting cycling on certain footpaths in the Borough, in pursuance of powers contained in Section 249 of the Local Government Act, 1833-
- (2) That the Town Clerk be authorised to take the necessary steps for the confirmation of such bye-law.
- (3) That authority he given for the Corporate Scal to be affixed to the bye-law(b) Hampstead Heath Extension.

The Town Clerk reported that as instructed by the Council he had written to the London County Council making further representations for the continuance of the concession to housewives permitting them to cycle across the Hampstead Heath Extension.

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He submitted a letter received from the Clerk of the London County Council stating that that Council is not prepared to vary its decision. **Noted.** 

# HE-MAKING UP OF FOOTPATH-HARTLAND DRIVE, EDGWARE:

The Borough Surveyor reminded the Committee that J. Laing & Son Limited had entered into an agreement with the Council for the provision of a footpath on the northern side of Hartland Drive for the use of children attending Broadfields School. He now reported the receipt of a letter from the firm pointing out that the footpath will be disturbed when connections have to be made from houses to the surface water and soil sewers, and requesting an assurance from the Council that no charge will be made on them for any reinstatement work. In the case of the Supply Companies the reinstatement must be carried out by the Council in the normal way at the expense of the Companies concerned.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That J. Laing and Son Limited be informed that the Council are prepared to pay the cost of any reinstatement works which may be necessary to the footpath as a result of connections to the surface water and soil sewers.

## 12.—CABLE DISTRIBUTION CABINETS:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application from the Post Office Telegraphs for consent to the erection of a Cable Distribution Cabinet on the east side of Annesley Avenue at its junction with Colindale Avenue. Permission was given in September. 1946, for the Post Office to erect such cabinets not exceeding 30 in number in the Borough, and the total number of applications received, including the present one, was still within the limit fixed.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That subject to the precise site of the Cabinet being agreed with the Borough Surveyor the application be approved.

## 13.-IMPROVEMENT OF FRITH LANE, MILL IIIIA:

The Borough Surveyor reported the receipt of a letter from the Middlesex County Council relating to the provision of a 'bus service from Frith Lane linking the Woodside Park Estate with Hendon.

The letter pointed out that there are no single-deek 'buses available to run the service along Frith Lane, and the London Transport Executive consider that the matter should be dealt with by the extension of route 125 as soon as the railway bridge in Frith Lane is lowered to permit the passage of double-deek 'buses and the requisite vehicles are available. The Executive are unable to give the undertaking required by the Ministry that the service will be introduced as soon as the road works are completed, but are of opinion that the work should be carried out without undue delay so that when the rolling stock position permits, the extension of this route can be proceeded with immediately. A copy of the letter has been sent by the Middlesex County Council to the Ministry of Transport. **Noted.** 

#### 14.—LEE ROAD, MILL HILL:

The Borough Surveyor reported the receipt of a petition signed by 35 residents in Lee Road stating that aithough the road was developed more than 11 years ago no scavenging has been carried out. The road was made before the war but the developer at that time had declined to enter into an agreement with the Council for it to be taken over as a public highway. Its condition is such that the works necessary to bring it up to proper standard would not involve excessive cost.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to prepare plans and estimates for the making up of Lee Road under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and that the Town Clerk be instructed to inform the frontagers of the probable cost involved in making up the road before any further steps are taken.

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# 15.—HOLDERS HILL CIRCUS—PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS:

At their meeting on the 5th April, 1948 (Hi.C., 1/3/48—3) the Council decided, subject to the approval of the Middlesex County Council and the Ministry of Transport, to provide pedestrian crossings at each of the four roads at Holders Hill Circus and for this purpose to re-site the refuges in Dollis Road, at a total cost not exceeding £150.

The Borough Surveyor reported that the Ministry of Transport had approved the scheme but had increased the estimate to £174 to provide for the conversion of the refuges to the "walk-through" type. The matter would be reported to the County Highways Committee at their next meeting with a recommendation for approval, subject to the Council agreeing to defray half the cost after deduction of the Ministry's grant. The net cost to this Council would, therefore, be approximately £35.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That approval be given to the carrying out of the revised scheme at a cost to the Council of approximately £35.

## 16,-DEANS LANE AND ORANGE HILL ROAD-DUAL CARRIAGEWAY SIGNS:

At their meeting on the 26th January, 1948 (Hi.C., 5/1/48-14 (b)) the Council approved a scheme for the erection of illuminated "Keep Left Dual Carriageway" signs on the islands in Deans Lane and Orange Hill Road, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Transport and the Middlesex County Council. The estimated cost of the work was £120.

The Borough Surveyor reported that the Ministry of Transport have elaborated the Council's proposals, and suggested additional signs which would bring all three sections of dual carriageway within the London Traffic (Dual Carriageway) Restrictions. The estimated cost of the work is accordingly increased to £294 and the annual maintenance and running costs of the signs estimated on current prices would be approximately £45.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the revised proposals of the Ministry of Transport be accepted, and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit the amended scheme to the Middlesex County Council for approval.

## 17.—MAINTENANCE OF HIGHWAYS—ASPHALTE SURFACING:

The Borough Surveyor submitted three tenders received for the carrying out of repairs to the asphalte surfacing of highways for which provision was made in the financial estimates for the current year. The tenders covered 32 different unit prices and in all cases the tender received from Constable Hart & Co. Ltd. is the lowest. This firm's tender is also the lowest received for the supply of binder for making up depressions and restoring to profile.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the tender of Constable Hart & Co. Ltd. for the repairs to asphalte surfacing of highways be accepted.
- (2) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents.

#### 18.—OVERHANGING HEDGES:

The Committee were informed that hedges at Nos. 56 and 66, Bridge Lane were over-hanging the public footway, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be authorised to take all necessary steps under Section 23 of the Public Health Act, 1925, for the prevention of the obstructions.

# 19.—NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD—UNAUTHORISED SIGNS:

The Committee were informed that a caterer providing refreshments in Brent Park had erected a sign on the grass verge of the North Circular Road.

RESOLVED-That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to take the necessary action for the removal of the sign.

#### DRAFT BYE-LAW

for the

# GOOD RULE AND COVERNMENT OF THE BOROUGH.

1. In so far as the Council may indicate by notices conspicuously exhibited alongside any of the footpaths described in the Schedule to this bye-law that the riding of bicycles, tricycles, or other similar machines on such footpath is prohibited, no person shall ride any such bicycle, tricycle, or other similar machine upon such footpath.

Provided that this Bye-law shall not apply to any person riding a bicycle, tricycle, or other similar machine, otherwise than to the obstruction or danger of any other person lawfully using such a footpath—

- (a) on any footpath in the Schedule to this Bye-law if the person so riding has lawful authority so to do; or
- (b) on either of the footpaths numbered 1 and 4 in the Schedule to this Bye-law, if the person so riding is bona fide going to or coming from premises abutting on that footpath.
- 2. Any person offending against the foregoing Bye-law shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding five pounds.

## SCHEDULE

- The footpath known as Church Way (leading from Station Road to Fairfield Crescent).
- 2. The footpath from Edgwarebury Lane, opposite to its junction with Purcells Avenue, to The Drive.
- 3. The footpath from Station Road, Edgware, past the northern boundary of the premises of the London Transport Executive to Brook Avenue.
- 4. The footpath from Aerodrome Road to Colindeep Lane, Hendon.
- 5. The footpath from West Way to Brook Avenue, Edgware.

## 1.-REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £2,761 2s. 3d. were submitted and approved.

## 2 - ENTERTAINMENTS IN PARKS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Entertainments Licensing Section of the County Engineer and Surveyor's Department referring to their letter of the 3rd June, 1946, wherein attention was called to the inflammable condition of the stages and dressing rooms at Hendon and Watling Parks. Arising out of an inspection of the stages and dressing rooms in connection with the licensing for entertainments during the current season, the County Engineer notes that the arrangements have not yet been improved and he enquires whether the Council contemplate carrying out in the near future alterations with a view to providing more permanent stages and dressing rooms of fire resisting construction at each of the Parks. The appropriate licences have been granted by the County Council for this season's entertainments. The Committee have duly noted the position and will give consideration to the points raised by the County Engineer at a later date.

#### 3.--FAIRS IN PARKS AND OPEN SPACES:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Showmen's Guild of Great Britain stating that their attention had been drawn to the decision of the Council to refuse to allow fairs to operate in their area and asking the Committee to receive a deputation to discuss the matter. Having regard to the fact that the Council have not prohibited fairs in the area but only in its Parks and Open Spaces no useful purpose would appear to be served by the reception of a deputation. The Committee, therefore,

RESOLVED-That the Showmen's Guild be informed accordingly,

# 4.—WATLING PARK PAVILION ACCOMMODATION:

The Committee's recommendation hereon was taken back at the last meeting of the Council in view of the fact that the Chairman had agreed to the reception of a deputation from the Watling Community Association at this meeting to discuss the question of pavilion accommodation in the above-mentioned Park,

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The deputation, which consisted of Messrs, E. Cole, A. R. Lodge, R. N. Molloy and A. V. Stevens, referred to the lack of lavatory accommodation in the Park and stated that the public convenience in Orange Hill Road was not within easy reach of persons using the bowling green. They also asked for the pavilion to be made available for the use of clubs using the bowling green. After the deputation had retired the Committee gave further consideration to the matter, and

RESOLVED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit an estimate of the costs of (i) the provision of a small temporary building for the purpose of lavatory accommodation on the south side of the tennis courts adjoining Colchester Road; (ii) the erection of a building for the purpose of storing tools, etc., and (iii) the provision of forms for seating accommodation in the existing pavilion.

## 5.-FOOTBALL PITCHES-INCREASED CHARGES:

The Committee received a deputation consisting of Alderman R. J. Cleaver (Hampstead Borough Council), Messrs, F. F. Taylor and R. J. Geary from the Hendon and District Football League on the subject of the 100% increase in the charges for the use of football pitches in the parks and open spaces. The deputation stressed the financial hardship such increase would cause to the Youth Clubs in the district who had great difficulty in obtaining sufficient funds to meet the considerably increased expenses of their Clubs. They also suggested that in the circumstances a 50% increase would have been preferable, and that the dressing accommodation should be improved at the West Hendon Playing Fields.

Having considered all the points raised by the deputation, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council re-affirm their previous decision hereon.

#### 6.-HENDON PIRATES CYCLE SPEEDWAY CLUB:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Wembley and District Cycle Speedway Control Board referring to a piece of land at Brent Hill Farm. Park Road, Hendon—which had been used as a cycle track by the Hendon Pirates Cycle Speedway Club until it was recently fenced in by the Council—and enquiring whether the ground is required for an immediate purpose and, if not, whether they could be permitted to continue racing on this track until the end of the season, which is scheduled for the middle of September. Alternatively, they enquire whether the Council can suggest another site to accommodate the Club. The League have been informed by the Town Clerk that the land in question has been owned by the Council for a number of years and will in due course be used for educational purposes by the County Council.

There are a number of tenants on the site using various buildings and garages, etc., and many complaints have been received from these tenants as to the unauthorised entry by cyclists belonging to the Club referred to who have been trespassing on the Council's property. The fence has been erected to prevent trespass and to protect the Council's tenants,

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken by the Town Clerk be confirmed and that the Control Board be informed that any application submitted by them for an alternative site on land belonging to the Council will be considered on its merits.

#### 7.—MONTROSE PLAYING FIELDS—SPORTS MEETING:

With reference to the approval given by the Committee at the last meeting (E.P. & A.C., 24/5/48-15 (b)) to the use of the above-mentioned playing fields for a sports meeting by the Hendon Boy Scouts on the 29th May, the Borough Surveyor reported that the date of the event had now been altered to the 10th July. **Noted.** 

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In connection with the use of the camp site in Moat Mount Open Space by the Local Youth Committee, the Borough Surveyor submitted for the formal approval of the Committee the following proposals:—

- (a) Alterations to existing lavatory accommodation on the ground as shown on Plan No. 691;
- (b) The fencing of the site with chain link fencing 5 feet in height as shown on Plan No. E.83.1.

It is understood that the work will be carried out by and at the cost of the Middlesex County Council.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the above proposals be approved on the understanding that the work is carried out by the County Council to the satisfaction of the Borough Surveyor.

#### 9.—CHILDS HILL PARK:

## (a) Bowling Green.

In connection with the Committee's decision to increase the fee payable by the Golders Green Bowling Club from 30/- to 35/- per club member with a minimum of 35 members, the Borough Surveyor reported that the Secretary of the Club had called attention to the resolution of the Council passed on the 30th June, 1947, to the effect that until such time as the ground is re-laid the Club be allowed the use of the ground at the previous charge, viz., £30 per annum; or £1 10s. Od. per club member whichever is the greater.

Having regard to the fact that the ground is in a reasonable condition and the user thereof is very small, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the licence to the Colders Creen Bowling Club be renewed on the same terms as last year and that notice be given to the Club that these terms shall not apply after the end of the present season.

#### (b) Provision of Windows, Golders Green Laundry.

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the Golders Green Laundry whose premises are in Nant Road, asking for permission to provide four windows in the wall of their building which overlooks Childs Hill Park.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Colders Green Laundry be permitted to provide such windows, subject to the payment of a nominal rental, and to the execution of an agreement in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk.

#### 10.—DOLLIS BROOK RIVERSIDE WALK—NOTICE BOARD:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application from the Woodside Park Rate-payers' and Residents' Association asking for permission to erect a notice board on the Council's land adjacent to the Brook at the junction of Linkside with Furshy Avenue. Having regard to the amenities of the Council's Open Spaces, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That such application be disapproved.

## 11.—HENDON GROVE—MIDDLESEX EAST GIRL GUIDES—CAMP FIRE:

An application was submitted by the Borough Surveyor from the Divisional Secretary of the Middlesex East Girl Guides asking for permission to use Hendon Grove on the 24th July next for the purpose of a Camp Fire.

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RESOLVED.—That permission be granted to the Middlesex East Girl Guides to use Hendon Grove for the purpose of a Camp Fire on the 24th July next, subject to the Council being indemnified in respect of any damage to the ground and in all other respects, and to the position and size of any camp fires being approved by the Borough Surveyor.

## 12.—BASING HILL PARK—ANNUAL SCOUTS MEETING:

The Borough Surveyor reported on an application from the 2nd Golders Green Boy Scouts for permission to hold their annual scouts meeting in the above-mentioned Park during the afternoon of Saturday, the 17th July, The Golders Green Boy Scouts have been allowed the use of this Park for a number of years past for their annual meetings and in view of the date of the meeting, the Borough Surveyor has granted the required permission subject to the usual indemnity.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the action taken by the Borough Surveyor be confirmed.

### 13.-LAND AT THE JUNCTION OF WEST WAY WITH FARM ROAD, EDGWARE:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a suggestion by the Hon. Secretary of the Edgware Horticultural Society that the above-mentioned piece of land should be laid out and provided with seats for the use of local residents.

RESOLVED-That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit a lay-out plan and estimate to the next meeting of the Committee.

#### 14.-LAND-DOLLIS BROOK RIVERSIDE WALK-REAR OF KINGS CLOSE, HENDON:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a plan shewing a portion of the Dollis Brook Riverside Walk at the rear of Kings Close on which there has been encroachment by the adjacent householders who are using portions of the land as allotments.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the portions of the land in question be let on lease for a period not exceeding seven years, subject to the payment of a an appropriate rental, and on the understanding that the Council will not be required to provide water supplies or fencing.

## 15.—COPTHALL PLAYING FIELDS—LAND FOR FOOTBALL PITCHES:

In connection with the Committee's decision to set aside a portion of Copthall Playing Fields for football pitches, the Borough Surveyor submitted a letter from the County of Middlesex Agricultural Executive Committee stating that it is not in a position to agree to the release of this land from agriculture and requesting that it should be cross ploughed, limed, summer fallowed and sown in the autumn with a cereal crop.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for this land to be dealt with on the lines indicated by the Middlesex Agricultural Executive Committee.

#### 16.—HENDON PARK TEMPORARY ALLOTMENTS:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from Mr. F. C. T. Evershed referring to the wilful and malicious damage caused to crops on his allotments in Hendon Park and enquiring whether it would be possible for the Council to erect fencing round the allot-The Committee have instructed the Borough Surveyor to submit an estimate of the cost of the provision of fencing around the allotments in question, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That warning notices against trespass be exhibited in the vicinity of the plots in question.

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# 17.—NATIONAL ALLOTMENTS AND GARDENS SOCIETY LIMITED—ANNUAL CONFERENCE:

A report was submitted by Mr. C. F. Windust on the above-mentioned Conference held at Brighton from the 27th to the 29th May, 1948. The Committee have duly noted such report and expressed their thanks to Mr. Windust for attending the Conference and for his report thereon.

## 18.—WAR-TIME ALLOTMENTS IN OPEN SPACES:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the County Valuer stating that after considering the views of local authorities in Middlesex on the need for cultivation of existing war-time allotments on open space lands, the County Council have agreed to the retention of such allotments until December, 1950, subject to the position being reviewed again not later than March, 1950. **Noted.** 

## 19.—SITE FOR ALLOTMENTS NEAR FRITH MANOR SCHOOL:

In connection with the provision of land in the vicinity of Frith Manor School, in lieu of the land at present used for allotment purposes, and which will ultimately be used for educational purposes, the Borough Surveyor reported that the whole of the land in reasonable vicinity to this Estate is occupied for agricultural purposes.

The Borough Surveyor therefore suggested that he should enter into negotiations with the owners of such land with a view to obtaining some five or six acres of land for allotment purposes.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to enter into negotiations on the lines of his report.

#### 20.—BROADFIELDS AVENUE ALLOTMENTS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that in pursuance of the Committee's instructions (E.P. & A.C., 12/4/48—20) he had approached Mrs. Allen of Bury Farm with a view to obtaining her agreement to contribute 50% of the cost of providing fencing along the northern boundary of the above-mentioned allotments. Mrs. Allen has indicated that she has nothing to do with the land on the north side of these allotments and is, therefore, not interested in the erection of the fencing. Enquiries have been made of the Hampstead Borough Council, the freeholders of the land, for information as to the lessees and it appears that such land is leased to Mr. Angus Keen to whom a similar suggestion as to fencing has been made. Mr. Keen states that he has no cattle grazing anywhere within half a mile of the allotments in question and that the land on the north side of the allotments has been under the plough for the past five years. The Committee duly **noted** the report, and

RESOLVED-That no further action be taken in the matter.

#### 21—HOSPITAL FIELD ALLOTMENTS:

#### (a) Cleansing of Stream.

In accordance with the instructions of the Committee (E.P. & A.C., 24/5/48—34) the Borough Surveyor reported that an inspection had been made of the brook which divides the Hospital Fields Allotments and the Vale Allotments from the adjacent housing scheme and playing fields. The total length of the watercourse is approximately 500 yards and the cost of clearing the invert of the brook so as to preserve a free watercourse is £150. To carry out a scheme for straightening and improving the brook would cost a large sum of money and the Borough Surveyor is of opinion that consent to such a scheme would not be forthcoming at the present time.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the clearing of the stream at an estimated cost of £150.

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### (b) Repairs to Cate and Fencing.

The Borough Surveyor reported on a request from the Federation for the gate nearest to the Hendon Way Depôt to be repaired and also for a gap in the fence between the Depôt and the allotments to be made good. The Federation also request the supply of clinkers for the front of the trading but. The estimated cost of carrying out this work is £10.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the necessary work to be carried out.

#### 22\_FENCING AND WATER SUPPLY:

The Borough Surveyor reported with regard to a number of requests from the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies for the erection of fencing, and the provision of water supplies at various allotment sites.

RESOLVED—That the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies be invited to submit a list of the sites on which in their opinion fencing and water supplies are required and, on the receipt of such list, the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit estimates of the cost of the work involved with a view to making provision in next year's estimates.

#### 23.-THE VALE ALLOTMENTS:

The Federation have requested the provision of clinkers on the road leading to the above-mentioned allotments and the Borough Surveyor reported that this work will be undertaken in the near future. Noted.

#### 24.—DEANS LANE ALLOTMENTS:

The Borough Surveyor reported on a request from the Federation for a fence to be erected at the western end of this site to replace the existing fence which is in need of repair. The estimated cost of the work is £8, and the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to carry out this work.

#### 25.—CHILDS HILL ALLOTMENTS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the Federation had requested the removal from Plot No. 79 of the small building built during the War by the Advance Laundry for Civil Defence purposes, and which the County Council were requested some time ago to arrange to have removed.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That a further request be made to the Middlesex County Council for the removal of the building in question.

#### 26.—FINCHLEY ROAD ALLOTMENTS—WATER SUPPLY:

It was reported by the Borough Surveyor that the allottees were prepared to pay 25% of the cost of the provision of a water supply at the above-mentioned allotments. The estimated cost of such provision is £25.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in the matter. .

#### 1.—ABSENCE OF MEMBERS:

An apology was received from Councillor Griffiths for his absence from the meeting, due to the fact that he is expecting to go into hospital shortly.

RESOLVED.—That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to Councillor Griffiths expressing the Committee's regret at the cause of his absence and conveying their good wishes for a speedy recovery.

#### 2.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £4,668 7s. 6d. were submitted and approved.

#### 3.—BRIARDALE GARDENS, HAMPSTEAD -SURFACE WATER DRAINAGE:

On the 26th January, 1948 (W.C., 12/1/48—12), in response to an application from the Hampstead Borough Council, permission was given for the drainage of surface water from Nos. 19/35, Briardale Gardens, Hampstead, into this Council's surface water sewer.

The Town Clerk reported that the Hampstead Borough Council have undertaken the repair and further maintenance of the surface water sewer in their district and have found it necessary to alter its line slightly so that for part of its length it will run within the Borough of Hendon. The Hampstead Borough Council accordingly applied for the formal consent of this Council under Section 17 (2) of the Public Health (London) Act, 1936, to the carrying out of the work within its boundaries. They also asked for confirmation that this Council will agree to the connection of the new length of sewer to the Hendon surface water sewer in the same way as the former sewer was connected.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That formal consent be given under Section 17 (2) of the Public Health (London) Act, 1936, to the carrying out by the Hampstead Borough Council of the work in question on condition that the length of surface water sewer for the section from Briardale Gardens to the connection in Finchley Road should remain vested in the Hampstead Borough Council.
- (2) That the Hampstead Borough Council be informed that this Council agrees to the connection of the new length of sewer to the Hendon surface water sewer in Finchley Road.

Recommendation of Finance and General Purposes Committee.

Add to Recommendation 2:-

subject to the Hampstead Borough Council accepting financial responsibility for any charge which may be made by the Middlesex County Council, and to a further endorsement to the Agreement of 6th September, 1899, being made in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk, and

(3) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents. SALV.

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4.-SALVAGE:

#### (a) Waste Food Bins.

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a complaint from the occupiers of 116/118, Cricklewood Broadway, N.W. 2, regarding alleged nuisance, particularly in warm weather, from four waste food bins outside their premises. The complainants had been informed that regular collections are made from the bins in question and a considerable quantity of pig food obtained therefrom, and that the bins are kept in good order and regularly cleaned by the Borough Surveyor's Department. In reply they had suggested that they have had a reasonable share of the inconvenience caused by the bins, which should now be moved to another site, possibly in a nearby side road.

The Borough Surveyor pointed out that the collection of waste food, which is being carried on under the direction of the Board of Trade, is as urgent and necessary now as it was during the war, and that the amount collected would probably drop if the bins were moved from their present site.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the complainants be informed that the Council are unable to agree to the removal of the bins in question.

#### (b) Kitchen Waste.

At their meeting on the 5th April, 1948 (W.C., 8/3/48—3 (c)) the Council were informed that the Tottenham Borough Council had been asked to provide details of the accounts relating to their Kitchen Waste processing plant, for consideration by a Conference of Local Authorities concerned, which was to be convened by the Southgate Borough Council. The matter arose out of their decision to reduce the allowance paid to Authorities sending kitchen waste to the Plant.

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of information that Tottenham propose to revert to the payment of the maximum allowance of 10/- per ton for the half-year ended 31st March, 1948. They have adhered to their decision to pay 5/- per ton for the half-year ended 30th September, 1947. This is regarded as a reasonably satisfactory settlement, and it is not now proposed to hold the Conference. **Noted.** 

#### (c) Salvage Return.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a statement (copies of which had previously been circulated) showing the tonnage of salvage disposed of for the years ended 31st March, 1946, 1947 and 1948, and the period from 1st April to 31st May, 1948, together with particulars of the value of the salvage under the various headings.

He also reported that the number of streets or large blocks of flats on a weekly basis of collection was 740 and the number on a basis between 1 and 2 weeks was 68.

Noted.

#### (d) Salvage Drive.

The Committee gave further consideration to the question of stimulating the collection of salvage, particularly of waste paper, and the Borough Surveyor reported on the results obtained from the experimental use of "posting boxes" for the reception of waste paper at Woodside Park and Pennine Drive.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Chairman of the Committee, in consultation with the Borough Surveyor, be authorised to approve a draft notice to householders incorporating a card bearing a large letter "S" for display by householders in their windows when they have waste paper for collection.
- (2) That such notices and cards be distributed in the first place in the Edgware and Burnt Oak Wards only, if possible by the Service Organisation.
- (3) That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to provide an additional "posting box" for the reception of waste paper at the Green Man Junction.

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## (e) Scrap Metal.

The Borough Surveyor reported on his efforts to arrange for the removal of a large number of metal water tanks from the Depot, and stated that he was in negotiation with a firm who quoted prices for tins and scrap metal similar to those at present obtained by the Council, and would probably be prepared to remove the water tanks.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to continue his negotiations with the firm referred to, and to accept any suitable offer, not less than the existing prices for tins and scrap metal, which they may make.

## (f) National Waste Paper Contest.

The Borough Surveyor reported the results of the efforts of the Refuse Collecting and Salvage Sections in the National Waste Paper Contest during the three months ended 31st May, 1948, as follows:—

#### 5.—FLOODING—OAKHAMPTON ROAD, MILL HILL:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from a resident of Oakhampton Road, Mill Hill, complaining of flooding of parts of that road after heavy rain, and suggesting that it is caused by the surface water ditch in Ashley Lane being choked with debris.

The Borough Surveyor reminded the Committee that a surface water sewer is at present being laid at the rear of the houses in Oakhampton Road, and stated that he would submit to the Committee at a later stage a further scheme of surface water sewer extensions in the area of Oakhampton Road and other roads in the vicinity.

The Committee noted the report of the Borough Surveyor, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the complainant be informed that the question of piping the watercourse in Ashley Lane will be considered in the near future.

#### 6.—PURCHASE OF DIESEL OIL ROLLER:

At their last meeting (W.C., 31/5/48—7) the Committee instructed the Town Clerk to enquire from Marshall Sons & Co., Ltd., whose tender for the supply of an 8-ton Diesel road roller had been accepted, whether in view of the policy of the Government that price increases should be avoided, they propose to insist on the rise-and-fall clause in the Contract.

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a reply from the Contractors stating that it is their endeavour to avoid price increases, but that their manufacturing costs are in turn controlled to some extent by prices fixed by the Government and accordingly they have to make provision for a rise in such costs.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That a contract be entered into with Marshall Sons & Co., Ltd., for the supply of an 8-ton Diesel Oil Roller in accordance with their tender of £1,750, subject to the usual rise-and-fall clause.
- (2) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to the necessary document.

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## 7.—TESTING AND REPAIR OF FIRE EQUIPMENT:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Clerk of the Middlesex County Council stating that the following standard charges have been fixed by the County Council for testing and repair of fire fighting equipment undertaken by the County Fire Service:—

# 9.—SURFACE WATER SEWERS—OAKHAMPTON ROAD AND DEVONSHIRE ROAD, MILL HILL:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a progress report on the construction of the new surface water sewers at Oakhampton Road and Devonshire Road, Mill Hill. In Oakhampton Road nearly 90% of the concrete tubes have been laid and three of the six surface water chambers are nearing completion. In Devonshire Road 70% of the tubes surface water chambers are nearing completed. Noted.

## 10.—RENTERS AVENUE PIG CLUB—TRADE EFFLUENT:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application from the Renters Avenue Pig Club for permission to discharge effluent from the pig sties into the adjacent sewer, and reported that approval has been given by the Middlesex County Council on the following conditions:—

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- That the Club shall pay to the Borough Council, for the County Council, the cost of treatment at the County Council's purification works, calculated at approximately 1/3d, per pig per annum, subject to a minimum annual charge of £2.
- 2. That the trade effluent shall consist only of waste waters from the pig sties,
- 3. That no more than 200 gallons shall be discharged into the Council's sewer during any one period of 24 hours without the prior consent of the County Council.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the application of the Renters Avenue Pig Club be approved, subject to the execution of an agreement on the usual terms, incorporating the conditions imposed by the Middlesex County Council, and providing for payment by the Pig Club of the cost of any special maintenance and cleansing of sewers which may be involved.
- (2) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to the necessary document.

## 11,-RAILWAY ESTATE, CRICKLEWOOD-NEW SURFACE WATER OUTLET:

The Borough Surveyor reported that in connection with the making up of the roads on the Railway Bstate under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, it will first be necessary to replace the existing 9-inch sewer in Edgware Road with one of greater capacity. He submitted a scheme for the provision of a pipe 18 inches in diameter discharging into the watercourse to the north of the nearby railway bridge, at an estimated cost of £600.

He reminded the Committee that it was originally proposed to include this scheme in an application for a composite loan consent embodying several sewerage projects, but in view of the difficult and complicated nature of the scheme he now recommended that the work should be carried out by direct labour.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to carry out the scheme submitted by direct labour, employing the members of the Sewers Section, at an estimated cost of £600.

#### 12.—DISMANTLING AND COLLECTION OF MORRISON SHELTERS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the work of dismantling and collection of Morrison shelters in the Borough was begun by the Contractor on the 30th June and approximately 300 shelters had been collected to date. **Noted.** 

#### 13.—PURCHASE OF VEHICLES:

#### (a) Motor Cars.

At their meeting on the 26th January, 1948 (W.C., 13/1/48 — 10) the Council authorised the placing of orders for additions and replacements of plant, transport and cars, and the Borough Surveyor was instructed to report on the possibility of forming a pool of cars and chauffeurs to meet the requirements of all departments.

The Borough Surveyor reported that nine of the Council's cars are chauffeur-driven (including one spare or General Purposes car) and are in fact operated as a pool but allocated to departments where there is constant and known work for them throughout the year. Additional and sudden requirements are met by daily allocations and by the use of the spare car. This system has many advantages, particularly that the chauffeurs are fully conversant with their duties and acquire a thorough knowledge of the district. The use of the cars on a strict pool basis would necessitate more drivers, probably more increased.

The amount of stand-by time might also be

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He also suggested that it would be a definite advantage to standardize the Council's fleet of cars to ensure efficiency in general maintenance and running repairs, and in view of the fact that spare parts for Vauxhalls are readily obtainable he submitted a quotation from Spurling Motor Bodies Ltd. for the provision of three 14 h.p. and five 12 h.p. Vauxhall cars in place of the Austin 16 cars originally considered. The Committee noted the report of the Borough Surveyor on the question of a pool of cars, and

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to obtain an additional quotation for the supply of Austin 16 cars and that the Chairman of the Committee be authorised to accept a suitable quotation for Austins or Vauxhalls within the amount of the financial estimates.
- (2) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents.
- (3) That the Chairman, in consultation with the Borough Engineer, be authorised, if he shall deem such course expedient, to formulate and implement a scheme for the provision of a pool of cars.

Recommendation of Finance and General Purposes Committee. In paragraph (3) of the recommendation, substitute the words 'report upon" for the word "implement."

## (b) Refuse Collection Vehicles, Lorries and Vans.

The Borough Surveyor sought instructions on the question of providing the Council's crest on the doors of the new refuse collecting vehicles and the Council's lorries and vans. The practice is adopted by many Local Authorities and apart from improving the appearance of the vehicles, assists in distinguishing the Council's vehicles at all times. He submitted an estimate amounting to £62 10s. 0d. for the supply of 100 transiers of 8-inch crests which could be put into store and used as required.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That authority be given for the purchase of 100 transfers of the Council's crest at a cost of approximately £62 10s. 0d., for attachment to the Council's refuse collecting vehicles, lorries and vans.

## (c) Trailer for Fordson Tractor.

Provision was made in the financial estimates for the current year for the purchase of a 2-ton Bedford lorry for the Parks Section, at a cost of £585.

The Borough Surveyor suggested that in view of the present difficulty in obtaining delivery of these vehicles a 4-ton four-wheel agricultural trailer should be purchased instead at a cost of £191. This vehicle would be towed by the Fordson tractor recently delivered and would be extremely useful for park and agricultural work, and work in connection with the tree pruning programme.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the purchase of a 4-ton four-wheel agricultural trailer at a cost of £191 in place of the 2-ton Bedford lorry for the Parks Section for which provision has been made in the estimates.

## 14.—PETROLEUM CONSOLIDATION ACTS, 1929 AND 1936:

### (a) Renewals.

The Borough Surveyor submitted for the information of the Committee applications for renewal of two licences to store petroleum and petroleum mixtures for the year ending 31st December, 1948. Under the authority given (Group II. Committee meeting-7/2/44-W. & F.B.C., 21) the necessary licences will be issued accordingly. Details of the applications are contained in the Committee's Minute Book. Noted.

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## (b) New Licences.

The Borough Surveyor submitted the following application for the issue of a licence:-

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the application be approved and that the necessary licence be issued accordingly.

#### 15.—PROTECTIVE CLOTHING:

## (a) Provision of Additional Overalls.

The Borough Surveyor reported that as instructed (W.C., 31/5/48-6) arrangements have been made to provide each member of the Council's Refuse Collecting Service with an additional suit of overalls. **Noted.** 

#### (b) Laundering.

The Borough Surveyor submitted quotations (a) for the laundering of overalls and (b) for the supply of overalls on hire including weekly collection, laundering, repairs, and replacements as necessary. The estimated weekly cost is £9 0s. 0d. for laundering only and £13 10s. 0d. for hire. He also reported that the schemes had been explained to the employees concerned at a recent well-attended meeting and only 10% of those present were in favour of either scheme. The remainder preferred to have overalls issued to them, and to arrange for their own repairs and laundering.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no change be made in the present practice in this matter.

#### 16.—BUILDING RESEARCH STATION:

The Borough Surveyor reported the receipt of a letter from the Director of Scientific and Industrial Research seeking the use of a piece of land at the Hendon Way Depôt in connection with a programme of tests to examine the practicability of using small piles for the foundations of buildings on clay sites in place of the traditional strip footings. The land would be in use for a period of three months and the Department would be responsible for all equipment and would leave the site to the Council's satisfaction. He had given provisional approval and sought confirmation of his action.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken by the Borough Surveyor be confirmed.

### 17.—REPORTS ON CONFERENCES:

The Committee received and expressed their thanks for reports by the Chairman on the Conference of the Institute of Municipal Engineers: Councillor Griffiths on the Conference of the Association of Bath Superintendents; and the Deputy Borough Engineer on the Conference of the Institute of Public Cleansing.

## 18.—ITEMS ON WHICH INSTRUCTIONS HAVE PREVIOUSLY BEEN GIVEN:

RESOLVED—That the Finance and General Purposes Committee be asked to reconsider the instruction to include on agendas an item ensuring that all matters on which instructions have been given are brought to the notice of the Committee concerned, with a view to the inclusion in the lists of any matters outstanding since the end of the last war.

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## 19.—REFUSE DISPOSAL WORKS—HOUSING ACCOMMODATION:

The Chief Librarian reported the receipt of the 14th Annual Report of the Executive Committee for 1947/8, a copy of which had been circulated to Members of the Committee.

#### 11.-LIBRARY OF GRAMOPHONE RECORDS:

At the April meeting of the Libraries Committee a letter was submitted from Mr. Lewis Hawes, of 83, Shirehall Park, N.W.4, drawing attention to the lending library of gramophone records that is being established by Westminster City Council, and suggesting that a similar service might with advantage be tried in Hendon. In connection with this the Chief Librarian submitted a schedule setting out the details of the operation and cost of a Library of Gramophone Records in 10 Authorities in London and the Home Counties. In connection with the schedule he pointed out that in three cases only are the loans restricted to schools and societies. It is reported that even where individuals are allowed to borrow there is little excessive wear and tear and damage and losses are negligible.

It can be said in favour of establishing the collection that there is a new public interested in recorded music who would profit by a study of the miniature score side by side with the record. For such people, as well as for the more serious student of music, adult education classes and the professional, it would be helpful to be able to borrow records in the same way as books. The library already lends musical scores including miniature scores and it does not seem illogical that it should provide and lend the records.

The scheme is a success wherever it has been tried and although the demand in Hendon is not yet apparent the staff at both the central and branch libraries are confident that the interest exists, especially among users of the music sections and that a collection, if formed, would be well used.

Most of the authorities find it desirable to provide separate accommodation for the records to prevent borrowers helping themselves. At the Central Library the only satisfactory arrangement would be to screen off one corner of the Reading Room with access restricted to the staff. Records could be stored here and issues made through a hatch in the glazed screen between the lending library and the reading room.

With regard to staff, it is pointed out that records take more time than books to be issued and returned owing to the need for inspection to check damage. Having regard to the information supplied by other authorities and the fact that Hendon has the kind of population that would use a Record Library, provision would have to be made for maximum use by individuals and societies, with hours of service as for the lending departments. In these circumstances a staff of 1 Assistant-in-Charge (Grade II) with the necessary technical knowledge of recorded music to be responsible for records at the central library and music sections at all three libraries, plus 1 General Assistant for relief, would be necessary.

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The Chief Librarian estimated the cost of establishment and maintenance for the first year as follows, but pointed out that no provision had been made in the current estimates for this expenditure:—

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### 13.—PURCHASE OF BOOKS:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter received from the Borough of Acton asking for support to be given to representations that had been made to the Association of Municipal Corporations. The Acton Council consider that the existing 10 per cent, discount which is allowed by booksellers to public libraries is inadequate having regard (i) to the number of books supplied—estimated to be about a million copies a year—and (ii) to the allowance by publishers to trade libraries which is  $33\frac{1}{3}\%$ .

The Chief Librarian pointed out that to by-pass the bookseller would necessitate each library making its own arrangements to collect books from publishers, or the setting up by the libraries of a co-operative central buying agency, the cost of which might exceed the difference between 10% and 33¼% discount.

In these circumstances, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken.

#### 14.—NEWSPAPERS:

The Chief Librarian reported that he had received a letter from the Circulation Manager of the "Daily Mirror" which stated he had been notified of the decision not to exhibit the "Daily Mirror" in the reading room and asked that the matter be reconsidered.

He alleged that there is a large unsatisfied demand which can only be met through the intermediary of the Public Libraries and that this state of affairs is likely to continue for some years. The letter suggested that in view of the display of other daily papers the decision is unfair and discriminative, emphasised the merits and popular appeal of the paper and asserted that under present conditions its provision is a public service.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken in the matter and that the Chief Librarian inform the Circulation Manager of the "Daily Mirror" accordingly.

#### 15.—MILL HILL LIBRARY:

The Borough Surveyor reported on his negotiations with the Ministry of Health under Defence Regulation 56a regarding the reinstatement of this building to its prewar condition. (Li.C., 19/4/48—19.)

## 17.—CENTRAL LIBRARY—LIGHTING OF LENDING DEPARTMENT AND REFERENCE ROOM:

The scheme is based on providing localised lighting to book stacks with a few general lighting points in addition. This system has been found to be superior in practice to the older method of attempting to provide a lighting system of uniform intensity throughout the room. Under the scheme now proposed, the light sources will consist of suspended enclosed fluorescent tubes for the general lighting, and similar but smaller tubes fitted to the tops of the book stacks.

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of bo centr He pointed out that with the use of fluorescent lighting a slight degree of colour distortion is inevitable but this will not affect the efficiency of the system.

The tender of Thorn Electric Industries Limited amounting to £685-11s. 11d., although not the lowest, is the most favourable.

A sum of \$550 is included in the Annual Estimates for the lighting of the Lending Department and Reference Room and the tender of Thorn Electric Industries Limited exceeds this amount by \$136.

The estimated cost of removing the existing portable range, supplying and fixing surrounds with raised hearth complete with firebasket and fret will amount to £11 15s. 6d. per house.

The Council at its meeting on the 10th May decided to accept the tender of Roger Malcolm Limited amounting to £24,288 subject to the execution of an agreement on the lines indicated, amended to provide that the interest payable thereunder should be at the rate of 3% per annum. The Town Clerk now reports that he was not satisfied that the agreement forwarded by the Ministry of Health is one that in the circumstances should be entered into by the Council and he, therefore, suggested that the tender should be accepted subject to the execution of an agreement in a form to be approved by him.

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With regard to the rate of interest payable under the agreement, a letter has been received from Roger Malcolm Limited asking that the usual 3½% allowed by the Ministry in similar cases to this contract should apply in this case, not 3% as previously suggested.

The Borough Treasurer reported that the rate of 3% was adequate to-day for deferred purchases of houses.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the tender of Roger Malcolm Limited amounting to £24,288 for the erection of 24 flats at Milespit Hill, be accepted, subject to the execution of an agreement in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk and that any previous resolution of the Council inconsistent with the above be varied accordingly;
- (2) That no variation be made in the Council's previous resolution fixing the rate of interest at 3% per annum payable under the agreement;
- (3) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

#### 7.—MEDICAL SERVICES ON COUNCIL ESTATES:

Pursuant to the Committee's instructions (31/5/48—13) the Housing Officer reported with regard to the number of persons resident in the areas of the Claremont Road and Wentworth Hall Housing Estates, in order that the Committee might consider the desirability of providing facilities for medical services on the Estates. It will be recalled that applications were received from two medical practitioners requesting—

- (a) that consideration be given to the allocation of a tenancy of a Council house at the Wentworth or Claremont Estates to each of the applicants or alternatively permission be given to allow the use of a room as a private surgery in a Council house, in order that they may set up practices in one of these areas; and
- (b) that the Council support representations to the National Executive Panel Committee of the National Health Service for permission to set up practices in these areas.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Housing Officer be instructed to communicate with the Executive Panel Committee of the National Health Scheme and to supply for their information particulars of the number of Council houses situated in the Claremont Road and Wentworth Hall Areas, including details of schemes approved but not yet commenced, with a view to the Executive Panel Committee giving consideration to the desirability of providing facilities for medical services on these Estates.

#### 8.—FENCING OF GARDENS-CLAREMONT ROAD POST-WAR ESTATES:

The Housing Officer reported the receipt of a letter from the Clitterhouse Tenants' Association requesting that consideration be given to the question of the provision of hedges along the boundaries of the gardens of the above-mentioned Estates.

The Committee have deferred consideration of this matter pending the receipt of a report by the Borough Surveyor, together with an estimate of the cost of the provision of hedges.

9.—CONTROL OF BUILDING OPERATIONS—MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR 104/48, DATED 21st JUNE, 1948:

It will be recalled that as a result of limitations imposed by the Minister of Health in the early part of 1947, the Housing Officer was obliged to curtail the programme of internal redecorations approved by the Committee in January, 1947, and to confine redecorations to the ground floor rooms in each Council house. The Housing Officer

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reported that under the Control of Building Operations No. 11 Order (to which the above circular makes reference) which came into operation on the 1st July, 1948, the amount of work which may be earried out without licence on any property during the period 1st July, 1948, to the 30th June, 1949, has been fixed at £100. He therefore proposed to increase the amount of internal redecorations being undertaken to cover all work of this nature considered necessary in houses included in the original programme for internal redecorations. The Housing Officer submitted for the information of the Committee a schedule shewing the position of the housing repairs fund as at the 31st March, 1948. A report by the Borough Surveyor on the Circular was also submitted.

Noted.

## 10.-REQUISITIONING OF UNOCCUPTED HOUSES:

The receipt was reported of a Ministry of Health circular stating that the Minister has not renewed the powers to requisition unoccupied houses formerly delegated to Clerks of Local Authorities. With effect from the 1st July, 1948, if it is proposed to requisition an unoccupied house, application must be made to the Minister's Principal Housing Officer for a special delegation to requisition in each case. Noted.

### 11.-ESTATES GARDENS COMPETITION:

The Housing Officer reported that the number of entries received for the above competition was 57. The judging of the entries will take place in mid-July and in accordance with the request of the Chairman arrangements will be made for the presentation of awards to successful entrants to take place at the meeting of the Council on the 26th July, 1948. Noted.

#### 12.-HOUSING APPLICATIONS SUMMARY:

The Housing Officer submitted for the information of the Committee a summary of applications outstanding amounting to 7,875 on the 1st May, 1948. An analysis of these applications is set out in the Appendix to the report of the Finance and General Purposes Committee. Noted.

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## 20.-RENT COLLECTION ACCOUNTS, 1947/48:

The Borough Treasurer submitted a comprehensive report with regard to the rent collection accounts, 1947/48, in respect of (a) the Council's housing estates, and (b)

With regard to the Council's housing estates, the report gives details of the gross rents (including rates and water charges) and the electricity charges due to be collected during the year. The total cash collected to the 31st March, 1948, amounted to nearly 99% of the total to be collected. The incidence of bad debts was negligible and in this connection the Borough Treasurer asked for authority to write off a sum of £3 15s. 7d. as irrecoverable.

In connection with requisitioned premises, the report shews that the total eash collected to the 31st March, 1948, was nearly 97½% of the amount collectable. Irrecoverable arrears amounted to £129–15s. Od. and authority was sought to the writing off of this sum.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Treasurer be given authority to write off as irrecoverable the sums of £3 15s. 7d. in respect of the Council's housing estates and £129 15s. 0d. in respect of requisitioned premises.

A considerable proportion of the work is necessitated by enemy action. Quotations for the work have been received, the lowest being that of W. M. Glendinning Limited amounting to £4985, and authority was sought to enter into a contract with W. M. Glendinning Limited accordingly. The Ministry of Health have approved this expenditure.

#### 27.-DERBY HOUSE, PARSON STREET:

Pursuant to the instructions of the Council the Borough Surveyor has prepared a scheme for providing two flats on the first floor of Derby House leaving the ground floor to be rented for the British Red Cross Society. A plan shewing the proposals for such provision was submitted to the Committee, the estimated cost of the necessary work amounting to £750.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the plan and estimate be approved; that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to obtain tenders for carrying out the work; and that application be made in due course to the Ministry of Health for a loan sanction for the necessary amount and for the Minister's consent to the appropriation for housing purposes of the portion of the premises to be used as flats.

## 28.—HOUSING—LICENCES FOR BUILDING NEW HOUSES—MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR 108/48:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of the above-mentioned Circular authorising the Council to allot, out of the total number of houses authorised to be built, licences for not more than one-fifth of such houses to be built by private persons. The Ministry state that licences should not be issued in respect of houses built for sale to unknown purchasers and that the identity of the owner/occupier should be made known before the licence is issued. Applications may also be considered for the building of houses for letting, provided the Local Authority are satisfied the houses will serve the general needs. A report by the Borough Surveyor on the provisions of the Circular as they affect Hendon was also submitted.

The Borough Surveyor drew attention to the under-mentioned paragraphs:-

Paragraph 3 of the Circular reads as follows:-

"The Minister has decided to leave it within the discretion of Local Authorities who desire to do so to utilize part of the allocation made to them after the date of this circular for houses to be built by private persons under licence. Applications for licences for such houses need no longer be referred to the Principal Housing Officer for his prior approval."

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It will be observed that the Local Authority is given discretion to utilize part of any allocations made to them after the date of this circular. The Borough Surveyor reported that up to the present the Corporation has not received any further allocation and he suggested that application be made to the Ministry of Health for an additional allocation with a view to utilizing part of such allocation for licences to private persons.

Paragraph 5 of the circular reads as follows:-

"Where a local authority have not yet invited tenders for all the houses covered by an allocation made before the date of this Circular and wish to devote part of the balance to licensing private building, they should submit proposals to the Principal Housing Officer."

In this connection the Borough Surveyor reported that tenders have been invited for all the houses covered by the allocation given to the deputation of the Corporation which attended at the Ministry of Health on the 20th May, 1948, with the exception of the 26 houses to be specially designed for aged persons. There is, therefore, no portion of this allocation which can be utilized for licences for private building.

The Borough Surveyor suggested that having regard to the fact that a wide discretion is allowed to the Local Authority in dealing with applications for licences to build houses it will be necessary to report each application to the Housing Committee to enable the Committee to be satisfied as to the needs of the individual applying for the licence and also to approve proposals as to the size of the house, the amount of the licence to be issued, the selling price and the yent chargeable. He further suggested that in order to protect the limited amount of land available in this Borough for building new houses it is desirable that licences should only be issued to persons who would be eligible for a Council house under the existing scheme of allocation.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the foregoing suggestions of the Borough Surveyor be approved and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to make application to the Ministry of Health for an additional allocation with a view to utilizing part of such allocation for licences to private persons.

### 29.—ISSUE OF BUILDING LICENCES:

The Committee duly **noted** an extract from information submitted by the Borough Surveyor for the purpose of the Ministry of Health Housing Progress Reports for the month of May, 1948. A copy of the extract appears in the report of the Buildings and Town Planning Committee, Item No. 24.

### 1.-PROPOSED NURSERY GARDEN, CHURCH ROAD, HENDON, N.W. 4:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application for permission to use a plot of land on the west side of St. Mary's Church House for the purpose of a nursery garden for the growing and retailing of plants and flowers. The site is situate in a residential zone of Scheme No. 1. Town planning consent has been given in respect of an application to erect lock-up garages for the storage of cars on this site, but the application was refused under the building bye-laws. The application has been advertised and no objections received.

RESOLVED-That the application be approved, subject to the following conditions:-

- (i) That nothing shall be done upon the site, which, by reason of noise, smoke, fumes, smell or otherwise, would, in the opinion of the Council, be a nuisance to occupiers of adjacent premises.
- (ii) That no advertisement boards or other notices shall be erected on the site.
- (iii) That no buildings shall be erected on the site without the consent of the Council.
- (iv) That the whole site shall be laid out and kept in a neat and tidy condition to the satisfaction of the Council.
- (v) That vehicular access shall be provided to the site to the satisfaction of the Council by the formation of a properly surfaced area 10 ft. wide along the frontage of the site to Greyhound Hill, including proper provision for any necessary surface drainage.

### 2.-PROPOSED INDUSTRIAL USE OF PREMISES ADJOINING 60, PURLEY AVENUE, N.W. 2:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application for permission to use premises on the west side of 60, Purley Avenue, N.W. 2, for any of the following uses; (a) General Storage (including chemicals); (b) "Bagwash" Laundry; (c) Garage.

The premises are situate in a residential zone of Scheme No. 1 and were erected during the war period, but no formal consent has been issued for any industrial user. The application has been advertised and sixteen objections received.

RESOLVED-That consent be refused (Clauses 28 and 30).

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# 3.—CENTRAL MOTOR INSTITUTE PREMISES, LLANVANOR ROAD, CRICKLEWOOD, N.W. 2:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application for permission to erect a temporary building approximately 100 ft. x 30 ft. on the north side of the site in Llanvanor Road at present occupied by the Central Motor Institute and Engineering Company. The site is in a residential zone of Scheme No. 1 and it is understood that the intention is to house vehicles awaiting repair or despatch from the site. The building would be approximately 6 ft. from the boundary and above the level of the gardens of Llanvanor Road properties. The application has been advertised and 13 objections received.

RESOLVED-That consent be refused (Clauses 28 and 30).

### 4.—BROADWALK HALL, BROADWALK LANE, GÖLDERS ĞREEN:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application for consent to the use of these premises for the manufacture of artificial pearls. The premises are situate in a special business zone of Scheme No. 2. The proposal has been advertised and thirteen objections received.

1.-TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT, 1947-CIRCULARS AND REGULATIONS:

### (a) Ministry of Town and Country Planning Circulars, etc.

The Town Clerk submitted the following Circulars and Statutory Instruments received from the Ministry of Town and Country Planning:-

- (i) Circular No. 45, and model form of application for planning permission.
- (ii) Circular No. 46 and Statutory Instrument No. 1236 of 1948. (The Town and Country Planning (Transfer of Property and Officers and Compensation to Officers) Regulations, 1948.)
- (iii) Circular No. 47 and explanatory Memorandum on the Town and Country Planning (General Development) Order, 1948.
- (iv) Circular No. 48 and Statutory Instrument No. 1126. (The Town and Country Planning (Enforcement of Restriction of Ribbon Development Acts) Additional Regulations, 1948.)
- (v) Circular No. 49, and a leaflet (P.R.2.) explaining briefly the general effect of the Act on private developers.
- (vi) Circular No. 50 and Statutory Instruments No. 1188 (The Town and Country Planning (Development Charge Exemptions) Regulations, 1948) and No. 1189 (The Town and Country Planning (Development Charge) Regulations, 1948.)

### (b) Communications from the Middlesex County Council.

### (i) Procedure for dealing with Applications.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter of June 1st from the Clerk of the County Council referring to the time limits, within which decisions must be conveyed to applicants. In the majority of cases a period of two months is allowed and to enable the procedure of reference to the County Council, consideration by the Borough Council and, if necessary, reference to the Area Planning Committee and the County Planning Committee, the County Council suggest that arrangements be made for the Borough Council's Planning Committee to have authority to deal with applications and for their Chairman to deal with applications which might otherwise be unduly delayed.

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All applications considered by the Chairman will be submitted by the Borough Engineer and Surveyor and any applications presenting difficulties from a legal point of view will be referred to the Town Clerk.

The Scheme of Delegation (Article 6 (3)) provides that a Borough Council may authorise not more than two of their officers to attend meetings of the Area Planning Committee in an advisory capacity.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That this Committee be authorised to exercise the powers and duties of the Council under the County of Middlesex (Delegation of Planning Functions) Scheme, 1948.
- (2) That the Chairman of the Buildings and Town Planning Committee, in consultation with the Borough Surveyor and where necessary with the Town Clerk, be authorised to deal with such applications under Part III of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1947, which cannot be decided within the prescribed periods by following the normal procedure.
- (3) That the Town Clerk and the Borough Surveyor be authorised to attend the meetings of the Area Planning Committee in an advisory capacity.
- (4) That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to sign on behalf of the Council the following forms:—

D.C.2. (Form of Acknowledgment).

D.C.3. (Notification of Consent).

D.C.5. (Notification of Refusal).

(5) That the Town Clerk be authorised to sign on behalf of the Council Form D.C.7. (Notification of Reference to Minister).

### (ii) Administrative Expenses.

A letter of June 3rd was submitted by the Town Clerk from the Clerk of the County Council referring to the question of reimbursement of the Borough Council's expenses under the Scheme of Delegation, and suggesting that such reimbursement could be directly related to the number of applications dealt with. The Borough Treasurer informed the Committee that he was in consultation with the County Accountant as to the basis for the reimbursement of administrative expenses.

RESOLVED—That consideration of the matter be deferred pending a report thereon by the Borough Treasurer.

### (b) No Evidence of Contravention.

The Town Clerk reported that he had considered a case submitted by the Ministry of Works of an alleged contravention in respect of one property (the address being recorded in manuscript in the Committee's Minute Book) and that after investigation, had reported to the Ministry that the work did not appear to require a licence. **Noted.** 

### 3.—CONTROL OF CIVIL BUILDING:

### (a) Regional Building Conference.

The Chairman reported that with the Borough Surveyor and the Town Clerk's representative, he had attended a conference convened by the Ministry of Works of Local Authorities and representatives of the various Ministries at Tottenham, on June 23rd. Information was given concerning the volume of licensing throughout the area covered by the conference, i.e., Central Middlesex and Hertfordshire. **Noted.** 

### (b) Circular 104/48.

The Town Clerk submitted Ministry of Health Circular 104/48 referring to the Control of Building Operations (No. 11) Order, in force from July 1st. This Order will allow work up to a maximum of £100 for the ensuing 12 months to be carried out on any property without a licence. The Circular also states that with effect from 1st April, 1947, the Ministry will reimburse approved expenditure on the control of licensing work to an amount of 75% by way of grant. **Noted.** 

### (c) Circular 108/48.

The Town Clerk reported receipt of this Circular authorising the Council to allot, out of the total number of houses authorised to be built, licences for not more than one-fifth of such houses to be built by private persons. The Ministry indicate that certain conditions should be attached to such licences and the Borough Surveyor informed the Committee of the nature of the report which he was submitting to the Housing Committee that evening. The Housing Committee are recommending that the Ministry of Health should allocate an increased quota to enable the Council to grant licences for the erection of houses by private persons. The Committee are of opinion that the discretion to issue licences to private builders up to one-fifth of the number of houses authorised to be built in the Borough should be exercised to the full, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That a number equal to one-fifth of the total number of houses authorised to be built be made available for erection by private persons under licence in accordance with Circular 108/48.

### (d) Circular L.R.L. 13/48.

The Town Clerk reported receipt of this Circular from the Ministry of Health indicating a revision in the quota for building licences consequent upon the alteration of the free limit notified in Circular 104/48 (paragraph 3 (b) above). For the next three months the amount of the quota for Hendon is fixed at £15,000 per month. **Noted.** 

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# 4.—HOUSING AND TOWN PLANNING COUNCIL "REGIONAL CONFERENCE":

The Town Clerk submitted notice of a conference of Local Authorities in the London Region to be held on Monday, July 12th, to discuss housing and planning matters, the latter dealing mainly with the administration of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1947.

The Committee have authorised the Chairman, together with the Town Clerk and the Borough Surveyor, to attend such conference, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That their action be confirmed.

### 5.—196, BRENT STREET, N.W. 4:

The Town Clerk reported receipt of the Minister of Health's decision on the appeal made by the occupiers against the Council's determination, which in effect granted no extension of time, in respect of the use of these premises for the making of padded coathangers. The effect of the Minister's determination is to confirm that the use of the premises fails to comply with planning control but to grant an extension of time until 31st March, 1950. Noted.

### 6.—PROPOSED PETROL STORE, FEATHERSTONE GARAGE, BUNNS LANE, N.W.7:

The Town Clerk reported receipt of a communication from the applicants giving notice of an appeal to the Minister against the Council's decision (B. & T.P.C., 31/5/48—31) refusing permission for the erection of a Petroleum Mixture Store at the side of Featherstone Garage. **Noted.** 

### 7.—STORE, WEST SIDE OF CLAREMONT ROAD:

The Town Clerk reported receipt of the decision of the Minister of Town and Country Planning in the matter of an appeal made against the Council's refusal under Interim Development Control for permission for the erection of a building in Claremont Road for the purpose of selling fruit and vegetables. The building had been erected before the application was made for permission, and the Committee have given authority for proceedings in respect of a contravention of the building bye-laws (B. & T.P.C., 12/1/48—23). The Minister has informed the appellant that in view of the fact that the development had already been carried out he had no jurisdiction to consider the appeal. The proceedings in respect of the contravention of the building bye-laws will now be taken. **Noted.** 

### 8.—72, FINCHLEY LANE:

The Town Clerk referred to the Committee's decision in April last to take no action for a period of two years to enforce the Council's rights under an Agreement binding the owner of these premises, which were converted during the war into three flats, to reinstate them. The owner has submitted an application for unconditional consent to the conversion of the building into three separate dwelling units.

RESOLVED.—That the Town Clerk be instructed to invite the owner to submit an application for development permission.

# 9.—SERVICE LAND REQUIREMENTS—H.A.A. SITE, HIGHWOOD HILL:

The Town Clerk referred to his report to the Committee in April last (Item 7) on the result of the conference with representatives of the Ministry of Town and Country Planning, and the War Department. It had then been indicated that the War Department were agreeable to provide an effective screen for the gun pits which are to be retained, but had deferred a decision on the retention of the existing camp. The Ministry of Town and Country Planning have now written indicating that the War Department agree to the Ministry's view that no clearance can be given for the retention of the existing camp or for the use of the site for training purposes. **Noted.** 

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# 10.-PROPOSED NURSERY SCHOOL-WILLIFIELD GREEN:

The Town Clerk formally reported that the Committee's recommendation to grant permission subject to conditions (B. & T.P.C., 31/5/48-42) to the Middlesex County Council for the development of a site on the south side of Willifield Green as a Nursery School had been referred back by the Council on the 21st June, 1948. The Borough Surveyor reported that he understood that the County Council did not now desire to proceed with this application. Noted.

### 11.-NAMING OF ROADS-MIDLAND BRENT TERRACE:

Pursuant to the instructions of the Council (B. & T.P.C., 19/4/48-1) notices were served of the Council's intention to re-name Midland Brent Terrace as "Brent Terrace." The Town Clerk reported that no appeals had been submitted in respect of such notices.

- (a) That the Council do make an Order under Section 18 of the Public Health Act, 1925, that the name of Midland Brent Terrace shall be altered to Brent Terrace.
- (b) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

### 12.- "HOLMLEA," STANLEY ROAD, WEST HENDON:

The Town Clerk submitted a reference from the Public Health and Medical Services Committee (P.H. & M.S.C., 28/6/48-11) drawing attention to the use for factory purposes of a garage at the above address. The Public Health Committee desire the question of a town planning contravention to be considered.

RESOLVED-That consideration of this matter be deferred for a report by the Borough Surveyor.

### 13.-3 AND 4, TEMPLE FORTUNE PARADE, N.W. 11:

The Town Clerk reported that in accordance with the instructions given by the Committee (B. & T.P.C., 31/5/48-41) he had communicated with the occupiers of these premises in respect of a contravention. He submitted a letter from the Solicitors for the occupiers stating that the latter had entered into a lease of the premises, such lease not being determinable until September, 1953, and asking if the Council would permit them to continue the use of the premises for manufacturing purposes until that date.

### 15.—152, STATION ROAD, EDGWARE:

The Town Clerk referred to the report at the meeting in April last (B. & T.P.C., 19/4/48-38) in respect of the contravening user of these premises for the purpose of a trade garage and partly for the manufacture of sprayed hessian rug backings. occupiers have requested that an application for planning consent should be considered and they have been supplied with the necessary forms for the making of an application for permission under the 1947 Act. ### 1.—TERMS OF REFERENCE:

(C.R.C., 25/5/48—4.) To consider the question of catering by the Meals Service outside the Civic Restaurants with a view to formulating a list of the types of organisations for whom such catering should be undertaken.

### 2.-REPORT:

In considering this matter the Committee were of opinion that entering outside the Civic Restaurants should not normally be undertuken except in cases where it is not possible to meet the requirements inside a Civic Restaurant conveniently situated. The Sub-Committee considered a list of the various types of organisations in the Borough, and concluded that outside catering should be restricted to a few types. They

### RECOMMEND-

- (1) That catering outside the Civic Restaurants should be undertaken by the Council's Meals Service (in cases where it is not possible to cater in a Civic Restaurant conveniently situated):—
  - (a) for community associations;
  - (b) for youth organisations affiliated to the Youth Organisation Committee;
  - (c) for functions organised by the Local Authority (County or Borough) or by Government-sponsored Bodies such as National Savings Committees.
- (2) That a panel of three members be appointed by the Special (Civic Restaurants) Committee, any two of whom shall be authorised to consider and decide upon applications for outside catering received from educational and cultural societies and applications in respect of children's functions.
- (3) That no other catering outside the restaurant premises be undertaken by the Council's Meals Service.

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### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the report of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.
- (2) That in connection with recommendation (2) of the Sub-Committee the Chairman of the Committee (Councillor Cope) and Councillors Arridge and Jones be appointed as the panel of members to consider applications for outside catering received from educational and cultural societies and applications in respect of children's functions.

### (b) Outside Functions.

The Chief Officer Meals Service submitted details of arrangements which had been made for the Meals Service to undertake catering outside the restaurants. Noted.

### 3.—STAG HOUSE CIVIC RESTAURANT:

### (a) Music and Dancing Licence.

The Town Clerk reported that as instructed by the Council (C.R.C., 2/3/48-2 (a)) he had sought clarification from the Middlesex County Council of the terms of the Music and Dancing Licence in respect of these premises (in view of the fact that the premises might be in use for restaurant purposes and for a public entertainment simultaneously) and had applied for an increase in the numbers permitted under the licence.

The Licence has now been amended by the County Council to allow the following numbers in the premises:—

RESOLVED-That in the future Stag House Civic Restaurant be closed at 6.30 p.m. daily.

### (c) Dance Floor and Snack-Bar.

As instructed, the Borough Surveyor submitted a plan showing a proposal to provide a snack-bar in the front portion of the restaurant. He also reported that it is unlikely that permission can be obtained for the provision of a dance floor for some time. In view of the recommendation contained in paragraph (b) above the provision of a snack-bar will not now be necessary, and the Committee

### 7.—TARIFF CHARGES:

At their meeting on the 10th May, 1948, the Council instructed the Committee to give further consideration to the question of charges made in the restaurants.

The Committee received a financial report of the Borough Treasurer and a report of the Chief Officer Meals Service suggesting that the practice of offering a set price or table d'hote meal only be discontinued and that an à la carte tariff be adopted. This would give a greater variety of dishes, provide a more satisfactory service, and enable the charges to be more easily adjusted to fluctuating costs. The introduction of such a tariff would necessitate the adoption of the cafeteria system and the use of machines for recording sales and giving receipts. The Chief Officer's report incorporated two suggested tariffs with estimates of the probable effect of the introduction of these charges on the receipts at the restaurants.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

(1) That Tariff "C" suggested by the Chief Officer Meals Service be adopted, subject to the charge for roast joints being increased from 11d. to one shilling.

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- (2) That the new tariff be put into operation in the first place at Stag House for an experimental period of one month, and that if successful it be extended to the other restaurants at the discretion of the Borough Treasurer and Chief Officer.
- (3) That the dishes not included in the specimen tariff submitted by the Chief Officer be priced proportionately, and that details be submitted to the Committee at their next meeting.
- (4) That such tariff be regarded as a standard and the Borough Treasurer and Chief Officer, in consultation, be authorised to vary the charges within  $33\frac{1}{3}\%$  of that standard.
- (5) That authority be given for the purchase of four Trumeter "Cater Counters" at a total cost of £38 and for the hire of four "Automaticket" machines at a rental of £2 3s. 4d. per month each.
- (6) That authority be given for the carrying out of the necessary works of adaptation to the service counters at an estimated cost not exceeding £80,

### 8.-LAMPSHADES:

As instructed, the Chief Officer Meals Service submitted quotations and samples for the provision of lampshades at the Edgeworth, Hartley, and Victoria Restaurants.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for the purchase of 39 shades of the oblique sphere type at a total cost of £79 12s. 6d.

### 9.—APPOINTMENT OF MANAGERESSES:

The Chief Officer Meals Service drew attention to the delay involved in the filling of vacancies for Manageresses by the Appointments Sub-Committee. He pointed out that the Meals Service is a trading undertaking and the work of a Manageress cannot be postponed, and that it is essential that vacancies arising should be filled immediately.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for any vacancy arising for a Manageress at any of the Council's Civic Restaurants to be filled by the Chairman of the Special (Civic Restaurants) Committee in consultation with the Chief Officer.

### 10.—HARTLEY RESTAURANT—TEA GARDEN:

The Chief Officer Meals Service submitted a quotation from Messrs. Waring and Gillow for the provision of four garden umbrellas at a cost of £8 19s. 10d. each for use in the tea garden at the Hartley Restaurant.

### 1.-ENTERTAINMENT GROUP:

The following items have been considered by the Entertainments Group and their observations are as indicated:-

### (a) Incidental Music.

### (b) Children's Competition.

The following is the main plan upon which the Federation will base its schedule which will contain approximately 150 classes:-

### (b) Vegetables and Fruit:

- (i) Allotments-Usual Classes closed to Allottees.
- (ii) Private Gardensa-

  - (2) Usual Classes closed to gardeners employed in private gardens.
- (iii) Trade Classes.

### (c) Floral:

- (i) Open Classes.
- (ii) Closed Classes :-
  - (1) Private Gardeners.
  - (2) Gardeners employed in private gardens.

### (d) Nurseries Exhibit by Parks Department.

### (e) Special closed Classes for N.A.L.G.O. Members and the Naar Cup, etc.:

The Group has considered the question of prizes, and in this connection it was felt desirable to follow the usual rule on these occasions of meeting the prize money as far as possible from entrance fees. In addition to this, however, Councillor H. L. K. Johnson, in his capacity as Chairman of the Allotments Committee expressed the hope that it would be possible to put up for competition three Championship Cups for the three main divisions of Vegetables, Fruit and The Horticultural Group are pleased to report that Councillor Johnson has himself donated one Championship Cup. (N.A.L.G.O. has already donated a Challenge Shield for Annual Competition among Allotment Societies affiliated to the Federation.)

The Sub-Committee have approved the Schedule and tendered their thanks to Councillor H. L. Kirby Johnson for presenting a Championship Cup.

### Judges:

Arrangements are in hand for obtaining the services of independent Judges and it is hoped to obtain assistance from the Ministry of Food in providing Judges for the Domestic Classes.

The Sub-Committee have authorised the provision of lunches for Judges and for the payment, if necessary, of any fees.

### 3.-LIVESTOCK GROUP:

It was reported that at a meeting of the above Group on the 4th instant, Mr. R. Cranmer, Brown, Secretary of the Hendon Rabbit & Poultry Club was in attendance together with members of his Committee. A full discussion took place as to the possibility of including rabbit and poultry exhibits and the representatives of the Hendon Rabbit and Poultry Club undertook to report to their Committee, which met on June 8th last, and to indicate to the Livestock Group whether it was a practical proposition to organise a display this year.

Attention was drawn to difficulties associated with Fowl Pest, and the hiring of suitable exhibition pens, etc.

In regard to Fowl Pest, enquiries have shown that there is nothing in the Regulations to prevent the holding of an exhibition of poultry.

It has not yet been possible to establish contact with the local Beekeepers but enquiries are being pursued. Noted.

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### 4.—GENERALLY:

### (a) Fire Protection.

It was reported that the Town Clerk was in communication with the Fire Brigade with a view to adequate safeguards being made against fire. Noted.

### (b) Women's Section.

This section is to consist of a special tent for the display of needlework and other matters of interest to women as distinct from the Domestic Classes in the Horticultural Section.

In was reported that the Hendon Federation of Townwomen's Guilds had indicated their interest in the proposal and will submit further details at a later date. Noted.

### (c) Hire of Marquees.

The Sub-Committee considered a quotation from Messrs. Blake & Son and gave authority for the hire of the necessary marquees at a total estimated cost of £68 12s. 6d.

### (d) Transport and Labour.

Authority has been given for the hire of the necessary transport and labour.

### (e) Insurances.

Authority has been given for the necessary insurance cover to be obtained against fire, etc.

### (f) Sanitary Arrangements.

The Sub-Committee have authorised the Borough Surveyor to make the necessary sanitary arrangements at the ground.

The Sub-Committee have approved the arrangements for the staffing of pay boxes.

### (j) Charges for Admission.

### (k) Car Parking Arrangements.

Authority has been given for the necessary arrangements to be made, in conjunction with the Police, for the parking of cars.

### (I) Publicity.

### (I) Local Press.

In connection with publicity, His Worship the Mayor has arranged to interview representatives of the Local Press with a view to supplying them with further particulars of the Show.

### (ii) Posters, Banners, etc.

The Sub-Committee have given instructions for the provision of Posters, Banners, etc., advertising the Show, including the posters for the Refuse Collection Vehicles and for the Notice Boards at the various allotments.

### (iii) Programmes.

It was agreed that programmes which are to be on sale, be numbered, and shall contain advertisements.

### (m) Temporary 'Bus Stops.

It was agreed that application be made to the London Transport Executive for suitable temporary bus stopping places to be provided on the day of the Show.

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### (n) Official Opening of Show and Reception of Distinguished Guests.

It was agreed that the official opening of the Show should be performed by His Worship the Mayor and that invitations be extended to the local Members of Parliament, the Mayors and Chairmen of neighbouring Local Authorities; Mr. E. A. S. Young, President of the Metropolitan District Committee of N.A.L.G.O. and Mr. G. W. Giles, O.B.E., F.R.H.S., Secretary of the National Allotments and Gardens Society Ltd., and that suitable arrangements be made for their reception and entertainment.

### (o) Time of Opening.

It was agreed that the Show be open to the Public at 42 noon, the Official Opening by His Worship the Mayor to take place at  $2.30~\mathrm{p.m.}$ 

### (p) Catering Arrangements.

It was agreed that Mecca Cafés Limited and the Council's Civic Restaurants Department be invited to submit quotations for catering, and that application be made to the Justices for a licence.

The Borough Treasurer submitted a detailed estimate of the cost of the Show based on the proposals contained in the foregoing report showing a net estimated cost to the Council of £300.

Having regard to the date of the Horticultural Show, the Committee, as a matter of urgency, have approved the report of the Sub-Committee and the estimate of cost amounting to £300, and have authorised the Sub-Committee to proceed with all necessary arrangements.

### 10.-RUBBISH DUMPS:

The Town Clerk referred to his report to the Committee in April last (F. & G.P.C., 27/4/48—8) on the Council's powers in connection with the control of rubbish dumps, the matter having then been deferred pending the issue of Regulations by the Minister of Town and Country Planning under Section 33 of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1947. The Regulations have not as yet been made and a further report will be submitted when they are received. **Noted.** 

### 11.—COLNE VALLEY WATER COMPANY:

The Town Clerk referred to his report at the last meeting of an Inquiry held by the Ministry of Health on May 27th into the application by this Company for authority to increase their charges. The Company had applied for an increase of 33½% in the charges for domestic water and 50% in the charges for the supply of the water by meter. The Minister of Health has now made an Order permitting increases of 20% and 40% respectively. Noted.

### 12.—REGISTRATION AND LICENSING OF WINDOW CLEANERS:

A communication was submitted by the Town Clerk from the National Federation of Master Window Cleaners forwarding the terms of a resolution passed at their conference, urging statutory registration and licensing of window cleaners. The Town Clerk informed the Committee that this question has recently been before the Law Committee of the Association of Municipal Corporations and that the view then expressed was that there is no knowledge that window cleaners have abused the trust placed in them. In the circumstances the Law Committee is of the opinion that it would be inappropriate for the Association to take any action at the present time.

### 1.—PROMOTION EXAMINATION—LIBRARY STAFF:

The Town Clerk submitted a communication from the Library Association referring to the first list of examinations approved as an alternative to the Promotion Examination of the Local Government Examinations Board. The Association ask for the Council's support to representations to secure the acceptance of the Registration Examination of the Library Association (instead of the final examination) as an alternative to the Promotion Examination. The Town Clerk referred to the consideration given by the Sub-Committee to this matter at their meeting on 21st February last when the implementation of paragraph 28 of the National Scheme of Conditions of Service had been deferred for a report of the Chief Officers, and reported that the question is under consideration by the National Joint Council at the present time.

The Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to advise the Association that consideration of the matter has been deferred pending a decision from the National Joint Council on the whole question of the Promotion Examination and its alternatives.

### 2.—BANK HOLIDAY ARRANGEMENTS:

In accordance with the Council's decision (F. & G.P.C., 20/1/47-7 (vi)), the Town Clerk asked for the Sub-Committee's instructions regarding co-ordination of the holiday arrangements for the various departments and services of the Council. The Sub-Committee

### 3.—STAFF APPOINTMENTS—MEALS SERVICE:

The Town Clerk reported that the Special (Civic Restaurants) Committee on June 29th had decided to recommend the Council that authority should be given to the Chairman of their Committee, in consultation with the Chief Officer Meals Service, to fill any vacancy arising in the position of Manageress at any of the Civic Restaurants. The purpose of the recommendation is to avoid delay in the filling of such vacancies, having regard to the fact that the Meals Service is a trading undertaking. The Council's present policy with regard to staff appointments (F. & G.P.C., 23/6/47—6 (iii)) is such that the appointment of Manageress, in those cases where the salary is outside the General Division, has hitherto been made by the Appointments Sub-Committee.

Your Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND—That no alteration be made in the present procedure.

# 4.—ARBITRATION AWARD—RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN CLERICAL DIVISION SCALE AND GRADE A.P.T. I:

The Town Clerk referred to the report made by the Borough Treasurer to the Sub-Committee at their meeting in April last (F. & G.P.C., 27/4/48—71 cl0 (c)) on the merging of the bonus in the new consolidated salary scales. The Sub-Committee had then instructed that the attention of the National Joint Council should be drawn to one resultant anomaly, i.e., the revised consolidated Clerical Division Scale (males) is now in excess of the revised consolidated A.P.T. I Grade. The Town Clerk reported that in response to his communication to the National Joint Council the Employers' Secretary has replied that the feeling of the Employers is that they should abide by the decision of the Tribunal, but that the anomaly has already been brought to the notice of the National Joint Council who will shortly be considering certain proposals submitted by the Staffs' Side. Noted.

### 5.—MANUAL WORKERS—TRANSFER FROM TEMPORARY TO PERMANENT STAFF:

The Borough Treasurer reported that lists had been compiled by the Borough Surveyor and himself showing a total of 48 employees recommended for transfer to the permanent or superannuable staff in accordance with the Council's resolution of October, 1947 (F. & G.P.C., 29/9/47—4 (xvii)). Of the employees whose names appear on the list, 34 are eligible for transfer to the superannuable staff as "Servants, Class A," subject to verification of age and medical fitness, and the remaining 14 employees are eligible for designation as permanent employees.

The Borough Treasurer also referred to the Council's decision (F. & G.P.C., 27/4/48-51 (12)) amending the qualifying conditions relating to the eligibility of employees for the grant of an allowance or gratuity under the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 4929. The amendments include a provision that any employees recommended for transfer to "Servants, Class A" who failed by their own neglect to satisfy the required conditions or who indicate in writing that they do not desire to be considered for transfer, should forfeit any right to consideration for an allowance under the Local Act. The Borough Treasurer reported that had notified the employees concerned of the effect of the Council's decision and he submitted the following names of nine employees who had either not replied to communications or had indicated in writing that they did not desire to be transferred to the superannuable staff:—

- (b) That the necessary action be taken as to verification of age and medical fitness in respect of the 34 employees eligible for transfer to the superannuable staff, and that a further report be submitted in due course.
- (c) That it be placed on record that the 9 employees onumerated above have forfeited any right to consideration for an allowance under the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929.

### 6.-FUEL CONTROL SECTION-RE-GRADING:

The Borough Treasurer referred to the re-grading, following appeals, of the Deputy Fuel Overseer (from Grade A.P.T. V to Grade A.P.T. V (a)) and of a General Assistant (from the Clerical to the Higher Clerical Division) with effect from 1st April, 1948. Representations have been made to the Minister of Fuel and Power to secure approval to the up-grading for the purpose of reimbursing the expenditure, but the Ministry had indicated that they are unable to give such approval in the case of the Deputy Fuel Overseer. The Sub-Committee have asked the Borough Treasurer to make further representations to the Minister in order to secure reimbursement of the full salary.

### 7.—NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE (SUPERANNUATION REGULATIONS), 1947:

The Borough Treasurer referred to the Council's decision (F. & G.P.C., 9/6/48-39 (8)) pre-determining the action which the Council would have taken under Sections 8 (2) (b) (i) and 46 (2) of the Local Government Superannuation Act, 1937, in respect of employees at the Isolation Hospital, who were contributors to the superannuation fund of the Council and transferred to the service of the Regional Hospital Board on July 5th. The effect of the resolution was to convert the non-contributing service of the employees to contributing service and to add years of service (not exceeding five in any one case) in the case of those employees who were female nurses. The Borough Treasurer further reported that draft Regulations had now been issued by the Minister of Health giving a similar power in relation to the staff transferred to the service of the County Council (Local Health Authority). Any resolutions are to be passed within three months of the date of such transfer. The Sub-Committee were informed of the additional payment which would have to be made by the Council in respect of the greater transfer value in the event of similar resolutions being passed in respect of the staff to be transferred to the Local Health Authority.

The hospital staff were transferred to an authority which does not possess any powers to convert their service or to add years, but this is not the case in respect of the staff being transferred to the Local Health Authority. The Caunty Council, in common with other Authorities operating a scheme under the Local Government Superannuation Act, 1937, have a right to convert non-contributing service to contributing service, and to add years in the case of female nurses, etc., at the date of retirement of the individual concerned, although there is no definite indication that they will in fact do so. Consequently, although to a lesser degree, there is a possible loss of expectation of benefits for the staff who are transferred to the Local Health Authority.

A further point is that the Council, if similar resolutions were passed for the health staff, would pay an increased transfer value calculated on the assumption that all such members of the staff would continue in the service until retirement, whereas if such action were taken at the appropriate time by the County Council, the resolution would necessarily have to be passed only for such employees as remained in that Authority's service until reaching the retiring age. The Sub-Committee were also reminded that a large number of Authorities would be transferring staff to the Local Health Authority and taking varying action in the matter, with the result that the Local Health Authority's staff would henceforth be enjoying varying bene-

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fits under the Local Government Superannuation Act, 1937 (as amended), as a result of the individual action of their former employing Authorities. The Sub-Committee are of opinion that the question should be discussed by the Middlesex Borough and District Councils' Association with the object of securing, if possible, some measure of uniformity of procedure among the various Local Authorities in the County. Having regard to the provisions of the Regulation, however, if any resolution is to be passed by the Council, action must be taken within three months from the 5th July, 1948.

The Sub-Committee have instructed the Town Clerk to request the Middlesex Borough and District Councils' Association to consider, at a special meeting if necessary, the question of the transfer of staff to the Local Health Authority and the superantuation position of such staff, and for a proposal that the responsibility for converting non-contributing service and for adding years is one which should be borne by the County Council, and have also instructed the Town Clerk to circulate all Borough and District Councils in Middlesex to secure their support for purply notion.

S.-JOINT INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL AWARD-REDUCTION IN WORKING HOURS:

#### (a) General.

In accordance with the instructions given at the last meeting (F. & G.P.C., 9/6/49-39 (10) (b)), the Borough Surveyor reported with regard to the implementation of the award of the Joint Industrial Council reducing the working hours from 47 to 44 per week as from 1st October, 1948. The award provides that the reduced working week may be spread over 5, 5½ or 6 days, according to the demands of the public services, provided that the particular spread over "to be adopted by each Local Authority shall be the subject of consultation between the Local Authority and representatives of the Trade Unions concerned. The

Borough Surveyor reported that the working hours at present are 8½ per day from Mondays to Fridays inclusive, and 4 hours on Saturday. The majority of the men concerned are outdoor workers, and having regard to the number of hours of daylight available during the winter months, the Sub-Committee are ef opinion that the award should be implemented by reducing the hours to 8 per day from Mondays to Fridays inclusive, leaving 4 hours to be worked on Saturdays.

Your Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to arrange accordingly, subject to consultation with the Trade Union representatives concerned.

#### (b) Housing Maintenance Manual Staff.

The Borough Treasurer reported that he had received an application from the manual employees of the Housing Section of his Department to be permitted to work one hour extra for four days in each week, thus enabling them to work a five-day week. The rates of pay and working hours of the men in this Section are governed by the awards of the Building Trade and the normal working week of 44 hours is operated by the men working 8 hours per day Mondays to Fridays inclusive, and 4 hours per day on Saturday. 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# (f) Transfer Values-National Health Service Act, 1946.

He submitted particulars of the expenditure involved and stated that it had been agreed that to the extent of £100 such expenditure could be regarded as covering items in respect of which the Council has received compensation in respect of dilapidations.

He also referred to works which the Council (F. & G.P.C., 19/1/48—37) had agreed to carry out for the improvement of certain buildings leased to the Club and in particular to the provision of a gas supply to two cottages occupied by employees of the Club. The cost of laying the main is to be borne equally by the Club and the Gas Company, leaving an amount of £36–12s. Od. for running the service pipe to the cottages.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That authority be given for payment to the Mill Hill Golf Club of the sum of £100 towards the total amount spent by the Club on essential repairs between June and November, 1946.
- (2) That authority be given for the payment of £36 12s. 0d. to cover the cost of running a service pipe to provide a supply of gas to two cottages at the Mill Hill Colf Club.

#### 34,—TITHE REDEMPTION ANNUITIES:

The Borough Treasurer referred to the operation of the Tithe Act of 1936 and to tithe annuities payable by the Council in respect of certain lands at the rate of £171 4s. 8d. per annum until and including the 1st October, 1996. The Tithe Act, 1936,

provides that the tithe annuities can be redeemed at any time and the Tithe Redemption Commission have informed the Borough Treasurer that the capital sum required to effect redemption of the annuities payable by the Council would amount to £4.266 0s. 7d<sub>n</sub> as at 1st August, 1948. The expenditure involved in such redemption could be met from the capital reserve fund, that fund being credited with notional loan charges which would amount to £167–10s. 0d. per annum for a period of 48½ years.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Borough Treasurer be authorised to take the necessary steps for redemption in the sum of  $\pounds 4,266$  Os. 7d. of tithe annuities at present payable by the Council.
- (2) That such expenditure be met from the Capital Reserve Fund.
- (3) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

# 35.—INSTITUTE OF MUNICIPAL TREASURERS AND ACCOUNTANTS CONFERENCE:

The Committee expressed their appreciation to their delegates (the Chairman (Alderman A. W. Curton, F.R.S.A., M:Inst.B.E.), Alderman W. R. Clemens, J.P., F.C.A., and the Borough Treasurer) for the report circulated on this conference, which they had attended from June 15th to 18th.

#### 36.—INCOME ACCOUNTS, 4947/48:

The Borough Treasurer reported particulars of outstanding items on income account including details of various items of income which, for reasons indicated, had been found to be irrecoverable.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That authority be given for irrecoverable amounts totalling £836 8s. 3d. to be written off.

#### 37.—RIDING ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1939:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a report by the Corporation's Veterinary Surgeon on inspections of two riding schools within the Borough. The Committee have asked the Borough Surveyor to arrange for a further inspection to be made of each of the riding schools during the winter months.

#### 38.—LAND ADJOINING 51, HOLDEN ROAD, N. 12:

The Borough Surveyor referred to applications previously made by the owner of this property who desires to purchase part of the land belonging to the Corporation adjoining his house. Previously the Corporation have not been prepared to sell any portion of the land and a request was submitted for the Council to grant a right of way across their land to give access to a garage to be erected on private property.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—

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

### 3.—CLEANING OF SCHOOL WINDOWS—MIDSUMMER HOLIDAYS, 1948:

Administrative Memorandum No. 289 was submitted from the Ministry of Education stating that the Minister will shortly be making the first Local Education Orders under Section 12 of the Education Act, 1944, which will, amongst other things, specify the County and Voluntary Schools which it will be the duty of the Authority to maintain. The Ministry state that this will be the appropriate occasion for reviewing the names of the schools and bringing them into line with the organisation set up by the 1944 Act. The Minister will invite the Authority, when the Local Education Order is in draft, to suggest the official titles by which it is desired that the schools should be known. Before making their suggestions for Voluntary Schools, the Authority will, of course, ascertain the wishes of the Governors and Managers. The Minister suggests that the aim in naming a school should be to give it a distinctive title based on its particular associations rather than to indicate its location, which is the function of the address, not of the name. The use of street names is, therefore, unnecessary and might well be abandoned as a general rule. Noted.

#### (b) "Granville" Restaurant:

#### 4.—ROOKERY CLOSE AND COLIN GARDENS:

The Town Clerk referred to consideration by the Committee at their meeting in May last (P.H. & M.S.C., 24/5/48—13) of a report arising from a petition signed by residents in Rookery Close and Colin Gardens complaining of the noise from nearby factory premises. The Medical Officer of Health had then reported on inspections made and on steps being taken by the occupiers to reduce the noise, the report being to the effect that there was no statutory nuisance. The Town Clerk submitted a further petition containing 46 names, and the Medical Officer of Health reported on a recent inspection which he had made. The noise is caused by electric generators and efforts have been made by the firm concerned to minimise the noise.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be requested to consult with the factory owners and to submit a report as to methods of minimising the noise.

## 5.—NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948—BURIAL OR CREMATION OF THE DEAD:

The Town Clerk reported on the provisions of Section 50 of this Act which places a duty on the Council to make suitable arrangements for the burial or cremation of any person who dies within their area in those cases where no other suitable arrangements are being made. The Act gives certain power to the County Council to arrange for the burial or cremation of any deceased person who was being provided with accommodation by the County Council, and the latter authority have extended their existing arrangements for a period of 12 months. The Act contains provisions for the recovery of expenses from any persons liable to maintain the deceased person and also for the payment to the Council in suitable cases of the death grant under the National Insurance Act, 1946.

It is necessary that arrangements should be made by the Council in anticipation of any request which may be made in the future, e.g., by the Regional Hospital Board, for action under this section.

The Committee are of the opinion that this work should be dealt with by an Officer of the Public Health Department.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Medical Officer of Health make suitable arrangements through the Sanitary Section of his Department for dealing with any cases under Section 50 of the National Assistance Act, 1948.

#### 1.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £6,381 1s. 8d. were submitted and approved.

#### 2.-ANNUAL CONTRACTS:

The Committee had before them for further consideration the question of returning to the pre-war practice of entering into Annual Contracts for supplies and services after obtaining tenders by public advertisement. The matter arose on a reference from the Council in February, 1948, and had then been deferred for six months.

RESOLVED-That consideration of this matter be deferred for a further period of six months.

#### 3.—STREET TRADING:

#### (a) Watling Avenue.

At their meeting on the 21st June, 1948 (Hi.C., 24/5/48 - 3 (c)) the Council received a complaint from the occupiers of No. 15, Watling Avenue regarding the presence of a licensed fish vendor outside No. 17 and decided, subject to the concurrence of the traders concerned and the licensees, that an exchange of sites should be arranged between two licensees.

At their meeting on the 26th July, 1948 (Hi.C., 28/6/48-6 (b)) the Council also received a complaint from the occupiers of No. 59, Watling Avenue, who are retailers of fruit and vegetables, regarding the presence of a licensed fruit vendor outside their premises. In this case the Council decided that subject to the concurrence of the shopkeeper concerned, the street trader in question should be moved to a point outside No. 63.

The Town Clerk reported that the concurrence of the shopkeepers concerned in the first case was not forthcoming, and in the second case was subject to the moving of an additional trader, which was likely to give rise to further difficulties.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the complainants be informed that the Council are unable to make any satisfactory alternative arrangements at the present time, but that they be informed of the Council's proposal for the establishment of an open-air market in the vicinity as early as possible

#### (b) Application for Licence.

The Town Clerk submitted an application from Mr. A. J. Hannington for a Street Trading Licence permitting him to sell fruit, flowers and vegetables in Garden City, Edgware, at its junction with Station Road. He stated that the application had been referred to the Commissioner of Police, who regarded the site as unsuitable for street trading.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND--That the application be disapproved.

#### (c) Offences.

The Town Clerk reported that in accordance with authority given (Hi.C., 15/9/47—3 (b)) a warning letter had been addressed and proceedings taken in respect of street trading offences as follows:—

#### (d) Central Hendon Chamber of Commerce.

At their meeting on the 21st June, 1948 (Hi.C., 24/5/48—3 (a)) the Council received a resolution of the Central Hendon Chamber of Commerce calling for steps to be taken to stop the practice of street trading from barrows and stalls, and decided to inform the Chamber that each application for a licence must be considered on its merits and that only a small number of traders had been licensed to trade in Central Hendon.

The Town Clerk submitted an enquiry from the Chamber whether they could be supplied with a list of persons holding Street Trading Licences in the Borough.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk inform the Central Hendon Chamber of Commerce that the Council are not prepared to supply a list of licensed street traders, and draw their attention to the facilities available to Local Covernment Electors for inspection of the Minutes of the Council.

## 4.—PRIVATE STREETS:

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#### (a) Fairway Estate.

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Ministry of Health stating that the Minister is prepared to approach the Regional Building Committee for the allocation of a starting date for the earrying out of private street works on the roads on

this Estate, on being assured that notices have been served under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and that the period allowed to the frontagers for carrying out the works has expired. He stated that he was proceeding with the necessary referencing work and would serve notices on the frontagers as early as possible.

The private streets in question are Laleham Avenue, Westmere Drive, Fernside Avenue, Southdene and The Fairway. Noted.

## (b) Penshurst Gardens, Edgware.

In connection with the Council's decision (Hi.C., 12/4/48—3 (e)) to carry out private street works on the small unmade portion of Penshurst Gardens, Edgware, the Town Clerk reported the receipt of a reply from the Ministry of Health stating that an application for an authorisation for such work cannot be considered unless the private street in question constitutes a danger to life and limb or a threat to public health. He reported that the letter had been referred to the Borough Engineer and the Medical Officer of Health, who could not certify that the road in its present condition falls in either category.

 ${\small \textbf{RESOLVED}} \ \ \textbf{TO} \ \ \textbf{RECOMMEND} \textbf{—} \textbf{That no further action be taken in this matter at the present time.}$ 

#### (c) Lee Road, Mill Hill.

The Town Clerk reported that in accordance with the Council's instructions (Hi.C., 21/6/48—14) he had informed the frontage-owners of Lee Road, Mill Hill, of the probable cost involved in making up the road. 19 replies had been received from the 34 frontagers, and 7 frontagers had indicated their opposition to the making up of the road at the present time.

The Borough Surveyor reported the receipt of a letter from the Surveyor acting for the Estate Developers indicating that they were prepared to make up the road and pay the cost thereof provided they were allowed to carry out the work themselves, but that they considered the full installation of electric lighting unnecessary at the present time.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Borough Surveyor inform the Estate Developers of the specification to which the Council will require the road to be made up, including the full provision of electric lighting.
- (2) That in the event of the Estate Developers being prepared to make up the road to such specification, authority be given to enter into an agreement in the standard form approved by the Gouncil, and that the Corporate Seal be affixed thereto.

#### (d) Green Lane, Edgware.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter received from 66 residents of Green Lane, Edgware, complaining of the bad condition of the unmade portion of the road and of the deposit of rubbish on adjoining land.

#### RESOLVED-

- (i) That the complainants be informed that the Council are unable in view of present restrictions to make up and take over the unmade portion of Green Lane.
- (ii) That the question of the deposit of rubbish on the adjoining land be referred to the Finance and General Purposes Committee with the suggestion that the owners of the land should be called upon to secure the clearance of the rubbish.

## (e) Railway Estate, Cricklewood.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a schedule of tenders received for the making up of Gratton Terrace, Midland Terrace, Johnstone Terrace, Needham Terrace and Campion Terrace. A copy of the schedule appears in manuscript in the Committee's Minute

### (g) Back Lane, Burnt Oak.

The Borough Surveyor submitted plans and estimates for the making up of the section of Back Lane (from Barnfield Road to a point adjacent to the banks of the Silkstream) which is to be used as an access road to the proposed open-air market. The estimated cost of the work is £258.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the plans and estimates propared by the Borough Surveyor be approved.
- (2) That notices under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875, be served on the frontagers, and that a period of three months be allowed for the frontagers to carry out the work.

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#### 5.—TRAVELLING FACILITIES:

## (a) High Street, Edgware-Trolleybus Turning Points

The Town Clerk reported that in pursuance of the Council's instructions (Hi.C., 28/6/48—4 (c)) he had drawn the attention of the London Transport Executive to a complaint received from the Edgware Ratepayers' Association as to obstruction caused by trolleybuses turning in High Street, Edgware, and the lack of conveniences for employees of the Executive at this point.

He reported the receipt of a reply stating that trolleybus route 645 running to Canons Park roundabout deals adequately with traffic along this part of the route and the extension of routes 664 and 66 to Canons Corner cannot be justified. The terminal arrangements were approved by the Ministry of Transport and are in the most convenient position for the travelling public. In view of the complaint, however, the staff of the Executive have been instructed to stop their vehicles in such a way as to avoid obstructing the entrance to The Forum and Wagers Yard, and steps will be taken to see that this instruction is carried out. The Executive do not consider it necessary to provide staff lavatories at Canons Park as there are public conveniences at other points which can be used and amenities are available at the Hendon Depôt, where a number of crews change over. **Noted.** 

#### (b) 'Bus Service-Woodside Park.

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Chairman of the Woodside Park Ratepayers' and Residents' Association expressing grateful thanks to those members of the Council who have supported the Association's efforts to obtain a 'bus service, which has now been inaugurated and is proving a great boon to the residents.

The Association also enquired whether a seat could be provided on the green near the 'bus turning place for the use of passengers and crew during the waiting period of about five minutes.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk inform the Chairman of the Association that the Council will provide a seat at the point in question when one can be made available.

#### 6-TRAFFIC CONTROL:

#### (a) Hendon Way-Traffic Dangers.

With reference to suggestions put forward by the Council at their meeting on the 21st June, 1948 (Hi.C., 2 (2) (m)) for reducing traffic dangers on Hendon Way near the junction of Wessex Gardens, the Town Clerk reported that arrangements had been made for police patrols to remain on duty at this point for a quarter of an hour after the opening of Wessex Gardens School each morning and afternoon. The matters referred to the Ministry of Transport are receiving attention. The London Transport Executive have arranged to re-site the 'bus stops in order that northbound 'buses shall stop on the north side of the junction. In this connection the Town Clerk submitted a letter from Mr. A. E. Harvey suggesting that in view of the fact that there is no 'bus stop nearer than the other side of The Vale, the two stops, viz., The Vale and Wessex Gardens, should be amalgamated into one, situated near Pennine Drive.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken on this suggestion.

## (b) Watford Way-Speed Limit.

At their meeting on the 11th October, 1947 (Hi.C., 15/9/47—2 (2) (a)) the Council referred to the Middlesex County Council a suggestion from the Mill Hill Ratepayers' and Residents' Association that a speed limit should be imposed on the section of Watford Way between Hartley Avenue and the "Hunter's Horn."

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The Town Clerk reported the receipt of information from the Clerk of the County Council that the Ministry of Transport are not prepared to approve the imposition of a speed limit on this section of road, since it would be contrary to the recommendations of the Departmental Committee on Road Safety. In regard to difficulty experienced in crossing the road near Mill Hill Circus and Northway Circus, the Ministry point out that erossing facilities exist at these points and that the speed of traffic is reduced by the roundabouts, so that the imposition of a speed limit would not further facilitate the passage of pedestrians. **Noted.** 

#### (c) Brent Green.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter received from the Hendon Ratepayers' Association drawing attention to dangers arising from the use of the fork road leading from Brent Street to Queen's Road by traffic travelling in a southerly direction. The Association suggested that the fork road should be made a one-way street, traffic being permitted to travel from Brent Street to Queen's Road only.

The Borough Surveyor reported on the results of a traffic census taken over a period of three hours at this point.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Council make an Order under Section 46 (2) of the Road Traffic Act, 1930, and Section 29 of the Road and Rail Traffic Act, 1933, constituting as a one-way street the fork road leading from Brent Street to Queen's Road, traffic being permitted to travel in a northerly direction only.
- (2) That the Town Clerk be authorised to take all necessary steps to secure the confirmation of the Order by the Ministry of Transport.
- (3) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents.

#### (d) Grampian Gardens and Quantock Gardens.

At their meeting in October, 1946 (Hi.C., 16/9/46—20) the Council received a complaint from Mr. A. E. Harvey that the narrow carriageway at the rear of the two islands in Grampian Gardens and Quantock Gardens gives rise to inconvenience, and that difficulty is experienced by motorists in taking cars from their garages and turning in the road, which has a total width of 14 feet. The matter was deferred for review at a later date in the light of the position in regard to labour and materials.

The Borough Surveyor reported that the estimated cost of widening the carriageway to 16 feet at the present time was approximately £1,650.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That consideration of this matter be deferred for a further period of 12 months.

#### 7.—PARKING PLACES:

#### (a) Brampton Grove.

At their meeting on the 21st June, 1948 (Hi.C., 24/5/48-13) the Council decided to acquire on lease a piece of land in Brampton Grove for use as a car park.

The Town Clerk reported that the necessary notice of the proposal had been given in accordance with Section 68 (2) of the Public Health Act, 1925, and the Trustees of certain properties in Brampton Grove had objected to the proposal on the grounds that it would cause a detriment to the income of the Estate derived from the various properties, and would affect the capital values of the Estate.

In accordance with the provisions of the Act the Council must consider and decide on any objections received and must inform the objectors of their decision. If the objectors are aggrieved by any such decision they have the right to appeal within 21 days to a Court of Petty Sessions.

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RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council adhere to their previous decision in this matter and that the Town Clerk be instructed to inform the objectors accordingly.

## (b) Mill Hill.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a report on his negotiations for the use of a piece of land in the Mill Hill Ward for the purpose of a parking place. The owners would be prepared to lease the land to the Council in the first instance for a period of seven years, subject to a six months break clause, at a rental of approximately £165 per annum. The cost of laying out the site was estimated at approximately £3,000.

 ${\bf RESOLVED\ TO\ RECOMMEND-That\ no\ further\ action\ be\ taken\ towards\ the\ provision\ of\ a\ parking\ place\ on\ the\ land\ in\ question.}$ 

#### (c) Edgware Road.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a suggestion from the Borough Engineer of Wembley that an effort should be made to improve the parking conditions in Edgware Road adjacent to Wakeman's Hill by the construction of a service road on the Wembley side from Wakeman's Hill south to a point opposite the premises of Messrs. Boots. The proposal would involve the moving of a pedestrian crossing and a 'bus stop, and the estimated cost was approximately £1,500. The Edgware Road is a Trunk Road and this Council act as agents for the Ministry of Transport in the maintenance of this particular section. The Borough Surveyor, therefore, suggested that the scheme in the first instance should be submitted to the Ministry of Transport for their observations.

The Borough Surveyor also reported that the Wembley Borough Council had raised the question of a section of Woodfield Avenue being used as a parking place.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit to the Ministry of Transport for their observations the scheme for the provision of a service road, and the suggestion for the use of part of Woodfield Avenue as a Parking Place.

#### 8.—PUBLIC LIGHTING:

#### (a) Cool Oak Lane.

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Town Clerk of Wembley stating that the Fryent Branch of the Wembley North Conservative Association had drawn attention to the lack of adequate street lighting in Cool Oak Lane, and had asked whether the lighting could be reinstated for the coming winter.

The Borough Surveyor reported that 66 panes of glass have been broken in street lamps in the section of road referred to during the first three months of this year, and only 2 of the 13 street lamps are at present in lighting. He suggested for the consideration of the Committee that the installation of sodium electric lamps might be proceeded with during the current year on this road, and in other streets on the west side of Edgware Road. The estimated cost involved would be £2,500 and adequate provision was made in the financial estimates.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to seek the approval of the Minister of Transport to the provision of sodium electric lighting in the streets on the west side of Edgware Road.

#### (b) Mill Hill Subway.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Rev. G. J. Byrnell drawing attention to considerable inconvenience, especially to women residents, caused by the lack of lighting in the Mill Hill Subway, and suggesting that the use of roof lighting in the tunnel should be abandoned and lighting be provided by strongly protected lamps on the existing standards at each end of the tunnel.

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The Borough Surveyor stated that considerable sums of money have been spent in replacing the lighting system in the subway since the war and despite all precautions, including a night patrol, lights have been destroyed within a few weeks of installation and the fittings severely damaged.

The Committee instructed the Borough Surveyor to look into this matter and submit a report at a future meeting on possible methods of lighting the subway, and

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Town Clerk be instructed to write to the Residents' Association drawing attention to the damage to public property which is continually occurring in the subway and seeking their assistance in preventing such damage.
- (2) That the Town Clerk send an informative reply to the complainant.

#### (c) Improvement Scheme.

The Borough Surveyor reported that the erection of concrete columns for the improved lighting scheme was in hand and 36 columns were in position, some fully equipped with lanterns and fittings, on a section of Selvage Lane. Suitable arrangements have been made with the Gas Light and Coke Co. for the change from gas to electricity, and negotiations are proceeding with the North Middlesex Gas Company. The majority of lamps in the roads now being dealt with are within the area of the Gas Light and Coke Company. Noted.

#### 9.—PRINCES PARK AVENUE—JUNCTION WITH BRIDGE LANE:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from a resident drawing attention to alleged traffic dangers at the junction of Princes Park Avenue and Bridge Lane, and suggesting that a "Halt" sign should be erected in the former street.

The request was passed to the Borough Surveyor, who has arranged as a temporary measure for the painting of the word "Slow" on the carriageway.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no further action be taken in this matter.

#### 10.—FOOTPATH FROM GLENDOR GARDENS TO MILLWAY, MILL HILL:

As instructed at the last meeting the Town Clerk submitted a report on the legal position in regard to the making up of ancient highways, with particular reference to this footpath. It appeared from the information available that the footpath is not an ancient highway.

RESOLVED-That the Borough Surveyor submit at a future meeting a report on the most economical method of improving the condition of this footpath in order that the Committee may put forward a suitable scheme for the observations of the frontagers concerned.

#### 11.-MAKING UP OF ANCIENT HIGHWAYS:

RESOLVED-That the Officers be instructed to submit at a future meeting a report on ancient highways generally, with a list of ancient highways in the Borough repairable by the inhabitants at large.

## 12.—PEDESTRIAN CROSSING—HOLDERS HILL CIRCUS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the construction of permanent refuges and pedestrian crossings at Holders Hill Circus in accordance with the scheme adopted by the Council on the 5th April, 1948 (Hi.C., 1/3/48-3) was completed. From observations taken at the point the new site for the refuge in Dollis Road appeared to be satisfactory both from a traffic point of view and for pedestrians using the crossing.

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## 13.-WISE LANE, MILL HILL:

The Borough Surveyor reminded the Committee that the eventual widening and improvement of Wise Lane would result in a road 50 feet in width, and stated that Sir Charles McRae was prepared to give up to the Council free of cost an area of approximately 70 square yards of his property at "Arrandene" opposite Mill Hill Park to enable the full width of the road to be obtained. In the event of a Conveyance being required the legal costs would be borne by the Council.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the offer of Sir Charles McRae be accepted with thanks.
- (2) That a Conveyance in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk be accepted from the owner and that any legal costs in connection therewith be borne by the Council.
- (3) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents, and
- (4) That the Middlesex County Council be asked to approve the proposal.

#### 14.—WIRELESS RELAY SERVICE:

At their meeting on the 24th May, 1948, the Committee instructed the officers to consult with Multi-Broadcast (Engineering) Limited on the question of a Wireless Relay Service being installed on the Watling Estate.

The Borough Surveyor reported that the Company have now informed him that in view of the large capital outlay required to establish a main station they are not prepared to submit a scheme for the Watling Estate only. The Borough Surveyor also reported that it is not the practice of the London County Council to give consent to the installation of a Wireless Relay Service on their Estates where such installation involves overhead wiring. **Noted.** 

#### 15.—USE OF MECHANICAL SWEEPER:

The Borough Surveyor reported that during the Summer Recess experiments had been carried out with a mechanical sweeper over some 40 miles of roads in the Borough and the results obtained were reasonably satisfactory. He proposed to carry out further trials during the late Autumn, and would submit a further report at a future meeting.

Noted.

## 16.-MAKING UP OF KENILWORTH ROAD AND FAIRMEAD CRESCENT:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a report on the question of making up Kenilworth Road and Fairmead Crescent, Edgware. Under the agreement for purchase of the adjoining land by the Council for housing purposes the Council have undertaken to relieve the frontagers of all liability in respect of the making up of the sections of road in question.

The Borough Surveyor suggested that the works should not be carried out until such time as building development is completed, but that in order to effect some improvement at present the paving should be taken up and re-laid as required, broken stones replaced, and a footpath provided on the short section on the westerly side of Kenilworth Road opposite the junction with Fairmead Crescent, linking up the footpath of the two sections of this road. The estimated cost of such works is £983 in respect of Kenilworth Road and £564 in respect of Fairmead Crescent.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to carry out the above work at an estimated cost of £983 in respect of Kenilworth Road and £564 in respect of Fairmead Crescent.

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#### 17.—SIGNS ON LAMP POSTS:

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application from the Hon. Secretary of St. Barnabas' Church, Temple Fortune, for permission to fix direction signs on lamp posts at 6 points in the vicinity of the Church.

In view of the Council's policy to restrict the use of signs on highways as far as possible, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor inform the applicant that permission will be given for the fixing of direction signs to lamp posts at two of the six points in question on the usual conditions.

## 18.—EDGWARE ROAD—SURFACING OF CARRIAGEWAY:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a schedule of tenders received for the laying of bituminous surfacing on the Edgware Road. A copy of the schedule appears in Manuscript in the Committee's Minute Book.

He also reported that it would be necessary to provide a special form of construction at 'bus stopping places as the thin carpet now proposed would not withstand the excessive wear at these points. It will, therefore, be necessary to take up the existing wood blocks and provide a special asphalt binder base finished off with 2" asphalt, at an estimated cost of £1,403 3s. 6d. This amount is within that allowed in the financial estimates and approved by the Ministry of Transport.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the lowest tender received, viz., that of Constable, Hart & Co., Ltd., amounting to £4,218 6s. 9d., be accepted, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Transport and to the execution of a contract in accordance with the Council's Standing Orders.
- (2) That the recommendations of the Borough Surveyor for special works at 'bus stopping places at an estimated cost of £1,403 3s. 6d. be approved.
- (3) That authority be given for the Corporate Seal to be affixed to any necessary documents.

#### 19.—MAINTENANCE OF FOOTPATHS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the provision made in the current rate estimates in respect of footpath repairs to be carried out by Contract had now been absorbed. In view of the necessity of continuing urgent work of this character it was suggested that further financial provision to the extent of £5,000 should be made.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That a supplementary estimate of £5,000 be approved for the carrying out of works of footpath repair during the current financial year.

### 20.—TRAVELLING FACILITIES CONFERENCE AT HARROW:

RESOLVED—That the Town Clerk write to the Harrow Urban District Council pressing for an early meeting of the Conference of Local Authorities on the question of travelling facilities in N.W. London.

## 21.—PROPOSED OPEN-AIR MARKET AND CAR PARK:

The Borough Treasurer reported the receipt of information from the Valuer and Housing Officer of the London County Council that he was taking the instructions of his Committee with a view to agreeing a reduced rental for the land which this Council propose to acquire from the London County Council for the purpose of an open-air market and car park. Noted.

### 1.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £759 18s. 4d. were submitted and approved.

#### 2.—FAIRS IN PARKS AND OPEN SPACES:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a further letter from the Showmen's Guild of Great Britain requesting the Committee to receive a deputation to discuss the question of the Council's recent decision to prohibit fairs in the parks and open spaces.

RESOLVED—That a deputation from the Showmen's Guild be received at the next meeting.

#### 3.—MILL HILL PARK—DAMAGE:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of letters from the Rev. G. J. Byrnell drawing attention to damage caused in Mill Hill Park and to cycling on the footpaths and stressing the need for adequate supervision with a view to preserving the amenities of the park.

RESOLVED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to submit a report on the matter to the next meeting.

#### 4.—SMALL PLAYGROUNDS AT HALF-MILE INTERVALS:

The Town Clerk reported a letter from the Hon. Organising Secretary of the Five Million Club expressing the hope that the Council would adopt, in principle, the Club's ideal standard of small playgrounds at half-mile intervals, and stating that such standard which had been endorsed by the National Playing Fields Association and Sir Patrick Abercrombie had already been adopted in principle by many progressive cities and towns.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council adopt, in principle, the standard of small playgrounds at half-mile intervals.

## 5.—HENDON PARK-DECK CHAIRS:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Hendon Ratepayers' Association enquiring whether consideration could be given to the question of the provision of deck chairs in Hendon Park and expressed the hope that such provision might be made next year.

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RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform the Hendon Ratepayers' Association that the matter will be considered in time for next season.

## 6.—LAND ADJOINING DOLLIS BROOK REAR OF BELL LANE NURSERY:

It was reported by the Town Clerk that Messrs. Soper and Son lease from the Council a piece of land adjoining Dollis Brook at the rear of Bell Lane Nursery for the purpose of a Nursery Garden at a rental of £5 per annum. The lease which is for a period of five years expires on the 29th instant and Messrs. Soper and Company have applied for a renewal of the lease and at the same time state that they would be prepared to negotiate with the Council for the purchase of such land.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform Messrs. Soper and Son that the Council are prepared to renew the lease for a period of five years at a rent of £25 per annum.

Recommendation of Finance and General Purposes Committee.

That the recommendation be amended by the substitution of "£10" for "£25."

## 7.—NATIONAL PLAYING FIELDS ASSOCIATION—ANNUAL CONFERENCE:

A communication was submitted from the above-mentioned Association inviting the Council to appoint delegates to the Annual Conference of Affiliated Local Authorities to be held at Caxton Hall, S.W. 1, on the 28th and 29th September, 1948. A conference registration fee of 5/- per delegate is payable. Having regard to the date of the Conference the Committee have appointed the Chairman (Councillor H. L. K. Johnson) to attend, and

RECOMMEND-That the action taken be confirmed.

#### 8.—PARKS NURSERIES:

The Town Clerk reported that at an interview on the 7th September between the Chairman of the Housing Committee and representatives of the Tenants' Associations on the Council's Housing Estates, a suggestion was made that it might be possible for bedding plants, etc., to be purchased by the tenants from the Council's Nurseries. On consideration of the suggestion, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform the Housing Tenants' Associations that the Council regret they are unable to adopt the suggestion.

#### 9.—LABELLING OF PLANTS, ETC.:

The Chairman referred to the letter from Mr. A. M. Sayers, read by His Worship the Mayor at the Special Meeting of the Council, expressing appreciation of the flowers provided throughout the season in Hendon Park, and suggesting that in the cases of the more unusual specimens, the plants might be labelled.

The Committee have instructed the Borough Surveyor to arrange for the labelling of such plants as suggested.

## 10.--MOAT MOUNT OPEN SPACE-SERVICE PIPE TO CAMP SITE:

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had been in communication with the Colne Valley Water Company regarding the question of the water supply pipe to the Camp Site. The Water Company are prepared to extend their main in Barnet Way to a point adjacent to the camp site. The cost of the work to them would be approximately £600 and it would be necessary for the Council to enter into an agreement with the Company in accordance with the provisions of the Water Act, 1945. The only supply taken from the main, in the first instance, would be to the camp site and it is improbable that further supplies would be connected to it.

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The Committee are of opinion that the cost of this work should be borne by the County Council, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to refer the matter to the Middlesex County Council with a recommendation that this work should be undertaken.

#### 11.-WATLING PARK:

#### (a) Damage.

It was reported by the Borough Surveyor that the following damage was caused at Watling Park between 10 p.m. on the 5th July and 7 a.m. on the 6th July.

- (1) Lock damaged and gate forced open at Fortescue Road entrance.
- (2) Electricity supply cable to entertainment arena damaged.
- (3) Locks on gate and door to dressing rooms broken.
- (4) Fence around flower garden damaged.
- (5) Two coping stones on bridge removed.
- (6) Plants to the value of £2 removed from the flower beds and broken on the lawns.

The police were duly informed of the damage, but no arrests have been made.

Noted.

#### (b) Estimate of Cost of Additional Buildings, etc.

Pursuant to the Committee's instructions the Borough Surveyor submitted plans and estimates as follows:—

- (i) That the plans and estimates be approved and that the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the necessary work to be undertaken.
- (ii) That financial provision for such expenditure be made in next year's Rate Estimates.

## 12.—SUNNY HILL PARK—RENEWAL OF FENCING:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the section of the fence which is the property of the Council, between Sunny Hill Park and the rear of the gardens of the houses Nos. 2/20, St. Mary's Crescent is in a very bad condition, and he suggested that for the time being, cleft chestnut fencing be erected against the existing fencing at a cost of approximately £50.

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## 13.-PRINCES PARK-SALE OF REFRESHMENTS:

In connection with the licence granted to Mrs. E. Marriott for the right to sell refreshments in the above-mentioned park on payment to the Council of a sum of £10, the Borough Surveyor reported on a letter from Mrs. Marriott stating that there is a very poor demand for refreshments in this park and asking whether in the circumstances, the Council will allow her to pay £5 instead of £10 as originally agreed.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to inform Mrs. Marriott that the Council agree to accept a sum of £5 for the right to sell refreshments in this park.

## 14.—LAND—JUNCTION OF WEST WAY WITH FARM ROAD, EDGWARE:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a plan of the above-mentioned land, together with an estimate amounting to £800 for the laying out of the land, which has an area of .77 acres, by the provision of shrubs, lawns with paths and seats.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the plan and estimate amounting to £800 be approved and the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the work to be carried out.
- (ii) That financial provision be made for the expenditure in next year's Rate Estimates.

### 15.—ISLAND SITE, JUNCTION OF WATFORD WAY WITH THE BURROUGHS:

In accordance with the Committee's instructions, the Borough Surveyor reported that he had communicated with the Ministry of Transport regarding the suggestion that arrangements should be made for keeping in a neat and tidy condition the above-mentioned island site. The Ministry point out that the Middlesex County Council are the agent authority for Watford Way and are doing all in their power to keep it in a neat and tidy condition. The Ministry do not think it is possible for arrangements to be made for this authority to maintain it at the Ministry's expense, in view of the fact that Hendon is not the agent authority for this length of road, but state, however, that if Hendon would like to undertake the work at their own expense until it is required for other highway purposes, it might be possible to make some arrangement.

In view of the fact that the Middlesex County Council is the agent authority for the road in question, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to make representations to the Engineer of the County Council regarding the condition of such island site.

## 16.—OPEN SPACE AT WILLIFIELD GREEN, HAMPSTEAD GARDEN SUBURB:

The Borough Surveyor reported that he had been in further communication with the Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust Ltd. regarding their suggestion that the Council should take over and maintain Willifield Green and pay the Trust the sum of £410–19s. 5d. in respect of road charges already paid by the Trust. The Trust now state that they are willing to convey the freehold of the land to the Council in consideration of a payment of £400 and to waive their claim for a refund of the road charges.

It will be recalled that the Council has already informed the Trust that they are prepared to take over the land on similar terms to those applicable to other open spaces taken over on the Garden Suburb. (E.P. & A.C., 1/3/48—15.)

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to inform the Hampstead Carden Suburb Trust Ltd. that the Council are not prepared to vary their previous decision in the matter, and to call the Trust's attention to the untidy condition of the site.

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## 17.--DEDICATION OF LAND—ROTHERWICK ROAD, GOLDERS GREEN:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a letter and plan from the Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust Ltd. suggesting that certain plots and narrow margins forming part of Rotherwick Road at its junction with Finehley Road should be taken over and maintained as part of the public highway.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That, subject to a conveyance of the land free of cost and free from all outgoings, such plots of land and margins be taken over and maintained as part of the public highway.

## 18.—BRENT PARK—SALE OF REFRESHMENTS:

The Committee gave consideration to the question of the sale of refreshments in Brent Park adjacent to the North Circular Road. It would appear that the licensee is not trading from the site approved by the Borough Surveyor and that Notice Boards advertising refreshments are hung on the railings of the park fronting the North Circular Road. The Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to require the licensee to trade from the approved site, and to remove the notice boards from the railings, failing which the licence be terminated.

#### ALLOTMENTS COMMITTEE.

#### 19.—WAR-TIME TEMPORARY ALLOTMENTS, MILL HILL SCHOOL:

The Town Clerk reported on a letter from the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries in further reference to the Council's decision to release from allotments the land belonging to Mill Hill School on the 30th September. The Ministry agrees that in the circumstances set out in the Bursar's letter of the 14th May, the Council's decision is justified, but feels that in view of the fact that many plot-holders have sown late-maturing crops, the School should be asked to allow access to the plots, so that those crops may be harvested. At the same time, it is felt that the Council should make every effort to secure alternative plots to accommodate the plot-holders when they are displaced at the end of September, and the Ministry would be glad to hear what steps the Council propose to take in this matter. In this connection, the Ministry's Land Commissioner suggests that the plot-holders could be accommodated at Arrandene on land bordering Wise Lane.

A letter has also been received from the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies asking for land to be provided for the displaced allottees.

The Borough Treasurer suggested that an area of approximately  $1\frac{1}{2}$  acres of land at Bunns Lane could be made available for the displaced allottees and the Borough Surveyor's estimate for the removal of turf on such land is £20. This land would provide approximately 32 plots, 22 of which would be required for the displaced allottees. The Committee have instructed the Town Clerk to ask the Mill Hill School Authorities to allow access to the plots on their land beyond the 30th September, 1948, so that the crops may be harvested.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (i) That the action taken by the Committee be confirmed.
- (ii) That an area of approximately one and half acres of land at Bunns Lane be made available for allotments at an estimated cost of £20.

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## 20.-FENCING AND WATER SUPPLIES TO ALLOTMENTS:

Pursuant to the Committee's instructions the Borough Surveyor submitted estimates of the costs of the provision of feneing and water supplies to allotments in accordance with a list of sites supplied by the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies. The representatives of the Federation informed the Committee that there were further allotments requiring feneing and water supplies particulars of which would be forwarded to the Borough Surveyor in time for the next meeting. In these circumstances the Committee deferred consideration of the matter until the next meeting, and instructed the Borough Surveyor to submit a complete list of such allotments with estimates of the costs of the works involved.

#### 21.—HENDON PARK—TEMPORARY ALLOTMENTS—FENCING:

The Committee deferred to the next meeting consideration of an estimate for the provision of fencing to the allotments in Hendon Park.

#### 22.—DEANS LANE ALLOTMENTS:

A request from the Hendon Federation of Allotment Societies for the construction of a clinker roadway at an estimated cost of £45 to provide a turning space for lorries was deferred until the next meeting.

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# Report of the Works Committee.

#### 1.—REQUISITIONS:

Requisitions amounting to £3,572 3s. 1d. were submitted and approved.

#### 2.—TRANSPORT—COUNCIL'S CARS:

The Town Clerk reported that at the meeting of the Council held on the 26th July last, in connection with a question raised by a member, the Chairman agreed that consideration would be given to the question of putting the Council's crest on motor cars belonging to the Council. The Committee duly considered the matter, and

RESOLVED-That no action be taken thereon.

#### 3.—ANNUAL CONTRACTS:

The Committee had before them for further consideration the question of returning to the pre-war practice of entering into Annual Contracts for supplies and services after obtaining tenders by public advertisement, consideration of which was deferred by the Committee at their meeting on the 8th March last for a period of six months.

RESOLVED-That consideration of this matter be deferred for a further period of six months.

#### 4.—SALVAGE:

#### (a) National Waste Paper Contest.

The Town Clerk reported that the result of the National Waste Paper Contest held during March, April and May had now been announced by the Waste Paper Recovery Association Limited. The prize winners in the Borough Councils' section of the contest were:—

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#### (b) Salvage Incentive Bonus.

The Town Clerk reported that notification had now been received of the National Joint Industrial Council's decision on the question of payment of an incentive bonus to salvage workers. The National Council state that they have investigated the circumstances which bear upon this matter, and have communicated to the Parliamentary Secretary of the Board of Trade their considered view in the following terms:—

"The Council is of the view that the Government should appeal to local authorities to revive the war-time enthusiasm for salvage collection, leaving it to the local authorities to deal with the problem according to local circumstances and possibilities."

It was also pointed out that no fresh appeal has yet been made by the Government on this matter and no expression of opinion has been received as to the payment of bonus.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to communicate with the Minister of Health referring to his previous observations in this matter, pointing out that the salvage incentive bonus scheme previously submitted is not based on profit but on the increased effort on the part of the men, and enquiring whether the Minister's views would be modified in the light of the National Council's decision.

#### (c) Salvage Returns.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a statement (copies of which had previously been circulated) showing the tonnage of salvage disposed of for the years ended 31st March, 1946, 1947 and 1948, and the period ended 31st March, 1948, together with particulars of the value of the salvage under the various headings.

He also reported that the number of streets or large blocks of flats on a weekly basis of collection was 773 and the number on a basis of between 1 and 2 weeks was 38.

Noted.

#### (d) Salvage Drive.

The Borough Surveyor reported that 9,000 "S" cards for display by house-holders in their windows were issued in the Burnt Oak and Edgware Wards, but he was unable to give particulars of the results at this early stage.

The Committee were informed that the distribution of these cards had been carried out voluntarily by members of the Borough Engineer's staff.

RESOLVED-That the best thanks of the Committee be conveyed to the staff concerned.

### (e) Waste Paper Collection.

A member of the Committee stated that he had received complaints that clean paper was not being kept separate from other refuse by the collectors. The Borough Surveyor undertook to investigate such complaints.

#### 5.-FIRE SERVICES ACT, 1947:

## (a) Management Scheme.

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of the County Council's Management Scheme under the Fire Services Act, 1947, which has now been approved, without amendment, by the Secretary of State. Accordingly Finchley and Hendon are grouped together for the purpose of the appointment of one district member to the County Fire Brigade Committee, and in accordance with the requirements of the Scheme the Clerk of the County Council has been informed of the name of the first representative of the group, viz., Councillor F. L. Pike, nominated by the Finchley Borough Council at the invitation of this Council. Noted.

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## (b) Transfer of Property.

The Town Clerk reported that in accordance with the Regulations made under the Fire Services Act, 1947, property used by the National Fire Service and vested in this Council as Fire Authority under the Fire Services Act, 1938, was automatically transferred to the Middlesex County Council on the 1st April, 1948. Accordingly the Central Fire Station, the Mill Hill Fire Station and the Firemen's cottages at Mill Hill have been transferred to the County Council. The County Council have also claimed the transfer of a piece of land adjoining 185, Granville Road which was purchased by the Corporation for Fire Service purposes but had never been developed for such purposes and had, in fact, been let to a tenant. The claim has been resisted in view of the fact that the land was not used for the purposes of the Fire Service immediately before the Appointed Day.

The County Council have, therefore, suggested that the matter should be submitted to the Home Office for a decision, but before this is done they ask that this Council should intimate their willingness to accept the ruling of the Secretary of State in the matter.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform the Clerk of the County Council of this Council's opinion that this land should be excluded from the property transferred to the County Council, and that the Council is not prepared to accept the decision of the Secretary of State as binding.

#### 6.-PRECAUTIONS AGAINST RATS IN SEWERS:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a circular from the Infestation Control Division of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries drawing attention to the necessity of maintaining precautions against rats in sewers. In particular, it is pointed out that rats frequent disused lengths of sewers for nesting and it is recommended that when new sewers are laid all old sewers should either be removed or filled up with weak concrete.

Where there is reason to believe that faulty connections from premises are giving rise to infestation by rats it is recommended that local authorities should investigate the condition of such connections and, where necessary, take action under existing powers to have them repaired.

In addition, it is recommended that provision should be made for the deposit of baits when designing new manholes. Noted.

#### 7.—PUBLIC CONVENIENCES:

#### (a) Compulsory Purchase Orders.

The Town Clerk reminded the Committee that the Council have resolved to make Compulsory Purchase Orders in respect of the sites of 6 proposed public conveniences, and submitted a petition received from 78 residents of Princes Park Avenue protesting against the Council's proposal to erect a public convenience in that road on the grounds that the proposal would result in depreciation of property values. The petitioners ask that further consideration be given to this matter and that they be given an opportunity to state their case before any further steps are taken.

The Town Clerk reported that in connection with the proposed orders the names and addresses of owners had been ascertained, but having regard to the Government White Paper on Capital Expenditure, the Ministry of Health had been asked whether the expenditure of money on the acquisition of sites and the erection of public conveniences would be sanctioned at the present time. A reply had been received stating that in the present circumstances the Minister can only approve the erection of public conveniences and sanction of loan to defray the costs thereof in cases where it can be substantiated that there is an immediate and pressing need for such provision on grounds of public health. Where provision is desirable but not absolutely essential proposals must be deferred until the labour and material position has considerably improved.

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ten ma The Borough Surveyor suggested an alternative site to the one at Princes Park Avenue particulars of which are given in manuscript in the Committee's Minute Book, and the Committee were of the opinion that the proposed site should be adopted in lieu of the Princes Park Avenue site.

Having regard to the reply of the Ministry of Health the Committee considered that it was advisable that the land for these sites should be purchased now even though approval might not be granted to the erection of public conveniences, and

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the necessary steps be taken for the compulsory acquisition of the sites previously approved, with the exception of that at Princes Park Avenue.
- (2) That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for negotiations for the acquisition by agreement of the site referred to in manuscript.
- (3) That in the event of such negotiations being unsuccessful the Council make an Order under the Public Health Act, 1936, and the Acquisition of Land (Authorisation Procedure) Act, 1946, for the compulsory acquisition of the site.
- (4) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to such copies of the Order as may be necessary.

#### (b) Free User.

The Committee considered the question of allowing the use of public lavatories without payment, and were informed that the financial loss involved would amount to approximately £870 per annum.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the use of the W.C's in the public conveniences indicated hereunder be available to the public free of cost:—

- (2) That in the case of the Centlemen's W.C's the doors be kept locked.

### (c) Installation of Weighing Machines.

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application from Barclays Weighers Limited for permission to instal personal weighing machines in the gentlemen's public conveniences in the Borough. The conveniences mentioned are Station Road, Edgware; Childs Hill, Orange Hill Road, Hartley Avenue and Hendon Central, and the company is prepared to pay as rent for this privilege £5 per machine, payable in advance. The maintenance of the machines would be the Company's responsibility and it is stated that the machines are fully insured with a reputable company against third party claims.

## RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That permission be granted for the installation of the weighing machines in the public conveniences indicated above, subject to an agreement being entered into in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk.
- (2) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to the necessary document.

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## (d) West Hendon-Renewal of Signs.

The Borough Surveyor reported that the external illuminated signs at the West Hendon public convenience are defective, and a quotation had been obtained from the Eastern Electricity Board for all necessary alterations to wiring and supply of new lamp holders and lamps complete, amounting to £38–15s. 0d.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the quotation of the Eastern Electricity Board amounting to £38 15s. Od. be accepted.

### & ELMCROFT AVENUE—WATERCOURSE:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a complaint made on behalf of a number of residents in Elmcroft Avenue and Wentworth Road regarding the flooding which occurs after heavy storms as a result, it is alleged, of the condition of the unculverted portion of the watercourse at the rear of Nos. 12, 14, 16 and 18, Elmcroft Avenue, N.W. 11.

The Town Clerk also reported that in view of the fact that a statutory nuisance under Section 259 of the Public Health Act, 1936, appeared to exist, authority from the Chairman of the Public Health Committee had been obtained to carry out temporary works of cleansing the watercourse pending further consideration being given to the matter by this Committee.

In addition to the complaint as regards the culverting of the watercourse mentioned above, the complainants state that flooding occurs in the area near the junction of Elmcroft Avenue and Ravenscroft Avenue during times of heavy rainfall. It is stated that at times the sewage from the main sewer backs up the premises Nos. 18, 24 and 26, Elmcroft Avenue and the complainants request that this matter should be investigated.

It appears that the floods arise from the fact that the watercourse is, during the summer months, used for the deposit of garden refuse, etc., and it is possible that the works of cleansing may prove to be adequate. As regards the complaint that sewage backs up into certain premises in times of storm, it appears that this is a consequence of the floods from the blocked watercourse mentioned above. It is understood that it is the practice for certain householders to open up inspection chambers, etc., in order to get rid of the water, with the result that overflows from the sewers occur in low places.

The Committee having considered the report of the Town Clerk and Borough Surveyor

RESOLVED—That further consideration of this matter be deferred until the result of the work at present in progress can be ascertained.

#### 9.—CIRCULATION OF REPORTS:

RESOLVED-That in future all reports of the Borough Surveyor dealing with matters to be considered by this Committee be circulated with the Agenda.

#### 10.—TRADE REFUSE COLLECTION:

The Borough Surveyor submitted a report relating to the collection and disposal of trade refuse in the Borough operated by the Council in accordance with the provisions of Section 73 of the Public Health Act, 1936. The present scale of charges for this weekly service is as follows:—

### 11.-DISUSED WATER TANKS AT REFUSE WORKS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that 29 tons of these tanks have been removed and it is estimated that to date the dump has been reduced by about two-thirds.

#### 12.—DISUSED DOMESTIC WATER TANKS:

Reference was made to the difficulty experienced by residents in disposing of disused domestic water tanks, and the Borough Engineer was instructed to submit a report on the matter to the next meeting of the Committee.

#### 13.-FITTERS IN CHARGE, REFUSE DISPOSAL WORKS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that in February last the pay of the two fitters in charge at the Refuse Disposal Works was increased by 10/- per week over and above their basic rate in order to establish their supervisory position on their respective shifts. Since that date the stokers and trimmers have received substantial increases under the recent J.I.C. awards, but the two fitters in charge, who are on Amalgamated Engineering Union rates have had no increases. These two men carry out the duties of shift engineers and, as such, are directly responsible to the Resident Engineer for the work of the men on their respective shifts.

The Borough Surveyor suggested that these men should be placed in Miscellaneous Grade I of the National Joint Council Scales, commencing at £345 per annum and rising by £15 increments to £390 per annum (including London weighting). The Committee are in agreement with the recommendation of the Borough Engineer, and

RESOLVED-That the matter be submitted to the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee for favourable consideration.

#### 14.—OAKHAMPTON ROAD AND DEVONSHIRE ROAD—SURFACE WATER SEWERS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the contract for surface water sewerage works at Oakhampton Road was completed on the 27th July, and the contract in respect of Devonshire Road was completed on the 14th September. Noted.

### 15.—SURFACE WATER SEWER—RAILWAY ESTATE, CRICKLEWOOD:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the work of constructing the surface water relief sewer by direct labour for the outlet of the Railway Estate at Cricklewood was commenced on the 17th August last. The total length of concrete pipes to be laid is 118 yards; progress to date has been satisfactory, approximately 40% of the work having been completed. Noted.

### 16.—DISMANTLING AND COLLECTION OF MORRISON SHELTERS:

The Borough Surveyor reported that the contract for the dismantling and collection of Morrison shelters in the district would be completed in the course of the next few days, bringing the total number of shelters dealt with up to approximately 6,000.

Noted.

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#### 17 .-- SWIMMING POOLS:

### (a) Installation of Automatic Machines.

The Borough Surveyor submitted an application from the Automatic Hair-Cream Vending Machines Limited for permission to instal their machines at the two open-air swimming baths. The Brylereem machine is coin-operated and delivers a suitable quantity of Brylereem to enable a man to dress his hair after bathing. The Council would receive one-third of all cash taken from the machines, and the standard form of agreement provides for the takings to be removed by officers of the Council and the balance of two-thirds to be forwarded to the licensees at monthly intervals. The Corporation will not be held responsible for any damage to the machines, but it will be the duty of the Council's employees to keep the machines replenished with the hair cream and notify the licensees when further supplies are necessary. The installation would be made next season.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the application of the Automatic Hair-Cream Vending Machines Limited be approved.
- (2) That an agreement in relation thereto be entered into with the Company in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk.
- · (3) That the Corporate Seal be affixed to any necessary documents.

#### (b) Appreciation of Work of Attendant.

The Committee noted with satisfaction a letter received from Mr. R. W. Haward, examiner for the Royal Life Saving Society which related to the examination of youths for the bronze medallion of the Society at the Mill Hill Swimming Pool. The letter stated that the youths were trained by the Superintendent at Mill Hill and the writer desired to place on record his appreciation of the work Mr. Eldred is doing on their behalf.

#### 18.-DAMAGE TO MAYORAL CAR:

The Chairman of the Committee referred to the press report arising out of a case heard at the Hendon Police Court when a previous driver of the mayoral car was fined, and submitted a report by the Borough Engineer from which it appeared that the statements contained in the press report were not in accordance with the facts. The Committee have asked the Chairman to make a statement on the matter at the next meeting of the Council.

#### 19.—REPLACEMENT OF MAYORAL CAR:

The Committee have instructed the Borough Surveyor to submit a report and estimates to the next meeting of the Committee for the provision of a new mayoral car.

#### 20.—PURCHASE OF VEHICLES:

The Chairman of the Committee reported that in accordance with the authority of the Council (W.C., 7/7/48—13 (a)) quotations had been obtained for the supply of Austin 16 h.p. cars for £714 and for Vauxhall 18 h.p. cars for £525 from Car Mart and Spurlings Motor Bodies Limited respectively, and also that one Vauxhall 18 h.p. car had been ordered from Spurling Motor Bodies Limited at a price of £525.

### 21.—PETROLEUM CONSOLIDATED ACTS, 1928 AND 1936:

The Borough Surveyor submitted for the information of the Committee applications for the renewal of five licences to store petroleum and petroleum mixture for the year ending 31st December, 1948. Under the authority given (Group II Committee Meeting, 7/2/44—W. & F.B.C.—21) the necessary licences will be issued accordingly. The Borough Surveyor submitted a quotation amounting to £6 12s. 6d. for the provision of two temporary lighting points in the Junior Library (now used as the Lending Department) to improve the lighting to the service table and between the two ranges of book stacks.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND.—That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to accept the quotation for carrying out the above lighting improvements at an estimated cost of £6 12s. 6d.

### 14.—LONDON & MIDDLESEX ARCHÆOLOGICAL SOCIETY:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the London and Middlesex Archæological Society with reference to the pottery which had been found at Brockley Hill. The letter stated that serious consideration had been given to the most suitable method of procuring the preservation of the pottery found and at the same time bringing the collection to the notice of residents in the area and others interested. Both the Excavation Committee and the Society are of the opinion that the collection should be kept intact and housed under one roof and they have come to the conclusion that if the Council would be willing to accept the custody of the pottery, this would most effectively secure the aims they have in view. The Society offer the pottery to the Council on permanent loan.

The London County Council are experiencing considerable difficulty in connection with the terms under which the land was conveyed to the Council, but hope to be in a position to forward their proposals in the near future. **Noted.**

The organisers of the exhibition will be responsible for the safety of the materials whilst at Olympia and for the provision of labour and erection of models, etc., in Olympia, but they cannot be responsible for the transport of the materials if it involves, as it may, special transport by road. The Executive Committee of the Housing and Town Planning Council feel this is a project they should encourage and they have accordingly agreed to assist in co-ordinating this part of the work, and they ask whether the Council have any material, preferably models, which they will be prepared to send to Olympia and loan for the period of the exhibition.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the matter be referred to the Borough Surveyor with a view to assisting, if at all possible, with the supply of material for such exhibition.

It will be recalled that the tender of the All Counties Engineering Company Limited amounting to £7,061 5s. 5d. had been accepted for the formation of the roads on the first part of this estate and the work is at present in hand.

In order to provide the necessary builder's roads for the contract of J. Laing and Sons Limited which will commence shortly, the Borough Surveyor reported that he had negotiated a further tender with the same firm for the completion of the laying out of the builder's roads on this estate. The tender is based on the same unit prices as the tender already accepted with the exception of a few minor adjustments where prices have altered. The total amount of the new tender is £6,873–9s. 7d.

It will substantially speed up the work of developing this estate if this firm carry on with the laying out of the builder's roads as they have the necessary excavating plant on the site and can proceed with the work immediately. The final making up of the road consisting of kerbing, paving and carriageway surfacing will be the subject of a further contract at a later date.

The Borough Surveyor therefore recommended that the tender of the All Counties Engineering Company Limited amounting to £6,873–9s. 7d. be provisionally accepted and submitted to the Ministry of Health for approval. It will also be necessary to make application to the Ministry of Health for consent to the borrowing of a sum of £7,160–0s. 0d. for a period not exceeding 20 years, based on the following figures:—

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### 33.—MINISTRY OF HEALTH CIRCULAR 108/48:

The Town Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Ministry of Health confirming an allocation of 300 houses for the next twelve months of which 60 may be private licences if the Council so desire. The figure of 300 will be exclusive of "cost of works" rebuilds and of the 106 houses to be built on the Kenilworth Estate. A report by the Borough Surveyor thereon was also submitted. It will be recalled that it has already been agreed (Hsg.C., 5/7/48-28) that in order to protect the limited amount of land available in the Borough for building new houses that it is desirable that licences should only be issued to persons who would be eligible for a Council house under the existing scheme of allocation. Noted.

#### 34.—NEW TOWNS:

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The Committee gave consideration to the question of the desirability of ascertaining whether there are any building operatives residing in the Borough who are on the waiting list for housing accommodation, and who would be willing to reside, in the first instance, in temporary hutments at Hemel Hempstead, subsequently transferring to permanent accommodation, to enable them to be employed in connection with the construction of the new town.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Housing Officer be instructed to ascertain from housing applicants who are employed as building operatives whether or not they would wish their names to be submitted to the Hemel Hempstead Development Corporation for accommodation in the new town and to forward particulars of such applicants as are agreeable to the Hemel Hempstead Development Corporation.

## 1.—TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT, 1947—CIRCULARS AND REGULATIONS:

#### (a) Ministry of Town and Country Planning.

The Town Clerk submitted the following Circulars and Statutory Instruments received from the Ministry of Town and Country Planning:—

- (i) Circular No. 51 and Statutory Instrument No. 1380. (The Town and Country Planning (General) Regulations.)
- (ii) Circular No. 52, which forwards Statutory Instrument No. 1436. (The Town and Country Planning (Tree Preservation Order) Regulations, 1948.)
- (iii) Circular No. 53. Coming into force of Act.
- (iv) Circular No. 54. Grant Regulations under Sections 93-96.
- (v) Circular No. 55. Control of Mineral Working.
- (vi) Circular No. 56 and Statutory Instrument No. 1613. Advertisement Regulations.
- (vii) Circular No. 57 and Statutory Instrument No. 1461. (The Town and Country Planning (Local Authorities' Lands: Exceptions to Section 82) Regulations, 1948.)
- (viii) Circular No. 58 and Leaflet P.R.3. Land ripe for development.
- (ix) Statutory Instrument No. 1767. (The Town and Country Planning (Development Plans) Regulations, 1948.)
- (x) Explanatory Memorandum on Town and Country Planning Act, 1947: Part II (Notes on Sections).

### (b) Communications from the Middlesex County Council.

The Town Clerk submitted the following Circulars from the Clerk of the County Council:—

- (i) County Planning Circular No. 3 dealing with the supply of forms.
- (ii) County Planning Circular No. 4 dealing with a number of matters of administration and requesting certain information, most of which has been supplied.

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(iii) County Planning Circular No. 5. This Circular deals with (a) the procedure to be adopted in dealing with applications for a determination under Section 17 applicants under the Building Restrictions (War-Time Contraventions) Act,

With regard to (e), the Committee were informed that the County Council had been advised of the previous practice whereby any hearing required has been before the Committee and that there would appear to be no objection to the same procedure being followed in future. **Noted.** 

### 2.—SCHEME OF DELEGATION:

#### (a) General Direction No. 1.

The Town Clerk submitted a notice from the Clerk of the County Council giving the terms of General Direction No. 1 made by the Local Planning Authority. The effect of this direction is that where a limited period is attached to a planning permission such period shall not exceed three years. The object of the Direction is to safeguard the right of enforcement action which must in most cases be taken within four years of the development being carried out. **Noted.** 

#### (b) Time Limit for Commencement of Work.

A letter was submitted from the Clerk of the County Council asking for the Council's views on the question of a condition being attached to planning consents (either to all consents or in appropriate cases only), to the effect that if development is not substantially commenced within a prescribed period then the consent shall become void. The imposition of such a condition would enable a consent which had not been utilised to be reviewed, and this has advantages particularly during the period of preparation of the development plan. The period suggested by the County Council, bearing in mind unavoidable delays owing to present-day restrictions and shortages of material and labour, is three years. The County Council ask to be informed of the Council's views by October 11th and the Committee have authorised the Chairman, in consultation with the Town Clerk and the Borough Surveyor, to submit observations on behalf of the Council.

#### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-That the action taken be confirmed.

#### 3.—GENERAL DEVELOPMENT ORDER:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Clerk of the County Council who have under consideration the making of a direction which would have the effect of requiring consent to be obtained for the following classes of development, which, in the absence of such direction, is permitted:—

- (a) Class I of the Order in respect of shelters and kennels for breeding of dogs, and pigeon and dove cotes and aviaries, or
- (b) Class IV of the Order in respect of trading, markets, fairs and caravans.

The making of such direction would enable control to be exercised and the Council's observations are requested by October 11th. The Committee have authorised the Chairman, in consultation with the Town Clerk and the Borough Surveyor, to submit observations on behalf of the Council.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the action taken be confirmed.

### 4.—CONTROL OF ADVERTISEMENTS:

### (a) Generally.

The Town Clerk submitted the Town and Country Planning (Control of Advertisements) Regulations, 1048, a copy of which had previously been circulated to each member of the Committee.

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The Regulations contain a comprehensive code of control, although there are certain exceptions in respect of which consent is not required. The control is to be exercised only in the interests of amenity and public safety and under the Scheme of Delegation any action is to be the subject of prior consultation with the County Council.

Apart from the specified exceptions, consent is required for the display of all advertisements, but there is a period of grace given for advertisements which existed on August 1st (the date of coming into operation of the Regulations). Advertisements being displayed on 7th January, 1947, have three years' grace and advertisements first displayed between that date and 1st August, 1948, have one year's grace.

Under Regulation 10, consideration is to be given to the selection of any part of the area of the local Planning Authority for definition as an "area of special control" within which the display of advertisements is particularly limited. The Borough Surveyor is carrying out a survey of the Borough as a whole for the purposes of submitting a list of advertisements in respect of which control is desirable, and he informed the Committee that the first stage of the survey would be directed to those existing advertisements which have one year's grace. In connection with this survey the Committee have asked the Borough Surveyor to embody in his report suggestions as to areas for definition as areas of special control.

#### (b) Hoardings on Railway Executive Land.

The Committee were informed by the Town Clerk that in accordance with their instructions (B. & T.P.C., 31/5/48—6) he had communicated with the Railway Executive drawing attention to the unsightly appearance of certain hoardings on their land and asking for consideration to be given to the removal of the hoardings and to the planting of a suitable hedge in their place. As a result the Railway Executive's Chief Commercial Manager had suggested a meeting on the site, which had taken place with the Borough Surveyor's representative on August 4th. The Borough Surveyor reported that as a result of such meeting he hoped satisfactory proposals would be made by the Railway Executive for improving the hoardings of which complaint had been made.

Noted.

#### (c) Hoarding, Holders Hill Circus.

The question of control being exercised over this hoarding, which was erected without the Council's consent, has previously been before the Committee and in view of the fact that it was in existence at the date on which the advertisement Regulations came into force there will be a period of grace which must elapse before the Council can take action (Sub-paragraph (a) above). This period will either be one year or three years, depending on whether the hoarding was first displayed after the 7th January, 1947, or before that date. A member of the Committee stated that he hoped to be able to obtain evidence as to the date of the hoarding's erection and that he would furnish such information to the Borough Surveyor. **Noted.** 

#### 5.—229, HALE LANE:

At the last meeting the Town Clerk reported that an appeal had been made by the occupier against the Council's refusal of permission for the use of the loft of these premises in connection with the occupier's business as Electrical and Engineering Consultant. He now informed the Committee that the Ministry of Town and Country Planning had notified the holding of a Local Inquiry on October 8th. Noted.

## **6.**—PROPOSED GARAGE AND WORKSHOP, EAST SIDE OF SUNNY GARDENS ROAD, N.W. 4:

The Town Clerk reported that an appeal had been made to the Minister of Town and Country Planning against the Council's refusal of an application for the use of this site as a garage and workshop. The Minister had held a Local Inquiry on August 26th Noted.

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### 7.-112. BRENT STREET, N.W. 4:

The Town Clerk reported that he had received intimation from the Solicitors acting for the occupiers of the premises that an appeal had been made to the Minister of Health against the determination of the Council that the use of these premises for glass blowing and the manufacture of special types of glassware for electrical purposes failed to comply with planning control, a period of 12 months expiring on 12th June, 1949, having been given. The occupiers are endeavouring to obtain alternative premises and if they are found they state that the appeal will be withdrawn. The Town Clerk added that he had communicated with the Ministry asking that the appeal should not he allowed to stand over until the end of the extended time. Noted.

### 8.—174. WEST HENDON BROADWAY, N.W.9:

The Town Clerk informed the Committee that an appeal had been made to the Minister of Health against the Council's determination (B. & T.P.C., 31/5/48-5) that the use of part of these premises for the manufacture of soft toys failed to comply with planning control, an extension of time until the 10th May, 1949, being granted. Noted.

### 9.—141. WEST HENDON BROADWAY, N.W. 9:

The Minister of Health has intimated that an appeal has been made to him by the occupier against the Council's determination (B. & T.P.C., 19/4/48-40) regarding the use of these shop premises for storage purposes and for wholesale business. The determination in effect granted a period of 12 months expiring on 10th May, 1949.

#### 10.-61, DAWS LANE, N.W. 7:

The Town Clerk reported receipt of the decision of the Minister of Health following the Local Inquiry held into the appeals made against the Council's determination regarding the use of these premises as an animal clinic. The Council had granted an extension of time for two years expiring 8th December, 1949. The Minister has determined that the use of the premises failed to comply with previous planning control. He has further determined that the use shall be deemed to comply until 1st July, 1951, or until the date of approval by the Minister of Town and Country Planning of the development plan, whichever is the later date. Noted.

#### 11.—44. VIVIAN AVENUE, N.W. 4:

The Town Clerk reported that in accordance with the Council's decision, notices had been served prohibiting the use of these premises for the manufacture of ladies' The Council had subsequently, on an coats in contravention of planning control. application from the occupier, decided to take no action to enforce the Prohibition Order for a period of three months expiring 10th August, 1948. Solicitors have now stated that it is their clients' intention to restore the premises to their proper use as a shop and have submitted an application for development permission in respect of such use. No further action would appear to be necessary in respect of the Prohibition Order, subject to confirmation by the Borough Surveyor that the contravening use has in fact ceased.

The Borough Surveyor informed the Committee that a further inspection would be made and a report submitted in due course. Noted.

### 12.—48, VIVIAN AVENUE, N.W. 4:

Following the Inquiry held on June 25th into the appeal against the Council's determination, the Minister of Health has now made his determination regarding the use of these premises for the manufacture of fancy and leather goods. The Council had granted an extension of time until 8th December, 1948. The Minister's determination confirms that the use fails to comply with previous planning control and grants an extension of time until 30th June, 1950. Noted.

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### 13,--54, VIVIAN AVENUE, N.W. 4:

Following the Inquiry held on June 25th into the appeal against the Council's determination, the Minister of Health has now made his determination regarding the use of these premises for the manufacture of boot and shoe laces. The Council granted an extension of time until 8th December, 1948. The Minister's determination confirms that the use fails to comply with previous planning control and grants an extension of time until 30th June, 1950. Noted.

#### 14.-392, FINCHLEY ROAD:

The Committee were reminded that in this case the occupiers agreed to submit to a Prohibition Order and had undertaken to cease using the premises for the manufacture of blouses by 8th December, 1948. As a result of such undertaking the Council had resolved not to enforce the Prohibition Order before that date.

The Town Clerk submitted letters from the occupiers and from their Solicitors stating that they had learned of the Minister's decision in the case of No. 48, Vivian Avenue; that they had negotiations in hand which it was expected would result in them obtaining alternative accommodation by June, 1950; that their removal from their present premises in December next would seriously dislocate their business, which is largely connected with the export trade; and that they desired the Council to suspend the enforcement of the Prohibition Order until June, 1950.

After careful consideration, the Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no further action be taken to enforce the Prohibition Order until 30th June, 1950, and that the Town Clerk inform the occupiers accordingly.

#### 15.—TEMPORARY BUILDING, WEST SIDE OF CLAREMONT ROAD, N.W. 2:

The Town Clerk reported that in accordance with the Council's instructions the necessary steps had been taken to secure the removal of this temporary building which had been erected without consent. The Borough Surveyor has now reported that the building has been removed and no further action would appear to be necessary. **Noted.** 

#### 16.—AUTO CAR SPRAYERS LIMITED:

The Town Clerk referred to the use, without the Council's consent, of land and buildings in Station Yard, Mill Hill. An application for interim development permission to use this railway land for repairing motor bodies had been refused by the Council (B. & T.P.C., 16/6/47—20) and action to terminate the tenancy of the premises was under consideration by the Railway Authorities. The Committee were informed that as a result of further complaints an inspection had been made and in view of the fact that the premises were still being used, the Railway Executive had been informed. They have now issued a summons against the occupiers which will be heard on November 11th. **Noted.** 

#### 17.--DEFENCE REGULATION 56A:

#### (a) Legal Proceedings.

The Town Clerk reported that in accordance with the Council's authority proceedings had been taken in the following case in respect of an alleged contravention of Defence Regulation 56A:—

### 18.—1. FERNHURST GARDENS:

At the last meeting the Town Clerk reported that an application for development permission was being submitted in respect of the use of these premises as a private school. The Town Clerk informed the Committee that the occupier's Solicitors had advised him that their client was securing alternative premises and that the Borough Surveyor had, as a result of the inspection, confirmed that the property was no longer being used for school purposes. Noted.

### 19.—287, GOLDERS GREEN ROAD, N.W. 11:

The Town Clerk referred to the Committee's instructions regarding the submission by the occupier of an application for a determination under the Building Restrictions (War-Time Contraventions) Act, 1946, concerning the use of part of these premises for a dressmaking business (B. & T.P.C., 8/3/48-33). The occupier has since vacated the premises and no further action is therefore necessary. Noted.

### 20.—DANGEROUS AND DILAPIDATED BUILDING-33, PARK ROAD, N.W. 4:

The Town Clerk referred to the authority given by the Council for action to be taken under Section 58 of the Public Health Act, 1936, following the report by the Borough Surveyor that these premises were in a very dilapidated condition and likely to become dangerous to the occupiers. He informed the Committee that the Borough Surveyor had reported that some repairs had been carried out to the property and that it could no longer be regarded as dangerous. No further action is therefore necessary in this case. Noted.

#### 21.—8a, RUSSELL PARADE:

The Town Clerk reported that following the Committee's consideration (B. & T.P.C., 31/5/48-41) of a contravention in respect of the use of these premises as a wholesale stockroom and store, the application under the Building Restrictions (War-Time Contraventions) Act, 1946, had not been proceeded with the occupiers intimating that they intended to discontinue the use of the premises as a wholesale stockroom and store and to convert them into shop premises.

The Borough Surveyor having reported that the use of the shop for the contravening purposes has now ceased, no further action is necessary. Noted.

## 22.—NURSERY SCHOOL—7, ELMCROFT AVENUE, GOLDERS GREEN, N.W. 11:

The Town Clerk referred to the Council's approval (B. & T.P.C., 12/5/47-27) to the use of these premises as a nursery school provided that the number of children did not Later applications for an increase in the number of children permitted had A further application has been received from the occupier asking if the Council would relax the condition and consent to the maximum number of children being The application has been forwarded to the County Council and the Borough Surveyor informed the Committee that it had not been returned. Consideration of the matter was, therefore, deferred.

#### 23.—ALDERTON HALL:

The Town Clerk informed the Committee that notice of appeal had been lodged on behalf of the owners and occupiers against the fines imposed on them as a result of the The appeal will be heard at the next Quarter Sessions. recent proceedings.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND.—That the Town Clerk be authorised to take all necessary steps on the Council's behalf to respond to the appeal.

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### 24.-29, GREEN LANE, N.W. 4:

The Committee were reminded of the Minister's determination previously reported (B. & T.P.C., 9/2/48—5) that the use of these premises failed to comply with planning control, an extension of time being given until 30th June, 1948. The Borough Surveyor has now reported that as far as can be ascertained the use of this house as a synagogue has ceased. No further action would appear necessary. **Noted.** 

#### 25.-665, FINCHLEY ROAD:

The Town Clerk referred to the Council's decision (B. & T.P.C., 12/1/48-13) prohibiting the use of these premises in contravention of Planning Scheme No. 2; action to enforce the Prohibition Order had been deferred until 25th June, 1948.

The Borough Surveyor has now reported that two rooms on the first floor have been used as offices, the remainder of the premises being empty. Such use would not appear to contravene previous planning control and no further action would appear to be necessary. **Noted.** 

#### 26.-681, FINCHLEY ROAD:

In January, 1948 (B. & T.P.C., 12/1/48—10), the Council prohibited the use of these premises in contravention of Planning Scheme No. 2, but deferred action to enforce the Prohibition Order until 25th June, 1948.

The Borough Surveyor has now reported that the industrial use of these premises has been discontinued. No further action would appear necessary. **Noted.** 

#### 27.-683, FINCHLEY ROAD:

In January last (B. & T.P.C., 12/1/48—11) the Council prohibited the use of these premises in contravention of Planning Scheme No. 2, but deferred action to enforce the Prohibition Order until 25th June, 1948.

The Borough Surveyor has now reported that the industrial use of these premises has been discontinued. No further action would appear necessary. **Noted.** 

#### 28.—687, FINCHLEY ROAD:

In this case the Council (B. & T.P.C., 12/1/48—12) prohibited the use of the premises in contravention of Planning Scheme No. 2, but deferred action to enforce the Prohibition Order until 25th June, 1948. ### 1.—TERMS OF REFERENCE:

To consider the question of obtaining an alternative site for a restaurant in the vicinity of The Hyde and to submit a report to the Special (Civic Restaurants) Committee (C.R.C., 29/6/48—5).

### 2.—REPORT:

In considering this question the Sub-Committee had before them a plan of a section of the Edgware Road showing the positions of Stag House Restaurant and The Hyde Restaurant (which was closed down on the 28th August). The plan also indicated vacant sites fronting the Edgware Road which might be available, if required, for Civic Restaurant purposes. It appeared, however, that there were no suitable premises available in the vicinity and in order to provide a Civic Restaurant in this area the erection of a building would be necessary. In these circumstances, the Sub-Committee

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken to provide an additional Restaurant in place of The Hyde Restaurant at the present time.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the report of the Sub-Committee be approved and adopted.

# 3.—WAGES AND CONDITIONS OF SERVICE OF EMPLOYEES:

At their meeting on the 23rd February, 1948 (C.R.C., 3/2/48—13) the Council received a letter from the Association of Municipal Corporations expressing the view that employees engaged in Civic Restaurants should not be within the purview of the National Joint Industrial Council for Local Authorities Non-Trading Services. The Council agreed with this view and suggested that consideration should be given to the extension of the jurisdiction of the Unlicensed Place of Refreshment Wages Board to include Civic Restaurant employees.

The Town Clerk reported that it is understood that the Wages Board in fact have jurisdiction over Civic Restaurant employees, but have made no regulations as to their remuneration, being satisfied that their conditions of employment are generally not less favourable than those of other employees affected by the Board.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Birmingham City Council seeking the support of all Civic Restaurant Authorities in respresentations calling for the establishment of a separate Whitley Council for Civic Restaurant employees. The City Council are concerned at the effect of the recent J.I.C. awards increasing wages and reducing working hours, particularly in view of the provisions of the Civic Restaurants Act, 1947, regarding the finances of Civic Restaurant Authorities.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Birmingham City Council be informed that this Council is not prepared to support their representations in this matter.

### 4.—TRADING ACCOUNT, 1947/48:

The Borough Treasurer submitted the revenue and net revenue accounts for the year ended 31st March, 1948, and balance sheet as at the 31st March, 1948, in respect of the Council's Meals Service. The trading account shows a net surplus of £509, but although an amount of £1,246 is included for preliminiary expenses incurred prior to the opening of Stag House Restaurant, no loan charges are included owing to the fact that it was not found possible to raise loans within the trading period. If the loans had been raised and no preliminary expenses incurred at Stag House during the year in question it is probable that there would have been a deficit in the region of £445. This represents 1.3% of the income and a small increase in turnover would suffice to make the restaurants self-supporting. **Noted.** 

### 5.—FINANCIAL REPORT:

The Borough Treasurer submitted a statement of trading accounts and statistical data for the months June, July and August in respect of the 5 restaurants. The results show a deficit of £424 for the period, and a net deficit (subject to contingent items) of £315 for the period from 1st April, 1948.

Details of the statement are contained in the Appendix to the report of the Finance and General Purposes Committee. **Noted.** 

### 6.—MEETINGS WITH MANAGERESSES:

The Committee considered the possibility of holding periodical meetings with the Manageresses of the various restaurants with the object of stimulating interest, receiving suggestions, etc., and

RESOLVED—That quarterly meetings be held at which two members of the Committee in turn accompanied by the Chairman shall meet the Manageresses of the various Civic Restaurants; such meetings to be held in rotation at each of the Restaurants.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to inform the Association that the Council are of opinion that the period of membership for the County Education Committee and the County Advisory Committee should be three years instead of one, but that no change should be made in the method of electing representatives.

### 7.—EDUCATION COMMITTEE—DEPUTATION:

A letter was submitted by the Town Clerk from the Hendon and District Trades Council and the Electrical Trades Union complaining that a deputation received by the Education Committee on July 6th on the subject of the provision of recreation for school children during the summer holidays had been asked to withdraw after stating their case; the matter not then being discussed in their hearing, but being considered "in Committee."

# 9.—LAND, NORTH CIRCULAR ROAD, OCCUPIED BY HALES CLINKERS LIMITED:

At their meetings on April 27th and June 9th last, the Committee had before them an application from Hales Clinkers Limited seeking permission to sub-let part of this land to Mead Brothers (Kingsbury) Limited for the purpose of standing lorries and storing light plant. The Committee had not been agreeable to grant the application, but the Town Clerk submitted a further application, including bank references in relation to the proposed Sub-Lessees, drawing particular attention to the terms of the lease to the effect that consent is not to be unreasonably withheld. It is possible for the Council to terminate the lease to Hales Clinkers Limited on the 25th December, 1950, by giving six months' notice with effect before that date. The Committee feel that no objection can now be offered to the proposal for sub-letting, but that the Council should retain their control over the future use of the land by exercising their right to terminate the lease and by giving the Lessees advance notice of their intention to do so.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the application by Hales Clinkers Limited to sub-let part of the land leased from the Council (having a frontage of approximately 55 ft. to the North Circular Road) to Mead Brothers (Kingsbury) Limited be approved.
- (2) That the Town Clerk be instructed to give notice to Hales Clinkers Limited of the Council's intention to terminate the lease on the 25th December, 1950.

# 10.—CHAMBER OF COMMERCE—SHOPPING, SOCIAL AND SPORTS WEEK:

The Town Clerk informed the Committee that he had advised the Hendon Chamber of Commerce of the facilities which the Council (F. & G.P.C., 13/7/48—6) were prepared to afford in connection with the proposed Shopping. Social and Sports Week. He submitted a letter from the Chamber of Commerce stating that they had decided not to hold the events this year owing to the shortness of time available for making the necessary arrangements, and expressing their appreciation for the facilities which the Council were prepared to afford. They add that they may hold a similar function in 1949.

# 11.—RUBBISH DUMPS—GREEN LANE, EDGWARE:

The Town Clerk reminded the Committee that the general question of rubbish dumps was under consideration by them, the matter having been deferred pending the issue by the Ministry of Town and Country Planning of Regulations under Section 33 of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1947.

### 12.—HIRE OF ROOMS AT THE TOWN HALL:

# (a) National Federation of Old Age Pensions' Association.

At their last meeting the Committee deferred consideration of an application by the Hendon Branch of this Association for accommodation at the Town Hall pending further information as to the Association's objects.

The Town Clerk submitted particulars received from the Association, and also the branch's request for the use of a Committee Room once a month for meetings of their members. The Council's decision on the subject of hire of rooms (F. & G.P.C., 17/6/46 -40) precludes the acceptance of a serial booking.

### RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the application be granted for three consecutive months, a further application to be made if an extension is desired.
- (2) That the Hendon Branch of the Association be charged half fees for the accommodation used.

### (b) Letting to Communist Party.

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from a resident referring to a meeting of the Communist Party held at the Town Hall on August 5th, and protesting against the leting of accommodation in a public building to this organisation.

### 13.—CENTRAL OFFICE OF INFORMATION LECTURES:

The Town Clerk submitted an application from the Central Office of Information for permission to give an address on "The Facts of the Present National Situation," during office hours, to members of the staff and representatives of the Chamber of Commerce and similar bodies. The Committee have, authorised the Town Clerk to provide the facilities desired on the understanding that the address is given outside normal office

### 14.—POSTAL FACILITIES:

### (a) Golders Green.

The Town Clerk reported that following representations made to the post office \*authorities for improved post office and postal facilities in the Golders Green area, a meeting had been held with representatives of the post office, at which Councillor Lawrence had been present. The post office are prepared to provide in the near future an additional pillar box near the junction of Hendon Way and Wessex Gardens and one at the Cricklewood Railway Estate near Gratton Terrace. In addition, when the supply position improves, a pillar box will be provided at Golders Manor Drive and one in the Prayle Grove area. Noted.

### (b) Late Facilities.

In accordance with the instructions given by the Committee at their last meeting, the Town Clerk reported that he had made representations with the object of securing that the final delivery and collection of post each day should be later than at present. In replying, the post office authorities stated that the present reduced standard of postal deliveries and collection results directly from the Government's man-power policy, and that it is not possible for any forecast to be made as to relaxation of the present restrictions. Noted.

### 15.—INTERNATIONAL UNION OF LOCAL AUTHORITIES:

The Committee were informed that in accordance with their decision on June 9th. the Association of Municipal Corporations had been recommended to support the International Union of Local Authorities. The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Secretary General 1 ous decis Internati

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18.—PUBLIC RENTS

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Secretary of the Association stating that the matter had been reconsidered by the General Purposes Committee of the Association, who had decided to adhere to their previous decision that they cannot recommend the Association to resume membership of the International Union. **Noted.** 

### 16.-CHILDREN ACT, 1948:

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The Town Clerk reported that the Children Bill had received the Royal Assent and under it the remaining powers of the Council in relation to Maternity and Child Welfare and Child Life Protection had been passed to the County Council. **Noted.** 

# 17.—NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE--MAINTENANCE OF GROUNDS OF WELFARE CENTRES AND DAY NURSERIES:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the County Architect asking if the Council would be prepared to enter into a contract with the County Council for a limited period for the maintenance at the County Council's expense by Borough Council labour, of the grounds of Welfare Centres and Day Nurseries, the control of which passed to the County Council on July 5th under the National Health Service Act.

The Committee were informed that the Borough Surveyor is in a position to carry out this work, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to carry out the work on terms to be agreed and subject to the execution of an agreement, in a form to be approved by the Town Clerk.

# 18.—PUBLICITY REGARDING INCREASE AND DECREASE OF STANDARD RENTS:

The Town Clerk reported receipt of a letter from the Hendon and District Trades Council concerning the methods of making public information concerning rent control, particularly as it affects those cases where there is a decrease in the rates payable by the landlord. The Council have previously issued pamphlets and a poster drawing attention to the provisions of the Rent Restrictions Acts, although the point raised by the Trades Council has not previously been incorporated in such publicity.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk be instructed to incorporate in any future posters and pamphlets which may be issued information concerning reductions in standard rents by reason of any rate decrease.

# 19.—LOCAL GOVERNMENT (MEMBERS' ALLOWANCES) REGULATIONS, 1948:

The Town Clerk submitted the Local Government (Members' Allowances) Regulations, 1948, a copy of which had been forwarded to each member. The Committee were reminded that prior to the coming into force of the Regulations the Council had been empowered to pay any reasonable expenses in connection with the attendance of members and officers at conferences and meetings, and that in May last (F. & G.P.C., 27/4/48 —25) the Council had decided to pay an allowance of £3 3s. 0d. per day and night to members and officers attending conferences. The new Regulations limit the maximum amount which may be paid to members by way of travelling allowance and subsistence

A resolution of the Council is necessary to determine whether or not first class fares shall be paid and what the rate of allowance is to be within the maximum rate, which is not to exceed 32/6d., although an extra 9/6d, may be added where attendance is made at certain annual conferences or is in London.

The Borough Treasurer informed the Committee that forms of application for claiming the allowances were available for the use of members.

After considering the Town Clerk's report and also the question of the allowance to be paid to officers, and having regard to the powers contained in Section 181 of the Hendon Urban District Council Act, 1929, it was

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the following scale of allowances be adopted with effect from 16th August, 1948, in respect of the attendance of Members and Officers at Conferences and Meetings as delegates of the Council:—

- (1) First class fares to be paid for Members and Officers.
- (2) Where the Member is absent overnight, the maximum rate permitted by the Regulations be paid.
- (3) The allowance to Officers to be a payment of reasonable expenses actually incurred, not exceeding 45/- per day and night.

# 20.—LAND ADJOINING EX-SERVICEMEN'S CLUB, THE BROADWAY, WEST HENDON:

An application was submitted by the Town Clerk from Mr. W. J. Cowley for the tenancy of part of land owned by the Council and adjoining the Ex-servicemen's Club, West Hendon Broadway, to enable him to sell shellfish from a stall on two or three days a week. A letter in support of the application has been received from the Ex-Servicemen's Club, who also enquire if the Council would consider selling to the Club the land adjoining their premises, in which event they would be prepared to grant a tenancy to Mr. Cowley.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That no action be taken on the applications from Mr. Cowley and the West Hendon Ex-Servicemen's Club.

### 21.—FOURFOLD FILM SOCIETY:

The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Fourfold Film Society asking for the Council's support in their activities. The Society have to find fresh accommodation for their work and require a small room for studio purposes and also the use of a hail for film shows once or twice monthly. There is no accommodation available at the Town Hall, but the Committee are of opinion that the work of this Society should be brought to the notice of the Middlesex County Council in connection with their adult education work, and

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Town Clerk forward the application to the Middlesex County Council for their favourable consideration, and inform the Society accordingly.

### 22.—OLD PEOPLE'S WELFARE COMMITTEE:

The Committee were reminded that the Old People's Welfare Committee had been set up following the meeting of interested local organisations convened by the Council. The Town Clerk submitted a letter from the Secretary of the Committee asking the Council to consider making a contribution towards the funds of the Committee and referring to a provision in the National Assistance Act, 1948, in support thereof.

The Committee have drawn the attention of His Worship the Mayor to the request for financial assistance and have deferred consideration of the application for a grant pending a report by the Town Clerk.

### 23.—GOLDERS GREEN WAR MEMORIAL:

At their meeting in June last (paragraph 5) the Committee approved an application for the placing of an additional inscription on the Golders Green War Memorial, subject to the work being carried out to the satisfaction of the Borough Surveyor. A previous recommendation on these lines had been referred back by the Council with the suggestion that the Council should bear the expense, but the Committee had subsequently been informed that it was the desire of the British Legion to bear the expense privately.

A ll with the ad subseee expense The Town Clerk submitted a letter signed by five residents of Golders Green, and suggesting that an appeal for a memorial fund to commemorate the men and women of the Borough who lost their lives during the 1939/45 War should be sponsored by His Worship the Mayor, and that a Committee should be formed to consider the provision and financing of a memorial. So far as the Golders Green Memorial is concerned, the letter suggests that the names, and not merely a commemorative plaque, should be inscribed on the memorial.

# RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND--That consideration of the matter be deferred in order that the views of the British Legion may be obtained.

### 24.—HENDON FOOD CONTROL COMMITTEE:

The Town Clerk referred to the provision of the Food Control Committees Constitution Order, 1947, concerning the nomination by the Council of persons to serve on the Food Control Committee for the year commencing 1st January, 1949. He submitted a request from the Divisional Food Officer asking to be supplied by October 31st with the names of the persons nominated. The Council are to appoint before 31st December as members of the Committee, those persons included in the list of nominations who are approved by the Minister of Food. Under the provisions of the Order the Food Control Committee is to consist of five Trade members, one trade (employee) member and not less than ten or more than twelve consumer members. (The Hendon Food Control Committee for 1948 includes ten consumer members.) The trade members shall consist of one Co-operative member, one grocer member, one butcher member and two unclassified members. Of the consumer members, one must be a representative of Trade Unions and at least two consumer members shall be women. With regard to the trade (employee) member, employees of Co-operative Societies and of multiple shops are equally eligible with employees in other food shops for this seat on the Committee.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Ordinary Meeting of the Council which was to have been held on 15th November, 1948, be held on 9th November, 1948, and combined with the Annual Meeting.

### 26.—CONTINUANCE OF STANDING COMMITTEES:

The Town Clerk drew attention to the position of the Standing Committees, including the Co-opted Members, who would have gone out of office in November, 1948, and to the revised procedure under the Representation of the People Act, whereby the annual meeting of the Council in 1949 will be in May.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the period of office of (a) the Standing Committees, and (b) the representatives appointed by the Council to serve on various other Bodies (unless such period extends beyond May, 1949) be extended until the day prior to the day fixed by Statute for the Annual Election of Councillors in May, 1949.

### 27.—REPRESENTATION OF THE PEOPLE ACT, 1948:

At their meeting on February 16th last, the Committee received a report by the Town Clerk on the provisions of the Representation of the People Bill, which received the Royal Assent on July 30th. The Town Clerk submitted a further report indicating the main provisions of the Act under the headings of Parliamentary Franchise and Distribution of Seats; the Local Government Franchise; Corrupt and Illegal Practices; and special provisions as to local elections. He also submitted a copy of a letter of the 30th July, 1948, from the Under-Secretary of State drawing particular attention to dates of local elections and related matters. **Noted.** 

### 28.—AUDIT OF ACCOUNTS, 1947/48:

The Town Clerk reported that notice had been received from the District Auditor that the audit of the Council's accounts for the year ended 31st March, 1948, would commence on October 22nd.

1.—NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE (SUPERANNUATION) REGULATIONS, 1947 AND 1948:

At their last meeting the Sub-Committee considered a report by the Borough Treasurer on the question of conversion of non-contributing service to contributing service and the adding of years (in certain cases) in respect of the staff of the Public Health Department transferred to the service of the Middlesex County Council. The 1948 Regulations enable the Council to take action in respect of such staff similar to that which they had taken in the case of the staff transferred to the Regional Hospital Board.

The Sub-Committee had given instructions for enquiries to be made of other Local Authorities in Middlesex, and for the question to be raised at a meeting of the Middlesex Borough and District Councils' Association with a view to uniformity of action. The view had been expressed that the responsibility should be borne by the County Council to whose service the staff are transferred.

The Sub-Committee were now informed that the matter had been raised at a meeting of the Association when it had been decided to take no action largely as a result of the diversity of practice of the various Authorities represented, a factor borne out by the enquiries which had been made of all district Authorities in the County.

The existing practice of the Council is to calculate Pensions in respect of non-contributing service on the same basis as that applicable to contributing service, and with regard to the addition of years, there is a Resolution to the effect that the Council are prepared to give favourable consideration in appropriate cases.

The decision of the Council with regard to the conversion of service and added years in relation to the staff transferred to the Regional Hospital Board, is consistent with the practice and Resolution referred to. The Borough Treasurer submitted brief details of the periods of service of the transferred staff now under consideration and referred to the fact that in certain instances non-contributing service had arisen by the failure on the part of the officer to make certain payments in respect of contributions previously refunded to him; had such payments been made the service would have been reckonable as contributing service. The Committee felt that any concession granted should not apply in such cases.

The Borough Treasurer informed the Sub-Committee of the total estimated amount of the additional transfer values involved, such amount being a charge on General Rate Fund.

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The Council have delegated to the Sub-Committee the power of passing any resolution deemed necessary in view of the fact that to be effective in the case of officers transferred on the 5th July, such resolution must be passed not later than the 4th October, 1948, i.e., within three months after the date of the transfer. Pursuant to such authority (F. & G.P.C., 13/7/48—17 (7)), it was

### 1.--MINUTES:

The Minutes of the meeting held 6th May, 1948, were confirmed and signed by the Vice-Chairman.

### 2.—SIMULTANEOUS PUBLICATION OF NATIONAL JOINT COUNCIL DECISIONS:

The Joint Secretary referred to the request made at the last meeting of the Committee that he should communicate with the Provincial Joint Industrial Council asking for earlier notification of that Authority's decisions, in view of the fact that the Employees' Representatives had received the decision relating to the reduced working week before such decision had been received by the Council. He submitted a letter from the Secretary of the Provincial Council forwarding a copy of a letter received from the Employers' Secretary of the National Joint Industrial Council. The letter states that it is inevitable for decisions to be received first by the Trade Unions inasmuch as the Trade Unions circulate the National Joint Council's decisions to their branches immediately after a meeting, whereas the Employers' Secretary has first of all to send the decisions to the Provincial Councils, who in turn circulate such decisions to the Local Authorities. Noted.

### 3.-NOTIFICATION OF GRADING:

The Joint Secretary referred to the recommendation made by the Committee at their last meeting that the Borough Treasurer should notify each employee of his or her grading and also of any changes in grading which may occur, and reported that the recommendation, amended to the effect that such notification is to be given by the appropriate Chief Officers, had been adopted by the Council. The Committee were informed that the notification was in hand.

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(Alderman A. W. Curton, F.R.S.A., M.Inst.B.F. (Deputy Mayor) (Chairman) in the Chair.)

### 4 .- SALVAGE BONUS SCHEME:

At their last meeting the Committee resolved to defer consideration of the question of a salvage incentive bonus pending an award by the National Joint Council. No award has yet been made by the National Joint Council but a letter has been received from the Employers' Secretary forwarding information received from the Secretary of the National Joint Council. The latter body is in consultation with the Board of Trade as to the desirability or otherwise of introducing an incentive bonus for salvage collection, but such consultations are not yet complete. In the meantime, the National Joint Council consider it undesirable that individual Local Authorities should introduce the incentive bonus scheme and request that no action be taken pending a further communication from them.

A letter which the Employees' Secretary had addressed to the Ministry of Health on this subject was also submitted together with the Ministry's reply. Noted.

### 5.-EARLIER OPENING OF MESSROOM, MILL HILL:

The Joint Secretary reported that as a result of the Committee's recommendation regarding the earlier opening of the messroom used by the Highways Section at Mill Hill, the Council had asked the Borough Surveyor to make suitable arrangements for the opening of this messroom at 7 a.m. daily or as soon as practicable thereafter either by one of the Council's employees living at the Depôt or by a member of the Highways Section. Noted.

### 6.-PROTECTIVE CLOTHING:

### (a) Extra Suit of Overalls.

The Joint Secretary reported that following the recommendation made by the Committee at their last meeting the Council had agreed to provide an additional suit of overalls for each refuse collector in the Council's service who is at present entitled to be supplied with overalls. Noted.

### (b) Laundering of Overalls.

The Joint Secretary referred to the recommendation at the last meeting that consideration should be given to the laundering of all overalls supplied to the men. He reported that after consideration of the quotations obtained by the Borough Surveyor and of the views expressed by an overwhelming majority of the men, the Council had decided to make no change in the present practice. Noted.

### 7.—CLEANSING SECTION—HOLIDAY RELIEF:

The Joint Secretary reported that the Council had considered the question of additional men being engaged to act as reliefs in the Refuse Collection gangs during the holiday period so that the gangs could be maintained at full strength, and had decided to take no action on the suggestion. Noted.

### 8.—REFUSE COLLECTION SERVICE:

Arising from consideration of the Council's decision in respect of holiday relief (paragraph 7 above) the Employees' Representatives referred to the "rounds" into which the Refuse Collection Service is organised and raised certain questions concerning the amount of work allotted to different gangs. The Committee were reminded that this question had been referred to the Refuse Collection Sub-Committee who had met on 8th October, 1947, and given preliminary consideration to the matter. The Sub-Committee had asked Mr. W. Hooper to prepare a scheme embodying his suggestions (after consulting with the men engaged in the service), such scheme to be submitted to the Borough Surveyor for circulation to the Committee. Pending the submission of such scheme the Committee are unable to give consideration to the suggestion made regarding individual "rounds," but the Borough Surveyor intimated that he would investigate any particular case of alleged inequality of which written information was given to him. Noted.

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9.—SICK LEAVE—PRODUCTION OF MEDICAL CERTIFICATES FOR FIRST DAY'S ABSENCE:

The Joint Secretary referred to the adoption by the Council of a recommendation regarding the production of medical certificates for the first day's absence. This decision had been adopted for an experimental period of six months and in order to continue the facility for a further period, the Committee

RECOMMEND—That employees absent for one day's sickness be not required to produce a medical certificate subject to:—

- (i) Payment of wages for a day's absence being made only on a certificate of the appropriate Chief Officer;
- (ii) A maximum of 3 such days during any period of twelve months;
- (iii) The matter being reviewed at the first meeting of the Committee following the Annual Meeting of the Council in 1950.

### 10.—CONSTITUTION OF COMMITTEE:

The Joint Secretary referred to his report at the last meeting of the Committee on the question of the Committee's constitution, and in particular to paragraphs 9 (d) and 10 (b) regarding the periods of office of the Employees' and the Employers' Sides respectively. He reminded the Committee that the Representation of the People Bill would, if enacted in its present form, extend the period of office of members of the Council until May, 1949, and consequently some alteration would no doubt be necessary in the term of office of the Employers' Representatives. The question of varying the term of office of the Employees' Representatives by reducing it from three years to one year had also been deferred from the last meeting. The Committee

### RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the following paragraph be substituted for paragraph 9 (d) of the constitution:—
  - "The representatives shall—provided they remain in the service of the Council—hold office in the case of the Committee as now constituted until the Annual Meeting in 1950 thereafter representatives shall hold office for periods of three years expiring on the date of the Annual Meeting of the Council in each third year, and shall be eligible for re-election."
- (2) That the following paragraph be substituted for paragraph 10 (b) of the constitution:—
  - "The representatives shall be appointed by the Council at their Annual Meeting each year. They shall—if still members of the Council—hold office for a period of one year and be eligible for re-election. The present representatives shall remain in office until the Annual Meeting in 1949."

### 11.—REPRESENTATION:

### (a) Casual Vacancy.

The Joint Secretary reported that as a result of the coming into force of the National Health Service Act, 1946, Mr. J. A. Taylor had been transferred to the service of the Regional Hospital Board. Mr. Taylor does not, therefore, now satisfy the condition of membership which requires that he should be in the service of the Council.

Mr. J. A. Taylor expressed his regret at his enforced retirement from membership of the Committee and his appreciation of the assistance given to him as Employees' Secretary. The Chairman of the Committee suitably replied to Mr. Taylor's remarks.

Mr. Taylor represents the Miscellaneous Group of Employees, and for the purpose of filling the vacancy, the Committee have asked the Borough Surveyor to arrange for an election to be held by the appropriate employees, in accordance with the basis of representation set out in paragraph (b) below, if such revised basis is approved by His Worship the Mayor.

### (b) Revised Basis of Representation.

Arising from the casual vacancy reported in paragraph (a) above, reference was made to the basis on which the Employees' Representatives are elected. At present, in accordance with the Council's decision (F. & G.P.C., 2/12/46-51) six representatives are elected, one from each of the following sections:—

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Refuse (Collection and Disposal).

Parks.

Transport (including Repair Shops and Ambulance Section).

Sewers (including Drain Testers).

Baths, Washhouses, Public Conveniences, Cleaners and Porters.

In order to cover employees whose sections do not fall within any of these definitions, the Committee are of the opinion that the sixth representative should cover not only employees in the Baths, etc., Section, but all employees not covered by any of the other five representatives. They accordingly

RESOLVED-That His Worship the Mayor be recommended to approve under Recess powers a revision in the basis of representation to secure that there shall be one representative from each of the following sections:-

Refuse (Collection and Disposal).

Parks.

Transport (including Repair Shops).

Sewers (including Drain Testers).

Miscellaneous (i.e., all employees not included in any of the other five

### 12.—PARKS DEPARTMENT:

### (a) Cooking Facilities-West Hendon Playing Fields.

As the result of an enquiry by the Employees' Representatives, the Borough Surveyor informed the Committee of action taken to provide cooking facilities in the men's canteen at the West Hendon Playing Fields.

### (b) Meal Break for Park-Keepers.

The Employees' Representatives referred to the hours of work of Park-Keepers on Saturdays and Sundays and to the difficulties of the men in obtaining time off for meals, particularly in those parks where only one Park-Keeper is employed. Committee have asked the Employees' Representatives concerned to consult the Park-Keepers to ascertain if they are willing to work on a rota system to secure adequate relief on Sundays, and

### RECOMMEND-

- (1) That the Borough Surveyor be authorised to arrange mid-day relief for Park-Keepers on Saturdays.
- (2) That if the Employees' Representatives report that the men concerned are themselves desirous of Sunday mid-day relief being arranged, the Borough Surveyor be authorised to bring this into operation.
- (3) That the Committee asked the Joint Secretary to submit these recommendations to His Worship the Mayor for approval under Recess powers.

### (c) Woodside Park-Messroom Facilities.

The Employees' Representatives raised a question concerning the withdrawal of messroom facilities previously enjoyed at Woodside Park. The Borough Surveyor explained that this was a temporary measure only necessitated by facilities granted to the Ministry of Food.

### (d) Waterproof Coats.

The Employees' Representatives asked if the men engaged on highway shrubberies could be supplied with waterproof coats in order to protect their clothes when working after a fall of rain. The Committee

RESOLVED-That His Worship the Mayor be recommended to authorise, under Recess powers, the issue of waterproof coats to street gardeners.

### (e) Parks Maintenance.

Councillor H. L. K. Johnson (Chairman of the Estates, Parks and Allotments Committee) asked the Employees' Representatives to convey to the men concerned the appreciation expressed by the members of his Committee during a recent tour of inspection of the parks.

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# 13.—CLEANSING DEPARTMENT-—SICK LEAVE AND ANNUAL LEAVE OF EMPLOYEE;

The Committee have deferred consideration of the question of the holiday entitlement of Mr. Birkens (18/098) who had been absent through illness for approximately eight months in order that the Joint Secretary may report at their next meeting on the legal aspect of the man's contract of service and on the appropriate recommendation of the Joint Industrial Council.

### 14.-HIGHWAYS DEPARTMENT:

### (a) Screens for Street Masons

In reply to an enquiry by the Employees' Representatives the Borough Surveyor stated that he would arrange to provide screens for the protection of the public on those occasions when street masons are working on the redressing of granite kerbs.

### (b) Redundant Sweepers.

The Employees' Representatives asked if consideration could be given to the reemployment, as and when suitable vacancies occur, of road sweepers recently discharged on grounds of redundancy. The Borough Surveyor stated that if any of the men concerned made application to him he would bear them in mind in connection with any appropriate vacancy in the future.

### 15.-TIPPING GEAR:

The Employees' Representatives referred to the recent award of an extra 6d, per day to drivers of vehicles with tipping gear, and asked that such extra payment should be given to the men when on annual leave or sick leave. The Committee were informed of the precise terms of the Joint Industrial Council's recommendation, which is to the effect that the extra rate is paid to drivers for any day or part of a day when they are actually driving. Noted.

### 16.—ISOLATION HOSPITAL—LAUNDRY STAFF:

The Employees' Representatives referred to an award of the appropriate Provincial Council which, by reason of its retrospective effect, entitles certain staff of the Isolation Hospital to an additional payment for the period 3rd May to 4th July inclusive. The Borough Treasurer informed the Committee that he would make such additional payment in accordance with details submitted in respect of the employees concerned.

### 17.-REFUSE COLLECTION FROM FLATS:

The Employees' Representatives raised a question concerning the collection of refuse from upper storeys of certain flats in Edgware and the Borough Surveyor asked for details of the particular cases to be supplied to him in order that he may give appropriate directions regarding the responsibility or otherwise of the men to collect these bins.

### 18.-LOSS OF DONKEY JACKET:

The Committee asked one of the Employees' Representatives to furnish to the Borough Surveyor for his consideration, details of a case where a donkey jucket had been lost, and a request made for the surrender of further clothing coupons.

The Employees' Representatives asked for information with regard to the implementation of the award of the Joint Industrial Council reducing the working week from 47 to 44 hours. The Borough Surveyor informed the Committee that he had received certain instructions from the Council and would be consulting with the Trade Union representatives on this matter.

The Town Clerk reported that paragraphs 11 (b), 12 (b) and 12 (d) of the report had been submitted to His Worship the Mayor who had approved the recommendations in paragraphs 11 (b) and 12 (b) under Recess powers. His Worship the Mayor had not considered the recommendation in paragraph 12 (d) to be of sufficient urgency to justify his approving it under such powers.

### 36.—NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946:

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### (a) Superannuation Regulations.

The Borough Treasurer referred to the decisions of the Council in respect of their former employees transferred to the service of the Regional Hospital Board and to the County Council, which in effect pre-determined the action taken under Sections 8—16 of the Local Government Superannuation Act, 1937, as at the date of retirement of each of the employees concerned, had such employees remained in the service of the Council. The decision in respect of the staff transferred to the Regional Hospital Board was made by the Council on 21st June, 1948 (F. & G.P.C., 9/6/48—39 (8)) and in respect of the staff transferred to the County Council, is contained in paragraph 1 of the report of the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee, dated 14th September, 1948 (paragraph 32 above). The estimated cost of giving effect to these decisions, which was reported to the Establishment and Staffs Sub-Committee amounts to £20,700 and is chargeable to the General Rate Fund.

RESOLVED TO RECOMMEND—That the Council approve a supplementary estimate of £20,700 to meet the additional transfer values as a result of the Council's decisions under the National Health Service (Superannuation Regulations), 1947 and 1948.

### (b) Transfer Values.

The Borough Treasurer reported that provisional calculations had been made of the transfer values which will be payable to the Middlesex County Council, amounting to approximately £70,250, which, when added to the provisional payment of £17,000 already made to the Minister of Health in respect of employees transferred to the Regional Hospital Board (F. & G.P.C., 13/7/48—20 (f)), makes a total of £87,250. Of this total, £20,700, formerly the subject of a supplementary estimate (paragraph (a) above) is chargeable to the General Rate Fund, leaving £66,550 chargeable to the Superannuation Fund. It is desired to use the whole of the ground floor for surgery and waiting room purposes and that Dr. Marshall should have an assistant in residence on the first floor. ### 1.—SITES FOR COMMUNITY CENTRES:

The Sub-Committee was set up for the purpose of considering and reporting upon the provision of Community Centres within the Borough. In their first report, dated 22nd March. 1948, the Sub-Committee indicated the areas which they suggested should be adopted as the basis for the provision of Community Centres to meet the needs of the whole of the Borough. The areas put forward were approved by the Council, and the Sub-Committee have now had a report from the Borough Surveyor, illustrated by plans, of the various areas indicating possible sites for selection for the establishment, as circumstances permit, of Community Centres within the various areas. The provision of these Community Centres will be made by the County Council to whom the Sub-Committee feel that the sites which they have selected should be put forward.

In several cases the Sub-Committee's conclusions will involve the acquisition of sites for buildings not at present in public ownership, although in other cases the Community Centres can be provided either by the utilisation of property already publicly owned, or by the reservation of part of a development area. For these reasons the Sub-Committee have recorded their conclusions in respect of each of the sites in manuscript.

Your Sub-Committee

RECOMMEND—That their conclusions, as indicated in manuscript, be approved, and that the Town Clerk be instructed to communicate them to the County Council.

### 3.—COMMUNITY CENTRE—CLAREMONT ESTATE:

The Town Clerk submitted correspondence from local organisations and particularly from the Claremont and District Community Centre Organising Committee, urging the Council's support in the provision of the war-time mortuary building as a Community Centre on a temporary basis.

The County Council have informed the Ministry of Health that the Chief Education Officer does not consider the mortuary premises to be entirely suitable for a Community Centre, and the County Architect has reported that owing to its construction the cost of reconditioning the building for use as a Community Centre would be very high and that, since there is no heating, the installation of some form of heating would be necessary.

The Organising Committee asked if a deputation could be received to support their application to the County Council.

In their recommendations (paragraph I above) the Sub-Committee record that a site has already been offered to the County Council, and they have instructed the Town Clerk to inform the Organising Committee that it does not appear that any useful purpose would be served by a deputation being received.

- (ii) That the salary scale attaching to the appointment be that recommended by the Middlesex Excepted Districts' Association, i.e., £1,450—£1,750 per annum.
